SEVENTEEN DAYS LATER FROM EUROPE.

FROM OUR EXTRA OF YESTERDAY. [From the Montreal Herald Extra, Wednesday afternoon, April 24th.]

The Royal Mail Steamer Acadia, Captain Ryrie, arrived at Halifax on the 19th, and at Boston on Sunday the 21st, at noon, after a tedious passage, caused by a continuance of westerly gales, and the great quantity of heavy field ice which she encountered. She was also detained ten hours off Boston harbour in a fog.

A summary of the news will be found below, for which we are indebted to Messrs. Willauer & Smith's European Times of the 4th instant.

The Grain Market had been gradually falling. In Liverpool, Canada Flour was dull of sale, and could not be quoted higher than 30s. Ashes were also dull: Pots at 26s. 3d. to 26s. 6d.; and Pearls 26s. 6d. to 27s.

The intelligence from the manufacturing districts is not so favorable as that received by the last two packets. The demand for goods and yarns in the Manchester market was for the week previous to the sailing of the Acadia, greatly depressed, in consequence, it is said, of the corresponding depression in the state of the Liverpool Cotton Market; but as soon as confidence is restored as to prices a revival of trade may be confidently anticipated.

Money continues very abundant, and consols have reached, we believe, the highest price since 1737, viz., 99 5/8—3/4. This fact speaks volumes for the stability of Sir Robert Peel's administration.

Mr. O'Connell has been making a tour of the principal towns in England. The Anti-Corn-Law League has been, but most unsuccessfully, straining every nerve in contesting each parliamentary seat that has become vacant of late. Its last defeats were at Christchurch and Hastings.

The Continental news brought by this packet is of no great importance. The most striking event recorded is the death of Bernadotte, King of Sweden. Sault is now the last surviving of Napoleon's Marshals. The latest accounts from Spain are to the 26th ult. & represent matters as being comparatively quiet in that unhappy country. The Queen Mother was at Madrid, and a general amnesty was spoken of.

CORN LAWS.—On the 26th a proposal by Mr. Hutt, to resolve in committee that corn imported from British possessions in South Africa, India, and Australia be subject to the same duty as from Canada, was rejected by 117 to 47.

The New Zealand Company has been compelled to suspend its operations, as, after expending upwards of £300,000, notwithstanding the compact entered into three years ago by Government, it is yet unsecured by the grant of a single acre from the Crown.

The Hibernia arrived home in 9 1/2 days. The Great Western has been sold and will not return to New York. The British government, it is said, intend to reduce the duty on tea.

Sir Robert Peel has given an authorized contradiction to the rumours that Her Majesty intends to visit Berlin, in the month of May.

THE SPRING TRADE TO CANADA.—It gives us the greatest pleasure to learn that our spring ships already on the berth for Canada have received full cargoes, more goods being about to be exported to that valuable colony this season, from this city, than for several years past. The Bellona and Caledonia cleared on Wednesday with full cargoes, and a number of other ships about to sail from the Broomielaw are also well filled with merchandize.—(Glasgow paper.)

THE CORN-LAWS.—DECLARATION OF MINISTERS.—The Duke of Wellington from his place in the House of Lords, as a member of the Government, used these expressions on Monday last with respect to the Corn-laws. "As to the Corn-laws, I have never changed the opinions that I held upon that question. I recommended to your Lordships to adopt the present Corn-laws, and I now recommend it to you to adhere to them."

RUMOUR SUPPRESSION OF COUNTRY NOTES.—The impression has become general that Sir Robert Peel intends, on the renewal of the Bank Charter, to prohibit, after a certain time, the issue of notes by Private or Joint Stock Banks.

Several of the Ultra-Tories have determined, when the sentence is passed upon Mr. O'Connell, to move his expulsion and that of his son from the House of Commons.

Government, it is said, have determined to afford every facility towards the removal of the obstacles to the successful commencement of a grand experiment in Ireland with reference to railroads.

COURT CIRCULAR.—His Majesty the King of the Belgians and suite, who arrived at Woolwich in the Princess Alice steam packet, from Ostend, at a quarter before eight o'clock yesterday evening, reached Buckingham Palace at ten minutes past nine o'clock, where His Majesty was received by the Queen and the Queen of the Belgians, attended by the ladies and gentlemen in waiting.—(Standard, 3d April.)

MR. O'CONNELL.—Every arrangement has been made for the appeal to the House of Lords; and Sir Thomas Wilde, Mr. Kelly, and Mr. Sergeant Murphy are retained for the traversers. There was some little delay about allowing the usual license for these Queen's Counsel to appear for Mr. O'Connell, but all this is now concluded.

IMPRISONMENT OF MR. O'CONNELL.—It is stated that in the event of the imprisonment of Mr. O'Connell, Whit-Monday, the 27th May, will be fixed upon as a day of general prayer and humiliation throughout Ireland, and it is suggested that the liberals and catholics, throughout Christendom, should be invited to participate in this object.

Never within the memory of the oldest stock-broker now living has there been such a state of things upon the Stock-Exchange as now exists. There appears a universal desire to "buy" stock, and the jobbers are in a very excited state. Consols have this morning been done at the high price of 99 3/4, and the broker acting for the Commissioners of Savings' Banks purchased a parcel of Consols at 99 5/8.

IRON TRADE.—Great activity prevails in the iron market, and prices continue to advance. The price of Welch bar iron is now £5 per ton, free on board in the British Channel, and the makers, having sold pretty largely at this rate, are not disposed to contract heavily without obtaining even a higher price. Scotch pig iron has advanced 5s per ton, 55s per ton for No. 1 being now the general quotation, and upon Scotch manufactured iron, we believe an advance

of 10s per ton has taken place. The Staffords hire and Shropshire iron masters held their usual meeting preliminary to quarter-day, on the 28th, at Dudley, when we understand they will declare an advance upon manufactured iron of at least 20s per ton.—*Glasgow paper.*

FURTHER EXTRACTS.

LIVERPOOL, April 1st.—CHARGE OF EMBEZZLEMENT.—At the Police-court, on Friday, a highly respectable looking person, named John Swainson Royle, was placed before Mr. Rushton on a charge of embezzling various sums of money to the amount of between £1,200 and £1,400, the property of Messrs. Jackson, Woolfall, and Percival, bottle manufacturers, of Manchester. Mr. Patchett appeared for the prosecution, and Mr. James defended the accused. Three cases were added against Royle, wherein he had received moneys belonging to Messrs. Jackson, Woolfall, and Percival, from parties who owed them accounts, for which he had not given them credit in the books. The first was a sum of £262 16s. 1d., paid to the prisoner in 1839 by Messrs. Owens, Johnson and Co.; the second was £11 5s. 6d., from Mr. Kearns in 1836; and the third a sum of £59 paid by Mr. Hickson, Mr. Woolfall produced the books and proved that no credit was given to the parties for the sums received by the prisoner, who absconded to America in 1839. At that time the various sums received by the prisoner, for which he had not accounted, were entered to his debit in the ledger, but he positively swore that no offer of compromise had been made to the prisoner, that he should not be prosecuted if 10s. in the pound were paid on the amount of his defalcations. Two respectable witnesses were called by Mr. James, and they swore that an offer to forego any prosecution had been made by the prosecutors, on the payment of a sum of £600, or 10s. in the pound on the sums which he had not accounted for. Mr. Jackson, one of the firm, not being present, the case, after a lengthened investigation, was adjourned until Saturday, in order that he might be examined. On Saturday Mr. Jackson was examined; after which the prisoner was ordered to be committed for trial at the Sessions, but was at the same time informed, that he might be liberated on finding bail, himself in £500 and two sureties in £ 50 each. The informations in the case will be read over to-day.

CONSECRATION OF THE NEW HEBREW SYNAGOGUE, PILGRIM-STREET.—On Monday evening the ceremony of consecrating the synagogue for the new Hebrew congregation took place. A great number of ladies and gentlemen were present. The building is the one formerly known by the title of Paris's room, and is capable of holding about 150 or 200 persons.

The Archbishop of York is now the oldest member of the House of Lords, being 87 years of age.

Major General Sir Robert Sale is to be Quartermaster-General to the Queen's troops in India, vice Churchill, deceased.

PROPERTY OF FELONS.—The Judges are of opinion, that the treasury order respecting the property of felons is illegal: no person has a right to take property from a prisoner except it had connexion with the case, or some other felony; the order, in fact, authorized the police to commit larcenies on prisoners.

CANADA COMPANY.—On Wednesday the half-yearly meeting of the proprietors of shares in this corporation was held at the Company's House, St. Helen's-place, London, pursuant to the terms of the charter, Mr. C. Franks, in the chair. It was resolved unanimously, that Mr. C. Franks should be re-elected as governor, and that Sir J. Easthope, Mr. A. Humphreys, and Mr. Stokes should be re-appointed as directors. Mr. Wilson was again appointed as auditor. The Governor then proceeded to state the operations for the past year. The sales of land in the Crown reserves had been 12,838 acres, at an average of 13s. 7d. per acre, and in the Huron tract, there has been disposed of 8,705 acres, at an average of 12s. 1d. per acre, making a total of 21,543 acres, the produce of which had been £13,804 currency. This was independently of the town lots that had been purchased. There had been leased of Crown reserves 88,805 acres, producing an annual rental of £2,769, or equal to 10s. 5d. per acre, and the leases granted in the Huron tract, for the year ending on the 31st Dec. last, were 63,907 acres. The leases were granted for 12 years, at a rental by which, if regularly paid, the land would become the property of the occupier, and, consequently, alienated from the company. The total quantity of land leased and sold was 194,255 acres. The governor then read a statement of the receipts and expenditure of the corporation from its commencement, which was considered satisfactory. The company had 1,378,189 acres of land paid for, but still unsold. The quantity purchased from the Government was 2,464,413 acres; of this there had been 982,941 acres sold, and 123,313 acres had yet to be paid for, the company having the option of taking the latter. Since the commencement of the year there had been sold in the Crown reserves 1,500 acres, and in the Huron tract 800 acres. There had been leased in the former 3,800 acres, and in the latter 7,290 acres, an increase over the operations of the same period of 1842 of 3,753 acres. In the receipts there had been an increase this year of £2,842. The plan of leasing the land had been most beneficial, and the rents, hitherto, had been punctually paid. The passing of the Canadian Corn Bill, which had come into operation in October last, had been productive already of the most beneficial effects, and no doubt could be entertained that it would continue to be so. Through the exertions of the company's commissioners, Mr. Jones and Mr. Widder, the sales of the company's lands had been greatly increased, whilst those on the part of the Government had been but few. The Governor read extracts from the correspondence received from the commissioners, in which the rising prosperity of the settlers was spoken most highly of. Markets for their produce were easily found, and for cash. They believed that emigration, this year, would be considerably increased, as many from Scotland, as well as Protestant families from Ireland, were coming to join their relatives who had already settled in Upper Canada. An extensive shipment of flour was expected to take place from Montreal. The colonists on the company's lands were improving, as was shown by the remittances made to their poorer relatives in the United Kingdom, which, upon an average, had, in the last year, been £9 for each individual who had sent home money to fathers, mothers, &c., through the company's agency, and which was done gratuitously. The total amount so remitted from Canada to the company last year was £2,990; and by the last letters £600 in addition, similarly destined, were advised. This showed that the settlers upon the company's lands were prospering.—(Hear, hear!)—and that the position in which the colony was placed was improving. The accounts were ordered to be printed, thanks were returned to the directors, and the meeting adjourned.

Two vessels have been despatched within the last few days from the port of Hull to engage in the Greenland and Davis' Straits whale fishery.

(From Willner and Smith's European Times, Liverpool, April 4.)

A meeting of the principal supporters of Sir R. Peel's government, in the House of Commons, took place on Tuesday, at the official residence of the Premier. The meeting had reference to the late defeats on Lord Ashley's amendment respecting the Factory Bill. As a considerable number of the ordinary supporters of the government have on this ill-fated subject become somewhat restive, Sir Robert threatened them, it is said, with a dissolution of parliament unless they behaved better for the future. School-boys never dreaded the application of the birch more than members of parliament do, facing their constituents with all its uncertainty, and what is worse, its expense. It is only necessary for the Minister to utter such a threat, in order to command implicit obedience. Nevertheless, it is singular that in a House of Commons where he has a working majority of nearly 100, the Conservative Prime Minister is compelled to keep the untractable spirits of his party in check by fear, not love.

Parliament has adjourned for the Easter holidays, and will meet again on the 15th. The session hitherto, half of which is usually considered to have expired at Easter, has been singularly barren of interest. There has been abundance of talk, but little work—no practical results unfortunately.

Almost every description of West India produce has been dull of sale recently, the result of the present unsettled feeling respecting the intentions of the Government.

The principal grain markets of the kingdom have been dull, and the duty has declined to 17s. per quarter. In foreign wheat there has been little doing.

The latest accounts from Madrid, which are to the 26th ult., state that the levee held on that day by the Queen-Mother was most brilliant. A general amnesty was talked of, and the butcheries of Roncali were disavowed. The recent accounts from Italy, as will be seen by referring to the news under that head, indicate a formidable breeze in that unfortunate but lovely land.

The following New York vessels have arrived in Liverpool since our last, having, all, with a few or no exceptions, made rapid and successful passages:—March 15, the Rochester, Britton; same day, the Garrick, Trask; March 22, the Sea, Edwards; March 23, the Hibernia, Bunting; same day, the Oxford, Rathbone; March 24, the Southerner, —; March 25, the Patrick Henry, Delano; March 26, the Ellerslie, —; March 29, the Henry Biss, On the 1st instant, no less than four vessels arrived here from New York, the Virginian, Allen; the Cohota, Hepburn; the Atlantic, Mallet; and the Peter Hattrick, Post. Thirteen vessels have, therefore, reached us with valuable cargoes on board.

The splendid steamer Hibernia, Captain Judkins, the success of whose voyages has thrown all previous triumphs of ocean navigation into the shade, sustained her high reputation on her homeward trip. She performed the run from Boston in twelve, and from Halifax in nine and a half days.

OUR VISIT TO CANADA AND THE UNITED STATES.

It is our pleasing duty to announce that Mr. Edward Willner, of the firm of Willner and Smith, is about to perform what he has long desired, but from the press of business engagements and other circumstances requiring his personal supervision, has been unable sooner to accomplish—visit the United States and Canada. Connected nearly a quarter of a century with the literary institutions, and the periodical press of that vast continent, he is known by report to the reading public of America; and it will afford him sincere pleasure to come in personal contact with those with whom he is now doing business, not less than with those who may wish to open accounts with his establishment. His stay in the principal cities must necessarily be brief, from the pressing nature of his engagements at home. Mr. Willner intends to sail on the 19th instant, in the steam ship Hibernia, and he hopes to be in Boston and New York early in May.

Her Majesty's brig Childers is now on her passage from China for England, with 1,000,000 of dollars.

Coal depots for the use of the navy steam vessels upon the respective stations are about to be established by the British Admiralty, on the Isle of Ascension, St. Helena, and Sierra Leone.

A rumour has for some time been current that it is intended to reduce our naval establishment afloat. This refers to the sailing ships only, for the First Lord of the Admiralty has expressly stated that "it is the determination of the Admiralty to increase the naval strength of the country as regarded steamers."

The American dwarf, General Tom Thumb, accompanied by his guardian, Mr. P. T. Barnum, of New York, had the honour of attending at Buckingham palace on Saturday evening, when the general exhibited his clever imitations of Napoleon, &c., which elicited the approbation of her Majesty and the royal circle.

Queen Victoria and Prince Albert will visit Berlin about the 15th of May next.

The transport, Pestonjee Bomanjee, Lieut. Still, is looked for from Barbadoes, with the remainder of the 59th regiment.

Meetings in aid of the Free Church of Scotland continue to be held in this country, and considerable sums are being collected.

An entertainment is to be given to Mr. O'Connell, in Dublin, immediately after his arrival from Cork, Wednesday, the 10th of April, has been named.

Rebecca seems to have commenced her outrages again in South Wales, for, on the 27th ult., a gate was destroyed at Cardigan, which was within six yards of the county goal.

Sir Henry Hallford, the eminent court physician, died on the 9th instant, at his house in London. He was in his 78th year. His title and estates fall to his son. The presidency of the College of Physicians is vacant by this event.

The Viscount de Contades died a few days ago at Paris, from the following comparatively slight cause:—Walking along the street only a few days before, he fell and broke his thumb. The pain brought on fever, which terminated his life.

DREADFUL MURDER IN TIPPERARY.—On Monday se'night, a man, named Keating, a decent farmer, was murdered in the noon-day. He resided near Ardinnan, county Tipperary. His two nephews committed the act, having first ordered a labourer to go out of sight! The old lease of these persons' farms had just expired, but the landlord had retained them in possession. Some squabbles consequently arose between the families, and at length they quarrelled about a limekin, upon which the nephews murdered the uncle, by beating his skull to pieces with stones.

CHURCH PATRONAGE.—The Dublin Evening Mail states that Sir Robert Peel has determined that the patronage of the Irish Church should only be bestowed on those clergymen who are favourable to the National System of Education in Ireland.

The gallant Lieutenant-Colonel Reilly died lately, at Louth, while visiting his brother.

On the 25th instant, Colonel John P. Brown, C. B., aged 77.

Lately, Sir Francis Drummond, Bart. He is succeeded in his title and estates by his son, Captain James Walker Drummond, of the Grenadier Guards.

Major General W. H. Beckwith, died at Chester on Sunday last. General Beckwith had sold out of the army for many years past.

The Earl of Lonsdale expired at his residence, Park-house, Twickenham, on Tuesday evening. His lordship had been on the half-pay of the 84th Foot since November, 1794.

Our readers in the United States and Canada will learn with surprise and regret that the Steam Ship Great Western will not again visit New York. She has been purchased by the Peninsular and Oriental Steam Ship Company for £32,000; and will immediately undergo a complete repair and refitting at an estimated expense of eight thousand pounds.—She will, at first, be placed on the Alexandria station, in order to give time for repairs to the Oriental and Great Liverpool, which have now been running a long time; but ultimately, it is intended to place her on the Bombay station. The Great Western and her able commander Lieut. Hosken leave this port and New York with a character which will do honour to both in every part of the world.

The Great Western's first cost was £61,671. It is stated that she will cost the Great Western Company for boilers, repairs, &c., now, £8000. Deducting this sum from the price paid by the Peninsular and Oriental Company for the steamer, it will leave only £24,000 to the Bristol Company, as the sum they receive for this fine vessel.

The general diet of Hungary had adopted, without any discussion, by a majority of 41 votes against 8, a motion for the emancipation of the Jews.

Mr. O'Connell has published another address to the people of Ireland, reproaching them for incendiary outrages committed, and recommending peace and tranquillity. He expresses great gratitude for the manner in which he has been received in England.

EXPENDITURE OF IRELAND.—The total expenditure of Ireland last year was £3,184,695, of which £1,211,313 was for the interest of debt, £994,500 for the army, £84,870 for the navy, £561,328 permanent charges on the consolidated fund, exclusive of public works, and £332,682 miscellaneous services. In this return, however, the share of Ireland in the general expenditure of the Imperial Government is not included.

THE OJIBBEWAY INDIANS.—Nottenakin, (the strong wind), one of the Ojibbeway Indians lately exhibited in London, is about to enter into the matrimonial state with a very pretty and interesting young lady of English birth, about 18 years of age and of respectable connexions, resident in Somers town. He acts as interpreter to the other Indians, and speaks both English and French tolerably well.

We have been requested to contradict a paragraph which has gone the rounds of the London and Provincial papers, to the effect that Mr. Atchill, recently appointed Attorney General of St. Lucia, is a man of colour, there not being the slightest colour for such a statement.—(London Times.)

Her Majesty held her first levee for the season last week, at St. James's Palace; many thousands were present to view the entrée of her Majesty and the Prince. The levee, which was numerously attended, was the first held since the returning and decorations of St. James's Palace.

PRESENTATION OF PLATE TO MR. PACKENHAM.—Mr. Packenham, now Minister to the United States, has had a valuable service of plate presented to him by the British merchants of Mexico, in recognition of his valuable services. The service is certainly of the most splendid description. It weighs about 4000 ounces, and the cost is between £3000 and £4000.

Mr. Solomon, chief officer of the Brighton police, has been murdered in the station-house of that town. The prisoner, a young man named John Lawrence, had been apprehended on a charge of felony, and while Mr. Solomon was standing with his back towards him in the station-house, the prisoner took, unperceived, the poker from the fire-place, and struck him so violent a blow with it on the head, that he died shortly afterwards. Lawrence has been tried at the Lewes Assizes and sentenced to execution.

The O'Connell banquet, in Covent-garden Theatre last Tuesday, was a magnificent affair. Mr. T. S. Duncombe was chairman, and he was surrounded by a great body of the leading liberals, including several of Mr. O'Connell's sons. The speech of the evening was that of the "agitator," which consisted in a moderated demand for repeal, some allusions to the late trials, which he characterised as grossly unfair, the usual compliments to "the finest planet," and praises of the justice of Englishmen, as exhibited in that demonstration. The Earl of Shrewsbury proposed the "people," and the proceedings terminated at twelve o'clock, having lasted six hours.

PRESBYTERIAN MARRIAGES.—The Presbyterian marriage question is causing a great excitement in the north of Ireland, and meetings are in progress all over that part of the country. At a meeting held at Londonderry, the Mayor in the chair, the speakers denounced the insolent and oppressive encroachments of the State Church, and the system of base deception practised against the Presbyterians since the unfortunate alliance between Prelacy and Presbyterianism, announced at the Orange meetings at Hillsborough, for the promotion of the scheme for turning out the Whigs.

Parliament has adjourned for the Easter holidays, and will meet again on the 15th.

The vessels from Hull, for the Greenland and Davis' Straits fisheries, will this year be more than double the number of those engaged in that trade last year.

Sir George Smart is about to retire from public life, after a most honourable career of half a century, but will confine himself entirely to tuition.

The London Times of the 15th says:—

Our private letter from Constantinople of the 21st. states, that the Porte appeared little inclined to give the written pledge required by the English and French Ambassadors, "that the punishment of death should not again be inflicted upon Rayahs who, having embraced Mahometanism, might subsequently recant its tenets."—The Turkish Ministers regarded the demand as an interference with their national independence and their religious laws, and were determined not to yield the point and abide the consequences of their refusal. The last accounts from Albania intimated that a general insurrection would shortly take place in that province.

The French army amounts to 344,000 men, including officers, and 83,416 horses. Of this total 284,000 men and 69,520 horses form the division in France, and 60,000 men and 13,416 horses those in Algeria.

Another earthquake occurred at Ragusa, in Dalmatia, on the 27th ult. It lasted six or seven seconds. The sea ran very high and a quantity of rain fell. Three new shocks of some violence were felt on the 2d inst. The inhabitants were so alarmed that they fled the town.

A letter from Adrianople, in the Augsburg Gazette, states that a sudden thaw had caused a great inundation, which had destroyed 3,000 houses in that city, and carried away a considerable quantity of goods. The loss is estimated at 3,000,000 piastres.

THE MISSOURI.—A mechanic in London, named Blackburn, has bought the wreck of the American steam frigate Missouri, which was destroyed by fire at Gibraltar six months ago, for £4,500; and he is about to proceed there with steam engines, air pumps, and condensing apparatus, for the express purpose of diving in thirty-six fathom water. It is expected it will be a most profitable job, the boilers alone, being of strong copper, are considered worth from £10,000 to £12,000 old metal, and the facilities for operating against the engine and boilers are very great, the decks having been entirely destroyed.

Reports are current that Sir E. Sugden will shortly leave Ireland to take upon himself the high office of Lord Chancellor of England. Lord Lyndhurst would be better pleased, they say, to have another successor, but the state of his health will not allow him to hold on any longer; and the arrangement he desired cannot now take place.

The Messrs. Fielden Brothers, one of the richest manufacturing houses in England, have had their warehouse in Manchester distrained upon for £300 income tax. It appears that they returned their profits from business at nil; but the Commissioners assessed them at £300, which they refused to pay. The sale took place on Monday last. Of course the credit of the firm is not affected.

THE SEASON.—Last week, Covent-garden Market presented a scene of great interest, from the excellent spring supply it contained. Amongst the novelties were green peas, French beans, cucumbers, strawberries, hot-house grapes, asparagus, rhubarb, and sea kale. The flower market had a May appearance, from the quantity of roses, geraniums, carnations, lilacs, heaths, and other flowers, all in rich bloom.

The Belfast Banks have reduced the interest on local paper to four-and-a-half per cent, and on English to three-and-a-half.

WALES.—On the 26th, Colonel Wood moved for leave to bring in a bill to exempt lime used in Wales for agricultural purposes from toll. The excessive toll now exacted was considered one of the main causes of the late Rebecca riots. In some cases the toll amounted to double the cost of the lime. After considerable discussion, the motion was carried by a majority of 68 to 42.

NEW ZEALAND.—Advices from Hobart Town to the middle of October, state that many families were leaving Nelson in consequence of the alarm created by the late massacre of the natives.

SPAIN.—All doubts as to the success of the insurgents in Alcant have been dispelled by the following telegraphic despatch, dated Bayonne, March 11:—"Alcant and its garrison have risen against the Chief Bonet, who has taken to flight. The town and the fort are in the hands of the Royal troops." There are no tidings of the royalist movements against Carthagen.

Since writing the above we have received later news, reporting the capture of Bonet, and his subsequent execution, with several officers and soldiers. General Roncali had gone to Carthagen, to operate against that place.

At date of the last advices, the butcheries still continued in the province of Alcant, where no less than thirty-five persons had already been shot, without even the semblance of a trial, and sixty-five more were doomed to undergo the same fate. General Roncali writes from his headquarters, before Carthagen, on the 15th, that the rebels were making strenuous endeavours to maintain themselves in the place, and that he was awaiting the arrival of the siege artillery to attack it.

The Barcelona journal, La Verdad, announces that a new conspiracy had been discovered in that city, and that the persons suspected of being engaged in it, were tried by a court martial, then sitting in the Citadel. A letter from Barcelona states, that four had been capitally convicted and shot. Two other executions had taken place at Zamora.

PORTUGAL.—The government movements against the rebels are characterised by much weakness and apparent indecision. The royal troops have been marching and counter-marching, as though it were part of their tactics to avoid, instead of meeting the rebels.

The Cortes, which assembled again on the 21st, had agreed to extend the suspension of the habeas corpus to the 31st of March.

PRUSSIA.—For some time past negotiations have been pending for a commercial treaty between the United States of America and the Germanic Union of Customs. We learn, upon good authority, that these negotiations have been brought to a close, and that a treaty has been actually signed by the Prussian government and Mr. Wheaton, the American minister at this court. The effect of the treaty is understood to be to reduce the present duties on tobacco and rice imported into Germany from the United States; and on the other hand, to afford facilities for the introduction into the United States of several branches of German manufactures for American consumption.

ITALY.—The last letters from Italy are full of accounts of the armed hands which have of late appeared in the Apennines and in the low country on the coast of the Adriatic; and it is said that all the troops the Pope has at his disposal at Bologna are not sufficient to prevent the nightly depredations to which that city is exposed.

A letter from Trieste, March 2, in the Cologne Gazette, says:—"Intelligence from Corfu states, that the Pacha of Janina has declared the ports of Murtas and Arpiza in a state of blockade, apparently against some pirates, but really to prevent the Greek malcontents of the Ionian Isles from increasing their relations with their countrymen. The Lord High Commissioner of the Ionian Isles has protested against the measure. Macedonia and Albania still inspire some uneasiness."

We have received Sydney papers to the 7th Nov. The revenue accounts for the three quarters of the year just closed show a deficiency of £29,049 when compared with the same period of 1842, a considerable decrease having occurred in the amount paid for duties on spirits imported, on tobacco and auction fees. The gross revenue is stated at £274,596, and upon the receipts of the year Sir George Gipps says he expects a decrease of £50,000 or £60,000 compared with 1842.

HOUSE OF COMMONS.

IRISH STATE TRIALS.—On the same evening, Mr. Wye presented a petition from members of the Repeal Association, praying for inquiry into the late trials in Ireland, and stated, that the number of signatures was 821,334; and that, among the petitioners, were several members of Corporations in different parts of the country.

The petition, meanwhile, had been laid on the floor, and was so bulky that a chest four or five feet square and deep would have been requisite to contain it.

The Speaker (in the customary phrase): Please to bring it up. (Laughter.)

Mr. Wye: I shall require, sir, the assistance of more than one member to do so. (A laugh.)

Aided by one or two members (among whom was Mr. O'Connell) the huge heap of paper was elevated to the table, and read at length by the clerk at the table.

On the 22nd March, The royal assent was given by commission to the following Bills:—The Three-and-a-Half per Cent. Annuities (1818) Bill; the Three-and-a-Half per

Cent. Annuities Bill; the Consolidated Fund (8,000,000) Bill; the Gaming Transactions (Witnesses' Indemnity) Bill; and the Teachers of Schools (Ireland) Bill.

Boston, April 22.—The steam packet Acadia, Capt. Ryrrie, arrived at East Boston yesterday, at about 12 o'clock, in 17 days from Liverpool. We have received our regular files of London papers to the 8rd instant, and Liverpool to the 4th.

The debate in the Chamber of Deputies on the vote of Secret Service money, after a general discussion of the policy of the Government, terminated in another triumphant vote in favour of the Ministry. The number of white balls was 225, black 169, majority 56. It was understood by both parties that the vote should be taken as the test of confidence in the Ministry, and it is remarkable that the Ministry closes the session by an increased majority.

FRENCH MARINE.—Rear Admiral Hamelin is appointed commander of the French Sloop in Oceania, and is to hoist his flag on the Didon frigate, Capt. Des Trosses is about to proceed from Brest to Madagascar and Bourbon. He will have under his orders five or six ships, and will exhibit the French flag along the whole coast of Africa, and in the Arabian Seas. One of his duties will be to extend the relations of France with Abyssinia, and in Madagascar.

The venerable Earl of Lonsdale died March 19th, in the 87th year of his age. He is succeeded in his honours and estates by Viscount Lowther, the present Postmaster General.

PARLIAMENT.—A summary of the most important doings of Parliament will be found among our extracts in a preceding column. The proceedings upon Lord Ashley's Factory Labour Bill, to which an unusual importance was given by the disregard of ordinary party distinctions in voting upon it, resulting in two defeats of the Ministry, seems to have excited more interest than any other matter. One of the papers in commenting upon the position of parties upon this bill, remarks that in public Government "found itself defended only by its adversaries," but by Lord Ashley's refusal to press his advantage, and suffering the bill to be withdrawn for the time and for consideration, the protection of Factory labour seems again to be entrusted, according to the recommendation of one of the debaters, "to the public and 'The Times.'"

The Times complains of the dilatoriness of Parliament; of the large amount of talk and small amount of work. The London Punch, parodying the "ten hour" plan of the Factory Labour Bill, recommends the House of Commons to shorten the speeches of its members by adopting a ten minute bill for the relief of reporters and the public, to abolish unsatisfactory factory labour.

In the House of Commons on the 1st instant, Lord Elliot obtained leave to introduce the "Irish Registration and Franchise Bill," and the "Irish Municipal Amendment Bill." The former is intended to produce a substantial equality between the position of voters in Ireland and England. It provides three qualifications for a country voter: that he shall have either £10 clear income over rent and charges, be taxed for £30 income, or be possessed of a freehold of inheritance of £5 annually. All persons who pay the poor rate, borough rate, and other local taxes to be borough voters. The bill does not satisfy the Irish reformers, but the opposition was not developed at this early stage.

Prince Albert, accompanied by Col. Bouverie and Mr. G. E. Anson, left Buckingham Palace on the 28th, for Dover, where he would embark on board the Admiralty Steamer Princess Alice for the Continent, on his way to Gotta.

TEA, TOBACCO, AND SUGAR.—A money article of the London Times says that the notoriety of the fact that by means of the income tax the public revenue exceeds the expenditure, and that the surplus will be increased by the reduction of the Three-and-a-Half per Cent., has given rise to an active agitation on the part of the importers of tea and tobacco for a reduction of the present exorbitant crown duties on these important articles of consumption.

Albert Thorwaldsen, the distinguished sculptor, died suddenly at Copenhagen, on the 24th March, in the 74th year of his age.

STATE CREDIT.—The House of Representatives of Pennsylvania, has passed by a vote of 55 to 28, the bill imposing a three mill tax upon all taxable property in the state. The proceeds to be applied exclusively to the payment of the interest on the State Debt, and the gradual liquidation of the principal. The bill also contains a provision submitting to the people the question of selling the public works. The Harrisburgh Union asserts that there is no doubt of the passage of the bill in the Senate, and of its becoming a law.—The stain of broken faith will thus be removed from the Keystone State.

OREGON.—The St. Louis Republican on the authority of letters of the 20th October, says the settlers are threatened with a war from their Indian neighbours.

TRIAL OF THE GORDONS AT PROVIDENCE FOR THE MURDER OF MR. SPRAGUE.—The trial of John Gordon and William Gordon, accused of the murder of Amasa Sprague, having occupied the R. I. Supreme Court for nine days, was brought to a close on Thursday. The jury, after being out about an hour and a half, returned with a verdict of GUILTY against John Gordon, and NOT GUILTY as to William Gordon.

CANADA.

CORNWALL, April 20.—The Highlander arrived here on Tuesday morning last. She lies at present between Cornwall and Coteau—in a few days the Canal will be open, when a regular communication will be open between Montreal and Kingston.

A gentleman named McKay from Montreal who unfortunately made away with himself in the river St. Lawrence at Williamsburg, a few weeks since, has been found by an Indian at St. Regis, on an island opposite that place. His remains were interred here the day following.

MONTREAL, April 25.—The body of the unfortunate man Chamepeau was interred on Tuesday morning last. A procession estimated at two thousand persons followed it to the grave. Amongst these persons, as we are informed, was the Hon. the Mayor, Mr. Lafontaine, Mr. Hincks, Mr. Motin, and Mr. Drummond. Several of the Jury were also amongst the mourners. As an enquiry into the cause of the accident was proceeding at the time, this display was certainly injudicious, and ought not to have taken place.—(Transcript.)

The 4th April English mail, which arrived at Halifax in the *Acadia* on the 19th instant, has not yet reached Quebec.  
We gave the news received by way of Boston and Montreal, yesterday morning, and have added in to-day's *Gazette*, extracts from the Boston papers, Willmer and Smith's *European Times* of the 4th, and the *Liverpool Mercury* of the 1st, both forwarded by an obliging correspondent at Montreal, by yesterday's boat.  
It will be perceived that there has been very little alteration in the aspect of European affairs since our former dates.  
There has been a decline in the price of Canada agricultural produce in England. It is, however, stated as probable that there will be no further material alteration till towards the next harvest.  
The price of timber has improved, and it appears now to be generally understood that with the present duties, Colonial timber can fully compete with the Baltic ports, notwithstanding their proximity to the market.  
New York and Boston papers of the 22nd and 23rd instant, were received this morning. The Texan treaty had not been forthcoming up to the 20th instant.  
Upper Canada papers of the 23rd, were received this morning. The Toronto folks say the Montreal election is as bad as that of Toronto in 1841.

**STATE OF THINGS AT MONTREAL.**

[Extracts from "The Pilot," Montreal, April 23.]  
"The 17th April, 1844, will hereafter be remembered by the citizens of Montreal, as the 21st May, 1832, has been, as a day on which murder was committed by Her Majesty's troops, under the authority of the magistrates, on peaceable citizens engaged in their lawful business. It is out of our power at present to give the details connected with the murder of our unfortunate fellow citizen, Champeau. The Coroner's Inquest was sitting during the greater part of yesterday, and will, in all probability, be engaged in their investigation for some days longer. Mr. Dyde, the magistrate who gave the order to charge, was present with his Counsel. Mr. Barthe's predictions have thus been realised. He reminded the people of the 21st May, with a view of warning them against exercising their elective franchise. He knew but too well the intentions of the party with which he has lately identified himself. We believe there are few who will now blame Mr. Drummond for refusing to lend his sanction to the calling out of troops to murder the peaceable citizens of Montreal."  
"Non-Interference.—We regret exceedingly to learn that Mr. Molson and his partisans have commenced a series of acts of the grossest persecution, against all persons suspected of being friendly to the return of Mr. Drummond. Mr. Molson himself has dismissed at least one of his servants, a man who, we understand, had been upwards of four years in his service. His brother has acted still more harshly, having dismissed a number of men from his Foundry. We are informed that even the ladies have been joined in the persecution, and that a very large number of female servants have been already dismissed. We forbear, at present, from giving any names. This persecution has been principally directed against the Irish Catholics,—the class most in the power of the Tory merchants. Mr. Viger is himself a Roman Catholic, and we scarcely think he will countenance such proceedings. There are some Irish Roman Catholics also attached to the party who are taking these steps.  
"The people must resolve never to enter the house of a man who sells Molson's beer. They must avoid such a person as they would one afflicted with leprosy. The same principle may be carried out in all other dealings, and it must be done energetically. Committees must be appointed in every street. The names of men who are detected dealing with Tories must be published, and held up to public execration; in short, every means that human ingenuity can devise, must be resorted to, to put down that infamous faction that has dared to persecute the people for exercising their elective franchise. We believe that the Reformers will not be asleep on the present occasion. They are watching with intense anxiety the proceedings of the Tories, and are determined, if they are compelled to do so, to establish as complete a system of non-intercourse with the Tories as they can devise. It is melancholy to think that such retaliation may become necessary, but Messrs. John and William Molson have set the example, and their friends have not been slow to follow it. Time will tell whether they have the power to carry out their diabolical intentions, which are to reduce the Irish Catholic population of Montreal to starvation."  
"We understand that most of the labourers who have got the means of leaving Lachine, have either departed or intend doing so, some for the United States, others for Upper Canada. The remainder will be left in a starving condition, which is precisely that condition in which their enemies seem to wish to see them. It is however, dangerous to reduce them to desperation, and we hesitate not to state, that Mr. Killaly, or rather the Government under whose orders he is acting, will incur a very heavy responsibility if any disturbance should take place on the Canal. The Military were ordered out to Lachine on Saturday, but they have since returned, and we believe that every thing is quiet in that quarter at the present time."
