## Visits Signals, Will Inspect RMR Regiment

H.R.H. the Princess Royal will visit Westmount twice on Tuesday.

The honorary colonel of the West Yorkshire Regiment in the Imperial Army and daughter of the late King George V will take tea and unveil a plaque at the Hillside avenue armoury of the 11th Regiment RCCS Tuesday afternoon and in the evening will inspect the Royal Montreal Regiment at its St. Catherine street armoury.

The RMR will also provide a guard of honor at Windsor Station Sunday night when Her Royal Highness arrives in Montreal for a 5-day visit.

Tuesday afternoon the Princess will arrive at the Hillside armoury of the Signals at 4.10 o'clock and will be received by Lt. Col. Harold Hurdle, officer commanding. She will walk a red carpet to a prepared dais inside the armoury and during her stay will be asked to unveil a plaque commemorating those of the unit who have fallen in service.

In the evening the Princess will be received at the RMR armoury by Maj. Gen. C. B. Price, Brig. G. V. Whitehead and Lt. Col. C. J. Pratt, officer commanding.

The Regiment will be resplendent in blue dress uniforms with white accoutrements and scarlet berets and with it will parade the Lower Canada College cadets and members of the 14 (RMR) Branch of the Canadian Legion.

The Princess will inspect the regiment and view the Book of Mem-

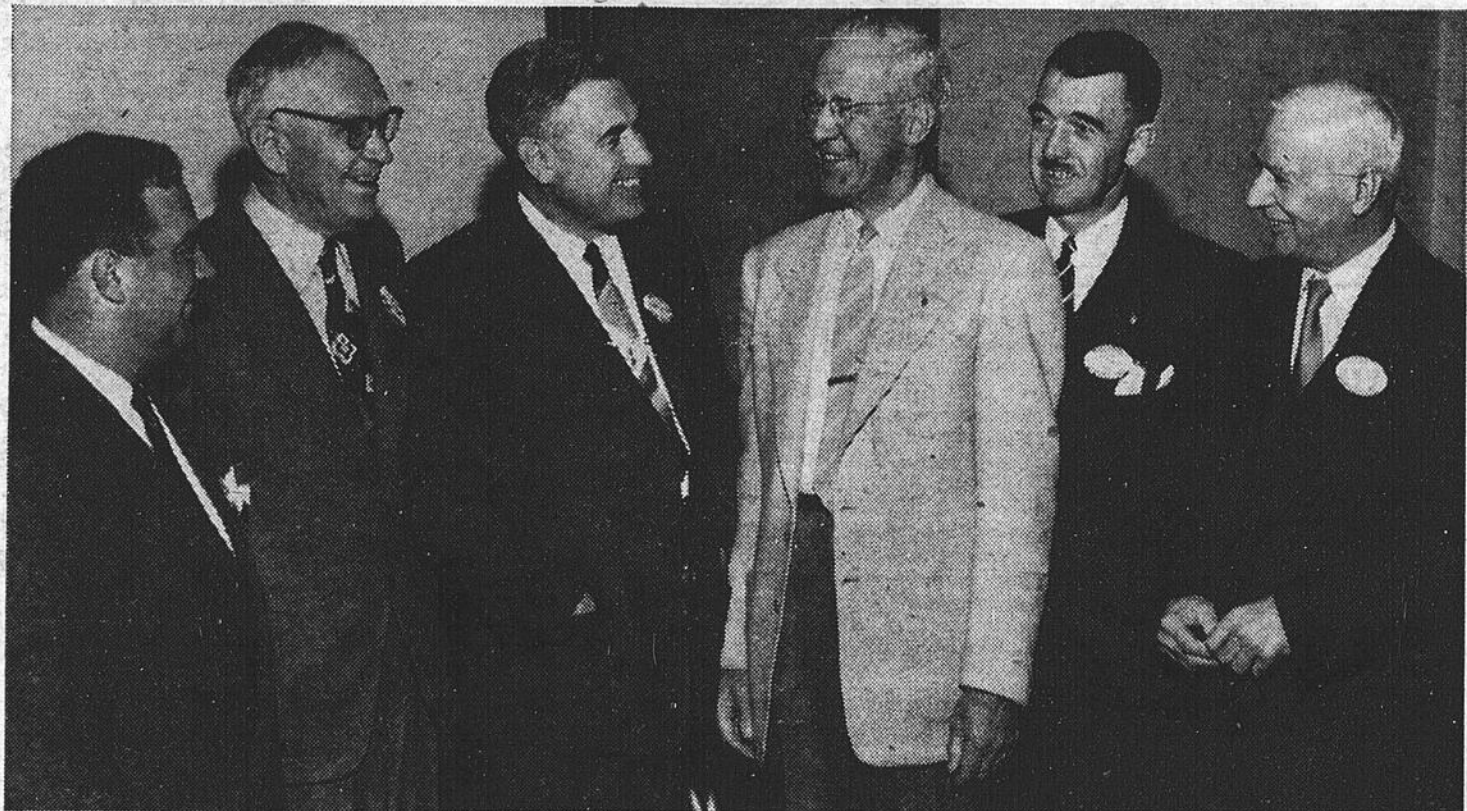

## Peter Saegert Is Winner Of Imperial Scholarship

Two Quebec youths are among 11 Canadian students named today as winners of Imperial Oil undergraduate scholarships, each worth \$2,800 over the next four years.

They are Jean-Baptiste-André Poisson, 20, of 1382 St. Jean Baptiste St., Plessisville; and Peter Frederick McLean Saegert, 17, of 36 Anworth Rd., Westmount.

The value of each scholarship, formerly \$625 a year, has been increased this year to \$700. At the same time, the company announced a new annual grant of \$500 per scholarship holder to the universities attended, to be used as each university sees fit. The increases apply both to the new winners and to previous years' winners for the remainder of their university studies. The new \$500 annual grants will also

go to all of the 16 universities selected by the 43 scholarship holders now taking courses.

The scholarships are open to children and wards of employees, annuitants, and deceased em-

The Unity Boys' Club of Westmount is sponsored by the Rotary Club of Westmount and operated by the Montreal Boys' Association, a Red Feather Service.

The Unity Boys' Club, situated at 1090 Greene Avenue, has as its prime purpose the guidance of boys and girls in health, mental and physical, vocational skills and social development.

Since 1950 when the Club was officially opened, nearly 1000 children, between six and sixteen, have been provided on a yearly basis with the opportunity to take part in a variety of interests. This year over 300 boys and girls have already registered for the 1955-56 season and if the present trend continues, a new record in registration will be made.

### VOLUNTEER LEADERS NEEDED

The scope of activities of the Unity Boys' Club makes it necessary for us to appeal for volunteer workers. Last year, 55 men and women contributed service in one form or another. This year because of varying reasons such as business commitments, health, departures from the Community, etc. nine workers will not be back and it is our hope that replacements will come forward to offer their services.

Instructors and leaders are needed for the following: Sewing, novelty crafts, woodwork, ballet, library assistant, two for general supervision and two basketball coaches.

## Cancer Research Society Launches Members Drive

The Cancer Research Society Inc., first laymen's organization in Canada to aid medical science in its battle against cancer, and which has contributed close to \$350,000 towards investigation and treatment of Canada's number two killer, is now engaged in a membership drive to intensify the fight.

The society, formed in 1945 by 12 Montreal women, and which received its provincial charter in 1946, has supported hundreds of anti-cancer research projects, including the Tumor Clinic Board of the Montreal Children's Hospital, the Cancer Control Centre at Reddy Memorial Hospital, the Well Woman's Clinic at the Royal Victoria Hospital and the Cancer Clinic at the Jewish General Hospital.

The society's membership in the province is now 8,000. It exists solely to raise funds for cancer research and indigent patients.

"We believe that no one has the right to wait until a loved one is lost through cancer before joining in the battle against this common foe," Mrs. Ben Sternthal, president, said.

The society recently received word from Dr. J. E. de Belle, executive director, Montreal Children's Hospital, praising them for the fine work in alleviating much of the financial worry of poor families with children suffering from the dread disease.

Cancer Research has a medical advisory board of 25 outstanding Montreal doctors, who allocate annual grants-in-aid and bursaries.

The membership drive will end on Nov. 15 with a fashion show in the Sheraton Mount Royal Hotel at which Miss Eve Trill of Henry Morgan's will be commentator. Canvassing is being

done by members who carry society credentials and subscriptions of \$2 per membership may be sent to the society's headquarters at 1410 Stanley Street.

Judge Paquette stated that the tag-day had achieved only 50 per cent of the \$25,000.00 which the Crippled Children's Society had hoped to collect.

"Our best workers in our annual tag-day," he stated, "are the crippled children themselves, but unfortunately, because of the rain, on Saturday, we could not ask the children to leave their homes and carry out their tagging. Thus, we lost half of our receipts, and we have no hope of recovering them otherwise than by asking the public to send in their subscriptions by mail."

The Province of Quebec Society for Crippled Children hopes that all those who contribute annually through the Society's tag-day and who have not donated this year, will mail their contribution directly to the Society's headquarters, at 1980 Dorchester Street West, Montreal.

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## Judge Fairly Urges Stern In Sermon

"There is nothing deeper in our religion than the thoughts of the Day of Atonement and being deep it is hard to grasp. The mandate of the day is 'ye shall afflict your souls', but out of these afflictions you must find greatness and wisdom Rabbi Stern said Sunday.

"To begin with this soul affliction is but a symbol of daily human suffering and we are asked to be fair in judging others in their failures and sorrows. Alas we must first suffer ourselves in order to know how much undeserved is the misery of the world. This is what the prophet Isaiah meant — 'on this

day of your affliction break the bands of wickedness," he continued.

One of the basic purposes of religion is to turn the sensitiveness of our own suffering into an awareness of other people's pain and grief. The tears we shed over our own sorrow should cleanse our eyes to all the sorrows and tears of others. It is a misfortune to suffer but not to learn sympathy from suffering is a tragedy, he said.

This holy day is meant to be a day of reconciliation. Quarrels and misunderstanding which so often are inevitable are this day to be liquidated. On this day the family is to be united and we are to pray for the unity of the family of mankind. Thus the prophet commands us "hide not thyself from thine own flesh." Indeed the way to be at one with God is to achieve at-oneness with fellow-man, he concluded.

### Sukkoth

Sukkoth or the Feast of Tabernacles will be ushered in at Temple Emanu-El tonight at 8:15 o'clock when Dr. Harry J. Stern will speak on "Counting Our Blessings". Following the worship there will be a Sukkoth reception in the Temple Community House under the auspices of the Temple Emanu-El Sisterhood.

Sukkoth Morning, Saturday, October 1st at 10:30 o'clock, Dr. Stern will speak on "Symbols Of The Sukkah". Following the morning worship pupils of the Temple Emanu-El Religious School will assemble in the Temple Community House for a Kiddush Reception.

On Sunday Morning, October 2nd, pupils of all departments of the Religious School will observe a special programme in observance of the Feast of Tabernacles.

The final day of Sukkoth, Saturday, October 8th, the boys and girls entering the Religious School for the first time will be consecrated at the Temple worship commencing at 10:30 o'clock and will be blessed by the Rabbi and will be presented with miniature Sefer Torahs or Scrolls of the Law.

An ancient harvest festival with a modern spiritual note Sukkoth means Tabernacles, a reference to the meager abodes in which the Israelites lived during their wanderings from Egypt en route to the Promised Land.

During the holiday, celebrated eight days by Orthodox and Conservative Jews and seven by Reform, booths hung with greenery and autumn fruits and vegetables are constructed adjoining homes and synagogues or on the altar of temples. Each booth, or Sukko, to use the Hebrew, is a reminder of nature's bounty and is designed to prompt a feeling of gratitude to God for the earth's produce and for preserving those who strive for freedom.

At the worship services, prayers are recited sounding the theme of gratitude. Sukkoth is the holiday after which the Pilgrims patterned America's Thanksgiving Day. ## 60,000,000 Jobs

Henry Wallace's 1945 Estimate Proves To Be Right

When U.S. Commerce Secretary Henry Wallace wrote book in 1945 entitled 'Sixty Million Jobs', most people thought his figure for a postwar employment goal was fantastic. Yet in July, 1955, just ten years later, the U.S. made employment history

by reaching not 60 million, but 65 million jobs.

Such figures pretty effectively dispose of all the hue and cry about machines putting people out of jobs. Concern over the supposedly adverse effects of automation has been neatly summed up by John Diebold, editorial director of 'Automatic Control' magazine, who describes such attitudes as "obituary accounting." He explains this term as "toting up the number of workers replaced by a machine, multiplying that sum by the number of machines, and tagging the end result 'unemployment'."

"This practice," he points out, "assumes that only a set number of jobs exist in our economy and ignores the fundamental fact that our needs increase continually. To ignore this fact is to sell short the marvellous capacity for growth and production that has been at the heart of American industrial expansion."

## Spiritual Healing Is Now A Science Lecturer Declares

Spiritual healing is today lifted out of the realm of blind faith into its true status of normal, demonstrable, divine Science, Jules Cern of New York City told a large Montreal audience Monday night.

Appearances to the contrary notwithstanding, man is spiritual — not physical — and knowledge of this fact is healing the sick as well as the sinner by prayer alone, Mr. Cern declared.

On a nationwide tour as a member of The Christian Science Board of Lectureship, Mr. Cern spoke under the auspices of First Church of Christ, Scientist, Montreal, in the auditorium of Montreal High School. His subject was "Christian Science: The Un-

derstanding and Practice of God's Allness."

Worship of God as All — as infinite Spirit — rules out physicality as actually real, Mr. Cern said. He held that there is nothing novel or unreasonable about rejecting matter as a basis for healing.

Commenting on the fundamental Christian Science teaching that "Spirit is all — instead of matter," he said: "This does not eliminate man and the universe; it illuminates man and the universe."

Mr. Cern explained healing in Christian Science by stating that to the Christian Scientist "the belief that there is disease is all there is to there being disease."

Therefore, since there is no such thing as an incurable belief, there can be no such thing as an incurable disease."

● THE ORDERLY and somewhat quiet withdrawal of the McGill University football forces from Vancouver last Sunday afternoon was in sharp contrast to the warm welcome they had received at the Pacific Coast city.

As the TCA North Star's big engines broke out into a staccato sputtering, much like a suddenly aroused bumble-bee, many in the party reflected on the three days they had just finished in Vancouver. Though not entirely successful in their quest to retain the Sir Winston Churchill Trophy, emblematic of victory in the annual Paraplegic Bowl game, the journey had still proven very worthwhile.

The quiet retreat was in contrast only to the Vancouverites themselves. The reception at Vancouver International Airport, a joint affair managed by the Pacific Coast branch of the McGill Grads Society and the University of British Columbia, started off in a somewhat spectacular fashion with two bag-pipers, kilts and all, greeting the players as they came down the ramp.

Inside was the more familiar type of kilted creature, as yet unknown on the McGill campus — cheerleaderettes — who gave the group a couple of good old-fashioned (and well rehearsed) Redmen yells. And then, to celebrate the arrival of the eastern forces, the entire party, including players, coaches and accompanying members, was taken on a motor cavalcade through the heart of the city, with horns blaring and banners flying to

advertise the weekend game. It was, to say the least, a rousing arrival after what had proven a rather routine flight.

More of the west coast version of western hospitality was yet to come, and special mention must be made of the McGill Graduates Society, particularly one Harry Boise. He was responsible for probably the most interesting excursion from the standpoint of the visitors — a bus tour Friday

that included such features as Empire Stadium, Stanley Park, North Vancouver, Capilano, and the University grounds.

Naturally, Empire Stadium, in the vast Pacific Exhibition Grounds, enjoyed some of the closest scrutiny. Most sports fans are by now well familiar with its particular attractions, including shelter over most of the stands along both sides. The newly laid turf, seen on a bright sunny day, resembled a gigantic green Arabian carpet, set like a jewel in surroundings of hard concrete.

The bus trip continued through the downtown area, with the usual pertinent facts thrown in about the city, its history, and its probable future. No comments were made about either drug traffic or police probes, but there is little argument about the progress Vancouver has made and will continue to make. As Mr. Boise said, "We hear Toronto and Montreal argue over which is the larger city. Out here we don't pay much attention, because we know that within a few years Vancouver will be much larger than either."

The rival beauties of Stanley Park and North Vancouver were each held in high regard. The park is a natural paradise not more than two miles from the heart of the city, and boasts tracts of land filled with interesting flora and fauna. North Vancouver, after crossing the Lions Gate Bridge, contrasts man's own progress — western style homes and beautiful developments.

But it must be said that a great deal more "thrill" was derived from Capilano; more specifically, from the Swinging Bridge there. Built by the owner to attract tourists, it is a cable suspension job stretching across some 340 feet of nothing, and the nothing itself is 400 feet deep. There's a magnificent view from the middle points of the bridge down along a watery gorge, with the occasional salmon flashing its silvery scales. But there seemed to be more desire to gain the terra firma on the opposite side than to stand nature-loving in the middle of the swaying wonder. Especially when a group of 260 pound tackles decided to venture with heavy steps from side to side.

It is well known that UBC ranks in beauty with any college on the continent, thanks mainly to the vast grounds endowed to them by the crown. Parts of these endowment lands have been sold for housing development, which have turned into some of the most beautiful areas of Vancouver. Moreover, the university has on display a complete set of modern buildings, along with the best of facilities. It is the site of Memorial pool, built especially for the British Empire Games, and its gymnasium features a resilient floor, with hardwood over a layer of horsehair. The floor proved so good when the Harlem Globetrotters visited Vancouver, that the famed court artists prolonged their visit an extra day.

The game, while disappointing to the McGill forces, should prove quite a boon to UBC. In spite of an overwhelming superiority on offence, coach Larry Sullivan's Redmen failed to score, and the contest ended in a scoreless tie. McGill retained the Sir Winston Churchill trophy, as previous winners. But the only real gainer as usual was the Paraplegic Association, which netted some \$1000. It is safe to assume, however, from the speculations of those concerned with the game, that several new efforts will be made next year in the promotion field. Few are satisfied that the annual match cannot be built into a much larger spectacle, and enhance a fuller sports scope of east-west competition. This year the mile relay, run at half time, was introduced; next year more is planned. Included on this board of strategy are

Dr. H. Elliott, founder of the game, and Westmount Mayor J. A. DeLalanne, chairman of the McGill Athletic Board.

Details of the trip were well handled all along, and most of the credit in that department goes to Harry Griffiths, new director of athletics at the university. And we might add, a man who has proven to be a most interesting conversationalist, in some of the most surprising subjects. The managing of what has often been termed an unmanageable crew fell to Buster Brown, the big guard from Hamilton whose current status is a moot question in intercollegiate athletics. placement. Then he and several of the FBI players paid Noel a visit in the hospital," Bertrand noted.



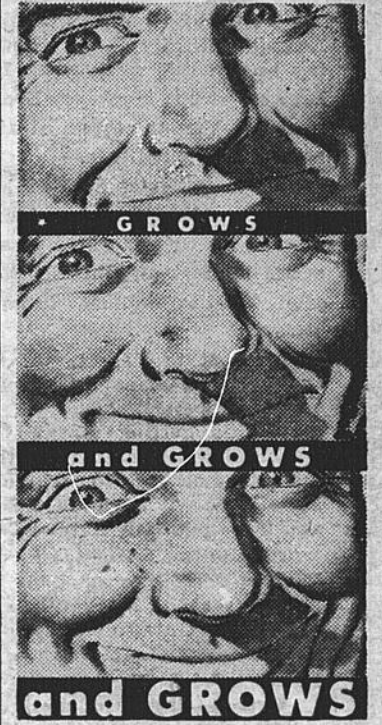


In the senior class, Jack O'Quinn caught the largest grey trout. It weighed 5 lbs., 4 oz.
