Student loans need change — minister

Two students from Bishop's University, John Piper and Alex Henderson, travelled to Quebec Wednesday to confer, along with other student representatives, with Youth Minister Paul Gerin-Lajoie, concerning the controversial topic of free education and student bursaries.

Piper, president of external affairs, and Henderson, president of the Students' Association, were among a group of university students representing six Quebec institutions of higher learning - the University of Sherbrooke, the University

of Montreal, Laval University, Sir George Williams University, McGill, and Bishop's.

The meeting was another in a continuing series of discussions between government and student officials over matters of common interest. Mr. Gerin-Lajoie opened the meeting by agreeing with the students that the present system of bursaries and loans must be revamped. He asked the students to have their student consultative com-

mittee advise government officials as to the changes which the students of Quebec think are needed, and set the date of next September for further discussion on the subject.

On the matter of free education for university students, Mr. Gerin-Lajoie expressed the government's support of a system of free education, at all levels. The students were asked to form a committee to investigate fully the matter from their viewpoint, including cost, the need for free education, whether students really want it, and its effects.

The minister also said that he in no way supported the federal government's recent disclosure that it hopes to distribute interest-free loans to students. He said that the matter was entirely provincial in nature, and that Quebec already had a bursary and loan system. He suggested that a more constructive move would be for the government in Ottawa to widen the taxation powers of the provincial governments.

At the same time the student Committee For Free Education defined the term "free education" by restricting this to free tuition, books and other necessities, but not including room and board. It was suggested that a bursary system would be retained in the event of free education to provide for those students who could not afford the cost of living expenses while in university.

Several weeks ago, the Student Association of Bishop's voted overwhelmingly to oppose the move towards free education. At that time however, neither the term "free education" nor "university student" was clearly defined. Since then, the matter has been clarified, first by the before-mentioned clarification of the "free education" part, and also by student meetings which have included both undergraduate and post-graduate students in the "student" category.

With the new definition including post-graduate students, and with the growing support for a planned march on the provincial capital, primarily from the French-speaking universities of the province, Bishop's students may take another look at their opposing stand. At the present they are the only student body in the province against free education, and even the provincial government has expressed support of the principle.

Bill 60 approved

QUEBEC — The legislative assembly gave formal approval Thursday to a pair of amendments to legislation creating a Quebec department of education and cleared the way for its last step along the road into law.

Bill 60, which first came before the legislature last June and sparked months of debate in the province, needs only royal assent, a formality expected to come late next week.

The legislation, however, takes effect only on proclamation. This is expected to be about mid-April at the earliest, once structures for the new department of education are completed.

When it does come into being, the existing youth department and the department of public education will disappear.

PUT OFF ADOPTION

When the bill was first introduced last June, the cry was raised that the government was moving too fast and it was agreed to put off adoption until this session.

During the summer briefings poured in suggesting changes to the measure, while Mr. Gerin-Lajoie campaigned across the province on its behalf.

A modified version was produced this session, although the government said the basic principle remained unchanged.

Coffin not the killer says QPP detective

QUEBEC (CP) — The veteran detective who opened the investigation into the 1953 slaying of three Pennsylvania hunters testified Thursday he has always believed that although Wilbert Coffin might have been involved, he wasn't the killer.

Coffin was hanged Feb. 10, 1956, after being tried and found guilty by a jury. Appeals right up to the federal justice department failed to save his life.

He died maintaining his innocence. A book published last year, *J'accuse les Assassins de Coffin* (I Accuse Coffin's Assassins), contends Coffin was railroaded to the gallows.

It spurred the Quebec government to set up the royal commission at which former Sgt. Henri Doyon of the Quebec Provincial Police was testifying.

"My opinion is that Coffin might have had something to do with it," the 54-year-old witness said, "but I don't believe he killed the American hunters. That has always been my opinion."

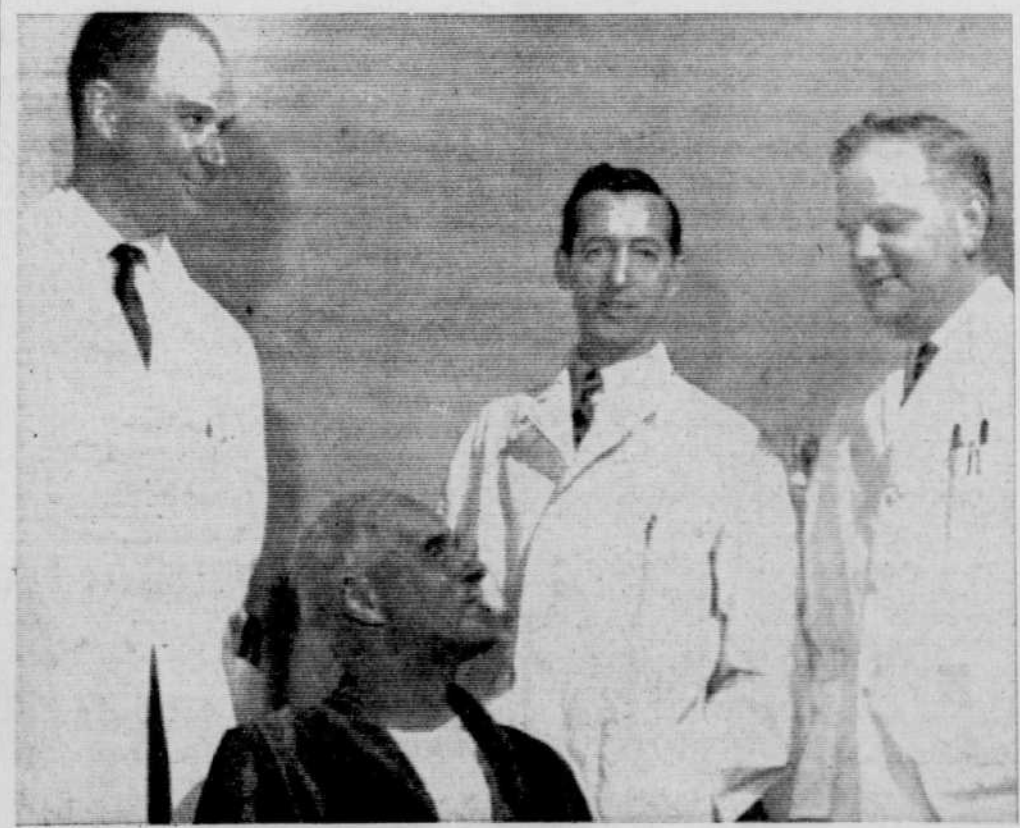
He was being questioned by Noel Dorion, a Crown prosecutor at the Coffin trial in Perce, Que., in 1954.

"Do you believe Coffin was guilty or innocent?" Mr. Dorion asked, in an exchange that left the packed court hushed.

"I have always said... he could have been an accomplice before, during or after the fact," Mr. Doyon replied.

There was no clear answer to another question:

"Didn't you tell Bernard Péclet (police chemist) on a train between Montreal and Quebec that Coffin was guilty but had accomplices? And didn't you even suggest names of possible accomplices?"

On electoral map, spending

Commons dawdles again

OTTAWA (CP)—The government's redistribution bill has bogged down in deep-rooted conflict between representatives of Canada's diverse regions and no progress is in sight until after the Commons Easter recess.

A three-day debate on the proposal to set up a new machinery to revamp the electoral map from top to bottom ended inconclusively Thursday. It is unlikely to resume until April 6 at the earliest.

Today, the Commons turns to the consideration of supplementary spending estimates of \$240,884,747 for the fiscal year ending March 31.

At the same time, the government will seek approval of interim spending authority for April and May. This opens the way for all kinds of Opposition grievances against the government and debate is likely to continue until 8 p.m. EST Monday when Finance Minister Gordon starts reading his second budget speech.

Tuesday has been set aside for debate on the highly controversial Canada Pension Plan and the six-day budget debate is expected to begin Wednesday.

The redistribution debate Thursday cut across party lines and developed into a spirited battle between rural and urban MPs. There were also pleas for special consideration for Quebec, the Prairies and the Maritimes.

Leon Baileer, the Conservatives' Quebec spokesman, warned that redistribution will change the "equilibrium" between Quebec and other regions.

Since the provincial governments were vitally affected, he urged that the 10 premiers be consulted at the March 31 federal - provincial conference in Quebec City.

He said the premiers should be asked informally for their advice on the personnel and the ground rules of the 10 proposed redistribution commissions.

(Unless the 265-seat lower chamber is expanded, redistribution will result in the loss of four seats for Saskatchewan and one each for Quebec, Manitoba and Nova Scotia. Ontario will gain three seats, Alberta two and British Columbia one.)

Gilles Giguère (Creditiste-Lapointe) called for a constitutional amendment that would guarantee that Quebec's representation would not drop below the present level of 75 seats.

Reid Scott (NDP — Toronto Danforth) said Parliament has been ruled for years by a "rural

tyranny." Rural voters were vastly over-represented and city voters were correspondingly under-represented.

Parliament should abolish this system and return to the democratic principles of equal representation for all—one man, one vote.

Several MPs from rural areas countered that population should not be the only factor in drawing constituency boundaries.

John E. Lloyd (L—Halifax) and Heath Macquarrie (PC—Queens), who represent the only two remaining dual federal ridings with two other MPs, de-

cried the fact that the government measure automatically would kill dual ridings.

As the bill stands, it will result in new boundaries for nearly every constituency across Canada. The population of each riding could not exceed or fall short of the provincial average by more than 20 per cent.

Redistribution until now has been handled by a Commons committee which set no limit in the population variations. Population figures now range from 300,000 in York-Scarborough to 13,000 in Ile-de-la-Madeleine.

The strict West Indian observance of Sunday and devotion to children were particularly noted.

Now the question is being asked whether racial discrimination will for the first time become a significant factor—at least in a few areas—in a general election.

Prime Minister Sir Alec Douglas-Home has not yet announced the date of the next election—it may come in June—but politicians and townsfolk, including colored immigrants, readily told a visiting reporter this week that the racial matter is decidedly an issue here.

"Blame the Tories," is the Labor Party cry.

DENY SLOGAN THEIRS

The whole thing was brought into the open by the slogan "If you want a nigger for a neighbor, vote Labor"—a saying whose parentage is denied by all.

"I've heard a lot worse than that from time to time, man," said one Jamaican laborer, grinning from ear to ear when buttonholed for a sidewalk interview.

Do the West Indians take much interest in politics? "If it was warmer, I would vote," said one.

A more sombre note was struck by an Indian leader. "Discrimination may be worse in Britain than in the U.S. south," he declared grimly.

Yet this same spokesman told of the sympathetic attitude of ordinary English folk and they, in turn, mentioned the gay and polite ways of their new neighbors.

NICOSIA — Turkey issued an ultimatum to the Greek-Cypriot government of Cyprus today, warning that it would take unilateral action unless a cease-fire was put in force throughout the island and all acts against the Turkish-Cypriot community were stopped.

The ultimatum, which carried the implied warning of a Turkish invasion of Cyprus, was contained in a note delivered today to the government of Greek-Cypriot President Makarios by the Turkish Embassy in Nicosia.

The British government strongly urged Turkey to act with great restraint in the deepening Cyprus crisis and at the same time called for U.S. help in attempts to calm international passions over the island's future.

A reliable source said the Cyprus government drafted a rejection of the Turkish warning.

The note was delivered by Turkish Ambassador Mazhar Ozkol. It called on Greek-Cypriot authorities to cease all acts which it claimed were being perpetrated against the Turkish-Cypriots.

At the same time Greece stated it would "react" decisively by all means "to any Turkish unilateral intervention."

Turkey, Greece and Britain are guarantors of the 1960 constitution which granted Cyprus independence.

Three months of sporadic fighting between the hostile Greek and Turkish communities on Cyprus has threatened to bring intervention by Greece or Turkey on behalf of their national groups.

The Turkish "strong warning" also was contained in a note handed over to the American, British and Greek ambassadors in Ankara, Turkey, today.

AMBASSADORS GET NOTES

The three ambassadors were summoned to the Turkish foreign ministry where they had separate meetings with Turkish Foreign Minister Feridun Erkin and were handed the notes.

Diplomatic sources in Ankara said the note addressed to Greek-Cypriot President Makarios warned that Turkey was not prepared to allow the present state of affairs to continue on the strife-torn island.

(A Cyprus government spokesman in Athens, Greece, said his government would reject outright the Turkish note as "unacceptable" both for its content

and for its form.)

Conciliation meetings which had ended the four-week wildcat strike of French-speaking Roman Catholic teachers were brought to an abrupt end last night when school commissioners refused to continue.

Schools in the eight ET communities involved in the negotiations were operating this morning as usual.

The strike had affected more than 15,000 children before the minister of youths intervened, organized conciliation under Montreal Labor lawyer Leon Lalonde, and got the teachers to return to work last Monday.

Spokesmen for the School Commissions said this morning they would not continue the negotiations because their "last offer was a maximum" and they "could not offer any more concessions to the teachers."

The School commissions are offering \$341,003 in salary increases to the 540 teachers in the eight towns affected, an average increase per teacher of \$623.

The teachers are asking for \$570,142 in salary increases.

Delay Ruby trial

DALLAS (AP)—The jury in Jack Ruby's murder trial waited today to begin deliberating his fate, after an 11-hour defence manoeuvre delayed the end of the historic case.

Defence lawyers won permission from Judge Joe B. Brown to call another witness today—after the trial officially ended Thursday.

In a dramatic scene, Ruby's lawyers told the judge that Dr. Frederick A. Gibbs of Chicago, an authority on epilepsy, "is coming to Dallas" to testify.

Train plot

PORT PIERCE, B.C. (AP)—Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation arrested two former railway employees early today on charges they attempted to blow up a Florida East Coast Railway train with 50 pounds of dynamite Thursday night.

They were identified by FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover as John Wesley Davis, 28, who lives near here, and Joseph Leo Vetter, 32, of Miami.

Bombs Bomarc

WASHINGTON (CP) — Maj. Gen. Robert Friedman, director of the U.S. Air Force's aerospace program, told a congressional committee that the USAF probably would have been better off trying to develop an improved interceptor plane instead of the Bomarc anti-aircraft missiles.

Last January, Defence Secretary Robert McNamara announced that 195 Bomarc-A missiles were to be removed from U.S. bases this year, leaving only 188 Bomarc-B weapons on launchers at six bases. Canada has two squadrons of the solid-fuelled Bomarc-B missiles which have a range of 400 miles, twice the distance of the liquid-fuelled Bomarc-A.

Fallout high along border

MONTREAL (CP) — Professor Maxwell Cohen, director of the McGill University institute of air and space law, said Thursday that nuclear fallout in a band 100 miles along the Canadian-United States border is more intense than in the rest of the world.

Professor Cohen said nuclear tests in the mid and north Pacific by both the U.S. and Russia had caused a concentration of fallout in this area.

He was speaking at a press conference held in connection with publication by the University of Law and Politics in Space, a book which outlines proceedings of the first McGill conference on the law of outer space, held here last April.

The conference brought together experts in government, law and space science from the Western world to analyze urgent problems in outer-space law.

Problem of nuclear fallout was one of many that have arisen because of man's increasing ability to use or abuse outer space, Professor Cohen said.

About Television

NEW YORK (AP)—While television has been attracting most of the attention as a stimulating visitor in American households, good, old radio has carved itself a special place as a comfortable home companion.

Radio has concentrated on service: frequent news programs—and lots of music.

Now, however, radio seems to be re-emerging as a real competitor in entertainment. It has discovered—again—what the industry calls "talks sh-v-s."

Several radio stations have changed or are planning to switch from popular and profitable news-and-music programming to news-and-conversation, news-and-interviews and news-and-comedy.

"The trend in radio for some years has been to provide background listening," a radio executive said. "Now, on many stations, there is a real effort to provide material for what you might call foreground listening."

"That means talk programs. They produce listeners who really listen. And this, in turn, is attractive to sponsors."

Qualifications for scholarship, nursing bursary

STANSTEAD — The Stanstead I.O.D.E. Chapter will award a scholarship of \$100 annually to a Grade Eleven student of this school municipality at Sunny-side School who fulfills the following qualifications:

The candidate must be Canadian born or a Canadian citizen.

The scholarship must be applied within two years of being awarded.

The student must be proceeding to further education and registered in a Canadian university or equivalent full course, or a registered school of nursing.

In awarding the scholarship, the committee will consider academic achievement and character.

Preference will be given to a returned soldier's sister, brother, son or daughter.

Application for this scholarship must be in the hands of the committee by April 15 and will be approved by the Chapter as a whole.

Every candidate must send with his or her application the following: Certificate of birth or satisfactory evidence of citizenship, a written statement from the principal approving the candidate, names and addresses of three persons to whom the committee may apply for reference.

A transcript of final marks obtained in June must be sent to the educational secretary Mrs. Hugh McClary, Stanstead, by Aug. 15. If candidate intends to write supplemental exams the secretary must be informed at this date.

The selection committee shall consist of the regent, the educational secretary, the treasurer, and two other members appointed by the Chapter, and the final selection will be approved by the executive.

NURSING BURSARY
The Chapter will also award a Nursing Bursary of \$120 annually to a deserving student in Stanstead County enrolled in any qualified school of nursing.

Application for this bursary must be in the hands of the committee by May 1.

Every candidate must send with her application the following: Certificate of birth, a written statement from the supervisor of the applicant's school of nursing, approving the candidate, together with a transcript of academic standing, names and addresses of three persons to whom the committee may apply for reference.

Lack of evidence on alcohol charge; is found not guilty

A Sherbrooke man was acquitted in Court yesterday of a charge of selling home-brewed alcohol.

The judge ruled there was a lack of sufficient proof in the case of Patrick Chouinard of Sherbrooke.

After three key witnesses were called to the stand, the crown rested its case on the testimony of one — Gerard Lemieux.

He told the court that he had bought one gallon of the alcohol from a man who he could "identify only with doubt."

He then pointed to the accused.

He testified that he paid this man \$18 for the gallon and that the man left a business card.

The card was produced as evidence and read "Pat" — 567-5529.

★★★ Pleads not guilty to charges

George Cruden of Beebe pleaded not guilty in Sessions Court yesterday to three charges arising out of a February 6 automobile accident in which Eugene Fearon of Lennoxville was killed.

He was charged with hit and run in the municipality of Ayer's Cliff, dangerous driving in the municipality of Waterville and impaired driving between Stanstead and Waterville.

The charges were laid against Cruden after a coroner's jury, Wednesday, ruled that the death of 21-year-old Fearon was accidental.

Cruden was released on bail and will appear in court next week.

A Bell Telephone official later told the court that the number was registered under the name of Mrs. Joseph Chouinard, the accused's mother.

Two other witnesses admitted buying alcohol from someone named Pat but failed to identify the man sitting in the court, claiming that they never saw the man's face when they dealt with him.

Crown Prosecutor Freehette then pleaded his case on a prima facie appeal, based on Lemieux's testimony.

Judge Turmel, in rejecting the appeal, told the court that the identification of the accused was not positive enough and the circumstantial evidence was insufficient to lead to the conviction of Chouinard.

Jean Paul "La Suisse" Gaudreau appeared before Judge Benoit Turmel and pleaded guilty to five counts of obtaining money by false pretenses.

The charges were brought against the accused after he passed five false cheques, the day after he was released from prison.

He will be sentenced Thursday, March 26.

Stanstead county council to reconsider evaluation

AYER'S CLIFF — (Staff) — A meeting of the Stanstead County Council decided Wednesday to reconsider the homologation of evaluation rolls in 20 member municipalities.

The decision was taken following the demands of a number of municipalities, Ayer's Cliff and North Hatley in particular, that the rolls be equalized before homologated.

These two municipalities, whose evaluation is about 100 per cent of the real value, are protesting against the inequalities in the evaluations which, in other municipalities, is as low as 35 per cent.

A clearly defined group is opposing the equalization plan, notably the Township of Magog, among the lowest on the evaluation roll.

One of the key factors in last night's decision to reconsider the thorny question was a letter from the deputy minister of Municipal Affairs.

The letter states that equalization must precede homologation.

The meeting was adjourned until next Wednesday.

Meanwhile, it was learned that the townships wanting equalization are seeking legal advice to strengthen their position in the county council.

Arthur Motyer's production of Twelfth Night opened last night at Bishop University's Memorial Gymnasium. And with this play, the directing was the thing.

This is not to say that the cast do not deserve accolades as well.

They do.

But the real star of the annual dramatic production of Bishop's Dramatic Society was director Motyer.

Without him, the stage could have been an awfully large one.

For in this romantic comedy, no one character monopolizes the dialogue—the Elizabethan apron is shared among a group of actors.

Aside from the lack of a single powerful character none of the actors are really outstanding, although all give solid performances.

Bob Lawrence and Rod Smith painted colorful caricatures of Falstaffian Sir Toby Belch and cowardly Sir Andrew Aguecheek.

Clem Chapple gave a sympathetic reading to the strange clown Feste.

But it was above all director Motyer who molded the many elements of the work into the dynamic production it was.

This play moves; really moves.

Most of human brain much like a computer

"The mind is a machine and can be dealt with as a machine to an extent of perhaps 80 or 90 per cent."

"The remaining part is a mystery," the clinical director of the Verdun Protestant Hospital, Dr. H. E. Lehmann, told the Women's Canadian Club of the Eastern Townships last night.

If we aim at the best of all possible worlds, let us explore to the greatest extent the mechanical portion of the mind and regard with awe and appreciation that other part," he said in his address, the human mind, machine or mystery.

He said that, since the beginning of the century, investigation has produced brain maps that show what each part of the brain does.

He mentioned experiments by Dr. Wilder Penfield who applied electrodes to portions of the brain during operations

(the brain itself can feel no pain, he said, and the patients were conscious).

The patients reported hearing snatches of song from their childhoods, smelling certain odors and seeing definite pictures. In short, he said, the perceptual processes of the brain were affected mechanically by the use of electricity on the temporal lobe of the brain.

It has been shown, he said, that the brain operates on electricity by a process almost identical to that of the electronic computer. This process, he said, is basically the most simple, involving pulses of electricity of perhaps 100 per second to five per second or more or less.

In both the brain and the computer, he said, it was a simple on-off pulse, less complicated than Morse code.

In the computer, he said, transistors simply added and subtracted the pulses, according to the programming, achieving

in the end some very complicated results. In the brain neurons, almost identical in function to transistors, did the same thing.

The computer, he said, doesn't think, but the output is very like thinking. Properly programmed, it can, for instance, beat even a champion invariably at checkers. In chess, a man has a chance of winning.

It is very possible that, soon, computers can be built to reproduce themselves. In fact, he said, plans are now being made to build a computer which can then build a better computer.

Differences between the brain and the computer mentioned by Dr. Lehmann included:

Capacity — The brain has about 12 billion neurons, the most sophisticated computer only about one million transistors.

Speed — The brain is much slower than the computer and said,

man will never be able to hold his own in this respect.

Size — If it should ever be possible to build a 12 billion transistor computer, its size would be immense; the brain weighs about three pounds.

Efficiency — The brain uses about 100 watts or the amount of electricity required for a light bulb; a computer of 12 billion essential parts would use 100 million watts.

The main advantages of the computer, he said were that it was more reliable than the brain, faster and untiring.

What it didn't have, and this was the mystery that remained about the mind of man, and the part that gave man his identity was the ability to love, imagine and to create and appreciate beauty.

"Beauty, love and imagination would not be possible if we were run by computers," he

Addresses Institute of International Affairs

Says Pakistan wants friendship with India but no improvement in relations is seen

Pakistan's biggest problem is how to be accepted by India as a neighbour and an equal, Professor S. M. Burke of the University of Minnesota, formerly of the Pakistani diplomatic corps, said last night.

Prof. Burke was in Sherbrooke to speak at the Sherbrooke - Lennoxville Canadian Institute of International Affairs meeting held at the St. George's Club last night.

Pakistani - Indian relations have not improved in the last five years, he said, in an interview before the meeting. The bitterness between the two powers persists.

Mr. Burke explained that the 92 million inhabitants of Pakistan were split into two provinces, each about equal in population.

In West Pakistan the official language is Urdu and the capital city is Islamabad. The executive branch of the government has its headquarters here.

Far to the east, separated by a vast region of hostile India is the province of East Pakistan where the official language is Bengali, and the legislative branch of the Pakistani government meets here in the city of Dacca.

There is some rivalry between the two parts, said Mr. Burke, but both know that they would be greatly weakened and in danger of being annexed by India if they should separate.

What the two provinces have in common, said Mr. Burke, is their Islamic ideology, for the country was founded so that Moslems could have a homeland to lead the Islamic way of life.

Last year Pakistan drew up a border treaty and some commercial agreements with Communist China, he said, but there is no political or defense agreement. The two countries have always been friendly, he said.

This does not mean that Pakistan is turning away from the Western world, stressed Mr. Burke, but merely that she does not want to have all her eggs in one basket.

Pakistani president Ayub Khan had said himself, pointed out Mr. Burke, that there was no contradiction between Pakistan's belonging to the pro-western SEATO defense alliance and cultivating friendly relations with Communist China.

The aim of the defense pact is to ensure peace, president Khan has said, and fostering friendly relations with other countries does the same.

Lighting between city, Lennoxville

A coroner's jury has recommended that more intensive street lighting be installed on Route 5 between Lennoxville and Sherbrooke.

The recommendation came at an inquest into the death of an 81-year-old man, who was struck by a car on the stretch of roadway.

He was the second person in two months to be killed by traffic.

The jury's recommendation and the fact that no blame was attached to the driver of the car that struck the victim indicate the jury members feel strongly about better lighting for the area.

And well they might.
At one time, the road was a short country highway. But that time has passed.

ed. Both Lennoxville and Sherbrooke have expanded, each toward the other in this particular area. Vehicular traffic has increased, and so has pedestrian traffic. There are bad curves on the roadway.

In short, it would seem that the road should be treated as a city street, so far as lighting is concerned.

There is a dual responsibility here. Part of the road is in Lennoxville. The rest is in Sherbrooke. Perhaps representatives of the two councils could get together and discuss the problem.

With good will on both sides (and there is no reason why this shouldn't exist) it should be possible to work out a solution to what is becoming an increasingly troublesome traffic situation.

Marine bans defeating own purpose

United States longshoremen apparently believed they have registered a victory for their seamen friends by forcing Washington to agree that fifty per cent of future wheat shipments of Russia be carried by American flag ships.

But recent developments indicate that the net result will be a loss of Russian wheat purchases and a sharp drop in the tonnage handled through United States ports, the principal sufferers being the longshoremen themselves.

Rather than pay the higher fees of the United States carriers, the Russians have indicated they will increase their

future purchases of wheat from Canada and other countries which give them the right to pick their own carrier agents.

The only alternative is for the U.S. government to subsidize its merchant marine so their ships can meet the rates set by foreign vessels. But as the government is already subsidizing the grain sales it would have in effect be paying a double subsidy.

Regardless of whether the situation rebounds to Canada's benefit it contains a warning that should be studied closely by labor and industry in this country.

A prince is born to Royal couple

Amid the strife and conflict around the world, there is especial joy in the birth of a new prince to Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip.

It does not seem so long ago that Canadians, and people in other countries, too, were rejoicing at the birth of Her Majesty's eldest son, Prince Charles. Now, there are four.

We have watched the British royal family grow even as we watch our own

families develop, and the families of our loved ones. Most of us have that same fondness for the Royal couple that we have for family members.

Traditions change rapidly these days. Some have disappeared forever. Royalty is rare, and that symbolism which the British royal family represents even rarer.

So there is particular satisfaction in being able to say "a prince has been born."

Canada has responsibility in Cyprus

A workable arrangement appears to have been evolved to put a temporary damper on strife in Cyprus. It is one in which Canada has been asked to participate. Both the seriousness of the situation in the Eastern Mediterranean and the auspices under which the police force is to be placed, make it a reasonably appropriate undertaking for Canadian co-operation and participation.

However unsubstantial the ties now may be which bind the Commonwealth, the fact remains that Cyprus and Canada are sister members of that organization. Canada is also a member of NATO and would be adversely affected if the NATO cornerstone in the Mediterranean were to break into pieces as a result of Turkish-Greek strife over Cyprus. Finally, Canada is not only a member of the United Nations, but has long professed an eagerness to make military units available for UN peace-keeping duties and, indeed, has backed up this profession of faith before now with police

missions in Egypt, the Congo and the Far East.

It has been extremely difficult to find a formula for peace-keeping in Cyprus which would satisfy all the parties directly involved: Britain, Greece, Turkey, President Makarios and the Cypriot minority. It may be impossible to find a lasting solution to the real problem which divides the modest little island. But that is no reason for abandoning hope or leaving the islanders free to indulge in a blood bath. If the various post-war agencies for keeping peace are to prove their worth, they must be used.

The world is now in an experimental period and Cyprus offers a golden opportunity to find out how effectively hostile peoples can be guided into reconciling and settling their differences short of slaughter.

In some ways the Cyprus problem is not one which might be considered suitable for UN intervention. The UN is supposed to mediate between nations rather than between parties to internal disputes within nations. Its actions to thwart Katanga's pursuit of independence from a tribally-unrelated section of the disorganized Congo were questionable, to say the least.

But in Cyprus both sides to the dispute are inviting UN help, and this makes some difference.

Perhaps there is a note of sad irony in the fact that Canada, which is preparing to send a contingent of soldiers to an island which has a bilingual, bicultural, biracial, and bi-religious population, has a problem with marked similarity of its own. Canada's problem, of course, is far from reaching the proportions of crisis and violence which have developed on Cyprus, and there seems

no reason to fear that it ever will. Still, an outsider might suggest that the time could come when Canada, far from helping to support UN peace-making operations abroad would be asking for the UN to send a peace-keeping force into this country while a solution could be worked out for keeping this nation as one or dividing it into two new ones.

Austrian union with Nazi Germany was declared 26 years ago today—in 1938—in a decree by Austrian Chancellor Arthur Seyss-Inquart. Former chancellor Kurt von Schuschnigg had wanted to hold a plebiscite on the question of Austrian independence March 13, but Hitler, accompanied by German troops, entered the country March 12. A plebiscite was held April 10 throughout "Greater Germany" and the vote was more than 99 per cent in favor of Hitler.

1941—More than 500 persons were killed in night air raids in the Liverpool area of England in the Second World War.

French Canada says:

Queen safe; Air Canada a gain; schooling, understanding needed

Sherbrooke La Tribune — The views put forward by some extremists in the last fortnight concerning Queen Elizabeth's visit to Quebec next autumn do not in any way represent the opinion of the people as a whole. . . .

If Queen Elizabeth does not arouse our sentiments to an intensity equal to that shown by our (English-speaking) compatriots, she remains the symbol of authority nevertheless and it is in this capacity that she will come to Charlottetown and Quebec City next October. She deserves therefore to be received with all the respect due her rank.

In October the Queen will be our guest in Quebec and on this account we ought to receive her with dignity, as citizens who wish to live up to their reputation for warm hospitality toward distinguished visitors. That will in fact be the attitude of the people in general.

A few exalted persons whose sense of responsibility does not shine with any particular brilliance may indeed try to sow hate and discord, but the people will not follow them because our fellow citizens possess enough self-respect and enough regard for others not to let themselves be drawn into disgraceful and reprehensible deeds. Despite all the publicity they are enjoying, especially outside Quebec, these extremists do not express the feelings of the people. (March 9)

Quebec Le Soleil — Much more important than the new designation (of TCA as Air Canada) is the change of attitude in the House of Commons. Not often is a bill presented by a private member accepted in so short a time and without arousing any opposition, indeed without precipitating a systematic obstruction designed to prolong the debate until adjournment time so as to send it to the bottom of the order paper.

By adopting a title that is both French and English, the House has responded to a desire manifested by French-speaking Canadians. Our airplanes, every time they go abroad, will say in their own way that Canada is a bilingual country. The fiercest opponents of Confederation will say this is a piddling concession. Perhaps, but it is another concession coming after a good number of others and proving that, by making our claims through normal and legal channels, we can advance the cause of bilingualism a little more each day.

This cause is making conspicuous progress and one could cite numerous decisions of the present government aimed at giving a greater measure of justice to the French portion of the country, while anticipating that the royal commission on bilingualism and biculturalism will paint the true picture of the situation and present recommendations designed to establish the equality of the two great ethnic groups so vital

to Canadian unity. (March 6)
Trois-Rivières Le Nouvelliste—Mr. Jean Chretien, Liberal member for St. Maurice-Lafleche, is without doubt one of the most brilliant rookies Quebec sent to the Commons in the last election. On several occasions he has spoken well and he has fought for the victory of common sense. He has made himself the champion of French and of bilingualism as a means of understanding between the country's two cultural groups.

It is to him that we owe the official adoption of the name Air Canada as a replacement

for Trans-Canada Air Lines, the clumsiness, unilingualism and inexactness of which cannot suit a Canadian air line in our time. . . .

What indicates a change in the cabinet's attitude is the fact that Mr. Chretien's bill was the first adopted by the Commons during the present session. Those who maintain there is no evolution taking place in the way the government is looking at its problems were resoundingly contradicted this time. . . .

It is appropriate to emphasize hopefully the goodwill being shown by the English-speaking population, which seems to be putting aside its initial astonishment in an effort to understand and to recognize, each time the situation requires it, that changes have to be made in usages, in methods and in the way of looking at problems. We are witnessing an effort of goodwill that must be encouraged by avoiding extreme positions and, above all, the bitter statements and verbal provocations that are mainly the deeds of young people insufficiently aware of the dangers of excessive language. . . . (March 6)

Montreal La Presse—Who will be so rash as to maintain that we can get along, in Canada as in Quebec, with feeble and second-rate universities? The opposite is true. It is not with quantity that Canada, facing American competition, can win the race or even stay on the track; obviously, it is with competence, specialization, finesse, ingenuity. As for Quebec, it will certainly not get ahead any more by means of "an abundant labor force, docile and cheap." We tried that solution for a half-century with results that have been close to catastrophic.

We therefore have no choice. We are condemned to competence. Our universities must be developed. We must look after them. They must also be more democratic. Free education must be extended as quickly as possible, unless the gigantic effort that we are all demanding of the state is to become an odious social injustice. To accomplish all this, however, we have very little time.

Who advised Diefenbaker?

US superplane shows Arrow blunder

TORONTO — (TNS) — The United States' fantastic new 2,000 mph. manned fighter plane, the A11 — kept secret since it was conceived in 1959 — has stirred new life into the Avro Arrow controversy.

Now Canadian aircraft industry officials want to know who advised the Diefenbaker Government in 1958 that the day of the manned airplane was over.

Why, they ask, was the Arrow scrapped when this new development in manned flight was just around the corner?

These questions may never be answered. But to Canada's planemakers it now seems evident, in the light of President Johnson's report that the U.S. has 12 of the new superplanes already flying, that the decision to scrap the Arrow was a monstrous blunder.

That decision, made just five years ago last month, came close to killing off the entire aircraft industry in Canada. It threw more than 16,000 men and women out of work and, more important, drove a nucleus of brilliant aeronautical technicians across the border in search of work.

At least some of these technicians were taken on by the Lockheed Aircraft Co. at its Burbank, Calif., plant — the plant that designed and built the A11.

Just how much did our technicians contribute to America's new superplane? How much more could they have contributed to Canada's economic well-being had they been kept here to complete the Arrow project?

These, too, were questions being asked in Toronto aircraft plants. They followed the realization that Canada itself might have developed the new superplane.

The real rub for Canada comes in a rundown of the A11's performance characteristics. Although few details have been officially released, word filtering across the border through industry channels is that there is little difference between it and the Arrow—that might have been.

The A11's top speed is 2,300 mph. Arrow development plans called for a Mark II version that would have come close to that.

The A11's maximum altitude is said to be about 100,000 ft. In test flights, the Arrow climbed to 60,000 ft. and its designers were aiming at better than 70,000 ft.

The one area in which the A11 does appear to have a real edge on the Arrow is in metallurgy.

It is made of a tough, heat-

resistant metal called titanium, rather than of aluminum, thus enabling the U.S. to explore the new regions of flight beyond the "heat barrier" — that point in flight where an aluminum aircraft fuselage starts to melt. The Arrow was made of aluminum.

But even here the Arrow does not lose out entirely. Authoritative trade sources say the A11 is primarily a long-range reconnaissance airplane, designed for high-altitude spy missions.

Its speed is limited at lower altitudes and its military value is questionable.

The Arrow, by contrast, was a tough and relentless interceptor that could also double as a light bomber. Its value to western air forces was never disputed.

"In fact," said former Avro executive Fred Smye "both the U.S. and Britain were keen to buy the Arrow. The British still regret that it was scrapped. On one of my recent trips to England, some of their top service chiefs bemoaned the fact that it was not available today."

When he lowered the boom on the Arrow on Feb. 20, 1959, Prime Minister Diefenbaker listed three official reasons for the junking. The Arrow was out, he said because:

Canada could not afford it; The plane's range was not great enough;

With the age of the missile almost upon us, the Arrow would be obsolete by the time it began squadron service with the RCAF.

Of these reasons, only that of its expense stands up to day—and even that is questionable.

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Town under no obligation to post public notices

COWANSVILLE — (Staff) — Cowansville was under no obligation to post any public notices of its desire to annex a portion of Sweetsburg.

This was learned by The Record in an interview with Claude Noiseux, Cowansville's legal counsel, who replied to queries posed by the Sweetsburg Citizens' Committee when it publicly stated it was looking for proof of such a public posting.

According to Mr. Noiseux, annexation proceeds two ways: Once Cowansville has filed its By-law to the Sweetsburg Council, Sweetsburg can either reject or accept the by-law.

"If the by-law is accepted," said Mr. Noiseux, "then the issue will go to a referendum. This referendum can only be called after public notices have been placed in the paper for four consecutive

weeks, and then notices posted in the Town Hall, the Church door and six other locations in the area to be annexed."

He further stated that this notice must specify that a referendum will be held "not less than 15 days and no more than 20 days after the date of publication."

"The notices are only to notify the public there will be a meeting."

In the recent case, the Sweetsburg Council rejected Cowansville's By-law to annex a portion of Sweetsburg. "Then no notice is necessary."

Cowansville Secretary-treasurer, J. Rossier Ouellette, said that the annexation request was eventually obtained by signatures, "requesting annexation."

The Sweetsburg Citizens Committee hasn't dropped the issue yet. Although there are no more news coming from the SCC's office, a spokesman said "We're still fighting it."

Grafftey to pursue the case of a too-old Quebec plumber

OTTAWA (CP) — The case of a Quebec plumber who has an honorable army discharge after Second World War service in Britain, the Mediterranean and continental Europe may develop into a new cause celebre on Parliament Hill.

The main, with five years war service, says he was turned down for a job in the Canadian penitentiary service — as a plumber — because he is too old.

He is 48.

Heward Grafftey PC-Brome-Missisquoi raised the case in the Commons Thursday and said later in an interview he intends to pursue the matter because it strikes at the root of the preference that has been given war veterans in federal employment.

He said it also runs counter to the labor department's program to encourage employment to older workers—those over 45.

According to official records, Mr. Grafftey said, the unnamed artillery gunner from Quebec's eastern townships enlisted in July, 1940, and was discharged in October, 1945.

SEES JOB

He applied for a job as a plumber with the penitentiary service which is building a new institution in Cowansville, Que., and last month received a rejection from the Quebec regional office of the service.

The rejection had a notation that the maximum age for hiring plumbers is 45, "and you are 48."

"Because of this, your application cannot be considered favorably," the letter said.

Mr. Grafftey said he could understand that penitentiary guards might need to be under 45 to take the rigorous training and do the work required of them.

ASKS POLICY

He asked Justice Minister Favreau in the Commons whether the penitentiary commission refuses other jobs to men over 45. When Liberal MPs protested that it was such a routine question it should be submitted in routine fashion for a written reply, Mr. Grafftey said it was urgent because it affected the civil service commission, the labor department, and the veterans affairs department.

Mr. Favreau said he knew of no age limit, except for the guards in penitentiaries, and promised to look into the case.

Press urged to tone down Quebec incidents reports to help tourist business

QUEBEC (CP) — Spokesmen for the government and the Opposition suggested Thursday that newspaper men tone down their reports of incidents in Quebec to help the tourist business.

Lionel Bertrand, minister of tourism, fish and game, said in the legislature that last year the department sent out 1,800,000 brochures all over Canada and many hundreds were returned with comments on them.

They remarked that "the warmth of our hospitality could be very much appreciated but it seemed singularly explosive to them," the minister said.

The tourist business suffered for a time because of the situation in Quebec, he said, joining with Claude Gosselin (UN-Compton) in asking newspaper men "to help us, on this matter, by not giving added publicity to events which happened in the past and which could happen again."

TOURIST TRADE UP

Nevertheless, Mr. Bertrand said, the number of tourists was up in 1963 over 1962, although he could give the assembly no precise figures. About 1,000,000 cars came into Quebec from the United States and about 4,000,000 from other parts of Canada.

Mr. Gosselin wondered whether "blaring publicity" had affected the tourist trade. He said requests for information about the province had dropped about 50,000.

"I wonder sometimes whether this decrease, this lack of interest, is not caused by blaring publicity over certain incidents which have occurred in this province in the last two or three years."

Prospective visitors see Quebec's advertising and contrast it with news reports in the province. He asked reporters not to "amplify more than necessary certain incidents which have taken place in the province."

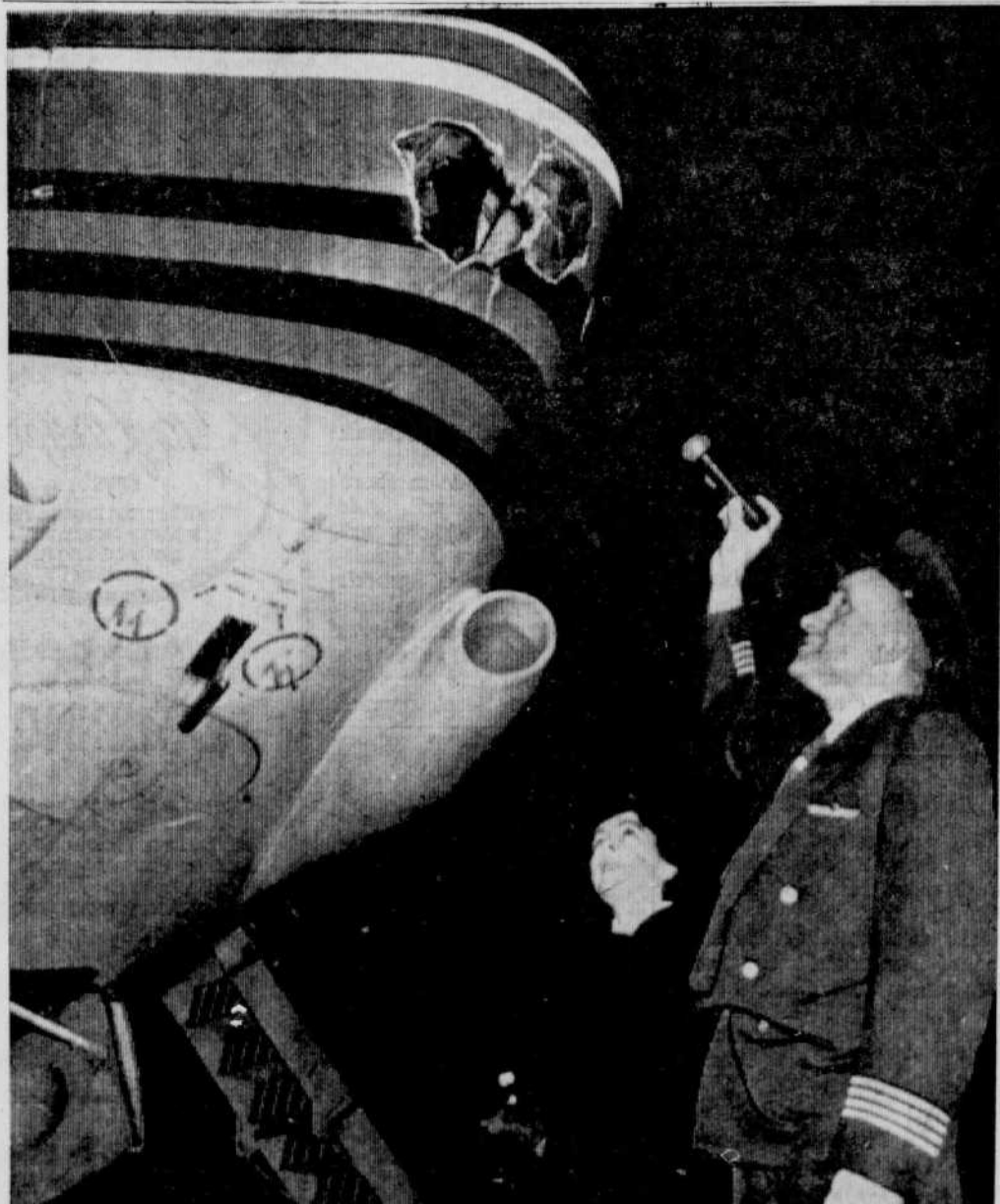

Today's recipe

COUNTRY FAIR DATE AND NUT SQUARES

(Makes 16 squares, 2-inch diameter)

¾ cup (small can) undiluted evaporated milk

1 cup chopped dates

½ cup shortening

½ cup sugar

1 egg

1 teaspoon vanilla

1 cup sifted flour

¼ teaspoon baking powder

1 teaspoon salt

½ cup chopped walnuts

Icing sugar

Heat evaporated milk and dates in saucepan over low heat, stirring occasionally until dates soften. Remove from heat and mix until thick paste forms. Cream shortening and sugar together in medium-sized bowl. Add egg and vanilla; beat well. Sift flour, baking powder and salt together and add to shortening mixture; mix well. Add date mixture and ¼ cup walnuts; stir well. Turn into greased 8-inch square pan. Sprinkle with remaining ¼ cup walnuts. Bake in 350° (moderate) oven 30 minutes, or until cake tests done. Cool. Sprinkle with icing sugar. Cut into 2-inch squares.

Father Hamel told the Richelieu Club of Montreal that the Roman Catholic Church in Haiti is underground persecution of an "insidious, indirect but effective" kind.

He said the police chief "insulted the priestly character" of himself, Father Paul Laramée and Brother François - Xavier Ross.

CLEVELAND, Ga. (AP)—Fire flashed like lightning through a two-storey frame home for the elderly Thursday, killing four persons.

Fifteen other aged persons in the College View Rest Home were helped from the burning building. Some were reported in a state of shock. One was described as being in fair condition.

Fire officials said a kitchen stove exploded, starting the fire.

TORONTO (CP)—An Ontario Supreme Court grand jury Thursday returned a true bill in an indictment for perjury against Ralph K. Farris, 53, president of Northern Ontario Natural Gas Company Limited.

Farris is charged with two counts of perjury in connection with statements he gave to commissioners investigating NONG stock transfers in 1958 and 1962.

Date of the trial by Supreme Court jury has been tentatively set for April 6.

NEW YORK (AP)—U.S. Attorney-General Robert F. Kennedy said Thursday night he believed the greatest contribution by his brother, the late president John F. Kennedy, was that "he made Americans feel young again."

He said his brother gave U.S. citizens more confidence in their own country and people in other countries great confidence in the United States and its leadership.

The attorney-general appeared on the National Broadcasting Company's Jack Paar show in behalf of the Kennedy Memorial Library to be built in Boston.

NEW YORK (AP)—A cashier accused of embezzling \$124,958 from a British-owned bank pleaded guilty to theft and forgery charges Thursday and was returned to jail to await sentencing April 22.

William Scorsia, 53, of New York, appeared before Justice George Postel in the criminal section of the Supreme Court.

Scorsia, described as a heavy better on horse races, was accused Feb. 19 of embezzling the money from the Chartered Bank between March, 1956, and Dec. 5, 1963. An assistant cashier, Scorsia had worked for the bank since he was 14.

LAUSANNE (AP)—The three-week trial of Swiss nerve specialist Dr. Gerard Savoy, accused of murdering rich American widow Marjorie Winifred Bird, of Matinecock, N.Y., by giving her fatal doses of drugs, ended here Thursday. Mrs. Bird died, aged 64, on July 22, 1961.

Mrs. Schepps, 52, was shot in the left thigh after being beaten to the floor, burned with a knife and shocked with the cattle prod. Schepps, 53, president of a tobacco firm, was beaten severely.

Later it was disclosed that Turkish-Cypriots opened up with machine-guns and rifles for half an hour on four British soldiers in Trakhanas. A British officer said the soldiers did not fire back and no one was injured.

Greek government and military leaders held urgent conferences at dawn today in Athens following the Turkish warning of intervention in Cyprus.

NAVY MANOEUVRES BEGIN

It was reliably learned that Greek naval units were ordered to begin "manoeuvres" between Crete and the Dodecanese Islands as they did when the Cyprus crisis reached a flash-point two weeks ago.

Foreign Minister Stavros Kostasopoulos of Greece separately received the British and U.S. ambassadors, Sir Ralph Murray and Henry Labouisse.

He told them the Turkish warning coupled with reported Turkish naval movements had caused "serious anxiety" in Athens.

He said "the Greek government steadily stands by its decision to react decisively by all means to any unilateral Turkish action on Cyprus."

Cyprus President Makarios, in Athens after attending the funeral Thursday of King Paul, had repeated telephone talks early this morning with Kostasopoulos.

Country Notebook

By WALKER RILEY

College Royal has come and gone. Thousands of hours preparation by students and staff, then in one short day it is over.

Since it was my first time through, I determined to have at least a quick look at everything. But I never did get all the way around; there was just too much to see.

The option exhibits were all well done. The General Biology students won first place with a demonstration of "Friendly Radiation". At the moment when radiation is a nasty word, their's was a timely theme. We have come to associate that word with deformed offspring, with deadly food and with contaminated plants.

But radiation isn't all bad.

In fact, some forms, when harnessed, are extremely useful. The students showed this in three good examples.

In the first, two rye plants were shown side by side. No difference, except one had two stems while the other had several tillers. Each plant had been grown from a single seed, but the second seed had been exposed to radiation. Succeeding generations will also carry the same tillering characteristic. This particular change (or mutation) may or may not prove to be beneficial. But it does point to the new doors open for plant breeders.

In the second example, the students showed the possibilities of radiation in food preservation. It destroys moulds and bacteria; it stops potatoes sprouting in storage. And the food is completely safe to eat.

The third part of their exhibit showed the use of radiation in agricultural research. For example, to find out how a plant uses phosphorus fertilizer, radioactive tracers are added. It is something like putting bells on the cows — you can find them in the dark. Only, in this case, the tracers expose themselves on photographic plates to give away the location of the phosphorus particles in the plant.

We are hoping to borrow this Friendly Radiation exhibit to take to Ottawa, on March 18, 19, 20. This year, the Ottawa Valley Seed Growers are expanding their fair to a full-grown Farm Show. It should be interesting.

If you are there, we hope you will look us up.

Syrup season is close now, but I haven't heard that anyone has tapped yet. We can only wait to see what effect the mild weather of the past few weeks will have on yield.

In the last year or two, there has been an interest in the use of formaldehyde pellets. These aspirin-like tablets are inserted in the fresh tap hole behind the spout. The purpose is to prevent the fungus growth which heals over the wood and slows sap flow.

I asked Professor A. R. C. Jones whether this treatment has any real value. He is doubtful.

They have tried it in the College sugar bush and the increase in sap flow was not significant. However, it did improve the keeping quality of the sap.

Legally, the use of these pellets is permitted provided that no more than 2 parts formaldehyde per million appears in the finished syrup. I understand that no manufacturer has yet registered them for sale in Canada, but that they are available in the States.

Personally, I hope the use of these pellets behind the spouts will not become a practice even though I know that formaldehyde occurs naturally in some foods. I like to think of maple syrup as one of Nature's purest products.

Prof. Jones does recommend, though, rinsing all the spouts, pails and equipment in a solution of "Javex".



Farm Forum Activities

PINNACLE

The Pinnacle Farm Forum met March 9 at the home of Mr. Roy Monahan.

The radio Farm Forum broadcast was listened to. The topic was ARDA at Work.

The Green Leaf was read to the members and discussion followed.

It was thought that ARDA has developed fairly well considering the relatively short time it has been in operation. A lot of interest has been created, especially in the Eastern Townships this past year.

However, more publicity and more information is needed to create a still wider interest and to get action.

This group thinks there is a definite need for more rural development leaders.

Another concern of ARDA should be the growing problem of water pollution everywhere. This forum would like to see more community pastures in Quebec.

Perhaps ARDA could set up its own training centre for rural development administrators and leaders.

The meeting closed with a lunch served by the hosts.

The next meeting will be held at the home of Walter Baker.

GALLUP HILL

The Gallup Hill Farm Forum met March 9 at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Clifford Mastine, Melbourn.

Fifteen people listened to the broadcast ARDA at Work and discussed the following questions:

What comments and suggestions do you have about ARDA as it has developed to date?

This group feels that ARDA has done a good job so far in encouraging people to sit up and take notice, even if there is not much tangible evidence of its work the publicity hasn't done any harm.

This group feels that people should not lose sight of the fact that the primary purpose of ARDA was "to help people to help themselves" and the Forum feel that ARDA publicity has helped a great number of people in this respect.

"ARDA was not designed to take our troubles away but as a means to help us find them out and to help us overcome them by self-initiative and self-confidence," the Forum members say.

In a lot of cases it has been left up to the local people to demand ARDA help but from the local point of view it is felt that in some cases it would be better for an ARDA officer to come into an area and to point out to the local people what projects would most likely benefit them, then they could progress from there. To leave it entirely up to the local people often causes a lot of discord and not everybody is satisfied.

Some people feel that ARDA will eventually be smothered out by politics, it is the feeling of this forum that a governing board be set up, the term of the officer to be longer than a government term of office so that there would be no political influence as a vote-getting gimmick.

What further projects and areas of action should ARDA undertake?

It's cheap. It's easy to work with. There's no rapid hardening. You can paint it as soon as it's in place. It does shrink, but if you treat the wood with linseed oil before filling, you can avoid some of this.

Some use white lead to cover a large surface in place of putty. Smooth with a putty knife, keep workable with linseed oil. Surface must be painted. One drawback is the substance is poisonous, and must be worked with extreme care.

For natural finishes stick to the wood putties—ready-mixed or mix it yourself.

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Do-it-yourself

Woodworkers know how to use wood

By MR. FIX

While wood fillers are sometimes used to cover up sloppy workmanship, it takes real skill to make a perfect patch with them. Thus, the sloppy worker is likely to use them poorly.

Various sorts of wood putty are no longer looked down on. Almost everyone—even the most skilled—used them. They can be used to cover up defects in the wood itself, fill in cracks and make an otherwise rejected

piece of wood usable, hide nail or screw holes and thereby make a more perfect job.

No one wood filler will handle all problems. Part of the skill in using them is in making the correct choice.

In Old Days

Old-timers made their own by mixing sawdust and glue. One advantage, besides cheapness, was that you match the filler with the surface by using sawdust from the same kind of wood.

Ready-mixed fillers are available in a variety of colors now and generally are more durable than homemade preparations. Once dried, the material can be worked just like wood. Nails, tacks and screws will hold in it as though it were the real thing. You can sand it and paint it, but it's usually too dense for staining.

Use it by applying with a putty knife or your fingers. Clean off residue before it dries. Build up layers about a quarter inch thick and let each dry before applying the next.

Keep the can tightly sealed or the solvent will evaporate leaving you with dry, hard, unusable filler.

Money Saver

If you need a great deal of filler you can save money with water-mixed wood putty. It comes in a dry, powder form and mixing with water makes it ready to use.

When dry it is white, which makes no difference when you are painting. For natural finish-

es, stain by using a water soluble powder mixed into the dry powder. The dried filler can be sanded.

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Money Saver

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For natural finishes stick to the wood putties—ready-mixed or mix it yourself.

Lawns ask your care in spring

Big changes have taken place in lawn fertilizers or plant

foods in the past five years and now we have several new ones high in nitrogen which will be welcomed by every home gardener.

With all signs at the moment pointing to an early spring let me emphasize that just as soon as the snow has gone in March is the time to give the lawn its most important feeding of the year.

We may as well realize that the lawn is a perfect mechanism for exhausting the supply of plant food in the soil. At least once a week during most of the active gardening season half the plant is cut away and removed from the lawn.

Even when the clippings are allowed to remain, there's considerable loss of plant food, particularly nitrogen. Quantities of the latter are used up in the process of breaking down the clippings into available plant food once again.

NITROGEN DISAPPEARS

You may say "Why all this bother to feed a lawn in March when the daytime temperatures are none too comfortable?"

The answer lies in the fact that just as soon as the soil temperature reaches 42 degrees Fahrenheit the grass plants start to grow and are immediately in need of nitrogen.

Then say "I fed my lawn the recommended number of times last year, surely some of that nitrogen is left over for the early spring needs of the grass plants."

Sad to relate, since your lawn was last fed in 1963 the remaining water-soluble nitrogen will

have gradually leached away in the soil moisture.

It's true that there will be a considerable quantity of the other form of nitrogen known as organic but it will not be available to the grass plants until released by the action of billions of soil bacteria.

Take my word for it, it's a proven scientific fact that these microscopic soil organisms do not start working in the earth until the soil temperature reaches 60 degrees.

Depending where you live and the particular season, this can vary anywhere from the middle of April to the first week in May. It also means that your grass plants can actually be starving for periods up to four or five weeks.

Experience Will Tell

In choosing a particular brand of fertilizer or plant food for your lawn make sure that it contains a type of nitrogen which will be immediately available to the grass plants just as soon as it comes in contact with the soil moisture.

Don't fight shy of some of the new lightweight brands whose 20 to 25-pound bags are sufficient to cover 5,000 square feet of lawn area.

Experience will show which type of fertilizer is the best for your needs. The main thing is to feed your lawn something and feed it regularly. Without a regular feeding of fertilizer or plant food it can never be the green carpet you desire.

With the season for diseases and insects just ahead, selection of equipment for applying pesticides is in order. The first question is whether to spray

or dust.

Experts agree that spraying, if done faithfully, is more effective than dusting. The catch is that preparing and applying sprays is not a hurry-up job.

Water and chemical must be measured, the tank filled and pressure built up. Afterwards, tank and hose must be thoroughly washed out to prevent gumming and corrosion.

While dusts are less effective, a dust that is applied is infinitely better than a spray that remains in the bottle. Chances are much greater that a dust will be used regularly.

A duster is easy to keep filled and used in the few minutes available before the gardener leaves for the office. There is no wash-up period afterwards.

FOG SHOULD BE GENERATED

Perhaps the best practice is to keep both a sprayer and a duster in readiness, using the sprayer whenever time permits but relying on dusts when time is limited.

sprayer is a four-gallon metal tank with a pump attached to bring up pressure. The most important part of this unit is the nozzle.

When applying insecticides and fungicides the rule is to use high pressure and a fine nozzle opening so that a fog will be generated.

A neglected type of sprayer is the trombone or bucket type. It has a tubular body which acts like a pump, with one part sliding into the other and generating pressure.

A hose at the lower end sucks a pesticide solution from a bucket. By adjusting the nozzle this sprayer can be used to apply liquids to the top of a 40-foot tree, or adjusted to wet a low-growing shrub.

Dodgers bat strength shifts from home runs to base hits

VERO BEACH, Fla. (CP)—Los Angeles Dodgers may be looking for their home-run power this year from the likes of Sandy Koufax and Johnny Podres.

Don't laugh. Frank Howard, who contributed 28 of the world champions' 110 four-baggers last season, may not be back. Five others came from Bill Skowron and Don Zimmer, who were traded away.

Which means assuming everybody makes last year's performance, that manager Walt Alton can look for 77 homers this season from the men who played for him in 1962. And he needs one apiece from his two ace southpaws to make it.

Howard, the only authentic long-ball hitter in the Los Angeles lineup, said Thursday he is considering retirement because of unrevealed personal problems.

The news left Alton juggling his potential lineup and commenting that "we may have to win it with more base hits, more running and better pitching."

TOP PITCHING STAFF

He won't get much better pitching than he had last year from Koufax, Podres, Don Drysdale and Ron Perranoski, who headed the best off in the league with a collective earned-run average of 2.95. He has a two-time batting champion in Tommy Davis and baseball's best base-stealer in Maury Wills.

For the rest, he'll need a lot of mileage from rookies like Al Ferrara (.321 and 19 home runs at Spokane last year) and Wes Parker (a combined .315 and 15 homers at Santa Barbara and Albuquerque).

While the Dodgers prepared to test their potential tonight in

the first of their pre-season exhibition games against Mexico City Tigers at Mexico City, another man with personal problems was giving headaches to manager Fred Hutchinson of Cincinnati Reds.

Joey Jay, still counted on as a main cog on Hutchinson's pitching staff despite a disappointing 7-18 record last season, walked out of the Reds' training camp at Tampa, Fla., Thursday saying he had to take time off to look into an expiring lease on his house in Cincinnati and his oil-well interests in Spencer, W.Va.

Hutchinson said Jay had left without his permission and promised action against the 29-year-old right hander on his promised return tonight.

Kansas City Athletics, still looking for a signature from slugger Rocky Colavito whom they acquired from Detroit Tigers in an off-season trade, settled for right-hander Moe Drabowsky Thursday. Drabowsky signed for a reported \$16,000, a \$5,000 raise over his salary in 1963 when he won seven games and lost 13.

In exhibition games, John Boccabella drove in the winning run for the second day in a row as his bases-loaded single in the 10th inning gave Chicago Cubs a 4-3 victory over San Francisco Giants at Mesa, Ariz. Both clubs have won four games in five starts. At Scottsdale, Ariz., Joey Amalfitano's bases-empowered homer in the sixth inning gave Los Angeles Angels a 2-1 victory over Boston Red Sox.

Leafs official says Stan best

TORONTO (CP)—King Clancy, assistant manager of Toronto Maple Leafs, Thursday referred to Stan Mikita of Chicago Black Hawks as the best hockey player in the National Hockey League.

Clancy, who has been in the NHL as player, referee, coach and assistant manager for 43 years, compared the 23-year-old Mikita with Howie Morenz, considered one of the greatest centres in league history.

"The best—by 100 miles," declared Clancy, whose third-place Maple Leafs are bitter rivals of the league-leading Black Hawks. "To me he's better this year than Montreal Canadiens' star centre Jean Beliveau and more important to Hawks than Bobby Hull. If they lost him they might fall from sight."

"He's a better defensive player than Hull," continued Clancy, "and he's only got four goals less (40-36); he's the best checking centre in the league but he's leading the scoring, too (85 points); and he's the biggest part of their power play."

"He's as good a small man as I've ever seen."

Clancy is in a good position to rate little men, big ones too having spent 16 seasons on defence for Ottawa, then Toronto, at playing weights that rarely topped 140 pounds.

Since graduating to the Hawks from St. Catharines Juniors five seasons ago, the five foot, nine inch, 165-pound Mikita has missed only 12 games, has scored 119 goals and earned 198 assists.

Ski jumping meet on this weekend

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada's top ski jumpers swing into action at nearby Camp Fortune, Quebec, over the weekend in the last of four tournaments of champions to be held this season.

Performances in the tournaments will help determine the makeup of Canada's national jumping team. In addition, a brewery is offering expenses-paid training trips both overseas and in North America to the best jumpers.

Performers taking part in the Camp Fortune meet include Kaare Lunde of Revelstoke, who won the Canadian title last week, Jacques Chariand of Trois-Rivieres, seven times the Canadian champion, and Rhea Seguin of Hull, Que., a member of the national team since 1958.

Northern Dancer to race in Kentucky Derby this year

If Native Dancer could talk, he undoubtedly would have a word of advice for his grandson, Northern Dancer, who carries Canada's hopes in the Kentucky Derby at Louisville May 2. The elderly Dancer, now living a luxurious life at Alfred G. Vanderbilt's Sagamore Farms in Glyndon, Md., had a frustrating 1953 Derby afternoon.

That was the day he lost a photo-finish verdict to Dark Star in the run for the roses. Not only that, it was the big grey's only loss in a 22-start, three-year career that gave him a record of 20 wins, 24 in purses.

Vanderbilt probably kicks the slats out of Native Dancer's stall whenever he recalls the Derby race 11 years ago.

He had his pride and joy primed to become the eighth horse in history to capture the triple crown—Derby, Preakness and Belmont—since Canadian-owned Sir Barton did it first in 1919. The Derby was first on the schedule and Vanderbilt's dreams were shattered fast.

The legend has grown that Native Dancer lost the race because he was bumped by Money Broker on the first turn of the 1 1/4-mile classic. But, say historians, that doesn't tell the whole story.

He did lose ground on the first turn, but it was not at a key point in the race. The horses still had seven furlongs to run, plenty of time and ground for the Dancer to come on again.

He was fourth and in striking distance at the far turn, still one-half mile from the finish. He got through along the rail, regained as much ground as he had lost on the first turn, and had a clear shot at Dark Star in the stretch but just failed to catch the flying leader.

Native Dancer went on to win the Preakness and Belmont, and now is one of 21 three-year-olds who have won two of the three U.S. triple crown classics since 1875.

In 1954, Native Dancer raced three times, won them all, and then was retired to stud. He sired Naltama, Northern Dancer's mommy. The sire is a native, horse of the year in Canada in 1958, and still standing at stud with Naltama at the National Stud in Oshawa, Ont.

Now, the pressure is on Northern Dancer, owned by E. P. Taylor of Toronto and winner of the \$100,000-added Flamingo Stakes at Hialeah earlier this month. The \$89,830 Taylor picked up for that one brought Northern Dancer's earnings to

ET lakes fishing season shortened

QUEBEC (CP)—The Quebec fish and game department said Wednesday bass fishing in Lake Massawippi, southeast of Magog in the Eastern Townships, will be allowed only between May 1 and Oct. 30.

A department spokesman said an error in a list of fishing dates issued by the department last week mistakenly said the fishing would be allowed between May 1 and next April 15.

The spokesman said the fishing regulations to protect bass in the Eastern Townships' Lake Massawippi were implemented at the request of the Stanstead Fish and Game Club.

Bass fishing in the lake will be permitted only between July 1 and next April 15. The season was previously unlimited.

The bass fishing in the lake was reported to have deteriorated in the last few seasons.

Fish and game department biologists are studying the Massawippi situation which some observers say may not be caused only by over fishing.

Red Wings within two points of Toronto edge Boston with goals by Ullman, Howe

In his unobtrusive manner, Norm Ullman has emerged as one of the most effective performers in the National Hockey League since the Christmas turn.

The first half of the season was a unqualified flop for the way-haired fellow with the plug-away style.

His output, embarrassingly amounted to four goals. But only Chicago's prolific Bobby Hull and Kenny Wharram have been going better in the second half.

Ullman, a 28-year-old centre, reached the 20-goal level and set up Gordie Howe's gamewinner when Detroit Red Wings shaded Boston Bruins 2-1 in the schedule's only game Thursday night.

The house count at the Olympia was 9,424 and only twice before this season have there been smaller crowds at Detroit, a reflection of Boston's plight in the standings.

For the fourth consecutive

season, the Bruins are destined to wind up last.

But Ullman's Red Wings are still making a scramble of it with Toronto for third place and the win lifted them to within two points of the Maple Leafs although the Canadian team has a game in hand.

Howe's power-play goal 23 seconds after the start of the second period was the difference. In the penalty box at the time was Boston's Forbes Kennedy, serving a minor carry-over from 19:37 of the opening period.

Ullman counted at 17:02 of the opener, exactly a half-minute after a minor penalty he was tagged with by referee Vern Bueffey expired.

Howe and Alex Delvecchio assisted. It was Ullman's 16th goal in the second-half of the campaign. A 26-goal man in the two previous seasons, he started the schedule needing only as many again to hit the 200-goal circle.

But his inexplicably-poor first-half leaves him shy. Nonetheless only Hull with 19 goals and Wharram with 18 have been more productive around the league in the second half.

Twenty-year-old Gary Dornhoefer found the mark for Boston's only goal. It was his 12th in 29 games and he undoubtedly would be a serious candidate for Rookie-of-the-Year honors had he been called up earlier.

NS senior hockey champion Windsor looks forward to Allan Cup finals

DARTMOUTH, N.S. (CP)—"We've got the Allan Cup in our hands right now," shouted jubilant George Guilbault here Thursday night.

Guilbault, a high-scoring centre with Windsor Maple Leafs, may have been a little over-exuberant after the club wrapped up the Nova Scotia Senior Hockey League championship.

But if this season's record in the NSHL is any indication, Guilbault and his mates could be excused for being confident. Their 3-1 victory over Halifax Schooners here Thursday night was the only tough game they had in eight playoff battles.

They disposed of New Glasgow Rangers in four straight in the best-of-seven semi-finals and repeated the sweep in the finals with Halifax.

Leafs, whose home is in an Annapolis Valley town of 3,900 about 40 miles from here, are used to winning. In 70 league games this year, they lost only nine while winning 58 and tying three.

The Windsor club, with an average age of 23, is virtually assured of being the Maritime representatives in Allan Cup play this season. They will have to dispose of the Cape Breton Prince Edward Island winner, but they expect no difficulty in

that series next week.

Playing coach Georges Roy, one of the NSHL's top defencemen, showed rare confidence after Thursday's game here.

"We'll go right through," he said. He is allowed to bolster his team with six players from NSHL teams and he figures with added strength the Leafs will be in a good position to win the Allan Cup.

Roy said he hasn't decided yet who he will pick up from the NSHL, but he mentioned Luke Hayden (Halifax defenceman), Jim Helki (Halifax goaltender), Oscar Gaudet (Moncton Hawks forward) as possibilities.

Asked to compare his team with last year's Moncton club which reached the Eastern Canada Allan Cup finals, Roy said "this team has much more heart than Moncton had last season."

Halifax playing coach Doug McPhee said Windsor "could go all the way if they keep playing the way they are now."

McPhee spoke from experience. His team scored only two goals against Windsor in four games, while Leafs scored 21 on Halifax.

Leaf winger Rod Gaudreault said: "I think we can win the Allan Cup. We're 50 per cent better than Moncton was last year."
