Again Convicted.

Captain Alfred Dreyfus, convicted on December 22, 1894, of high treason and condemned to life imprisonment on evidence that has been proved to be a tissue of lies, forgeries, and frauds was, to the astonishment of the whole world, again found guilty on Saturday morning of the same offence, and sentenced to ten years' imprisonment.
In France there are doubtless millions who think Dreyfus is guilty, but a great number are influenced to that view by zeal for the army and hatred of the Jew. Not one fact was brought out during the alleged trial that has occupied the last month to strengthen the case against Dreyfus, though many of the strongest points for the prosecution were demolished. Nobody believes to-day that Dreyfus wrote the bordereau, which at the first trial was the chief evidence against him. Esterhazy has confessed that he was the author of it, and has hinted that it was prepared at the dictation of General Mercier, who was at that time the Minister of War. This famous document was alleged to have been discovered in April, 1894, among waste papers from the German Embassy, in the department of Col. Count Schwarzkoppen, the military attaché, by secret emissaries of the French Government, who had bribed the janitor to surrender these papers. It is in translation as follows:
"In the absence of any news indicating your desire to see me, I nevertheless send you, sir, certain information of interest.
1. A note on the hydraulic brake of 120 (method of operating this piece).
2. A note on the outfit troops. (A few modifications will be made by the new plan).
3. A note on modifications of artillery formation.
4. A note relating to Madagascar.
5. The scheme relative to the manual of field firing (March 14, 1894).
"This last paper is extremely difficult to procure, and I can have it at my disposal only for a very few days. The Ministry has issued a definite number to the corps, and these corps are responsible for them; each officer is obliged to return his copy after the manoeuvres. If, therefore, you wish me to take you, and hold it at my disposal, I will take it, unless you do not want me to make a copy in extenso and address it to you.
"I am just leaving for the manoeuvres."
In the course of the trial just concluded it was shown that the document was a clumsy forgery of the handwriting of Dreyfus, that the writer made an error in speaking of the hydraulic brake which a man of the training of the accused would not make, and that whereas the document states that the writer was leaving for the manoeuvres; as a matter of fact Dreyfus was not at that time doing so. All this went to sustain the confession of Esterhazy, and drove the prosecution to take the ground that though Dreyfus did not write the bordereau, he was nevertheless, guilty of treason.
The man who emerges from the trial with least credit to himself is General Mercier. It was a remarkable circumstance that the very day Maitre Lachon was timed to cross-examine Mercier, and to perhaps to destroy the value of his evidence, the bullet of the would-be assassin was lodged in Lachon's skull. Here was the man who knew most about the case absolutely shielded from cross-examination through the intervention of a criminal. General Mercier was Minister of War when the French spy at the German Embassy brought to the secret service of the French army the fragments of the bordereau. The report was received by Col. Du Paty de Clam, head of the secret service. He was a violent Jew-hater. He appealed to Bertillon, and the man who invented the Bertillon system for measuring and identifying criminals, following Du Paty's suggestion, who in turn reflected General Mercier's antipathy to the Jews—said it looked like Dreyfus' handwriting. It was reported. Mercier ordered that Dreyfus be arrested. Du Paty de Clam tried to prepare the case against him. It was not strong enough to suit Mercier, and the Minister of War secured a pleader whose skill was as great as Du Paty's. The anti-semitic party and press had doubts of Mercier, and denied to charge the Ministry with trying to smother the case because Dreyfus was a Jew. That added fuel to his flame, and Mercier became the most rabid foe of the imperilled Captain. The press rewarded him by declaring him the paragon of patriots. Yet he knew he could not crush Dreyfus with the material at hand, and he must act at once. He rose at the first court-martial—Minister of War in the Republic's Cabinet—and said: "Gentlemen, there is something more. I shall read you one sentence from a letter in cipher that some months ago came into the possession of the Ministry. You will comprehend its source, although I am not permitted to present its context. 'Decidedly this second of a Dreyfus is becoming too exacting.' He had wholly, deliberately changed the sentence, for the paper from which he read did not contain the name of Dreyfus, but the initial 'D' only, which it has since been shown, did not apply to Dreyfus."
From the first there has been some doubt as to whether Dreyfus would receive fair treatment from the court which has just condemned him. That doubt has been confirmed into a fixed conviction by the attitude of the judges towards the prisoner, their refusal to admit evidence favourable to him, and their eager acceptance of testimony against him, which Dreyfus aptly characterized as mere "tit-for-tattle." Indeed towards the end of the trial it became apparent that a conviction was a certainty, not because the case was proved, but because the judges had their minds made up. All the world is asking now whether the troublesome issue will end here or become a festering sore in the body politic of France.

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DREYFUS TRIAL. (Continued from First Page.)

the row, and in a few moments an anti-Dreyfusian demonstration was in full swing. The people sitting at the tables rose with shouts of "down with the Jews" and "live Dreyfus," and demanded that the band play the Marseillaise. The band was obliged to comply with the demand, and the crowd hailed the Marseillaise at the top of their voices, alternating words to "March on, march on against the Jews." Sticks, canes and hats were waved, and then the crowd chanted "Vive Dreyfus, vive Dreyfus." Finally one man waved his hat and shouted "Let us march on the Hotel Jodelier." The crowd showed a strong disposition to follow this advice, and the cafe, the situation began to look ugly. Two Philistines, who were sitting in the cafe, were recognized as foreigners, and the crowd there hustled them out. At this moment the cry "Vive Dreyfus" was heard again, louder and stronger than ever. A band of mounted gendarmes and dragons with bayonets fixed to their rifles, galloped up and threw themselves across the entrance to the cafe, and drove them into the street. The crowd followed the river and into the upper part of the town, which was filled with shouts of "Vive Dreyfus" and "down with the Jews."

A FRAUD OF A BLUE COAT. A number of the most noisy of the demonstrators were arrested, and the cavalry at a quick trot, broke up every group, and drove the participants in the demonstration out of the centre of the town, around which was formed a cordon through which no one was allowed to pass, except he was provided with a pass from the police at this time. The demonstration dwindled from this time until 11.30 in the evening, when only a few noisy bands were left, parading the smaller streets, but running at the first sight of a man in a uniform, or a mounted gendarme, however, along to prevent serious disturbances. The cafes in the neighborhood have been closed, some by the police and others by panic, and tranquility is now practically restored, though to-night's trouble will be only the prelude to a bigger demonstration to-morrow.

MAY ONLY SERVE A FORTNIGHT. It was reported this evening that as Dreyfus had been condemned to 10 years' detention, and as he has already suffered 5 years' detention in a prison, which counts as double the ordinary detention, he will be released at the end of a fortnight. In the meanwhile the President of the Republic pardons him, which means that certain as being the only solution of the present situation, Dreyfus will have to be degraded here again within 4 days.

THE NEWS IN PARIS. Paris, Sept. 9.—At an early hour the boulevards presented an scene of unquieted animation. The demand was enormous for the successive editions of the various papers giving home accounts of the proceeding of the trial at Rennes. The police, although reinforced, were lost among the swaying bodies of the Parisians. Large numbers of police were kept on duty at various points in the vicinity of the boulevards, and mounted and foot municipal guards, patrolled the main thoroughfares. At 5 o'clock this evening every available policeman on the boulevards was occupied. The Gaulois exhibited to an enormous crowd a placard on which were the words "Vive Dreyfus," which indicated the verdict was anti-Dreyfus. The announcement was greeted with a deep hum of approval and joy. The Libre Parole announced that Dreyfus had been condemned to 10 years' detention, and that the editions were absolutely torn from the hands of the vendors. The news, however, spread like lightning. It was almost impossible to hear opinions favorable to the prisoner. The masses were hostile to Dreyfus. But in private circles the verdict was criticised in strong terms. The anti-revisionists continued to issue editions suppressing the names of the press, and condemning to only 10 years' detention, in the presence of this extraordinary sentence, it is believed the tribunal recognized the prisoner's innocence, but was afraid of the anger of the public opinion, and as Dreyfus has suffered 5 years' detention in prison, which in France counts for double, he will be immediately released. As this despatch is sent the people were leaving the boulevards.

OPINIONS OF THE WORLD. Despatches from Great Britain, Germany, Italy and the United States state that in all those countries the verdict disgust has been caused by the verdict.
