N. A. Provinces, bolting, cloth, book binders' tools and implements, brim moulds for gold beaters, burrstones, candle wick, cotton, cement, marine unground, cement, hydraulic unground, church bells, clothing—donations of for charitable institutions, com-

munion plate, cocoa paste, from Great Britain and the B. N. A. Provinces, coin and bullion, except United States silver coin, cotton netting for India rubber shoes, cotton waste, cotton wool, drain tiles, duck for belting and hose, emery paper and emery cloth, electrotype blocks, for printing purposes; farming implements and utensils when imported by Agricultural Societies for the encouragement of agriculture; felt for hats and boots; fire brick; fire engines—steam—when imported by the municipal corporations of cities, towns and villages, for the use of such municipalities; fish hooks, nets and seines, lines and twines, flax waste; glass paper and glass cloth; gold beaters skin; gold leaf, hoop skirt manufacture, the following articles for, crinoline thread for covering crinoline wire, clasps of tin and brass, slides, spangles and slotted tapes, and flat or round wire uncovered, junk, linen machine thread, lithographic stones; lumber, plank and sawed, of mahogany, rosewood, walnut, cherry and chestnut, and pitch pine, machine silk twist, machinery when used in the original construction of mills or factories, not to include steam engines, boilers, water wheels or turbines, nails—composition, nails—sheathing, oakum, oil cake, philosophical instruments and apparatus, including globes, when imported by, and for the use of colleges and schools, scientific or literary societies, platters' leaf, printing ink, printing presses, except portable hand printing presses, prunella, plush for hatters use, rags, sand paper and sand cloth; ships' binnacle lamps, do blocks and patent bushes for blocks, do bunting, do cables, iron chain, over half of an inch, shackled or swiveled or not, do compasses, do dead eyes, do dead lights, do deck plugs, do knees, iron, do masts or parts of, iron, do pumps and pump-gear, do riders, iron, do shackles, do sheaves, do signal lamps, do steering apparatus, do travelling trucks, do wedges, do wire-rigging; cables, bemp and grass, cordage, sail cloth or canvas from No. 1 to No. 6, varnish, black and bright, silver leaf, spikes, composition, straw plaits, Tuscan and grass, fancy; stereotype blocks for printing purposes, tree nails,

Under Regulations and Restrictions to be prescribed by the Minister of Customs.

Carriages of travellers and carriages laden with merchandise and not to include circus troops, nor hawkers; locomotive and railway passenger, baggage and freight cars, running upon any line of road crossing the frontier, so long as Canadian locomotives and cars are admitted free under similar circumstances in the United States, menageries, horses, cattle, carriages and harnesses of, travellers' baggage.

Goods free of Duty.

The following goods when the growth and produce of any of the British North American Provinces may be imported free of duty, viz: animals of all kinds; fresh, smoked and salted meats; green and dried fruits; fish of all kinds; products of fish and of all other creatures living in water; poultry, butter, cheese, lard, tallow; timber and lumber of all kinds, round, hewed, sawed, but not

otherwise manufactured in whole or in part, fish oil, gypsum, ground or unground.

Table of Prohibitions.

The following articles shall be prohibited to be imported under a penalty of two hundred dollars together with the forfeiture of the parcel or package of goods in which the same may be found, viz: books, printed papers, drawings, paintings, prints and photographs, of a treasonable or seditious or of an immoral or indecent character; coin, base or counterfeit.

Export Duties.

Wharfage shall be charged at the above rates on all merchandise discharged into other vessels or landed on the wharves, whether into store or otherwise. Also on all goods shipped from off the wharves or out of the stores.

The owners of goods and the persons landing or taking them from the wharf are both to be accountable for the wharfage.

All goods landed on the wharves are subject to be removed at the expense of the owner.

No articles of any kind put upon the wharves are to be considered as at the risk of the Commissioners, nor entitled to remain there over five days free of charge, after which they shall be charged per month, according to the space occupied.

Any person wishing to pile lumber or other goods on the wharves to remain shall first obtain a berth.

Vessels lying at the wharves are to remove at the request of the Wharfinger, and if not she will be removed at the risk and expense of the owner.

No fire shall be made on the wharves for any purpose whatever, nor on board of any vessels lying at the wharves for the purpose of heating Pitch, Tar, or Rosin, or any other combustible matter.

No ballast shall be put on the wharves without the consent of the Wharfinger.

Any person found throwing ballast or dirt of any kind into the river alongside the wharves shall be fined according to the rules of the Port.

All vessels must top their yards and rig in their jibboom before coming to the Wharf.

Vessels loading timber shall not fill the basin with lumber in such a manner as to prevent other Vessels from passing in and out.

The annual issue of licenses commences on the 1st of May, the old licenses expiring on the 30th April.

Those who are in possession of certificates for tavern licenses in the Country, or of permits from the City Clerk, in the City, will have the right, on making applications to this office, and on paying the above taxes, for their licenses, as heretofore.

Those who make applications for shop licenses will be required, as heretofore, to produce a certificate from the city treasurer for \$8 road tax.

In all cases, the above provincial tax is eligible apart from the impost or tax imposed by the local or country councils.

The duty on Tavern, Shop Licenses, Auction, Auction duty, &c., under Confederation, belong to the Local Governments.

Persons infringing the law are liable to a fine of \$50, or to an imprisonment of 3 to 6 months in the common jail of the district.
