Italy and the Pope.—At a meeting of the Dublin Corporation on May 17th, the following letter from Lord Beaconsfield was read:—“Sir, Lord Beaconsfield has had the honour to receive your letter of the 15th inst. transmitting a memorial addressed to him by the Italian Mayor and Corporation of Dublin, in which attention is drawn to the relations existing between the Italian Legislature and the Holy See, especially with reference to a measure proposed for the alteration of the Italian Parliament. Under these circumstances the Prime Minister would be unable to give any useful purpose to be served by his receiving a deputa-tion on the subject.”

The Ministerial journals of this city are reprinting France's anti-clerical speeches, signifying that a Clerical lobby in France might imperil peace between Germany and France. The North German Gazette states that Russia has declared to Paris that it will ally itself to Germany, and is prepared to see its capital bombarded. The Times' opinion is further supported by the course of the French Government, which is very doubtful. The refusal of the Senate to authorize a declaration of war inevitably causes MacMahon's resignation.

London, May 23. The Moslem-din insurrection in the Caucasus has proved a serious check to the advance of the Russians. The insurgents are constantly harassing the Russian troops, and a large force of Cossacks attacked the Russians near the frontier, and compelled them to retreat.

A Vienna despatch says that the Sultan Uli Khan's proclamation of a holy war against Russia, in the almost simultaneous announcement of a Constantinople telegram that the Sultan for the first time since the departure of the Sultan for the Caucasus has been declared upon, seem to show that at the advance of those who took up in the present struggle as one of the reasons for the Ottoman Empire is exaggerated.

A Paris despatch says that a portion of the Ardanais garrison took the road to Ardennes, having cut its way through a Russian column. The Russians have closed in upon the rear of the Ardanais, which is now in a very serious situation.

A Vienna despatch announces that the Austrian Government's attention is occupied by the increasing agitation in Hungary. There is an eager desire for war among all classes.

It is reported from Bucharest that on Tuesday the Turk invading forces at the Austrian frontier, which, after a few days, caught fire.

A Paris despatch says that MacMahon requested Don Carlos to leave France to fight. Sir Matthew Digby, the great English architect, is dead.

TOMORROW will witness in this city an event of no little importance, and presenting some features of historical interest. If our memory serves us right, the first legation ever received in England was sent as a peculiar honor to Henry VIII, when the approved defender of Rome against the assaults of Luther; and the last was sent to Queen Mary when engaged in restoring England to the ancient public form of religion, which that same Henry had substituted. These facts, assuming them to be such, show the immense importance and dignity of this office in the eyes of the Princes of the Catholic Church.

In fact a large number of the Roman Catholic Christians what an ambassador is amongst them, that is, the highest agent of the power which sends him. If these conditions be correct (and we must confess to approaching such a subject with the greatest diffidence), we must congratulate our Roman Catholic fellow citizens in advance on receiving the greatest honor the head of their Church could pay them, and will do them credit at all hands. The Province of Quebec is the last country in Christendom in which the Catholic Church has never been disturbed in the position it has occupied since its original foundation, either by revolution, as in the France of the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries, or by a prophesying monarch, as in the island of the sixteenth century and in modern Poland, or by general changes of religious opinion, as in England, Germany, and other countries in the sixteenth century, when nations casting off one form of faith accepted another, instead of, like all modern nations, rejecting their old beliefs, and planting their new ones.

Everywhere but here political freedom and representative institutions have made the fragments of an ancient faith inseparable to the masses, and the Church has been the first victim of political revolution. In Canada she is intact and untouched, and precisely as she stood in the middle ages, and the triumphs of popular measures, and the creation under the name of Representative Government of what is in substance a French Canadian republic under British protection, united with public education, have made the people of French origin without exception the most devoted Catholics the world has seen since the days of Peter the Hermit.

Though commerce in the Province of Quebec is British, four-fifths of the people and the great bulk of the real estate of the country, including the possessions of the Church, are French, yet not a free thinker can be detected amongst them, even with a microscope. As the political affairs of Canada consist only of matters which in England are settled in bond and deed, and not in Parliament, the party warfare in separate from representative government consists, in this insular member of the Canadian Confederation, in a race between the parties for which the most successful in being thought the most devoted to Catholicity, and the most anxious for the approval of Pius IX, and the most hostile to Victor Emmanuel and to every form of error, it not being expedient to tell the peasantry that their beloved France has not retained those titles which French Protestants do not take away, and which, in lands, are still collected by law, though the writ for them runs in Queen Victoria's name. So in truth is the Canadian hatred of unbelief—the only form of dissent on the mainland of Europe—that the retention of the French language itself would be almost endangered by it, and this the average rural cultivator's only relief from boasting his personal piety would be lost to him. For that relaxation consists in the rather dirty trick of flinging mud over his opponent's shoulders at every opportunity, and no one will be admitted without a coat of mud.
