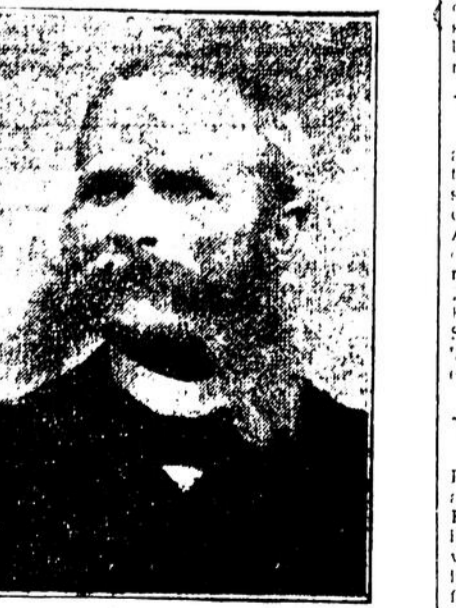
ST. JEAN BAPTISTE.

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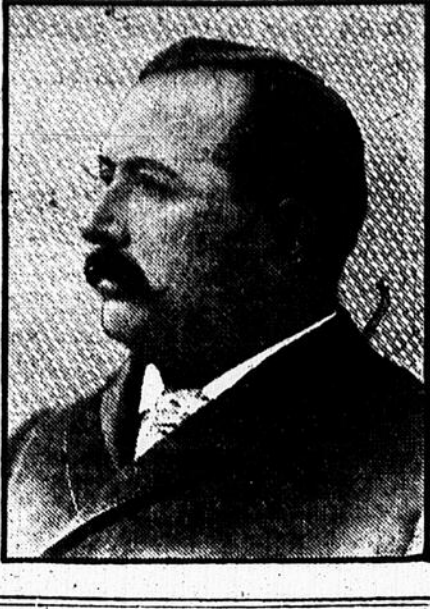
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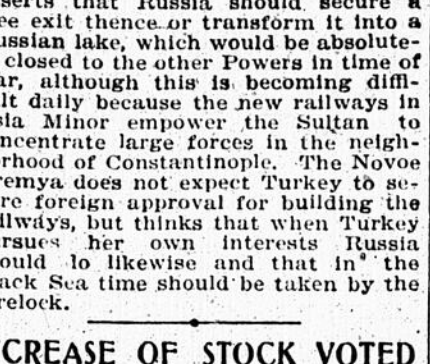

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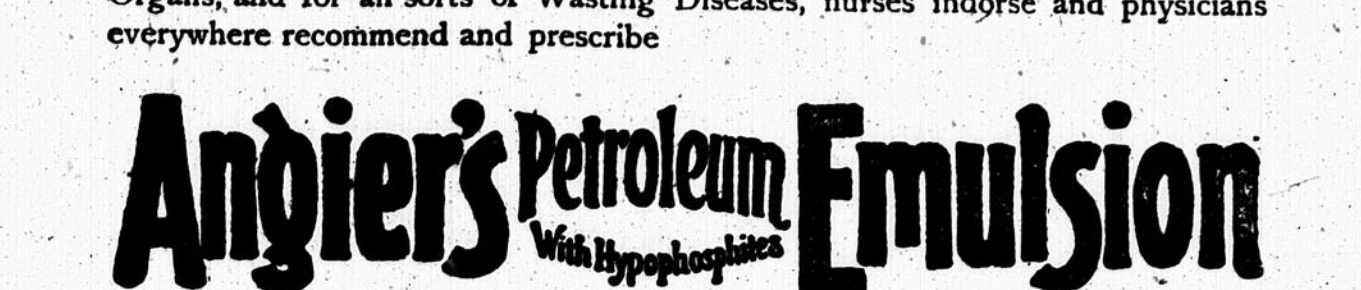

NO LET-UP TO BOOM IN STEEL AND COAL

Common Stocks of Both and Steel Prof. Had Another Active Day.

HIGH-WATER MARKS WERE AGAIN SCORED

A Bearish Factor on Twin City—The Dominion Coal's Yearly Earnings.

The Coal and Steel issues were again the big points in the stock market this morning. Coal common going up to \$4.25 steel common 29 1/2 and steel pref. 33.

It is estimated in some quarters in fact that the road may be assessed as much as \$130,000 a year, which will of course be a feature of no little importance.

JOHN REDMOND WAS IN A FIERY MOOD

Discussing Irish Affairs Says Resistance Has Become a Duty.

London, January 24.—The debate on the address in reply to the speech from the throne was resumed in the House of Commons yesterday by John Redmond, who moved an amendment raising the whole question of Irish grievances. He declared that instead of remedying the admitted wrongs, the Government had fallen back on the old method of coercion. The Irish people would yet teach Mr. Wyndham, the chief secretary for Ireland, to repent his rash refusal to grant the reasonable demands of Ireland in regard to the compulsory sale and purchase of land. There was no country in the world where crime was less frequent than in Ireland. Yet the Coercion Act had been resurrected after a decade and had been ruthlessly applied to score, including members of the House of Commons, who had been unjustifiably imprisoned and trial by jury had been abolished. The whole intellect of Ireland was against the Government, and in such circumstances resistance to the Government was a duty and a noble one.

Mr. P. Hayden, Nationalist, seconded the amendment.

WYNDHAM'S REPLY.

Mr. Wyndham, in replying, traversed almost all of Mr. Redmond's statements, and declared that no Government expected to settle the Irish question, but only hoped to do a little towards improving it, and that the Land Act of 1881 was too drastic a measure, having caused a loss of life which had ruined many people. The chief secretary for Ireland said that the strongest argument against introducing coercion into the purchase and sale of land was that such action would provoke every landlord and every tenant to fight from court to court on every disputable point. He reiterated his conviction that the power of the United Irish League was declining; that it had only seventy-four

BRITAIN ALONE A PRACTICAL FRIEND

Efforts of Continental Powers to Discredit Cranborne Statement Are Amusing.

London, Jan. 24.—The newspapers here printed Viscount Cranborne's recent statement in the House of Commons about Great Britain's attitude prior to and during the Spanish-American war in conspicuous parts of their issues. They made no comment upon it, and it has since attracted little public attention, until this morning, when, for the first time, prominence is given to it because of the discussion it has aroused in the United States and the replies thereto in the papers from their correspondents in the United States, giving their own views and extracts from the American press.

The Times, in an editorial article, says: "The eagerness of the European semi-official press to discredit Viscount Cranborne's statement is likely to defeat itself." The Times would suggest that Great Britain would willingly sanction M. Hanotaux's reported desire for evidence of the accuracy of Viscount Cranborne's published statement. The Times editorially states that it is yet forthcoming that the other powers were equally friendly as Great Britain, and until that evidence is forthcoming, the American public seem likely to remain convinced that England and England alone showed practical, effective friendship for their country in the day of her trial. Neither the press nor the British pretend that our conduct at that time was dictated wholly by considerations of sentiment. Our interests were at the stake of America, and we acted accordingly. We were honestly glad, as we always are, to see the great people who inherit our language, laws, religion and manners. We did them service at a very critical time. They recognized the fact long ago, and recognized it more clearly after Viscount Cranborne's careful announcement. They will recognize it more fully yet when the details of the negotiations are known. They are not ungrateful, as the tone of their chief journals and the words of their public men sufficiently show. NEWS OF SHERBROOKE.

Sherbrooke, Jan. 23.—(Special.)—A delegation of the directors of the Eastern Ontario Exhibition are in Quebec interested in the government in regard to a grant for the exhibition. At the annual meeting of the Sherbrooke Gas and Water Company the old directors were re-elected. Satisfactory reports were submitted of the business done during the year.

ROSSLAND MINERS' STRIKE.

Rossland, B.C., Jan. 21.—The result of the ballot for the calling off of the strike of the Leroi mine was not known yet. Members of the union have been informed that the executive committee will publish it in due time. The strike has been called off all that is required to discontinue the strike. It is generally conceded that the affirmative was strongly supported. Union men take the view of the matter and are looking forward with satisfaction to resuming work.

SANITARIUM FOR N. S.

Kentville, N.S., Jan. 24.—The Provincial Government has voted \$15,000 for a hospital for curable consumptives and has been looking for the most suitable and healthy place for its location. The site has already been chosen and a property on the outer limits of Kentville has been chosen, the deed given and the price of land, \$2,000 is paid. Next spring the Government will expend \$18,000 in suitable buildings here for the above hospital. The location is an ideal one.

SENATOR FOR JERSEY.

Trenton, N.J., Jan. 24.—Republican caucus to select a candidate for United States senator, to be elected by the Legislature, opened at the late General S. Sewall, agreed upon John F. Dryden, of Newark, president of the Prudential Insurance Company, on the 19th ballot. His principal rival in the contest here is Senator Stokes of Cumberland county, and former U.S. Attorney-General John W. Griggs.

A ROYAL MARRIAGE.

Vienna, Jan. 24.—The Archduchess Elizabeth, granddaughter of Emperor Francis Joseph, was married yesterday to Prince Otto von Wardenburg-Graetz, at the Chapel of the Hofburg, in the presence of Emperor Francis Joseph, Countess Lenyay, the bride's mother, and a number of princes and princesses belonging to the Imperial family.

BISHOP ROGERS RESIGNS.

St. John, N.B., Jan. 24.—It is understood that Bishop Rogers, of Chatham, has tendered his resignation to Rome, owing to his advanced age. It is probable that Rev. Dr. Thomas Casey, of Chatham, will succeed him.

SUCCEEDS MR. DOBELL.

Quebec, Jan. 24.—(Special.)—Ald. Geo. Langway, M.L.A., president of the Quebec Board of Trade, was elected yesterday afternoon to represent the Board on the Board of Harbor Commissioners, in the place of the late Hon. R. R. Dobell.

TORPEDO EXPLODED.

Paris, Jan. 24.—A telegram from Antwerp says that during torpedo practice on the coast of Belgium a torpedo exploded and several persons were injured.

Peking, Jan. 23.—The ministers of the powers here have attained the goal which has been their aim since intercourse between China and the powers began. They have been received as representatives of sovereigns equal in rank to the Chinese Emperor.

THE BOER HOPES.

London, Jan. 24.—Telegraphing from Paris, the correspondent of the Times says that Yves Guyot, in Le Siecle, declares that French Anglophobia is a Clerical malady, and is embodied in the Chamber only by the Right.

MISS HOBHOUSE'S SUIT.

London, Jan. 24.—Mr. Brodrick, Secretary of State for War, has refused to attend the service of papers on behalf of General Kitchener, Lord Miller and their subordinates, in an action brought by Miss Hobhouse to obtain redress for her husband's death by officials of Cape Town and her deportation from South Africa. Mr. Brodrick also refused to accept responsibility for the death of her husband, the action of the officials.

ONLY A RUMOR.

London, Jan. 24.—It is rumored in the lobby of the House of Commons that a Boer delegate from Acting President Schalkburg last June saw Lord Rosebery and submitted peace proposals to him. Lord Rosebery, as quoted Lord Salisbury, the Premier, with this fact, according to this source, declined to consider the matter on the ground that the war was coming to an end with the unconditional surrender of the Boers.

FATE OF THE CONDOR.

London, January 23.—The Admiralty has issued a notice in which it says it regrets that nothing has been heard of the British cruiser Condor since December 2, on which date she was reported to have been captured by the Germans. It adds that the arrangements to obtain news of the missing vessel tends to confirm the public fears that she has been extended to the United States.

A BRITISH PATROL WAS SURPRISED

Boers in Ambush Swept Down on the Little Party—Miss Hobhouse's Case.

Ladybrand, Orange River Colony, Jan. 24.—Colonel Seath sent a patrol of 200 men, including the 10th Sunday night in the direction of Belmontsberg, twenty miles north of Ladybrand. At dawn Monday the patrol captured a hundred horses and three armed and four unarmed Boers. Later a small detachment with some natives were sent to take force, down by the Boers on a farm at Lindenberg. Two waggoners were taken along. The escort consisted of twenty-five Yeomanry and one officer, the main patrol going in another direction, thinking that the country near the farm was clear of Boers. As the detachment was passing through the hills they suddenly encountered 150 burghers who, springing from their hiding places, headed them, killing six and wounding four. Owing to the Boers' superior numbers, the patrol was forced to retreat.

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DR. ROBERTSON'S LAST LETTER

Toronto, Jan. 22.—A pathetic memorial of the late Dr. Robertson, in a letter which was prepared by him a few days before he died to be sent to a number of Presbyterians whose names are with Rev. Dr. Warden. This letter deals with the conditions on the Western home mission field and indicates Dr. Robertson's solicitude for the needs of the Church in the Northwest.

The letter is an appeal for more funds to carry on the work. It informs the reader that "But for a contribution of \$15,000 from British Columbia and a special collection from our own Church, the committee would have closed the past year \$20,000 in debt. The outlook just now is not cheering, the fund being upwards of \$50,000 in debt. The receipts for 1901 are less than for 1900 at this date, and yet the liabilities for this year—owing to extensions in New Ontario and the West—are higher. The grants promised last spring are \$25,000 above the normal revenue of last year."

NEEDS OF MISSIONS.

Missions are increasing at the rate of twenty-three per cent., and revenue only ten per cent. Last year Ontario gave

about twenty cents per communicant, to plant and maintain missions and augmented congregations in Western Canada. Last year from 70,000 to 80,000 settlers found a home in the West, and the immigration of 1902 is expected to reach 100,000, not 150,000. From the United States, Eastern Canada, Britain and the continent of Europe they come. If the foreigners are not educated and noble loyal, they are sure to prove a menace to the free play of popular government. It is not evangelized and brought up to a moral level, they are sure to drag us down to theirs. This we cannot afford. Our ideals and conduct are not high enough now. At present, about 100,000 English-speaking settlers in the West are without ordinances and a large mass of foreigners are in the same sad plight. Of these alone, 50,000 are big sheep without a shepherd, and their children are without schools. These foreigners are receiving accessions from Europe every year, and the bulk among them is high. Neglected, what shall the harvest be?

DO NOT REG FROM BRITAIN.

"Encouragements are many. During the past ten years the population of the West increased eighty-three per cent.; the adherents of the Presbyterian Church increased 187 per cent., and her communicants 168 per cent. Missions and augmented congregations are becoming self-supporting every year—about twenty are supposed to go off the lists next spring, and become huddlers in the general work of the Church.

"For work done in the Kootenay and Klondike, the Church has been highly commended—even by Roman Catholics. Missionaries have been a saving salt where drinking, carnality and gambling hold high carnival. Past success is a potent plea for aggressiveness. The respect in the West for law and order is largely due to missionary effort.

A larger revenue is imperative—where it is to come, and from Britain, they think Canada abundantly able to support her own home missions. Nor, with the means at our disposal, should we ask Britain for money.

The general contributions are rising, but too slowly for the present emergency; hence an appeal is made to the well-to-do members of the church to contribute specially for a few years. In addition to the contributions of the people connected with a mission, \$250 will support one missionary. To make a more prosperous times, \$250 is a mere bagatelle. Scores of people could give this amount and not a few could double or even quadruple it, and not feel pinched."
