#### GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

FRIDAY, May 30.  
The opening of the Synod of Aberdeen, about the Presbyterian Church of Canada, was read, together with an extract of the proceedings of the committee of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, and of a book session of said church, expressing the appointment of that church. The General Assembly being with much satisfaction, that the congregation of Presbyterians at Montreal desire to be considered as in full communion with this national established church, and that they have called to discontinue the ordinances of religion among them a minister who has been licensed and ordained by this Church; and the General Assembly declare, that so long as the congregation continues to elect pastors thus qualified, its members shall be regarded as in full communion with the Church of Scotland.

#### COMMUNICATION.

Mr. GRAY.  
I noticed in the Boston papers some time since, a communication on the subject of a new species of grain which has been recently introduced into the United States and which has been cultivated with much success in Northern climates.

This grain which is of such promising character is indigenous in Persia, was first cultivated in Europe in the garden of Plants in Paris, and from thence was introduced into the United States through the Agency of the Society of Massachusetts. Three kernels of it fell into the hands of Mr. Woodward in New Hampshire, who forgetting to sow it the Autumn as directed, put it into the ground in the spring, and it proving to be spring grain, he sowed all who received the exotic seed brought it to perfection. We are, therefore, to learn, that this grain is a proper seedling of the year's crop through this city to Quebec. It is surely to be wished that our farmers will avail themselves of this interest by endeavouring to secure some of the seed for experiment next spring. Montreal, 15th Aug. 1817.
