

THAW TO CONCORD; JEROME GOES HOME

Hearing Before Governor Next Week. Way Open For Fight Even to Supreme Court of United States. Littleton Public Demonstration Exceeds Anything in Canada. "Matteawan Never Again For Me", Says Thaw. The Case of Constable Andrews, of Coaticook, Roger Thompson, Thaw's Chauffeur Before, Sherbrooke Court To-Day and Set Free

Littleton, N.H., Sept. 17.—At 9.59, this morning, Harry K. Thaw and his retinue of officials, lawyers and reporters, boarded the Boston & Maine train for Concord, N.H., the State capital, where they are due to arrive at 2.10 p.m.

They go to Concord for the hearing before Governor Felker. This is not likely to take place before next Tuesday.

DEMONSTRATION AT LITTLETON.

The Thaw demonstrations here greatly exceeded anything of the kind seen during his detention in Sherbrooke. The entire populace turned out and during the progress from the Court house to the hotel, yesterday, the Matteawan fugitive was cheered the entire distance. Jerome came in for a hostile demonstration. "Go back to New York" shouted the crowd. The scenes at Sherbrooke were not a patch on the demonstrations here yesterday. There was no outburst in the Court room for the reason that the general public were not admitted. All who entered had previously obtained cards of admission. Those present included the elite of the town, many of them ladies.

FOLLOWS CROWDS ADVICE.

William Travers Jerome, N.Y. Attorney Kennedy and Captain Lanyon left for New York last night. Jerome has apparently abandoned all hope of speedy success in his mission to return Thaw to Matteawan.

"The gates of that institution will never close on me again," declared Thaw last night.

His lawyers profess the same opinion.

The action of Federal Judge Aldrich, yesterday, was of greatest importance to Thaw. It opens the way for a fight right up to the Supreme Court of the United States if he requires it.

"There is no doubt that Thaw can now obtain a jury trial in New Hampshire on the merits of his pretensions against return to New York if it is deemed necessary," said one of his lawyers last night.

The Court action yesterday put an end to all possibility of railroadings. The Federal Court and the courts of New Hampshire will take their time. The New York representatives receive far less official consideration here than they did in Canada, as is evidenced by the rebuke administered to Jerome by the Federal Judge yesterday.

SITUATION AT CONCORD.

Governor Felker is the next step in proceedings. The hearing before the Governor is not likely to take place before next Tuesday.

The Governor is deluged with petitions and letters not only from New Hampshire but from all parts of the United States.

There is little doubt that the Governor will leave the matter to the Courts. He stated some time ago that he would be greatly influenced by the report of Attorney-General Tuttle. The Attorney-General was present at the hearing yesterday, heard the rulings of the Federal Judge and there is scarcely a doubt that his recommendation will be against summary action in the matter of extradition.

Attorney Moses Crossman, of New York, has an absolute grasp of the Thaw case and he states emphatically that summary extradition is no longer possible.

Thaw will have his chance for a fair fight in the Courts of the United States. It is likely, eventually, to come to a sanity test in this State. If he passes there, will, when that point is reached, in all probability, be nothing further in the way of his freedom.

THAW'S PLEASANT DAY AT LITTLETON.

Thaw spent yesterday perhaps his happiest day since his first incarceration. He witnessed the opening of the way of a fair fight for freedom and saw, also, the discomfort of his nemesis, Jerome.

Yesterday afternoon, accompanied by U. S. Marshal E. P. Nute and Sheriff Drew he went for a long walk into the country. Under Federal protection the fear of kidnapping has passed. He remained at the hotel last night.

During the evening he played for an hour on the piano, in the parlors of the hotel, for the entertainment of officials, lawyers, reporters and citizens. He is an excellent musician and seemed as happy as a boy.

JEROME CRESTFALLEN.

Before leaving for New York Mr. Jerome had little or nothing to say. "Thaw is tied up now with a Federal writ," he said, "and there is no getting around it. But the questions to be decided by the Governor are simple and we hope for victory."

Concluding his rescript yesterday, Judge Aldrich engaged Mr. Jerome in colloquy as regards Thaw's status as an insane man or a criminal. It was perhaps the most interesting part of the brief court procedure.

The court's rebuke to Jerome, as briefly told in yesterday's despatch, was the sensation of the hearing before Federal Judge Aldrich. It started when Attorney Merrill Shurtleff asked for adjournment.

Jerome was on his feet in an instant. "I desire to interpose objection to any delay," he said. "I move that this hearing proceed forthwith and that the writ be quashed. Examination of the return will show that the questions raised in the application are frivolous and raise no new question of law or fact. There is no Federal issue involved and I feel constrained to say that this writ was obtained under circumstances which approach very near trifling with the court. I have here the affidavit of Lindsay Denison, based on statements made by the loquacious court for the other side."

"You need not use that term loquacious, Mr. Jerome," said the court severely.

"I withdraw the remark," said Jerome.

"I will say now," continued the court, "that unless you have a pretty strong case I advise you to save the trouble of raising the issue of bad faith."

Mr. Jerome sat down. Governor Morris, one of Thaw's New Hampshire lawyers, then addressed the court. He said in brief that the writ in Thaw's behalf had been obtained because under the New Hampshire status there was no recourse to the courts in case the Governor honored the extradition warrant and the New York authorities cared to remove the fugitive instantly.

"We will agree," said Jerome, rising, "that we will use no undue haste in removing Thaw should his extradition be granted. We are willing and anxious to proceed in a legal and eminently fair manner."

"Do you wish to press this question of bad faith?" inquired the court.

Mr. Jerome paused a moment, then said that in view of the assurances from the other side he would let the matter drop.

"Then," said Judge Aldrich, "the only question to be decided is whether this hearing shall go on or be suspended."

In concluding his remarks on the proceedings, Judge Aldrich said: "Holding pendency and control of this proceeding under suspension menaces rights of neither of the parties concerned nor of the state authorities. Such considerations make it justifiable that the hearing under the writ before us be suspended to the end that the executive of the state shall have a free hand in respect to the extradition investigation."

"It must be understood that it is open to the petitioner, at any time, to press the alleged constitutional right of an immediate hearing. It is likewise open to the parties representing the State of New York or the State of New Hampshire to move at any time for a hearing or for a dismissal of the writ."

In conclusion, the court said that Thaw was subject to re-commitment to state authority, to be held in bail or placed in the custody of suitable keepers. He recommended Marshall Nute and Holman A. Drew, sheriff of Coos County, as custodians, and they were selected.

FOUNDATIONS FOR LONG LEGAL FIGHT.

Counsel for Harry K. Thaw have laid the foundations for plans to carry his case to the Supreme Court of the United States.

When the Governor of New Hampshire passes on the matter of his extradition to New York, at the hearing to be held at Concord on Tuesday next, the findings, if adverse to Thaw, will be reviewed by the United States District Court, and should a decision against him be rendered, successive appeals will be taken until the case reaches the highest court in the land.

This was the announcement made by the Thaw lawyers last night after the most notable court victory for

THOMPSON IS FREE IN CANADA

Thaw's Chauffeur Liberated in Sherbrooke To-Day

HAS OFFER OF \$500 PER WEEK FOR VAUDEVILLE ACT WITH FLIGHT AUTOMOBILE.

Roger Thompson, Thaw's chauffeur in his famous flight from Matteawan, is a free man in Canada.

After several adjournments of his case, Thompson came before Judge Mulvena this morning.

Mr. F. Campbell, K.C., representing the Immigration Department, declared that after full investigation by the officers of the Department, both in Toronto and in New York, it had been ascertained beyond any doubt that Mr. Thompson was a Canadian citizen, and that the Department had therefore decided to offer no evidence on the complaint.

Mr. D. H. Reynolds, Inspector of Immigration, was in Court on behalf of the Department.

THOMPSON HAS VAUDEVILLE OFFER.

Thompson will leave Sherbrooke this afternoon. He has an offer of \$500 per week to appear on the vaudeville stage. It is understood he is endeavoring to secure the automobile in which the flight was made.

In his vaudeville stunt this would be run on to the stage, and from it Thompson would relate incidents of his experiences.

Thompson created a very favorable impression with all who met him here. The immigration authorities could find nothing wrong in his entire record. He has now won fame, and as he says, "I can't go back to New York just yet, and so must find some way in which to earn an honest living in Canada for a while."

ANDREWS OUT ON BAIL BOND

Must Answer Charge at Rutland in October

WELL TREATED BY VERMONT OFFICERS—QUITE READY TO FACE CHARGES, HE SAYS.

Coaticook, Sept. 17.—(Special)—Constable John Andrews, arrived home from Newport, Vt., last evening, having been liberated earlier in the day on furnishing bail bonds to the amount of \$1,000 to appear before the Court in Rutland, Vt., in October next on the charge of violating the United States Immigration Act.

"I was not arrested at Colebrook, N.H.," said Mr. Andrews to the Record this morning. "As a matter of fact they could not have held me in that State because the alleged offence was committed in the State of Vermont. When I was informed that I was wanted in Vermont I told the officer that I was quite ready and willing to face any charge they had against me, and for that purpose I said I would accompany them to Vermont. They wanted me to go to Canaan, Vt., but I told them that this would put them out of the way and I suggested that they should go to Island Pond. The officers were much pleased at my suggestion and when we got into Vermont they read some sort of a paper to me.

At Island Pond I was given a nice bed in the State house, and the officials treated me with great courtesy. Later I went to Newport, Vt., and appeared before the Clerk of the Court there, and gave a bond of \$1,000 to appear before the Court at Rutland, Vt., in October next. There was no charge read to me."

"I must say that the Vermont officers treated me well and I cannot thank them enough," concluded Mr. Andrews.

ARSON SQUAD AGAIN AT WORK

Attempt Made to Burn Down Historic Seat of Lord Dudley

INMATES OF GREAT MANSION AWAKENED BY SMOKE AND EXTINGUISHED FIRE.

London, Sept. 17.—(Special)—A desperate attempt by a suffragette "arson squad" to burn down Penhurst, the historic fourteenth century country seat of Lord DeLisle and Dudley, at Turnbridge, Kent, was made in the course of last night.

The inmates of the great mansion were awakened by the crackling of wood and by clouds of smoke after the framework of a number of windows was ablaze. A working party of household employees soon succeeded in extinguishing the flames with the efficient apparatus on the premises.

Two women were seen fleeing across the lawn in front of the building.

Improved B. & M. Service Under Winter Schedule

WINDSOR MILLS WILL ORGANIZE BOARD OF TRADE.

The quarterly meeting of the Eastern Townships Associated Boards of Trade will be held at Ayer's Cliff on Thursday, September 25th. Delegates will arrive at Ayer's Cliff on the noon Boston & Maine train, excepting in the case of members from Bedford district boards. It is understood that arrangements are being made to convey them from Montreal to Ayer's Cliff as their train would reach Sherbrooke too late to connect with B. & M.

THE IMMIGRATION MATTER

Arrangements are being made for a conference with E. T. representatives at Quebec relative to the best steps to take in connection with the question of immigration. This meeting, it is expected, will take place prior to the Ayer's Cliff meeting.

WINDSOR WILL HAVE BOARD OF TRADE.

Windsor Mills, Sept. 17.—(Special)—A meeting of business men will be held next Thursday evening for the purpose of organizing a Board of Trade.

Some sixty citizens have signified their intention of joining.

It is expected that Richmond and Sherbrooke Boards of Trade representatives will be present to assist in the organization.

IMPROVED B. & M. WINTER SERVICE.

The Boards of Trade representations to the Boston & Maine Railway have succeeded in bringing about a winter train schedule much more accommodating than that which has prevailed in the past.

The Boston & Maine will continue throughout the winter train service from Sherbrooke in afternoon. When the winter schedule goes into effect, this train will leave at 5 p.m. instead of 5.20, the summer hour of departure. The winter service will be in the form of a passenger coach attached to a freight but it will be a great improvement over the old winter schedule which provided for no afternoon service at all, and people had to wait till the 9.45 p.m. train.

Under the winter schedule the early morning train will not leave Sherbrooke till 7.45. This will be a great improvement. The incoming morning train will not be due to arrive till 7.30, so this train will be much more convenient for people coming to Sherbrooke than formerly in the winter.

A letter has been received from Mr. H.E. Folsom confirming this arrangement.

DUKE OF CONNAUGHT'S RETURN TO CANADA

Expected That Duchess Will Accompany Him on October 24

PREPARATIONS ARE NOW BEING MADE IN LONDON FOR DEPARTURE OF THEIR ROYAL HIGHNESSES.

London, September 17.—The Duke of Connaught hopes to return to Canada about October 24th. The Duchess of Connaught is making satisfactory convalescence, and is expected to return to Ottawa with the Duke. Major Murray, comptroller of the English household, is in town making preparations for their departure. Unless there should be any change, the wedding procession will go from Prince Arthur's state apartments to the private chapel. There is a suggestion to erect seats for guests in the color court. There will be a few privileged spectators, but the chapel accommodation is limited. The massive pews will be temporarily removed from the chapel. The officiating clergy will probably be the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Bishop of London and Canon Sheppard. The musical director will be Dr. Alcock. After King George and Prince Arthur have conferred on details of the ceremony, the full programme will be published. The King and the Princess Royal are also having frequent consultations. Apart from the troupe, all work is falling on the royal staff of Buckingham Palace. The chef is making a wonderful cake and is responsible for the menus.

AGAINST GENERAL STRIKE.

Jena, Germany, Sept. 17.—The "general strike" as a political weapon in the way of Belgium, and at earlier periods in France and Russia, was the subject of a warm and extended debate by the Socialist convention here yesterday. It, however, found few friends as a measure for immediate use.

JUDGES FINISHED THEIR WORK THIS FORENOON—ATTENDANCE FOR FIRST DAY GOOD.

Waterloo, Sept. 17.—(Special)—The Shefford County Agricultural Fair opened yesterday morning and is being continued to-day. The weather was all that could be desired for the occasion and in consequence it was a gala day in Waterloo. There was a good attendance from the surrounding country. The proceedings were enlivened by selections from the Garrison Military Band of Montreal. There are the usual midway attractions which delight the soul of the small boy and his older and bigger brother. There was also the inevitable attendance of the fraternity who "swap de horse."

There is a splendid showing of horses of all kinds, and while the exhibits of cattle are not as numerous as in former years, yet the grades are higher, being mostly thoroughbred, as the farmers in this section are going more into "thoroughbred stock than formerly. The exhibit of sheep is exceptional in size and the quality is fine. The exhibit makes a good showing, many fine specimens being on the ground. The poultry department is a very interesting show as the farmers in this section vie with each other in raising pure bred specimens of the best breeds. Vegetables, while not a large exhibit, make up by being a very superior quality. Good judges say that in this respect they are very much ahead of any collections exhibited for many years.

The fruit, owing to the ravages of the tent caterpillars and the late frosts this spring, is not as good as usual, but still some very fine collections are on exhibit. The exhibits in the fancy work department are about the average of former years.

The directors have spared no pains to make this show the best in history. New buildings have been erected for the poultry and swine, and everything has been put in tip top shape.

The wants of the visitors are being catered to by the members of the Ladies' Aid Society of the Methodist Church, who are serving excellent dinners. Everything has been done by the directors for the comfort of the visitors and this with the beautiful weather and good roads in the surrounding country is a guarantee of a successful exhibition. The President, Mr. H. Phelps, the Secretary, Mr. N. O. Rockwell, and the directors are to be congratulated on the success of their endeavors.

RICHMOND COUNTY FAIR

Judges Make Mention of Fine Quality of Stock on Exhibition

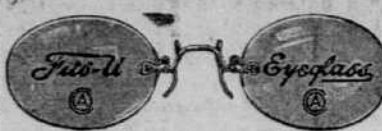

PIANOFORTE RECITAL.

EUROPE'S TINIEST STATE

Moresnet Only as Big as a Good Sized Farm

When the Ambassadors of Europe agreed that the peninsula of Athos, in Macedonia, should be regarded as an independent State, many people thought that they had at last discovered the smallest state in the whole world.

Athos, however, has an area of 180 square miles, roughly. It is a huge country compared with Moresnet, a tiny neutral state on the borders of Belgium and Prussia. Its area is reckoned in acres, not square miles! In size, in fact, is 1,400 acres—just a good sized farm!

Moresnet was made a separate state in 1815, after Napoleon had been finally crushed at Waterloo. The reason that the little country has remained independent is rather curious.

As has been said, the tiny state is on the borders of Germany and Belgium. It possesses what was once the most important and valuable zinc mine in the whole world. Belgium wanted that zinc, and so did Germany. As they couldn't agree on the amount of compensation to the other, Moresnet remained independent.

The tiniest country in the world lies four miles away from Aix-la-Chapelle, and possesses one village. There's not room for two! The total number of inhabitants is under 3,000. Recently Germany began negotiations with Belgium to acquire her tiny neighbor, though the Belgians say they prefer to be under Belgian rule, if they can't be independent.

PROBLEM OF TWINS

How Sarah Was Asked to Sing Elizabeth's Song, and Both Wept

How to distinguish between six pairs of twins, each pair being exactly the same in appearance, is a daily problem for the teachers of a children's school at Woodend, near Shipley, Yorkshire.

Five of the pairs are girls, and none of the twins are more than eight years of age. According to the usual plan of mothers the twin sisters are dressed similarly, with the result that confusion is frequent at school. For instance, there was a school concert, and each of one pair of twins, Sarah and Elizabeth Mounsey, had learned a little song for the occasion.

When the time came the sisters had changed places and the teacher asked Sarah to stand up and sing Elizabeth's song, at which the real little Elizabeth, thinking she was going to be robbed of her privilege, began to weep, and Sarah wept in unison.

It is a curious phenomenon with regard to the twins at the school that when one gives way to tears the other follows suit. One method of identification used is to allot each one a certain place, but sometimes the mites get into the wrong places, and this plan fails.

Even the mothers often find difficulty in distinguishing their own children, but the mother of Annie and Doris Denby hit upon the idea of ornamenting Annie with a necklace of blue beads and her sister with one of white beads.

Evidence was given by a boy of six at the inquest at Arundel on his mother, Mrs. Greenfield, and his four-year-old sister, who were drowned in the Arun. He said that he and his mother and sister were dropping stones into the water, when his sister lost her balance and fell in. His mother jumped in after her, and witness also jumped in. He could not see "Mummie," and so he scrambled out again. His father, a postman, said he could not understand how the boy managed to get out. The child said he swam out, but he had only had one swimming lesson, when his father taught him strokes on a mat.

AUCTION DEAD-HEADS

Men Brought in to Act as Decoys for the Public

How Londoners are decoyed into salerooms was described at Bow street during the hearing of a case against Ernest Collard, John Callaghan and Arthur Smythe who were charged with assaulting an auctioneer named Dent.

Mr. Dent said his brother was selling goods by auction when Collard threw a biscuit barrel at him, but it just missed him. Saying that he was going to smash the shop up, Collard then struck Mr. Dent with a bronze horse and threw a figure at him. Callaghan struck him with a stick and he also received a punch from Smythe.

He had given Collard odd jobs as a "dead-head" but he was not employed in the shop when the row took place. Dent admitted that he employed men to stay in his auction room as an inducement for others to come in, and also that he had occasionally given them money with which to make purchases. He denied, however, that he supplied his "dead-heads" with counterfeit money so that they might get outsiders in a buying mood by seeing a brisk business going on. The young men were fined.

Welsh Stone for Halifax

Some time ago Mr. Lloyd George was asked to obtain a slab of Welsh stone to be built into a memorial to be erected at Halifax, Nova Scotia, to commemorate the opening of the first Parliament Assembly in British America. The Chancellor of the Exchequer laid the matter before Mr. Haydn Jones, M.P., who agreed to supply a slab from his quarry. The slab was completed and engraved with the red dragon of Wales.

COUNTRY PRODUCE.

ACTIVE BUSINESS IN EGGS

Montreal, Sept. 17.—Receipts of eggs were 536 cases, as compared with 1,302 for the corresponding date last year. The tone of the market is strong at the recent advance in prices, owing to the fact that the supplies coming forward are not sufficient to fill the daily requirements of the trade on account of the demand being much larger than usual for this season of the year and quite an active business is doing.

MAPLE PRODUCTS QUIET

Montreal, Sept. 17.—There is no change in maple product, for which the demand is still limited and the market is consequently quiet and featureless.

We quote prices as follows: Maple syrup, in the wood, per lb., 7c. to 8c.; maple sugar, per lb., 9c. to 10c.

SLOW DEMAND FOR HONEY

Montreal, Sept. 17.—The trade in honey shows little improvement, owing to the fact that buyers seem to be fairly well supplied for the present and in consequence the demand is slow.

We quote prices as follows: Clover, white honey, 10c. to 11c.; dark grades, 8c. to 10c.; buckwheat honey, 8c. to 9c.

BEAN MARKET QUIET

Montreal, Sept. 17.—The demand for beans is quiet, but the tone of the market remains steady with three-pound bushels offering at \$1.65 to \$1.70 per bushel in car lots at track.

GOOD DEMAND FOR POTATOES

Montreal, Sept. 17.—The demand for potatoes is good and the market is fairly active and steady, with sales of car lots at 70c. to 80c. per bag extra track, and in a jobbing way at \$1 to \$1.10 per bag extra track.

DAIRY PRODUCE

BUTTER MARKET STEADY AT THE MOMENT

Montreal, Sept. 17.—Receipts of but-

ter were 608 packages, as compared with 1,111 for the corresponding date last year. The undertone to the market continues strong, and prices are steadily working towards a higher level, as at the auction sale yesterday finest creamery sold at higher, fine 1c. and pasteurized 1c. more than this week. There was no important change in the local market, except that a better feeling prevails and holders in some cases are asking higher prices. PROVISION MARKET

DRESSED HOG MARKET WEAKER.

EARLY POETS LAUREATE

Office Three Centuries Old But Title Assumed Much Earlier
It is almost three hundred years since "rare Ben Jonson" was formally appointed Poet Laureate, and during this lapse of time not a few of the illustrious names of English literature have been associated with the title. Jonson, Dryden, Southey, Wordsworth, and Tennyson are still names to conjure with, though many of their laureated predecessors are but pale ghosts in oblivion, and of many even the mere shadow of their names does not stand.

The term laureate is of hoary ancestry. It is probably as old as the art of poetry itself, for the custom of crowning the victor in a contest dates from very early times, and the wreath of the laurel tree, sacred to the god Apollo, was a trophy eagerly coveted by the poet or hero of the Greeks and Romans long years before any mention in history of our Druidic and early British forefathers. Spenser expresses aptly the idea: "The laurel, meed of mighty conquerors and poets sage," he calls it, and the word thus became closely identified with literary or military distinction. "Laureate letters" in old times were the despatches announcing a victory, and the epithet was officially bestowed by each university on the poet presenting the most brilliant Latin Ode.

The first of modern poets to be publicly crowned appears to have been the Italian poet and humanist, Petrarca, who was so honored in 1341. The office of Poet Laureate in England, however, was not legally recognized till 1616, when it was instituted by letters patent and given to Ben Jonson. Court-poets had doubtless existed before this; minstrels and versifiers were part of the royal retinue, and it is on record that Cour le Lion had a special "versificator regis." Guillelmus Peregrinus by name. "Haucer is the first Englishman known to have assumed the title. This he did on his return from diplomatic missions abroad, and in 1398 he obtained the annual grant of a tun of wine for life. For the first two hundred years the appointments were irregular, their line only becoming unbroken and continuous from the creation of Richard Edwards in 1561.

When Jonson was appointed he was granted a yearly pension of £500, with the additional grant of one tierce of Canary wine out of the King's store. This latter allowance was commuted in favor of Pye for £135, but the emoluments varied considerably, as Dryden received £1,500 a year and then but of wine, whereas Tennyson drew only \$360 from the Lord Chamberlain, in whose hands the appointment had been placed, and £135 from the lord steward in lieu of the Canary.

TAKING INDIAN CENSUS

Tribesmen Thought it Foreshadowed War and Rejoiced Greatly

A report containing the statistics for Baluchistan, obtained when the last census of India was made, contains some humorous passages, notwithstanding the long delay that was experienced in getting it into print. The sending forth of his servants by the mighty King-Emperor to reckon his subjects, even to the meanest, was as may be imagined, the subject of much discussion among the tribesmen. Many were the amusing explanations offered by the natives. To the frontier tribesmen everything connected with the census pointed to war and the preparation for war. So far from this having any disturbing influence, it found a sympathetic echo in their warlike hearts, and left them with the comfortable feeling of having discovered what the extraordinary trouble was about. The one thing they were unable to square with this footed idea was the fantastic counting of the womenfolk.

Though nothing could shake the general conviction that the primary object of enumerating the blind, the deaf, the leper, and the insane was to weed wastrels from the fighting strength of the tribe, it was gravely argued by some that the benign Government was contemplating a form of old age pension for these unfortunates. The tribesmen were at first exercised by the nature of the inquiries. But they soon fell into the spirit of the thing. "I should like you to put down my poor old sheep dog," said one wagish Pathan. "It's a great pity," quoth a hoary-headed Brahui lady, "that you're leaving out our cooking-pots; you would otherwise have numbered everything there is to number among us."

The fisherfolk of Soniani went one further, and gravely presented the enumerators at the close of the check of their village with a list based on their catches for the season, in which not only the numbers but the names of the fishy tribes on the Bela coast were faithfully recorded. All told, 834,703 souls were enumerated, and apart from journeys by rail and sea, the three chief organizers covered 6,041 miles of the road between them.

LEPROSY AND FISH

Noted Surgeon's Death Recalls His Theories of Disease

Sir Jonathan Hutchinson, the famous surgeon, who died at Haslemere, England, at the age of eighty-four, devoted much time to the study of the origin of leprosy. He formed the theory that the disease was due to the eating of diseased or imperfectly cured fish, and to confirm his view he set out at the age of seventy for a long tour in India and Robben Island, Cape Colony. His writings did much to secure better conditions for leprosy sufferers.

In bygone times, he once wrote, I used to call leprosy "fish-eaters' gout"; but he latterly preferred the description, "fish-eaters' tuberculosis."

Leprosy, he said again, advanced in inland districts of Europe with the advent of Christianity, and the observance of fish fasts, and it disappeared when Protestantism threw these fasts into disuse. This contention brought him into conflict with the heads of the Roman Catholic Church.

Sir Jonathan, who lived in Haslemere for fifty years, was the founder of the educational museum there, the superintendence of which he counted as one of his recreations.

Sutton, September 17. (Special).—It will be a surprise to many to learn that Conductor E. F. Jackson, who had been laid up by illness for several weeks, was able to take his regular run on Monday morning on the Sutton to Drummondville train out of here.

SUTTON SKUNK FARMS.
Sutton, September 17. (Special).—Two skunk farms have been started in this township the present fall and much local curiosity and interest is taken in the outcome. The first to start was Mr. Richard Spencer's near Abercorn who has no less than 11 skunks now in his enclosure. Mr. Ernest Johnson has his skunk reserve well fenced in and has four fine animals in his enclosure to which he proposes to add several more. He has to commence with a yard 50 feet by 150 feet, which will be supplied with running water.

DIDN'T KNOW IT WAS LOADED.
Papineauville, Que., Sept. 17.—Ann Cochran, the twelve-year-old daughter of a farmer near the Portage, five miles north of here, was shot and instantly killed by a rifle in the hands of her fourteen-year-old brother, Ernest, at their home.

The shooting was accidental. The boy pointed a rifle, which he had been cleaning, at his sister, thinking that the weapon was not loaded. The gun, however, happened to have a cartridge in it, and when young Cochran pulled the trigger his sister dropped to the ground, and upon examination was found to have been shot through the heart.

Coroner McKay, of Papineauville, conducted an inquest, a verdict of accidental death being returned.

RECOGNIZING AESTHETIC VALUE
(From the Troy Record.)
The Appellate division of the New York Courts recently sustained the judgment of a lower court which fixed the value of shade trees on a city street at five hundred dollars each. A construction company had unnecessarily destroyed several trees and suit was brought against it. A thousand dollars additional fine was given for wilful destruction of property.

In rendering the decision the court stated that it looked not so much at the commercial worth of the trees as to their aesthetic value, which it considered, was the more essential of the two.

This is a somewhat unique standard for a legal decision to be based upon. Prospective utility and commercial value have been the guiding power of civic accomplishment. Only recently has the knowledge come to many of us that beauty is a potent factor, even in business transactions, and that architectural grace of line and natural beauty of situation and adornment count for dollars as well as for aesthetic pleasure. Beauty, in itself, was not a sufficient motive to strive and to plan for. But now that long blinded eyes open to its monetary value, we reach out with avidity to grasp its essentials. Hence the wave of civic centres, city planning and public park systems which is sweeping over the country.

European centres of art are prone to scoff at our earnest but somewhat belated efforts. In truth, as they insist, much of even our late architecture is crude and lacking in harmony, and many of our public memorials and statues are ugly and unsuitable. From the vantage point of centuries of artistic culture Europeans look down upon us. Yet the situation is but one of the many phases of national evolution, and is far from being hopeless. European art grew through error and struggle from the dark days of the ancient warring invaders through the dawn of the middle ages to the light of the renaissance.

We of America have already eaten of the tree of knowledge, and that knowledge is bearing fruit. We have artists whom the people of the old world can but praise, musicians whom they delight to honor, buildings and statuary which they genuinely admire. Slowly we are evolving a national type of architecture and of music, and a more correct sense of artistic beauty. We have realized our limitations and mistakes of the past and are striving to overcome them.

ITALIANS SUFFER SEVERE LOSS

General and Thirty-Three Officers and Men Killed by Arabs

TRIBESMEN WERE EVENTUALLY FORCED TO RETIRE FROM A STRONG POSITION.

Bengazi, Tripoli, Sept. 17.—(Special)—The Italian Commander General Torelli and thirty-three Italian officers and men were killed, and seventy-three others wounded, in a hard fought battle yesterday with a body of intractable Arab tribesmen, who were eventually forced to retire.

The Italian column, which had been operating for some time against the tribesmen, yesterday found them posted strongly on a height commanding the valley of Tecniz.

MANUFACTURERS IN SESSION.

Halifax, N.S., Sept. 17.—(Special)—In the presence of over two hundred delegates from all parts of the Dominion, the annual meeting of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association was opened here this morning, the feature of the first business session being the address of R. S. Gourlay, Toronto, president of the association.

This afternoon the convention will discuss transportation facilities, while the tariff will be considered to-morrow morning.

FRANKLIN K. LANE'S CONDITION SERIOUS.

Berkeley, Cal., Sept. 17.—(Special)—Franklin K. Lane, Secretary of the Interior in President Wilson's Cabinet, and who was born near Charlottetown, P.E.I., is believed to be dying here from a general collapse. His condition is extremely critical.

LEVIS MAN GETS CONTRACT.

Quebec, Sept. 17.—Mayor Drouin received a telegram from Major Leonard, of the Transcontinental Railway Commission, yesterday, that the contract for the construction of the workshops for the railway at St. Malo had been awarded to Contractor Gosselin, of Lewis, and that the contract had been signed yesterday. The cost of the work, which is to be started to-day, will be \$1,500,000.

As the family of the groom is in mourning, the wedding was a quiet one, only the members of the two families and a few intimate friends being present. Among the latter was the Rev. U. S. SHIPS WILL NOT BE WITHDRAWN

Highly Important They
Should Remain in
Mexican Waters

FORMER MEXICAN AMBASSADOR
WILL WAGE WAR AGAINST
WILSON ADMINISTRATION.

Washington, Sept. 17.—(Special)—It was announced to-day that in spite of President Huerta's message, the United States warships now at Vera Cruz and other Mexican ports for the protection of Americans would not be withdrawn. Secretary Bryan stated that the presence of the warships was necessary, saying that political reasons of the highest importance demanded they be kept there.

GOES ON WESTERN TRIP.
Ottawa, Sept. 17.—Hon. C. J. Doherty, Minister of Justice, leaves on Thursday for his western trip. He will visit Winnipeg, Prince Albert, Edmonton and New Westminster on his way to the coast, inspecting the penitentiaries in connection with the prison farm programme.

REVISION OF TARIFF IN 1914

Canadian Correspondent
to London Times Says
it Will Take Place
Next Year

MANUFACTURERS ASSOCIATION
ARE NERVOUS THAT WEST-
ERN DEMANDS WILL BE
MET.

London, Sept. 17.—A Canadian correspondent of the London Times, under the heading "Canadian Manufacturers and the Tariff," discusses the convention now proceeding at Halifax, N. S., and refers to the meeting of 1902 and the memorable stand the association then took on the Dominion tariff. It is now generally accepted, he says, that there will be a revision of the tariff in 1914. This will be the first general revision of the tariff made by the Conservative Government since 1894; consequently the tariff question is as important at the convention as it was in 1902. The correspondent points out, the iron, steel and textile industries are asking for more protection, but the Canadian manufacturers generally are on the defensive. The situation is not so favorable for the manufacturers as it was in 1902, as the cost of living was then much lower, and the country beyond the great lakes had nothing to say on the tariff question. But today there is a strong movement in the prairie provinces against the comparatively high tariff in favor of lower duties on British imports. The Manufacturers Association members are nervously fearing that the demands of the western grain-growers will be met by a low tariff.

CLOSE CALL FOR CHICAGO FLIER.

Toronto, Ont., Sept. 17.—(Special)—The blocking of both tracks on the main line with railroad ties near Little Lake Station nearly caused the wreck of the fast Grand Trunk train from Chicago yesterday afternoon.

The ties were rotten and flier's wheels ground them to powder.

The ties were removed by the crew. Railroad detectives are conducting an investigation.

CENTENARIANS' SOCIETY

Old People of Japan Members of
Curious Club

A curious society was formed by Count Okuma, the Japanese ex-Premier. It is called the "Hyskununkai," or the Society of Centenarians. Count Okuma, who believes that under proper conditions we ought to be able to live for 125 years, is its first President. Persons of 80 years and over are eligible for membership. About 500 members met at its first assembly at the Count's house. The oldest person present was a woman of 113, who traveled a long distance to Tokyo to meet her fellow centenarians.

Some of the aged members drove in carriages and jinrickshas, but many walked. They were all intensely interested in each other, and compared notes as to teeth, deafness and use of spectacles. Count Okuma delivered an address. It was observed, however, that most of the audience failed to catch his words, and, giving up making ear trumpets of their hands, fell into a pleasant drowsiness, lulled by sunshine and the voice of the speaker. The meeting was voted a great success, and they all look forward to many repetitions of it.

WRECKED ON DESERT ISLE

Sailors Lived For Six Months on Ice-
Clad Rock

News reached North Shields of the safety of twenty of the crew of the sealing schooner, Sea Bird, belonging to that town. The vessel was wrecked and for six months the crew had to exist on a desert island which is frequently covered with ice and snow.

The Sea Bird struck a sunken rock in the neighborhood of Prince Edward Island, in the Southern Ocean, and speedily sank. The three boats were launched and provisioned before she went down, and for the next six months the crew, who numbered twenty-two, were marooned on a desert island.

Their sufferings were terrible, but they made a shelter of a marquee and a cave in a mountain-side. There was no wood on the island, but sea elephants were shot, and their blubber burned. The men's food consisted chiefly of penguins, albatrosses and seals. Two of the men died from the severe exposure, but the other twenty were rescued by a whaler and landed at Capetown.

PARIS STORM SWEEP.
Paris, Sept. 17.—Thunderstorms of exceptional violence have swept over France, doing great damage. At Marseilles the streets were transformed into torrents; hundreds of cellars were flooded, and quantities of merchandise on the quays was ruined or washed into the sea. Traffic in the city was suspended for a time. A boat containing a fishing party of six was capsized in the harbor and five persons were drowned.

At St. Agre, in the Department of Ardeche, and other places, houses were struck by lightning, with considerable loss of life.

MEXICAN INDEPENDENCE DAY PASSED QUIETLY

President Huerta Hopes
Soon to See Peace
Restored

STRAINED RELATION WITH THE
UNITED STATES HAD RE-
TARDED PEACE.

Mexico City, Sept. 17.—In spite of the rumors which dealt impartially with attacks upon the Americans, an army uprising and the assassination of the President, Independence Day came and went with nothing to mar the holiday spirit.

Politically the great event was the re-opening of Congress and the reading of the President's message. But without doubt General Huerta was moved less by that than by the spectacle of thousands of students, citizens and soldiers doing him honor as he stood on the balcony of the National Palace reviewing the great parade.

HUERTA'S MESSAGE.

In his semi-annual message at the opening of the second session of the twenty-seventh Mexican Congress, Provisional President Huerta promised to spare no efforts to bring about the unrestricted elections of president and vice-president of the Mexican Republic next month, declaring that it would constitute the greatest triumph of his career to turn over the office to his successor with the country at peace, as he hoped to do.

General Huerta said the strained diplomatic relations between Mexico and the United States had caused the Mexican nation to suffer unmerited affliction and had retarded the pacification of the country. Nevertheless, he asserted, he had good grounds to hope for an early solution of the differences between the two nations and to see Mexico and the United States once more united in bonds of friendship.

RAILWAY STRIKE IS THREATENED

Liverpool Workers go Out
in Sympathy With Du-
blin Strikers

COMPLETE TIE-UP IS EXPECTED
ON THE NORTHWESTERN
RAILWAY LINES.

London, Sept. 17.—The country is again threatened with a great railway strike, and Liverpool, as before, will be the storm centre. The trouble began with the refusal of the Liverpool dockers to handle freight from Dublin, where the transport workers are on strike. Men to the number of 3,500 employed in the freight yards of the various railways went out yesterday afternoon and were joined later by 4,000 from Birmingham.

That a complete freight tie-up is expected on the northwestern lines is indicated by a warning issued by the Cunard officials to homeward bound Americans to carry all their baggage with them on the boat trains.

The Liverpool workers struck without the sanction of the railway unions, and lack of support may prevent a national strike on the railways, but as other big centres are involved the outlook is ominous. The only hopeful feature is the appointment of a committee of strikers to negotiate with the companies.

At Dublin the deadlock continues. Vast crowds gathered in the streets last night, but there was only one riot, which resulted in the smashing of the windows of street cars. More than 10,000 men are on strike in Dublin.

The Bus Drivers' Union adopted a resolution last night calling out all the employees of the transport combine, which includes practically all the motor bus lines and tube railways, unless drivers discharged for wearing the union badge are immediately reinstated and the union recognized.

CANADIANS ARE NOT CONCERNED

Exporters Have Made no
Arrangements in Con-
nection With U. S.
Tariff

DROP IN EXPORTS TO THE UNIT-
ED KINGDOM NOT DUE TO
THIS CAUSE.

Ottawa, September 17.—So far as the Department of Trade and Commerce has been advised, Canadian exporters have made no preparation for taking immediate advantage of the prospective reduction in the United States duties. The failure of the Dominion to maintain her record of exports to the United Kingdom in certain lines of farm products was attributed recently in reports of agents in England to the expected lowering of the tariff bars by the United States. It was stated at that time that stores of these products were accumulating in Montreal with a view to placing them in the United States as soon as the new tariff should become operative. This condition, if it exists, is unknown to the department at Ottawa so far as Canadian reports are concerned. Canadian exporters appear to be taking very little interest in the inauguration of the new tariff and are making no preparations to take advantage of it.

THAW TO CONCORD, N. H.

the fugitive, either in Canada or in the United States, since his escape from the Matteawan asylum for the criminal insane early on Sunday morning, August 17th.

Thaw's jubilant counsel left town last night, leaving their client in the joint custody of the U. S. marshal and the sheriff of Coos County, not to return until the hearing before the Governor is called. Not long after departed the head of the New York State forces, William Travers Jerome, and with him Deputy Attorney-General Franklin Kennedy and Sheriff Hornbeck of Dutchess county. They will come back for the hearing on Tuesday.

THAW'S MOTHER GOING TO CONCORD.

Concord, N.H., September 17.—Mrs. Wm. C. Thaw, mother of Harry K. Thaw, has reserved a suite of rooms at a local hotel for use to-day and succeeding days, but on account of the postponement of the hearing before Governor Felker, it was expected last night that Mrs. Thaw would not arrive until next week. It is thought she will be accompanied by her daughter, Mrs. Carnegie, and the latter's husband.

Governor Felker was very willing to change the date for the hearing when a suggestion was made by counsel for Thaw and for the State of New York, as the governor is busy at present trying cases as an attorney in the courts of Stafford county. His desk here continues to pile up with correspondence on the Thaw case, largely from sympathizers with Stanford White's slayer. Much of it must go unanswered, the Governor's secretary said.

CASE IN MONTREAL

FULL DISCUSSION WILL TAKE
PLACE AT HEARING TO-
MORROW.

Montreal, Sept. 17.—In accordance with an agreement reached between opposing counsel when the Thaw habeas corpus case came up Monday, the hearing which is postponed 'till Thursday morning before the Court of King's Bench, will be all-comprising; it will deal with the merits of the case itself, the constitutionality of the immigration act, under which the immigration authorities acted in deporting Thaw; and, finally, it will touch upon all technical exceptions with the representatives of the immigration authorities may or may not make against the manner in which the restraining order of the Court of King's Bench was or was not made known to and served upon those who were in actual charge of Thaw at Coastbrook. Counsel for the respondents maintain most guarded reticence as to the line of conduct they will adopt in carrying out their side of the argument; but N. K. Lafamme, K.C., of counsel for Thaw, made it quite well understood in addressing the court that he and his colleagues would prefer to have every phase of the case—technical or otherwise—brought into discussion at the one hearing. Opposing counsel, L. T. Marchal, K.C., and Gustave Lamothe, K.C., in asking for a delay, concurred in this view, the latter pointing out that as he had been called into the case at the last moment, and as there were many weighty questions of law involved, he would appreciate an extension of delay to enable him to enter into study of the various issues raised.

PETITION TO PRESIDENT WILSON

Boston, Sept. 17.—President Woodrow Wilson and every Governor in the nation have mailed to them copies of a petition being circulated for the full release and liberty of Harry K. Thaw. The petition was launched yesterday afternoon in Boston and within a few weeks it is planned to flood the country with millions of them.

A thousand of the petitions left the office of the Ray Detective Agency, Inc., at 100 Boylston street, yesterday afternoon, and to-day bundles of them are to be shipped to every state. As soon as the petitions are filled with names of people who are in sympathy with the movement to have Thaw pardoned and freed they will be sent directly to the Governor of the State in which the signatures were secured. The petitions will then, if the plans are carried out, be forwarded to President Wilson.

The agency is acting in the interest of Thaw for some person interested in his release. Who this person is, the principal, James Ray will not say. The petition is as follows:

"Petition for the Full Release and Liberty of Harry K. Thaw.

"Honorable Woodrow Wilson, President of the United States, Washington, D.C.: The following named petitioners, knowing in a general way the circumstances relating to Harry K. Thaw, do respectfully petition you as the chief executive of our nation to give him his liberty and overrule law technicalities whereby he would be imprisoned any longer.

"As you are well aware, ninety per cent. (90 per cent.) of our citizens seem to be favorable towards his liberation and think that the punishment that he has already received is ample for the crime that he committed.

"This petition will first be presented to the Governors of all States, who will in turn present it to you."

SWEPT EVERYTHING IN SIGHT.
Mons, Belgium, Sept. 17.—The canal connecting the towns of Pommereu and Antwerp, near Mons, burst yesterday as the result of the tunneling to extend mine workings, and in a few minutes the canal for a distance of eight miles was emptied. An enormous mass of water rushed over the surrounding country, flooding the houses and sweeping away everything movable in its course.

CONFESSED MURDERER ALSO COUNTERFEITER

Detectives Gathering Evidence
to Convict Hans
Schmidt with Offence

WAS A MAN OF VARIED ACTI-
VITIES AND CANNOT BE IN-
SANE SAYS DETECTIV-
ES.

New York, Sept. 17.—(Special)—Gathering up the loose ends of the evidence that convicts Hans Schmidt, a confessed murderer of Anna Amulmer with the making of spurious money has been begun by detectives under Inspector Joseph Faurel. The facts being brought to light in this search show that Schmidt has been a man of varied activities. No man of Schmidt's varied pursuits could be insane, the detectives say, and they look upon him as a criminal with a master mind, a man trained in many things which he turned to account in his operations.

GUESTS OF IMPERIAL SERVICE EXHIBITION

Prominent Canadians in
London Attend Cele-
bration

WILL WITNESS DISPLAY OF NA-
VAL AND AERIAL WARFARE
AND DISPLAY OF FIRE-
WORKS.

London, Sept. 17.—The Imperial Services Exhibition at Earl's Court to-day celebrates "Canadian Day," when the guests of honor are stated on the official programme to be "Col. Hughes and officers, Sir Richard McBride, Hon. W. T. Crothers, and General Ian Hamilton."

Lord Chelymore, chairman of the exhibition, and Admiral Sir Albert Markham and members of the committee will receive the guests, who will witness a display of "naval and aerial warfare." During the afternoon hands will play the Canadian national airs and an interesting feature will be Allan Jamieson collection of historical Canadian pictures, prints and medals, which will be on view.

During the day bunches of maple leaves, made expressly for Canadian Day by the Cripple and Flower Girls' Mission, will be sold as souvenirs by Canadian ladies, the proceeds going to a London East End institution.

In the evening there will be a display of fireworks, among the "set pieces" being portraits of the King and Lord Strathcona, the map of Canada and a giant representation of a maple leaf.

AUDACIOUS THIEF SENTENCED.
Winnipeg, Sept. 17.—Edwin L. Brewer, the youth whose home is in Minneapolis, was sentenced to five years in Stony Mountain Penitentiary yesterday for selling the house furniture of Rev. W. B. Caswell, of Winnipeg, to a second-hand dealer while the family was away at Winnipeg Beach.

DANVILLE WILL ISSUE DEBENTURES

\$15,000 Will be Spent on
Permanent Sidewalks
In Town

BY-LAW WILL BE SUBMITTED TO
THE RATEPAYERS FOR AP-
PROVAL ON OCTOBER 13

Danville, Sept. 17.—(Special)—An adjourned meeting of the Council was held in the Town Hall on Monday evening. All the Councilors were present with Mayor Guilmette in the chair.

The annual taxes were levied and will be as last year, viz., 12 mills on the dollar, 3 per cent rental and \$1.00 poll tax.

Councillor Dr. Cleveland resigned as a member of the Board of Health. A resolution was passed to submit to the ratepayers a by-law to issue debentures for \$15,000 to extend over a period of forty years. Considerable discussion took place all the Councilors being in favor of the resolution.

The by-law will be submitted to the ratepayers for approval on October 13th. These debentures are to be used for raising money for permanent sidewalks and can be diverted to no other purpose. If passed by the ratepayers it will be forwarded to the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council for approval and will then become law. The Council then adjourned.

GREAT NATIONAL STRIKE THREATENED

Discontent Is Apparent in
Labour Community of
British Isles

THREE OF GREAT TRUNK LINES
IN ENGLAND ARE BADLY
CRIPPLED.

London, Sept. 17.—(Special)—A great national strike, as it was described to-day by one of the trades union leaders, threatens the United Kingdom. Beginning with the lock-outs of large numbers of workmen last week in Dublin, in consequence of the strike of a number of members of the Transport Workers' Union, because of the employment of non-union laborers, rumblings of discontent have since been heard throughout the entire labor community of the British Isles.

The sympathetic strike of the Liverpool dockers and the transport workers on the railroads there and at Birmingham has already partly crippled the three great trunk railways serving the midland counties of England, namely, the Midland, the London & Northwestern, and the Great Western, while the Manchester Ship Canal Company also is contending with a strike of its dock laborers for better wages.

At Liverpool seven of the great freight depots were idle this morning and others are likely soon to be closed for want of traffic.

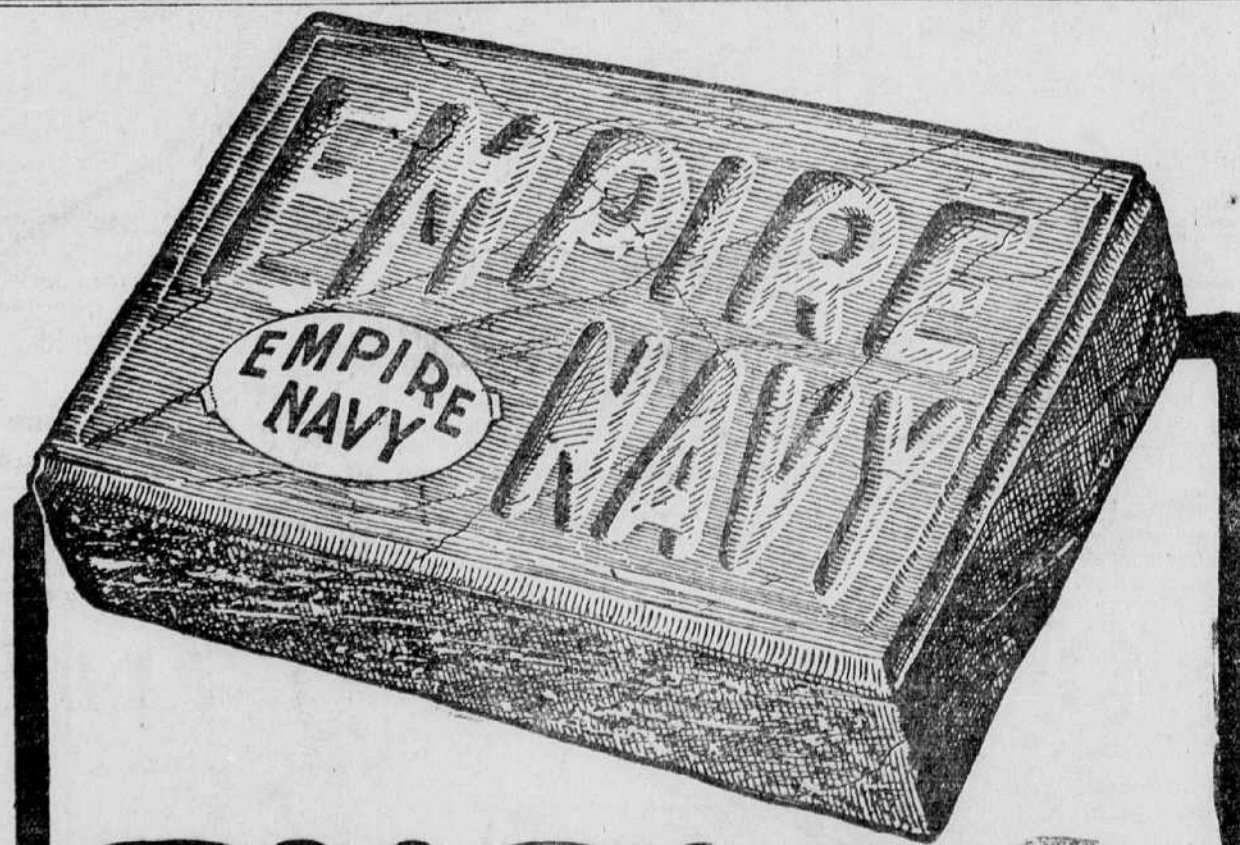
