20,000 Expected At Special Coronation Celebration Here

Prize Bulbs Feature Of Spring Flower Show Opened Yesterday



Allen B. Oxley Presented Award At IRE Banquet

NEW YORK, N.Y. — Allen B. Oxley, of 449 Strathcona avenue, Chief Engineer of RCA Victor Company, Limited, in Montreal, has been voted a Fellow in the Institute of Radio Engineers. The fellowship becomes effective January 1, and formal presentation of the Fellow Award was made to Mr. Oxley at the annual IRE banquet at the Waldorf Astoria in New York March 25.

The fellowship is being awarded "for his many contributions in the field of radio manufacturing and sustained support of radio engineering activities in Canada."

Mr. Oxley has been an IRE Director since 1950 and a senior member of the institute since 1925. He was responsible for organizing Canadian IRE branches during the 30's. He has been an outstanding figure in the field of wireless communication since the earliest days of radio and has done outstanding work in both Canada and England. Mr. Oxley's association with

Westmount Plans Big Program

The City of Westmount will not be represented at the forthcoming Coronation in Westminster Abbey, it was decided at a meeting of Westmount Council, but instead, the ceremony will be observed in Westmount with the staging of a gigantic Coronation Celebration on the day the Queen is crowned.

Decision not to send a representative to the Coronation followed receipt of a telegram by Mayor Roy Campbell from the Under Secretary of State of Canada, which stated that the Westmount Coronation Committee would be allowed to nominate any member of the Council and his consort as official representatives at the ceremony.

Although Mayor Campbell said that it would not be possible for him to make the trip, it had been disclosed earlier that the Department of Secretary of State would have been willing to accept the nomination of the mayor and his wife.

T. J. Hughes, Manager of the City of Westmount, said that all residents of the district would be able to participate in the Coronation celebration planned for Westmount. It is expected that some 20,000 persons will be present for the celebration.

Donations Needed

It was also pointed out that in view of the very careful control of expenses to which the Council had committed itself, it would not be in the interest of the taxpayers that any significant contribution would be made toward the expenses of a representative to the Coronation.

Mr. Hughes said that the money would be used in connection with the local program of Coronation celebration.

The Coronation Committee has already submitted a proposed coronation program to the General Committee of Council.

Plans call for a tree planting ceremony to take place in Queen Elizabeth Park on the afternoon of the Coronation.

The evening celebration will be held in the Westmount Athletic Grounds where community singing, and a military display by various Westmount Units will take place. A choir of 600 pupils from schools throughout the Westmount district will perform with the evening culminated by a giant fire works display.

The Coronation Committee consists of Alderman R. Panet Raymond, Commissioner of Parks, who is Chairman of the Committee; Alderman A. Turner Bone, Commissioner of Public Works and City Manager T. J. Hughes.

Church Of Advent Rector Vacates Pulpit End Of May

Rev. Sydenham B. Lindsay, rector of the Church of the Advent, has resigned his charge and will vacate the pulpit of the church at the end of May on the feast of Trinity and the 50th anniversary of his first communion.

Mr. Lindsay, a native of Montreal, took up church extension work on behalf of the Anglican communion in the city after graduating in Arts at McGill University. Later, he became one of the assistant clergy at the Church of Columbia in NDG. In 1929 he was appointed assistant at St. Simon's Church in St. Henry and became rector, being the last to hold that position as the edifice was sold and the congregation dissolved as

"Three-in-One" Drive For Blind Starts April 7

A notable first step toward the solution of Montreal's problem of multiple appeals is seen in the announcement of the three-in-one campaign on behalf of the blind here. The Combined Appeal for the Blind, incorporating in a single campaign the needs of the Montreal Association of the Blind, the French-Canadian Association of the Blind, Inc., and the Canadian National Institute of the Blind, will seek an objective of \$250,000 in a two-week campaign beginning April 7.

According to Joint General Chairman Arthur Cross, M. A. Blain Q.C., and Frank W. Collins, this is probably the first instance in which the language barrier has been crossed to achieve unified campaigning in Montreal. One of the most formidable hurdles in campaigning in Montreal has been the difficulty of presenting an appeal to both the French and English speaking sections of the community. This difference has accounted for much duplication in campaigning for the same cause. This year, both French and English associations, have joined forces for greater economy and effectiveness in serving a common cause.

Municipalities within Greater Montreal have been organized in readiness for an effective campaign, district chairman report. The City of Westmount has been divided into six geographical areas, each with a district chairman and teams of workers. District chairmen for Westmount are Mrs. Gerald Bruck, 24 Ramezay Road, Mrs. Robert Coristine, 4345 Montrose Ave., Mrs. Ruth Shaw, 3222 Roslyn Ave., Mrs. D. W. Ferrier, 630 Carlton Ave., Mrs. John E. Duquet, 99 Gordon Crescent, and Mme. Lionel Coté, 4453 Western Ave.

All district chairmen report that canvassing teams are prepared to do their utmost to explain the special services which the combined associations render to the blind population of the city. Among these are a wide range of indispensable projects for blind people of all ages and types. Support will be sought for the Residential School for Blind Children, for the for the Aged Blind, and for the maintenance of braille and talking book libraries. The three organiza-

tions united in the forthcoming campaign also list a need for funds for work in the prevention of blindness, social work, home teaching and recreational activities among their campaign objectives. Needy cases need supplementary allowances, particularly among the newly blind who need time to adjust themselves to a changed world, and, possibly most inspiring of all, the work done to fit blind people to become independent and self-supporting, requires the facilities for special training, a job placement service, and industrial workshops.

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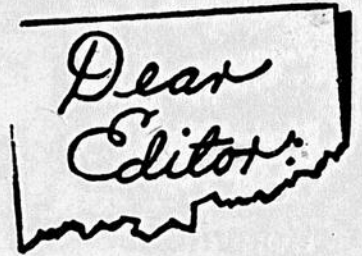

A New Portrait Of Her Majesty



The beautiful portrait of Queen Elizabeth, reproduced above, was completed last summer by a woman who is Britain's most famous living painter of royalty. Margaret Lindsay Williams was no stranger to the Queen when she arrived at Buckingham Palace to do the portrait, as she had painted the Queen three times before and had also done portraits of Edward VII, Queen Alexandra, King George V, Queen Mary, Queen Mother Elizabeth, and the Duke of Windsor.

The above portrait was the first done of Elizabeth as Queen. For the occasion, Her Majesty wore a gown designed by Hartnell, of London, for the royal tour of Canada. It was a ball gown of blue and gold embossed brocade on an off-white ground encrusted with gold. The dress was trimmed with blue velvet and billowed out in crinoline skirt.

Miss Williams had told the Queen's lady-in-waiting that she would like to make the portrait "a regal painting."

The Queen smilingly obliged and appeared for her sitting wearing a diamond tiara, a diamond necklace and the Ribbon and Star of the Garter. On her left wrist she wore a platinum bracelet watch, one of her favorite pieces of jewelry.

The Queen was completely natural, and when poses were discussed Her Majesty gladly tried out various positions until the most suitable pose was decided upon. She chatted amiably and during rest periods inspected the canvas to see how the portrait was taking shape.

Winter Parking Ban Here Lifted; Results Excellent

Winter parking restrictions in Westmount were lifted this week and Police Chief R. A. Byford, said that the experiment of keeping one side of the street open this winter produced excellent results.

The restrictions in force between Dec 1 and March 31, were destined to facilitate snow removal operations. Due to the mild winter, however, full benefit could not be obtained, the police chief said.

The chief also praised motorists for their careful observance of the restrictions and pointed out that first offenders were given only caution tickets. A second offence ticket brought \$4 fine.

The restrictions proved particularly of assistance to motorists on the up-hill streets, he said.

The Cross Which Christ Found Heavy Has Not Lightened With the Years

As Easter comes again we find the world still busy beating its ploughshares into guns, tanks, airplanes and other weapons of war. Eight years after World War II the world is still restless; there is no peace, nor in the foreseeable future can we hope to find the peace which Christ hoped two thousand years ago would permeate the hearts of His people. The Cross which Christ found heavy has not lightened with the years.

Jesus faced the Cross with a faith that made the symbol of defeat a symbol of triumph. This is the faith that challenged a civilization in disintegration to build up a

newer and finer civilization, and to make that faith dominant. Emerging from the new day which dawned with the Resurrection of our Lord, men, through faith, became aware of forces working towards the creation of a better world, a deeper instinct to spiritual needs and a newer conception of their relationship to God and to their fellow men.

This is the faith which challenges the world today: "The faith that we can do away with war and poverty and disease must take possession of us before we can move into a world set free from these ancient scourges," says an eminent divine.

It is evident in a rapidly changing world that racial hatreds, industrial strifes, international wars, religious controversies, cannot go on much further. Nor can we much longer survive conditions brought about by fear and greed. We must either rise above them or be submerged.

The remedy is so simple — just intelligence and fidelity to the teachings of Jesus. Nothing stands in the way except the obstacles we have either put in the way of permitted to remain there... Few of us appreciate the possible splendor of the human life at its best, and few of us seem to believe that the best is within the reach of the ordinary.

At this Eastertide, let us rededicate ourselves to the cause of Christ; let us turn again towards the light that will lead the world from the dangerous path it is travelling; that a long and lasting peace may again return to the world.

Are we to believe an authority which denies God's spiritual command relating to perfection, an authority which Jesus proved to be false? He healed sickness in defiance of what is called material law, but in accordance with God's law, the law of Mind."

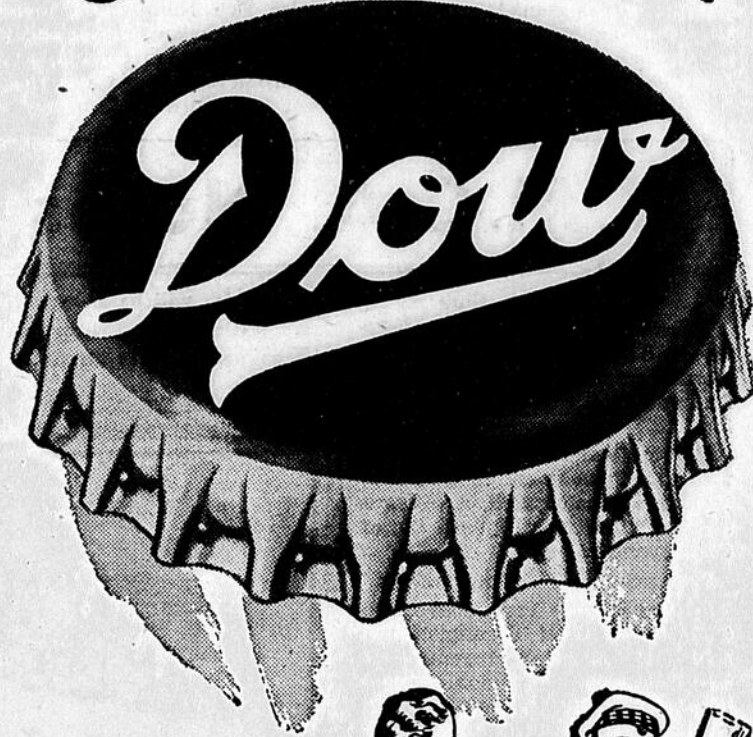
The Maple Leafs defeated Rangers 9-5, in an exhibition game played on the hour following the championship game.

longing for a taste of the free life he once knew, at great danger: to himself and his wife, fled from Hungary hidden in the back of a truck. He went to France where he fenced at l'Academie d'Armes de France, and graduated from there as a Maître d'Armes. Two years ago, he came to Montreal, the fencing capital of Canada, and now is firmly established here.

Miss Eva Kun was a member of the Hungarian team at the 1948 Olympic Games in London. At the conclusion of the games, she refused to return to Hungary and

asked for asylum in England. She came to Montreal over a year ago.

After building up the club, the natural thing to do was to look for new competition. This was found at the Salle Santelli in New York and invitations were sent to members of the American Olympic fencing team recently returned from Helsinki. So at 3.30 Saturday afternoon, April 4, at the Westmount Y, a fencing exhibition will take place between the best in Canada and the States.

The Americans will be headed by Giorgio Santelli, coach of several American Olympic teams, who has his own salle in New York. Giorgio is the son of Mr. Halo Santelli, who, incidentally, was the instructor of both Mr. Vamos and Miss Eva Kun in Hungary.

This exhibition will present the most imposing array of fencing champions ever to assemble under one roof in Canada, and will not likely be repeated for some time.
