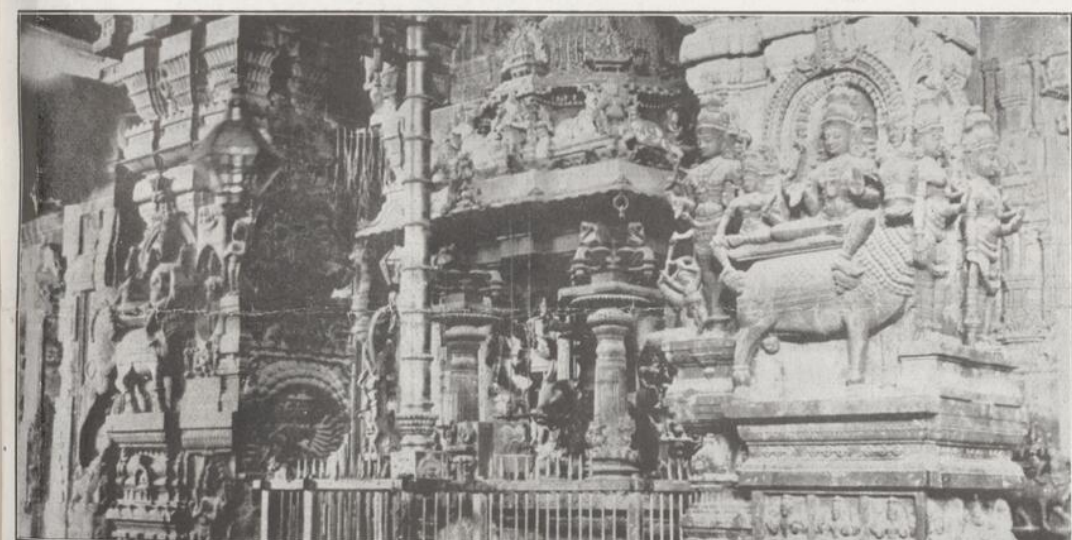

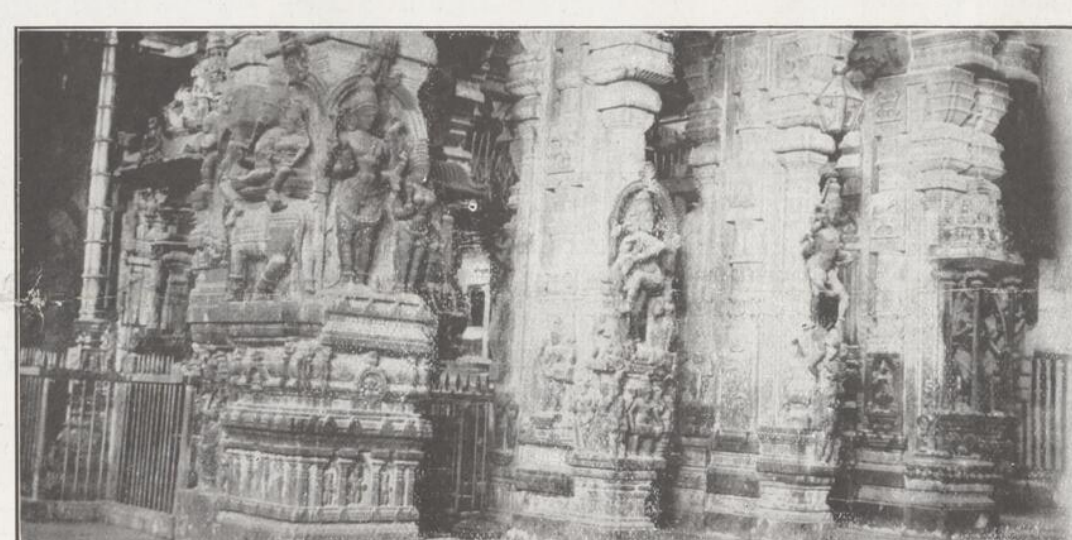

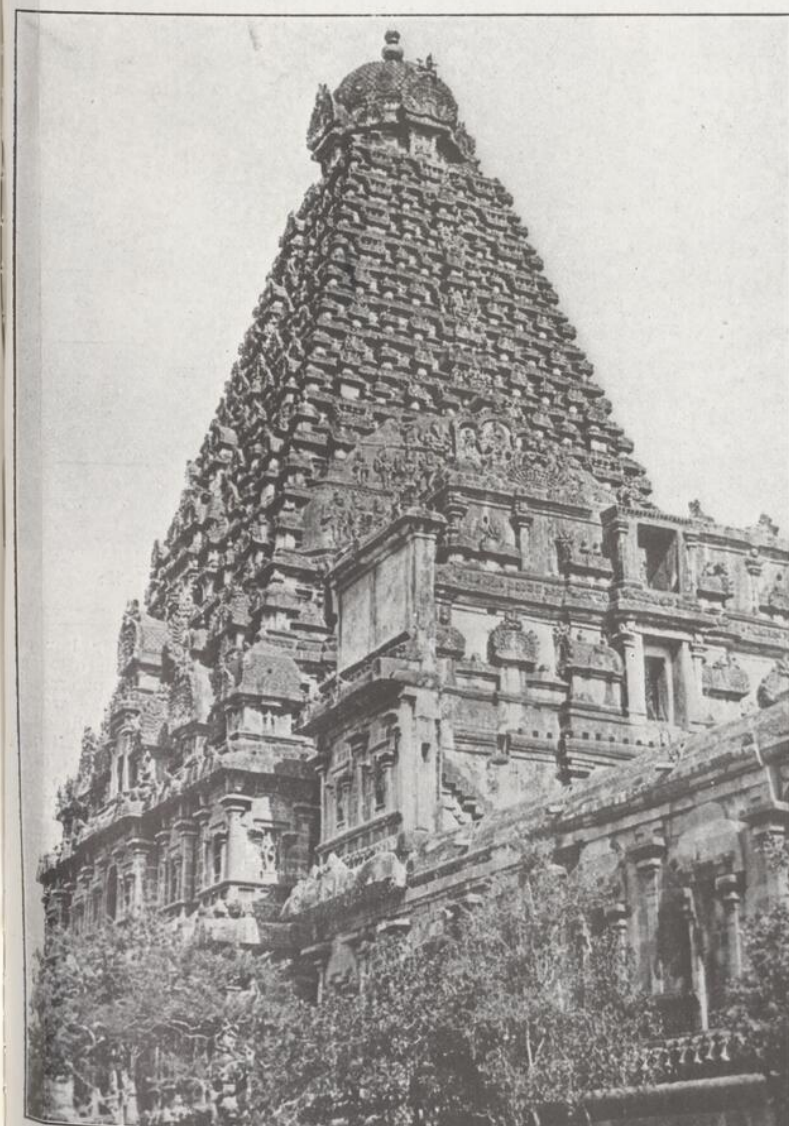

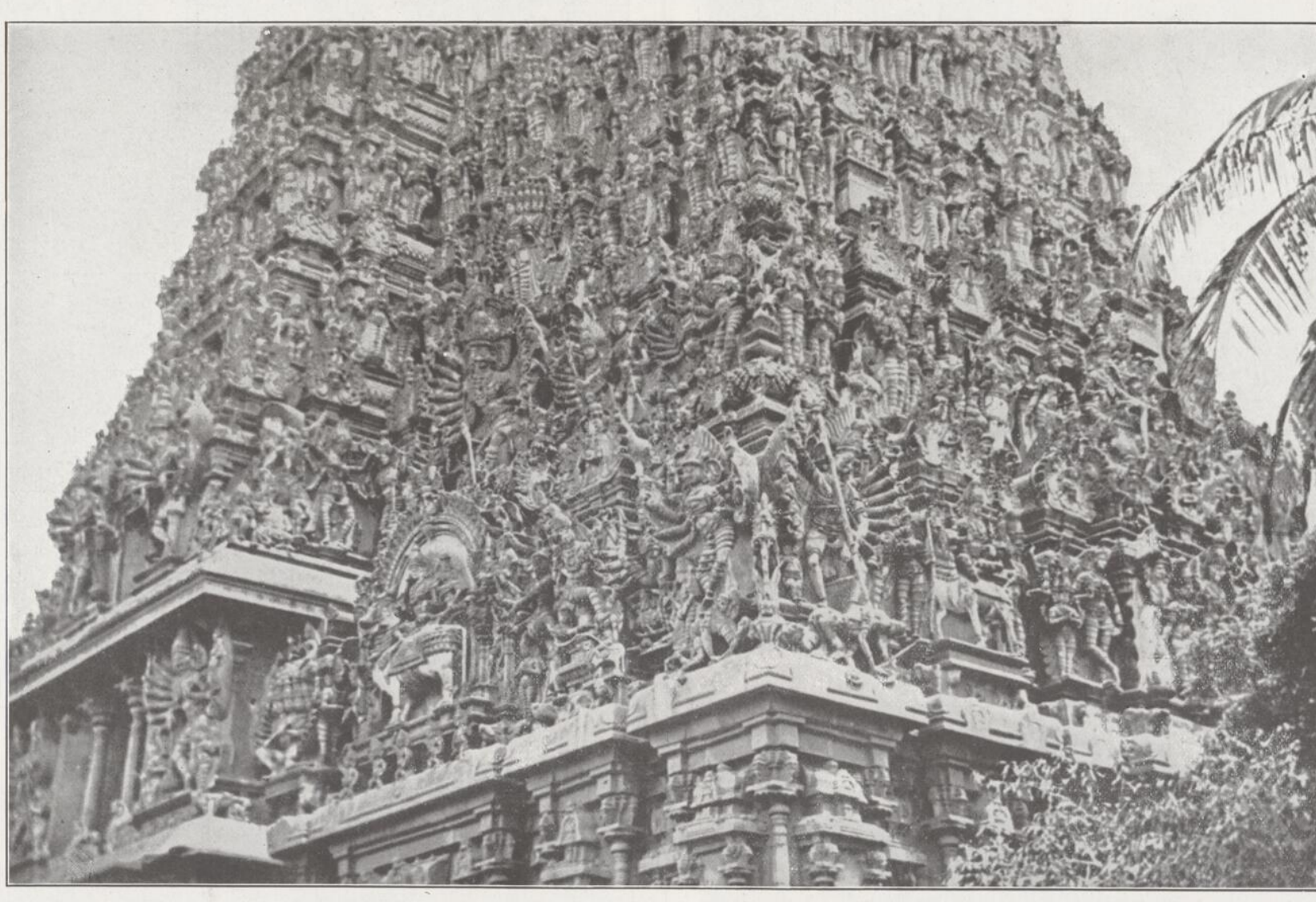

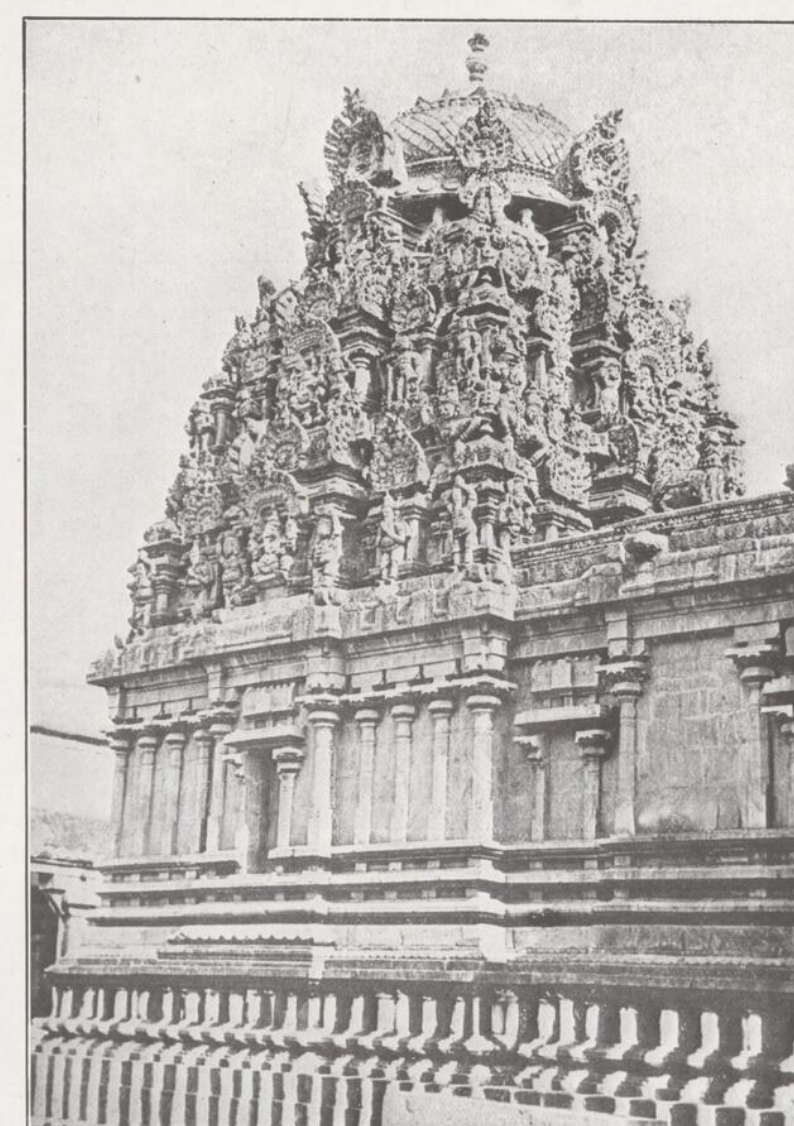

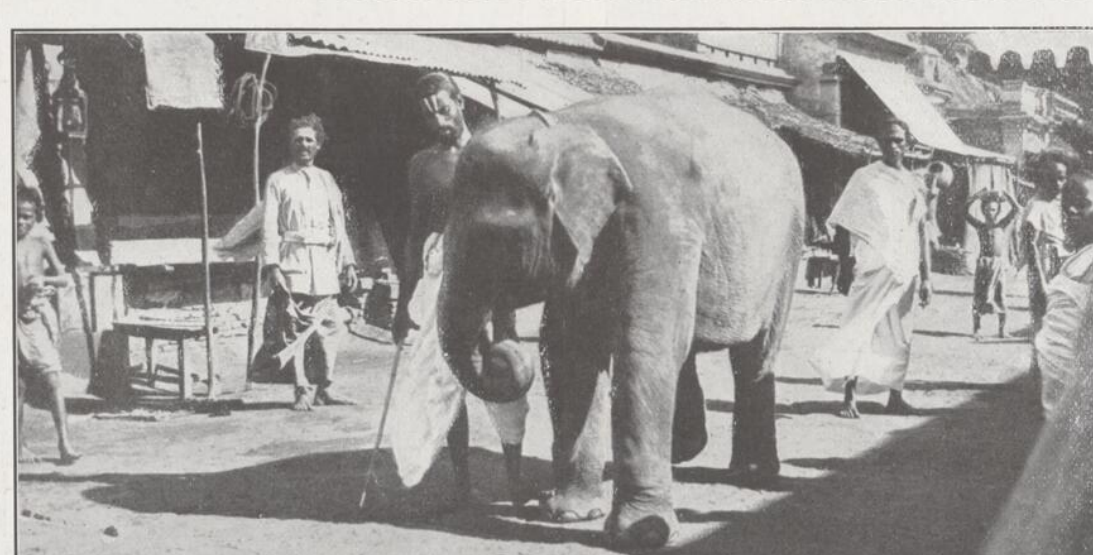

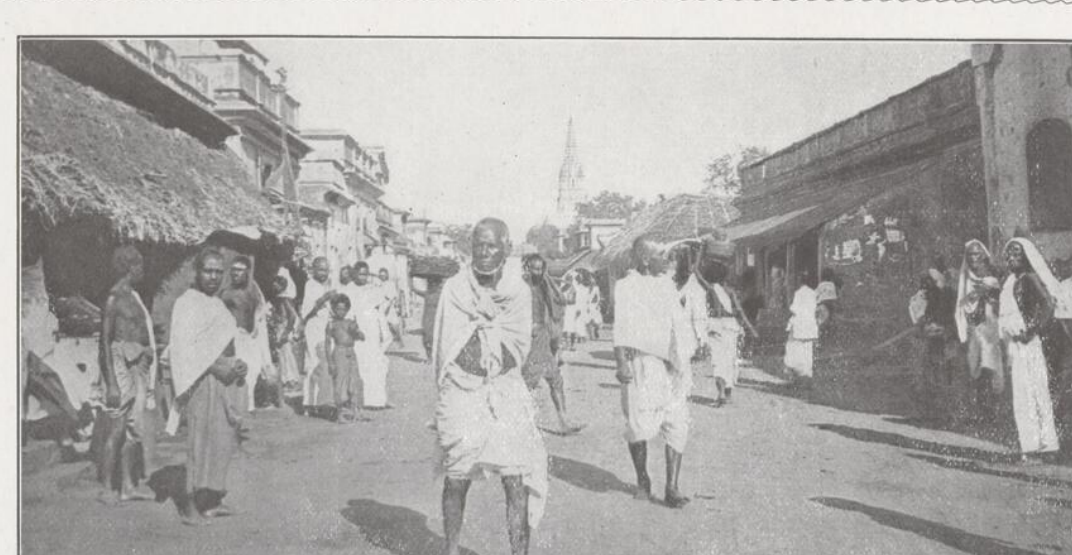

QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY, KINGSTON, has ever had the rare power of provoking the enthusiasm and loyalty of her students. The struggles through which the University has passed and the sacrifices which have made her what she is appeal strongly to the heroic in young life. Before his freshman year is over the student feels that he is a necessary part of the institution and is prepared to share actively in all that makes for her good. This is but one token that he has felt the spell of the University's individuality, her love of truth and freedom. The same spirit is manifested in the self-government among the students which at Queen's has long since passed the experimental stage and forms one of her distinctive features. Of college institutions the most notable and the most inclusive is the Alma Mater Society. It forms a bond of union between the students, alumni, and graduates, and is a medium of communication between the students and the governing bodies of the University. All students in all faculties of the University are members and the society administers through committees, or subsidiary organizations, the

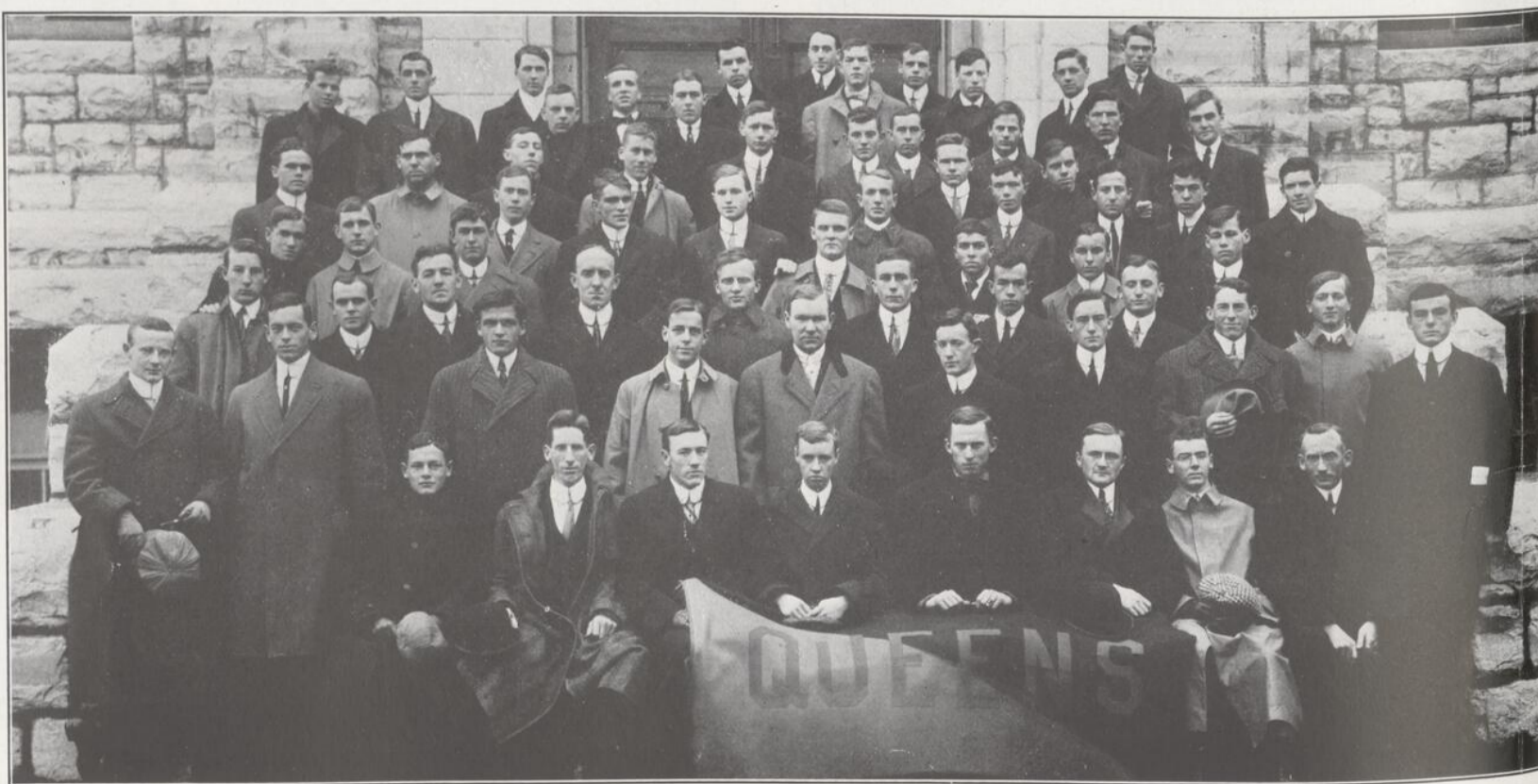
chief activities of student life, such as Athletics, The Journal, Debates, and the various musical clubs. Each faculty, too, has its society, concerned with purely faculty interests, and controlling the faculty concourse, a judicial student body, by which discipline is maintained. Such organizations as the Y.M.C.A., the Y.W.C.A., and the Missionary Association have caught the spirit of the place and have long exercised a stimulating influence upon the social and religious life of the students. The Dramatic Club, the Political Science Club, the Western Association, the Class organizations and many others are further evidence that education at Queen's is not confined to lectures and class-room problems, but takes account of the mingling of men with men in many-sided social and intellectual interests. In athletics Queen's has played a keen and sportsmanlike part. Championship honors have come to her again and again on Rugby field, on ice and track and in assault-at-arms. Better still, an increasing percentage of the students are actively participating in the various sports. The athletic equipment is being steadily improved. Three football campuses, tennis courts, a track and open-air rink have good facilities for out-of-doors games. Five years ago a spacious and modern gymnasium was pluckily and generously erected by the students themselves at a cost of \$40,000. It has already proven an inestimable boon.

The College Women.—An eminent authority has said, "Tell me the status of the women of any nation and I will tell you the quality of the civilization of that nation." Queen's has been a pioneer in recognizing and giving effect to this principle, for her attitude towards the education of women has been most liberal and progressive. Of Canadian universities she was the first to accord to women all the educational advantages of a university; the first to confer an honorary degree upon a woman; the first to elect women to a seat on a university governing board; and, despite her poverty, among the first to establish a temporary Women's Residence. Moreover,

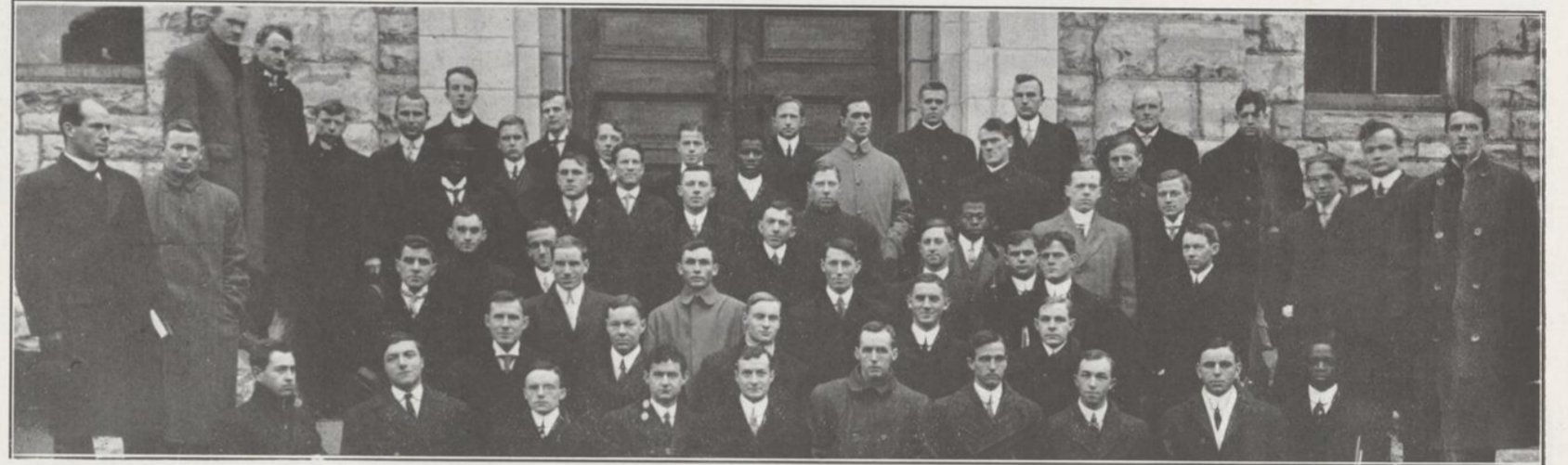

Queen's is co-educational in the fullest sense of the term. All her educational privileges, physical as well as intellectual, are shared alike by men and women. Not only do women attend the University lectures with men and compete with them at examinations, but when a thoroughly modern gymnasium was recently erected, a section was specially equipped for the women students, the main hall being reserved for their use at certain hours. Queen's women graduates have been singled out as possessing a marked individuality. The struggles of the Uni-

versity have bred in her women as well as in her men the power to initiate, to endure, and to sacrifice for a cause. When an appeal was made to the graduates and undergraduates to erect Grant Hall, the women responded generously, not only by personal contributions, but also by personal canvass. At present Queen's women are active as never before. They realize that if Queen's is to hold her own in the front rank of coeducational colleges, an adequate Women's Residence, such as those existing at other Canadian Universities, must be established; and that this work, because of the many problems which now confront Queen's, must be undertaken by the

women themselves. An Alumnae Association has been organized which has adopted as its special work a scheme sanctioned by the Board of Trustees, to raise \$50,000 to build a Women's Residence as a memorial to the late Mrs. Gordon. A vigorous campaign has been outlined and the women of Queen's are practically a unit in the determination to bring this enterprise to a successful issue.

The Graduates.—Queen's has done much for her intellectual and spiritual children. Not the least among her gifts is the impulse to her graduates to repay their debt to her by serving the community and nation. As a rule they have been quick to discern and accept the responsibilities of leadership that belong to University men. They number now about 8,500. The majority as teachers, physicians, ministers, lawyers, engineers, and in other allied callings hold a high place in the social, professional and commercial life of the Dominion, while many have won distinction in other lands. But absorption in the world's work has not made them unmindful of their Alma Mater. The efficiency and prestige of the University are due in no small measure to their substantial gifts and willing sacrifices. To renew the fellowship of earlier days, Alumni Associations have been formed in the principal cities of the Dominion.



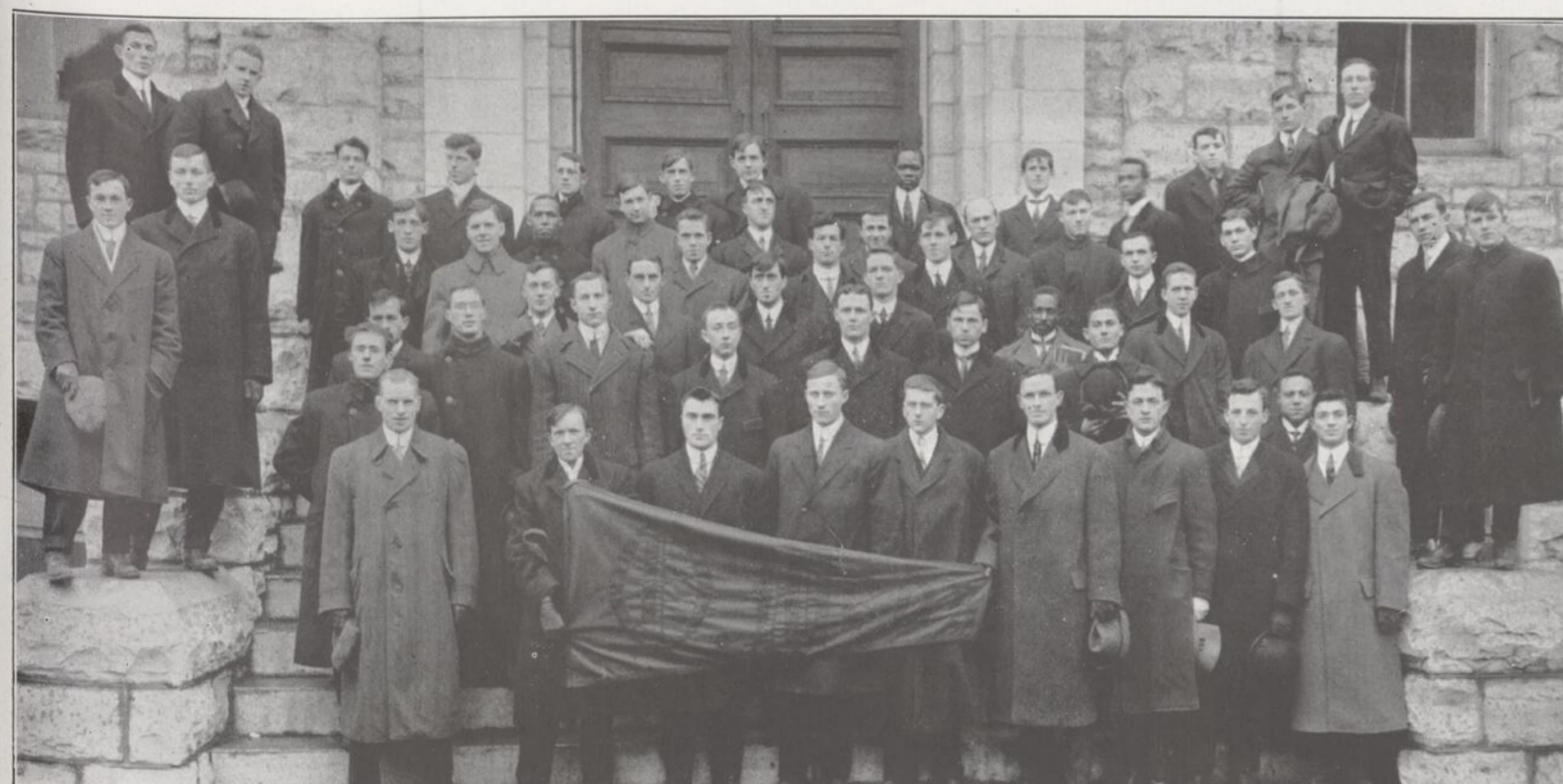

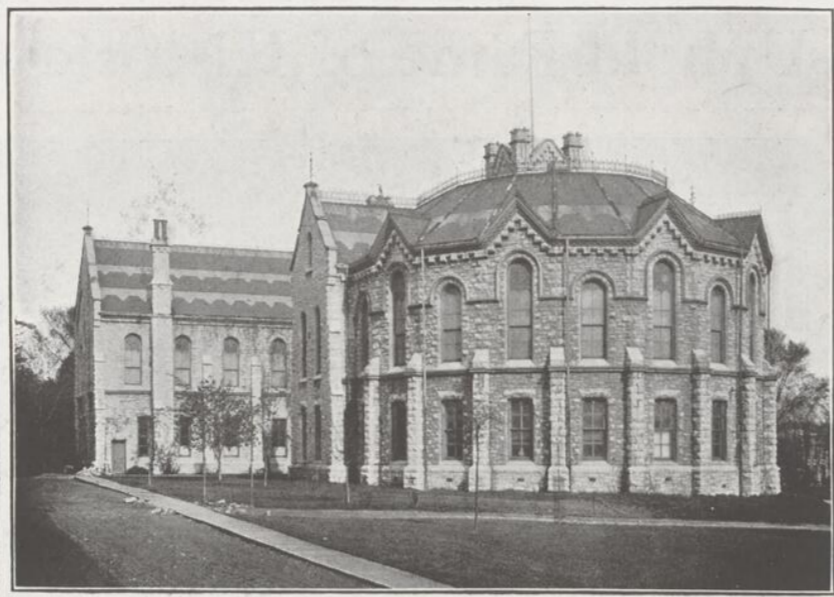

THE following is an official description of the illustrations which appear on Pages 4 and 5 of this Supplement, of buildings and persons connected with Queen's University, Kingston.

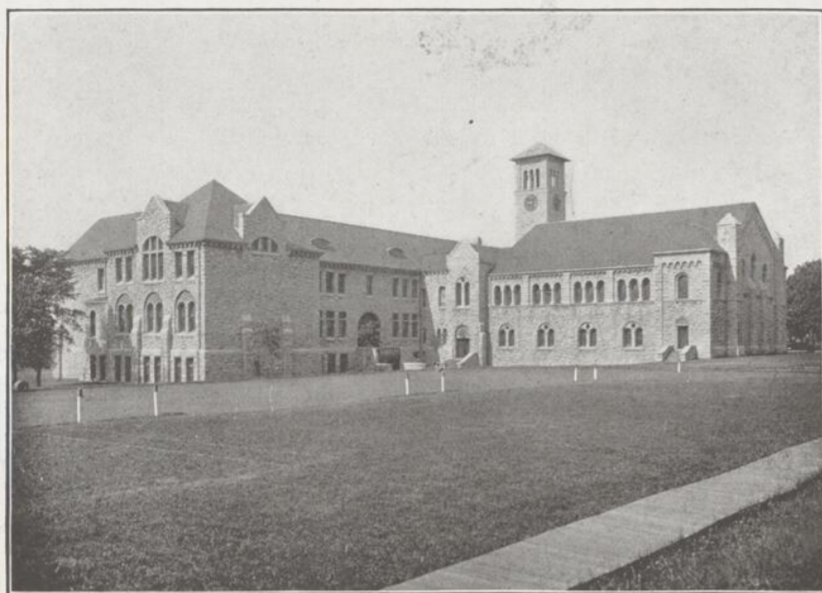
The Medical Building was from 1858 to 1880 the chief home of the University, and the second oldest building on the campus. It was enlarged in 1901, and now contains the Department of Anatomy, Medical Classrooms, Offices, Library, etc.

The opening of the Medical Laboratories Building marked a new era in Medical education at Queen's. It was erected in 1907 with funds granted by the Ontario Legislature, and contains modern equipment for the Departments of Animal Biology and Physiology, Pathology and Bacteriology.

The residence of the Principal is the oldest building on the campus. It was acquired by the University in 1853, and for several years was the home of the Arts and Theological Faculties.

The Gymnasium was erected in 1906 by the Students of Queen's. Like Grant Hall, it is a striking tribute to their loyalty and esprit d'corps, and probably is without a parallel in the history of Canadian Universities.

The story of Queen's is more fully

Railways. He has also rendered important services in the introduction of the twenty-four hour system of time and the Standard Time now in use in Canada, and in promoting the construction of the All-Red Cable, and the reform of the Calendar. His benefactions to the University have been timely and generous, and his devotion to her interests unceasing.

The Very Reverend Daniel Minor Gordon, D.D., LL.D., has been Principal of Queen's University since 1902, and is one of that notable band of educationists which Nova Scotia has given to North America. Prior to his coming to Queen's, in succession to Principal Grant, Dr. Gordon ministered with distinction in St. Andrew's Church, Ottawa; Knox Church, Winnipeg; and St. Andrew's, Halifax; and for several years occupied the Chair of Systematic Theology and Apologetics in the Presbyterian College, Halifax. He has presided over Queen's during one of the most significant and progressive periods of its history.

portrayed in the interior of the old Convocation Hall than in any other building. The portraits shown in the illustration are those of distinguished leaders and teachers of the University, and a number of memorial tablets keep green and fresh the memory of thousands of its benefactors.

The Main Driveway gives a glimpse of the trees and shrubberies that beautify the University Grounds. The Observatory was built in 1908. It is the successor of one of the oldest observatories in Canada, and has an unobstructed north and south view of the heavens.

The Old Arts Building was erected in 1879-1880 with funds contributed for the most part by the citizens of Kingston. The corner-stone was laid by the Marquis of Lorne and H.R.H. the Princess Louise. For twenty years it was the chief home of the University. It now contains the Library, Museum, Administration Offices, Old Convocation Hall, the Faculty of Theology and the Botanical Laboratories and Class-rooms.

The City of Kingston has been unwavering in its loyalty to Queen's University. It won for itself a unique place among Canadian municipalities by passing a by-law granting funds for the erection of the Kingston Building. The corner-stone was laid on October 16th, 1901, by the present King and Queen, and the building was occupied the following year.

A tablet of brass in Grant Hall has the following inscription: "This tablet is placed by order of the Trustees of Queen's University, to commemorate the loyalty and liberality of the students, who, of their own accord, in November, 1901, undertook to erect at their own cost a new Hall of Convocation, to be known as 'Grant Hall, in honor of George Monro Grant, who, for twenty-five years, was the famed and much-loved principal of the University, and whose lamented death on May 11th, 1902, gave the noble act of the students the solemnity of a Memorial."

The John Carruthers' Science Hall was the first Chemistry Building erected in Canada in 1890. It was named after the late John Carruthers, of Kingston, who gave largely towards its erection. It has been lately remodelled for the department of Civil Engineering.

Ontario Hall, containing Geology, Mineralogy, Physics, and Museum of Economic Mineralogy and Geology, was built in 1902 with funds granted by the Ontario Legislature.

Fleming Hall is devoted to Electrical and Mechanical Engineering. It was built in 1902 with funds granted by the Ontario Legislature, and was named in honor of Sir Sandford Fleming, K.C.M.G.

Gordon Hall, the Chemistry Building, was erected in 1910-11 with funds granted by the Ontario Legislature. The corner-stone was laid in April, 1910, by Sir James Whitney, who named the building in honor of Principal Gordon.

One of the most attractive features of the buildings of Queen's University is that they are built uniformly of limestone in which the district about Kingston abounds.

Sir Sandford Fleming, K.C.M.G., LL.D., is Queen's "Grand Old Man," and has been Chancellor of the University continuously since 1880. Sir Sandford is one of the outstanding figures in Canadian life. In earlier days he was Chief Engineer of the Inter-colonial and the Canadian Pacific

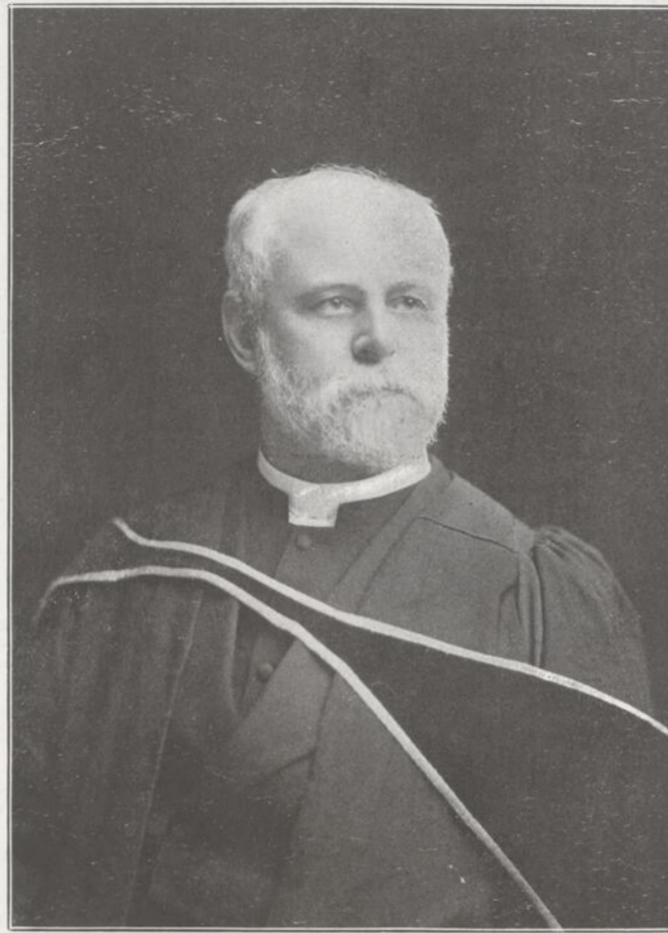

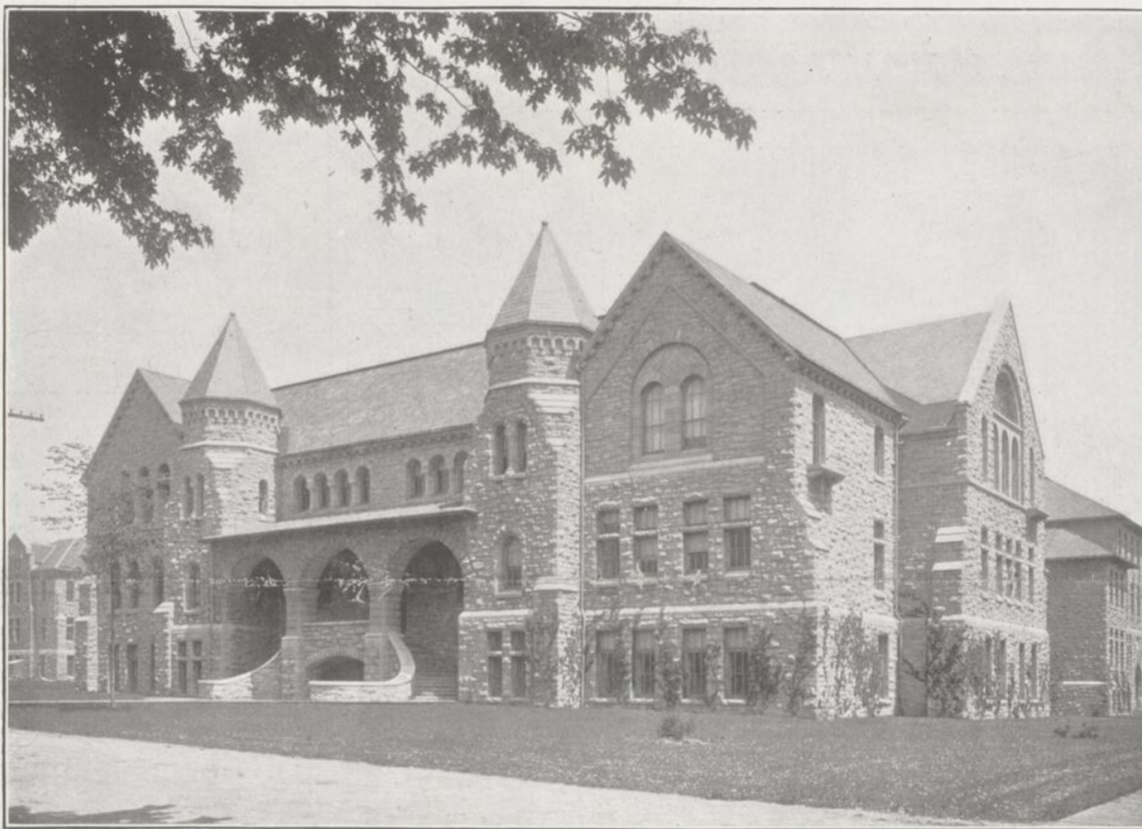

THE MAKING OF QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY, KINGSTON.

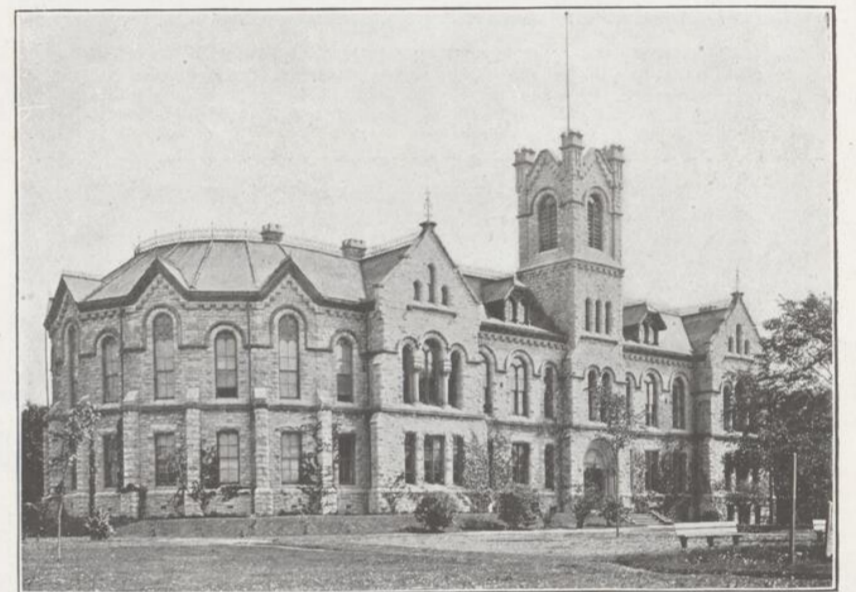
QUEEN'S awoke one morning and found herself "national." So much of the best work of the world is done unconsciously. The men who began the College seventy years ago were not thinking so much of the future as of their own immediate need of an institution wherein religion and learning might be cultivated together; as it was expressed in the first proposal:—"Following the Universities of our native land as a model, we shall take up the pupil at the point to which the district and grammar school has conducted him and introduce him to those higher studies that may qualify him for public and professional avocations." It is a matter of history that Queen's was founded not as a denominational College but as a protest against sectarianism, which at that time had seized upon and held possession of the Provincial University. The



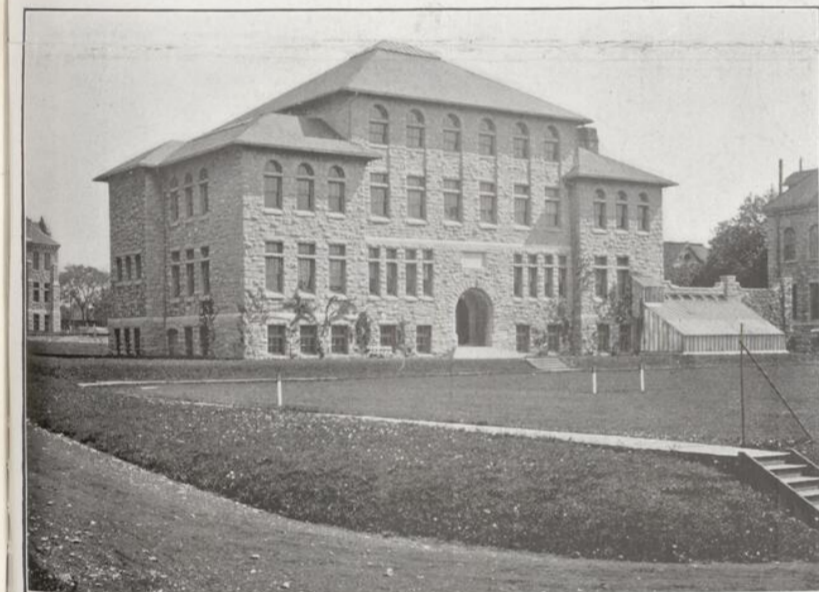
The Medical Laboratories at Queen's University, Kingston.

notion of a denominational College was foreign to the minds of the fathers of Queen's. The Scottish National University hand-in-hand with the National Church was the only type they knew, and it they followed. It would have its Theological Faculty, in which the national religion would be taught, and its Arts Faculty was to be open to all. The religious test required of its teachers was in accord with the practice of the Scottish Universities at that day. The Royal Charter was granted in 1841, "For the educating of youth in the Christian religion and in Arts and Sciences." It was the nick of time. The old order was passing, bureaucracy was being displaced by responsible government, and new heart and hope animated the people. Funds were subscribed in Toronto, Kingston, Montreal and elsewhere, and work began in 1842 with ten students and two professors. Dr. Liddell, a man of ability and force, was sent from Scotland to head the infant College, and Dr. Campbell, afterwards the brilliant Principal of Aberdeen University, taught classics. In the next session came Dr. Williamson and began his fifty years of faithful and fruitful service. The struggle

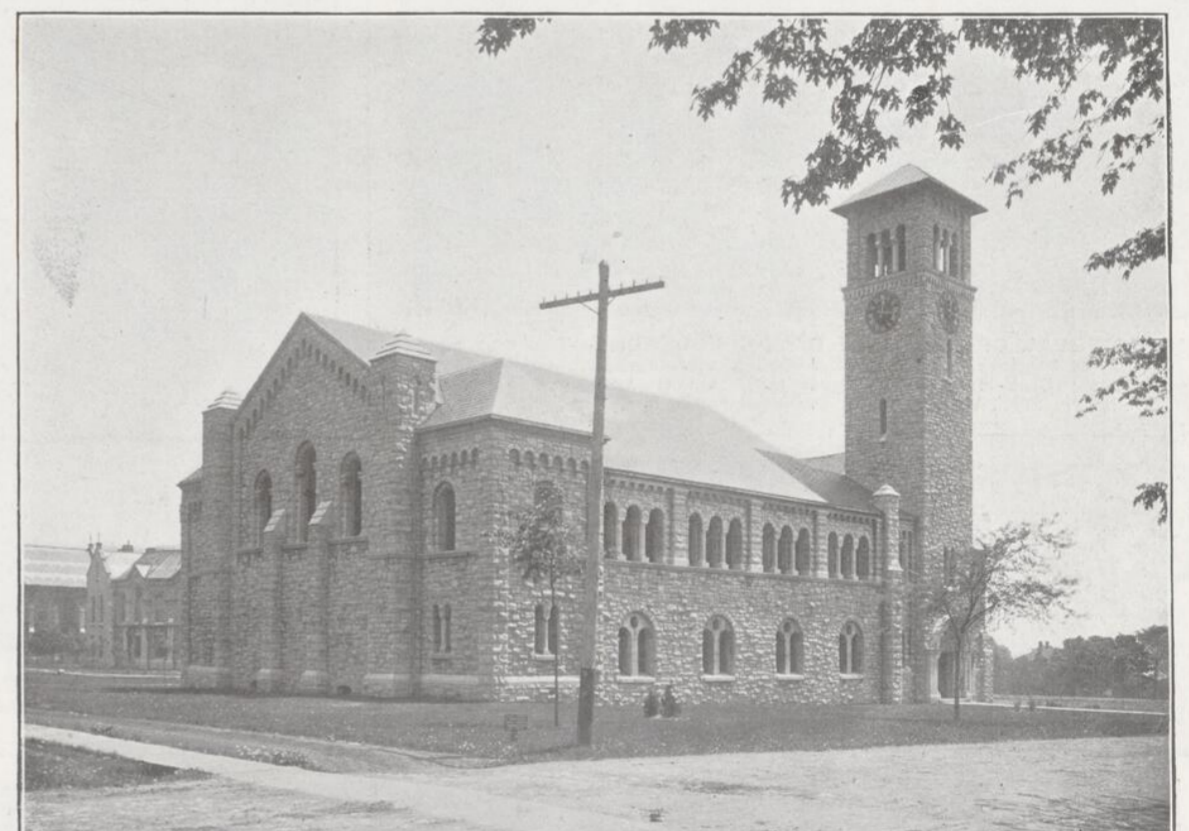

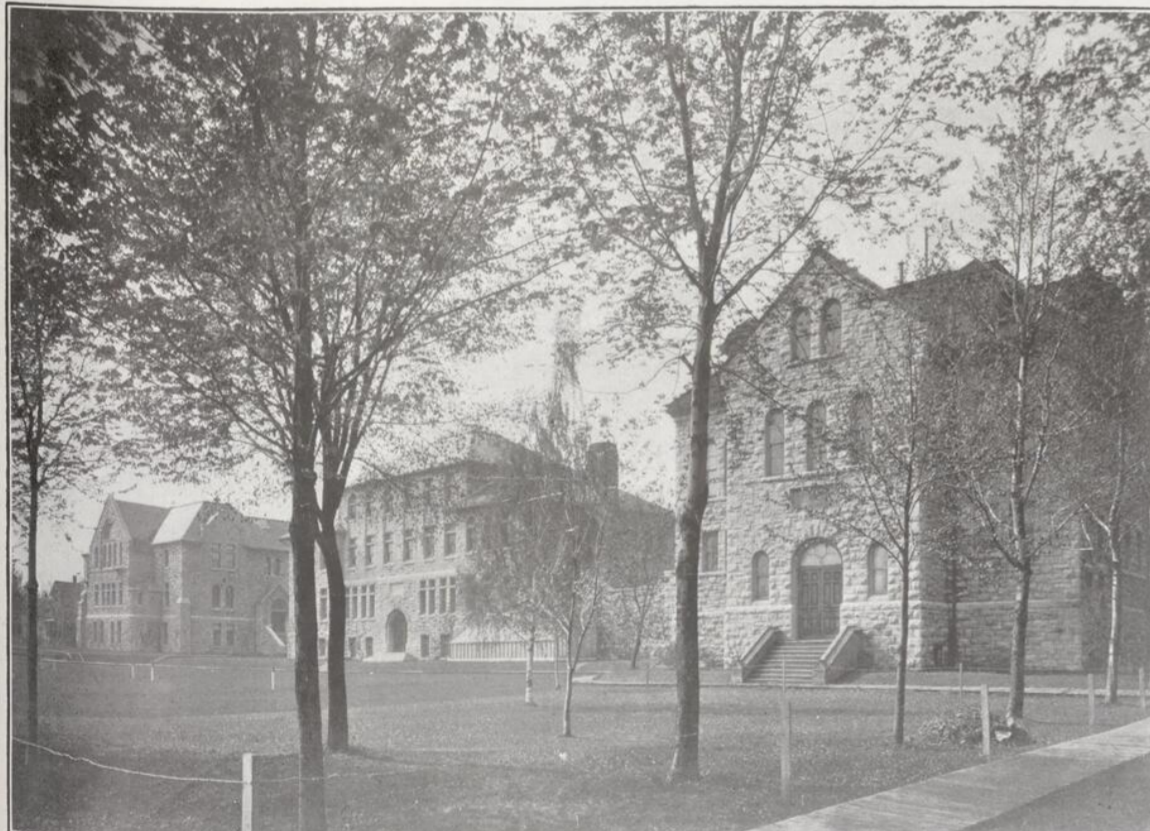
The Gymnasium at Queen's University, Kingston.

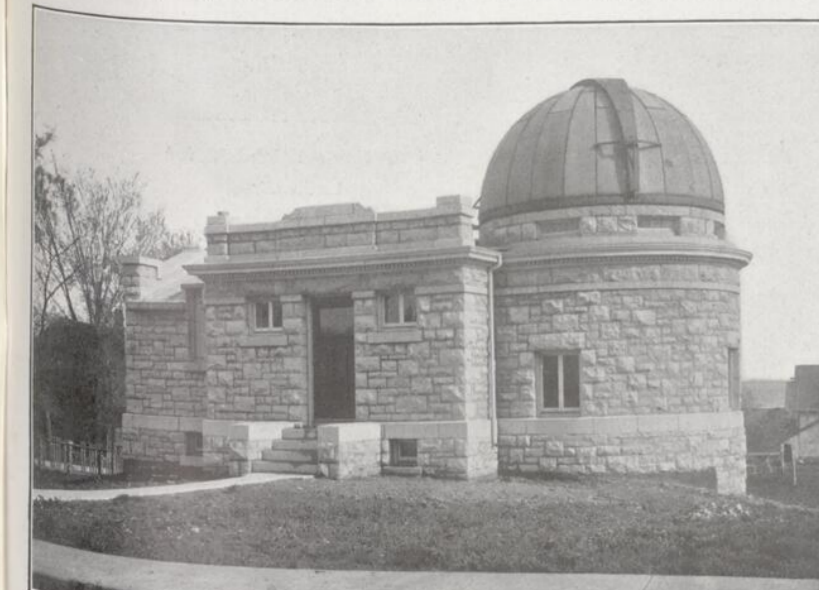
Dr. Liddell did not stay long, and after him "good Dr. Machar" of St. Andrew's Church became Principal and kept the flag flying until 1852, when Dr. George was appointed Vice-Principal and brought his originality, his personal force, and his strong character to give fresh life to the institution and impart some portion of his enthusiasm of humanity to his students. After him were Dr. Cook and Dr. Leitch, both men well fitted to fill the office of Principal. Then Dr. Snodgrass, in 1862, on the lamented death of Leitch. If men could have foreseen the calamities that were to befall the struggling College in 1868 they could not have chosen a man better fitted to encounter them than he. Steadfast and immovable amid the buffetings of the storm, he held on his course undaunted through all the strain and stress of that desperate struggle for existence. The Provin-

the first he gathered about him friends, who became friends of Queen's first for his sake, and then for her own, conspicuous amongst them all being her great Chancellor. What Grant did for Queen's would fill books. The strongest intellectual powers combined with tireless energy, the force of the orator, a sympathetic nature, infinite tact, a kindly, genial, wholesome disposition, and a rare moral enthusiasm made him a unique personality, attracting and charming all sorts and conditions of men, and sometimes sacrificing them when they stood in the way of his great plans, as he sacrificed himself.

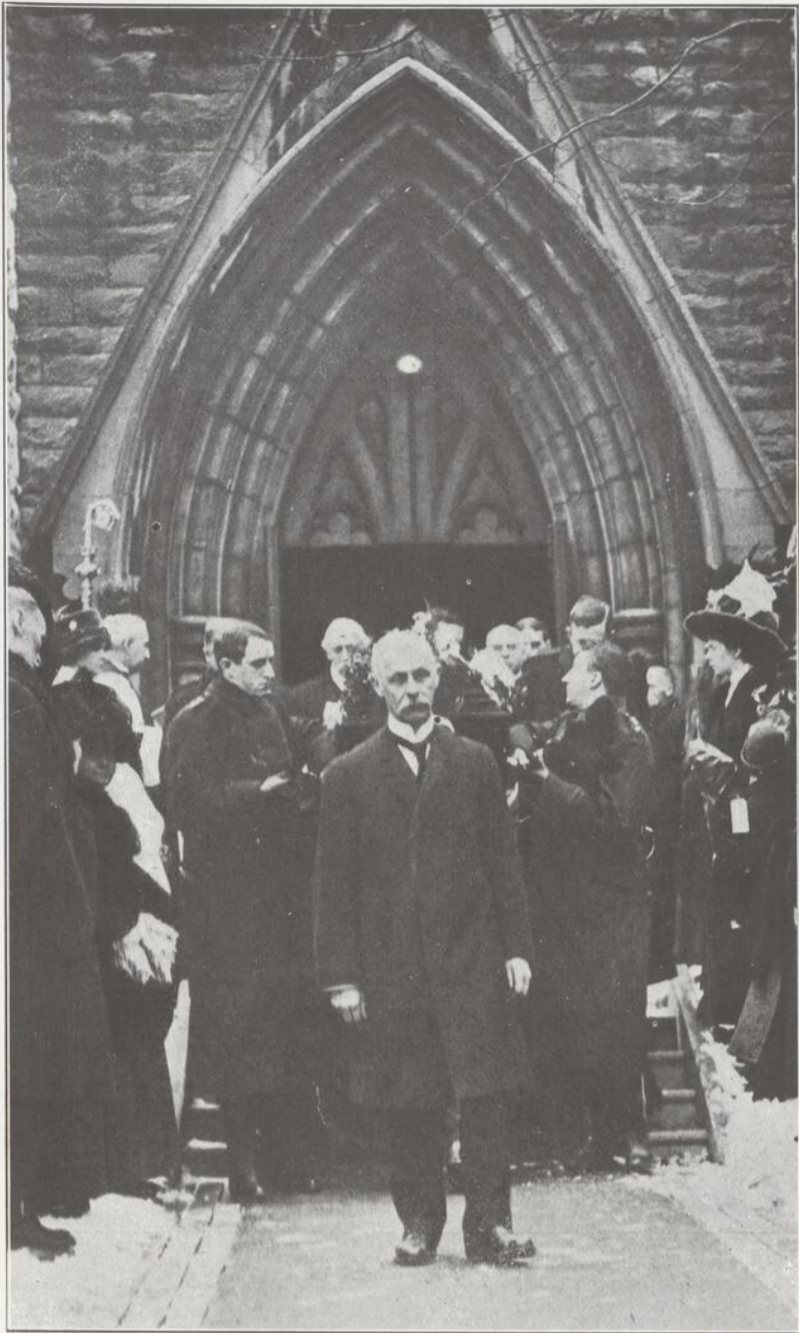
It was the cheerful saying of one of his most devoted friends on the staff: "We know we are only pawns on the board." The buildings on the campus tell the story in stone of his triumphal progress, and his spiritual children, Dyde, Shortt, Gandier, and the rest, are the fruits by which we may know what manner of man essentially he was. There is no harder work than to raise a college endowment, and that was the least part of what he did for Queen's. When we talk about the spirit of Queen's the thing we mean is the spirit of the men who have made her.



The Principal's Residence at Queen's University, Kingston.



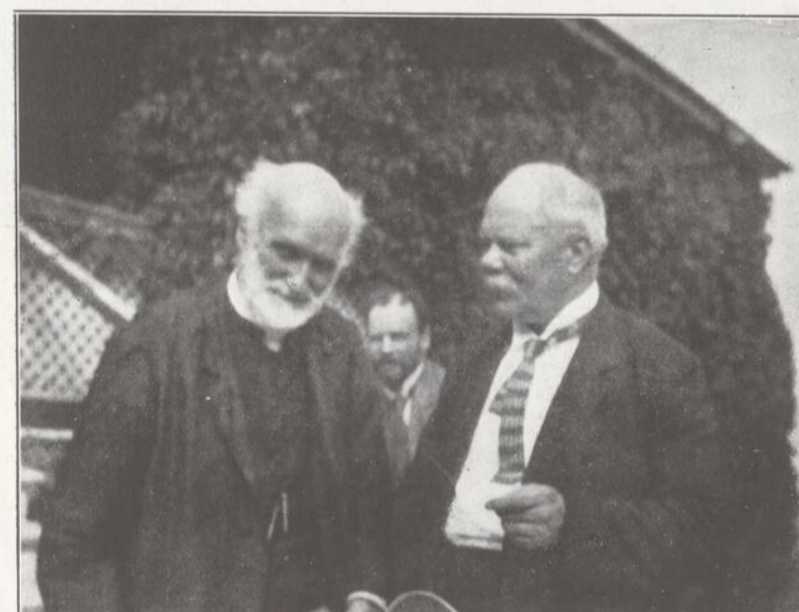

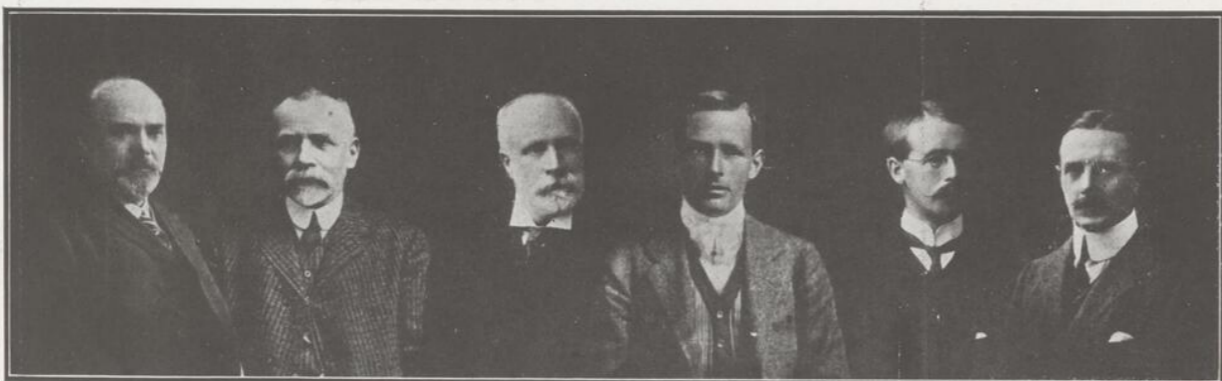

The King's Camp at the Delhi Durbar, which was held on Tuesday last, is a very beautiful place. As one looks up the grand avenue, one faces a huge Shamiana, in which both the investiture and the reception were held. This tent is capable of seating over three thousand spectators, and the decorations are all of blue and white and gold. Behind this Shamiana is the

King's State dining-tent, hung with blue, where 160 guests attended the State banquet. Their Majesties' private apartments, or rather tents, are on the right of the big State Shamiana, and the Viceroy has a somewhat similar encampment to the left. The arrangement of the tents is certainly perfect. The green lawns and gardens in many of the big camps, and especially those around the King's Camp, are perfectly charming, and over \$5,000 is reported to have been spent on the rose plots near the Queen's tents. For miles in front of His Majesty's quarters lie the other camps comprising the Durbar city. There

were in all some 135 ruling Princes present at the Durbar, and the camps of these chiefs were in close proximity to that of the King-Emperor, and were mainly situated along the thoroughfares appropriately called Kings-way and the Coronation Road. The King arrived at the centre of the great plain about three miles from his camp

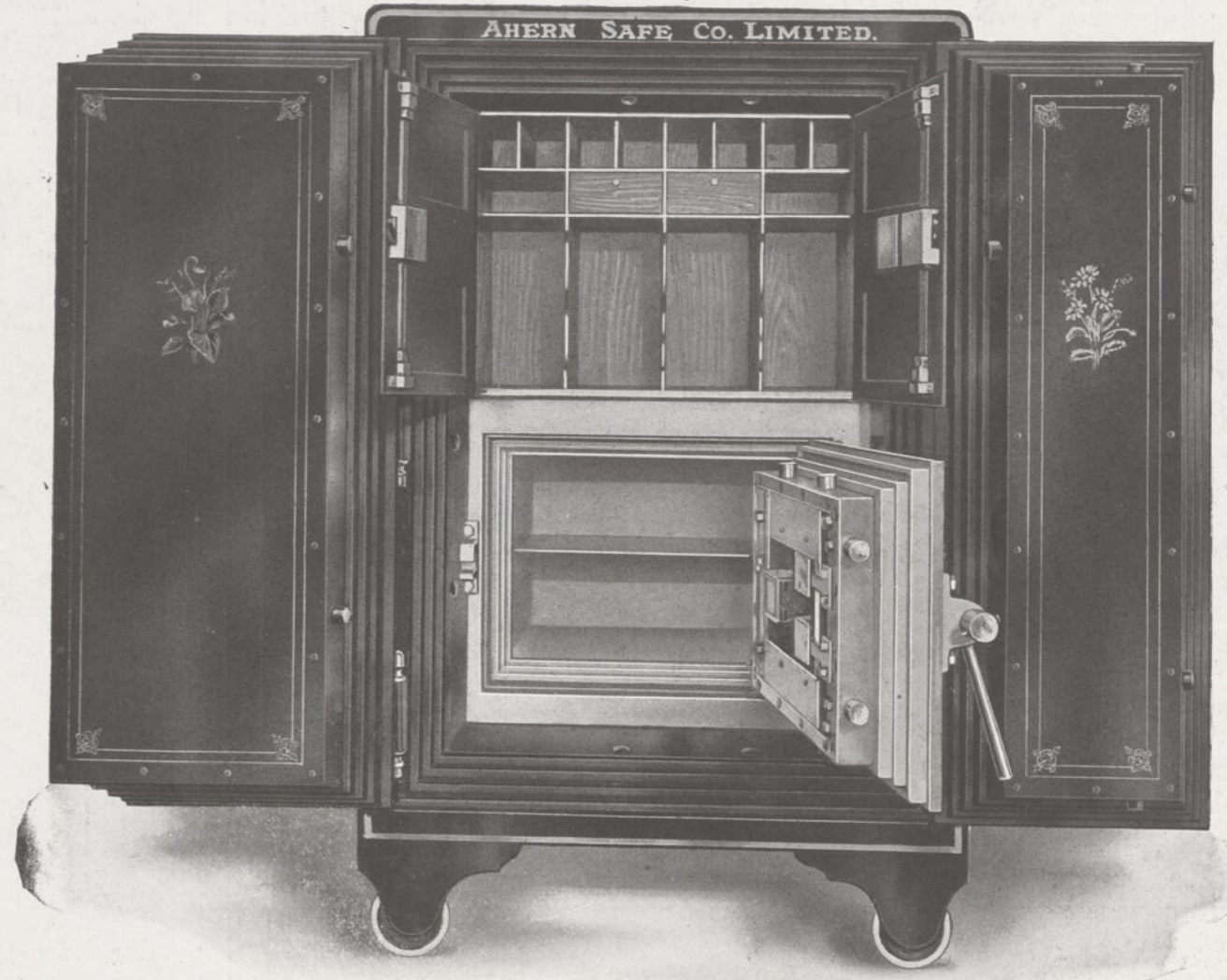

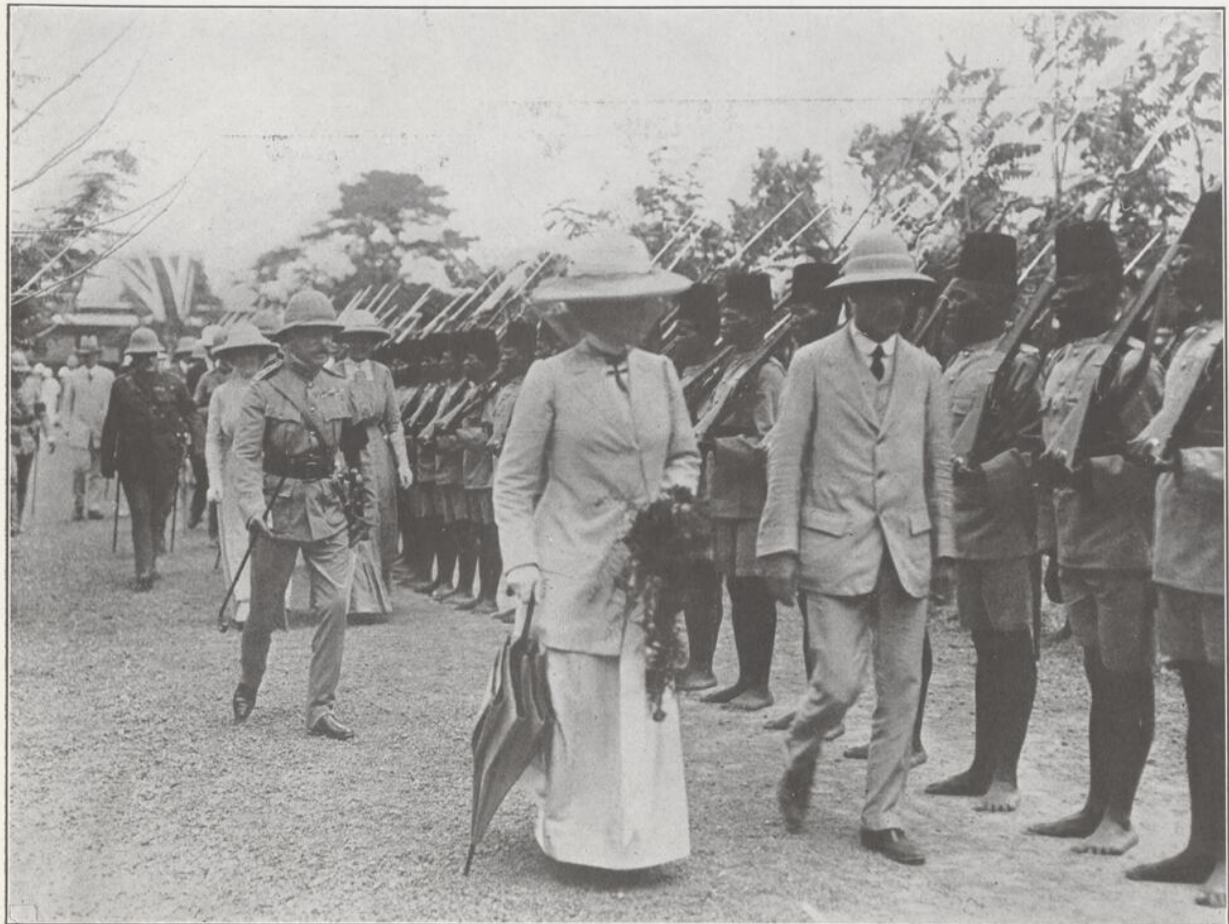
for the Durbar in State procession, and proceeded half round an enormous banked-up arena calculated to hold some 50,000 to 80,000 spectators. Thence he proceeded to the centre of a smaller amphitheatre, which accommodated some 12,000 persons only. These privileged persons comprised the Indian Chiefs, the Governors, and Lieutenant-Governors, the Imperial and Provincial Councils, with all the leading officials, nobility, and gentry of India. After receiving the homage of the chiefs, on a special dais under a regal purple canopy, His Majesty and the Queen proceeded to a splendid marble dome, surmounted with a golden dome, situated about 100 yards from the centre of the small amphitheatre, and showed themselves in their Coronation robes and crowns to the assembled multitude. As some 20,000 troops, with the heralds and massed bands consisting of nearly 2,000 men, were assembled round the dais in front of the huge assembly on the big earth mound, the scene almost defied description. Their Majesties, on leaving after the ceremony, proceeded home to their camps round the second half of the huge circle, and travelled along the Princes Road through a number of other camps belonging to Indian Princes. The State entry into Delhi was also a grand spectacular affair, though on all sides there seems to be much regret that an elephant procession was not arranged.

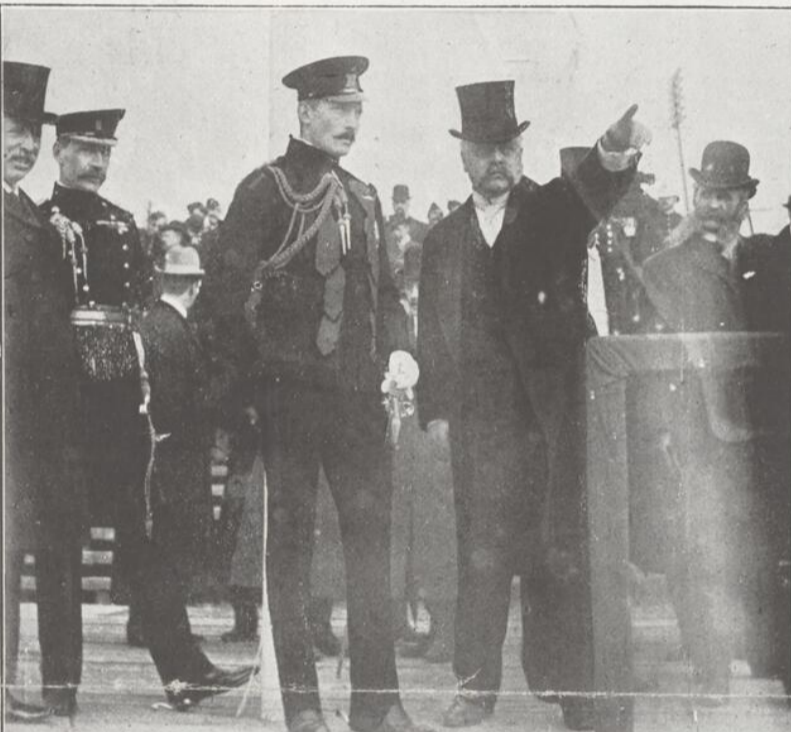

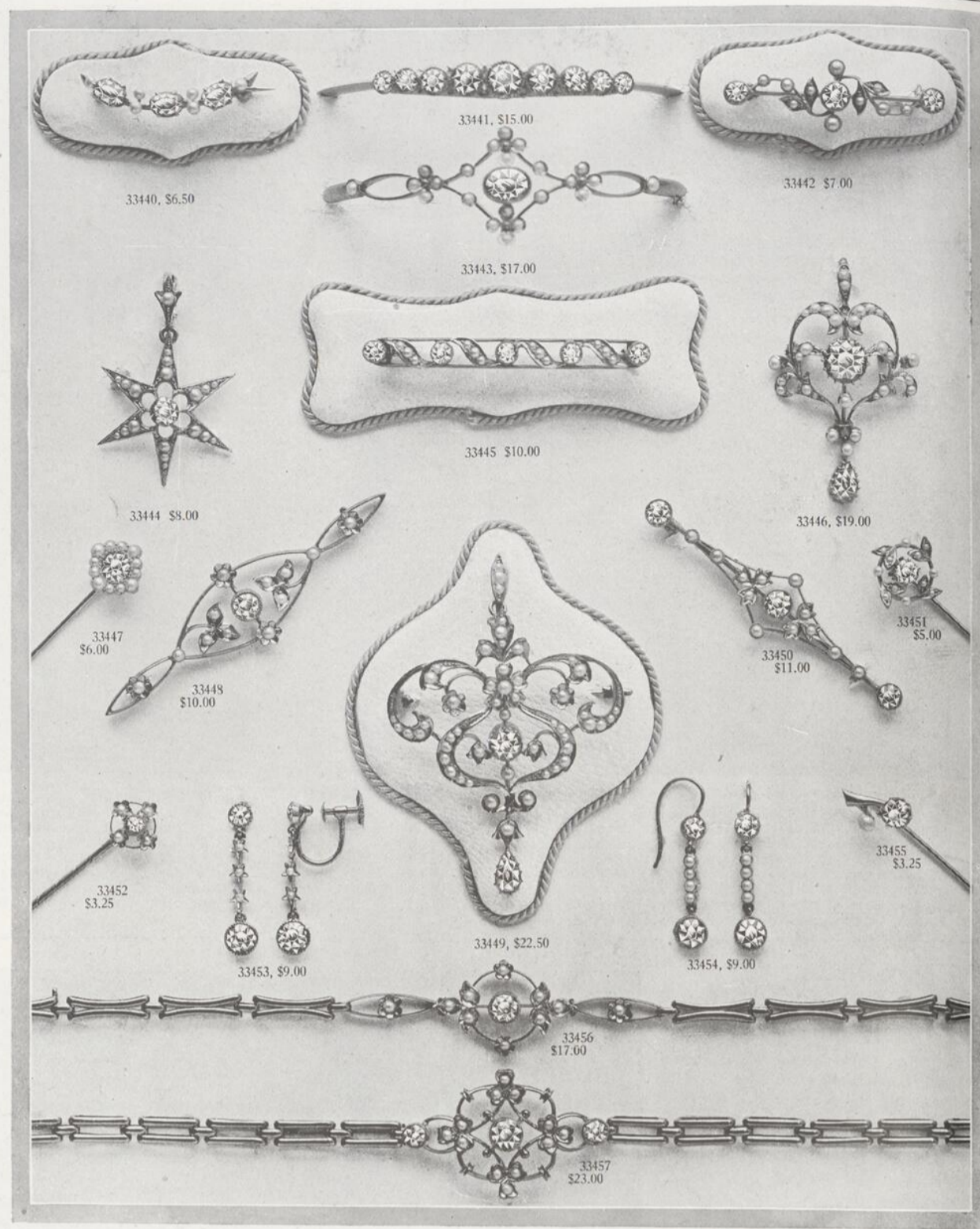

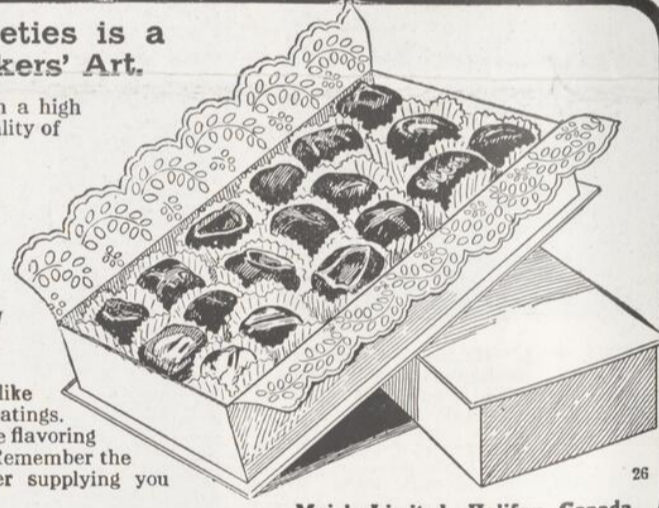
