NOVA SCOTIA.

HALIFAX, July 3.

This unexpected attack on the Belvidera convincing Captain Byron that war must have been declared, induced him to detain three American vessels. One of which the Belvidera brought in with her; but as Admiral Sawyer had received no other information than what arose from the action, he instantly ordered the vessel to be liberated; and she would have proceeded to sea, had the wind permitted. This, among many others, is a proof of the reluctance of Government to afford any pretext for hostility.

July 13.—We have seen a Gentleman who arrived here in the brig Undaunted, from Jamaica, and who sailed in the Fleet that Commodore Rodgers was left in pursuit of on Tuesday morning. This gentleman informs us, that the whole fleet, on their departure from Jamaica, consisted of 110 sail, including 5 or 6 American vessels. They were under convoy of the Thalia Frigate, of 38 guns, Capt. Vashon, the sloop of war Reindeer, of 18 guns, and another small sloop of 14 guns, whose name our informant does not recollect. About 20 of the fleet mounted 20 guns, and were manned with from 30 to 40 men each.

SAINT JOHN N. BRUNSWICK, July 13.

Yesterday arrived His Majesty's Ship Indian, Capt. Jane, from Halifax.

American Brig Mars, from Portugal bound to Portland, prize to the Indian.

Extract of a letter from a Gentleman in Halifax, to his friend in this City, dated the 6th inst.

"Our squadron sailed yesterday for the American coast, consisting of the Africa, 64 guns, (flag ship) Capt. Bastard; Shannon, 38 guns, Capt. Brooke; Aeolus, 32 guns, Capt. Townsend; Belvidera, 36 guns, Capt. Byron.

"If Commodore Rodgers chooses, he will soon have a more dignified opportunity of displaying the prowess of the American Navy, than he chose last year, when he attacked the Little Belk."

July 6.—The General Assembly of the Province is to meet for the Dispatch of Business, on Tuesday the 21st inst.

Extract from a letter dated St. Andrews 17 inst.

"Scott's ship Jarratt, inward bound, was taken 3 days ago—the crew have arrived here."

Since the sailing of His Majesty's sloop Indian, and Plumper brig, for St. Andrews, we understand, by a variety of reports, that they have taken, sunk and destroyed a number of American privateers.

We learn from Partridge Island, that the Spartan frigate, Capt. Brenton, from Halifax, is in the offing with two prizes in tow, we believe privateers.

HALIFAX, July 17.—At this morning, Am. ship Ononoko, from Lisbon for New-York, captured by H. M. S. Guerriere and Shannon—Left the squadron on Sunday last—The Guerriere joined the other ships on Thursday the 9th inst.

The barque William, was captured by Am. privateer Dolphin, and recaptured by the Indian sloop of war. The brig enterprise was sent in by H. M. brig Ringdove. The brig George, by the Guerriere. The ship Marquis Somerselous, by the Atlanta, The Start, from St. Ubes, was captured by H. M. brig Plumper, recaptured by Am. privateer Regulator, and taken again on Wednesday morning, by H. M. S. Spartan and sloop Juniper, off Cape Negro.

H. M. brig Ringdove, which arrived here on Saturday from the island of St. Thomas, fell in on her passage with H. M. sloop Bloodhound, with Mr. Shaw, King's Messenger, on board, for the United States.

Extract of a letter dated St. John, N. B. July 10.

"On Sunday last, the ship Eliza Farquhar, 1 m.m., was attacked off Bailey's Mistake by a privateer, which she beat off—Next day, she fell in with another privateer, who was also compelled to sheer off, after losing several of his crew; but two days after, was unaccountably captured by a ship of 20 guns, and carried into Machias."

A pilot boat sailed from New-York for England, on the 19th ult. with official intelligence of the Declaration of War by the United States.

The Spartan has sunk a privateer belonging to Salem; and put her crew on board the Colibri yesterday morning.

American Privateers.—Are swarming around our coast, and in the Bay of Fundy; hardly a day passes but we hear of captures made by them: a sloop from hence to Liverpool, N. S. was taken on Friday last, near Port Medway—A sloop from hence, with arms and ammunition for Country Harbour, was taken in that harbour on Wednesday last, as also a Liverpool sloop, returning from the Labrador. Two schooners from Lunenburg, were captured last week, considerable sums of money taken out of them, and afterwards let go—Indeed so numerous are the privateers around the coast, that we consider it very imprudent for any vessels to sail from this port unless under convoy.

Since writing the above, we have been informed of the capture of the sloop, Capt. Bouchie, from hence bound to Quebec, laden with Brandy; and of a sloop from Gaspe, bound to this place—the latter was taken yesterday off Jodere.

H. M. S. Maidstone, Captain Burdett, arrived here on Friday last, from Plymouth, with Despatches; and H. M. Brig Colibri, Captain Thompson from New-York.

Passengers in the Colibri—His Majesty's late Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary to the United States of America, AUGUSTUS J. FOSTER, Esq. and Consul-General for the Eastern States THOMAS BARCLAY, Esq.

The Maidstone frigate, left Plymouth June 17—Despatches, in cypher, from the Government of the United States to that of France had, been intercepted.—We understand they informed of the time when War was to be declared against Great Britain; and subsequent sailing of the American squadron to a place of rendezvous of one from France, when they were to act together on a previously digested plan of operations—the Government of Great-Britain becoming consequently aware of the contemplated measures of the United States had, it is said, ordered 10 sail of the line, and 10 frigates, to be immediately prepared for service in North-America.

The Acacia, Nymph and Loire frigates, were under sailing orders, supposed for this place.

It was confidently reported, that the enemy had been compelled to raise the siege of Cadix.

Saturday arrived, the Am. Brig Mary, from Algiers and Gibraltar, 32 days out, bound to Boston, prize to H. M. S. Spartan; by her we learn, that a French line-of-battle ship has been captured in the Mediterranean, by H. M. S. Euryalus, and another frigate; the Euryalus, it is said, had 200 men killed and wounded—among whom were nearly all the officers—the ship was bound to Toulon.

Off Cape Sable, on Wednesday last, the Colibri fell in with H. M. S. Spartan, and received on board the crew of an American privateer, which the Spartan had sunk the day before.

AMERICAN PAPERS.

St. CLARKSWILLE, (OHIO) July 4.

The Volunteers and the Indians.—Dr. James Reynolds, Surgeon's Mate in Col. Cass' regiment, under date of June 28, at Camp Necessity, 49 miles within the Indian territory, writes as follows:

"Gen. Lucas, who was dispatched some time since, for the purpose of spying, arrived last evening, and informs, that 500 Indians of the Wyandot tribe were embodied on the river Huron, with 300 Potawatamies, who were drawing rations of the British. We have no doubt but this information is correct, and if so, we will be attacked in a few days. Our camp was fortified last night by falling trees all around. To-day a soldier of the 4th (Boyd's) regiment was fired on by an Indian some distance from the Camp.—Three Indians have been shot by our soldiers.—On the 22d, an alarm was given about midnight. The army was formed immediately, and remained one hour in readiness. When dismissed, the soldiers were much out of humour in not having a fight. To-day the men are building a blockhouse. A company of men will be left to guard it. Tomorrow morning the army will march."

ALBANY, July 28.

Gen. DEARBORN arrived in this city yesterday from Boston. Major-General VAN RENSSLAER has left Sacket's Harbor, and has his head-quarters at present at Ogdensburg.

Major-General HALL, we understand, commands at Niagara. We have nothing new from the frontiers—but all accounts agree in this, that there is no immediate appearance of offensive war.

The Military, as well as the inhabitants on both sides of the lines, as far as example will go, appear to be extremely anxious to ameliorate the horrors of war, by discountenancing and preventing all predatory excursions.—[Alb. Gazette.]

BUFFALO July 14.

Posture of Affairs on the Lakes.

Gen. Brock, President of the Parliament of U. Canada, acting Governor of the Province, and commander in chief of His Majesty's forces in U. Canada, is at present at Newark, superintending the various defences on the river. He is stated to be an able and experienced officer, with undoubted courage. He came from Little York, soon after hearing the declaration of War, and it was believed, with a serious intention of attacking Fort Niagara—but contrary to what has been reported, he made no demand of surrender.

Expecting a descent from the American army, the Canadians have, for ten days past, been removing their families and effects from the river into the interior. At Newark, Queenston, and other villages on the river, there are no inhabitants, except a few civil officers and soldiers. It is even said, that an immense quantity of specie, plate, &c. from various parts of the province, have been boxed up and destined for Quebec.

The British are understood to have about 6 or 700 regular troops stationed between the lakes, and Fort George to Fort Erie. These men are generally those who have seen service in various parts, of the world. The militia of the province are ordered out en masse. Great discontent prevails in consequence of this requisition: there being no help to gather in the crops, the clamors of the people are but little short of open rebellion.

There is no civil authority in Canada—no magistrates will act—the martial code has usurped the civil law. Many young tradesmen in Canada, from the States, will be ruined. They are required to take up arms or leave the country.

They cannot collect their debts, nor bring away their property—but many have come away and left their all in jeopardy.

The British are said to have more than 100 pieces of flying, field, and garrison artillery, in the different defences on the Niagara river Fort Erie has been strengthened considerably—a redoubt of many rods in length was thrown up on Wednesday and Thursday last, on the hill directly opposite the dwelling house of Gen. Peter B. Porter at Lower Black Rock. There is also a small battery on a point below Chippawa, mounted with two pieces of heavy artillery, calculated to play upon the storehouse and mills of Schlosser.

Below the Falls there is a small stone battery near the bank of the river. On Thursday evening last, a rifleman deserted from the other side, and crossed the river immediately below the Falls on a pine log—he stated that but a little way from the battery up the river, a field piece was stationed in the bushes, in order to fire into Schlosser village. The woolen factory of Mr. John W. Stoughton (consisting of two carding machines, and fulling and dressing machinery) is very much exposed. On the hill about half a mile from the stone battery, are placed two 18 pounders. The ladders on both sides of the river are taken up.

On the hill above Queenston, there is a small defence on very commanding ground. Below Queenston, and nearly opposite the seat of Benjamin Barton, Esq. there is a defence work of several rods in length. Opposite Youngstown, there is another redoubt thrown up. Fort George, at Newark, nearly opposite the American garrison is considered the strongest and most important fortress in Upper Canada. On Wednesday morning last, during a thick fog, four British soldiers, standing as sentinels on the river near Fort George, swam over to the American shore. Three of them brought their arms.

It is stated by gentlemen of intelligence, at Lewistown, that the Government of Canada have in their employment, under pay, about 250 Indians, armed complete—a part of them are mounted.

Brigadier Gen. Wadsworth, of Genesee, commands our troops on the frontiers—His Head-quarters are at Lewistown. It is impossible to state the precise number of troops under his command; but, from what we can learn, there are, in regular troops, volunteers and detached militia, above 4000 stationed at Black Rock, Fort Niagara, &c. They are in excellent health and want employment.

A Mr. Henry McBridge was shot at Youngstown, by a sentinel, on the evening of the 9th inst. Mr. McBridge was hailed three times, but giving no answer, was shot through the heart and expired instantly.

FROM BOSTON, July 29th.

While we express our pleasure at the safety of the Constitution, we regret to state that the U. S. brig Nautilus, 12 guns, Capt. Crane, (16 hours from New-York, on a cruise) was captured the 16th inst. by the British frigate Shannon, after a hard chase of six hours, during which the Nautilus was obliged to start her water, and throw over all her lee guns. She was ordered to Halifax, with Lt. Crane on board; the remainder of the officers and crew (106 in number) were sent on board the Africa. The officers were treated with the greatest respect. Several of the Nautilus' crew entered on board the Shannon, acknowledging themselves British subjects, (except one, named Jesse Bates, seaman, an American).

PRIZES.—The whole of the prizes sent into Salem, since the war began, will not probably bring more than 30 or 40,000 dollars. The single cargo of the Marquis Somerselous, of Salem, carried into Halifax by the British, was worth upwards of 300,000 dollars, and the duties to government would have been nearly 100,000 dols. Thus far the balance is vastly against us.—Salem Gaz.

UPPER-CANADA.

PROCLAMATION.

The unprovoked declaration of War, by the United States of America, against the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and its dependencies, has been followed by the actual invasion of this Province, in a remote frontier of the Western District, by a detachment of the armed force of the United States. The officer commanding that detachment, has thought proper to invite His Majesty's Subjects not merely to a quiet and unresisting submission, but insults them with a call to seek voluntarily the protection of his Government.—Without condescending to repeat the illiberal epithets bestowed in this appeal of the American Commander to the people of Upper Canada, on the administration of his Majesty, every inhabitant of the Province is desired to seek the confutation of such indecent slander, in the review of his own particular circumstances: where is the Canadian subject who can truly affirm to himself that he has been injured by the Government in his person, his liberty or his property? Where is to be found, in any part of the world, a growth so rapid in wealth and prosperity, as this Colony exhibits?—Settled not thirty years, by a band of Veterans, exiled from their former possessions on account of their loyalty, not a descendant of these brave people is to be found, who under the fostering liberality of their Sovereign, has not acquired a property and means of enjoyment superior to what were possessed by their ancestors. This unequalled prosperity could not have been attained by the utmost liberality of the Government, or the persevering industry of the people, had not the maritime power of the mother country secured to its colonists a safe access to every market where the produce of their labor was in demand.

The unavoidable and immediate consequence of a separation from Great Britain, must be the loss of this inestimable advantage; and what is offered you in exchange? to become a territory of the United States, and share with them that exclusion from the ocean which the policy of their present government enforces—you are not even flattered with a participation of their boasted independence, and it is but too obvious, that once exchanged from the powerful protection of the United Kingdom, you must be re-annexed to the dominion of France, from which the Provinces of Canada were wrested by the arms of Great Britain, at a vast expense of blood and treasure, from no other motive but to relieve her ungrateful children from the oppression of a cruel neighbor: this restitution of Canada to the Empire of France, was the stipulated reward for the aid afforded to the revolted Colonies, now the United States: the debt is still due, and there can be no doubt but the pledge has been renewed as a consideration for commercial advantages, or rather for an expected relaxation in the tyranny of France over the commercial world.—Are you prepared, inhabitants of U. Canada, to become willing subjects, or rather slaves, to the Despot who rules the nations of Europe with a rod of iron?—if not, arise in a body, ex-

ert your energies, co-operate cordially with the King's regular forces, to repel the invader, and do not give cause to your children, when groaning under the oppression of a foreign master, to reproach you with having too easily parted with the richest inheritance of this Earth,—a participation in the name, character and freedom of Britons.

The same spirit of justice, which will make every reasonable allowance for the unsuccessful efforts of zeal and loyalty, will not fail to punish the defalcation of principle: every Canadian freeholder, is by deliberate choice bound by the most solemn oaths to defend the Monarchy as well as his own property; to shrink from that engagement is a treason not to be forgiven: let no man suppose that if in this unexpected struggle, His Majesty's arms should be compelled to yield to an overwhelming force, that the Province will be eventually abandoned; the endeared relation of its first settlers, the intrinsic value of its commerce, and the pretensions of its powerful rival to repossess the Canadas, are pledges that no peace will be established between the United States and Great Britain and Ireland, of which the restoration of these Provinces does not make the most prominent condition.

Be not dismayed at the unjustifiable threat of the commander of the enemies forces, to refuse quarter should an Indian appear in the ranks.—The brave bands of natives which inhabit this Colony, were, like his Majesty's subjects, punished for their zeal and fidelity by the loss of their possessions in the late colonies, and rewarded by his Majesty with lands of superior value in this Province: the faith of the British government has never yet been violated, they feel that the soil they inherit is to them and their posterity protected from the base arts so frequently devised to over reach their simplicity. By what new principle are they to be prevented from defending their property? If their warfare from being different from that of the white people is more terrific to the enemy, let him retrace his steps—they seek him not—and cannot expect to find women and children in an invading army; but they are men, and have equal rights with all other men to defend themselves and their property when invaded, more especially when they find in the enemies camp a ferocious and mortal foe using the same warfare which the American Commander affects to reprobate.

This inconsistent and unjustifiable threat of refusing quarter for such a cause as being found in arms with a brother sufferer in defence of invaded rights, must be exercised with the certain assurance of retaliation, not only in the limited operations of war in this part of the King's Dominions but in every quarter of the Globe, for the national character of Britain is not less distinguished for humanity than strict retributive justice, which will consider the execution of this inhuman threat as deliberate murder, for which every subject of the offending power must make expiation.

MONTREAL, Tuesday Morning August 4.

The following are copies of Letters received from Upper-Canada, containing the account of the capture of Fort Michilimackinac, and the unsuccessful attempts of the American Governor Hull at the River Canard.

MAKINAC, 18th July, 1812.

DEAR SIR,

I am happy to have it in my power to announce to you, that Fort Makinac capitulated to us on the 17th inst. at 11 o'clock A. M.—Captain Roberts at our head, with part of the 10th R. V. Battalion—Mr. Crawford had the command of the Canadians, which consisted of about 200 men; Mr. Dickson 113 Seniors Followains and Winnehegoes; myself about 230 men, Attawas and Chippewas, part of Attawas of L'Arbre Croche, had not arrived. It was a fortunate circumstance that the Fort capitulated without firing a single gun, for had they done so, I firmly believe not a soul of them would have been saved. My Son, Charles Langlade, Augustin Nolin, and Michel Cadotte, jun. have rendered me great service in keeping the Indians in order, and executing from time to time such commands as were delivered to me by the Commanding Officer. I never saw so determined a set of people as the Chippewas and Attawas were. Since the capitulation, they have not drank a single drop of liquor, nor even killed a fowl belonging to any person, (a thing never known before) for they generally destroy every thing they meet with.

PROVINCIAL PARLIAMENT

OF

LOWER-CANADA.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL, Saturday, August 1.

This day, at two o'clock, His Excellency the GOVERNOR in CHIEF came down in the usual State, to the Legislative Council Chamber, and being seated on the Throne, the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod was sent to command the presence of the Assembly, which being come up, the Honorable Speaker of the Assembly said:

May it please your Excellency,

His Majesty's faithful Subjects the Representatives of the Province of Lower Canada have passed a Bill, intitled, "An Act to facilitate the circulation of Army Bills."

Their loyalty, and the happiness of this Province in being connected with and powerfully protected by the British Nation, are the basis of their Constitution, and the just grounds which gave rise to the formation of the Militia and the firm determination to defend this country against the unexpected and unjust war that the United States of America have recently declared; they are therefore under the greatest obligation to your Excellency for having confidently communicated to them his wise precautions on the means to ameliorate and insure, for several years, the punctual payment of the Army, by the circulation of Bills, the reimbursement whereof is guaranteed in England. To give them greater credit, this bill limits the sum necessary, and moreover provides for the interest, the advantages accruing therefrom, and even for the entire payment of the principal in specie in this Province, which has become expressly bound for the same at a fixed period, to any person whatever who from the state of his private affairs would prefer such payment.

In full confidence that under the present and any unforeseen circumstances your Excellency is vested with all necessary authority, the Representatives of this Province and their constituents rely on the wisdom already experienced of your Administration, and in the name of the Commons of Lower-

Canada, I have the honor to present this Bill to your Excellency, humbly requesting thereto His Majesty's Royal Assent.

To which Bill, His Excellency was pleased to signify the Royal Assent in the following words: "In His Majesty's name, I thank his loyal subjects, accept their benevolence, and assent to this Bill."

His Excellency was then pleased to address both Houses in the following SPEECH:

Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, and

Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

I cannot close this Session without assuring you that I have observed with great satisfaction, the assiduity and perseverance with which you have applied yourselves to the important business which, when I first met you, I recommended to your immediate consideration; and I hope and trust that the law which has been the result of your deliberation, will be found to answer the salutary end for which it is intended.

Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

I return you my hearty thanks for the supply you have granted me with so much cheerfulness to enable me to meet the exigencies of the times.

Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, and

Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

I most earnestly entreat you to use, in your several stations, your utmost endeavours to assist me in promoting the happiness of H. M.'s Subjects in this Province, by encouraging amongst them a spirit of subordination and of active loyalty, as the most effectual means of insuring the continuance of those blessings which the Dispenser of all Good hath so bountifully bestowed upon them.

After which, the Honorable Speaker of the Legislative Council declared the Provincial Parliament to be prorogued to Tuesday, the 15th September next.

A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE PREVOST.

GEORGE THE THIRD, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland King, Defender of the Faith, and so forth: To all our loving Subjects and to all others whom these presents may concern, Greeting. Whereas by our Royal Proclamation bearing date at our Castle of Saint Lewis, in our City of Quebec, in our Province of Lower Canada, the Thirtieth day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twelve, we did see fit, by and with the advice of our Executive Council of our said Province, to order, and we did there by order that an Embargo should be thenceforth laid on all ships and Vessels, and on all Goods, Wares, Monies, Merchandise and Commodities in and within our said Province of Lower Canada, and we did thereby further strictly prohibit and forbid the sailing or departure of any Ship or Ships, Vessel or Vessels, and the exportation of any Goods, Wares, Monies, Merchandise and Commodities whatsoever, from any port or place in and within our said Province, to any Place, Country, Kingdom, Dominion or Territory whatsoever, save and except such Ships and Vessels as were at that time loaded and had already cleared out from the Custom House, and by our said Royal Proclamation we did further order, that the said Embargo should continue and remain from the said Thirtieth day of June last, until this Sixteenth day of the Month of July now last past: And whereas by our second Royal Proclamation bearing date at our said Castle of St. Lewis, in our said City of Quebec, in our said Province of Lower Canada, upon the said Sixteenth day of July, in the present year of our Lord, We deemed it necessary and highly expedient for the interest of our Empire, and for the welfare of our loving Subjects in this our said Province of Lower Canada that the said Embargo should be continued and be in force for a longer period than the said Sixteenth day of July; did by and with the advice of our Executive Council of our said Province, further order that the said Embargo should be continued, and the same was thereby continued, from the said Sixteenth day of July last, until this fifth day of August, on all Wheat and Flour of any kind, Biscuit, Salted Pork and Beef, Arms and Ammunition of all kinds, Gun Powder, Saltpetre, Sulphur, Flints, and all Military Stores, Bridle Bits, Stirrup Irons, Buckles, and every description of Furniture and Trimmings applicable to Harness of any kind, or to the mounting of Cavalry, Blankets of all qualities and kinds, Swanskins, Meltons, Buzes, Duffels, Coatings Flannels, Carpeting and all Woollen Cloths of any kind, of which the original cost does not exceed ten shillings sterling per yard, Scalping Knives, Daggers, and Indian Bayonets or Lances, of every kind, Bullion and Specie of every description. And also whereas the causes and considerations inducing our said Royal Proclamation of the Sixteenth day of July still existing, we have therefore thought fit, by and with the advice of our said Executive Council to issue this our Royal Proclamation, and to order, and we do hereby order, that the said Embargo be, and the same is hereby continued on all the said articles enumerated in our said Royal Proclamation of the sixteenth day of July last: And we do hereby strictly prohibit and forbid the sailing or departure of any ship or ships, vessel or vessels, having on board wheat and flour of any kind, biscuit, salted pork and beef, arms and ammunition of any kind, gunpowder, saltpetre, sulphur, flints, and military stores, bridle bits, stirrup irons, buckles, and every description of furniture and trimmings applicable to harness of any kind, or to the mounting of cavalry, blankets of all qualities and kinds, swanskins, moltons, buizes, duffels, coatings, flannels, carpeting and all woollen cloths of any kind, of which the original cost does not exceed ten shillings sterling per yard, scaling knives, daggers, and Indian bayonets or lances of any kind, bullion and specie of any description, or any other articles contained in our said Royal Proclamation of the Sixteenth day of July, from any port or place in and within our said Province of Lower Canada, to any place, country, kingdom, dominion or territory whatsoever. And it is our will and pleasure, and we do hereby order that the said Embargo do continue and remain from the date of these presents, until the Twenty-fifth day of this present month of August, of all which our loving subjects and all others concerned, are to take due notice and govern themselves accordingly, by the tenor of these presents, firmly enjoining and commanding them, and all and every our officers and ministers whatsoever, to be in all things and to the utmost of their power, aiding and assisting in the due execution of this our royal proclamation. Provided always that nothing herein contained shall extend to prevent the exportation of such quantities of flour, pease and biscuit, as shall be required for the support of His Majesty's Navy and Army in the Province of Nova Scotia, and the Islands of Newfoundland and Bermuda, and which shall be exported for that purpose under the Licence of His Excellency the Governor in Chief, nor to prevent the exportation of coarse biscuit, commonly called Newfoundland Bread, certified to be such by the Inspector of Flour at the time of shipment, and any quantity of flour not exceeding four thousand barrels, which shall be exported for that purpose under the Licence of His Excellency the Governor in Chief, first had and obtained to the Island of Newfoundland, the shippers giving bond for the landing such flour and biscuit in the Island of Newfoundland. In testimony whereof we have caused these our letters to be made Public and the Great Seal of our said Province of Lower Canada to be thereunto affixed: WITNESS our right trusty and well beloved Sir GEORGE PREVOST, Baronet, Captain General and Governor in Chief in and over the Provinces of Lower Canada, Upper Canada, Nova Scotia, & New Brunswick and their several Dependencies, Vice Admiral of the same, &c. &c. at our Castle of Saint Lewis, in our City of Quebec, in our said Province, the Fifth day of August, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twelve, and of our Reign the twenty-second.
