Waterloo.

D., of Lennoxville. The church was very prettily decorated for the occasion. At 7.30 p. m. the bride assisted by Miss Lee and Miss Foss, was conducted to the

altar by the maids of honor, Miss Ellen Green Stevens and Miss Mary Tenny, where she was presented by Mr. C. E. Tenny. The groom was attended by his brother W. J. Foss of New York and J. P. Wells, advocate of Sherbrooke. The ushers were Messrs Wilfred Taylor, and John Frary. The ceremony was performed by Ven. Archdeacon Lindsay assisted by Rev. J. I. Strong, the music being rendered by the choir assisted by Prof. H. S. Hubbard and Miss Cora Martin. Scotstown.

Business is once more at a "standstill" in Scotstown as the large mill is shut down for repairs which is for the third or fourth time in less than a month.

The clapboard mill is also closed for want of logs. Mr. John Taylor, who has the contract for sawing logs here, has finished cutting the logs belonging to the American Company, which is now at law with the Scotstown Lumber Co. for possession of their limits. It seems a great pity that all our best clapboard logs should be cut into pulp wood, sawn into square timber, or sold to mills at a distance as they have been in the past. If it can be made to pay after freighting logs from fifty to one hundred miles it would certainly pay to manufacture them at home where we have one of the best equipped clapboard mills in the Province.

Mr. C. Parker has started a new industry which promises to be a great success, Mr. Parker having lately built a mill here for dressing rough clapboards. He has introduced a number of labor saving devices in his mill which will do away with nearly one half the help usually employed in similar mills.

A "Mr. Letellier" from Lake Megantic has opened a well equipped jewelry store and watch repairing establishing at Scotstown.

On Monday night last Mr. Malcolm Smith who resides on the McNamee road in the township of Hampden, had the misfortune to lose his horse and almost all the entire contents of his stable by fire. Unfortunately Mr. Smith had but a trifle of insurance on his property. He has the sympathy of the entire community in his misfortune.

Lake Megantic.

The water is still a foot over the road at the bridge.

The Montague Mill Company are framing and laying the foundation of their new mill in place of the one burnt last January. Several of the claims for damage by water against the Company has been amicably settled during the last five weeks, and some that has been in court under considerable cost for some time, are also about being settled; this means business and a step to regain public confidence.

Mr. Prudent Francoeur who has been very low with lung fever is improving also Mr. Angus K. McLeod, Masboro who has been very low with inflammation.

Frank Murray, hotel keeper of Bury, has bought the Prince of Wales Hotel here and took possession last Monday. He is an old acquaintance in the village. Mr. O'Hara, who came here three years ago from "Orono," Maine, a perfect stranger, has during that time, succeeded in making many friends. It is hoped that the patronage the house received during Mr. O'Hara's ownership and management will be also given Mr. Murray.

During the past few weeks great activity was shown by the electors in Compton and Beauce counties. Those who had the interests of the Province at heart wished to place it on a par with other Provinces in the Dominion and have it ruled by honest legislators. The people have voted for an honest legislation, and they expect this government to deal in such a manner with the affairs of the Province as will set it in the forefront

of the country. The electors of Compton county have broken away from the crack of the Conservative clique whip and acted for themselves as every elector should. Two years ago the Government at the bye-election did not provide the voters' list for St. Cecile de Whittton consequently they were disfranchised. At this last election for some reason or other the township of Woborne, Rixboro, and Mailo in Beauce county were not supplied with ballot boxes. Quite an exciting scene was witnessed in the districts of Ditchfield and Spaulding. The deputy-returning officer Edward Dalaire left Agnes early on the morning of the election and drove to the very end of Spaulding, and opened the poll ten miles from where it should have been. Messrs S. N. Lapointe and P. H. Renaud went after the deputy and the poll was opened at a quarter past two o'clock, and from that time until five o'clock 127 recorded their votes, out of which number only three voted Conservative. Many of the Conservatives voted Liberal on account of the action of the deputy. On Friday evening the Liberals in Lake Megantic and Agnes village held a demonstration in honor of the success of the party in Compton and Beauce counties. A triumphal car was erected in Mr Matheson's yard and was beautifully gotten up. It was headed by a brass band, and the procession made a tour of the principal streets and on to Megantic Town Hall. Bon fires, fireworks etc., were the order of the evening. Speeches were delivered by Dr. Gregor, Matheson and Stevenson. The proceedings closed with cheers for Hon. Mr. Marchand, Mr. Hunt and Dr. Beland and the singing of "God Save the Queen."

Mr. and Mrs. F. M. Viles were staying at the Queen's Hotel last week. Mr. Viles is the superintendent of the Club House of Spider Lake, the headquarters of the Megantic Club. It is expected that the coming season will be a very busy one at the club, a larger attendance of members than usual being promised.

Smith's Mills.

They attended services at the church in the forenoon where they listened to a very fine sermon from the Rev. Mr. Moore and in the afternoon at the tent, Elder Fairbanks gave a very interesting address to a large audience.

The house to house prayer meeting will be held at the home of Mr. J. H. Merrill, on Wednesday evening. Considerable interest has been aroused and people are coming out in greater numbers each week.

While Mr. and Mrs. Alonzo Wheeler and child were driving from Rock Island on Saturday evening they were run into by a team with a drunken driver; their carriage was upset throwing out its occupants. Mrs. Wheeler had her shoulder dislocated and the child received bruises about the face. Mr. Wheeler escaped unhurt. The drunken parties were unknown.

GENERAL NEWS.

Of the many immigrants that are arriving in Canada quite a number are settling in the Eastern township.

An incendiary fire did damage to the extent of \$20,000 in the brewery of James Cumming, Kingston, Monday morning.

The Toronto university among others has conferred the degree of LL. D. on the Honorable Wilfred Laurier and Hon. A. C. Hardy Premier of Ontario.

About 1000 delegates from all parts of Canada and the United States are in Toronto attending the annual convention of International trade of Railway trainmen.

Mr. Charlton's seduction bill went before the House in committee on Monday and the clause raising the age of consent from 16 to 18 years was put through. The bill stands for third reading in the Commons.

The S. S. Arcadia which left Montreal last week with one of the largest cargoes of grain ever shipped from that port, went ashore at Cape Ray, Newfoundland and it is expected will become a total wreck.

A fire broke out in Thurso Saturday night and did damage to the amount of \$20,000. It originated in the house of D. McLean and spread to the premises of Mr. Thomas and Whitehead, McGregor and Thomas O'Leary. The insurance in all only amounted to \$5,000.

The Montreal Methodist conference will be invited by the Granby Methodist to meet in that town in 1898. It is generally expected that at the conference this year in Ottawa Rev. Dr. Saunders, Ottawa, will be appointed President, and the name of S. G. Bland, Smiths Falls is favorably mentioned as secretary.

Mr. Charlton's bill for the better observance of the Sabbath Day was before the House in committee on Monday and on the suggestion of the Premier a new clause will be framed prohibiting the sale and publication of Sunday newspapers in Canada. The other clauses will be dropped. The offence will be punishable on summary conviction instead of being indictable as under the Charlton measure.

The postmaster-general is making important changes in his department. Formerly postmasters have been paid by fees, and received remunerations out of all proportion to the service they rendered or responsibilities they assumed. He has decided to place them on salary, and let the surplus revert to the treasury. At Berlin where a new postmaster has been appointed a saving of \$1,300 a year is saved by appointing him at a fixed salary of \$1,200 a year. This is one of the many ways in which the new government is carrying out its pledges.

The Methodist conference which meets in Ottawa next month will be asked to set Rev. Dr. Hunter aside for the work of assisting in raising a sum of \$150,000 to place the St. James Methodist Church, Montreal on a sound financial basis. It is proposed issue 30,000 shares at \$5 each payable half yearly and extending over five years. The congregation will take up 15,000 shares, while the other christian denomination in Montreal will be asked to subscribe for 5000 shares and permission will be asked of the conference to appeal to the Methodist connections outside of Montreal.

Cooper, Siegel & Co., New York, it is stated will open a departmental store in Montreal, which will be the largest of the kind in Canada.

A large deputation of Quebec citizens waited upon the Government on Wednesday with regard to a subsidy for the Quebec bridge.

The Queen has been graciously pleased to grant the desired permission to give the name Victoria Park to that formerly known as Parent Park in the City of Quebec.

Mr. Thos. Fyshe, cashier of the Bank of Nova Scotia, has been appointed Joint General Manager of the Merchants' Bank of Canada.

Lieut.-Col. White, of the 8th Royals, Quebec, who was offered a position on the Canadian Jubilee Regiment is unable to go and has been obliged to decline the offer.

The Catholic committee of the council of public instruction met in Quebec on Wednesday to decide on the question of a central board of examiners for all school teachers, lay and clerical. This is a scheme of reform which in the past has been strongly opposed by the clerical influence. Present indications are that that this step forward will be taken, however.

Hon. R. J. Sedden, Premier of New Zealand, who is on his way to England to take part in the Jubilee celebration arrived in Ottawa this week. He is accompanied by his wife and daughters. Previous to his departure the Premier will have a conference with the Government relative to the improvements in the steamship and mail service between Canada and New Zealand.

"Joe" Racine has been arrested at Rouses' Point, N. Y., for the murder of Leon Mailloux, at Rouse's Point, on December 24th, 1896. The murdered man was known to have had about \$700 on his person at the time of his disappearance.

"Joe" Racine is well known in Montreal, where he used to keep a restaurant on St. James Street, but skipped out after being apprehended for having been detected in issuing counterfeit bills. He was allowed on parole but escaped the vigilance of the detective sent to watch him and crossed the line. Numerous efforts had been made to induce him to return to the other side but without avail. The arrested man took the matter quite coolly, and stated that he would be able to clear himself in a few days.

The circular from the President of Hamilton Homestead Loan and Saving Society stating that the Society was insolvent, caused immense excitement among the working men of Hamilton, Ont., on Saturday last. The Society was organized 15 years ago by Lt.-Col. J. A. Studdart, who acted as Secretary and Treasurer. The shareholders were composed of shop assistants, shop girls, salesmen, school teachers, who invested their hard earned money, thinking it was a sound investment. At a meeting of the shareholders it transpired that the Secretary did not die a natural death a few days ago, but took his own life, and that he misappropriated funds to the amount of \$69,000. At the annual meeting Lt.-Col. Studdart stated that the company held \$120,000 of interest bearing first mortgages. After an exciting discussion at the shareholder's meeting it was decided to wind up the Society. The shareholders will not receive more than 10 or 20 cents of the money they have paid in.

Election News.

It is expected that the Ministers at Quebec will step out early next week. Most of the Cabinet ministers are still in Quebec, and are attending to the arrears of work that had accumulated during the fight. Several of the ministers have already begun removing their private papers. It is said that Hon. G. A. Nantel will resume the editorship of *Le Monde*.

The Official Gazette announces the appointment of Mr. Daniel Gillies as a member of the Legislature Council of the Province of Quebec for the electoral district of Pontiac.

The employees in the Montreal Court House have been notified of increase in their salaries. The Government has also created several new offices among the officials in the Circuit Court, and also increased the salaries of the clerks.

Premier Flynn's private secretary has been provided for by being appointed to the position of accountant in the Public Works Department.

Mr. J. S. Hall has been declared elected for St. Antoine Division, Montreal, the vote being Hall 2188, Bickerdike 2175. Mr. Bickerdike's counsel has asked for a recount.

As a result of the election in Missisquoi the editor of the *Bedford Times* had to wheel J. J. Mullin, of the People's Favorite store, from his store to the Central House in a wheelbarrow.

Removals recommended at Kingston Prison.

The Commission appointed to report on the Kingston Penitentiary in their report show a gross neglect of duty on the part of the officials. They have gone into every detail of the management and as a result have recommended varied and many improvements for the better working of the prison. They suggest that James H. Metcalfe, Warden, should be allowed to retire, that the deputy warden, William Sullivan, whose carelessness and negligence has led to the escape of prisoners should also be allowed to retire; that the prison Surgeon owing to his increasing age should be allowed to retire and a younger man appointed in his stead; that James Devlin the engineer owing to his gross extravagance should be dismissed and for receiving money from contractors they recommend that the steward, Jas. C. Weir, be instantly dismissed. It is also recommended that Patrick O'Donnell and N. P. Wood, storekeepers should be allowed to retire and that the chief keeper, W. P. Hughes, although a zealous officer owing to the friction between him and other officials should be transferred to another prison.

The War Still Raging.

The hostilities between Greece and Turkey has opened out afresh. According to despatches from Athens in Friday's battle at Filiipiada 650 men were killed and 28 officers were wounded. It is reported here the loss of prestige on the part of France at Constantinople and the German influence there is causing considerable anger. A despatch to The Observer from Athens says that the fighting which was expected has been resumed and that another battle in the vicinity of Preversa is probable.

A despatch to the Daily Mail from Constantinople, dated Saturday, says:—Germany is urging the Sultan to insist upon the European control of Greek finances as the only means of securing the payment of an indemnity. Representatives Deutsch Bank will arrive next Saturday to realize on the promise of important concessions which the Sultan has made to the bank.
