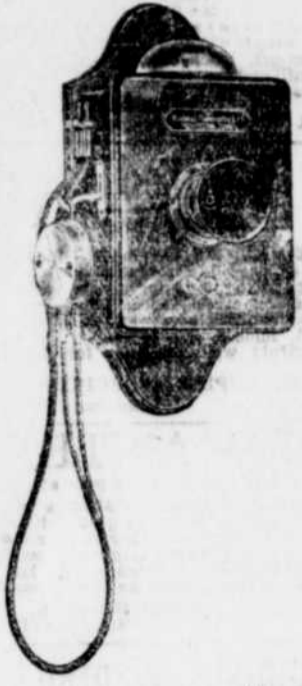

INJUNCTION PROCEEDINGS.

Defence Says Contestation Is Barred by Lapse of Time.

The injunction proceedings, instituted by Mayor William Farwell and others to restrain the city for awarding the contract for the dam at Westbury, and also from installing an electric light plant there, promises to be very interesting. The defence had until Monday to file their answers to the petitioner's representations, and, having complied with this, they now take exception to the form of the petitioner's action. The latter question will be argued before Mr. Justice Lemieux today in the Superior Court. A large number of the representations made by the petitioner are denied. The answers state that it is true that in the month of June, 1902, the Corporation of the City of Sherbrooke, under a resolution of the Council, purchased the water power for the purpose of installing an electric light plant for the city, and borrowed temporarily the sum of \$9,500 to pay therefor from the Eastern Townships Bank, of which bank, the petitioner, William Farwell, Esq., is president. The legality of the resolution under which the purchase was made was never questioned or contested, and any contestation is barred by lapse of time. It is further contended that the building of a dam is part of the project for lighting the city with electricity and furnishing power, and that if the corporation has to borrow the money the by-law will have to be submitted to the ratepayers according to law. The respondent further says that the petitioner themselves are not opposed to the expenditure, but are opposing the installation of a municipal plant in the interests of the Sherbrooke Heat and Power Co., formerly known as the Sherbrooke Gas and Water Co., whose contract with the city expires on the 1st July, 1904. The resolution of the 28th October accepting the tender of R. Arkley for a dam at Westbury is in all respects legal and valid, and the contract between the city and the said Arkley is perfect without the signature of the Mayor and Secretary-Treasurer to a written contract. If the resolution is illegal (which is denied) the signing of the contract would not affect the rights of petitioners. One of the petitioners, to wit, Mayor Farwell, is the Mayor of the city and he cannot obtain an injunction to restrain himself from signing the contract. Petitioners are not acting in good faith in the protection of their own interests, but on behalf of the Sherbrooke Heat, Light and Power Co. The remedy by injunction does not lie when a statutory remedy is given, namely, by section 4376 and 4389 of the Revised Statutes of Quebec, which form part of the Charter of the City of Sherbrooke. The proceedings by injunction exist only as an incident to the action instituted the same day, under the same number, to set aside the resolution referred to, and the said action is illegal and irregular, inasmuch as the specific remedy provided by statute to set aside a resolution of the Council is that provided by article 4376 and 4389, and other articles of the Revised Statutes of Quebec in connection therewith, and moreover any judgment rendered in such action could only be rescinded between the plaintiffs' petitioners and the city, and would not affect the mass of the citizens and no injunction could be granted prohibiting the putting in force of the said resolution as prayed for, and a motion has been made to reject the principal action. The resolution in question is entirely within the powers of the council, has been passed in the best interests of the city, and does not and cannot work any great or irreparable injury to the petitioners or any of them.

THE ARGUMENT THIS MORNING

In the Superior Court this morning before Mr. Justice Lemieux, the exception to the petition for injunction against the city of Sherbrooke to restrain them from proceeding with the Westbury Water power, was argued.

The exception to the form of the petition, which contended that the resolution of the Council passed on the 28th October last, whereby Arkley was awarded the contract for the construction of the dam at Westbury, is illegal. The respondents deny that, and contend that insofar as the petition to quash is the proper proceeding to quash a resolution of the Council according to the charter, and that the said resolution cannot be set aside by a petition for injunction.

The Petitioners contend that inasmuch as the contract has been made with Arkley they are obliged to bring Arkley into the suit and this can only be done by such an action.

Mr. C. W. Cate is attorney for the Petitioners, with Mr. A. S. Hurd, K.C., as counsel, and Mr. H. B. Brown, K.C., city attorney, and Mr. L. E. Panmeton, K.C., for the city.

War Cloud in East Very Dark

JAPAN SENDS SHIPS TO INTERCEPT RUSSIAN WAR VESSELS.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 25.—The semi-official Russian agency has received from Tokyo a report to the effect that Japanese warships have been despatched to prevent the Russian war vessels Tsarevich and Bayan reaching Port Arthur to join the Russian squadron there.

London, Nov. 25.—The London Daily Mail's Tokio correspondent says that the Russian minister at Seoul has addressed another note to the Korean Government, declaring that if Korea should ignore all warnings and persist in opening Yonampio to foreign trade, Russia will take steps to deal with the situation. The Korean Government has replied strongly objecting to Russia's interference as a violation of Korea's sovereign rights. A communication to the same effect, according to the correspondent, was sent to the Japanese minister at Seoul.

The correspondent also says: "It is reported that Baron de Rosen, Russian minister at Japan, received yesterday an urgent telegram from the foreign office at St. Petersburg and that immediately thereafter the Minister's secretary was despatched to the Japanese foreign minister. It is believed that a conference will be held today, when Japan's reply will be given."

Shooting Accident at Lake Megantic.

Mr. Alfred Flint, of Montreal, met with a very serious accident near Three Lakes Friday afternoon. While leaning with his hands over the muzzle of his rifle it was accidentally discharged, the contents going through both hands. He was taken to the Victoria Hospital Saturday morning and there is hopes of saving the right hand, while fears are entertained for the other.

Mr. Flint only arrived in Megantic Wednesday in company with his friend Mr. David Inrie, also of Montreal, and intended spending a couple of weeks hunting in the vicinity. He is well known in Megantic, having spent his vacation for a number of years back with his mother and the rest of the family at the cottage near Lake Maccanama.

Another accident also happened the same day not very far from where the above occurred, when Mr. Jules Bedard, of Woburn, had his arm broken and otherwise injured through a falling tree striking him.

200 Persons Drowned.

London, Nov. 24.—A telegram received by the Indian office from Lord Curzon says that according to reports in Patna river destroyed half of the town of Vanizambadi. Two hundred persons were drowned.

One man was killed and another seriously injured in a collision near Chatham, Ont., yesterday.

CHICAGO'S STRIKE

HAS BEEN SETTLED

An Agreement Was Reached at a Late Hour Last Night.

Chicago, November 24.—The street car strike is settled. This evening the meeting of the council, which has at different times endeavored to mediate between the company and strikers, was called together at the request of President Hamilton, of the Street Car Company, who desired to make a statement to it. This was carried in by Attorney Bliss and Mayor Harrison immediately afterwards summoned Attorney Darrow and President Mahon, of the street car men, who declined the proposition.

The mayor then called in the council mediation committee and they were locked up with representatives of the street railway until a late hour.

It was subsequently announced that a settlement had been arranged.

Devonshire Declares

Against Protection.

London, November 24.—The Duke of Devonshire supported by six peers and thirty members of parliament, declared tonight, in the Queen's Hall against any semblance of protection. He admitted that moderate retaliation might sometimes be exercised, but food taxation was the keystone of the whole policy to which he objected. He also objected to a preference might gain eight million pounds a year by the Glasgow budget and provide a subsidy of two and a half million pounds to the colonies. Canada would get three shillings, two pence a head, Australia one shilling eleven pence; New Zealand six shillings eight and a half-penny, and South Africa the magnificent sum of three pence per head of the whole population. He found, he said, no trace of any definite offer on the part of the colonies. The speaker was frequently interrupted by Mr. Chamberlain's supporters.

Lord Goschen, who also spoke, urged that strenuous opposition should be offered to the taxation of food, and a general preferential tariff. While England was considering protection, he said the United States was favoring a lower tariff.

Miraculous Escape of

Mother and Child.

Were Practically Asphyxiated For Many Hours, But Still Live.

Galt, Ont., Nov. 24.—Practically asphyxiated from Friday night until Sunday morning is the remarkable experience, Mrs. J. P. McKenzie, of Brock street, and her ten-year-old daughter have passed through and live to tell the tale. Mrs. McKenzie and her daughter retired on Friday night and from then until Sunday morning is a blank in their minds. E. A. Smith, Mrs. McKenzie's brother, had noticed that the little girl was not at Sunday school on Sunday morning and thinking that some one was ill at the McKenzie home proceeded there after church. He found the little girl wandering around the house in a dazed condition and the mother unconscious from gas that escaped from a new coal stove that was put in the McKenzie house on Friday. Both will recover.

Serious Accident to Brake-

man.

FELL FROM CARS AT FARN-

HAM.

Louis Buck, of Farnham, a brakeman on the Canadian Pacific Railway fell from the top of a freight train at the Mile End at 6:30 o'clock yesterday morning, and the rear cars passed over him. He was picked up in an unconscious condition, and sent to the Royal Victoria Hospital, Montreal. He is suffering from a fractured skull, his back is hurt, and he has internal injuries. His condition is serious, but the doctors say he will pull through.

SAN DOMINGO HAS FALLEN.

Cape Haytien, November 24.—Despatches received here from Puerto Plata, say that the city of San Domingo was surrendered to the revolutionists this morning, and that President Wos y Gil and his ministers took refuge on board a German warship. The despatches further say that great enthusiasm prevails throughout the country.

ANOTHER QUEBEC JUDGE.

It is stated on good authority that the Federal Government will shortly establish a Superior Court judgeship at Bryson, Que. L. M. Champagne, M.P. of Hull, will likely get the appointment. In the past Judge Rochon has been accustomed to hold court at Bryson, but it is thought the work of the judge is too congested, and an effort will be made to relieve him.

Canada's Future.

THE IMPORTANCE OF BRINGING NEWFOUNDLAND INTO CONFEDERATION.

Toronto, Ont., November 24.—J. M. Clark, K.C., president of the Toronto branch of the British Empire League, in an address to the Mulock Club tonight on the future of Canada dwelt on the importance to Canada of bringing Newfoundland into Confederation. He pointed out that Newfoundland owns all the Labrador coast from Belle Isle to the Hudson Straits, and that if this went to the United States we would have only the St. Lawrence and Nova Scotia as an Atlantic frontier. He considered the Alaskan boundary as a mere bagatelle compared to Canadian interests on the Atlantic.

CANADIAN CRUISER SAILS FOR PORT SIMPSON.

Vancouver, B.C., Nov. 24.—The Dominion Government cruiser Kestrel sailed today at daybreak for Port Simpson to guard Canadian waters against poachers from the United States who fish for Halibut in Dundas channel, and carry them to Ketchikan. Thirty-three Seattle Halibut fishing boats, steamers and schooners are working out of Ketchikan this winter and over half of them are illegally stealing fish out of Canadian waters.

A man named Weale was killed near Bridgewater, N.S., on Saturday while thawing dynamite.

In the French Senate on Saturday a measure was passed debarring the clergy from teaching in the higher education departments.

Carey, the man who confessed at Manchester, England, to having murdered Glory Whalen at Collingwood, a few months ago was sentenced to fourteen years on another charge.

The New Zealand tariff became law on Saturday and extends the preference clauses to the whole British Empire.

A ST. MALO CASE.

Two Doctors at Variance.

DR. TURCOTTE ALLEGES DR. BELAND FIRED REVOLVER AT HIM.

Before Judge Mulvena this forenoon Dr. Beland, of St. Malo, in the township of Auckland, was charged with carrying firearms for purposes dangerous to the public peace. The case has attracted a good deal of attention in the district. It appears from the evidence that some days ago a man named Reid got his finger injured in a mill near St. Malo, and a message was sent to Dr. Beland to attend. He could not be found at the time, and as the case required urgency Dr. Turcotte was called, and he at once proceeded to dress the injury. When he was about to proceed home from attending the patient, Dr. Beland drove up and found that the injury had been attended to. On returning Dr. Turcotte had proceeded but a short distance on his way home

when Dr. Beland's team drove up behind him and six revolver shots were fired in the direction of Dr. Turcotte's team. The latter paid no attention to the shots, but drove with all speed home. Just as he was about to enter his residence the door of Dr. Beland's house opened and another shot was fired at Dr. Turcotte. Fortunately none of the shots did any injury. The matter was reported to the Attorney General at Quebec, and Detective McCaskill was sent out to investigate the matter, and on enquiry into the case lodged a complaint against Dr. Beland, who was afterwards placed under arrest by High Constable Moe. A number of witnesses were examined in the case. Dr. Turcotte is a son of Dr. Edwin Turcotte, professor at Laval University, Quebec.

Board of Trade

PASS RESOLUTION OF CONDOLENCE WITH WIDOW OF LATE J. M. DUFRESNE.

A regular meeting of the Sherbrooke Board of Trade was held in the City Council Chambers last evening. Mr. L. A. Bayley, president, presiding.

Messrs. L. A. Dufresne and G. A. Darche, of this city, were proposed for membership. It was moved by Mr. L. S. Channell, seconded by Mr. E. W. Farwell, "That this Board desires to place on record their deep sense of the loss it has sustained through the death of its late ex-president, Mr. J. M. Dufresne, and to give expression to the esteem in which he was held by every member of the Board, their appreciation of his many sterling qualities, and their sincere sorrow at the untimely death of so useful and public spirited citizen, and that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to Mrs. Dufresne."

An Interesting Case.

QUESTION OF IMPORTANCE TO MUNICIPALITIES.

Judge Mulvena rendered judgment at Waterloo in the case of K. Knowlton, secretary-treasurer, of South Stukely, against J. P. Pelletier, of Lawrenceville, charged with having illegally refused to act as road inspector for the Township of Stukely. The case was dismissed on the ground that the District Magistrate had no jurisdiction to try the case, the Municipal Code providing that the recovery of penalties for offences of this nature could only be tried before the civil courts, or before a Justice of the Peace of the municipality, or in default of that of a neighboring municipality. The court held that the complainant had failed to make proof that there was no qualified magistrate in the township of Stukely. The Court had less hesitation in dismissing the complaint because the proof showed that the defendant had filled the charge of road inspector for fourteen months, and had then removed from the township of Stukely to the adjoining municipality, and that the municipal council had attempted to levy a fine of \$5 on him for failure to act, which was wholly illegal.

C. P. R. Engineers' Pay.

SATISFACTORY SETTLEMENT REACHED.

It is announced by General Manager McColl, of the C.P.R., that a satisfactory basis of agreement has been reached in connection with the negotiations which have been going on for some time between the management and the engineers and firemen of the road, relative to wages and other considerations. The negotiations looking to a new schedule more advantageous to the engineers and firemen were opened by the western employees, but the matter finally widened out to include all the company's employees of that class.

To Increase Water Supply

MILL OWNERS ON MAGOG RIVER WILL CONFER WITH CITY.

A special meeting of the Water Committee was held yesterday for the purpose of considering what best could be done to increase the flow of water in Magog River for the pumps at the city water station. A report was submitted by Mr. Tremblay, superintendent of the Water Works, who made an examination of the outlet of Lake Memphremagog to see if a channel could not be cut so that another foot of water could be secured. Mr. Tremblay reported that after examining the situation he found that this could be accomplished, which by computation would give 30,000 cubic feet per minute, which is supposed to be the maximum flow of the river for two months. He estimated the cost at about \$2,000. After discussing the matter it was decided to invite all those who are interested in the river for industrial purposes to meet the City Council and discuss the advisability of deepening the channel at the point mentioned. If this arrangement can be come to it will relieve the situation as far as the city water supply is concerned.

A Gigantic Cross

To Be Erected on Mount Royal by St. Jean Baptiste Society.

Montreal, Nov. 24. St. Jean Baptiste Society, to mark the seventeenth anniversary of the association next June, have decided to erect a cross 140 feet high on the top of Mount Royal, to recall the one put there by Jacques Cartier. It will cost eighteen thousand dollars.

TWO-YEAR-OLD BOY SHOT BY BROTHER.

Port Arthur, Nov. 24.—The two-year-old son of Mark Leitermann, of Oliver township, was instantly killed yesterday morning by the accidental discharge of a gun in the hands of an eight-year-old brother. The father was in the room when the accident occurred.

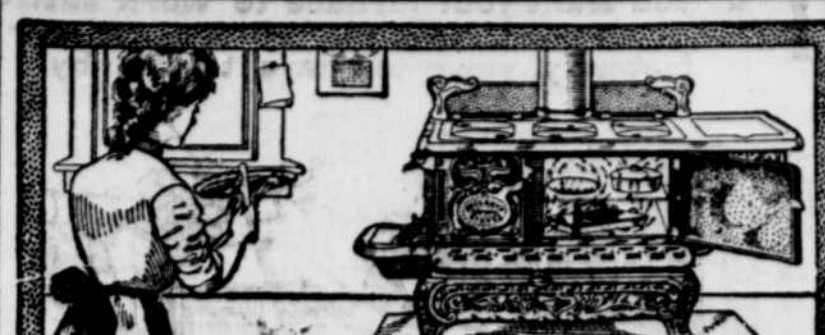
