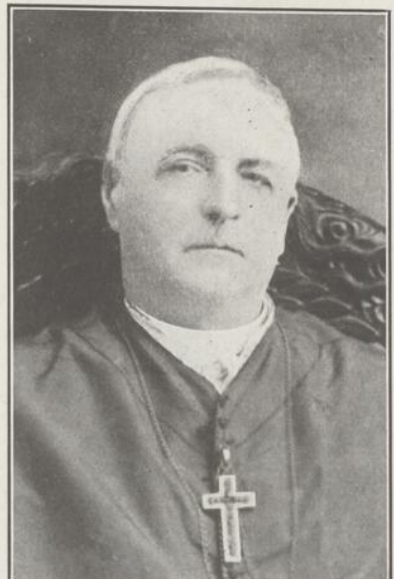

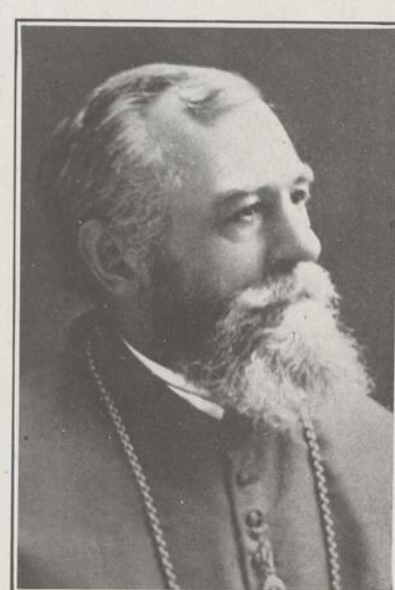

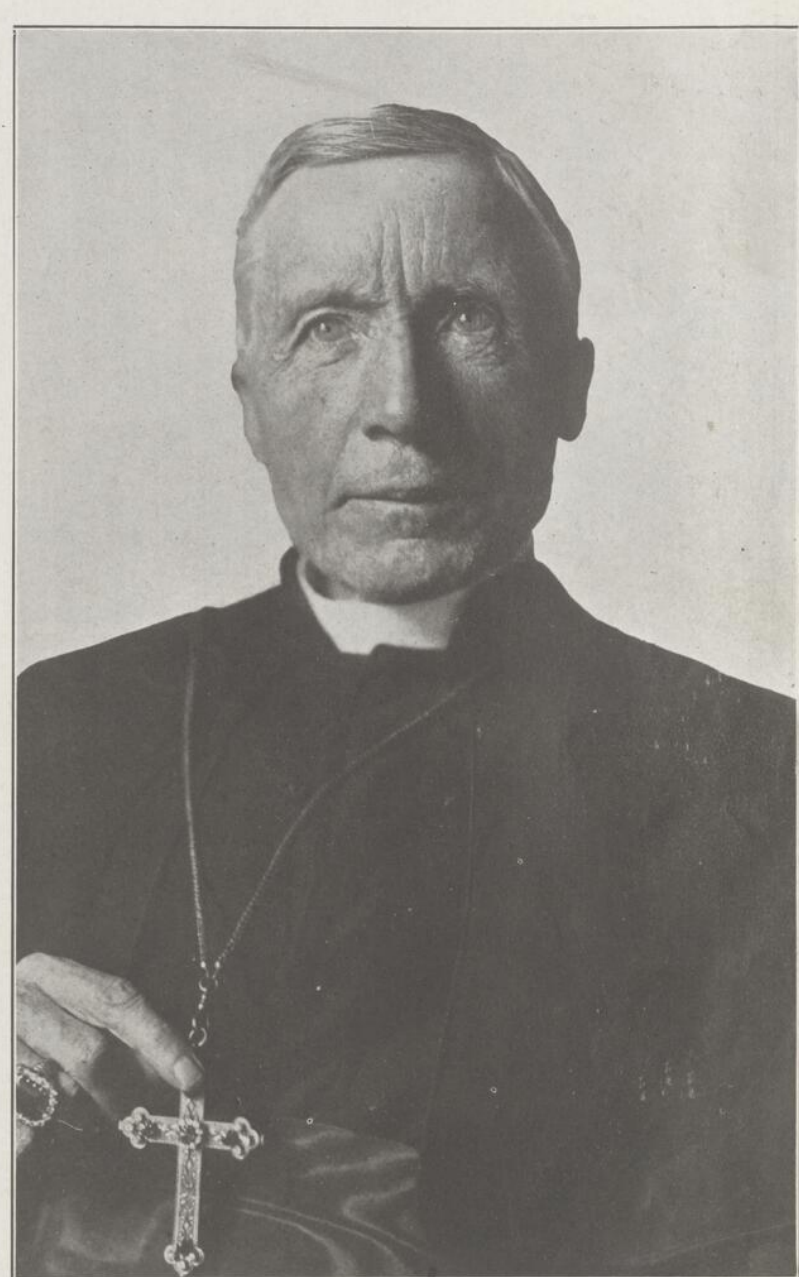

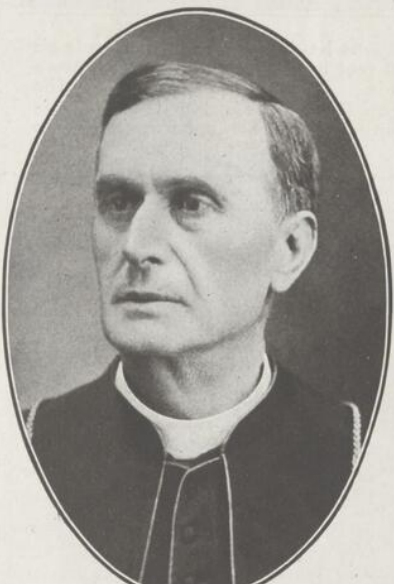

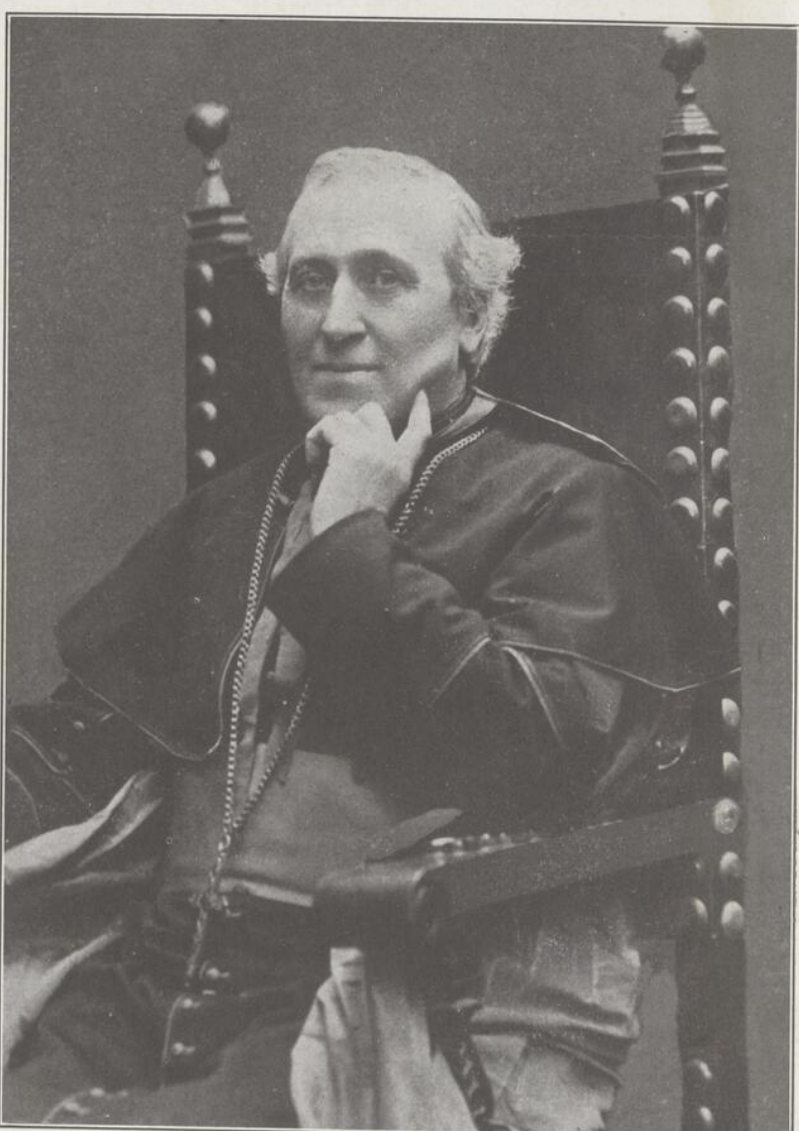

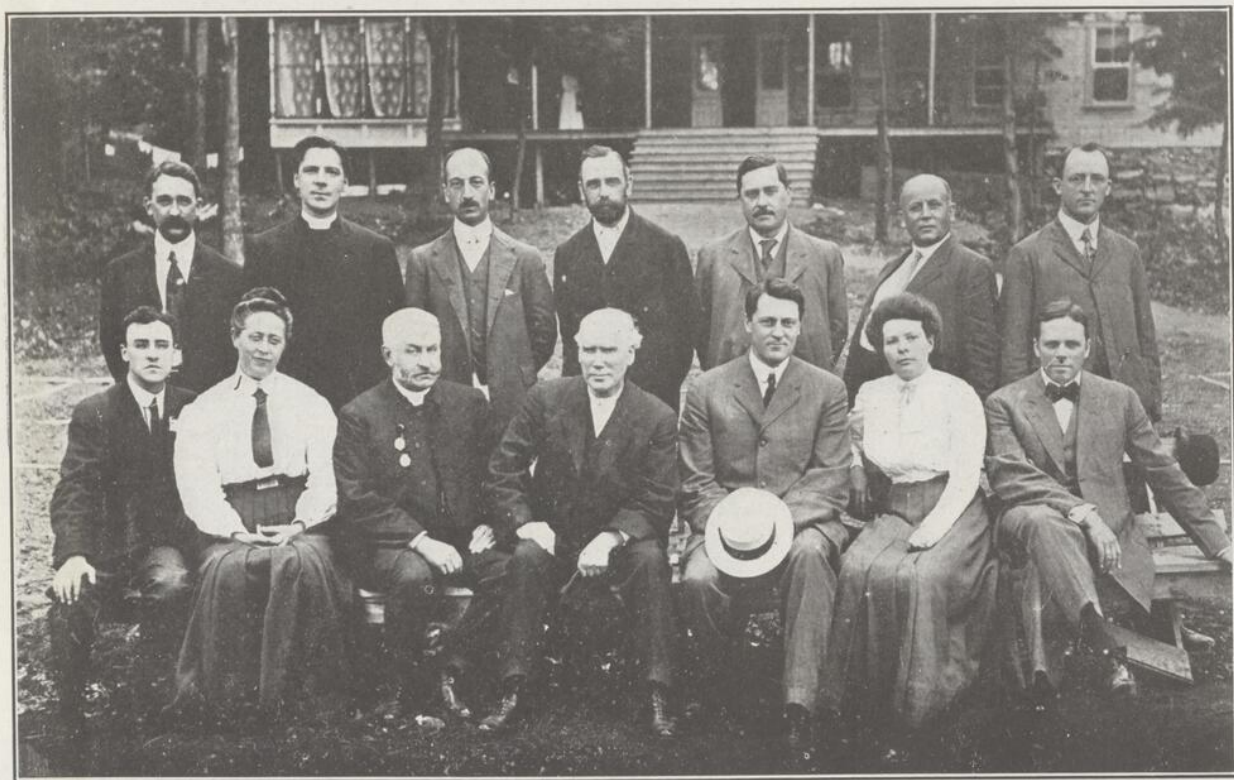
ON this page The Standard publishes the photos of the most distinguished of the prelates who will attend the Eucharistic Congress to be held in this city from Sept. 6 to 11. In all, about 100 cardinals, archbishops and bishops will be present, representing all parts of the United States and Canada, England, Ireland, France, Italy, Germany, Belgium, Switzerland, South Africa, and

Australasia. The most prominent delegate, of course, will be the representative of the Pope, namely: His Excellency, Vincenzo, Cardinal Vanutelli. His Excellency will sail for Canada on Friday of next week. His Grace, Archbishop Bourne, of Westminster, Eng., who is to celebrate the midnight mass at the Church of Notre Dame on Sept. 8, reached Quebec this week. Next week will see most of the delegates en route to Montreal.

Notre Dame, Paris, Where Napoleon Was Crowned, and Where the Eucharistic Congress of 1888 Was Held



THE FIFTEENTH PLATE IN THE STANDARD'S SERIES OF GREAT CATHEDRAL PICTURES—An exterior view of the Cathedral of Notre Dame, Paris, where the Eucharistic Congress of 1888 was held. This church stands on a site successively occupied by a Pagan temple and a Christian basilica of the time of the Merovingian Kings. The main building, begun in the 12th century, is 400 feet long, 150 feet wide and 110 feet high. The height of the two towers is 218 feet, and of the fleche, at the juncture of nave and choir and transepts, 300 feet. The interior consists of a principal and two flanking naves, which are continued round the choir. During the Revolution the church was mutilated in order to destroy what were erroneously supposed to be emblems of royalty. In 1793, after childish and repulsive mockeries of the ceremonies of the Roman Catholic Church, it was converted into a "Temple of Reason," wherein the French goddess of that name was acclaimed and worshiped. In 1804 Napoleon I., then at the zenith of his power, resolved to impress Europe by an imposing ceremony—that of his coronation—in Notre Dame; and there it was that he, in the presence of the Pope—who never before had crossed the Alps at the bidding of King or Emperor,—rudely placed the crown upon his own head.

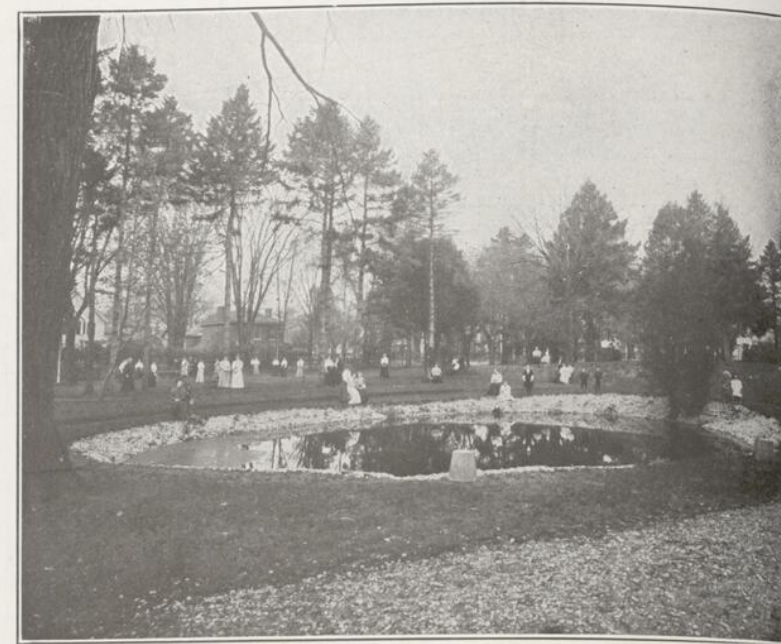

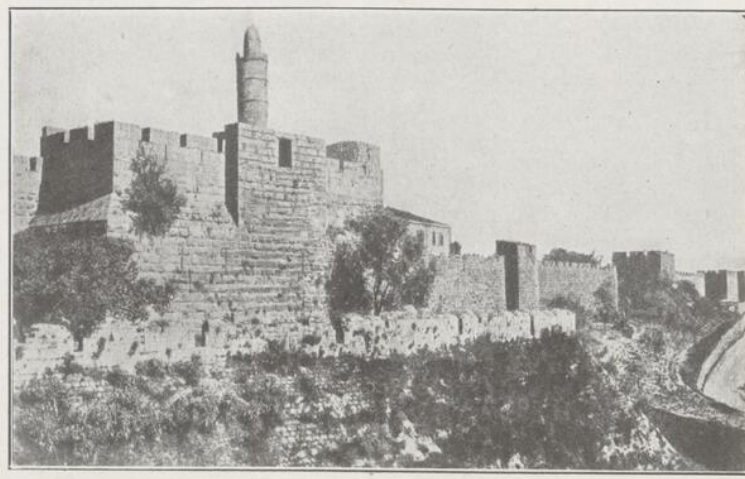

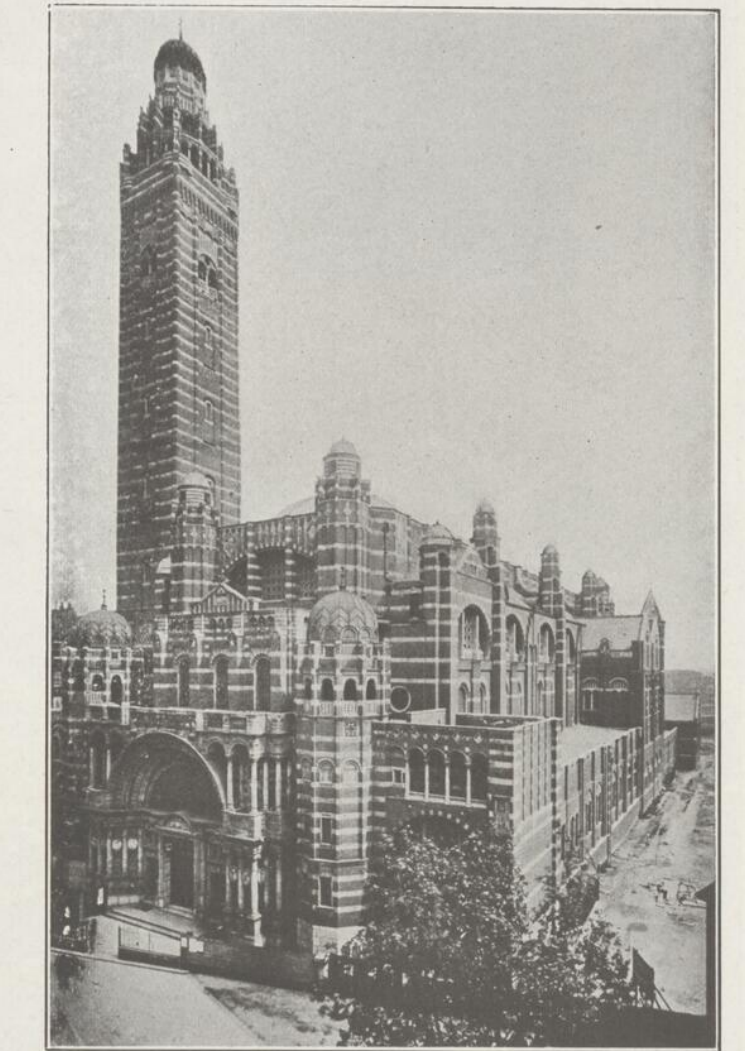
INTERNATIONAL EUCHARISTIC CONGRESS.

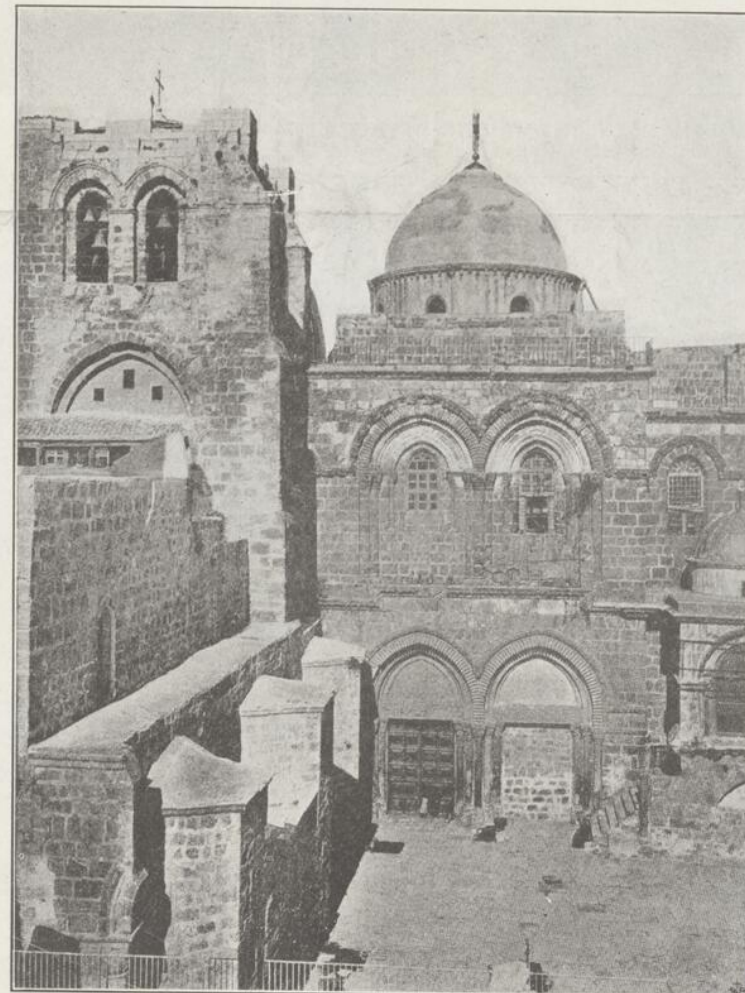
"THE Disputation on the Eucharist," painted in 1509 in fresco at the Vatican by Raphael, then but a young man of 26 years of age, and reproduced on this page, may fittingly serve as a preface to the other pictures illustrating the history and theological significance of the Great International Eucharistic Congresses of modern origin. For the first time in the history of the New World, a Congress will soon be held on this side of the Atlantic.

In the picture above, the artist, using the symbolism of Christian Art and Catholic Theology, has portrayed the fullness of the idea of the real abiding presence of God with mankind. Though he uses three zones, a unity of conception pervades the whole design.

On high, God the Father, eternal and all-present, surrounded by imperishable spirits, wishing to be nearer unto man, speaks forth the "Word," and the "Word was made flesh and dwelt with us." Thus Christ—the Word of the Father—is presented to us in an aureole, as an emanation from the Father, in which, as God the Son, the Messiah is seated, in glorified human form, with His Mother and the beloved disciple, and surrounded by the just, who have walked in the presence of God represented by the Saints of the Old and New Testament, and by a sybil representing Paganism seeing God with broken lights—all of whom find in Christ the fulfilment of all the Scriptures. Connecting this second zone with



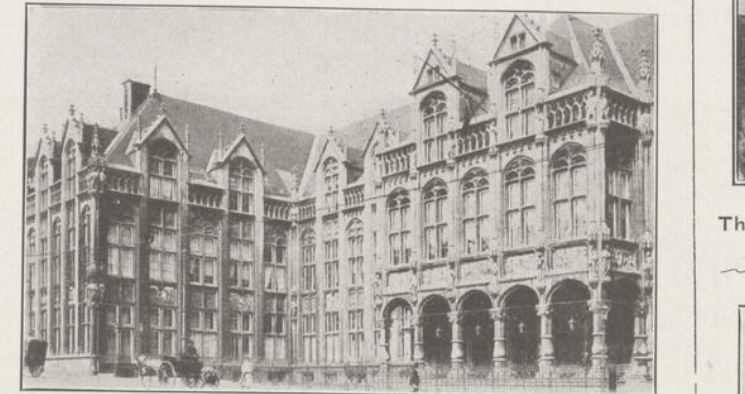
The Roman Catholic Cathedral of Westminster, London, where the 19th Congress was held in 1905.



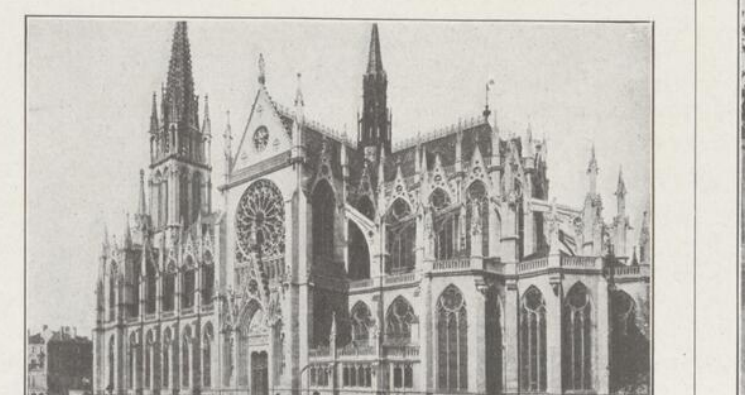
The Church of the Holy Sepulchre, Jerusalem, visited by the delegates to the 8th Congress.

Though painted 400 years ago, Raphael foreshadowed the modern Eucharistic Convention as a gathering of clergy and laity around the Eucharistic Shrine as the centre of Roman Catholic dogma and ritual.

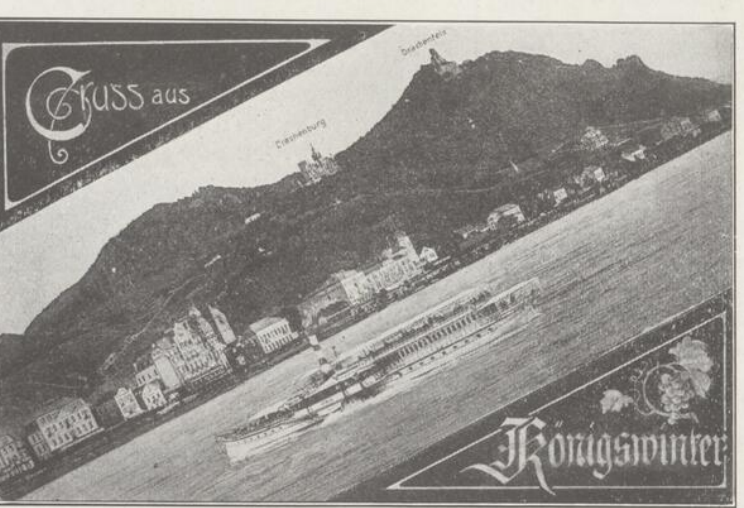
Imagine the fair city of the fresco to be Montreal, and the assembly attracted to it to be composed of a Papal Legate, Apostolic delegates, Cardinals, Archbishops and Bishops, priests and religious, theologians, philosophers, statesmen, distinguished men of letters and affairs, and thousands of the faithful, foregathering from all quarters of Christendom for the same motive as those forty-two figures in Raphael's Disputation, and the purpose of the Great International Eucharistic Congress of 1910, viz: the glorification of the Eucharist, becomes quite apparent.



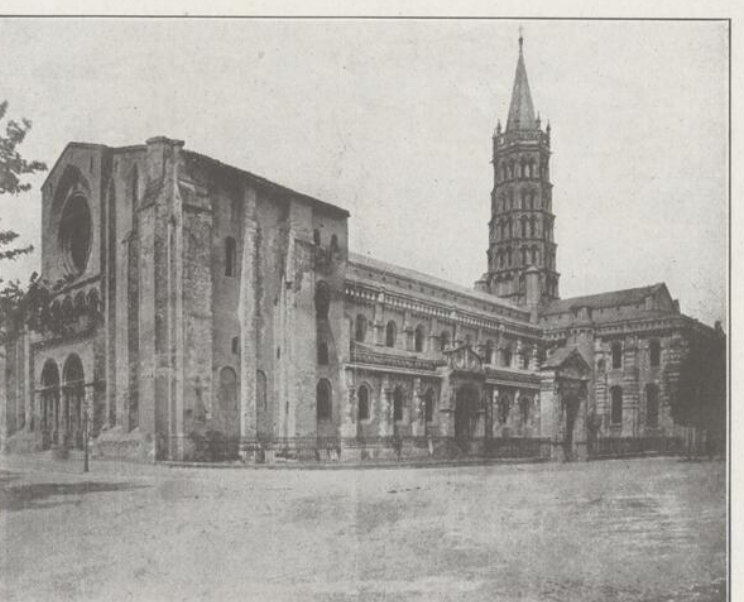
The Hotel du Gouvernement at Liege, Belgium, a building associated with the 2nd Congress.

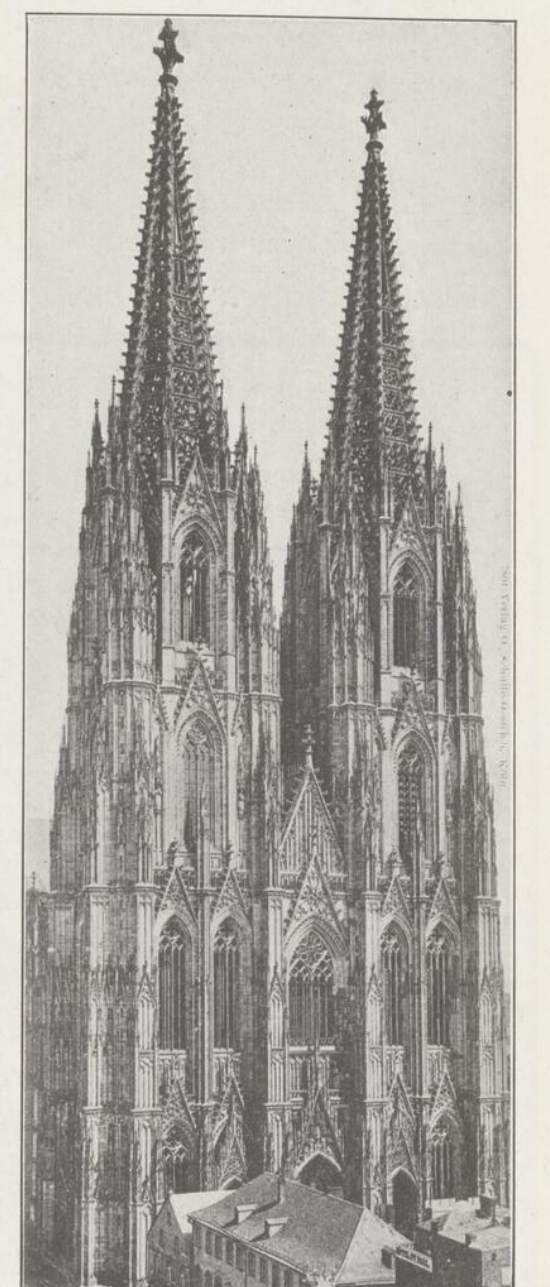

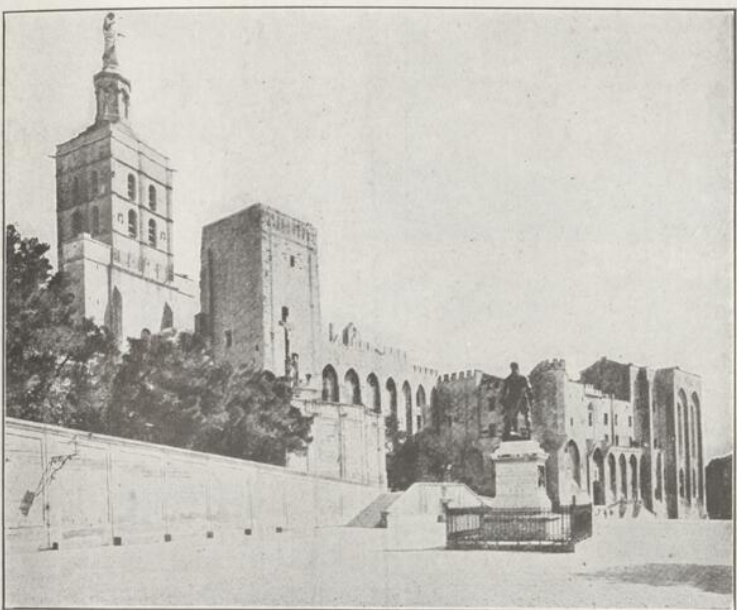

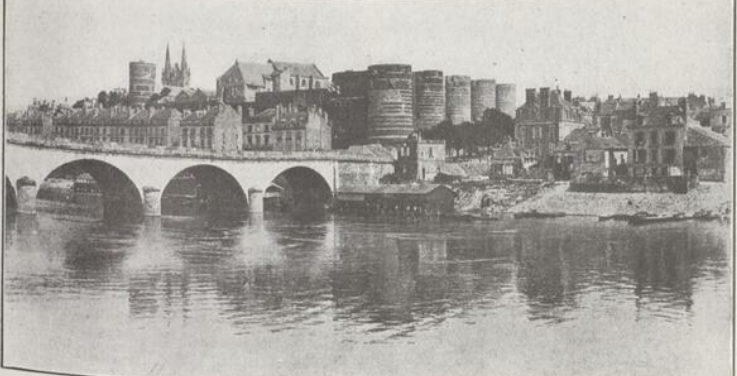

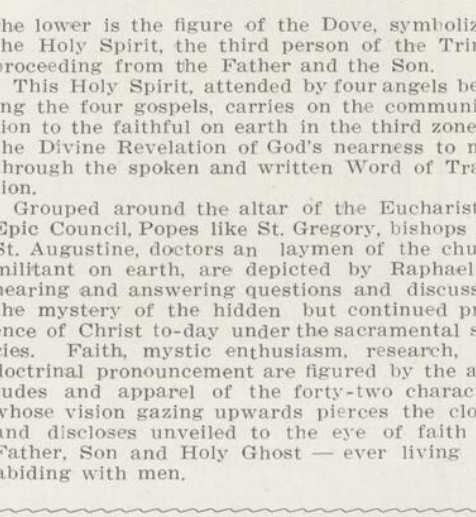

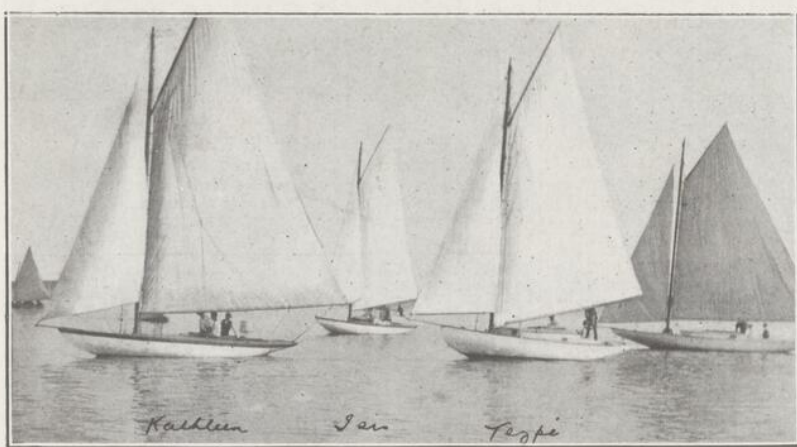

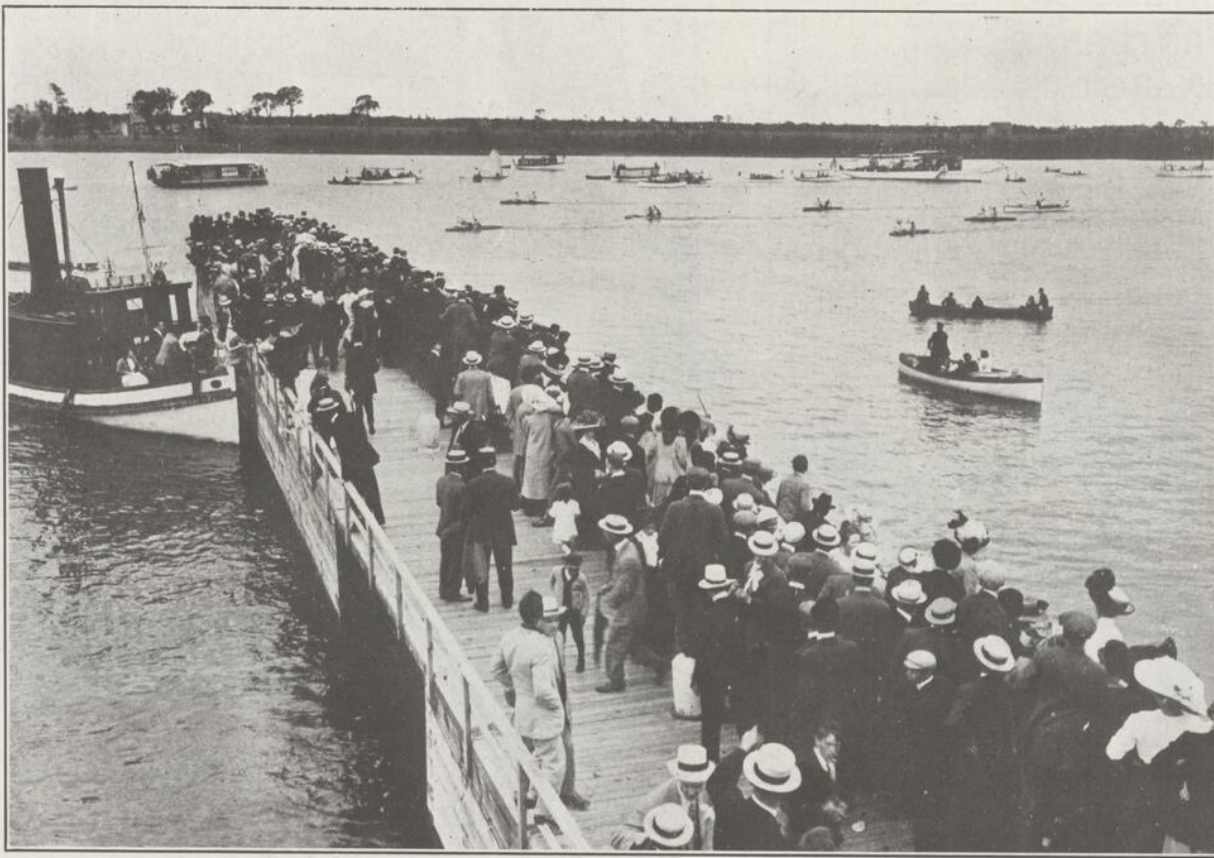
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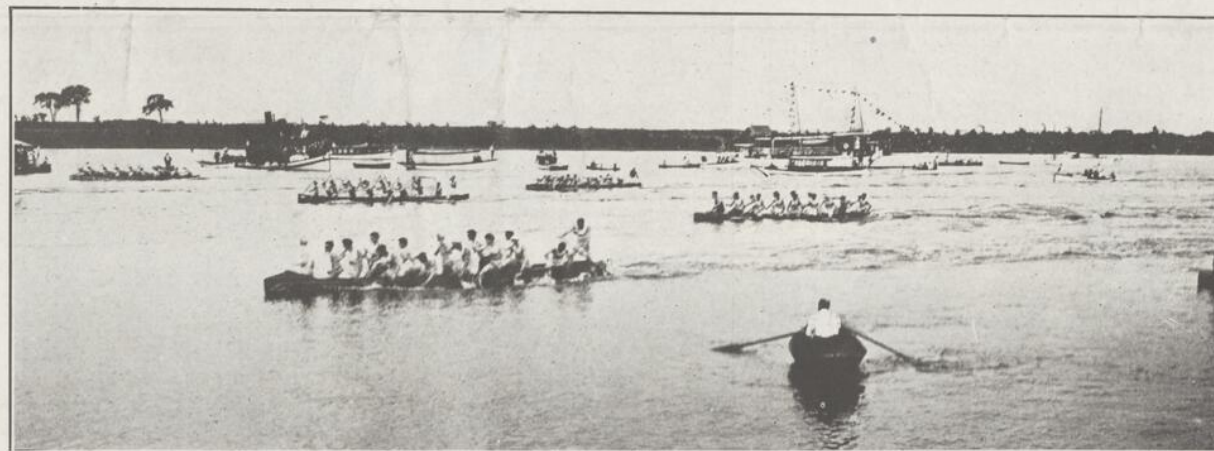
