THE TRIP TO WINNIPEG.

WHAT PROFESSOR BONNEY SAYS OF MANITOBA AND NIAGARA FALLS.

Professor Bonney, Sec. tary of the British Association who has just returned from Winnipeg, relates an experience which may not be without interest to many of our readers, whose world is limited to the municipal boundary of the city. The journey to Winnipeg was extremely interesting, and he was profoundly impressed with the wonderful scenery through which he passed. The boundless prairie became monotonous after some time but reminded him of their own Cambridge fens, only that it lacked the willows, which were so prominent a feature of the former. The "Athabaska" was a good boat. Food and sleeping accommodation were all that could be desired. The scenery along Lake Superior was rather scrappy and unimpressive.

Winnipeg was the funniest place he had ever seen. The rudest structure which seemed to belong to a forgotten century, jostled against the brand new edifice, imposing in finished stone and cornice, and this obtained all through the city. Its growth was astonishing and it seemed to him like a boy who was fast outgrowing his old clothes. The streets were a fearful spectacle; but he understood the city was now going in for proper pavements. He could well understand however, that in a place like Winnipeg, where expansion was so rapid and prodigious, such minor matters might easily be lost sight of. The people of Winnipeg treated the visitors with the utmost cordiality, and had prepared for them a most successful exhibition of natural products. He was perfectly astounded at the size of cabbages and potatoes and carrots and beet roots, and he counted sixty nine stalks of wheat from a single seed.

The greatest treat he had during his journey was his visit to the Falls of Niagara. This colossal natural wonder produced such an impression upon him that he could not find words in which to adequately express what he felt. He would gladly cross the Atlantic to see it again. The enormous volume of water, falling in a solid and unbroken mass to the depths below, and producing a sea of blind foam—this constituted the grandeur of the spectacle. The quiet river, which seemed in no hurry to reach the fall, the apparent hesitation of the waters as if they shrank back in dread, and then their awful leap below—this was the sublimity of a spectacle which he should never forget. He returned home on Saturday with an experience greatly enlarged.

A PRUSSIAN MURDERER SUPPOSED TO BE IN AMERICA.

The Prussian police believe that America is harbouring at this moment a wholesale murderer whose many crimes have just been brought to light. His name is Sievert, and he was until recently the proprietor of a public house known as the Cruche hotel, at Ruzig, in Pomerania. He is a shoe maker by trade, and is a tall, muscular man, with a florid complexion and yellow hair. A few weeks ago Sievert sold out his hotel and left Pomerania. The new landlord took possession recently, and on searching the premises was horrified at finding six corpses in a cellar. The bodies were all of men, and all had evidently been murdered at different times. They have all been identified as the remains of travelling merchants who had been temporary lodgers in Sievert's tavern, and who had mysteriously disappeared.

THE NILE EXPEDITION.

DIFFICULTY AND SCARCITY OF TRANSPORT.—MOVEMENTS OF TROOPS.

Korosko, Aug. 21.—The difficulty and scarcity of transport have already become apparent. The gunboats have to do incessant work in towing men and stores, and as they have to get over the Second Cataract in a few days from this date, the transport will have to be carried on by sailing boats almost entirely between Assuan and Wady Halfa. As the country there is quite incapable of feeding an army by local resources, the stores must be all sent from the base of operations, Assuan; and the strain will be very great. As the left of the line of communication is very vulnerable at and near Korosko, where the roads de bouch from the Abou Hahmed Desert, the stream of traffic is very likely to be interrupted unless the greatest precautions are taken. And as the number of Nile boats is very limited on this part of the river, the movement of both troops and stores must be very long operating under the most favorable circumstances. Altogether, the movement of troops by the Nile route will be a very difficult military operation, if the expedition is to be on a large scale; and if on the other hand it is to be on a small scale, anything like the relief of Khartoum by means of it is out of the question. There is a hope that Gordon will be able to extricate himself by means of steamers, and will join the expedition at Berber or Dongola; but this hope cannot be depended upon.

The first English regiment which has moved forward to Wady Halfa from Assuan is the Royal Sussex, and it is to be followed at once by the 2d Battalion of the Duke of Cornwall's and the South Staffordshire regiments. This will constitute the English brigade; and there will also be an Egyptian brigade of Sir Evelyn Wood's army. Probably before the end of September these two brigades will be in Dongola; one English and two Egyptian battalions keeping the communications between Assuan and Wady Halfa.

The people along the route are quiet, and engaged in cultivating their ground. It one could believe an Egyptian in anything, the villagers are glad to see English troops; but they would doubtless equally welcome the Mahdi's forces if they arrived. The chief thing to note since the date of my last letter is the change in the situation caused by the force of character of one man, the Muftir of Dongola. Had he received three months ago the support which he has at last succeeded in extorting, the Berber disaster would probably have been avoided.—*London Times*.

SENATOR FERRIER was, at the last meeting of the board of Governors of McGill University, elected Chancellor of the University, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the late Hon Mr. Justice Day.

The village authorities of Peekskill, in the State of New York, have been taught that a man does not lose all his rights by getting drunk. A villain, who when in that condition, fell into a hole in the street and hurt himself, has been awarded damages by the Supreme Court of New York, the Chief Justice saying: "I don't think a man is guilty of contributory negligence if he gets drunk and falls into a hole." A man wants a good street to walk in.

The *Republique Francaise*, Paris, seems determined to fan the fading fire of animosity toward England. Not content with foretelling the speedy break up of the British Empire it declares the present generation of Englishmen to be the most stupid the "Mother of Nations" has yet produced. In ten years, it adds, they will acknowledge it themselves. The *Republique* dwells cheerfully on the dangerous position of the British merchant navy. Ten swift cruisers, it says, would destroy it and cut off the supplies of foreign coin. The moral is that England should make herself safe against continental attacks by an alliance with France and the construction of the Channel tunnel.

English papers are devoting much attention to the Nile Expedition for the relief of General Gordon and the Mahdi-beset City of Khartoum. The correspondents are writing long letters every day from Woolwich of the operations in the dockyards, preparing for the movement toward Egypt, and daily and hourly cause the Government's plans to be altered to suit the variety loving correspondents.

Although the final selection of regiments for the expedition will be made conjointly at Cairo by Lord Wolseley and Lieutenant General Stephenson, the general principle on which they will be selected will be that those corps which have been stationed in Egypt for some time and are acclimatised will go to Khartoum. The corps from the Mediterranean garrisons, including the Yorkshire and Berkshire Regiments, will, in all probability in concert with the Royal Irish and East Surrey Regiments, assist in garrisoning Lower Egypt. The two latter from India are considerably below regulation strength, and these with the Royal Scots (Lothian Regiment) from Barbadoes, are expected to be detailed at Cairo. Unless special circumstances intervene the following infantry corps will see active service: Duke of Connaught's Light Infantry, Colonel Richardson; Essex Regiment, Colonel White; Black Watch, Colonel Green; Gordon Highlanders, Colonel Hammill; Sussex Regiment, Colonel Vandelaar; Cameron Highlanders, Colonel Leith. Five of these served in the campaign of 1882. As illustrating the climatic difficulties of the expedition it may be mentioned that the Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry have since their arrival at Kench lost no fewer than four men in quick succession through sunstroke.

The Mackay Bennet cable steamer was launched at Glasgow. It has a capacity of 27,000 cubic feet for holding cables.

Miss Cusack, the Nun of Kenmare has started a conventual establishment at Nottingham for training domestic servants.

THE ARTILLERY CONTEST.

WHY THE BRITISH TEAM WAS BEATEN.

As will be seen by our telegraphic columns, the British Volunteer Artillerymen have been thoroughly defeated at Toronto by a Canadian team. Sergeant Major King, of the Field Battery, the only Montrealer among the eleven, was in town this morning in conversation with a *Witness* reporter he said the defeat of the British volunteers might be attributed partly to their having been going about sightseeing a little too much and partly to their being quite unaccustomed to the style of gun which they fired. However, as the Sergeant Major remarks, the Canadians had to fire on Wednesday, when a very strong wind was blowing, while the British were favored with excellent weather. As to being unaccustomed to the guns the Garrison Artillery's defeat by the British at Quebec may be put down to the same cause. To the Field Artillerymen belongs the honor of beating their British fellow soldiers both in firing and shifting the guns—*Witness*.

TEMPERANCE CRUSADE.

Voting for the Canada Temperance Act in the adjacent County of Stanstead has been fixed for the ninth of October, with Registrar Shurtliffe as returning officer. Temperance advocates are, we hear, busy canvassing the county in favor of the act.

MYSTERY UNSOLVED.

The continued absence of M. Bellevue at Point Lévis is still a mystery. The investigation before the Police Magistrate has so far resulted in nothing and his disappearance is still unaccounted for since he left his boarding house.

THE POST OFFICE INVESTIGATION.

The investigation into the charge against young Gray, of the Post Office, has about finished. There is, it seems, sufficient evidence to warrant his commitment for trial at the Queen's Bench.

THE PILGRIMS.

Pilgrimages to La Bonne Ste Anne have about ceased for the season. The total number of pilgrims who have visited the good Saints shrine this season is stated to be about eighty thousand.

WARSHIP SAILED.

H. M. S. *Garnet*, Capt. Henry Hand, which has been here for the past two weeks, left port shortly before ten o'clock this morning for Halifax.

QUEBEC'S FAIR DAUGHTERS.

The steepness of the streets is believed to contribute to the health, and therefore to the beauty, of the women in Quebec—*N. Y. Herald*.

FOR PASTURES NEW.

It is stated as more than probable that two of our largest lumber ship ping firms will next year remove their business to Three Rivers.

BREAD REDUCED.

The "loaf of life" dropped two cents on the staff today, to the great joy of the victims of the "National Policy."

MAIL STEAMER HOME.

The Allan mail ss *Peruvian*, from Quebec for Liverpool, arrived out yesterday.

The Vice Presidency has been offered to Mrs. Dr. Glemonce Lotzler, of New York, a lady of great force of character and ability and she has declined the proffered seat.

BRITISH ASSOCIATION.

The members of the British Association who visited Nova Scotia were met at Amherst Friday by the Halifax reception committee. The day was occupied by the scientists in visiting the coal mines at the Joggins, Maccan, Spring Hill and Parsboro and Sunday and Monday were spent at the latter place. On Tuesday they will go to Halifax via Cherie and Windsor and the following day visit one or two gold mines in the vicinity. On Thursday they will go to Pictou and the following day take the steamer for Rimouski, to embark in the Quebec mail steamship for England.

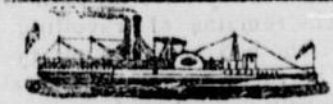
