VIEWS AT VATICAN REGARDING PEACE

MGR. TEDESCHINI SUCCEEDS
GASPARRI AS POPE'S PRIME
MINISTER.

New York, August 10.—A cable message from Paris received by the official French Bureau of Information in this city and made public tonight, indicates that Monsignor Frederico Tedeschini, who has been Under-Secretary of State of the Vatican, has succeeded Cardinal Gasparri as Pope Benedict's Prime Minister. Previous dispatches direct from Rome credited "many Italian newspapers and some authorities on Vatican affairs," as affirming that Cardinal Gasparri had resigned, partly because of ill-health and partly because of the Pope's desire to institute a new policy in relation to Germany. The semi-official Vatican organ flatly denied, however, that the Cardinal had retired. The message received by the Bureau of Information quotes Monsignor Tedeschini as declaring for a "peace of justice." It follows:

"In a conversation with Monsignor Frederico Tedeschini, new Secretary of State of the Vatican, had with the Rome correspondent of the A. B. C., a Spanish newspaper, he made the following declarations:

"Only a Christian peace is desirable, because it will be a peace of justice. Some people have pretended that a Christian peace ought to be a white peace or a peace without result; that is, a peace bringing the world back to the status quo ante.

"This is not exact. We believe, on the contrary, that there are rights which justice must respect. We cannot believe, for instance, that Catholic Poland will revert to the same state as it was before the war. As Christians we cannot approve that Palestine should remain under Turkish yoke.

"We believe also that everyone would be satisfied to see Alsace-Lorraine returned to France. We believe finally that if the Italian provinces now under Austrian domination would be attributed to Italy, no Christian would oppose it, just as no Christian would declare himself opposed to the unification of Rumania in the east."

GERMAIN LIBERATED BY THE COURT.

Hon. Justice Lavergne in chambers yesterday morning, rendered judgment in the appeal of F. X. Germain, ex-manager of the Crown street branch of the Singer Sewing Machine Company, who was sentenced by the Hon. Judge Langelier, in the Court of Sessions some time ago, to six months imprisonment on the charge of defrauding the company. Hon. Justice Lavergne annulled the judgment of the lower court and liberated Germain on habeas corpus proceedings on the grounds of a compromise between plaintiff and defendant. The habeas corpus proceedings were entered on behalf of Mr. Germain by Mr. Henri Bernier, advocate, with Mr. Alphonse Taschereau as counsel, the plaintiff's being represented by Mr. J. A. Laine, K.C., and the Crown by Mr. Arthur Fitzpatrick, K.C.

LORD ROBERT CECIL GIVES INTERVIEW

SHOWS TREMENDOUS WAR
BURDEN CHEERFULLY
SHOULDERED BY BRITISH
PEOPLE.

London, August 10.—Lord Robert Cecil, Minister of Blockade, in his weekly talk with The Associated Press today discussed Great Britain's war expenditure in the hope that a better idea of its details might serve to show the people of the United States what a tremendous war burden the people of Great Britain have cheerfully shouldered.

"In the period from April 1, 1914, to August 4, 1917, the British government's total expenditures has been \$26,378,000,000," Lord Robert declared. "Nearly one-fifth of this figure, or \$5,320,000,000 has been advanced to our allies.

"How does this hit the ordinary citizen? Well, we raised a considerable part of this expenditure by taxation, and taxation per head in Great Britain has increased from less than \$18 per year before the war to \$61 yearly at present. Of this average \$61 which every man, woman and child pays annually to the government, \$30 is collected by direct taxation, namely, income tax, excess profits tax, stamp tax and death duties of inheritance tax. The other \$31 comes from indirect taxation, namely, customs or excise.

"We now are raising \$310,000,000 yearly by direct taxation and \$2,335,000,000 by indirect taxation. It may be added that heavy restrictions have been put on all government expenditure which is not immediately required for war purposes and on private expenditures wherever such restriction was possible. To take one instance, the building trades have been practically at a standstill since the commencement of the war so that there is a large shortage of houses at the present time.

"The people have responded wonderfully to appeals for voluntary restrictions in food expenditure, and an increasing proportion of all classes is practising economy in every possible direction, putting the fruit of such economy at the service of the government in the form of loans. Popular loans have had a wide success and today over 35,000 civilian associations are at work collecting small private war loan subscriptions."

DISASTROUS DAY FOR GERMAN AIR SERVICE.

British Front in France and Belgium, August 10.—Yesterday was a disastrous day for the German air service which again was active after a long spell of bad weather that precluded observation. Seven enemy airplanes were crashed to earth, and another was driven down out of control. The German sausage observation balloons also had a bad time. Two of them were destroyed and four others, emitting smoke, were forced to descend in a flabby condition. Three others were hit by British airmen and were more forced by long range fire from the British guns.

BRITISH AND FRENCH ARMIES MADE FURTHER
GAINS IN FLANDERS—HAIG'S MEN TOOK GERMAN FIRST LINE POSITIONS FROM FREZENBERG TO YPRES-MENIN ROAD—FRENCH CAPTURED SEVERAL FARMS—CANADIANS WITHSTANDING INTENSE GERMAN SHELLING.

Both the British and French armies facing the Germans in Flanders have again struck hard blows at their antagonists and been rewarded with further gains in the line of Crown Prince Rupprecht of Bavaria. While the fighting has occurred only on isolated sectors, it seems evident that the heavy artillery duels that are in progress all along the front from Neuport to the Franco-Belgian border are the forerunners of a resumption of the big Allied offensive which the rain and the accompanying mire stopped almost at its inception more than a week ago.

Driving eastward from the sector of Ypres in the early dawn of Friday Field Marshal Haig's men took for their own all the German first line positions east of Hooze between Frezenberg and the Ypres-Menin road, including the village of Westhoek, and held them in their entirety, notwithstanding the usual counter-attacks launched by the Germans under an extremely heavy barrage fire.

To the north near Bixchoote and Langemarck the French troops have captured several farms held by the Germans and also have taken a number of machine guns from them. While these gains are characterized as "slight," they nevertheless are another step forward eastward toward the Ostend-Lille railroad, toward which the British drive from Hooze also is pointed.

The Canadians lying in their trenches at the doorstep of Lens and the British forces holding trenches south of the famous Vimy Ridge are coming in for intensive shelling from the Germans.

On the long neglected front near St. Quentin the Germans have delivered a surprise attack of considerable proportions, but were unsuccessful in gaining ground anywhere except at several weak points in the centre of the French line. Otherwise the fire of General Petain's men put down the sally, inflicting considerable casualties on the Germans.

Likewise along the Aisne front the Germans have delivered onslaughts against the French, but here also they met with the same result that has marked the previous attempts of the German Crown Prince to pierce the French line—defeat. At several points the Germans managed to make their way into isolated trenches, but they met death later in hand-to-hand fighting or were captured.

Aside from the front in France little fighting of moment is taking place except in Galicia, Bukovina and Southern Moldavia. In all these sectors the Germans and Austro-Hungarians are declared by the Berlin War Office to be continuing their gains. South-east of Czernowitz, the capital of Bukovina, the Germans have penetrated the Russian frontier positions. Farther south, fighting with their allies, they have taken height positions between the Trotus and Putna valleys and in southern Moldavia, in the region of Fokshani, have thrown their forces across the Suchitza river on a wide front.

British laborites at a conference in London by an overwhelming vote have decided to send a delegation to the coming international Socialist conference at Stockholm.

PERU MAY BE NEXT.

Washington, August 10.—Failure of the German Foreign Office to placate Peru has forced that country into a position where some officials of the State Department believe it can do nothing less than break relations with the Imperial government.

Manuel De Freyre Y Santander, the Peruvian Charge D'Affaires, today was informed by his government that Peru would not accept the new German proposal to submit the case of the Peruvian bark Lorton to a prize court. Unofficial advices yesterday said the Peruvian Senate had endorsed President Wilson's stand in the war, and a break in relations is now expected by many officials to follow shortly.

LICHNOWSKY SHOWN UP.

London, August 10.—(Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency)—M. Take Jonescu, vice-president of the Rumanian Council of Ministers, in a letter to the Times says that during his visit to London in the second half of July, 1914, he saw the German Ambassador almost daily, sometimes twice daily, and is in a position to know that the ultimatum to Serbia was known and approved in Berlin; that Tschirschky participated in drafting it, and that Lichnowsky asked Jonescu to telegraph Premier Passitch, of Serbia, advising acceptance of the ultimatum, promising a modification of its harsh conditions. Lichnowsky told M. Jonescu on the 27th of July, 1914, that he no longer believed England would abandon her neutrality.

BRITISH STATEMENT.

London, August 10.—The official communication issued tonight by the British headquarters announces that the British troops have made further gains on the battle front east of the Belgian town of Ypres. The communication says that heavy casualties were inflicted on the enemy during fierce fighting for possession of advantageous positions. The text follows:

"Our attack this morning east of Ypres was delivered on a front of nearly two miles south of the Ypres-Roulers railway. On the right wing of the attack heavy fighting occurred for the high ground astride on the Ypres-Menin road. Some progress was made by our troops in this area and the fighting continues.

"In the centre and on the left our attack, after overcoming the enemy's resistance, resulted in our gaining the whole of our objectives. In addition to Westhoek and Westhoek ridge, which are now completely in our hands, our troops established themselves in Glencorse wood. In the fierce fighting that occurred heavy casualties were inflicted on the enemy. We took 240 prisoners.

"In addition to the foregoing number of prisoners, we captured in successful raids last night east of Monchy-Le-Preux 86 of the enemy.

"The enemy raided one of our posts south-east of Guenappe and two of our men are missing. Another hostile raiding party was repulsed north-east of Gouzeaucourt.

WESTERN LIBERALS DISQUIET VETERANS

LATTER SO DISSATISFIED
THEY MAY FORM A NEW
PARTY.

Winnipeg, August 10.—The formation of a new party, which will hold its own convention, may be the outcome of the dissatisfaction of the Veterans of the West, over the Liberal convention.

J. Hilliard Leech, K.C., of the executive board of the Army and Navy Veterans Association, and chairman of the committee which waited upon the resolutions committee of the Liberal convention on Wednesday morning to urge the formation of a national government, said today that a definite plan of campaign to force a "win-the-war" government would be adopted at a meeting to be held on Tuesday.

TAFT'S CONDITION MUCH IMPROVED

EX-PRESIDENT DESIRES FOOD
FOR FIRST TIME SINCE
MONDAY.

Clay Centre, Kas., August 10.—William H. Taft is much better tonight. "He improved wonderfully today," according to the statement of the attending physician given out tonight.

Mr. Taft asked for food today, the first time since Monday when he was stricken with an internal disorder. He was given a soft boiled egg and some toast. Not only is his physical condition improved, but his mental attitude has brightened.

The attending physician said it was impossible to state when Mr. Taft would be able to resume his speaking tour. He said, however, that it probably would take some time for Mr. Taft to regain his strength after he leaves his bed.

REAL PATRIOTS AMERICAN NEED

STAND AGAINST GREAT BRITAIN
AIN DECLARED RESULT OF
GERMAN PROGRAM.

Chicago, Ill.—"There is a tendency in certain quarters to depreciate Great Britain. It is a part of a program of German propagandists, organized in committees," Dean Shailer Mathews of the University of Chicago, told a large gathering of business men in the Chicago Association of Commerce. Dean Mathews is known internationally as head of the university's theological school, but perhaps more broadly as president of the Federated Council of the Churches of Christian America.

"This tendency takes various forms," continued Dean Mathews. "Mayor Thompson of Chicago, for instance. He says he wants a real American patriotism. Others assert that they are pro-American and not pro-English. You meet it in the talk on the street, in which we are told that England is a hypocrite and has got us into this war simply for the purpose of furthering her commercial interests. We are suspecting that much of this propaganda has German money back of it; but whether it has or not, we ought to tell every man who attacks the Allies, and especially Great Britain just now, that either unconsciously or intentionally he is engaged in German propaganda. He may not know it, but whether he does or not, he should keep still. And if he will not keep still tell him that you will take steps to see that he does keep still."

"Meetings for the alleged discussion of peace and war are being manipulated by people who speak English with a German accent. And well intended idealists who think that whether we should be at peace is still an open question are being used with a sturdy type of German propaganda. It is a program we must meet with a sturdy loyalty to America which amounts to this: We are in the midst of war, and whoever undertakes to confuse one's mind to weaken our sympathies with our allies, or cause suspicion of Great Britain, is an enemy of the United States of America."

"Great Britain is a leader in this movement to recognize the rights of nations. There is something wonderful in the capacity of England to breed democracies that are loyal to herself. No other nation in the world has done it. Alexander did not do it; Rome could not do it, and Napoleon could not. England has. Look at Canada, a nation almost as independent of England as the United States, yet from her 8,000,000 people she gathers 300,000 volunteers and throws them in the fight for democracy on the plains of France."

NEW JEWISH STATE IN FAR SIBERIA

HATRED OF RUSSIAN BY JEWS
HAS VANISHED WITH RE-
VOLUTION

The attitude of the Jews in the anti-German countries toward the New Russia has never for a moment been in doubt. In the twinkling of an eye hatred of Russia or sullen acquiescence in the alliance to which the devil of military necessity has driven democracy, was transformed into that trinity of emotions—"admiration, hope and love"—by which according to Wordsworth, humanity lives.

There is even among her escaped stepchildren a nostalgia for Russia and a palpable movement back, retarded only by the absence of ships.

Imponderables, as Bismarck knew sometimes count more in politics than concrete and measurable factors, and who can estimate the myriad influences by which the old Jew-baiting and Jew-hated Russia was enervated?

Some of these negatives may now be appraised by their positive aspects.

The New Russia has, for example a good press—and the Jews are a people of journalists.

New Jewish Orientation
In 1831 Mr. Punch was righteously indignant with the Austrian Jew because, according to a Viennese correspondent of the London Jewish Chronicle, they would have nothing to do with the Austrian loan until they had received the government's assurance that they would be left in possession of their liberties.

That they should thus provide "alters for the patriots of Hungary," on a condition of being left free themselves seemed monstrous to Mr. Punch, who in fact, proposed the very next week that, in recognition of the Sultan's services in saving Kosuth from Francis Joseph, a British three-decker should be presented by national subscription to the gallant Abdul Medjid, and should sail up the Bosphorus, manned for the nonce by British tars.

To me the monstrosity lies in the fact that the financial weapon, recommended by the Jewish correspondent, should have remained so long unused. A minority must fight for its liberties with whatever weapons it possesses and the only thing in Mr. Punch's article is the assumption that the liberties of the Jews do not count, though Hungarian liberty is holy.

In this Austrian instance, however the bargaining was purely local and egoistic. To Mr. Jacob Schiff, the American banker, belongs the glory of the impersonal pioneer of liberty for his financing of Japan in her war against Russia was deliberately beligerent.

That he should now declare himself a "very substantial" contributor to the Russian liberty loan and should moreover present a complete hospital unit to Russia is significant of the new Jewish orientation and disposes finally of the foolish attempt of the London Times to represent him as a pro-German puppet.

Loyalty of 6,000,000 Pariahs

And his fellow-Jews in America, reacting more intensely than ever their fellow-Americans to the great events in Russia, are they not, as Emma Lazarus said, the "intensive mood" of the nations with whom their lot is cast—have set on foot a national project for presenting Russia with a replica of the Statue of Liberty—a symbolic offering which the new Russia has known how to appreciate.

In the great and wonderful London meeting to celebrate the Russian revolution, at the Albert Hall, it fell to me to give the first expression to the universal feeling of Anglo-Jewry and to congratulate Russia on having rid herself, not only of the Romanoffs, but of her suicidal policy of degrading 6,000,000 of her ablest subjects.

The leaders of the new Russia had indeed, long since come to understand with the old Franciscan Father that "whatever a man does unto others he does unto himself," and they have long blushed under the humiliations of their Jews as something that tainted themselves in the eyes of civilization.

The loyalty of these pariahs, their devotion to the common fatherland, has displayed itself in many touching forms during the war, and the great fund they are now raising with the same symbolic instinct as their American brethren—to establish and endow a "palace of equality" in Petrograd, shows how deeply they have felt their lack of status and how ardently they welcome their inclusion in the new fraternity of creeds and races.

Their industrial and commercial genius, given for the first time free play in Russia, will save her from future German penetration and supply the missing factor necessary to bring her into line with the Western Powers to whom she is now allied, and who—by an irony of history—she is now destined to liberate.

Steam Roller Antiquated

For not all the "Russian Supplement" of commercial journalism can gloss over the fact that the steam roller is a rusty, ramshackle, antiquated and hopeless piece of machinery, and that Russia with her dearth of roads, railways and business capacity, is as ill equipped for either war or trade as she is rich in every human and material potentiality.

SPLENDID WORK BY BRITISH AIRPLANES

AIRMEN SWOOP TO AN ALTITUDE LOWER THAN TREE TOPS.

London, August 9.—With regard to the Russian military situation General Maurice, the British military expert, says:

"It is natural to expect that the Germans after advancing ninety miles and reaching railways of a different gauge must pause a while and bring up communications and supplies. All that can be said today is that the Russians have gained a brief breathing space which we hope they will use to the best advantage to prepare for the next German move forward."

General Maurice gave an interesting resume of the detailed reports which he had received on the air fighting situation in the Flanders battle of July 31 and the amazing superiority which the British airplanes had displayed, on that day, owing to their determined onslaught on Germany's air fighters during the preceding fortnight.

"On the day of the attack," says General Maurice, "the weather conditions were as nearly impossible as could be imagined—low clouds of great density, haze and mist. The observation was almost nil, and as a result the artillery was under a severe handicap, having to work without adequate airplane observation."

"But the airplanes were enormously busy in other departments. More than 100 engagements were fought by airplanes with the forces of the enemy on terra firma, our planes in these cases descending often to within less

ROOSEVELT SAYS
HE WAS MISQUOTEDTEDDY AFFIRMS PROF KUNO
MEYER GUILTY OF "GROSS
IMPROPRIETY."

New York, August 10.—Col. Theodore Roosevelt declared in a statement today that he had been misquoted by Dr. Kuno Meyer, Berlin professor, in remarks from Amsterdam. He said Prof. Meyer was guilty of "gross impropriety" in quoting him concerning compensation and indemnities Germany might collect.

"Mr. Meyer's statement is substantially correct, with this exception," said Roosevelt. "I did not say the Austro-German victory would entitle them to compensation or indemnities, or to form a mid-European federation under Germany's agency."

"What I said was that if Germany was victorious, she would undoubtedly exact the utmost limits of compensation and indemnity she could wring from all her adversaries, including the United States whether we went to war or not. Mr. Meyer and his wife called on me in May, 1916."

"What I said to him was what I said in speeches, so far as Germany and the duty of this government is concerned."

"We are fighting for our nearest and dearest interests, to make the world safe for America. Until America shows her ability to do that she should not talk about making the world safe for democracy. Now let every man, woman and child in this country strain every nerve so at the earliest possible moment our giant strength may be used to win the victory."

"Let us remember that pacifists and pro-Germans stand where the copperheads stood in the Civil War. This applies to some Senators and Congressmen and newspaper editors. I hope Congress will immediately pass a law refusing to allow any paper to be published in German or the language of any other of our opponents while the war lasts."

ENEMY DEVASTATED
THE TOWN OF LENS.

Paris, August 10.—(Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency)—Deputy Basly, mayor of Lens, whom the Germans have released from internment, says: "The Germans will not fail to declare that the British artillery destroyed Lens, but I know that the enemy devastated the town. For example, they blew up the church, the theatre, the Banque de Paris, and the new Hotel de Ville. There is nothing they did not carry away."

He tells an interesting story of General Klotz, whose army occupied Lens: "General Klotz had a truly German soul," says the deputy. "When I objected that certain demands of his were opposed to the Hague convention, he replied jeeringly. 'The Hague convention is for us, not for you.'"

BIG DAMAGE IN B. C.
FROM THE FOREST FIRES.

Calgary, Alta., August 10.—An estimate made today by an expert forester who has travelled through the British Columbia region affected by the recent forest fires, is to the effect that \$5,000,000 worth of timber was destroyed in southern British Columbia alone.

The loss from the forest fires which have burned in Alberta forest reserves is not nearly so great, in fact, would be covered perhaps by an estimate of \$200,000 and this loss was principally in the one great fire which swept the slopes of Crow's Nest mountain.

The timbers lost are mostly fir, with some tamarack and pine and a few cedar trees.

EXPERT IN ECONOMY.

Ottawa, Aug. 10.—Mrs. Jean Muldrew, assistant superintendent of the Woman's Institutes of the Department of Agriculture, Alberta, formerly of the MacDonald Institute at Guelph, has been loaned by the government of the province to the Food Controller as an expert in domestic economy. Mrs. Muldrew is preparing a special bulletin on canning.

Mr. D. Johnson, Dominion Fruit Commissioner, has been loaned to the Food Controller by the Dominion government. He will act as chief of the food distribution bureau, dealing with questions of purchase, storage, transportation, wholesale and retail sale price and export.

WILL DIE HERE
SAYS T. MARCILSPEAKS FOR HIMSELF AND
SONS OF LIBERTY—DISAP-
PROVES EXCESSES.

Montreal, August 10.—Tancrede Marcil, the chief local firebrand in connection with the anti-conscription campaign in this city, said tonight at a meeting at Villiers, St. Hubert st., that he did not approve of excesses such as the dynamiting of Lord Atholstan's summer residence. As to the enforcements of conscription he thus delivered himself:

"I say here for myself and the Sons of Liberty, and for every French-Canadian worthy of the name, that before Canadians are made slaves and our liberty taken away, we will die here."

LIEBKNECHT IS
IN CONSUMPTIONGERMAN SOCIALIST LEADER
RELEASED FROM PRISON—
WEIGHS 84 POUNDS.

Paris, Aug. 10.—Dr. Karl Liebknecht, Socialist leader in the German Reichstag, who was arrested in connection with the May Day demonstration in Berlin in 1916, was liberated a fortnight ago by the German government through fear that he might die in prison. He is said to be suffering from tuberculosis, weighing only 84 pounds.

The authenticity of the above seems certain, says the Temps' Geneva correspondent, although the German newspapers, in obedience to orders, have kept silent regarding it. "The news," says the correspondent, "was brought here by a Hollander who had just arrived from Germany. He says the trades union organizations brought pressure upon the government for the release of Dr. Liebknecht, who is now in a private hospital and is not expected to recover, suffering, in addition to the lung malady, from mental depression, the result of inhuman treatment while in prison."

Dr. Liebknecht was tried by court martial in Berlin for "military treason" and sentenced to four years and one month in prison. A court martial at Thorn also is said to have sentenced Dr. Liebknecht to four and a half years at hard labor, charging that he had attempted to incite the soldiers of the Thorn garrison to disobedience and rebellion.

CENTENARIAN DEAD.

Toronto, Aug. 10.—William Lloyd is dead at the residence of his daughter, 2122 Queen street east. He was 104 years of age and lived under six British sovereigns, commencing with George III. He is survived by his widow, who is 91 years of age, and ten children, the oldest of whom is 70 years of age. There are 42 grand children and 33 great grand children. Mr. Lloyd retained all his faculties up to his death.

DOUBLE DROWNING.

Belleville, Ont., August 10.—A double drowning accident occurred at the falls of Deer River, near the Cordova mines, in Marmora township, when two boys lost their lives. Charles Maloney, aged 14 years and a companion named John Houghton, aged 11, were bathing when the latter got into a deep hole and called for help. Maloney went to his assistance and both were drowned. The bodies were recovered.

STEAMER FEARED FOR.

Kingston, Ont., Aug. 10.—Enquiries are: insistent about the steamer T. J. Waffle, of this city. It is feared she went down in the gale on Lake Ontario on Wednesday. The steamer is owned by the Swift Coal Company. She left Tuesday night for Fairhaven, and under ordinary circumstances would have been in Fairhaven on Wednesday morning. Tonight a message was received stating that the vessel was not at Fairhaven nor in Oswego.

WILL REPRESENT

ST. ANDREW'S UNIVERSITY.
London, August 10.—Sir William Cheyne has been elected to parliament unopposed to represent St. Andrew's University, succeeding Christopher Johnston, who has accepted a judicial appointment. Sir William now is serving with the navy.

KILLED BY TRAIN.

Welland, Ont., August 10.—Percy Elsie, aged 18, driver for S. L. Lambert, and Frank Pollard, aged 10, who was taking a ride with him, were killed this afternoon when a Michigan Central passenger train struck the load of lumber on which they were riding. The accident happened on a level crossing, just east of Welland.

WOULD IMPROVE
RUSSIA'S CREDITGOVERNMENT PROPOSES TO
ESTABLISH SOME STATE
COMMERCIAL MONOPOLIES

Petrograd, August 10.—N. V. Nekrasoff, vice-Premier and Minister of Finance, today made a statement to the press in regard to the financial resources of the country, in which he expressed his opinion that commercial monopolies that the Government proposes to establish would soon bring about a stable condition of credit. M. Nekrasoff's statement follows:

"The demands of the Budget exceed the forecasts as regards the income from direct taxes which already was at a maximum. The Finance Ministry proposes to establish a number of State commercial monopolies, therefore, as an extreme measure. It considers that the guaranty of Russia's prosperity lies in the development of public and private industrial and commercial enterprises."

"In our troubled condition allowances must be made. We, therefore, aim to co-operate with the Ministry of Commerce and Industry to support development of our resources. It is realized that our credit abroad depends on events on the battle front, but we believe that our trials soon will end with our financial credit again stable. Incidentally, subscriptions to the Liberty loan so far are hundred and one-half billion rubles."

WHEAT AVERAGE
IN MANITOBA

Winnipeg, August 10.—Wheat will average about 15 bushels on acre in Manitoba, according to a report by the Manitoba Department of Agriculture. The conditions vary greatly, some districts expecting a forty bushel yield to the acre, and others not more than five bushels. The report states that the outlook for the barley and oat harvest is not as bright as for wheat. On the whole, the report says, conditions have improved much in the last six weeks. Cutting of wheat has begun in some places and will be general next week in a great many sections of the province.

HOOVER APPOINTED
FOOD ADMINISTRATOR

Washington, August 10.—Formal appointment of Herbert Hoover as Food Administrator under the new food legislation was announced at the White House late today.

WHAT ABOUT QUEBEC?

Toronto, August 10.—A second consignment of fresh haddock and codfish from the Atlantic seaboard, under the arrangements made by Food Controller Hon. W. J. Hanna, arrived in the city this morning. This shipment contained 10,000 pounds. Long before noon all of the consignment had been disposed of.

APPOINTED FRENCH

MINISTER OF MARINE.
Paris, Aug. 10.—Charles Chaumet, deputy chairman of the naval committee of the Chamber of Deputies, has been appointed Minister of Marine, succeeding Admiral Lacaze, who resigned on August 2.

An under-secretary of Marine has been created and Jacques Louis Dumessil has been appointed to the post on recommendation of M. Chaumet.

UP TO LAURIER.

Hamilton, Ont., August 10.—A meeting of the executive of the Hamilton branch of the win the war movement tonight decided to ask the Central body at Toronto to ask Sir Wilfrid Laurier, in view of the fact that he had stated that he was in the war to a finish to place a definite limit on the time for the continuation of voluntary enlistment and to appeal to him to state that if this effort should fail to produce the men the necessary reinforcements that he would support conscription.

QUEST FOR MURDERER.

Toronto, August 10.—It was announced this afternoon by the Attorney-General's Department that the reward for the discovery of the murderer of Carmen Lapello, the Italian taxi driver, who was found stabbed near Mimico, has been increased from \$500 to \$1,000. So far the provincial, county and city police are entirely at fault. Several anonymous letters received have indicated that if the reward were increased, valuable information would be forthcoming.

FRENCH CAPTURED
HUN PRISONERSVIOLENT ARTILLERY FIGHT-
ING AT PANTHEON AND
EPINE DE CHEVRENGNY.

Paris, August 10.—The War Office communication this evening says:

"To the north of St. Quentin both artilleries displayed continued activity. In the region of Fayet at 3 o'clock this afternoon two enemy attacks between the Menechet hill and the Cepy farm were stopped by our fire."

"Violent artillery fighting took place on the front of the Pantheon and Epine de Chevrengny. The enemy after his bloody defeat this morning made no new attempt. Prisoners declare the attack had been prepared most carefully with the object of retaking the trenches captured by us on July 30."

"Besides the three battalions already mentioned, the troops used by the enemy included nine detachments of special storming troops and two detachments of flame throwers. We made in the course of this action more than 100 prisoners."

"In Champagne the Germans attacked our trenches to the east of Maisons de Champagne. On the two wings all the attacks broke down under our fire. In the center where the assailants had been able to gain a footing, very spirited fighting took place which ended to our advantage. Our line is re-established in its entirety."

"On both banks of the Meuse violent artillery actions took place in the region of Hill 304, Le Mort Homme and on the Bezonvaux sector."

"Belgian communication: 'During the day of the 9th. and the following night the German artillery was especially active in the region of Ramscapelle. On the evening of the 9th. our artillery brought down a German airplane. Today we carried out numerous artillery bombardments with a view to destroying or neutralizing enemy batteries or to find their range.'"

"Army of the east, Aug. 9th: After strong artillery preparation in enemy battalion attacked at 8 o'clock p.m. the positions occupied by the Franco-Hellenic troops in the region of Huma but was repulsed. Feeble artillery activity prevailed all along the front on the 9th. instant."

FODDER SHORTAGE
IN FATHERLANDCOMPELS GERMANS TO UNDER
TAKE SWEEPING SLAUGHTER
OF LIVE STOCK.

Copenhagen, August 10.—A shortage in fodder has compelled the Germans to undertake a sweeping slaughter of homestocks of cattle. German buyers in Denmark, who last week cut prices fifteen per cent, are according to a despatch today from the interior, discontinuing altogether until the surplus at home is utilized.

This has brought about another reduction in the high price of meat in Denmark and it is said that further cut will follow. BRITISH OFFENSIVE
NOT AT STANDSTILLGERMANS RECEIVE PROOF
THEIR NEWSPAPERS ARE
TALKING NONSENSE.

London, Aug. 10.—(Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency)—Reuter's correspondent at British headquarters in Flanders, telegraphing today, says:—

Early this morning the Germans received definite proof that their newspapers were talking bosh when they declared that the British offensive in Flanders had come to a standstill. That their high command does not think so is shown by the strenuous advantage it has taken of the conditions which bad weather has imposed on us, to strengthen their front and rear defences.

"I learn that no fewer than ten enemy divisions have been withdrawn since the 31st of July, which is a fair criterion of their losses since we know that most of these troops were fresh in the line on the eve of the attack."

"Operations this morning were not of the first magnitude, but rather a battle for position, to try and complete our partial dominance of Westhoek ridge. Following the usual thunderous preliminaries by the guns our infantry went over at 4.30 on a front of 2,500 yards. We carried the advance to an extreme depth of 500 yards. At the time of writing the Germans are preparing counter attacks, but our artillery is warning them off in no uncertain voice. The weather is pretty fair except for local showers which temporarily mar visibility and retard the drying of the ground."

Interesting Order.

"A general order, dated July 6th, addressed to the Ypres group of Prince Rupprecht's armies, is both interesting and enlightening. It states:—'The fact that economy in our stocks of bread and cereals is necessary makes it essential to sanction increased rations only to those for whom it is really necessary. All officers are requested to explain again to their subordinates the really serious nature of the economic situation in Germany, and to instruct them in the strictest economy. Supplies must not be consumed beyond what is necessary and even the smallest particle must not be wasted.'"

Telegraphing this afternoon Reuter's correspondent says:—"Fighting continued throughout the morning in the development of our operations against the German positions between Frezenberg and south-east of Westhoek. The Germans launched several counter attacks, but latest accounts show that all gains have been pretty well maintained. Up to the present two hundred prisoners have been counted. The fine weather is enabling the airmen to render fine service. The enemy is still resisting vigorously, some of the southern sections of the front being attacked. French patrols to the northward pushed forward and found several farms evacuated, with the result that our line of outposts is now established well into the area of the flooded country north-east of Bixschoten."

"This evening near the famous Kortkeer cabaret, on the Bixschoten-Langemarck road, the French found five guns abandoned. Our artillery is most busy counter firing with their batteries, and the most satisfactory results are reported. Your correspondent has been shown aerial photographs of Hollebeke, from which it is plain that not the least sign of a habitation remains."

"Last night two British parties carried out a most satisfactory raid in the neighborhood of Monchy, taking sixty prisoners, capturing two light mine firers, bombing dugouts and generally considerably damaging the enemy defence works in the direction of Boisvert."

RUSSO-RUMANIAN
TROOPS ATTACKCAPTURED PRISONERS AND
MACHINE GUNS IN THE
TROUS VALLEY.

London, August 10.—Russian and Rumanian troops repulsed enemy attacks in the Trous valley and then launched vigorous counter attacks which gained them prisoners and captured machine guns, according to an official statement issued today by the Rumanian War Office. The statement follows:

"In the Trous valley enemy attacks were repulsed and in counter attacks Russian troops, who maintain all their positions, forced the enemy to flee in disorder after taking prisoners and machine guns."

"Between the Trous and Putna valleys Rumanian troops gallantly withstood a violent artillery bombardment with attacks accompanied by

asphyxiating gas. They completely repulsed the enemy in five assaults except at a single point in the Otuse valley."

On the Putna and Sereth rivers Russo-Rumanian troops, attacked many times by superior numbers of the enemy, inflicted heavy losses and maintained all their positions."

MIDNIGHT JOY RIDE
RESULTED IN ACCIDENT.

Brookville, Ont., August 10.—A midnight joy ride resulted in half a dozen people being taken to the hospital. In the party were Lawrence Jackson, a Detroit policeman; Arthur Lafontaine, Ernest Ford, Morley Simon, Lawrence Kelly and Morris Jackson, all of Brookville. The last mentioned was the chauffeur, and in attempting to pass a horse and buggy, the big seven-passenger car struck the buggy and plunged into the ditch. The accident occurred in the township of Elizabethtown, half a mile west of Brookville. Lawrence Jackson, Simons, Ford and Kelly were found pinned beneath the car, while the other occupants were thrown clear of it. All were badly cut and bruised, the policeman suffering the most, his internal injuries being of a serious nature. The doctors have hopes of his recovery.

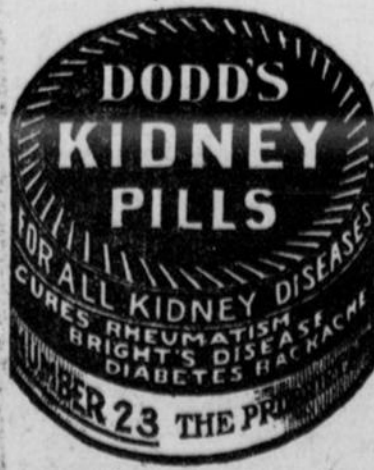

WIN-ELECTION LIBERALS.

Diogenes with his lantern, looking for an honest man, would have had an awful task among the Liberal tub-thumpers at the Win-the-Election Convention at Winnipeg if he had essayed the job after Michael Clark had departed from their midst. For the member for Red Deer, upright and fearless as he is, could not stand the atmosphere of political chicanery and dissimulation which affected all the deliberations of the delegates. He realized at once that this was no genuine Win-the-War meeting. The majority of those present could see nothing except over the top of a ballot box. When it came to a question of stating their views and convictions on the vital questions of present day politics these unprincipled opportunists and political obstructionists showed that they did not possess the courage of a louse and that with them patriotism was merely introduced as the last scoundrelly refuge. Hence that wretched abortion, the Neeley resolution, with its cowardly and indefinite phraseology, its failure to embody a single word relative to compulsory service or national government.

"If God won't help us, surely the devil will not fail us." That sums up the attitude of the Western Liberals.

INCREASE IN REVENUE.

The statement of the Finance Department, Ottawa, for the first four months of the present fiscal year, that is to say, from April 1 to July 31, shows an increase in revenue of \$15,500,000.

If this rate of increase is continued during the whole of the present fiscal year, the total revenue for the year, including the large Parliament debt under the Business Profits War Tax Act, due this fall, will aggregate \$275,000,000 or more. This compares with a total revenue of \$163,000,000 for the fiscal year 1913-14 immediately preceding the war, and \$133,000,000 for 1914-15, the first fiscal year since the outbreak of war. For the next fiscal year 1918-19 there will be added to the ordinary revenue the increased business profits taxes upon the business of 1917, and the proceeds of the new income tax now before Parliament. The total of the special taxes may reach \$50,000,000. The outlook for revenue for the next fiscal year is, therefore, more satisfactory. It will probably reach \$300,000,000.

For the present fiscal year, therefore, and for that of 1918-19, the Dominion Government will be able to pay all current and capital expenditures, all increased interest charges due to the war, all pensions to dependents of soldiers, and, in addition, contribute during the two years as much as \$200,000,000 on account of principal of its war expenditures. Assuming that the addition to the current expenses of the Dominion for increased interest upon its war expenditures and for pensions will aggregate \$35,000,000 for 1917-18, and \$45,000,000 or \$50,000,000 for 1918-19, it will be seen that the additional revenue for these years due to the war taxation measures of 1914, 1915, 1916, and 1917, will not only take care of this expenditure but provide the above mentioned substantial part of the expenditure which the Government will make in connection with the war.

FRANCE NOT EXHAUSTED.

Those self-constituted experts who have contended that France is nearing the stage of exhaustion will have to revise their arguments if not their figures. Relatively France may have suffered severely, but there is no reason to believe that she is nearer than Germany to exhaustion, either in men or in money. Andre Tardieu, French High Commissioner to the United States, says that France still has nearly three million troops in the fighting zone, exclusive of those in the interior and colonies. This is a million more men than she had mobilized at the Battle of the Marne, nearly three years ago. France is still holding 300 miles of the Western front, out of about 500 miles. French troops in June were facing 81 divisions out of 128 German divisions on the Western lines. France had 6,000 heavy guns in June, and in the last offensive a ton and a half of explosives was hurled into every lineal metre of the German trenches assaulted, and twelve million shells of all calibres were fired. France has completely re-equipped and re-armed the Belgian, Serbian and Greek armies and furnished 800 heavy guns to her Allies.



Certainly France has been compelled to make greater sacrifices, both in men and in money, than any of her Allies. She bore the brunt of the first German onslaught, giving Great Britain time to equip and train her citizen armies. But now France has the assistance, not only of Great Britain and her Dominions, with their millions made ready for war, but of the United States, with her millions about to be mobilized. And there is every reason to believe that France is able, as she is willing to "carry on" and do her part in the Great War. Louis J. Malvy, French Minister of the Interior, replying to the request of the Associated Press for a statement outlining his views on the end of the third year of the world war, emphasized the fact, which he said sometimes had not been sufficiently realized, that it was the "unanimous and concerted effort of every citizen which allows our regiments to keep crushing the barbarous assaults on the moving frontier of trenches."

The minister added:

"The length of the war and the enemy's inauguration of submarine piracy placed us last winter face to face with fresh difficulties, but economically, as in every other way, France has inflexibly and imperturbably confronted each, and has begun to conquer. She has poured forth her blood too freely to begrudge her gold or endurance. With firm endurance she is accepting a regime of restrictions. After some inevitable tentative efforts she will regulate between now and the beginning of winter the food supply and heating."

"By the end of the three years France has endured every affliction, suffering and glory. Without violence or shock, but not at times without discussion (for discussion is the very essence of liberty and a democratic regime), she has maintained within her land order and discipline—accepted, not forced, discipline—and she will conquer. She is as united as she was on August 2, 1914. Better still, she is unanimous; that is, she forms but one soul for work as for combat."

"The country, then, is ready to enter upon the fourth winter of the war in the best conditions of physical and moral health. It knows that, thanks to American aid next spring, it will apply at once all its endurance and every sacrifice."

"Every time we have exacted increased work or devotion it has been sufficient to explain our reasons, for the French citizen is like the French soldier, who is willing to die, if necessary, as the civilian is willing to suffer, but each demands to understand why."

"Never was my mission easier than in the first months of the war, when, at the government's appeal, every party and class difference disappeared. Even our 'extremists,' answering to a confidence which it was an honor to me to offer them, rushed to the frontier to fight. The public then imagined the war would be short and that the battles would be gigantic but decisive. France of the interior then thought its only duty would be to efface itself before armed France."

The Minister then traced the changes through which civilian France had passed. First came work for the wounded and other war charities, but as the war continued it had to work to live and the aged and the women and children worked the land. Then came the urgent need of a supply of munitions and heavy artillery, but never, M. Malvy said, had France of the interior failed France of the front.

"My wife is like George Washington; I don't believe she could tell a lie to save her soul."

"You're lucky! Mine can tell a lie the minute I get it out of my mouth."

PRESS COMMENT.

We must never be guilty of the egregious folly of rejecting and condemning the blessings of life that are held out to us by the hand of pain. There is often a quality to them that most others seem to miss. We are told that after Peniel Jacob went halting all his days, but the Jacob as we like to think of him, the Jacob who was worth while, probably never could have been without the struggle and fierce conflict of those hours. Struggle begets strength; pain develops patience; sorrow gives birth to sympathy. The Master of Men Himself apparently never really ran away from the easy, painless joys of life, but it was "the joy that was set before Him," and which He knew could not be reached save through the Cross and the shame, that He determined He would not miss. He sought no Cross for its own sake, but He knew that when the Cross lay in the way of duty, duty would utterly glorify it, and that the pain of love and service would be turned into a great and abiding joy. And that is one of the lessons of life no man should miss.—Christian Guardian.

Izaak Walton, who was born at Stafford, 324 years ago today, is, surely, one of the most interesting characters in English literature; and few books are more certain of an abiding place in the literature of the language than his masterpiece, "The Compleat Angler." Thousands of people, the English-speaking world over, who know little about angling, and care less, have learned to love the simple, lovable character of this book, with its quaint conceits, its happy quotations, its poems, and its anecdotes, and to find retirement in its leisureliness. It was, of course, in a preeminent degree the reflection of the man. Few books, indeed, reveal their author more clearly, and the more one knows of the character of the genial and gentle man, who wandered, for many years of his life, from one country rectory and from one bishop's place to another, spending his time, as Wood has left record, "in the families of the eminent clergymen of England, of whom he was much beloved," the more one sees how inevitably he just expressed himself in the pages of his famous book. His writings are made all the more interesting when it is remembered that his days were cast in troubled times, and that the greater part of "The Compleat Angler" was written during the period of the Revolution and the years of unrest and unsettlement which followed it. Then again, in his early days, Izaak Walton's lot was cast well away from the haunts of the countryside. He had settled in London as an ironmonger, and at first had a little shop, seven and a half feet by five feet, in the upper story of Gresham's Royal Bourse, or Exchange, in Cornhill. In 1614, however, he had a shop in Fleet Street, two doors west of Chancery Lane, and it was here, in the Parish of St. Dunstan's that he gained the friendship of Dr. John Donne, the vicar of that church, a friendship which filled so large a place in his life.

After the Royalist defeat at Marston Moor, he retired from business. He had bought a piece of land near his birthplace, Stafford, and he went there to live. That is to say, he made Stafford his headquarters, for he spent most of his time in visiting his eminent clergymen, a welcome guest everywhere, compiling the biographies of his friends, and steadily adding to the "Angler," a first edition of which was published in 1653. Writing biographies of his friends was, indeed, Izaak Walton's literary forte. His friendships were deep and earnest, and, after the manner of the days in which he lived, very spacious. There was, with him, no such thing as short visits. His friends would be satisfied with nothing less than that he should make his home with them. Thus, in 1602, he found a home at Farnham Castle with George Morley, Bishop of Winchester, to whom he dedicated his "Life of George Herbert," and also that of "Richard Hooker." Then, from time to time, he would visit his great friend, Charles Cotton, in his fishing house on the Dove.

His love of angling, indeed, brought Izaak many friends, but, as has been well remarked of him, he had much more than a love of fishing and a humorous temper to recommend him. Men of letters, and men who appreciated good writing, paid much respect to him, and trusted his literary judgment. Thus, some fifteen years before "The Compleat Angler" passed through the press, Izaak Walton, at the instance of Sir Henry Wotton, the famous British Ambassador, wrote a life of that friend of his early days in London, Dr. John Donne. He had already contributed an elegy to the 1633 edi-

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, who was at the commencement of the present war, and has since continued to be, a British subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions. Duties: Six months residence upon and cultivation of land in each of three years.

In certain districts a homesteader may secure an adjoining quarter-section as pre-emption. Price \$300 per acre. Duties: Reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres extra. May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions. A settler after obtaining homestead patent, if he cannot secure a pre-emption, may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$300 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

Holders of entries may count time of employment as farm laborers in Canada during 1917, as residence duties under certain conditions. When Dominion Lands are advertised or posted for entry, returned soldiers who have served overseas and have been honorably discharged, receive one day priority in applying for entry at local Agent's Office (but not Sub-Agency). Discharge papers must be presented to Agent.

The deceased lady gave birth to a daughter about a month ago and had quite recovered, but unfortunately she was stricken with another illness less than two weeks ago and passed away yesterday morning surrounded by her husband and other members of her young family.

News of the premature demise of this estimable lady came as a shock to her numerous friends in Quebec few of whom were aware that she was ill. The late Mrs. Kelly was the daughter of Mr. C. E. L. Dionne, and was but 39 years of age. She took a keen interest in working for charity and patriotic objects. Her passing away will occasion much regret not alone among the population of New Carlisle, but also among deceased numerous friends in Quebec, Montreal and Ottawa where she was much sought after in private and public social functions.

MAN IS BEATEN AT THE PALAIS

FATAL ACCIDENT AT NEW DRYDOCK

LEVIS MAN RUN OVER BY SMALL ENGINE — HE DIED SHORTLY AFTER.

A man named Pierre Blais, of Levis, was killed yesterday afternoon while at work at the new dock which is being constructed by the Davis contracting firm at Lauzon, Levis. The victim was run over by a miniature locomotive which was hauling two cars of stone. Before he was noticed on the track it was too late for the engineer to avert the accident. One of the unfortunate man's legs was cut off close to the body by the wheels and he died shortly after.

The victim was aged sixty years. He leaves a wife and family to mourn his loss. The remains were conveyed to Mr. Charles Moisan's Morgue, Levis, where an inquest will be held this morning. The funeral will take place from the late residence, Samson street.

THE CAR SHORTAGE

Consignees Can Help by Ordering Full Carloads

The railways solicit consignees' co-operation in their endeavor to provide all their patrons with a satisfactory freight car supply.

Consignees Can Help by Ordering Full Carloads.

Many consignees never order more than the minimum authorized under the tariffs and classification. The result is an economical waste which reduces the efficiency of the railways and the public suffers.

To increase the average car loading by 1 ton, would be equivalent to placing 10,000 additional freight cars in service in Canada.

To fully load cars would go a long way towards solving our transportation difficulties.

Railways realize that some consignees cannot always order full carloads, but they are requested to help by ordering in as large units as possible.

A Car Saved Is a Car Gained.

The difference between minimum loads and full loads of certain standard commodities is given herewith:

Flour shipped in 24 lb. barrels. Minimum load 210 lbs. A 30 ton car will hold 300 bbls., a 40 ton car will hold 315 bbls. 28 lb. sacks. Minimum load 459 sacks. A 30 ton car will hold 673 sacks, a 40 ton car will hold 900 sacks.

Sugar shipped in 100 lb. sacks. Minimum load 300 sacks. A 30 ton car will hold 300 sacks, a 40 ton car will hold 340 sacks.

Cement shipped in 87 1/2 lb. sacks. Minimum load 457 sacks. A 30 ton car will hold 754 sacks, a 40 ton car will hold 1074 sacks.

Nails shipped in 107 lb. kegs. Minimum load 280 kegs. A 30 ton car will hold 616 kegs, a 40 ton car will hold 878 kegs.

Consignees Can Help by Promptly Releasing Cars.

To most consignees such an appeal is unnecessary—they do not delay cars under load. There are others, however, who appear to be satisfied if they release cars in what is known as "free time." Again, there are others who hold cars in storage service for weeks, and such consignees are largely responsible for car shortages and terminal congestion.

A recent check of cars placed for unloading and held by consignees at some of the stations on one of the railways showed 700 cars delayed an average of twelve days. Had these cars been released within even five days they would have made nearly 1,400 trips, and would have handled about 35,000 tons of freight. 2,615 other cars unloaded within three days could have been placed for delivery on the tracks occupied by these 700 delayed cars.

The railways do not want their cars to earn demurrage, but want them employed in carrying freight.

A Rolling Car Gathers No Demurrage.

If consignees will order freight from shippers so as to increase the average loading by 5 tons per car, and if they will reduce the average delay in unloading by 24 hours, it will prevent car shortages.

SHOT HIMSELF CLEANING PISTOL

ADOLPHE POTHIER, COMMERCIAL TRAVELLER, DIED AT SHERBROOKE, YESTERDAY.

News reached here from Sherbrooke yesterday of the death there of Mr. Adolphe Pothier, traveller for the Massey-Harris firm.

The shooting occurred at Magog in the Grand Central Hotel, and the victim was transferred to hospital at Sherbrooke, where he died.

He was a widower, and is survived by five children.

Copenhagen, Aug. 10.—Nine hundred and thirty three Scandinavian ships have been destroyed by torpedoes or mines since the beginning of the war, according to the Aftenbladet. Of this number, Norway lost 600, Denmark 187 and Sweden 146. The number of Scandinavian seamen lost in these disasters was about 500.

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NEWS SOURCES AND PUBLICATION

GERMAN SUPPLY NEWS FROM "NEUTRAL" SOURCES GIVING ONLY DARK SIDE

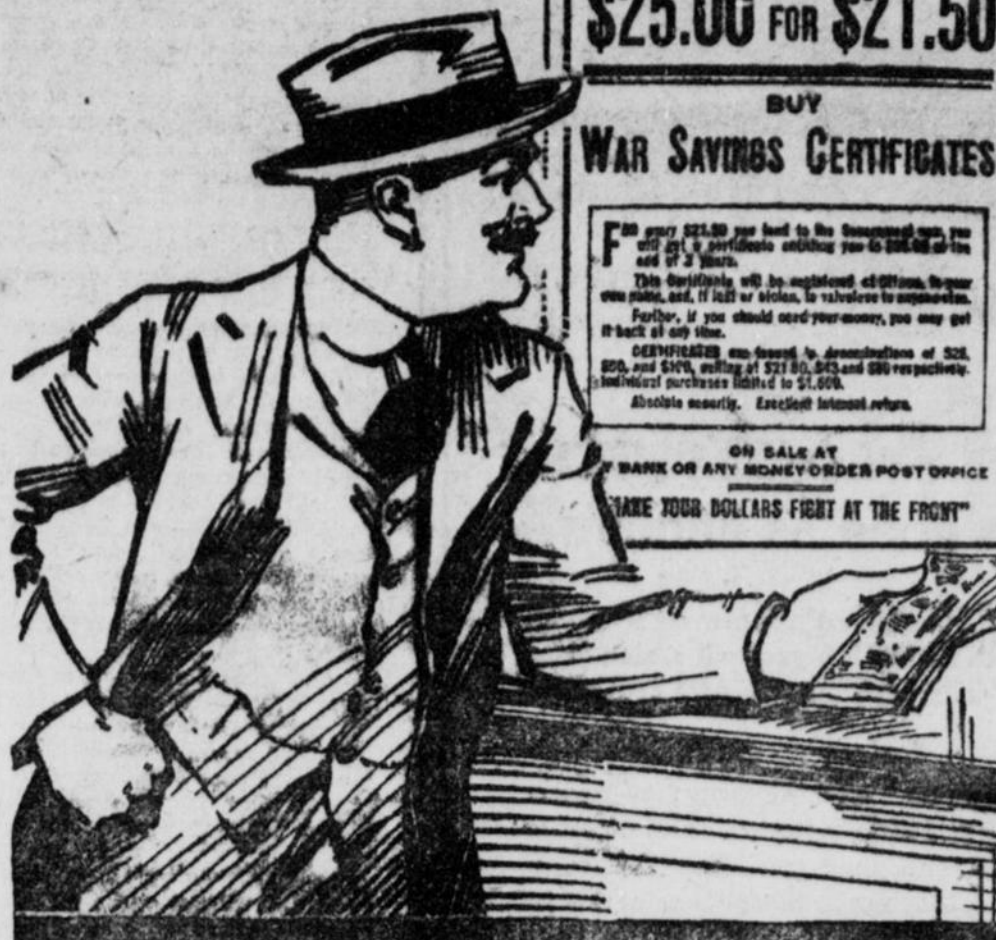
Stockholm, Sweden.—Public opinion and the morale of the people behind the line, as well as of the soldiers in the front trenches, are important factors in this great conflict. As the writer has often emphasized in his articles for The Christian Science Monitor, the Germans have made every effort to shake our confidence in Russia and in the Russian Revolution. Now, of course, we no longer have read in our newspapers the long cables from Berlin, devoted exclusively to the discussion of the internal situation in Russia, and claiming to give the real facts. Von Wiegand Hales and Bennets are no longer in Berlin to send these dispatches, but the German press-bureaus in Copenhagen and Stockholm, operating as before, but now working at top speed, supply the news from "neutral" sources. In both of these capitals there are the strongly pro-German organs, which also give many items on Russia, for Denmark and Sweden, and Norway also, have their pro-German newspapers just as America had only a few months ago. These papers, for example, gave only summaries, and short at that, of President Wilson's Flag Day speech. With the same basis they emphasize the dark side of the situation in Russia, and make no mention of the constructive work that is going on.

The Swedish newspapers claimed to be the interpreters of the Russian Revolution to the whole world. For Sweden right at the door of Russia, could learn just what was going on, and report it to the world. Thus the whole truth would come out, despite the Russian censorship. There was however, a "slip" that spoiled the plan; for the revolution in Russia practically abolished censorship at least for political facts. But a censorship was established in the offices of the pro-German newspapers in Stockholm; all encouraging facts were carefully suppressed and any disorders, however slight, was reported with headlines in large type, very much as was done by many American newspapers. But then the Swedes explained to the outside world that all Russians had to pass through Sweden as they came out of Russia, and that Sweden therefore had this very exclusive source of Russian news. Correspondents were sent to the frontier station of Haparanda, where they could get the news without delay and speed it to the world. Thus it was from Haparanda, I believe, that Sir George Buchanan, the British Ambassador in Petrograd, was three times reported to have been killed.

It was not only from travelers that Sweden could get the news. Many Russians were staying at in Stockholm where they could interpret the news that came from Russia along the usual channels. Quite a large Russian colony had sprung up in the Swedish capital, composed of prominent Russians who moved much in Swedish society and were very eager to tell about the revolution; the great event of the moment for all the world. But who were these Russians? Where they the men who were working to bring Russia through the great crisis of her history? Why were they living in Stockholm? Why were they not in Russia working for the country? With the exception of the correspondents sent to represent Russian newspapers at the Socialist Congress, and a few Russian business men, this colony of Russians reminded one of the Emigres of the time of the French Revolution.

I do not question for a moment the sincerity of these Russians. The names of some of them are known to me. They represent the landed aristocracy of Russia. Their interests have been severely injured, perhaps irreparably, by the revolution. The day of the large landed estate in Russia is past, on economic if on no other grounds. Russia is simply passing through a stage in her economic development which has already been reached in some countries, and which is coming in others. But the interpretation of the revolution given by these men cannot be accepted, especially by a democratic American. We understood the Russian Revolution because it was a democratic movement.

The man in the street does not read the quotations on the stock exchange but he frequently notes the rates of exchange, particularly when he lives in an exporting country. And he reads into the rate of exchange the situation in the given country. Yesterday I was disturbed when I got 100 rubles for \$25, even though I lost by having to change first into Swedish kronen. Rubles were higher than that. America three weeks ago, but then, of course the Government had just put a large sum at the disposal of the Russian Government. We know that Bankers help to make the exchange, not of course, in any illegitimate way. Swedish bankers, by the very organization of the Swedish foreign trade policy, are more interested in German marks. These had gone down also, but Germany was owing much to Sweden, while during these last months Russia has not been getting much from or even through Sweden. The writer does not draw any conclusion, but he was obliged to note while in Sweden that the



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trade relations between Sweden and Russia were not much discussed. He did not hear, as we have been hearing in America since the revolution of the great trade opportunities that the new Russia would offer. But already established trade relations always have the stronger support, and very naturally tend to determine the orientation of sympathies.

The war has shown how important it is for one country to know about another country if it wishes to have any close relations with it, relations either of a political or of a purely commercial character. We must be very careful to scrutinize the source of the information that comes to us about a country in which we have become vitally interested. We wish to know about Russian from Russians, and from Russians that are working for the reconstruction of their country, and when we hear about Russia from others, be they Swedes or English or what not, we want to know this fact. We want also to understand, if we can, the relations between Russia and this source of information, if we are going to use the indirect information to form a judgment. Better, after all, to get the news direct, from Russians in Russia or in America, or from our own people in Russia.

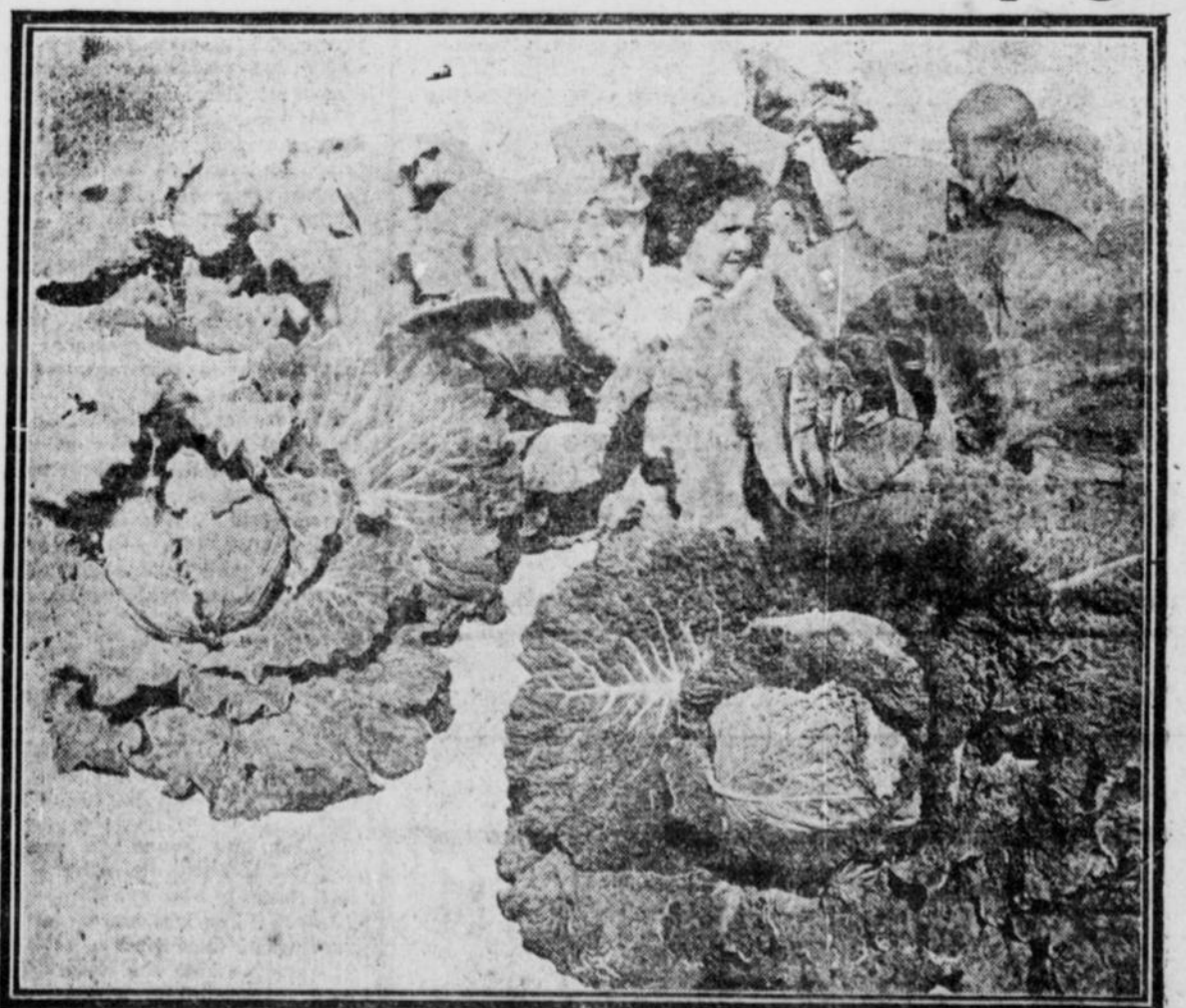

Grand Trunk Men Help In Food Production Campaign.

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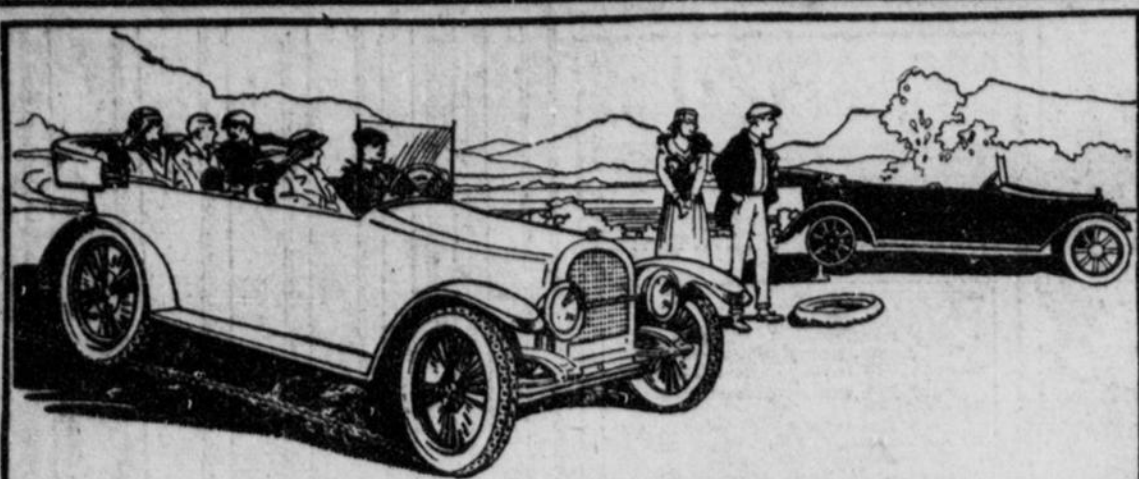
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PRISON HONOR SYSTEM VIEWS

DIFFERENCE OF OPINION
BROUGHT OUT BY SECRETARY OF PRISON ASSN.

New York, N.Y.—Just what constitutes the honor system of prison administration seems to be a question about which there is some difference of opinion among students of penology. For example Great Meadow Prison at Comstock, N. Y., a visit to which was described recently, is regarded by Warden Homer as an excellent example of the honor system. Many persons who have visited the prison and learned the details of its conduct agree with the warden. Many others, however, draw an opposite conclusion. Advocates of the self-government system of prison administration are particularly frank in expressing their conviction that no special dependence is placed in the prisoner's honor when a guard with a gun stands close by.

The warden at Great Meadow did not speak to the writer of the gun which some of the guards carried, and several of them may not have been armed at all. But in two cases at least guards were seen carrying revolvers at their belts, and at all times, in a little house within plain sight of the prison entrance, bloodhounds were held in readiness to overtake men attempting to escape. Guards and guns and dogs, in the view of the advocates of self-government methods, make it impossible to regard any system in which they are used to hold prisoners in leash, as an honor system. These weapons of discipline, they say, hold power over the prisoners, not through his sense of honor, but through his fear of the consequences. The real honor system, according to this opinion, releases the prisoner outside the walls on their own responsibility, without guns or dogs as caution against attempted escape.

There are a certain number of students of penology who take a middle

course in this connection. One of these is Dr. Orlando F. Lewis, general secretary of the Prison Association of New York State. "There is no one honor system," said Dr. Lewis to a representative of The Christian Science Monitor. "In Great Meadow you have a wall-less prison, with agricultural and some industrial work, and with the squads of men accompanied by guards, some of whom are armed and some not. In Colorado you have a system by which the men are allowed in some cases to go off at least 100 miles from the prison to build roads. In New Jersey 40 or 50 offenders sentenced to a reformatory work on a farm many miles away. Then there is the story of Governor West of Arizona, who, when the honor system was in its infancy, sent for a certain lifer reputed to be a bad man, and arranged that the prisoner should come to him, in another city, unguarded; the man came, did the work the Governor wanted done, and went back, alone, to his cell to serve out his life term. That was a most radical variation of the honor method.

And Judge Lindsay out in Colorado uses still another variation. He turns a sentenced man loose with his commitment papers and tells him to appear at the reformatory door at a certain time, and in nearly all cases Judge Lindsay's trust is not broken. In Jeffersonville, Ind., the State prison, twice during recent years, has sent out prisoners to fight flood or perform guard or other emergency duty for the protection of the public.

"Now in all these variations of method there is a single, common element, and I believe that to be the trust imposed upon prisoners when out of sight or away from direct supervision of the prison authorities or under so few guards as to make escape possible. There are gradations of this trust in different prisons, and with the same prison. These gradations range from the minimum of privilege granted within the prison, to the temporary releases of men to go on long errands or to camps some distance away unguarded by anything except the confidence of their warden in their sense of honor.

"Honor systems grow out of the old trusty system. The trusty was chosen by the warden to enjoy privileges not granted to the prisoners generally, for three chief reasons, long residence within the prison, marked intelligence of trustworthiness. The trusty was frequently a stool pigeon, that is, a spy. As the honor system has developed and has included a very much larger number of men, the stool pigeon element has decreased, and the choice of men to receive the privileges has come to be made not necessarily for length of term, good conduct or intelligence. The honor system has developed so that it now includes all who can be trusted.

"There is, too, what I may call the 'quid pro quo' element in the honor system. Great Meadow grants increased community freedom. Colorado grants both that and a considerable commutation of sentence, 10 days in 30. Governor West's early experiment with the lifer gave the man a sudden, unexpected and dazzling liberty. Judge Lindsay gives the prisoner the satisfaction of self-respect when he expects it least. In return for all these similar privileges under the honor system, the prisoner practically binds himself not to escape and not to break the prison peace. The honor system is a mutual agreement between the warden and his men. It is a personal act of reciprocity. The warden is like a central telephone exchange; every inmate is a wire which runs into that exchange.

"Therefore the warden must be a big man. He must have a strong personality. He must be an efficient administrator, as well as a firm believer in the theory of the honor system. And he must command from the men a certain amount of affection, for men in prison have to focus their attention on definite things much more than do men outside. The warden's grasp of his prison must be firm, and he must have the power of individuality which will make it easy for the men to respond to that grasp.

"But I do not think it is wise to call a system which insures, as a primary requisite, that at all times the warden shall be in absolute control of his men, either personally or through guards, the only system of benevolent despotism. It may seem to be such a system, but every prison, under any system, is despotic. And in speaking of the new penology the word 'despot,' and its derivatives is not a good one to use. The warden needs to be supreme, not only for the purposes of discipline, but because the men need something to tie to, something to look up to. In this respect they are not unlike men outside prison. Whole peoples are led to look up to certain men. Joffre and Hindenburg are of such type; Roosevelt is also, and so was Kitchener.

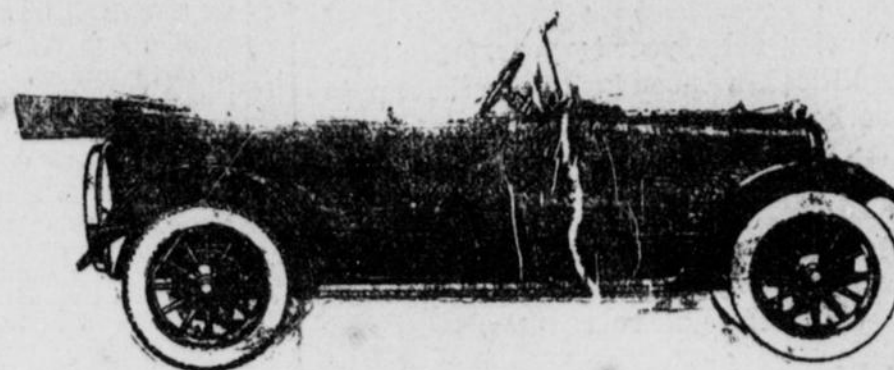
"The advantages of the honor system are obvious. It develops self-respect among the prisoners, helps them mentally and physically, insures better discipline in the institution, and widens the possibility of the prison becoming what it should be, a training place for men regarded as criminals."

The Mutual Welfare League, established by Thomas Mott Osborne, after he had served a term for investigation purposes in Auburn State Prison, was beyond the honor system, since it added to the benefits accruing from that system a spirit of community co-operation among the prisoners which to a certain extent remained with the master their release. The league was a system of self-government which went further than any other prison administrative system toward placing the prisoner entirely on his own responsibility. Its real guards were the men themselves.

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At first this system, Dr. Lewis thought, had tended to over-emphasize its spectacular features, such as its court. But now he believed the emphasis had shifted to the vocational activities of the leagues, and this promised well for the permanency of the system. This was an example that the self-government system enabled the men to create privileges for themselves, whereas under the honor system the men were recipients of privileges from the warden in return for the promise not to make trouble, and not to run away. The one government was from without, the other from within.

Dr. Lewis believed firmly that prisons were developing into a marked likeness to universities. The prison of the future, in his opinion, must be a training school to fit men for worthy lives after they have served their sentences. The prison had been a guard-house for human liabilities long enough. The old-time prison authorities could not save the so-called soul of the prisoner by excessive cruelties.

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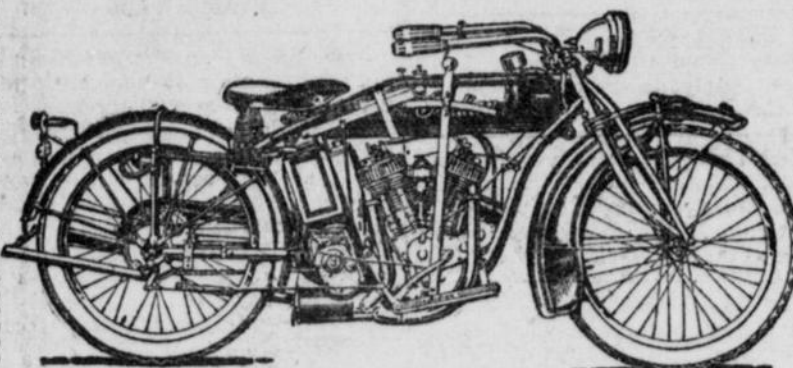
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WORK OF ENGLISH GIRLS ON THE FARM

ONE OF ENGLAND'S GET-ON-WITH-THE-WAR GIRLS FIND THE WORK FINE.

(By Lincoln Lorenzo.)

London, August 9.—Three ex-housemaids came to London town today on a load of last year's straw, and 90,000,000 Americans, had they happened to be passing the Mansion House at the time, would have stopped and forgotten their errands long enough to look. For those three ex-housemaids on a load of last year's straw, are prophetic for America.

A year ago, they were flicking the dust off mantels with feathers. Today they come back "home" (for they used to be housemaids to the Lady Mayoress of London), in corduroy breeches, high boots, overalls, and hail-hail-the-gang's-all-here hats. Their necks are bared and browned. There is sunburn in their cheeks. Their shoulders have filled out. They stride like men. Housemaids they are no longer.

"I've been out on my farm now for two months and more," said one of them to me. "I like it. It's more interesting than housework—more exciting. I'm feeding the pigs now—forty-one of them I have. After the war I'm going to Australia. Splendid chances there."

It makes me gasp. It made even London—war-worn London long used to seeing its women impressed into all sorts of men's jobs—stop and look. At Broadway and Forty-second street a half dozen vaudeville managers would have been killed in the rush if this girl had appeared there. And may be the police.

For these are the real get-on-with-the-war girls. Before America has been in it long, you'll begin to see them in the smaller towns up and down the Atlantic coast on Saturday afternoons. For one of the incidental achievements of the war in the United States, is going to be the first boom that the much talked of back-to-the-land movement has enjoyed in a very long time.

The creaking old wain (which means wagon) of straw drew up and stopped before the Mansion House, where lives the Lord Mayor of London, and looking very unfamiliar in his top hat that shone like a mirror and faultless morning dress, he came out with Lady Maxwell and shook hands with the three ex-Mansion housemaids and introduced her Ladyship. And one by one, out of the clear skies, dropped fifteen photographers of the Lord Mayor, Lady Maxwell and the three ex-housemaids—all backed up against that "wain", of last year's straw, and a team of farm horses who were paying no attention whatever.

And after that, the three ex-housemaids scurried into the Mansion House to say a "howdy" to their companions. Then they again climbed up on their load, clucked up their team with startling briskness, and went weaving their way through the traffic to the Bank and toward Theydon Bois, in Essex, where is the Gerald Buxton training farm for National Service girls.

A run-away steer couldn't have attracted more attention to itself in First Avenue, New York; in Cottage Avenue, Chicago, or Market Street, Philadelphia, or Royston Street, Boston, or anywhere in the United States, than did these three ex-housemaids on a wain of last year's straw in Threadneedle Street.

A hundred times better than house-maiding.

There is no issue of the great conflict, barring Kaiserism itself, which looms bigger than just this problem of women and the war.

Some will think of it in connection with what a London tobaccoist said the other day: "The girls of London are earning money as never before, and like the rest of the workers, they fly to tobacco to soothe their tired nerves. 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WATCHWORD OF WAR IS SPEED

DAYS SAVED NOW IN PRODUCTION MEAN SAVING LIVES OF TROOPS.

Washington, D.C. — "Days saved now in the production of war material will mean lives saved hereafter when our troops take the field," says Frank A. Scott, chairman of the new war industries board of the Council of National Defense, in a statement on the demands of the war upon the United States. "Speed," he declares, "must be our watchword."

"Nations, not armies, are the units of modern warfare," Mr. Scott said in discussing the task before the board. "Nothing less than the full power of our country must be exerted. Every resource, human and material, must be placed at the disposal of our Government."

"In war, time is of the essence—and this applies as well to the production of things necessary for the soldiers, as to the movements of armies. This thought the American people must take home."

"If it can be said that there has been a preliminary stage of war material in the war, it is over now. Our troops are already in France, and we have begun the actual raising of the huge army here at home to be sent abroad when the time is ripe. It was hard, at first, to realize that the country had actually entered the struggle. That time has passed, and we are facing the actual fact of participation. It is for us here at home in civil life, for American industry, to make it plain that we see clearly what we are facing, and that we give our fighting men the support due them. We have passed the period of expectation—we are waging war."

"Only a part of modern war is fought on the battlefield. An important part is fought in the mines and workshops—in the harvest fields and

Shipping News

HALF NUMBER SHIPS ATTACKED ESCAPED

TIMES NAVAL CORRESPONDENT ANALYZES REPORTS OF SHIP LOSSES.

London, August 10.—The Times' naval correspondent writes: "The losses by submarines and mines the first week of August are not very different from those sustained during the four weeks of July. When the necessary restrictions are made, it is found that British vessels over 1,600 tons sunk numbered 19, one more than the previous week. Compared with the average for July, the losses are slightly higher.

"A phase of the U-boat war outside of any figures is that indicated by the Admiralty announcement of the loss of the Belgian Prince. The cruel circumstances under which her seamen were murdered is remarkable even in the grim record of submarine outrages. The popular appeal for the figures of tonnage destroyed shows no falling off, but the officials still refuse to supply such information. There is one comparison which the present method of issuing figures admits, namely, between the number of vessels attacked and the number which escaped. Adding together the losses of ships both over and under 1,600 tons and those unsuccessfully attacked, in the four weeks of March, out of 151 attacks, the escapes numbered 58, or 38 per cent; in April, 36 per cent; in May and June, respectively, 41 and 44. In July the proportion went back to 39. In other words, well over half the vessels attacked are sunk. The ratio of escapes remains about the same, notwithstanding the increase in the number of armed vessels.

"These figures make it more interesting to note that while in this country the official view of the submarine menace appears to have taken on more sanguinary coloring, there is manifest in the German press a perceptible cooling of the expectations which were encouraged earlier in the year. The reason is probably the same in both cases. Fears or hope around the big toll taken in April may have proved illusory. This is far from saying the danger has passed. It is fair to draw the conclusion that after two years of preparation for a short, glorious campaign, Germany again failed to execute her plans. This result is admitted in Berlin, and is shown by the change in method. Attack on merchant shipping in bulk has been abandoned for specialized attacks on selected vessels. Fewer torpedoes are wasted and larger cargoes sunk. How the campaign on these lines progresses, the figure in the official tables shed no light.

"It may also be assumed that if the campaign is no more successful the next six months than the last, this country ought to be able to survive it. To make this certain there must be progressive effectiveness in an offensive war. The increasing value of aircraft in this war has already been pointed out here. The great bar to the destruction of the submarine is the difficulty experienced in locating it under water. Inventors of all the Allied nations should concentrate in an endeavor to discover an instrument which will surmount the difficulty.

German mass meeting in Hesse, Dr. Michaelis telegraphed: "I am firmly confident that the splendid military situation will help us to a peace which will guarantee permanently the German Empire's continued existence on the continent and overseas."

"The message for which the Chancellor thanked the senders, had expressed assurance that after the recent great successes of the German armies and the answers of Entente statesmen, there would be a peace on a sound basis and that the Erzberger resolution for peace without necessary extensions of territories and indemnities was impossible. Confidence that the new Chancellor would bring about a victorious peace and not one of renunciation was asserted.

SHIPPING NOTES.

The SS. Tours recently launched along the upper lakes is on her way to this port.

SS. Savoy arrived in port yesterday from points along the north shore. She carried passengers, mails and general cargo.

The steam barge Mapleton arrived yesterday with a cargo of coal which is being discharged at a wharf in the inner basin.

The Marquette-Bressier left outward yesterday morning. The W. B. Morley after discharging coal left for the lakes. The Oceanic and Irigoin arrived in port during the night with coal.

The Manchester liner which arrived here early this week with 1,500 tons of cargo for Quebec left last night for Montreal after taking on 800 tons of outward cargo.

AMERICAN SEAMEN COME TO TERMS.

Washington, August 10.—American seamen and their employers have come to a full agreement on wages and working conditions during the war which the government officials said today solves the problem of obtaining sufficient men to operate the great merchant fleet the country is building.

TO PUT FOREIGN SHIPS ON COASTWISE LINES.

At the suggestion of the United States Shipping Board, representative Alexander introduced in the House of Representatives a bill giving the President authority to admit by proclamation foreign vessels to the coastwise trade. The bill was referred to the Committee on Merchant Marine and Fisheries of which Mr. Alexander is chairman. As introduced the measure read:

"That during the present war or emergency the President may, if in his opinion the interests of the United States so require, permit by proclamation vessels of foreign registry to engage in the coastwise trade of the United States in such conditions and as he shall deem wise."

It was pointed out that there are a number of ships in the coastwise trade which are fast and seaworthy which could be used to admirable purpose in the trans-atlantic trade. But these vessels cannot at present be spared from the trade in which they are now engaged. The coastwise shipping has already been drawn upon to a considerable extent by the demands of overseas shipping and it is feared that some great hardships would be endured by certain industries were more of them withdrawn, unless a substitute service is performed by permitting foreign vessels to engage in coastwise trade and permitting a foreign vessel taking on a part of a load for overseas destination, take a coastwise cargo from one to another domestic port.

BRITISH SHIPPING PROFITS.

A. Bonar Law, Chancellor of the Exchequer, has received a return of nearly 100 per cent within two years on an investment in seven different English shipping concerns. He announced the fact during a recent discussion in the House of Commons regarding excess profits taxes. He severely criticised the Government for permitting such profits to be made during war times. The effect of high ocean freights from which the profits have been made, upon the cost of foodstuffs, the Chancellor declared, had been exaggerated, but was by no means negligible.

As an example of the kind of profits that have been made in shipping during the war the Chancellor made public his own personal accounts. In one case a steamer in which he had invested about \$1,300 had been lost or sunk, and he received about \$4,500 as compensation, in addition to ample dividends.

Another shipping company in which he invested about \$1,500 wrote him a letter saying that, as the cost of shipbuilding was so high that new investors probably would not be found for some time to come, they were distributing surplus capital, enclosing a check for more than \$4,000. The investments all were in tramp ships or companies owning them.

FREIGHTS AND CHARTERS.

New York, August 10.—Chartering was light but rates continued firm and a steady demand prevailed for tonnage in several trades. Only a limited number of boats offered for charter.

New York, August 10.—Diverse developments bearing upon quoted value doubtless accounted for the lower trend of today's restricted operations in the stock market. A decrease of over 500,000 tons in unfilled orders of the United States Steel Corporation for July, a new low record for Russian remittances and the expansion of labor troubles were among the principal drawbacks. On the other hand, call money relaxed from yesterday's opening rate of four per cent and several of the leading industrial and producing companies submitted favorable financial reports. Among the more noteworthy of these were the annual statement of the Maxwell Motor Company and the quarterly return of the Utah Copper Company.

Apart from shippings, tobaccos, sugars and oils, which seemed to derive much of their irregular strength from pools and other professional interests, war shares continued under intermittent pressure. United States Steel reacted 2 points to 122 3/4, with substantial recovery. Bethlehem Steel new stock 2 1/4. General Motors 4 5/8 and a few high priced specialties lost 1 to 3 points. Rails manifested a sudden reversal from their recent firmness, dividend paying issues like Reading, St. Paul, Canadian Pacific and Delaware and Hudson breaking 1 to 3 points on comparatively small offerings. The preferred shares of the Lake Erie and Western, Chicago Great Western and Rock Island roads yielded to a like extent, but Southern Railway Common and Pfd. were in steady demand, the latter gaining 1 1/2 points. Lowest prices were made in the final hour, with fractional recoveries at the close. Total sales amounted to 470,000 shares.

Bonds were again irregular, with minor changes in internationals. Liberty 3 1/2's moved in the narrow radius of 99.56 to 99.60. Total sales, par value, aggregated 2,560,000. Most of the old United States bonds were 1-4 per cent higher on call.

Montreal, August 10.—Today's market was a very interesting affair, trading being dull throughout both sessions. The only stocks to show any strength were Scotia and Riordon, the former sold as high as 105 1/2 and the latter closed at the high for the day, 121 3/4. The advance in Scotia was due to the higher quotations in it in New York. The list, as a whole, was steady, however, and with any encouragement from the New York market, it looks as if prices would advance easily. Until affairs are more settled in Washington, and the New York market settles down it does not look as if we would have much activity.

(By Bruneau & Dupuis.)

New York, August 10.—Yesterday sharp rally petered out after the first half hour and the market has been heavy, if not actually weak. We hear that the copper people are anything but satisfied with the attitude of Mr. Daniels and the cabinet on price fixing. The market is at present watching the price fixing matter and the immediate move will probably be based on the result of developments in this line. Broadly speaking, we believe that peace is much nearer than it would seem on the surface and that this is going to affect the market quite as much, if not more than the prices to be arrived at, purchase of commodities. We may have a sharp upward movement in this fixing of prices if satisfactory but the market should be a sale on such advance we believe, generally speaking, the bull market is over although we may have a resumption of one from time to time.

(By Breen & Gourdeau.)

New York, August 10.—Prices in the securities market during the current week saw within a trading area, which, for the greater part of the time, was of decidedly narrow limits. Irregularity, too, characterized the movement of values, while the business transacted was, to a very considerable extent, credited to professional interests. After opening better, and undergoing further improvement for a time, bear pressure, which set in around mid-week, caused a declining tendency that practically involved all departments of the list, although the weakness was more intensified in the steel, equipment and motor groups, than elsewhere.

This character of selling developed on an enlarged scale subsequently, that resulted in further recessions, which in some issues was not alone of substantial proportions, but amounted to the most severe losses experienced in sometime. Despite the unsettledness ensuing from this cause the market's technical position was materially improved. This fact was partially demonstrated in the closing days when a readjustment of accounts led to marked recoveries that were pretty general, with but few exceptions. The absence of public participation is still in evidence, and the uncertainties that have been acting as a deterrent upon speculative circles in the matter of fresh commitments, are likewise in effect. However, although the market's undertone is satisfactory, considering the character of the general situation, the future course of prices seems greatly dependent upon the outcome of the various matters contained in the Government's price fixing and revenue raising program.

AIRPLANES INDISPENSABLE.

Efforts in Canada and States Arouse Interest at Front.

Canadian Headquarters in France, via London, August 10.—(By Stewart Lyon, special correspondent Canadian Press)—The great efforts that are now being made in Canada and the United States to assure supremacy in the air during the final stages of the war are viewed here at the front with keen and sympathetic interest. Airplanes have become absolutely indispensable for scouting purposes and directing artillery fire, as well as, by means of photograph, recording its effect. Without airplane observation no army henceforth dare take, or attempt to carry out, plans for offensive warfare.

During the past two weeks of rainy and misty weather it is not too much to say that the activities of millions of men were greatly hampered, and their efforts to get on with the war frustrated by clouds that prevented a few hundred men from making their customary flights. The airplane is not only a necessity for the intelligence and artillery services, but is being used with ever increasing results as a fighting machine. Reports from our own front this morning record that airplanes yesterday attacked the enemy's observation balloons which were directing his gunfire from points well behind his front. One balloon was brought down in flames, and three were smoking as the result of machine gun fire from our airplanes. Another fighting machine flew along the enemy's front line trench at an average height of only thirty feet and engaged the occupants with a machine gun. At one point it dipped within six feet of the ground and on its return to the airbase some German telephone wire was discovered wound around the machinery of the plane. Another plane pursued and opened fire on parties of Germans behind the enemy front, and a cyclist despatch rider. These operations, in addition to the regular programme of bombing trains, railway stations and supply depots many miles behind the German lines, are carried out every night on which the machines can take to the air indicate the wide range of the aeroplane's usefulness. In pursuit of a fleeing foe in the open country aviators with bombs and machine guns would be far more effective than the cavalry has been in any past war. The overwhelming aerial supremacy and ample supply of bombs and machine guns for the aviators is likely to be a decisive factor in the last phase of the war.
