Fire Threatens Hotel At Fort Coulonge

Over \$30,000 Damage To Labine's

Damage reported variously as somewhere between \$30,000 and \$50,000 was done to Labine's Hotel yesterday, Wednesday, shortly after midnight when fire threatened the entire hotel, as well as the whole town of Fort Coulonge.

The fire took place in what used to be the ladies grill, an area beautifully finished with Manitoba fir and which is now used as the hotel's kitchen. A part of the addition is also now used as a meat market.

The blaze was noticed at first by the town constable on his midnight rounds. He tried to put it out with a fire extinguisher and then called in the fire brigade. Volunteer units arrived from Fort Coulonge, Campbell's Bay and Shawville. Going from Shawville were Watt Taylor, Hubie Dale, Allan Black, Rolly Rennie and Rolly Wickens.

The fire was kept entirely under control so there was only smoke damage to the three story hotel proper but the part where the fire started was demolished.

Other fires this week have caused damage to the extent of over an estimated twenty thousand dollars.

At Portage du Fort Monday morning at seven o'clock a fire took place at the home of Mrs. Elsie Delarge.

The loss was even greater Monday afternoon in the fire at Oliver Beauchamp's Coffee Shop in Otter Lake.

On Tuesday afternoon at about one o'clock a fire in Beechgrove burned the dwelling and granary of the Wilbert Smiths.

Although the losses were considerably greater, the insured values of the above premises were \$3,000, \$5,000 and \$2,500.

Grand Canal Project

Plans are in the making for two meetings to discuss the construction of the Grand Canal project for the Ottawa River. At both meetings, Paul Marineau, M. P. for Pontiac Temiscamingue, will be guest speaker.

The first meeting will be held in Hull on Feb. 22, sponsored by Hull City Council. Representatives will be invited to attend from all municipalities in Western Quebec. In addition, federal cabinet ministers representing the three departments concerned with the canal will be invited. The three departments are Public Works, Transport and Trade and Commerce. The Chambers of Commerce of Western Quebec will also have representatives present.

The second meeting will be held in Ottawa on March 21, and will be sponsored by the Eastern Ontario Development Association.

Two QPP Officers Suspended At The Bay

Detective Sergeant Andre Audet and Sub-Inspector Linden R. Quaille have received notice that they have been suspended indefinitely from the QPP force at Campbell's Bay for participating in political activities.

Det. Sgt. Audet joined the QPP in 1947 moved to Campbell's Bay in Aug. 1952 and was named head of the detachment in Jan. 1953. Mr. Audet aged 37 was in the R. C. Navy during the War and was wounded in action. He is a past President of the Canadian Legion and is District Commander of Western Quebec, and is a Past President of Pontiac Lions Club. He is married and the father of four children.

Sub-Inspector Linden R. Quaille aged 43 joined the Provincial Police Liquor Department in Feb. 1951 and was promoted to his present rank in March 1955. Before joining the force Mr. Quaille was President and General Manager of the Hotel Co. of Chateau Pontiac Ltd. and previous to that was a Farm Equipment Dealer for International Harvester Co. He is married and has two children. He is a Past District Governor of Lions International and now hold the title of International Counsellor, Lions International.

Det. Fred Laxton, 27, who replaces Det. Audet, arrived in Campbell's Bay yesterday. He is a seven-year veteran with the QPP in Montreal, Maniwaki, Gracefield, Hull and Abitibi. He is married and has two children.

Mysterious Fire Damages Residence At Shawville

Tom Barley had gone to bed early and his wife Dorothy was doing some late office work at John L. Hodgins' Garage last Monday night. The children Matthew 3, and Suzanne 4, were also asleep at home but fortunately, the two pet kittens were awake and smelled smoke about ten o'clock. They ran to Tom's bed and awoke him with their clawing at his bed covers and by this act they probably saved the lives and certainly the home of the Barley family.

People had been smelling a burnt smell about the house for several days but couldn't find the cause of the odour. What they didn't know was that a large bearing beam in the newly built house had been slowly smouldering from the bottom and it wasn't until the slow burning reached the open attic that a fresh supply of air fanned it into a blaze.

When the cats awakened Mr. Barley, he leapt out of bed and went to the source of the trouble; called the fire department and also his wife who arrived upon the scene with Royce Richardson and Stan Widdicombe from the garage.

The Shawville Volunteer Fire Brigade carefully put out the

flame using buckets of water instead of the hoses to protect the new home from water damage. Mr. Barley received a bad shock when he fell from a chair trying to locate the point of trouble; as he opened the hatch to the attic, smoke and flame puffed out at him causing him to collapse on the floor.

Dr. Green was summoned to his aid as Mr. Barley has just recently recovered from a heart attack. He was sufficiently recovered from his new set back to be on the job again on Wednesday.

The Richardsons took the two Barley children to their home; the Keith Munroe's were of great assistance helping Mrs. Barley clean up the mess after the fire; the Dr. Green's took Mr. and Mrs. Barley into their home while their own place was being repaired and Russell Judd and his men are busily making repairs as fast as possible.

Insurance adjusters from Renfrew have been examining the premises and cannot determine the cause of the fire. They have most emphatically declared that there was no fault in the construction of the house, nor in its wiring.

Today the Barleys are most grateful to all their neighbours for help received.

"The Hilton Mines" Subject of Address By Mine Manager

With a labor force of close to 400 men, an annual payroll in the vicinity of \$2 million; and an investment of about \$20 million The Hilton Mines is removing about 5½ million tons of material from the pit at Bristol Mines each year from which about 700,000 tons of about 65% iron content pellets are shipped to Stelco at Hamilton; and to various points in the States.

This data provided the opening remarks of Ed Tyler, manager of the mining operation at the Hilton Mines, in an address before the Shawville Rotary Club last Monday night.

Provision of raw material for the iron and steel industries is highly competitive, Mr. Tyler stated, and thus far The Hilton Mines has been able to

meet the competition quite well, in spite of the fact that the ore body at Bristol is very low grade iron. Of the several reasons for a favorable competitive position, one is the quality of the labour force at the mine. Other favourable factors include tax benefits granted the Company at all levels of government; and finally the chemical composition of the ore body, which lends itself well to concentration of the iron oxide, (although the process is complex) as well as the fact that the silica content of the finished pellets runs to less than 2%, compared to as high as 10% in shipments from some other areas.

Stressing the competitive aspect of the iron ore business Mr. Tyler said "It behooves us to get this stuff out as cheaply as we can, because that's the only way we're going to stay in business."

Present proven ore reserves at the Hilton Mines indicate production at the Mine on a 364 day basis, for another 12 or 13 years. Next October increased stripping at the pit, will require additional manpower. It is expected that there will be full employment for these additional men for several years.

New Ore Reserves At New Calumet Mines

Underground exploration on the property of New Calumet Mines Ltd. has uncovered 150,000 tons of high-grade ore to increase known reserves to 300,000 tons, Mr. Jock Dunlop, mine manager, told the annual meeting recently.

Since the Sept. 30, 1960 year-end, drilling has opened up several new areas on the Calumet Island, property containing about the same quality ore as previous known reserves. Average grade of the 25,500 tons milled during the first quarter ended Dec. 31 was about seven per cent zinc, two percent lead, 0.014 ounce gold and 3.90 ounces silver a ton.

Ore was found on extensions of the 1,200, 1,350 and 1,500 foot levels, and diamond drilling further confirmed new ore found last year at the 2,050 level, at present the lowest operating level in the mine. This could be extended to the 3,000 foot level if a good section were found.

Another Zone
Another possible ore-zone was discovered within the past few days under the old Longstreet orebody on the property. With only one hole drilled no further information is available other than the find looks encouraging.

The recent drop in lead and zinc prices will affect the mine's income materially, but the blow has been softened by the decrease in the premium on the Canadian dollar. Each year for the past few years the company has paid out conversion of U. S. dollars re-

duced lead and zinc prices is the present excellent position of silver, with a possibility of a price increase in the near future. Production of silver at New Calumet is currently running at about 310,000 ounces a year.

Diamond drilling has started on the Matagami Lake property of the Basada Syndicate, in which New Calumet has 66 per cent interest. The property is three miles northwest of Mattagami Lake Mines Ltd. which now is developing some 20 million tons of copper-zinc ore outlined by diamond drilling.

"We have reason to believe that similar geological and geophysical conditions exist on the Basada ground as those found near the large ore occurrence at Mattagami Lake Mines Ltd., Mr. Dunlop said.

Ken Ross Death Ruled Accidental By Hull Corner's Jury

A coroner's jury in Hull recently ruled that the death of Kenneth Ross, 35, of Quyon, Que., whose car hit a bus in Lusville on Dec. 23, "was accidental".

Six witnesses were heard. The driver, Manley Brown, 28, of Campbell's Bay, said his bus was going east on Highway 8 at 40 miles an hour when a car crashed into the bus and swerved into a ditch.

The bus was pushed off the road.

Three passengers, Mr. and Mrs. Paul Elliott, of Shawville, and Gerald Pratt, of Quyon, confirmed the driver's statement.

QPP Constable Raphael Vin-

gigoli said the two vehicles were 100 feet apart when he reached the scene. The front parts were smashed. Driver Ross was dying. His companion, Douglas Bonchar, 34, of Quyon, had to be pried out of his seat. He died a few days later in hospital.

The jury deliberated less than two minutes.

Coroner Dr. Gerald Brisson presided at the hearing. Crown Attorney Orville Frenette led the questioning.

Redmond Quain Jr., represented the Pontiac Bus Line which owned the bus. Paul Martineau and Charles Major represented the Ross family.

FOR EXPANSION

The attention of our readers is drawn to the advertisement which appeared last week in The Equity announcing the availability of loans up to \$25,000 for small businesses.

This is the result of federal government legislation enacted at the end of 1960 to enable small businesses to obtain the financial backing required for their expansion.

Not only will the legislation make it possible for existing businesses to carry out needed expansion programs, but it will also enable new businesses to get started. In this area, the urgent need is for good tourist accommodation. The new legislation will no doubt encourage the setting up of such accommodation here before too long — indeed many enquiries along these lines have already been received by federal member Paul Martineau, whose advice to all who seek this information is to talk it over with a bank manager.

Small business makes up a large percentage of the economy of this country. It is encouraging to note that the federal government has now recognized the importance of this seemingly small cog in the national production wheel; and further, that it has done the one thing most badly and urgently needed by small business — by giving access to capital funds in sufficiently large quantity to be effective.

REDUCING THE RISK

It is heartening indeed to see that representations have been made to the provincial government for the establishment of a provincial "unsatisfied judgments fund" for the financial protection of those who use the highways of the province of Quebec.

The good news comes that the Chambre de Commerce du District de Montreal has submitted a brief to Premier Lesage along these lines.

The brief suggests that the fund be established and maintained by annual levy against those seeking application for drivers permits. The brief further suggests that those who carry insurance should pay a levy of say \$1.00; and those who carry no protection should be charged five or ten dollars.

Our view is that the driver who carries insurance should not be required to contribute to the fund. It should be supported entirely by those who carry no protection. However these are minor matters. The important principal is to get the government to recognize the need for the existence of such a fund; and to expedite its creation.

The financial risk of driving on Quebec Highways, while not quite so dire as the physical risk, is nevertheless little short of appalling. The sooner the government admits this, and sets corrective machinery in motion, the better.

SAFETY AFLOAT

With icy winds howling down on us from the Arctic, it is difficult to think of the warmth of summertime, and of the problems of life which arrive with the melting of the ice in our rivers and lakes.

These problems were brought into sharp focus last week when a Joliette man was fined \$100 and forbidden to pilot any kind of craft on Canadian waters for a period of two years. The sentence was imposed when he pleaded guilty to a charge of criminal negligence in the death of an 18 year old girl by drowning last summer. The victim drowned when she was thrown out of a rowboat which was struck by an outboard motor-equipped craft operated by 23 year old Roger Massicotte of Joliette County.

Massicotte admitted that he had been looking astern towards a water skier being towed at

This tragic accident is mentioned here, even at such an unseasonable time as this coldest week of the year, in the hope that the sequence of events which culminated in the death of a young Canadian will sink into the minds of those who operate power boats.

This death points out the absolute necessity for all boats used for water skiing purposes to carry at least two people. One to watch the water skier; and one to watch everything else.

Our opinion is that up to this time at least, the use of power boats has been treated far too casually by too many people. These boats, many of them overpowered, are placed all too frequently in the hands of children, yes, and of adults too, who apparently do not realize the extent of their responsibility. The accident described above was only one of many similar tragedies and even more near-tragedies, that happened last summer. Others like it will happen next summer.

It is our hope that the people of this area will take their responsibility seriously in this matter and promote the principles of water safety to the limit on the many water playgrounds to be found on our doorstep.

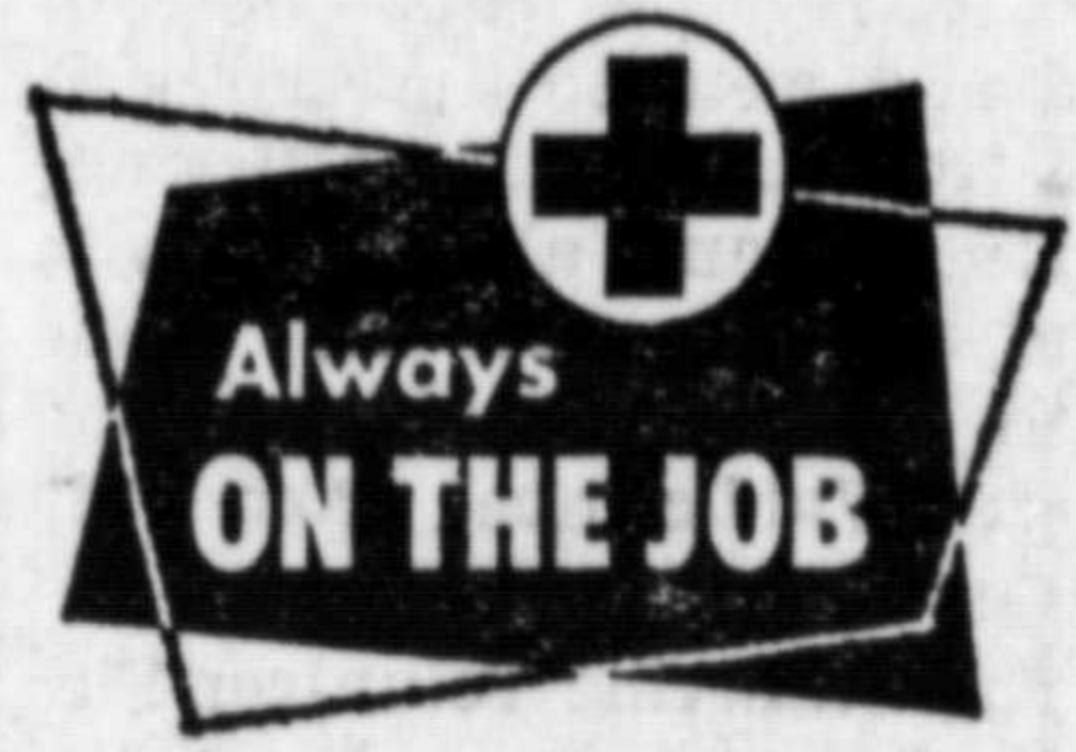

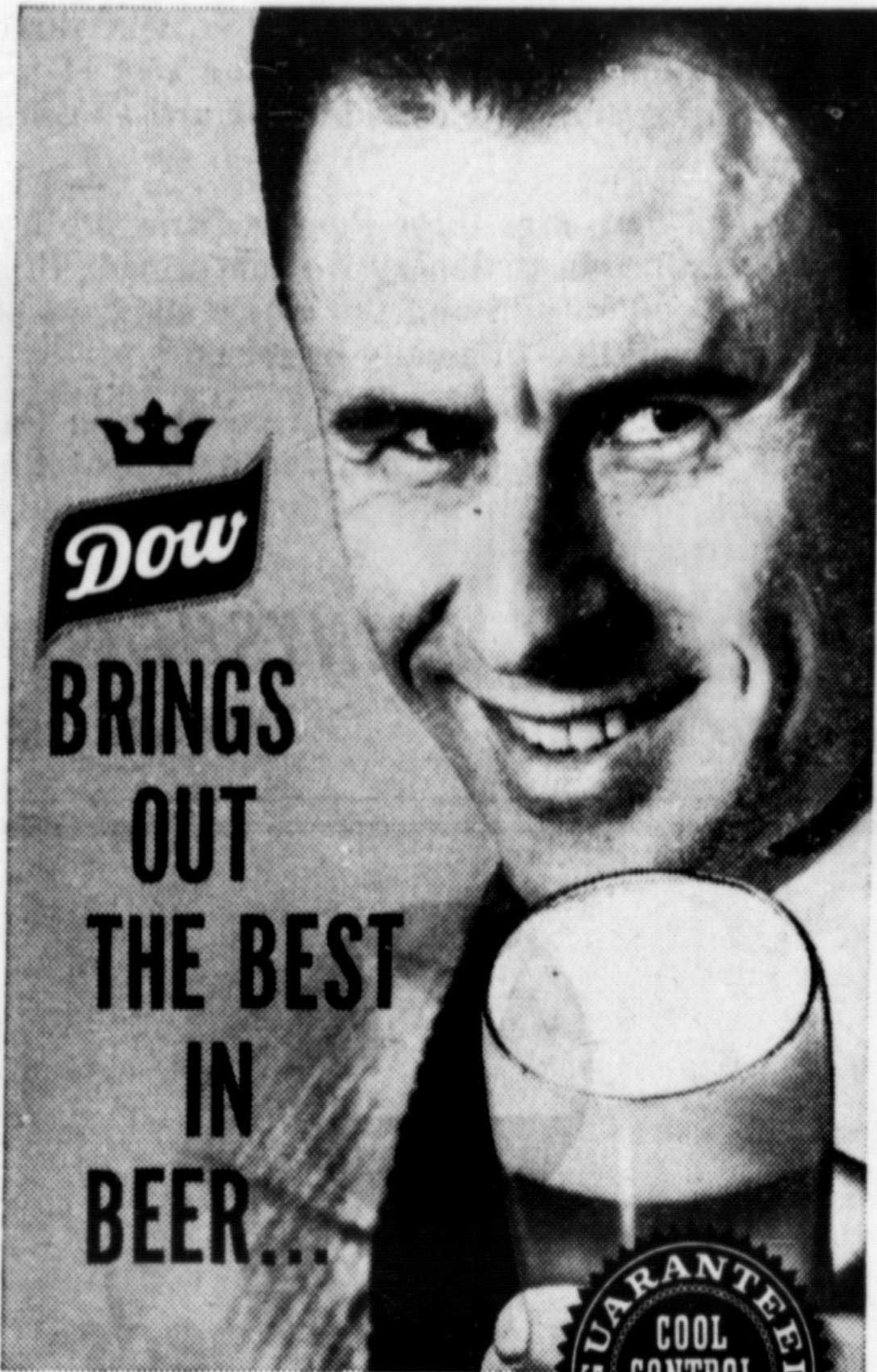


