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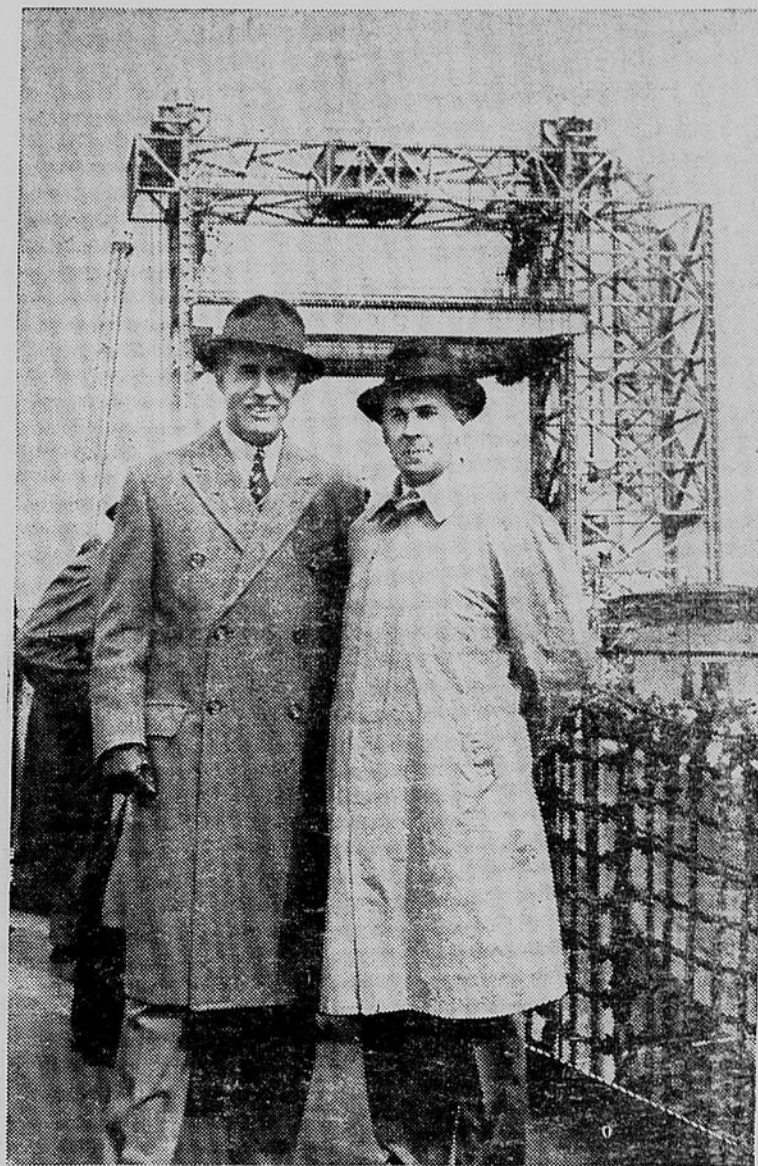
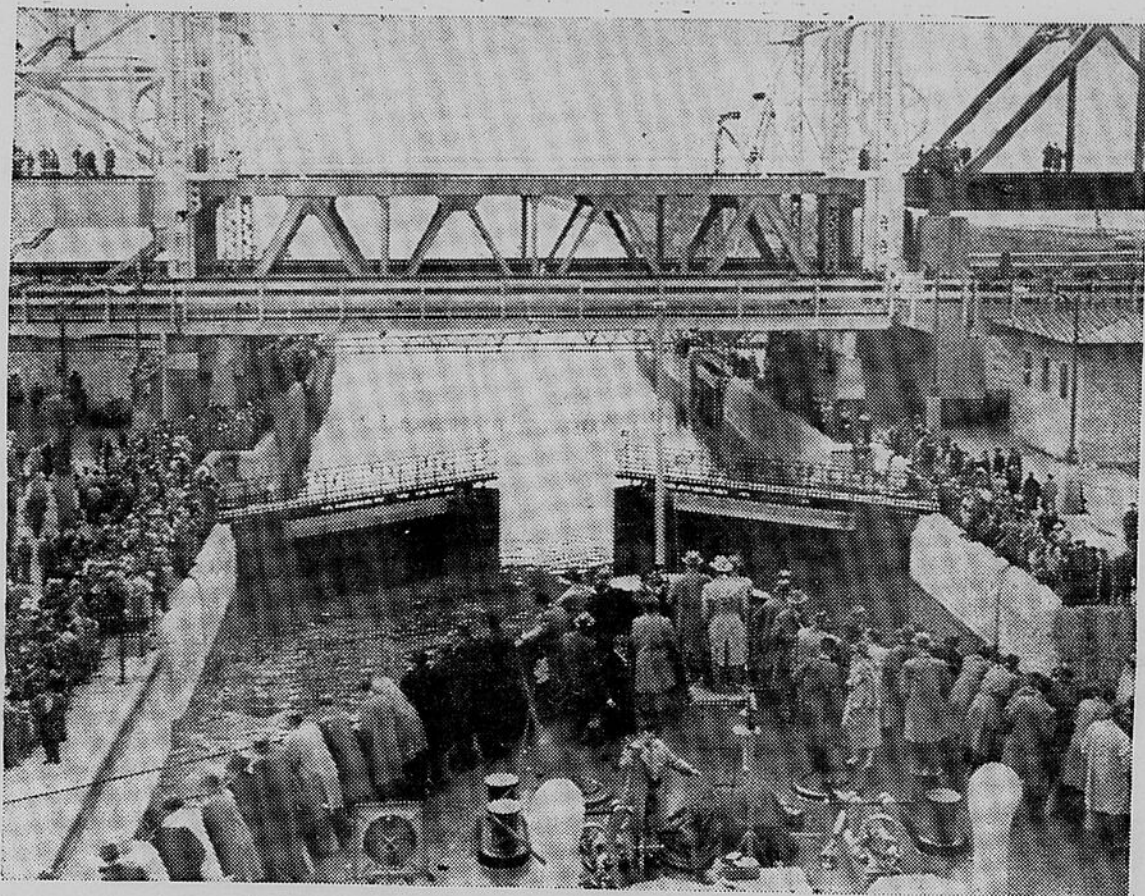

It was an exciting moment for the SUN and the several hundred other M.P.'s, newspapermen, photographers and Seaway officials, who were on board the icebreaker D'Iberville last Saturday-morning April 25th, when these locks in photo at left opened to let the first ship the D'Iberville enter the St. Lawrence Seaway thus opening this great waterway for national and international shipping. SEAWAY OPEN FOR BUSINESS

Another milestone in the development of our great country was reached last Saturday when one of Canada's most daring ventures, the half a billion dollar St. Lawrence Seaway, was opened for business. Thousands of words have already been written and spoken about the advantages and disadvantages, about the potentiality of the man made waterway and a thousand and one other factors directly or indirectly connected with it have been discussed by laymen and experts alike.

For us one main question remains unanswered: What will it mean for our own area? Experts have said that with the Seaway going right through our district further industrialisation can't stay out... especially along that part of

the Seaway between Valleyfield and Melocheville where abundant land is available along the shore with easy access to both rail and road service. While no doubt time will tell the story we are confident that this waterway will greatly contribute to the further development of our area.

The Seaway is now open for business and while the official opening will come at the end of June, with Queen Elizabeth and President Eisenhower participating, we would like to take this opportunity to extend to all the men, from Paul Smith, division engineer in charge of the Seaway construction here in our own area, down to the men who manned the drills and poured the concrete... to them our sincerest congratulations on a really magnificent job.

SEVEREST PUNISHMENT FOR HIT-AND-RUN A MUST

"Father of seven murdered..." that's the way the headline could read on the story relating the brutal hit-and-run killing of a 57 year old man cycling along a secondary public highway last week Tuesday evening.

It is probably one of the most ruthless, bloodiest and shocking hit-and-run cases ever reported. (For full report please see page 9) While we feel sorrow and pity for the seven children and their mother we feel nothing but disgust and horror for the driver of the car and we are expressing the feelings of all those who have heard of the accident when we declare that the severest punishment must be handed out in this case. It is indeed difficult to fathom the thinking and mental level of a human being who will drive several miles along a highway with the body of the man he just hit hanging out of his windshield and then dumping it on the roadside before speeding away. How and why he hit the cyclist will no doubt come out at the trial. The fact for which no excuse can be given, and

must not be allowed, is the cruel and murderous manager in which the guilty person tried to cover up his deed.

He has been charged with "criminal negligence on a public highway" rather than hit-and-run. Maximum penalty for the charge is life imprisonment while 2 years is all the law calls for in cases of hit-and-run. Judges of the Montreal courts are handing out the stiffest possible sentences in an effort to curb the great number of armed robberies that have been committed lately. Perhaps the time has come to revise the law governing hit-and-run cases in order to provide for stronger punishment and thus contribute towards keeping reckless and irresponsible people of our roads.

RESTAURANTS PROTEST; BUST FOR EDGAR HEBERT; THREE MORE GAS STATIONS — AT LAST WEEK'S VALLEYFIELD COUNCIL MEETING

At the last meeting of the Valleyfield City Council, on Wednesday, April 22nd, a petition, signed by 50 restaurant owners, was read in which they protest against the large use of soft drink machines and request the council to give them the exclusive right to sell soft drinks.

Alderman George Leduc gave a notice of motion to adopt a bylaw for restaurants and to amend the bylaw concerning the tax on softdrink machines. The present tax is \$10 per year.

The Council passed a resolution stating that it is in favour of Metropolitan Blvd plan A-1

which would bring the proposed road through Ile Perrot and Dowker Island up to the Clover Leaf near the Mgr. Langlois bridge leading into Valleyfield. The two other alternatives would take the road close to Dorion or considerably to the North of this town. Copies of the resolution have been sent to Premier Maurice Duplessis and members of the provincial cabinet.

Aldermen G. Leduc and A. Gagnier proposed to erect a plaque or bust of Mr. Edgar Hebert, M. P.P. on the new traffic island opposite the Chateau Salaberry. The traffic island will form part of the new approach to the Jac-

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ques Cartier Bridge which is now in the process of being widened.

The Council decided to install parking meters on the Bank of Commerce side of Bay Street.

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WE HELPED OPEN THE ST. LAWRENCE SEAWAY

"It took 4½ years to build, now this is it"... with these words the Minister of Transport George Hees no doubt expressed the feelings of all those who were on board the government ice breaker D'Iberville when she pulled away from pier 46 in Montreal last Saturday morning at four minutes past 8 to be the first ship to enter the Seaway channel at St. Lambert. Behind her came a second government icebreaker the Montcalm followed by a fleet of Canadian and foreign freighters which had been patiently waiting for the last few weeks to get the St. Lawrence navigation season underway.

On board the D'Iberville were some 140 members of parliament and senators together with Dept. of Transp. officials, Seaway representatives and a large number of newspaper, radio and television people including the SUN. Among the officials we met on board were former Seaway presidents, Lionel Chevalier and Charles Gavsie, Mr. B.J. Roberts, Seaway Authority President, Mr. Gordon Murphy chief engineer for the Seaway, Mr. Gerard Bruchesi, M.P. for the Beauharnois-Salaberry riding, Mr. Barrington, M.P. for the Chateaugay-Huntingdon constituency and many others.

Thousands of people were waiting along the seaway channel shore and at the St. Lambert locks to welcome the D'Iberville which edged her painfully slow way into the lock area. It was nevertheless an exciting moment for those aboard the icebreaker. It took an hour and fifteen minutes for the Seaway's first ship to enter and clear the locks. The SUN was later told by Seaway engineer Gordon Murphy and other officials that it would take a little time before captains and pilots of the lakers and ocean going vessels alike would be familiar with the operations in the locks. Further more the shape of the D'Iberville makes handling in a lock difficult.

The locks can handle two ships at a time when they are not longer than 300 feet. Only one boat will enter the locks if it is 400 feet or longer. When both lock operators and pilots are fully acquainted with the operations the locks will be able to handle 30 small vessels in each direction in 24 hours or 15 large ships.

At Cote St. Catherine another crowd of people awaited the arrival of the first snip. On arrival all passengers disembarked and the D'Iberville and the Mont-

calm returned to Montreal thus making way for the first commercial vessels to sail up the Seaway.

Master of the D'Iberville is captain C.A. Caron. The D'Iberville, the largest Canadian Government Icebreaker was built in 1953 in Levis Quebec and was one of the snips representing Canada at the Coronation review at Spithead. Since then she has been continuously engaged in icebreaking and marine transportation in the Canadian Arctic.

The first commercial vessel, bedecked in flags, to enter the Seaway was the Canada Steam-

ship laker Simcoe which had followed the government icebreakers from Montreal. All along the Seaway channel and at the Melocheville locks people were waiting to welcome her. Since Saturday morning some 50 ships have passed through the locks at Melocheville to the great excitement of hundreds of visitors.

More official ceremonies are to be held when the Queen and President Eisenhower will be present to formally open the Seaway.

by his wife, Pearl Buchanan and 7 children: Ross Lorne, Ralph jr., Beverly, Melvin, Don and Diane and a sister Mrs. T. Godsell (Rita). The funeral takes place today Wednesday from the William Wray chapel in Montreal at 2 p.m. Interment to be at the Mount Royal Cemetery.

Mr. Buchanan was an elder of the Valleyfield United Church and member of the Board of Managers. He had been with Merk C. Ltd., since 1937 and plant maintenance Supervisor in Valleyfield since 1950.

President of the temporary committee is Mr. Georges Andre Meloche with Mr. R. G. Robineault as Secretary.

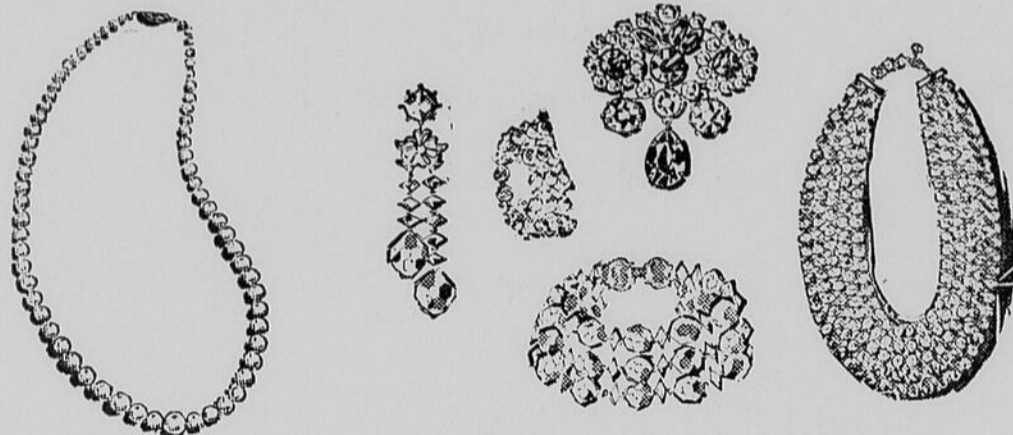

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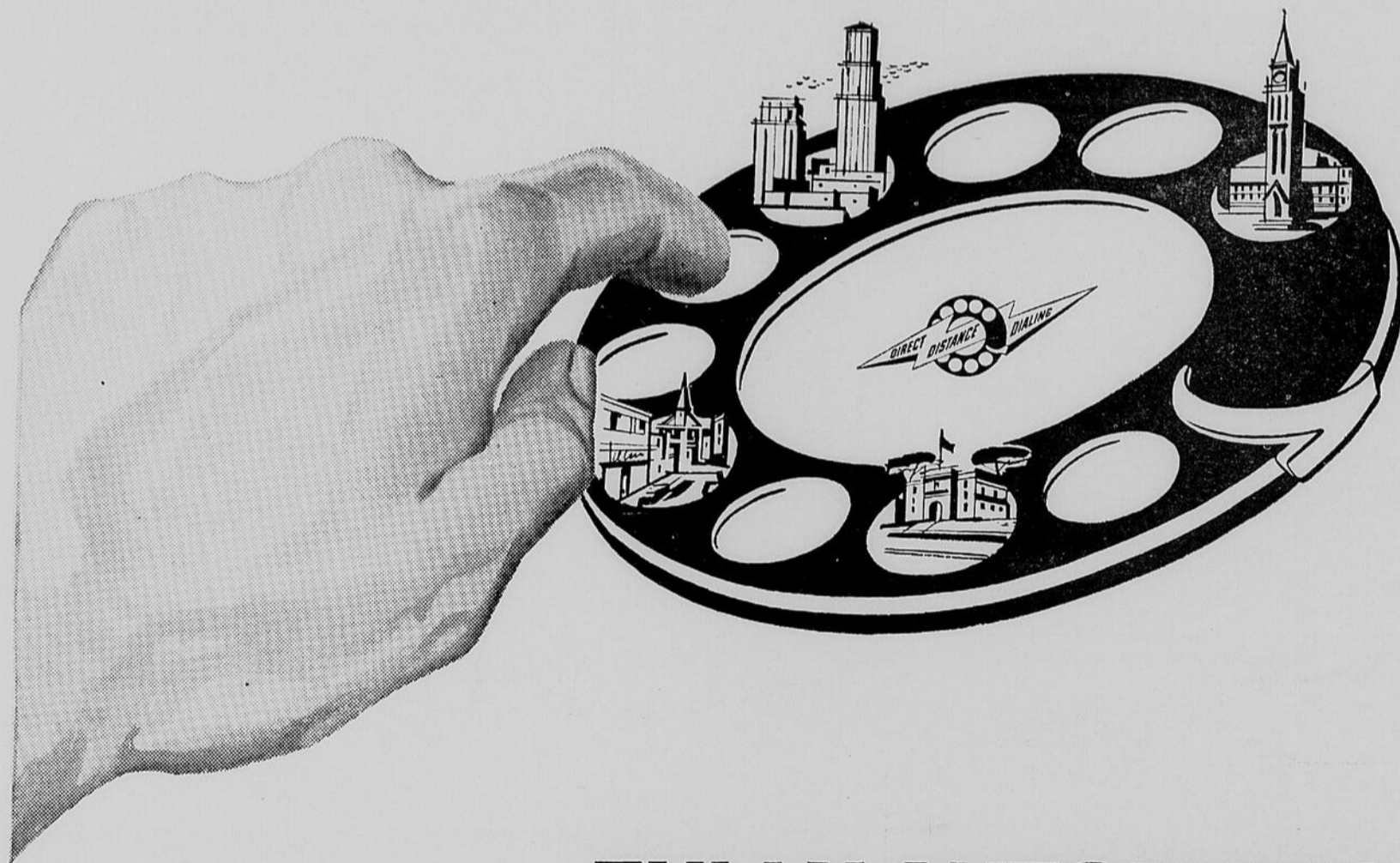

District Shocked By Hit-And-Run Killing

Meril LaViolette, 44, of Vill. LaSalle was charged with manslaughter for the hit-and-run killing of 57 year old Albert Goyette of 12 St. Laurent, Maple Grove before judge Maurice Fortin at Valleyfield last Friday morning.

The defendant pleaded not guilty and is out on \$2,000 bail. His trial will be held on Friday May 1st at the Valleyfield courthouse.

Albert Goyette, 57, father of seven children died of a fractured skull and other injuries when he was hit by a car driven by LaViolette last Tuesday evening shortly after 7 p.m. while riding his bicycle on the Lower Road between Bellevue and

Woodlands.

The impact was so severe that Mr. Goyette went half through the windshield of the car. With the body in this position the driver drove on to a side road but presumably lost his nerve when some children saw what had happened and ran away screaming for help. Driving on in the direction of Beauharnois, LaViolette finally dumped the body near what are known as the hydro houses before entering Beauharnois. There the body was later found and identified.

An hour later he was picked up in Brysanville between Howick and O'towns by provincial police where he was involved in an accident with a truck. When

the police arrived the driver had abandoned his car and was hiding in the ditch along side the road. Found on the front seat and floor then pointed out that he had been involved in a previous accident.

The inquest to determine the cause of death, had been held in Beauharnois on Thursday evening prior to the court hearing in Valleyfield. At the hearing the defendant's lawyer, Yvan Mercure only admitted that his client was the driver of the car a 1957 Chevrolet and had been driving most of the day. The defendant himself had admitted to police earlier that he had had 4 bottles of beer during the course of the day.

LaViolette was charged with criminal negligence on a public highway (Manslaughter) for which the maximum penalty is life imprisonment. The maximum penalty for hit and run is 2 years. M. Goyette was buried last Friday.
