THE SESSION.

The last session of the present Parliament of the Province of Quebec will be opened in this city this afternoon by His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor, Sir ADOLPHE CHAPLEAU, who will come down to the Parliament House in state at 3 o'clock, and will read the Speech from the Throne, intimating the reasons for which it has pleased him to summon the Legislature for the despatch of business. Our readers will regret to learn that Sir ADOLPHE is not in very good health, but Dr. GROSSEIN is taking all possible precautions with his distinguished patient, and because of the inclemency of the weather and of a desire to save himself for to-day, His Honor did not venture out from Spencer Wood yesterday at all. Some of the Opposition newspapers are talking as if the session which opens this afternoon will be a long one. It is to be hoped, in the interests of economy, that this does not presage an Opposition policy of Parliamentary obstruction, though nobody who understands the general principles that operate with professional politicians under our system of Government by party, will be surprised if the Hon. Mr. MARCHEMONT and his friends put forth every effort during the next few weeks towards the creation of Opposition stock-in-trade for the general elections. If the session is not a short one and the expenditure for legislation comes higher than it should come, it will certainly not be the fault of the Government, which has all its proposed measures ready to submit to the House, as well as the departmental reports and public accounts for the last fiscal year, and the estimates of expenditure for the coming year. This is a great improvement over past sessions and ought to materially reduce the length of the present one. But while it should be short, the session which opens to-day will be by no means unimportant. In fact in many respects it promises to be one of the most notable of recent years. A new Government will meet the Legislature to-day and a new Premier will lead the House of Assembly. The Hon. E. J. FLYNN needs no introduction to the readers of the CHRONICLE. This paper has pointed to the honorable member for Gaspé, for years past, as a coming leader in Provincial affairs. Mr. FLYNN possesses all the attributes of a distinguished and successful general in the political arena. His stern sense of duty, his high moral character and his strict integrity are no less remarkable than his intellectual ability and his admirable capacity for hard and conscientious work. Some of his colleagues have sat with him in previous Administrations and all are his perfectly loyal and patriotic colleagues. The Treasurer is a perfectly new Minister. Though a member of the new Cabinet, the Hon. Mr. ATWATER has never as yet occupied a seat in the Legislature. But as in the case of the new Premier, great things are expected of his Treasurer. Mr. ATWATER not only possesses the thorough confidence of the commercial community, but his election by acclamation proved that he enjoys also that of one of the leading divisions of the commercial metropolis. During his short residence in Quebec the hon. gentleman has become exceedingly popular here. In selecting for Treasurer a gentleman enjoying to so considerable an extent the confidence of the English-speaking and financial interests of the Province as the Hon. Mr. ATWATER does, Premier FLYNN paid a compliment to those interests which should not soon be forgotten. The CHRONICLE is glad, however, to take this opportunity of repudiating and condemning the frank-

Speech submitted to the House. It will scarcely be pretended that the CHRONICLE is indiscreet if it briefly refers to one of the most important topics likely to be mentioned in the Speech from the Throne, concerning which nothing has so far been published. This is the proposed conversion of the Provincial debt. It need not now be any longer a secret that the Government has been quietly studying this important question for some time past. As negotiations on the subject are believed to be very well advanced, it should not surprise anybody if Sir ADOLPHE CHAPLEAU informs the Legislature that a law to authorize this conversion will be placed before it. It will, indeed, be something for the Government to be proud of if it can make an arrangement for reducing the annual charges for the public debt which at present weigh so heavily about the neck of the Province. At the same time, the Government will urge its just claims upon the Federal authorities for an increase in the Federal subsidy to this Province. The Ministers have been corresponding with the authorities at Ottawa on the subject and it is only reasonable that this correspondence should be placed before the House. In another important matter Mr. FLYNN has achieved a splendid success at Ottawa. He has secured the recognition by the Dominion Government of the right of this Province to a very large amount of valuable northern territory. So it will be seen at a glance that there is no lack of material for a very pretty and very interesting and effective little speech this afternoon by His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor, and though we expect much we know very well that we shall not be disappointed.

Notes and News.

Personal Intelligence. Mr. Martineau, M.P.E., arrived in town yesterday. Captain Wilberforce, A.D.C., is expected here shortly. D. D. O'Meara, Esq., Inspector of Customs, was in Ottawa on Saturday. The Rev. R. W. Fothergill, the new rector of Drummondville, is in town. Mrs. Robert Hamilton has returned to town from Ottawa, where she has been visiting her daughter, Mrs. Irwin. Admiral Sir Frederick Wm. Richards, Lord of the Admiralty, died suddenly yesterday in a hotel at Bath. He was 63 years of age. The Hon. Messrs. Rolland and Berthiaume, the new Legislative Councillors, who have returned to Montreal, are expected here again to-morrow to take the oath of office. A marriage has been arranged, and will take place in November at Equivalents, B.C., between Lieutenant the Hon. Victor Stanley, R.N., second son of the Earl and Countess of Derby, and Annie, second daughter of the Hon. C. E. Pooley, Q.C., and Mrs. Pooley. By the birth of a son and heir to Lord Stamford, the title of Lord Grey of Groby comes into existence after sixty years' interregnum. Lord Grey of Groby, the eldest son of the sixth earl, was created a peer in 1832, but died three years after. Mr. David Erskine, of His Excellency's staff, has been called home to Scotland owing to the very serious illness of his father, in the case of whose death he will not return to Canada. Their Excellencies' staff has undergone many changes since they first came to Canada and this winter will see an almost entirely new staff. Capt. Wilberforce is at present in Ottawa, where he is waiting for the season sets in. Captain Urquhart is not to return, as he has entered the staff college for a three years' course. Mr. Manro Ferguson is in New York and Mr. Erskine, as already mentioned, is in Scotland for an indefinite period. Her Excellency's private secretary, Miss Wilson, has been in England for some months and it is currently reported that she also has severed her connection with Government House, Ottawa. If it be true there will be much regret felt here, for Miss Wilson, though a very busy woman, had always time to be pleasant and managed to make for herself a number of sincere friends.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

A compliment has been paid to one of the new Legislative Councillors,—the Hon. J. D. ROLLAND,—upon which we heartily congratulate him, in his election by acclamation as President of the Dominion Commercial Travellers Association.

Prominent Liberal officers of the militia as well as Conservatives are up in arms at the recent militia orders from Ottawa, ante-dating so many brevet commissions. Acting upon the open invitation extended to all ranks of the service by the Minister of Militia when dined here some time ago, a number of our local militiamen have already met to complain of the orders from headquarters and are going to see the Minister about it as soon as opportunity offers.

Commendable enough as it is on the part of the Hon. Mr. LAURIER to refuse the use of private cars, saying that a seat in a public car is good enough for him, the tremendous stress now being laid upon the fact by Ministerial newspapers all over the country is not only a very left-handed compliment for the luxurious Mr. TARTE and his suite, but cannot fail to recall the frightful extravagance at the cost of the Province indulged in, not only by the late Mr. MERCIER, but by those friends of his who are still seeking to gratify the same old tastes again.

The complaint is made and made from Liberal sources too, that since the advent to power of the present Administration at Ottawa, there is an evident attempt on the part of the postal authorities to boycott the use of the English language in advertising for tenders for conveying mails, etc. After what has recently occurred in the Quebec Harbor Commission, where similar undue favoritism on the part of the majority of Mr. LAURIER's nominees has resulted in the resignation of some of the Government's own English-speaking supporters, it is unfortunately not difficult to credit the truth of the complaint, and the more so that it is a fact patent to everybody, and loudly complained of in commercial circles in the Lower Town and elsewhere, that the mail time table that used to appear in the columns of the CHRONICLE for the accommodation of business men and others, is not now printed in any of the English-speaking papers in Quebec.
