Home and Colonial Democracy.

The Westminster Review, in an article upon Canada, says: "Perhaps the time may come when the Imperial Star will find in the Federal system of the Canadian provinces a constitutional solution which will settle many national difficulties, and give that unity to the Empire which it now certainly has not."

"Contribution of all Mother Country and Colonies, to the support of the general defence of the communications, on some such proportionate basis as trade or wealth."

"Some application of the principle of delegation to the control of this Imperial force, and of the policy of which it would be the strong arm. Colonies might, for the present, delegate such control to the English Parliament, in the confident trust that that Parliament will see to it that colonial interests do not suffer."

These are straws, which it would be an exaggeration to say, show which way the wind blows, but they, at any rate, betray the existence of a breeze. They indicate that Imperial Federation is beginning to be recognized in England, as one of the possibilities of the not very remote future.

The subject is not a new one, but hitherto has been discussed principally in Australia and Canada, and from a colonial standpoint. The fact is, that home as well as colonial statesmen are beginning to recognize that the perpetration of the colonial system upon its present basis, is an impossibility.

Great Britain's colonies are too much like herself to accept permanently a position subordinate even to her.

The theory that colonies are a distinctly appointed institution for the benefit of such superior institutions as London, Liverpool and Manchester, has worn out in the colonies, and is wearing transparently thin at home.
