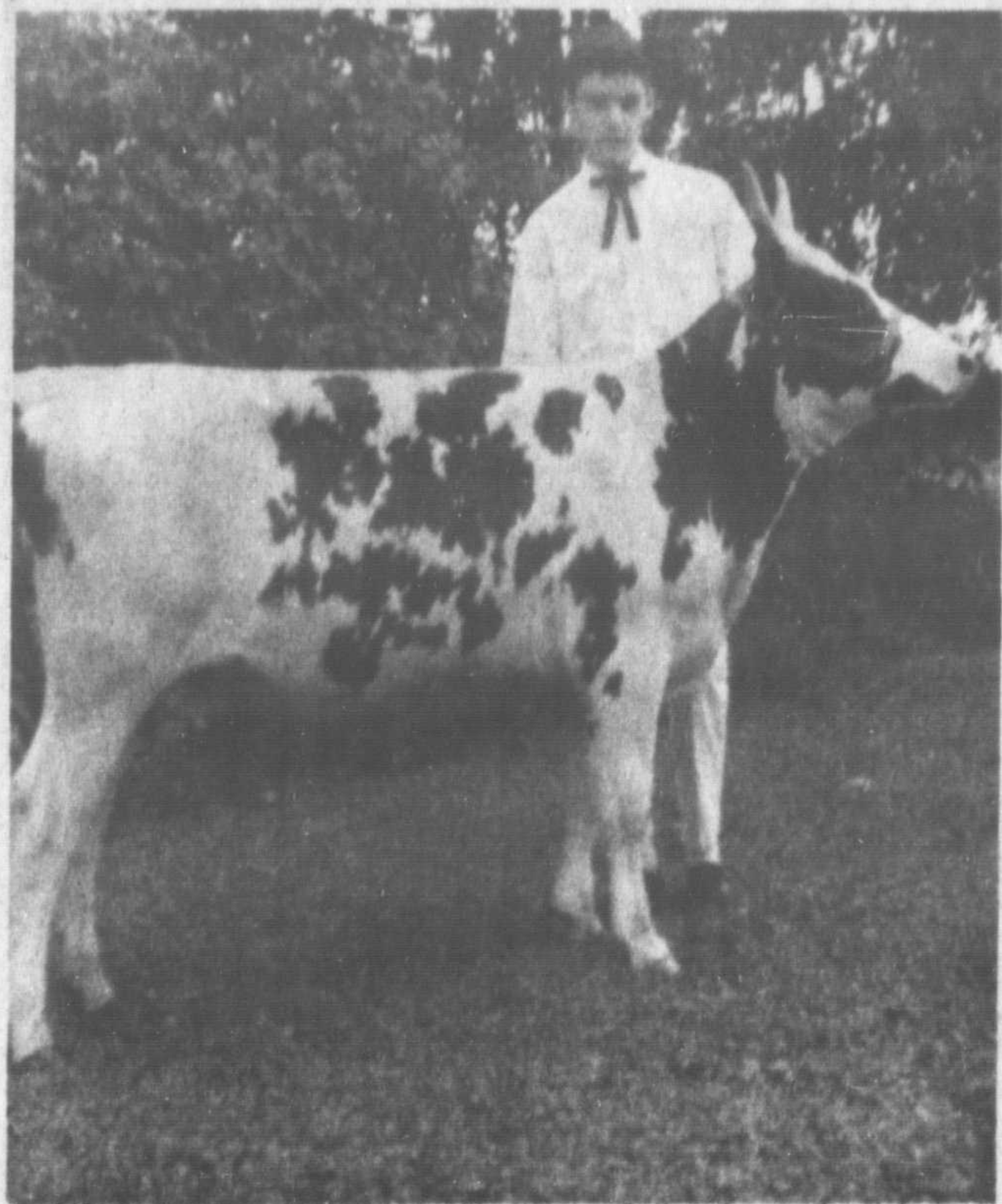

Dugal F. Sharpe ordained minister

At the East Ontario Annual Conference of the Free Methodist Church, held in Kingston in August, Dugal F. Sharpe was ordained to the ministry.

Rev Sharpe is the son of Mr Harry Sharpe and the late Mrs Sharpe of Quyon. He attended public school in Bristol and High School in Shawville. Later he studied at Brockville Bible College graduating in 1952. Following this he served one year in song evangelism, travelling across Canada singing in crusades and services.

Mr Sharpe served for two years as minister of the Holiness Movement Church at Wildwood, Alberta, following which he taught school in Onslow Intermediate School and then in Temiscaming School for six years.

He was appointed pastor of the Bracebridge Free Methodist Church where he is now serving his sixth year. During this time the church has undergone extensive renovations to both the sanctuary and the Christian Education area. During the time served in Bracebridge, Rev Sharpe has continued his studies at Roberts Wesleyan College, Rochester, New York and from Headquarters of the Free Methodist Church.

Rev Sharpe is married to the

former Mary Irvine of Manotick and Ottawa. She is on the staff of the Bracebridge Public School.

The Area Bishop, Myron F. Boyd of Winona Lake, Indiana headquarters of the Free Methodist Church, was in charge of the ordination service. Rev Sharpe was presented for ordination by the Reverend Carl V. Bull, Secretary of the East Ontario Conference. Bishop Boyd read the charge to the ordinands and also asked the questions. Following this the Bishop and Elders laid hands on the ordinands and the Bishop repeated, "Take thou authority to execute the office of a deacon in the church of God, in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost", and then, presenting the Bible, "Take thou authority to read the Holy Scriptures in the church of God, and to preach in the same."

Assisting elders in the ordination service were Dr W J Stonehouse, former Superintendent of the Toronto-Peterborough-Muskoka Districts; Rev Earl S. Bull, Superintendent of the Ottawa-Kingston Area; Rev Paul G. Johnston, newly elected superintendent; Rev W C A McFarlane, through whose ministry Rev Sharpe entered the ministry; Rev Carl V Bull, secretary of the Conference.

Bishop of Ottawa pays pastoral visit to Quyon Parish

The Rt Rev E S Reed D.D., the Bishop of Ottawa, paid a pastoral visit to the Quyon Parish on Sunday evening and celebrated the Holy Communion. This was the first time the recently confirmed members made their communion.

A Guard of Honour as escort was provided for the Bishop by the members of the 1st Quyon Boy Scout Troop under Scoutmaster Dennis St Laurent.

Bishop Reed, long associated with the movement as a scoutmaster in Gaspé and member of the Dominion Council, holds the Silver Wolf award, the highest honour the Scout movement offers its members. The troop had its origin among the members of St Mary's Parish, Quyon.

The epistle was read by the Rev Roy Huntly of Quyon United Church.

There was active participation by several members of the congregation who read the scripture and offered the prayers.

The theme of the Bishop's sermon was based on Jesus' words from St John's Gospel, "I am the bread of life." He pointed out that God is related to all life and is sufficient for all its needs.

During the service he was assisted by the Incumbent of the parish, the Rev E N McColl.

Afterwards there was an informal reception in the Parish Hall when people had the opportunity to chat over a cup of tea.

New regulations for drive-ins

The Hon Raymond Johnston, Minister of Revenue for the Province of Quebec and Member of the Provincial Parliament for Pontiac County has sent us some interesting information about the licensing of outdoor movie theatres in the Province.

Until the passing of the Cinema Act in 1964 the establishment of outdoor movies was not permitted in Quebec and amendments to the regulations respecting outdoor cinemas have been made in August.

The amendments refer to the equipping and operation of the drive-in type of theatre operation and have to do with

the number of documents required to make application to the Department of Cultural Affairs.

Safety and health regulations are spelled out in detail as well as minimum requirements of space and equipment necessary to meet the approval of the ministry.

Anyone interested in setting up a drive-in theatre would be wise to write to the Department of Cultural Affairs for their complete regulations before even buying the property because its access, dimensions and location are all regulated by the order in council No. 2522 dated August 27, 1969.

Large German population in the Province of Quebec

According to a recent study made by the information service of the Department of Immigration of the Province of Quebec, there are 120,000 people here of German descent.

The study went back to the arrival of the first Germans in Quebec and extended right up to the current year, throwing light on the social, economic and artistic influence of this group of Quebecers.

It is interesting to note that Germans began to establish themselves in Quebec in the

seventeenth century. The first such family was the family of Haps Bernath, who came here in 1664.

Today, German origin families make up the fifth largest ethnic group in the country. From the latest census they number over a million, that is exactly 1,049,599 across Canada. About 70,000 live in the west end of Montreal.

Snowmobile trails in Provincial parks

After a success-crowned beginning last winter when the Quebec Parks Branch offered snowmobile enthusiasts trails covering 500 miles, officials have decided to add to that network a circuit of about 100 miles spread over three other parks. This has just been announced by the Tourism, Fish and Game Minister, Mr Gabriel Loubier. The new parks being added to the network are Rawdon (Darwin Falls), Dollard-des-Ormeaux and Mount Orford (Stukeley Campsite).

For each of the circuits, snowmobile enthusiasts will enjoy trails marked off and well provided with shelters. They will also be welcomed by a guard who will give them a map showing all the trails in the park. A season permit good for all the parks is to be sold for \$5.00 and a one-day permit will cost \$1.00.

A new pamphlet is being distributed by the Tourism, Fish and Game Department which illustrates the circuits for all parks. There is also a new

magazine out called "The World of Snowmobile" which was introduced by the Hon Mr Loubier at the Snowmobile Show in Montreal last month.

More than ever at Winter Fair

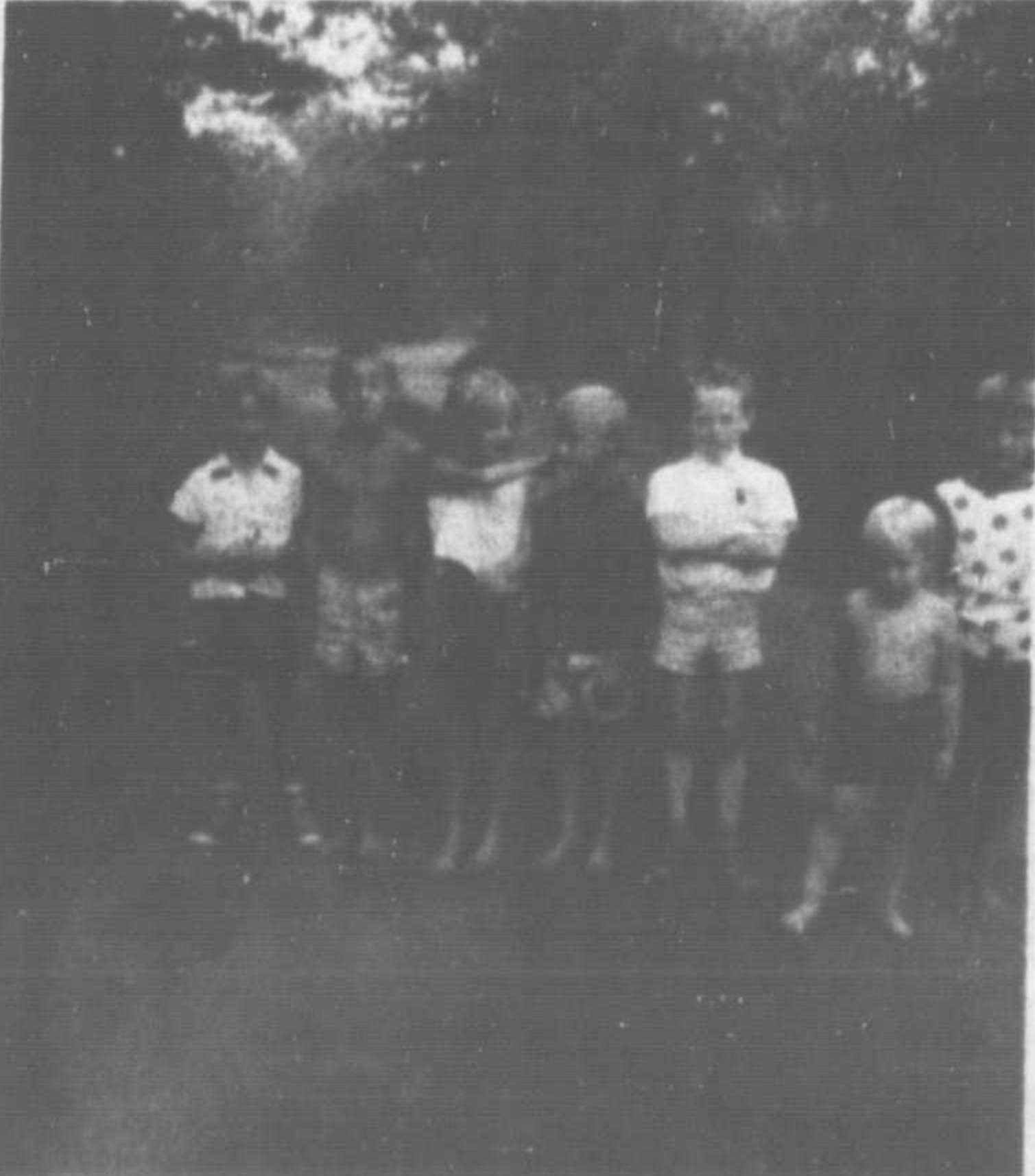
The Ottawa Winter Fair will have more to see and do this year than at any time in its sixty-seven year history.

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PLOWING MATCH 1969

If you're looking for speed, noise and suspense, don't go to a plowing match. But if you enjoy being outdoors on a beautiful fall day, wandering about in a leisurely manner among friends and neighbors in your old clothes, eating a hearty home cooked meal from farm kitchens, or your own packed picnic in endless acres surrounded by the rich autumn colors that tourists drive a hundred miles to see, well then come along to Calumet Island on Saturday and join the plow match watchers.

It's not all just standing around with the sun and the rain in your hair. There is also a contest going on with keen competitors from each part of Pontiac vying for the Imperial Esso trophies and prizes which are put up by businessmen, merchants and industries who still believe in the agricultural importance of this County.

The farm of Alec Bertrand has been chosen as the site of the Plowing Match this year and the Farmerettes of Calumet Island will be serving the meals. Twenty competitions will be taking place at once with every combination of driver, tractor and plow and as always there will be classes for horse drawn

plows as well. A new class has been added this year for tractor and four score hydraulic plow.

Also new this year is the special attraction of the Western Horse Square Dancers who caused such a sensation at the Shawville Fair. This will take place at three o'clock. There will be cross cut sawing contests and horse shoe pitching as well and a large display of farm machinery and implements.

Eric Brown is the President of the Pontiac Plowmen's Association which sponsors the Match and the results of the judging will be announced on Wednesday night, October 15th, in Calumet Island Town Hall when a square dance contest will enliven the prize giving program.

The scenic drive to the Bertrand Farm, across the new Bryson bridge is worth the entire outing even if the prospect of an afternoon of watching plows cut furrows in rich soil doesn't particularly appeal to you.

Whatever draws you to the Plowing Match, we think that once you've seen one you'll make it a regular family affair.

More cows More sheep fewer horses

The Agriculture Section of the Quebec Bureau of Statistics issues estimates annually of the number of cattle, sheep and horses on Province of Quebec farms.

The latest figures are for June 1969 and show an increase in cattle of 2.6 over last year's estimates, an increase in sheep of 2 percent over last year and a decrease of 7.5 percent from last year's estimate of horses.

According to their figures there were 53,000 horses in

Quebec in 1968 and in June, 1969 the number was 49,000. Cattle numbered 1,847,000 in June 1968 and this year there were 1,895,000 including 1,043,000 milk cows, 101,000 cows kept for beef purposes, 245,000 heifers, 374,000 calves, 69,000 steers and 63,000 bulls. Sheep in Quebec totalled 99,000 in 1968 and 101,000 in 1969 with about half being one year old and over and half being lambs under one year old.

The particular figures for the County of Pontiac show an increase in cattle of 2,300 over the year but an actual decrease in milk cows.

In 1968 the milk cow census showed 9,400 in Pontiac and one year later, June 1969, the count was 8,600.

Calves numbered 8,500 in Pontiac County in 1968 and 9,400 in 1969. Other cattle counted for 10,500 in 1968 and increased to 12,700 in 1969 which looks very much like an increased interest in the beef breeds in the County of Pontiac.

Pontiac sheep farmers reported seven hundred sheep one year old and over and another seven hundred under a year old in 1968 and exactly the same number for June 1969, for a total of 1,400 without increase or decrease.

According to the figures of the Bureau of Statistics, the horse population was 800 in Pontiac County in 1968 and in 1969 it decreased to 700.

IN MEMORIAM

From the emergence of life on the face of the earth, there has always been death. But every time death strikes us we poor human beings cannot help being stupefied by its finality. We try to rationalize over its inevitableness and draw courage from the words of Sacred Scripture which give us hope of the eternal life in the next world. With all this, death is so painful, especially when it happens in circumstances that are in our human way of speaking, tragic. And yet to some extent those who have left us for the "undiscovered country from which no traveller ever returns", do not really cease to exist, as long as we cherish their memories. And through this memory we remain united to them.

Three of our colleagues, Mrs Lorna Ferrigan, Mrs Barbara Desjardins and Mrs Doreen Sloan were snatched away from us by the unseen hands of that eternal Power that ultimately guides our lives from the time of our birth. That they were all so young, starting their teaching career in a community close to their home towns, trying to find their fulfillment by their dedication to their profession and to their families, makes it difficult for us to understand why it had to be as it has been. We search the wisdom of all the philosophers for an answer, but are beaten back by the vacuum in our hearts and minds which cannot be filled, since those who were before us are no more to be seen. Only the faith in the Christian doctrine of resurrection gives us some consolation. In a note of triumph St Paul asks in one of his epistles "O death where is thy sting? O hell where is thy victory?" It seems to me that this question of St Paul defying the power of death to destroy us completely brings us abundant courage and consolation. Christ has taught us that with Him we can conquer the destructive power of death. Our body will surely return to dust from which it was taken. But we do know that it is not the end of everything that an individual was. Our Christian faith establishes a real unity between those who live on the earth and those who have departed this life.

Let us therefore cherish their memory and take courage from the devotion to duty they displayed. They died while coming to do their duty. Like soldiers who fall in the field of battle. It is my humble suggestion that the members of the teaching profession in Pontiac County should take steps to establish a bursary or some endowment in honour of these three teachers. We share with the members of their families the grief and suffering which their deaths have caused, and we offer to all of them our heartfelt sympathy.

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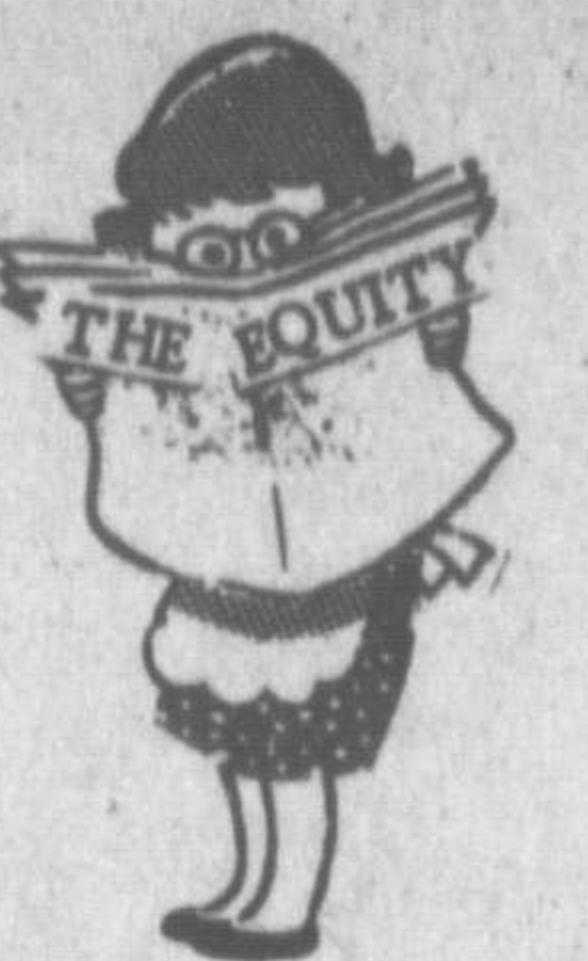
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On the farm

Cats and horses are our principle products as we go into our second week as farmers. Cats come first because they are the most recent arrivals and also require the most attention at the moment.

Also requiring instant attention was a bird who came down the chimney on our first Sunday morning at the farm. With nine people expected for breakfast we thought we had enough to do in the kitchen but this bird was in the flue and simply had to be rescued. It didn't take long to find the escape hatch at the cellar end and liberate the bird but it was a noisy few minutes there while the poor wild thing was trying to fly out the way he had flown in.

The horses never had it so good. Many of them have been accustomed to small premises and just glory now with acres and acres to race around in.

As for the boys - well ask them. One week has converted them. And of course we're delighted ourselves. We're lucky to have a lot of strong and able friends to call on for advice and assistance, otherwise the whole enterprise would be a catastrophe - or else we'd have had to give up printing and publishing and go into full time farming.

But we have great neighbors and can always find willing workers when a job is to be done.

At this point we have a granary full of oats, a mow full of hay and straw, a cow barn in the process of being remade into horse stables and if winter will just hold off a few weeks we'll be ready for it.

Thanksgiving will be a big celebration for us all this year. Family from several cities will be here to share our joy in finally having a farm of our own after half a lifetime of wishing and wondering. When we finally took the plunge we still went on wondering but now that we're settled on the farm we wonder no more.

Of course we know our problems have just begun - for instance - one corner of our barn is dying on its feet and undergoing surgery and some of the fences which kept cows well are not horse-proof. We'll get these things straightened away one by one and then there will be more of course. But, as they keep telling us, that's farming.

Somehow this year I'm afraid there won't be time for curling but farming should provide the same exercise and challenge and fully occupy our evenings all winter.

As for the sociability, well, we've had more visitors out on the farm than we did in town and we hope they keep coming because the nicest thing about having something good is in sharing it with good people.
