Lightning Sets Fire To Barn At Starks Corners

A severe thunder storm last Sunday night was the cause of a fire in a Stark's Corners barn owned by Mrs. John Wickens. Noticed first by Willard Sparling, the barn seemed to burst into flames when struck and was rapidly demolished.

The fire occurred while church was in progress, but notwithstanding this, the neighbours rushed to the scene. There was nothing to be done except prevent fire from spreading. There were 500 bales of hay in the barn, as well as some straw, lumber and timber.

The barn was situated on the Wickens farm at Starks Corners, some five miles from the Wickens house down by the river. Mrs. Wickens was not at the farm when the fire broke out. The loss was not covered by insurance. No plans for rebuilding have been made.

Three Killed, One Injured; In Car Accident East of Quyon

Three natives of the Shawville area died in an auto crash early Wednesday morning, half a mile east of Quyon, and a fourth lies injured in Pontiac Community Hospital.

Dead are: Miss Margo Dagg, 19, of Aymer, Que., only child of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Dagg, of Aymer and niece of Edgar and Arthur Hodgins of Shawville.

Donald Thompson, 31 of Eastview, Ont., son of Mr. and Mrs. Graham Thompson of R. R. 3, Shawville.

Graham Russell, 20, of Eastview, Ont., son of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew K. Russell, a nephew of Donald Thompson, and grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Graham Thompson.

In hospital in Shawville is Carol Thompson, 28, driver of the car, and a brother of Donald Thompson, now on leave from the Navy in Halifax. He is suffering broken ribs and shock.

The car, a 1959 model, left

the highway on a curve half a mile east of Quyon at 12.15 a. m. and crashed into a tree about three feet off the edge of the road. The vehicle was a total loss. Donald Thompson and Margo Dagg died instantly, and Graham Russell died as he was being transferred to Hayes' ambulance. Dr. R. M. Hudson of Quyon attended at the scene of the accident.

Dr. H. E. Laycock, coroner, of Fort Coulonge, called an inquest at 9.30 a. m. on Wednesday and shortly thereafter adjourned it until the recovery of Carol Thompson.

The victims were returning to Ottawa after driving Andrew Russell, father of Graham, to Bristol to catch the westbound CNR train for his home in North Bay.

Funeral services will be held for the three victims on Friday afternoon, from W. J. Hayes Funeral Home to Shawville United Church. Rev. E. I. Johnston will officiate, and burial will be in Maple Grove Cemetery. The Dagg service will take place at 2.30 p. m. and a double funeral will be held for Donald Thompson and Graham Russell at 3.30 p. m.

Shawville Council Preparing By-law Re Merchandising By Non-Residents

Following the publishing of an editorial last week on the subject of out of town businesses selling merchandise on the sidewalks of Shawville, two young men from Renfrew by the name of Hanford appeared at the Shawville Council meeting on Monday night to complain about the content of the editorial. They stated to the councilmen that they didn't just walk in and set up shop on our sidewalks, but consulted the secretary-treasurer of the town, as well as a lawyer in Campbell's Bay before doing so. Secretary Hayes informed them that there was no bylaw on the books to prevent them selling from the sidewalks, and this was, they said, corroborated by a lawyer from Campbell's Bay.

The Hanfords stated that they had no wish to make bad friends over the episode, and wished only to do what was right. They had come, they said, to make their position clear in this respect. They were courteously heard out by Council, were told that the whole matter would be further discussed by Council, and that they would be advised by mail of the outcome.

The episode terminated with a not-so-courteous exchange between one of the Hanfords and the editor of The Equity, touched off by Hanford embarking on instructions to the editor as to what to report to readers of the paper regarding the matter.

Later in the evening Edgar Hodgins met Council on the same subject, opening his remarks with a word of congratulation to the editor of The Equity for making the townspeople aware of what was happening on our sidewalks. He continued by requesting Council on behalf of Shawville merchants, to give consideration to the passing of a by-law which would effectively prevent out of town businesses from selling merchandise in Shawville. Final decision was embodied in a notice of motion to introduce a by-law at the next meeting of Council which would accomplish this object.

Mrs. H. H. Horner Passes At Radford

Mrs. H. H. Horner, a well-known personality in Shawville and district for many years, died quietly in her sleep at her home in Radford, July 1st. She was in her 73rd year.

Born Angelina Hodgins, at Radford, Quebec, daughter of the late Thomas M. Hodgins and his wife Mary Hanna. Mrs. Horner married her late husband, Henry Hingston Horner in 1910 at Radford. With the exception of seven years spent in the Canadian West, where her husband died in 1914, she spent her entire life in the Radford area on the Hodgins homestead.

As a resident of the district, Mrs. Horner had a keen interest in and a vast knowledge of the early days of the church and community. She was a devout member and an ardent supporter of all forward-looking community enterprises. When the Radford Hospital Auxiliary was formed in 1948, Mrs. Horner was its first president and she held offices at various times in other community organizations.

The funeral of the late Angelina (Lina) Horner was held on Friday, July 3rd from Radford United Church with interment in the cemetery of Norman United Church, Charleris. The officiating clergyman was the Rev. E. I. Johnston of Shawville United Church, assisted by Mr. E. V. Cook, lay minister of the Radford church. The organist was Mrs. Hubert Hamilton.

The pall bearers were Messrs. Russell Mee, Bill Hanna, Clarence Brownlee, Marshal Chamberlain, and her nephews Brent Horner and Dr. Bruce Horner.

Mrs. Horner will be keenly missed from Radford Community. Her kindly disposition and keen interest in all things relating to community life made her a prominent and much loved figure in the district.
