Books.—School or other Books, printed in this province, (copies of which to be deposited with the Customs Branch of the Department of the Finance Minister,) are subject to a duty of 10 per cent; Brass in bars, rods and sheets; Brass or Copper Wire and Wire Cloth: Cameos and Mosaics, real or imitation, when set in gold, silver and other metal; Canada Plates, Tinned Plates, Galvanized Iron and Sheet Iron; Copper, in bars, rods, bolts or sheets; Silk Twist for hats, boots and shoes; Iron—Bar, Rod or Hoop: Nail and Spike Rod; Hoop or Tire for driving wheels of locomotives, bent and welded; Boiler Plate; Railroad Bars; Wrought Iron Chains and Spikes; Rolled Plates; Wire; Jewellery and Watches; Lead in sheet; Maps, Charts and Atlases; Sails ready made; Spirits of Turpentine; Steel, wrought or cast; Cotton Candle Wick, Cotton Yarn and Cotton Warp; White lead, dry; Plaster of Paris, ground and calcined; Hydraulic Cement, ground and calcined; Red Lead; Litharge; Phosphorus; Medicinal Roots; Engravings and Prints; Straw, Tuscan and Grass fancy Plaits; Tin, granulated or bar; Tubes and Piping, of copper, brass, or iron when drawn; Zinc or Spelter, in sheet; Locomotive and Engine Frames, cranks, crank axles, railway car and locomotive axles, piston rods, guide and slide bars, crank pins, connecting rods, steamboat and mill shafts, and cranks forged in the rough.

represents, and not engaged in commercial business or professional pursuits, shall be admitted free of duty.

*Table of Prohibitions.*

The following articles are prohibited to be imported under a penalty of fifty pounds, together with the forfeiture of the parcel or package of Goods in which the same may be found :—Books, drawings, paintings, and prints of an immoral or indecent character; Coin, base or counterfeit.

Books—Foreign Reprints of British Copywright Works are subject to 12½ per cent. duty, by Order in Council, under authority of 13 and 14 Vict., cap. 6.

Wharfage shall be charged at the above rates on all merchandise discharged into other vessels or landed on the wharves, whether into store or otherwise. Also on all goods shipped from off the wharves or out of the Stores.

The owners of goods and the persons landing or taking them from the wharf are both to be accountable for the wharfage.

All goods landed on the wharves are subject to be removed at the expense of the owner.

No articles of any kind put upon the wharves are to be considered as at the risk of the Commissioners, nor entitled to remain there over five days free of charge, after which they shall be charged per month, according to the space occupied.

Any person wishing to pile lumber or other goods on the wharves to remain shall first obtain a berth.

Vessels lying at the wharves are to remove at the request of the Wharfinger, and if not she will be removed at the risk and expense of the owner.

No fire shall be made on the wharves for any purpose whatever, nor on board of any vessels lying at the wharves for the purpose of heating Pitch, Tar or Rosin, or any other combustible matter.

No ballast shall be put on the wharves without the consent of the Wharfinger.

Any person found throwing ballast or dirt of any kind into the river alongside the wharves shall be fined according to the rules of the Port.

All vessels must top their yards and rig in their jibboom before coming to the Wharf.

Vessels loading Timber shall not fill the Basin with Lumber in such a manner as to prevent other Vessels from passing in and out.

**SEIZURE.**

*Articles exempted by 23d Victoria, ch. 25.*

1st.—Bed and bedding and bedsteads in ordinary use by the debtor and his family.

2nd.—Necessary and ordinary wearing apparel of debtor and family.

3rd.—One stove and pipes, 1 crane and appendages, 1 pair of andirons, 1 set cooking utensils, 1 pair tongs and shovel, 1 table, 6 chairs, 6 knives, 6 forks, 6 plates, 6 teacups, 6 saucers, 1 sugar basin, 1 milk jug, 1 teapot, 6 spoons, all spinning wheels and weaving looms in domestic use, 10 volumes of books, 1 axe, 1 saw, 1 gun, 6 trays and fishing net seines in use.

4th.—All necessary fuel, meat, fish, flour, and vegetables, actually provided for family use, sufficient for 30 days, and not worth more than \$40.

5th.—1 cow, 4 sheep, 2 hogs and food therefor for 30 days.

6th.—Tools and implements of, or chattels ordinarily used in the debtor's occupation, to the value of \$60.

1.—Nothing shall exempt from seizure in satisfaction of debt contracted for such identical chattel of any articles in Nos. 3, 4, 5 and 6.

2.—The debtor may select.

The annual issue of licenses commences on the 1st May, the old licenses expiring on the 30th April.

Those who are in possession of certificates for tavern licenses in the country, or of permits from the City Clerk, in the city, will have the right, on making applications to this office, and on paying the above taxes, for their licenses as heretofore.

Those who make applications for shop licenses will be required as heretofore to produce a certificate from the city treasurer for £2 road tax.

In all cases, the above provincial tax is exigible apart from the impost or tax imposed by the local or country councils.

Persons infringing the law are liable to a fine of \$50, or to an imprisonment of 3 to 6 months in the common gaol of the district.
