Class 5—*Surveillance Warehouses.*

ARTICLE XI.—Warehouses of this class
for the accommodation of steamers and
other vessels may be established in ac-
cordance with the provisions of the Act
passed by the Order in Council relating
thereto of 23rd October, 1865.

ARTICLE XII.—The proprietor of every
warehouse of Class 4 shall pay for the
privileges granted him in the use of
such warehouse, the sum of forty
dollars per annum in half yearly payments
in advance to the Collector of Customs.

REGULATIONS.
ARTICLE I.—Warehouses for the storage
of imported goods shall be known and
designated as follows:—
Class 1. Stores occupied by the Government
of Canada.
Class 2. Warehouses occupied by Importers
exclusive for the storage of goods imported
by, or consigned to them, or purchased by
them in bond.
Class 3. Warehouses occupied for the gen-
eral storage of imported goods.
Class 4. Yards, sheds and other buildings
used for the storing and slaughtering of
animals in bond.
Class 5. Warehouses exclusively for the
manufacture of goods, and the storage of
raw materials.
Class 6. *Surveillance Warehouses.*

ARTICLE XIII.—No alterations can be
made in any Bonded Warehouse without
the permission of the Collector of Customs;
and if any material change in the premises
is contemplated it must be submitted for
approval of the Minister of Customs.

ARTICLE XIV.—The Collector of Customs
shall advise the Commissioner of Customs
of all facts which may be likely to affect
their general security, and if turned or
plundered, immediate notice
must be given at the Commission, with full
particulars of all facts connected therewith.

ARTICLE XV.—The Collector of Customs
may, at any time, upon giving
reasonable notice to the owners of merchandise
deposited therein, but no part of any quan-
tity of goods shall be refused for any
portion of a term unexpired.

ARTICLE XVI.—The Collector of Customs
may, at any time, upon giving
reasonable notice, order the discontinuance
of the right to store bonded goods in any
premises established as a Warehouse;
and when such discontinuance of such
Warehouse can only be re-established after
showed application as at first.

ARTICLE XVII.—If on examination of the
Inventory documents the Minister of Customs
is satisfied that the public interest will be
substantially benefited, the application will
be granted, whereupon the owner or occupant
will be notified by the Collector, and an
inventory of the contents of the Warehouse
will be made by the Collector, and a number
of the Inventory will be assigned to the
Warehouse, and also the same to his
register, placing a Warehouse Locker in
charge thereof.

ARTICLE XVIII.—At all points where there
are Government stores, they shall be used
for the examination and appraisement of
imported goods, and for the storage of un-
claimed and seized goods, and where there
are no such stores, the Collector may, under
direction of the Minister of Customs, make
temporary arrangements for the storage of
such goods, or may deposit such un-
claimed or seized goods in any Warehouse
of Class 2.

ARTICLE XIX.—A Warehouse of Class 2
shall consist of an entire building, or not
less than one of the divisions thereof, and
in the latter case must be so arranged
as that the Collector shall have full access
to the floor set apart and established as
a Bonded Warehouse, and no portion
of the same shall in any case be allowed,
but all divisions between the part of a building
occupied as a Warehouse, whether door
or partition shall be of the most solid
and secure construction possible in each
case.

ARTICLE XX.—A Warehouse of Class 3
shall in every case consist of an entire
building and shall be used solely for the
storage of bonded merchandise, or of un-
claimed and seized goods ordered thereto
by the Collector of Customs.
The rates of storage and compensation
for labour in the handling of bonded goods
in Warehouses of this class, shall be subject
to agreement between the owner or importer
of the goods, and the proprietor of the Ware-
house who will collect all amounts due for
storage and labour, the duty of Collector or
proper officer of Customs being to look after
the safe custody of the goods for the security
of the revenue only.

Should the Collector of Customs require
to deposit in any such Warehouse un-
claimed and seized goods, the charges for storage
and labour thereon, shall not exceed the
regular rates, and the proprietor shall be
liable as in other cases for their safe
keeping.

ARTICLE XXI.—All Warehouses of either
Class 2 or Class 3 shall be secured by
Customs locks, provided by the Department
of Customs; but this will not prevent the
proprietors or occupants of the building from
having their own locks on the same doors
in addition thereto.

ARTICLE XXII.—No free or duty paid
goods shall be stored in any Bonded Ware-
house; and all bonded goods, when entered
for consumption, removal or exportation,
the goods, and the proprietor of the Ware-
house, unless permission to the contrary be
first obtained from the Collector upon an
application made to him in writing, specifying
the goods and the time for which it is desired
they should remain, and in such case the
goods shall be legibly and conspicuously
marked and set apart from those remain-
ing in bond, but no such privilege shall be
granted in any case, except for good and
urgent reasons.

ARTICLE XXIII.—Applications for the estab-
lishment of a Warehouse of this class shall
be made in the same manner as for Classes
2 and 3, and shall be subject to the regula-
tions adopted by Order in Council of 17th May,
1875.

ARTICLE XXIV.—Applications for the estab-
lishment of Warehouses of Class 5, shall
be made in accordance with the terms of
the Order in Council, relating to the Refin-
ing of Sugar in bond dated 11th January,
1874, except that the application and de-
scription shall be submitted for approval

THURSDAY, JULY 22, 1875. BY CABLE THIS EVENING.

London, July 22. There is no change in position of the steamship Abbotford, Ashore in Commos Bay, Wales.

In the House of Commons this afternoon Mr. Russell announced that the Government had abandoned the Merchant Shipping Bill for the session.

Mr. Russell violently attacked the Government. He said the consequence of the abandonment of the bill would be the destruction of thousands of lives.

The speaker ordered Mr. Russell to withdraw and he went out shaking his fists at the Government benches.

The House then began a discussion as to what action to be taken in regard to Mr. Russell's conduct.

Mr. Russell declared that nothing has occurred to create the least uneasiness in the cotton trade and exports refer to the contrary are sensational.

Berlin, July 22. The town of Warmbrunn and vicinity in Silesia has been visited by very heavy rainstorms.

A despatch just received from Wimbledon says the match for the Elms (Chalenge) is left in doubt as the Irish team is slightly ahead.

London, July 22—3 p.m. The bullion in the Bank of England has increased £7,000,000 during the week.

Agents of the steamer Abbotford report that she went ashore in a dense fog.

Second despatch.—The old Orchard House is now flat and men are doing their best with water to save the Ocean House, which is just across the way.

Fourth despatch.—A steam started at 12.30 from the steamer. The Ocean House is valued about \$80,000.

Old Orchard, July 22—4 p.m. There were 25 boarders in the house.

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Government Notice.

THE attention of parties concerned is hereby directed to the provisions of the "Inland Revenue Act of 1875" (37 Vic, chap. 8), which came into force upon the 1st day of January 1875.

This Act is entitled "An Act to impose License duties on Compounders of Spirits; to amend the Act respecting Inland Revenue; and to prevent the Adulteration of Food, Drink and Drugs." Under its provisions all Compounders of Spirits must bring themselves under the supervision of the Department of Inland Revenue, by taking out a license for the carrying on of their business as such. Application for such license should be made to the Collector of the Inland Revenue Division within which such business is, or is to be carried on.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by Order of the Council of the 7th day of June, 1871, it is directed that sworn declarations and machinists' certificates in cases required preliminary to the admission of any duty, of machinery not manufactured in the Dominion for use in Canadian manufacture, and whereas by the Act in Vict., chap. 8, the same machinery is made subject to an "ad valorem" duty of ten per cent, to take effect on the first day of January next, and whereas it is desirable to simplify the practice of the Customs in such cases, and to avoid being led to the security of the revenue.

His Excellency the Governor-General in Council, on the recommendation of the Hon. Minister of Customs, and under the provision of the 13th section of the Act in Vict., chap. 8, has been pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the first day of January next, the said Order in Council be, and the same is hereby resolved, and that the Collectors of Customs be, and they are hereby authorized and instructed to accept entry of such machinery on and after that date at ten per cent, duty "ad valorem," requiring the following affidavit to be filed in each case, and to accept thereof to be attached to each entry.

A. B., the importer of the following described machinery, viz. (here a full description of each machine, giving name of maker and use to which it is to be applied, shall be inserted) do solemnly swear, that to the best of my knowledge and belief, no machine such as that above described, is manufactured in Canada, and that the same is imported for use in the manufacturing industry of which I am the proprietor or one of the proprietors, or legally authorized agent, and that the same is not to be offered for sale.
