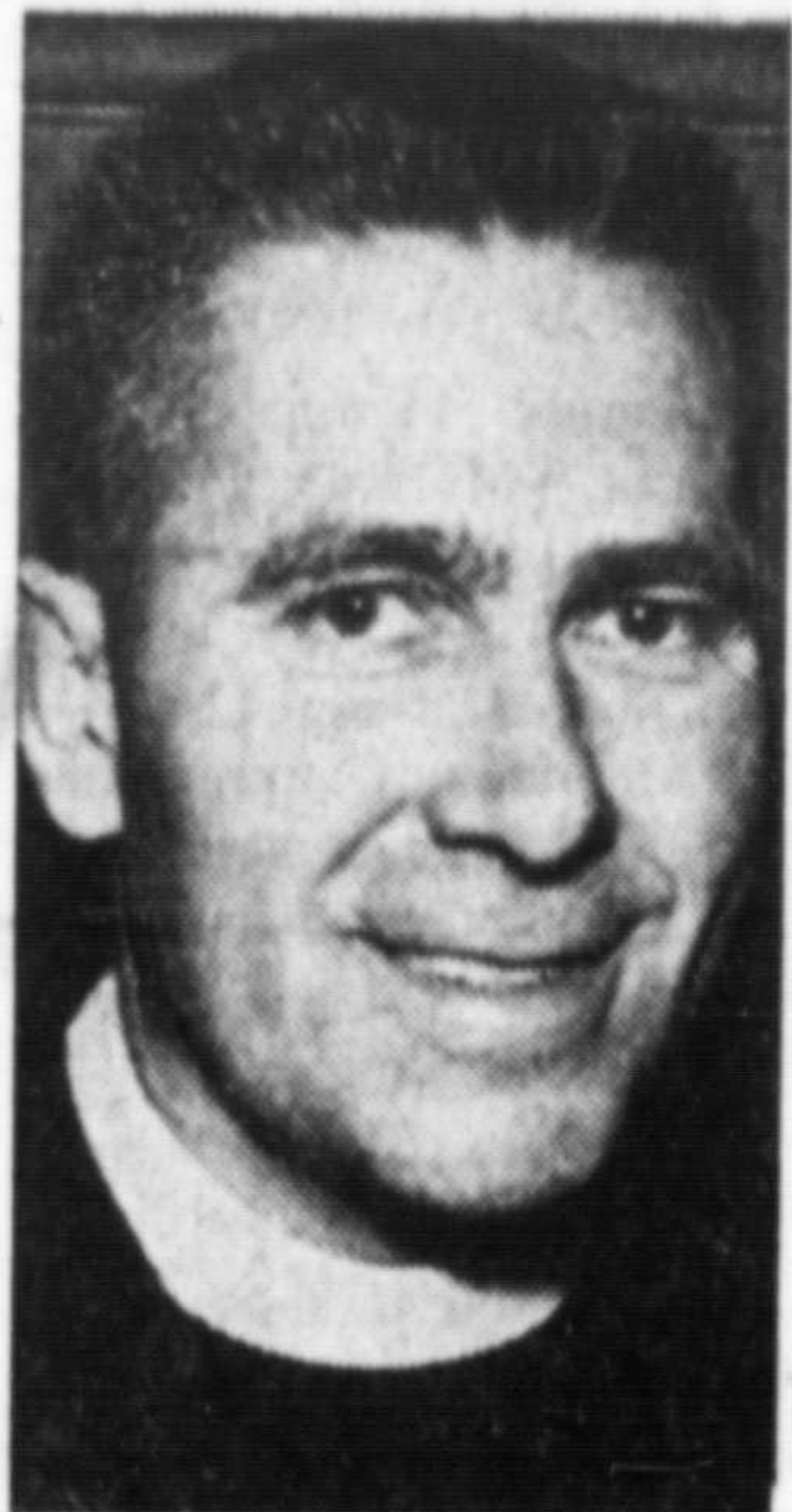

Alumni reunion

For the second time in its history Shawville High School is to have an Alumni Reunion. The first one was held in 1961 and proved to be quite successful. At that time it was hoped to make it an annual event but such was not the case. This year though a hard working committee headed by Gail Horner, Elizabeth McKinley and Sandra Brown have plans well in hand for the second reunion to be held on Saturday, February 15th.

This will take in graduates from 1954-63, over three hundred in all. Improvements have been added to make this second one an even bigger success than in '61.

The program the committee has lined up for the 15th begins at 2 o'clock with a girls basketball game in the gym, followed by a boys game at 3. Teams made up of graduates and coached by G. Stones will take on the present school teams. In 1961 the games were split, one going each way. Save the bridge

Fort Coulonge landmark may be demolished immediately

For all those sentimental people and otherwise who have strong feelings about Pontiac County's only covered bridge, the place to be Friday night at 7:30 is at the Parish Hall in Fort Coulonge at the Mansfield and Pontefract Council meeting.

Mayor Vaz'na Herrault has a bad unemployment situation in his district to consider and also the problem of very high school taxes to counteract. With about 65 mills going to education he tries to keep the municipal tax down around 20 mills and that doesn't allow any extra for the upkeep or even the insurance of the old covered bridge.

His unemployed men number upwards from 75 and the municipality feels obligated to do what it can to prevent their families from going hungry. One means of providing an income for them immediately is through the winter works grant which could be used to demolish the bridge. A similar grant might be used to rebuild the bridge but to this would need to be added probably \$20,000 worth of materials which Mansfield and Pontefract can't afford.

Every day the bridge stands is a financial threat to the Municipality because they are responsible in case it collapses. Friday night the Council may need to make the fateful decision and all who are interested one way or another might well be there with their suggestions to save or demolish this almost 80 year old landmark.

Agriculture Society President Basil Quaile calls for old fashioned cooperation

Fair board returned with few additions

Basil Quaile, having first offered his resignation, finally accepted unanimous re-election as president of Pontiac Agricultural Society Division A last Wednesday night at a large meeting in the Masonic Hall, Shawville.

He called on the members of the Society and the community to return to the pioneer spirit which first established the Fair here and see the present organization through its hard times.

Not only the good old spirit is needed. According to President Quaile, the good old attitude towards work is also going to be required and many of those services which have been paid for in recent years must be done voluntarily again.

The members present agreed with their president and if the feelings of that meeting carry through the year the Fair will undoubtedly come out on top.

Over fifty members were present and all were well fed after the business meeting and elections by the Clarendon Women's Institute. Secretary Everett McDowell read the minutes of last year's annual meeting and also the auditor's report, explaining whatever was necessary.

Assets of the Society appear to total \$167,117.03 including land, buildings, Dominion of Canada Bonds and a small bank balance of \$22,511. Liabilities of the organization total \$66,780.96 including the forty five thousand dollar mortgage loan, a twenty thousand dollar bank loan, personal loans and outstanding cheques.

Grants received in the year ending November 30th, 1963 were two years of Quebec Building Grant \$10,000, Federal Grant for permanent improvement and 4-H \$3,078.63, Pontiac Ayrshire donation \$50., Quebec Special from Alcide Courcy \$300., Bristol Township \$50., Shawville Council \$250., Quebec Membership Grant \$640, Clarendon Council \$150, County of Pontiac \$400.

The Society received \$3,592.25 for rentals of space, the hall and

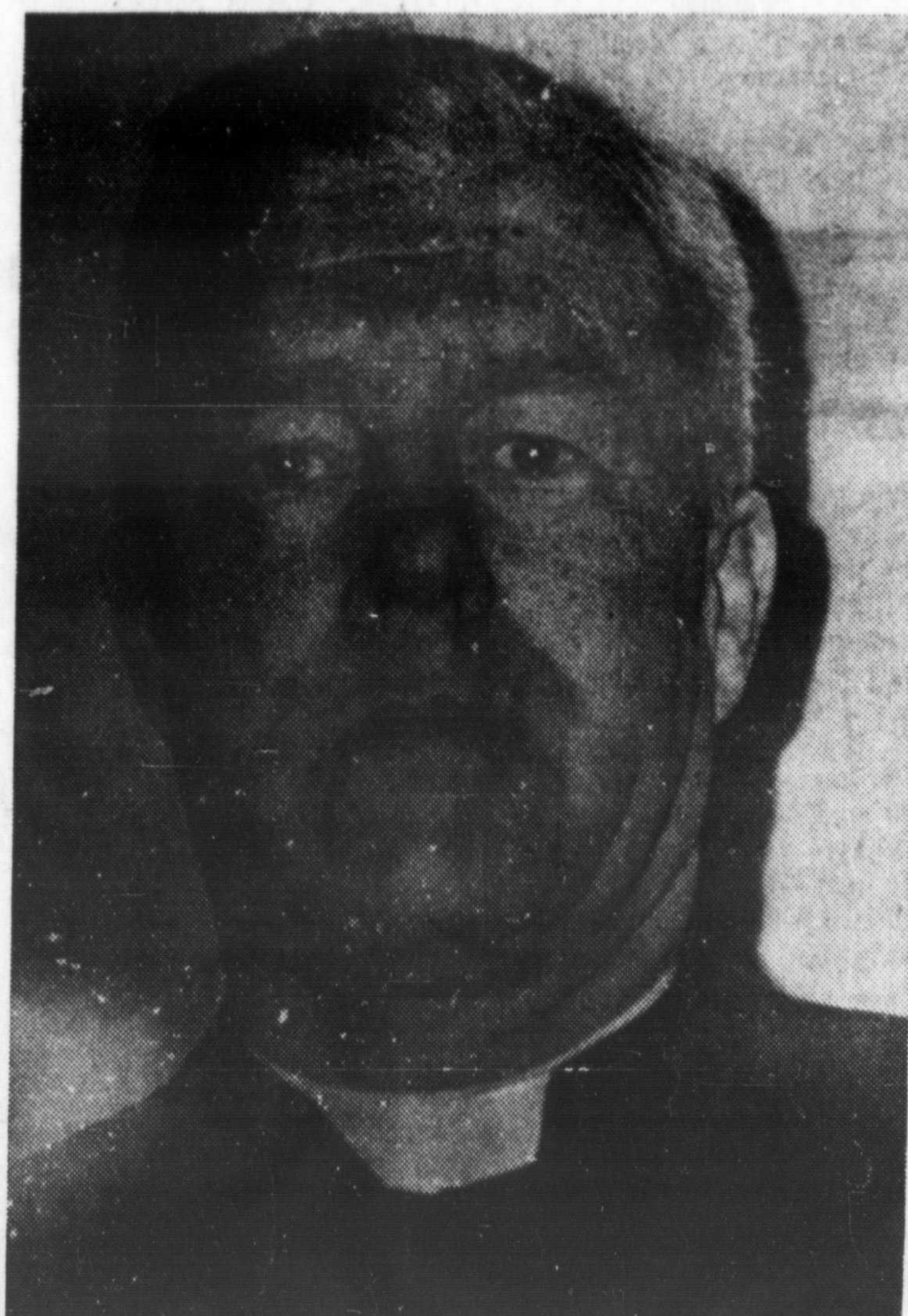

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THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The Agricultural Society received compliments from all sides on their financial statement as presented at the annual meeting. The compliments were in good faith but in our view the statement left much to be desired, as do most such statements to public bodies.

This is not meant as a criticism particularly against the Agricultural Society but against most organizations which use public funds. We believe they should insist that their auditors provide statements from which the public can derive information for their use.

For instance, it should be possible to know whether a particular money raising venture was indeed money raising and it should be possible to discover exactly what each venture cost.

So many items of receipt and disbursement are split into several categories that nobody gets a clear picture.

It shouldn't take an auditor to decipher an auditor's report and even if it means giving a little more attention to the annual statement a little earlier than the last possible minute it would be worthwhile.

The next meeting of a public body will be the Hospital annual. It is to be hoped that their auditor's report will be understandable to all who contribute in taxes towards that institution's support.

Objects to tax

Dear Sirs:

See last week's Equity report of Pontiac County Council.

In that report was included an instruction from the Pontiac County Council to the Municipal Council of Bristol to increase their assessment by the sum of \$1,000,000, from \$1,804,820 to \$2,804,820, nearly double.

Why single out Bristol? The only other municipality within the County required to have its assessment increased was Fort Coulonge, with an increase of \$100,000. There is nothing in the report to indicate that there was a single dissenting voice against the increase in the Bristol assessment. Bristol Township is supposed to have representation on the County Council.

Neither in the report is there any justification indicated as to why such action was taken. It certainly cannot be justified by any improvement in value of deserted farms in North Bristol nor by any increase in value of over-bush land in much of the rest of Bristol.

True there is the natural resources development of the Bristol Mines and the thriving summer tourist trade of the whole township, the former of which probably brings to the Lower Pontiac a sum of \$2,000,000 or more in wages annually and the latter upwards of a \$1,000,000 in money spent in ordinary living by cottagers living at Pontiac Station, Norway Bay, Bristol, Philip's Lake and sundry other points within the Township, money spent not alone in Bristol but to the benefit of the entire Lower Pontiac.

According to the Municipal Code, increases in assessment can be protested to the Municipal body in which the property is located and likewise that Municipal body can protest to the governing County body. There is also recourse to the Department of Municipal Affairs at Quebec.

Such action need not be confined to organized groups within Bristol Township alone. The whole of the Lower Pontiac benefits from the pay roll of the Bristol Mines and the liberal spending of the cottagers throughout the area and the aggregate of that spending is a major asset in the economy of the whole County. Pontiac County needs more population and industry and the industry it has not closed up or driven away.

Chambers of Commerce are supposed to be concerned with the industrial and economic development of the area for which they serve. Not since the days of the building of the local railroad has anything occurred in Pontiac County which could have such a disturbing effect upon a whole community as this most recent action, in the matter of assessment, on the part of Pontiac County Council.

the midway which paid \$1500.

Donations to the Building Fund were \$1,389.68, six thousand dollars was borrowed from the bank, \$1,226.29 was donated to the fair, receipts from the calf sale were \$1,348.75 and from the spring horse show were \$343.75. Personal loans of \$700 were received for prizes. Gate receipts at the fair were \$3,603.96 and memberships totalled \$450.

Total receipts, accounted for above and also including arena winter events (\$2,856.13), show receipts, bond and bank interest, sale of Government Bond, car receipts (\$2,516.70) damages collected, stake race entries, hay and straw sold and \$1.13 prize money returned, amounted to \$41,819.39.

Total disbursements were \$42,501.55 which left a deficit for the year of \$682.16. The monies paid out went to membership in CHSA, 1962 prize cheques paid, general account, postage, office supplies, mortgage payments (\$6,060.00), telephone, power and light, general administration (\$5,021.67), interest and bank charges, amusement tax, printing and advertising, secretary's salary, bank loan repaid (\$11,900), fuel for the new building (\$1,086.97), insurance, calf sale expenses (\$988.30), Spring Horse Show (\$250.02), Hall expenses, pee wee showmanship, car draw expenses (\$2,367), horse races, variety concert, 4H club expenses, electrical work at grounds, judges, horse drawing contest and labor (\$96.30).

It was announced that the Society would be sending out prize money to the horse classes next week. Many of the horsemen were visitors to the area and it was felt that the cattle men who were mostly local people would want the visitors to be paid first. It was hoped that the cattle prizes could be paid later.

Past president Arthur Kilgour commended the Society on such a good report, considering the large amounts which have had to be sent out. Mrs. Cecil Sly also complimented the Society on the report, feeling it was well done, clear and concise.

Agronomist Neil Drummond announced that Chapeau Fair would be held September 15-16 and Quyon Fair Sept. 8-9-10. Shawville Fair dates are Sept. 16 to 19.

Mr. Drummond commented on the interest shown by the good attendance at the annual meeting, on the beauty of the flower show in the middle of the old agricultural building at the fair, and suggested that other projects should be encouraged here such as an exhibit of old time agricultural equipment a fly casting demonstration for the summer people, recreational activities for young and old.

Mr. Drummond said that the Society might investigate the midway arrangements made at Maniwaki as a possible improvement.

President Basil Quaile then thanked Neil Drummond, Art Kilgour, Mr. and Mrs. Nellis Hodgins, the Lions, the executive and the lady directors for all their help on so many aspects of the Society's work and asked all to help support affairs in the new building.

President Quaile said there must be more community effort, more free help. He felt it would be difficult to increase the income to the Society but it might be possible to think up ways to cut down on expenses.

From talking to some old people who helped to build earlier buildings and barns at the fairgrounds, Mr. Quaile found they did it by lots of hard work and not too many government grants.

A letter from Dr. Armitage who was unable to be present suggested the Society apply to Quebec for \$1000 annual grant for the past 3 years and also suggested asking for extension of \$2500 annual grant. He also offered to serve on a finance committee which he suggested be named immediately. After the election of officers Shawville Mayor Orla Young, Citizen Keith Horner, Dr. S. E. McDowell, Wyman McKechnie and Dr. Armitage were named to be the "Ways and Means Committee."

Neil Drummond presided at the election of directors for 1964 and all were returned as last year with the addition of Kenneth Winfield of Wakefield, Don Corrigan, Clayton Dodds and Lorne Rouliffe. New lady directors are Mrs. Alvin Kelly, Mrs. Roland Graham, Mrs. Claude Young, Mrs. Keith Munroe, Mrs. Oswald Cuthbertson, Mrs. Sadie Sparling and Mrs. Grant Eades. The meeting then adjourned and a Directors meeting followed immediately during which Basil Quaile was redrafted to presidency, George Pirie first vice president, Roland Armitage second vice president, Warren Campbell third vice president and Everett McDowell was nominated secretary.

In accepting his election, Basil Quaile said he felt he didn't do

very well last year and hoped to better this year. He said he'd be asking for a great deal of free help.

Sherwood Henderson declined appointment to chairmanship of the horse committee but his resignation was not accepted. Sid Sheppard was then named to chair the Horse Drawing and Art Kilgour, Lee Hodgins and Veral Smiley were named to the midway committee. Nobody would accept chairmanship of the parking committee but Sterling Hodgins was named to the building committee.

Art Kilgour remarked that when the extra expense was entered into to provide the skating rink there seemed to be promise of a recreation grant that never materialized and might be sought.

Hilliard Beattie suggested personal visits to outside councils to request grants.

Gervase O'Reilly moved a

vote of thanks to the president for a good job done last year and for accepting the chore for another year.

Basil Quaile said the Society must refinance and get their money at a better rate than is provided by the present arrangement with Canadian Acceptance Corporation. He suggested a bond issue which would pay better than Government of Canada bonds but noted that the refinancing can't take place until after July, 1964.

The Society president hopes people will respond cooperatively to his refinancing plan and sees no reason why such bonds wouldn't sell well. "If the CAC was willing to lend money then anyone should" he said.

His last official act of the evening was to present to George Pirie the Eaton Trophy for having won highest marks in all livestock at the 1963 Fair.

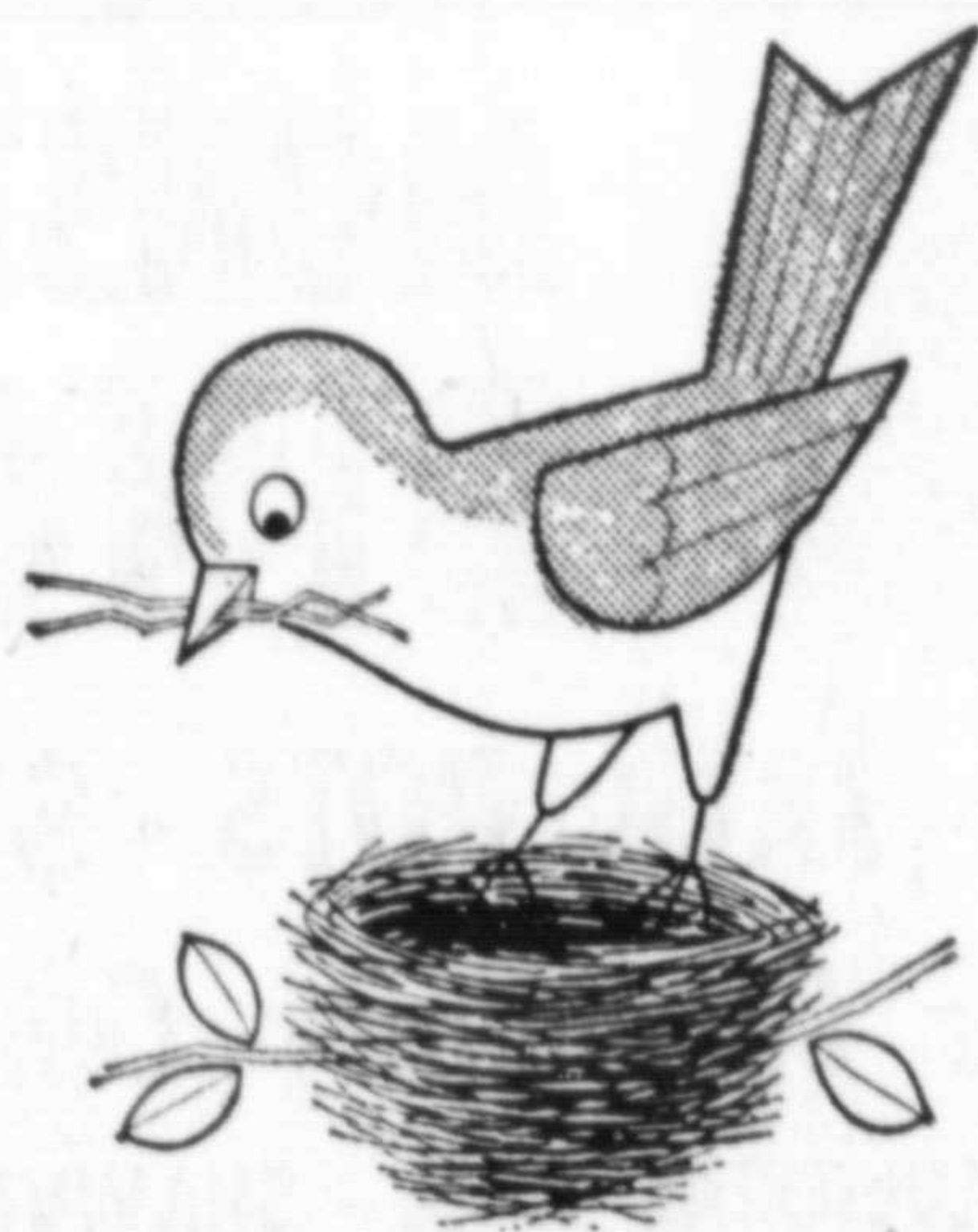

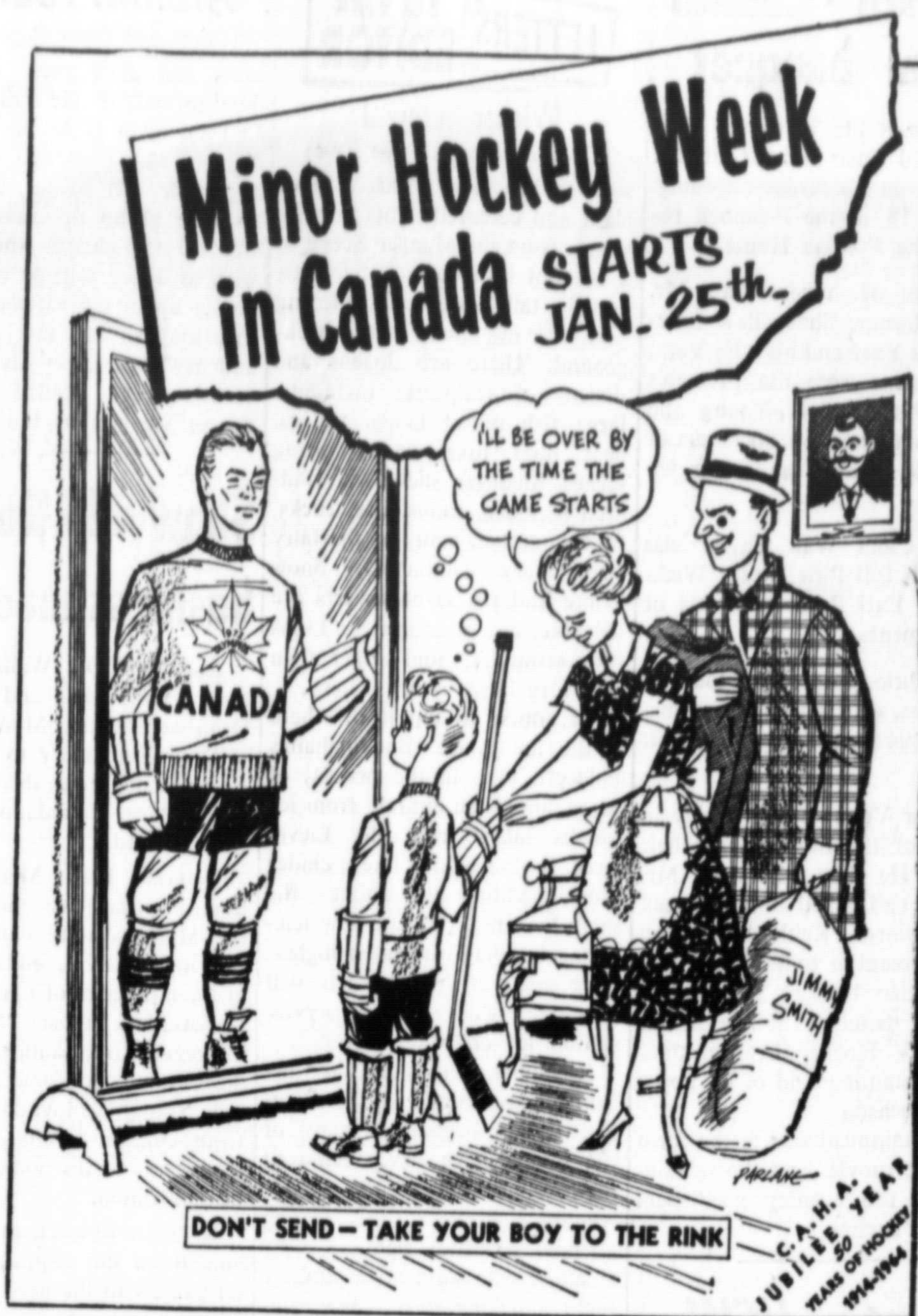

Reports showed expansion in the work and influence of the OVHS with its membership of 82. Through the courtesy of a generous monetary donation from Mr. and Mrs. DR Rogers, Pembroke, which will be directed towards the erection of a typical pioneer dwelling adjacent to the Champlain Trail Museum, more space will be provided for the displays of antiques. The annual obligation to the Pembroke Electric Light Co. who loaned the purchase price of the museum to the OVHS was met. Each year a payment of \$500 is made. During 1963 the North Renfrew District Women's Institutes contributed \$135 towards this fund. The Pembroke Horticultural Society donated many shrubs for landscaping the grounds, reported by Mrs. JWM Findlay. Miss Lulu Fraser gave a comprehensive account of antiques acquired and displayed. Reporting on historical data and filing and publicity, Mrs. Carl Price emphasized the broadening features of her work, contributing information requested to the Department of Mines and Technical Surveys, Ottawa and the Department of Travel and Publicity, Toronto; the Upper Ottawa Valley Travel Council and recording more local history in addition to reporting activities of the OVHS through the media of press, radio and television. Elie Quinn killed as compressor explodes

One man was killed and four others narrowly escaped injury when a compressor exploded on the grounds of the Quebec Roads Department garage at the western outskirts of Aylmer on Monday, January 13, a few feet from the Eardley Road.

Elie Quinn, 41, of 16 North Street, an employee of the Quebec Department of Public Works for about 15 years, was instantly killed when he was struck on the side of the head by a piece of metal from the disintegrating compressor. A fellow-worker, Hugh O'Leary of 50 Main Street, who had been working with Mr. Quinn on a jack hammer to reach a frozen water-pipe, had just jumped into a ditch to resume work with the hammer when the machine exploded. According to Police Chief Roger Boucher, the compressor on which Mr. Quinn was working had run out of gas and had just been refilled. When he touched the starter the whole machine shattered and a hail of pieces of metal mined into the ditch, just missing Mr. O'Leary. The Aylmer town foreman, Antonio Graveline, who had just driven into the Dept. of Highways yard, was about 50 feet away from the blast area. Metal fragments smashed the windshield of the town truck, and narrowly missed the truck's other two occupants, Noel Graveline and Moe Dubeau.

Dr. Armand Lecours was called and pronounced Mr. Quinn dead at the scene of the accident. The police investigation was under the direction of Chief R. Boucher and Const. R. Poirier of the Aylmer force, and Detective Marcel Joyal and Const. Ovide Belec of the QPP were also called in to complete the investigation. There will be no inquest.

Mr. Quinn, a bachelor, is survived by his mother, Mrs. Severe Quinn, four brothers, Romeo and Noel of Hull and Marcel and Roger of Aylmer; and five sisters, Mrs. Edmond Dubeau (Therese), Mrs. Juilien Ladouceur (Fleur-ette), Mrs. Arthur Cardinal (Desneiges) all of Aylmer, Mrs. Ernest Miner (Germaine), of Hull, and Mrs. Ulysse Dechesne (Patricia) of Ottawa. The funeral took place on January 16 from the Emond Funeral Home to St. Paul's Church, with burial in the parish cemetery.

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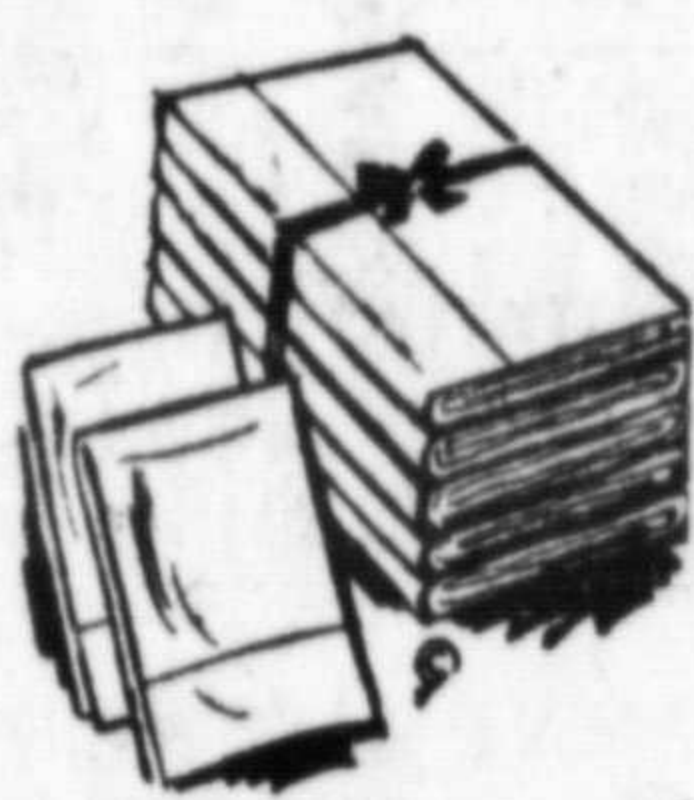
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Country notes

When the seed catalogue comes can spring be far away? Our first arrived in yesterday's mail. It was as welcome as a robin.

With the mental picture before me of warm brown fields, dust clouds behind the harrows, and rich soil spilling off the top of the seed drill's slowly turning wheels, I phoned my old friend Bill Ewing. Bill is in the seed business. He knows his work inside out, and he has a wealth of information on the tip of his tongue.

I asked Bill how the seed situation was shaping up for this spring, and his report came back crisp and concise. "At the wholesale level, the stocks of grass seeds are generally quite tight, with prices running above last year's level, but, with the exception of red clover, seeds of legumes are more plentiful and prices easier. With a good demand overseas, red clover is quite short, and prices very firm. A similar situation exists with timothy. We can't fill the export orders for Climax, and with US stocks low, timothy seed is coming into Canada from New Zealand. The price spread between common and Climax timothy is very narrow this year," he replied.

I asked Bill about certified seed of other named varieties. "There should be plenty of seed this year of Vernal and Narragansett alfalfa, and at lower prices, but Dupuis may be hard to buy. There is a good supply, though, of Alfa which is about equal to Dupuis. As for certified brome grass, Saratoga is quite short. In orchard grass, the Swedish varieties Frode and Tarsus are available", was his answer. He told me also that the stocks of certified Viking and certified

Empire trefoil would not likely fill demand, but that there were sufficient supplies of good commercial seed from Ontario and the North-eastern States. Alsike, Ladino and White Dutch clover were also in plentiful supply.

Last year, corn received a lot of publicity. The advantages of early maturing hybrids were stressed. As a result, there was a rush to buy early varieties, and the dealers were caught short. It is not likely they will let it happen again; there is a good stock of these corn hybrids in the warehouses.

Wondering what varieties to plant this year and what mixtures to use? A good guide is the booklet put out by the Department of Agriculture, "Recommendations of the Quebec Seed Board". Send us a postcard if you want a copy. Dr. John Bubar, of the Agronomy Department, tells me that the Board has not made any changes this year, so your last year's copy is still valid.

These recommendations are not made lightly. It is only after careful checking over several years that a new variety is accepted by the Board.

For instance, I wondered why the two oat varieties, Rodney and Russell, which I knew so well in Ontario, were not included. It seems that under Quebec conditions, they simply do not perform as well as Glen, Shefford, and Garry. Rodney dropped after 77 trials, in all parts of the province over a period of six years, gave consistently lower yields. In the same way, Russell has not yet proved itself.

Mrs. Robbins, who looks after the Extension Film Library, tells me that there is an excellent new film on hand. It is "Cattle Ranch" a robust, prize-winning film of

the life of a real cowboy. Made in colour by the National Film Board of Canada, it is accompanied in music and songs by folk singer Peter Seeger. Cattle Ranch presents a vividly dramatic picture of the open range where the cowboy is king.

If you would like to borrow this film, or anyone of the 700 others in the library, drop us a line. The charges are moderate—just \$1.00 for this one, plus transportation. The address is Box 237, Macdonald College.

I have received a very well-written letter from a grade V boy in one of the city schools. He wants information on Dairying in Canada so that he can write a composition for his Geography class. I don't know whether the fault is mine, or the industry's but I can not find one single piece of good general information. I am sending him some dry-as-dust statistics, and hoping that someone will help him figure them out.

However, in the process of searching, some interesting facts did turn up. The National Cow gives 6500 pounds of milk—enough to supply six Canadians with eighteen pounds of butter each, eight pounds of cheese, and 150 quarts of milk. Besides, this fictitious beast exports seventeen pounds of skim milk powder, and eight pounds of cheese. And note this—out of 6500 pounds milk she gave last year, less than 50 pounds was surplus.

Next week, I hope to have some information for you about the farm management group being formed in Argenteuil County.

Aylmer Council

Principal item of business at the January meeting of the Aylmer Town Council consisted of the reading of the annual report of the Aylmer Volunteer Fire Brigade. During the year 1963 the number of fire calls reported totalled 59, with a total estimated damage of \$14,100 as against 108 fire calls for a total estimated property damage of \$60,000 in 1959. A total of 32 hours was spent in actual fire-fighting by the Brigade — a decrease over all previous years.

A Committee, chaired by Ald. G. M. Griffin is at present working on a review of the By-laws governing the administration of the Brigade, and the municipal by-law concerning Fire Prevention. It is felt that the regulation against burning of grass and leaves in the town has done much to cut down on the number of unnecessary alarms.

Some concern was expressed in the report over the difficulty encountered in obtaining the necessary grants from Quebec to permit the purchase of a new pumper to replace the ancient Bickle-Seagrave which can now be used only on standby duty. In commenting on this section of the report, the Mayor pointed out that the Secretary-Treasurer of the Town, Mr. L. C. Savard, had been in Quebec the preceding weekend and had spoken to officials of the Department of Municipal Affairs on Monday. Apparently the entire system of grants is being reviewed and prospects for funds from this source do not appear to be too good at the moment, but every possible avenue of approach will be explored to make purchase of this equipment possible.

In other business, the Mayor outlined plans for the official re-opening of the renovated Town Hall on January 26, to be followed by a banquet at St. Joseph's High School. The Town Hall, built in 1869 was re-built under the winter work program last year at a total cost of \$101,655.80 and has been occupied by the town since late May. Every citizen of Aylmer is invited to attend the ceremonies at the Town Hall at 3:30 p.m. Refreshments will be served.

Council expressed its appreciation of the work of the Brigade and had high praise for the work being done by Chief R. Guertin and his 24-man staff.

A further temporary loan in the amount of \$30,000 to meet running expenses was authorized. The chairman of the Finance Committee, Ald J. E. Whelan pointed out that \$63,000 was owing in taxes and collection of this amount would obviate any necessity for using the credit authorized by the resolution under study.

It is expected that the February meeting of Council will deal with the new budget and consequently set the tax rate. Mayor O'Donnell also announced that he planned at that time to make a statement of the work Council hopes to carry out during the coming year.

At the close of the meeting Mr. O'Donnell announced that the town's consulting engineers would be going to Montreal within a few days to discuss preliminary plans and cost studies for the Aylmer sewage disposal plant with officials of the Water Purification Board. Some time ago, officials of this provincial bureau agreed that the building of a separate plant in Aylmer would be more efficient and cheaper than tying in with either the projected regional plant at Hull or the Deschenes plant now nearing

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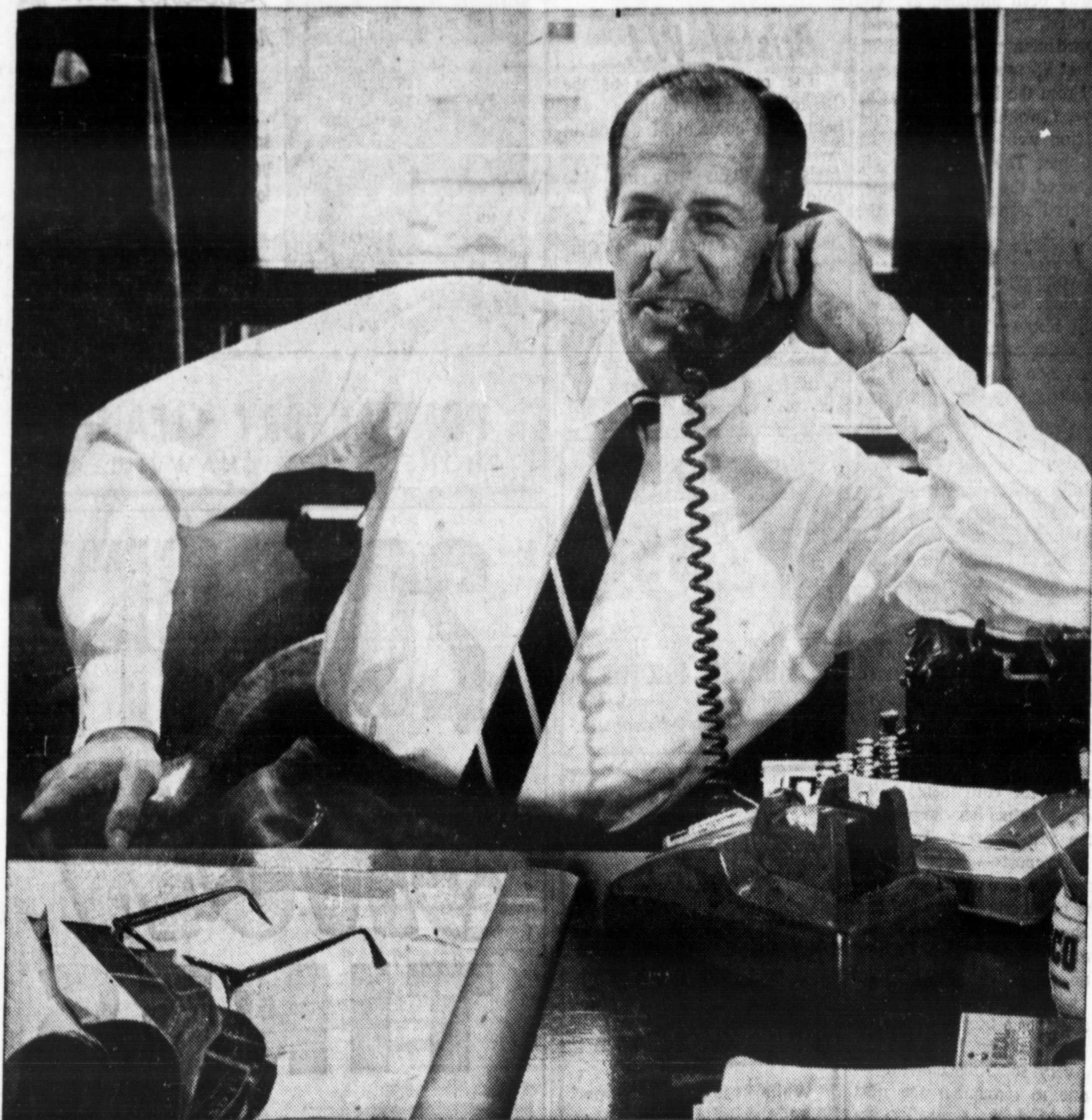
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Aylmer Jottings

In connection with the Fire Department report presented to Council last week, some figures are in order concerning the new pumper. Fully equipped, the pumper will cost about \$19,000 so that if one quarter or one third of it is available in grants, it will make the tax load considerably easier. The unfortunate part is that every month's delay increases the risk to the town. Normally, Council allots a capital grant of about \$1,000 each year to the Fire Brigade for equipment. Last year, because the provincial grant was fully anticipated, no annual grant was made for equipment — so the boys have neither the pumper nor the \$1,000 grant. To quote from the report — "The Brigade realizes that the delay in ordering the new pumper may not rest with the Council, but, nevertheless, we have been most fortunate that no serious fires have taken place which would have turned the delay into a tragedy."

A very sobering thought — and one to remember the next time you feel like screaming because taxes have to be raised to meet such expenditures! This is not a "budget leak" — whether taxes go up or not will not be known for another month—but we have had a remarkably stable tax rate in this town for a long time now IN VIEW OF THE SERVICES WE DEMAND, EXPECT, AND, USUALLY GET! There are those who have accused the present Council of dragging its feet — of not getting on with things — of forgetting about progress, when progress is all around this enclave — but this may be a very good time to remind ourselves that if we want to progress we have to pay for it — and some of the "progress" is being forced on us any way by outside regulation. We can't keep Aylmer a stagecoach town in a jet age!

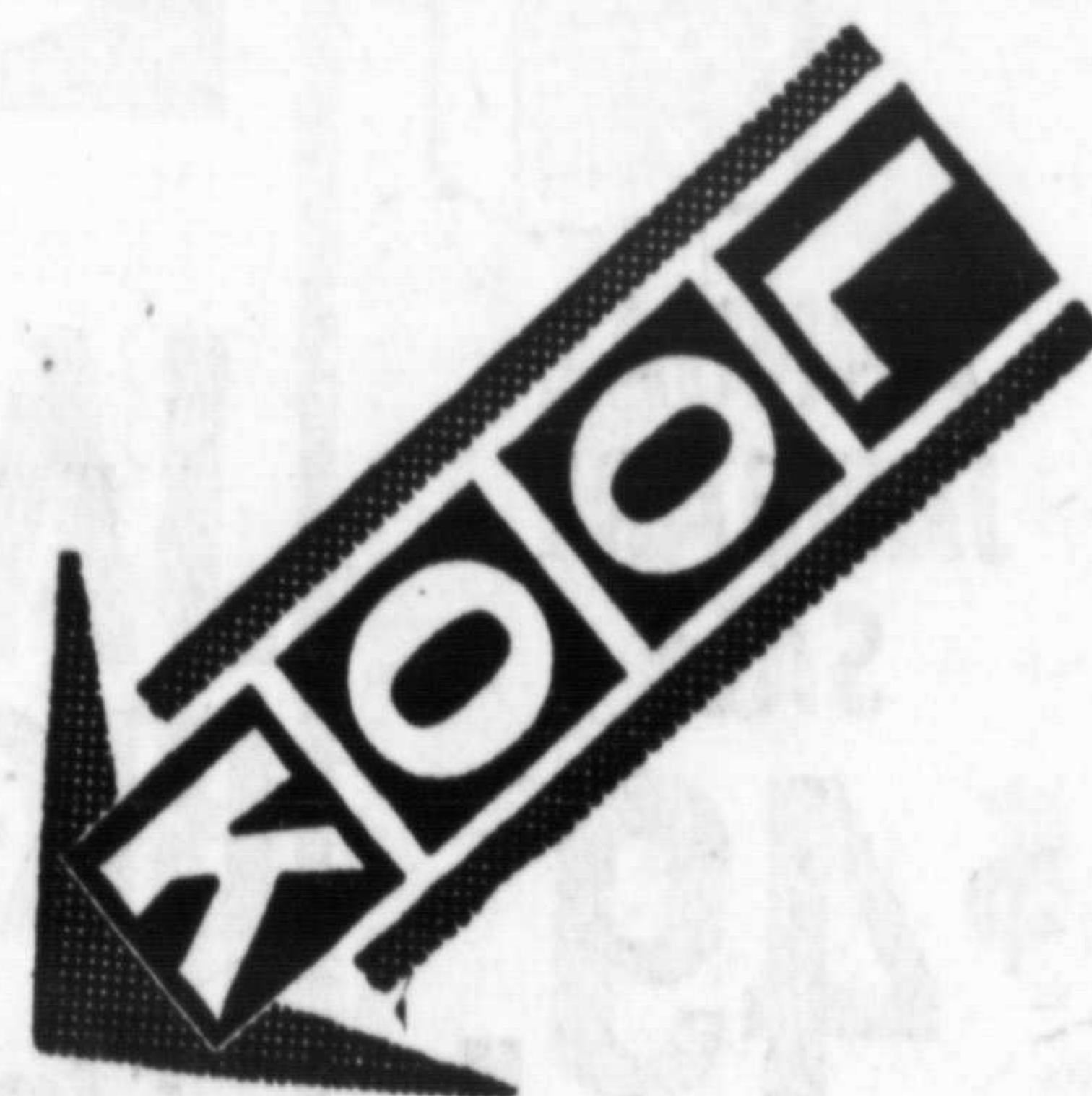
