DULLES ONCE MORE PRESSES PACT PLAN

World News In Brief

New Delhi (AP)—Mrs. Rattan Bai Jain was found guilty at a New Delhi trial Monday on charges of murdering three girls whom she suspected of intimacy with her husband. He runs a clinic for the treatment of sterility and women's diseases.

Buenos Aires (AP)—The body of Lt. Francisco Ibanez, killed in an unsuccessful attempt to scale 26,810-foot Mount Dhaulagiri in the Himalayas, was received there Monday with military honors. Lieut. Ibanez died in Nepal from effects of frostbite.

London (Reuters)—Fifty-four ships totalling 57,341 tons were lost throughout the world during the last quarter of 1953. Lloyd's Register of Shipping stated Monday. Britain lost the most—eight—and the United States followed with seven losses.

Paris (Reuters)—Prince Buu Loc, former Vietnam prime minister, arrived here by air from Saigon Monday night to resume his post as Vietnam high commissioner in Paris, the position he held before becoming premier last January. Buu resigned the premiership a month ago and was succeeded by Ngo Dinh Diem.

Nicosia, Cyprus (Reuters)—A British air force Canberra jet bomber Monday established an unofficial speed record by flying from Farnborough, southern England, to Cyprus in three hours 32 minutes—an average speed of 650 miles an hour.

Ryde, Isle of Wight, England (Reuters)—A tape recording was made of a service at the Baptist church here as part of a scheme "take the church to the people." As he makes his pastoral rounds this week the minister, the Rev. Walter Fancutt, will play back the recording in homes of people who could not get to the Sunday service.

Perth Amboy, N.J. (AP)—A mechanical genius today rigged up an execution chamber in his woodshed and shot himself to death, police said. Police said, Zigmund Szatmari, 80, pulled a string which passed through a pulley, along a specially-constructed platform and down to the trigger of a .22 calibre rifle, anchored in a vise three feet away. The rifle was pointed right at his heart. The victim had been suffering for many years with heart trouble, authorities reported.

North Bend, Wash. (AP)—Gaunt, footsore and famished, James E. Stolberg, 31, Seattle fisherman whose hunger drove him to eat boiled fern leaves, was found today after being lost eight days in the Cascade mountains. The disabled Seconome World War veteran, who suffered from arthritis, had been sought by large parties.

London (AP)—British police said Monday night a packet of rough diamonds valued at \$5,000 was missing from a mailbag on a Quantic airliner which arrived in London from Ceylon over the weekend. The diamonds were mailed in Ceylon to a New York firm.

Russian, U.S. Troops Join In Fighting Flood Water

Vienna (AP)—American and Russian troops worked within a few hundred yards of each other outside Vienna today in an effort to save a U.S. airfield and two Austrian villages from flood. The waters of the swollen Danube river—raging downstream after leaving 70,000 homeless in Germany and western Austria—threatened the U.S. Air Force base at Tulln. Isolated in the Russian occupation zone of Austria, it is 22 miles northwest of Vienna's American sector.

German officials said the airfield was "pretty much out of danger" unless the waters took a big rise. Floods from the Danube approached within 200 yards of the field, inundating the communities of Tulln and Langeneubarn and flooding a road connecting them with the airfield.

The Russians sent troops and trucks to one stretch of the road, while the Americans sent trucks and scores of airmen to another stretch.

Subpoena At Funeral Led To Rioting

Jersey City, N.J. (AP)—One-time Democratic boss Frank (I Am the Law) Hague was served with two subpoenas Monday when he entered the city to attend the funeral of his nephew, former Mayor Frank Hague Eggers.

The first, presented to 78-year-old Hague just before the start of the funeral procession, touched off a near-riot among 1,000 assembled spectators. It ordered his appearance in a court suit brought by the city to recover \$3,000,000.

The second, demanding Hague's presence at a city commission investigation July 21, was served as Hague stopped for a traffic light on his way home from the funeral. Summons servers sought for months to have Hague the legal papers to get him into court and before the investigating committee which is probing city financial affairs during Hague's administration.

Hague, who was mayor of Jersey City for 17 years, Eggers, and John F. Malone, deputy mayor under Hague, are named in the first suit seeking to recover funds allegedly collected from municipal employees as campaign contributions over a number of years.

As Hague stepped out of a limousine in front of the funeral home for the start of the three-hour service for his 53-year-old nephew, he was approached by Deputy Sheriff Leo Gattoni.

Hague suddenly shoved Gattoni and shouted to the crowd: "Imagine an outfit like that serving a summons at this kind of service."

The crowd surged forward, shouting phrases both for and against Hague and John V. Kenny, a former mayor and arch political enemy of Hague's. It was Kenny, a onetime lieutenant of Hague's who unseated Eggers in the heated 1949 city commission elections, ending a 30-year reign of power for Hague.

A police guard of 30 men rushed forward and held back the pushing throng. Gattoni was escorted away.

Eire Problems Are Outlined By Commission

Dublin (Reuters)—A government commission Monday called on the Irish to increase their marriage rate and to marry younger. The commission, which has made a six-year study of the Republic of Ireland's population problems, found Ireland "unique in having exceedingly high percentages of young unmarried persons and persons who never marry."

Its report said 56 per cent of Irish males over the age of 14 were unmarried.

The average marriage age was given as 33 for men and 28 for women, but in rural areas this rose to 37 for men and 30 for women.

The commission declared there was something gravely wrong in a community where there was such widespread "frustration of natural expectation."

The low marriage rate and emigration are Ireland's two great population problems, it said. The low marriage rate contributes to emigration, while the intention to emigrate helps keep the marriage rate low.

The Czechoslovak radio reported immense damage to farms and villages near Bratislava, Hungary also braced itself for the waters, three times their normal July height at some points.

Believes Collective Defence Organization Could Help France Get "Just And Honorable Terms" In Indo-China.

Paris (AP)—U.S. State Secretary Dulles arrived here today and said he considers that a collective defence organization for Southeast Asia could help France get "just and honorable peace terms" in Indo-China.

Dulles flew into Paris aboard a U.S. military air transport Constellation for a top-level British-French attempt to convince him an "honorable" peace can still be won in Indo-China—and that his presence in Geneva will help win it.

He is scheduled to open talks with French Premier Pierre Mendes-France and British Foreign Secretary Eden at 6 p.m. (1 p.m. EDT). Eden and Mendes-France left Geneva earlier today to be on hand for the conference.

In a statement, Dulles recalled he had come to Paris last April 13, before the Geneva conference started, to talk about forming a Southeast Asian defence pact.

At that time, he said, he felt such an organization would help France. "I still feel the same way," he added.

"However, we do have a great and continuing interest in collective action by France, Great Britain, United States and other free countries to promote the peace and freedom of the area."

"This, as well as pressing European problems, will, I hope, be among the subjects of our conversations here."

The reference to European problems indicating Dulles expects to discuss plans for the six-nation European army which France has delayed placing before its parliament for ratification.

Dulles' flight here was in answer to an urgent appeal from Mendes-France. On leaving Washington Monday night, Dulles emphasized that Paris was his present destination.

At conferences this afternoon and tonight, Mendes-France and Eden will outline the prospects for an Indo-China peace settlement in an attempt to allay American fears that France is getting ready to surrender to the Reds at Geneva.

Dulles' determination that the United States should not be saddled with responsibility for any such settlement resulted in his decision that neither he nor Undersecretary Walter Bedell Smith would return to Geneva for the final round of negotiations.

Western diplomats at the Geneva conference viewed Dulles' trip to Paris as a strengthening of Mendes-France, who has only eight days left to make good on his promise to win an "honorable" Indo-China peace by July 20 or resign.

Dulles in an airport statement in Washington served notice the United States might part company with her European allies over future policy on Indo-China.

"It is not clear that the interests which we hold in common with France and Viet Nam, Laos and Cambodia will necessarily be best served by identical action in all respects," he declared, adding: "Therefore, my trip to Paris is without prejudice to the position previously expressed that neither I nor Undersecretary Smith have at the present time any plans for going to Geneva, where the United States is presently maintaining contacts with developments through ambassador U. Alexis Johnson and his associates."

In the absence of Mendes-France and Eden, the Geneva negotiations were at a virtual standstill today. Eden and Molotov, co-chairmen of the conference, agreed late Monday that no formal sessions of the nine delegations will be held for several days.

Hollywood (AP)—Vocalist Rosemary Clooney and her husband, actor Jose Ferrer, announced Monday they are expecting their first child next January. Miss Clooney said she hopes to make one or two more motion pictures before her confinement.

Family Re-united After Two Years

Albuquerque, N.M. (AP)—With tears and loving scolding Peggy Ann Hewston was reunited today with the family which feared her dead for two years.

Peggy Ann's mother, Mrs. Robert B. Hewston, of Edgewood, Pa., fell sobbing into her daughter's arms as she emerged from the family car after the long ride to New Mexico and her longlost daughter.

The 17-year-old daughter now is a wife and mother.

Peggy Ann—wife of airman Tom Carry—fled from her Pittsburgh home two years ago, mainly because she didn't like the school she attended. She was the object of a country-wide search.

Her identity came to light in a series of episodes starting 6½ weeks ago when she was in the Sandia base hospital having her son, Dale Eugene.

She was recognized by an airman who knew her brother.

Vietminh Press On

French Army Headquarters Under Mortar Fire

Hanoi, Indo-China (AP)—Vietminh mortars shelled French army headquarters at Son Tay, 25 miles northwest of Hanoi, Monday night and sniper warfare rang through the streets of the defence outpost town of 6,000. A French army spokesman said civilians were moving out of Son Tay as rebel pressure builds up in that sector and across the northern Red river delta defence area.

Forty-one rebels were reported killed and 17 captured in various actions during the night. There was no announcement of French losses.

Between Son Tay and Hanoi Vietminh guerrillas attacked a French highway guard patrol but were driven off by a tank squadron that rumbled out of Son Tay to the rescue. Twenty Vietminh were killed and seven captured in the roadside fight.

One rebel sniper was killed on a Son Tay street corner but others apparently escaped.

Other fights were reported just north of Hung Yen, 25 miles southeast of Hanoi, and through the Sept Pagodes—Luc Nam-Phu Lang Thuong triangle, 35 miles north-east of Hanoi.

North of Hung Yen, rebel guerrilla and French-Vietnamese patrols clashed in small night battles for possession of the supply road from Hanoi.

In each fight, the French spokesman said, the Vietminh were driven off before their demolition units could cut the road. Twenty rebels were killed and 10 captured in the area.

Youth Acquitted Of Slaying Father

London (Reuters)—A 21-year-old assistant scoutmaster who killed his bullying father during a family quarrel last court here Monday in tears—a free man.

Victor Boorman was found not guilty of the manslaughter of his 48-year-old father, James.

James Boorman had often assaulted his wife and been to prison for it in the past.

The son, Victor, said he had arrived home two days before his father died, to find his mother with blood on her face and her spectacles twisted.

The next day the father picked a quarrel with Victor and threw books belonging to him on the kitchen fire. A struggle started. Victor seized his father by the throat and hung on "until he became quiet."

Reds Were To Infiltrate Aborigines, Aussies Hear

Melbourne, Australia (Reuters)—Russian plans to infiltrate Communist agitators among Australia's aborigines were bared at spy probe hearings here today.

An agitator working among the natives to prepare them for service in any invasion of Australia in time of war was named at the royal commission session.

A former Australian Communist party member, Don McLeod, was the "white leader" of aborigines in the Exmouth gulf area of West Australia, where American and Australian exploration companies are now drilling for oil, Mr. Justice Owen of the commission reported.

McLeod, he said, had aborigines under his influence who would be of vital importance to any army operating in the hostile country because of their knowledge of water, holes and trails necessary to an army's supply lines.

Owen's information came from the controversial Document J which Vladimir Petrov took with him when he bolted from his post in the Soviet embassy. Owen read portions of the document.

It said the Exmouth gulf area was of strategic importance to the United States and that defence engineers were working on roads to an airfield there.

The document stated that during the war a big submarine base had been built there with a big air base nearby. Japanese planes had tried unsuccessfully to find the air base during the Second World War.

U.S. Barrier Is Urged On Oil Imports

Bolton Landing, N.Y. (AP)—In resolutions aimed at relieving widespread unemployment in coal fields of the United States the governors of nine coal-producing states Monday called upon Congress to impose strict curbs on imports of residual oil.

Members of the governors' fuel conference also called for a national fuel policy that "would consider the economic impact of any proposed importation of natural gas into the United States" from Canada and Mexico.

The fuel conference agreed to push for a system of import quotas of residual oil—the material left over at the end of the refining process—that would cut foreign supplies by approximately two-thirds.

Spokesmen for the coal industry contend that yearly imports amounting to 136,000,000 barrels of residual oil are depriving thousands of coal miners of work. Foreign oil, they say, competes with domestic coal as a fuel for power plants and space heating.

Guatemala Plans To Keep Estates

Guatemala (AP)—Col. Castillo Armas, president of Guatemala's new military junta, says he will keep in effect the land reform law under which the former left-wing government split many large estates among peasants.

The controversial measure, adopted by the ousted regime of ex-president Jacobo Arbenes Guzman, resulted in confiscation of 234,000 acres of land belonging to the U.S.-owned United Fruit Co., according to company officials.

Speaking Monday at an anti-Communist rally here in the capital, Castillo Armas said the settlers who have taken over the land will now be made outright owners, not mere tenants on lease as under the "Communist system." He did not say what the new government would do about compensating the former owners.

Lindbergh Gives View On Defence

New York (AP)—Brig-Gen. Charles A. Lindbergh says the security of the United States hinges on a "prodigious" air force with "the indestructible power to destroy."

Writing in the current issue of the Saturday Evening Post, Lindbergh says:

"It is inevitable that our primary attention be shifted from the advantages of progress to the essentials of survival."

"It is no longer a question of what we can afford on previous standards of life, but of what we must do and how we must live in order to exist and maintain our independence as a nation."

"The American policy of non-aggression requires a military position of such magnitude that if our enemies should strike us by surprise, annihilating hundreds of our bases and dozens of our cities, we can still exceed their power."

"This means a prodigious air force, a strong army, a strong navy and strong allies."

"It is a formidable task, extending into the future as far as we can see. There is no longer such a thing as adequate defence. As long as a dangerous enemy exists, our security will live in the indestructible power to destroy."

Lindbergh writes that "an inextinguishable means of retaliation" involves a fleet of the most modern aircraft capable of being airborne with atom bombs minutes after an alarm is sounded.

The planes "must be scattered over hundreds of bases, over too many for an enemy to paralyze with a single blow," he said, adding:

"Nothing else will give us enough influence to discourage aggression."

Nuclear Power Prospects Revealed To U.S. Congress

Washington (AP)—The land-based model of the world's first nuclear submarine engine "has already produced more than enough power to send an atomic submarine around the world, fully submerged and at full speed."

The Senate-House atomic energy committee revealed this today in a report to the Senate and House of Representatives recommending a series of changes in the basic Atomic Energy Act.

The engine, a land-based "prototype" of the atomic engine now installed in the submarine Nautilus, is located at the Atomic Energy Commission's testing site in Eastern Idaho.

The bill would:

1. Authorize the negotiation of agreements with foreign powers in the area of peacetime uses of atomic energy. The committee said this would provide "a mechanism to implement the president's peacetime international atomic pool plan."

2. Permit the AEC to transfer to another country participating in such an agreement atomic materials in quantities needed for the development or utilization of atomic energy for non-military and research purposes.

3. Allow transfer to another country, or to a regional defence organization, secret data concerning the tactical employment of atomic weapons—but not including any information on their design and fabrication.

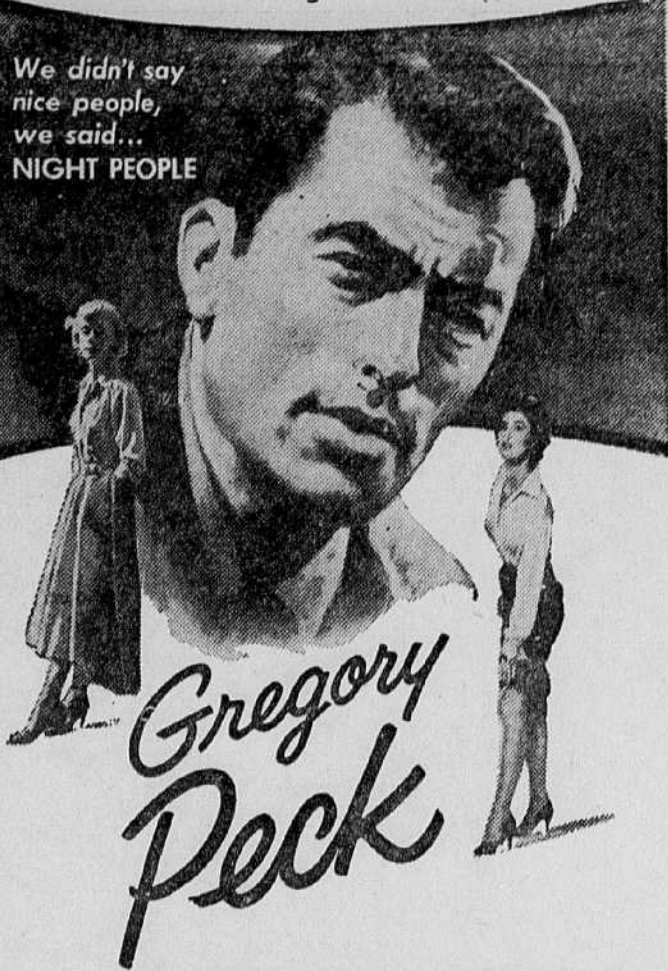
The committee said such information would include "data necessary to the development of defence plans, the training of personnel in the employment of, and defence against, atomic weapons, and the evaluation of the capabilities of potential enemies in the employment of atomic weapons."

4. Permit the AEC to license private industry to possess and utilize atomic materials and to own atomic reactors or "furnaces" designed to produce and utilize such materials.

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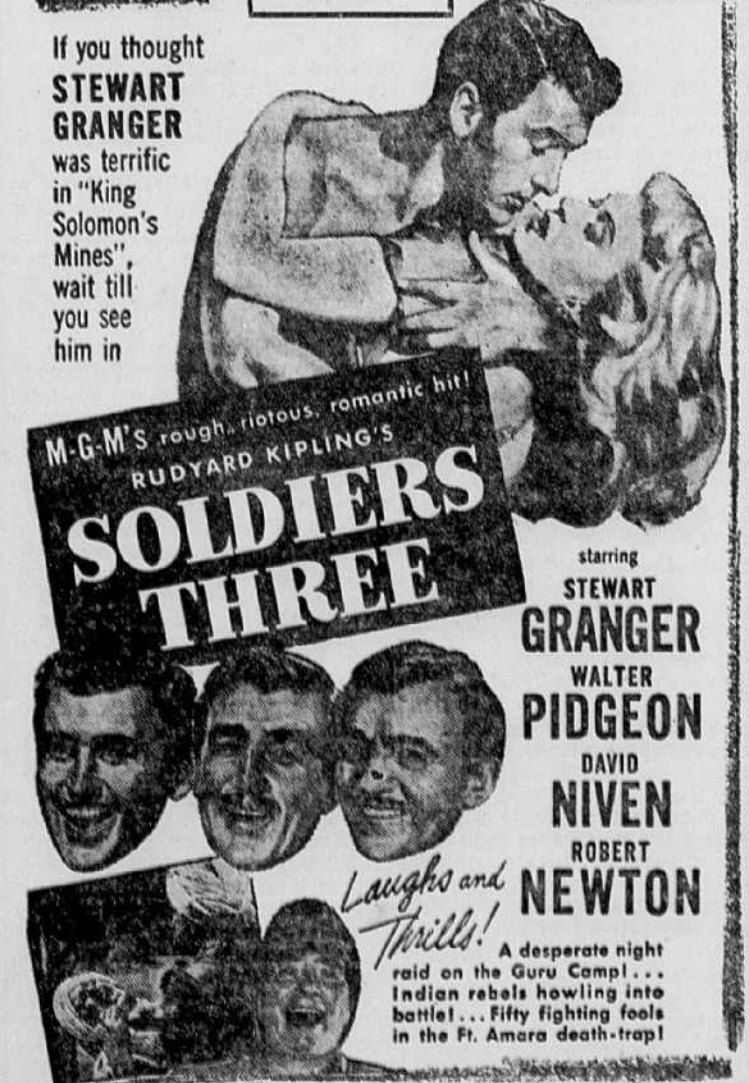

Over 1,500 Persons Gather For Annual Inverness District Orange Lodge Rally

Inverness, July 13 — "The Glorious Twelfth," Orangemen's Day, was commemorated in the Eastern Townships yesterday by a customary gathering over half a century old on ancient grounds some five miles north of here.

At least 1,500 friends and members of the Loyal Orange Association, many of them from widely scattered regions in Canada and the United States, put on their lodge regalia and returned to the 8th Range to pay their annual tribute to the Orange cause, and to renew acquaintances in many cases, neglected for thirty or forty years.

Megantic County, one of the strongholds of Orangedom in Quebec, was marking the 246th anniversary of the Battle of the Boyne in which Protestant William of Orange for the Netherlands, defeated Roman Catholic King James II of England. James fled to France, and William took the English throne.

Nobody knows exactly how old this Inverness custom is, but Arthur J. Lowry of Inverness has been filing for the file and drum concerts, which are a highlight of each year's celebration, for 69 years. He first laid a fife to his lips in this same spot when he was only eight years old. Mr. Lowry is now 77, and joined the Loyal Orange Association at Kinneair's Mills, Lodge No. 995, when he was eighteen.

The complete program, under the direction of County Lodge Master Aldo Kenneth of Inverness, actually started on Sunday with a special church parade and service at the Inverness Presbyterian Church. Three preachers gave sermons at the service: Rev. J. Smith of Richmond, Mr. R. Freeman of Inverness, and Rev. John Hill, of Inverness.

The big event, however, was the gathering and picnic at the Orange grounds amid aged wooden benches which had seen countless "Twelfths" and many more Orangemen go by.

Speeches were given, fife and drum bands from the various lodges performed and Orangemen and their families talked of the old days and relaxed in the warm sunlight.

Some of them came from as far away as Alberta. William Morrison was born at Hillshead, some 17 miles from Inverness but moved out to Gleichen, Alberta, 49 years ago. Now the Grand Chaplain of the Grand Orange Lodge of Alberta, Mr. Morrison and his Alberta-born wife travelled the 2,800 miles from their home in a little Hillman Minx to be at the reunion.

Calvin W. Lowrey, of Blackie, Alberta, was even more determined to come back to his native hills. A native of Leeds, Mr. Lowrey left the Eastern Townships when he was nine years old and never before returned for a "Twelfth" reunion. At that, it took three planes to get him here yesterday. Grants Are Not All

Premier Maurice Duplessis' statement at a recent press conference involving the construction of two new mental hospitals and mental institutional grants totalling more than \$4,000,000 represents a sound step toward the solution of what has now become one of Canada's most serious of health problems.

Mr. Duplessis did not say where or when the new hospitals will be built but he announced that a \$3,000,000 grant would go to Mont Providence Mental Institute in Montreal for expansion and another \$1,000,000 grant to the mental hospital at St. Ferdinand in Megantic county. Another "substantial" grant will be given to the mental hospital at Longue-Pointe near Montreal.

This is a sorely needed step towards a sound goal. The 62,000 mentally ill patients in 1952 accounted for 44 per cent of all patients in our hospital and outnumbered by 7,500 all public general hospital patients in Canada. During that same year, mental illnesses caused more lost time than tuberculosis, cancer and polio combined.

One can well see that the time has come for all of us to take a new look at the seriousness of the problem and attempts we are making to meet it.

Apart from further government assist-

ance which is desperately needed, the community mental health clinic, the psychiatric hospital and the mental hospital should be brought into an integrated system in order that each make its own unique contribution to the restoration of health where possible, and care of those who have become mentally ill.

We need adequate child training programs, mental health counselling for welfare agencies and more attention to the normal development of emotions. This is the only hope left to lessen the tragic toll taken by mental ill-health.

Somehow the complex problem of human relations must be solved or face the terrifying possibility of the destruction of civilization as we know it. Mental health workers, in their efforts to find the keys to human behavior, are working on the very problem which is now challenging the statesmen of the world.

For generations, religious leaders have been working with the human personality helping people to fight their own individual battles. They have led the way. We need kindness and understanding, insight and skill. These are the vital instruments with which to lead people to a better adjustment in life never losing sight of life's larger ideals.

Fruitless Efforts

Canada, believe it or not, is undertaking to prepare a micro-film record of the some 9,000,000 national registration cards made in 1940. The aim, they say, is "future reference."

Obviously the micro-film would take far less storage space than the original documents. But to what purpose? Not to mention the \$50,000 it would cost to have the records preserved in this manner.

Since this registration — which was never used in the first place — was taken, many of these persons have died or left the country. Many have changed their jobs, their homes and marital status. Furthermore, all those who are still alive are four-

teen years older and all those who were under sixteen in 1940 are in no way accounted for not to mention the vast numbers of people who have come to Canada since that time.

There seems little point in preserving a record so out of date and so incomplete. It would not even be a reliable method of establishing proof of age, as at that time it was not necessary to furnish a birth certificate.

Why the government would continue this unnecessary nonsense is beyond us. If we are any judge the work would take four or five months to complete. It would be hard to find a more fruitless project we think.

E.T. Has Junior Ogopogo

The Eastern Townships have many scenic tourist attractions. We now have — apart from the floating island at Waterloo Lake which has so obstinately anchored itself to a private beach — a landlocked monster all our own.

Although somewhat smaller in size than Ogopogo, of Lake Okanagan or the Loch Ness monster, residents of Garthby Station claim that a shy undersized sea serpent, first seen in the 16-mile Lake Aylmer five years ago, has reappeared.

General consensus is that junior measures about twelve feet in length, is dark

brown in color and kicks up a wave like a large motorboat. He is rather shy and does not appreciate unsuccessful efforts to capture him.

Of course, it may be just another fish story. After all this is the fishing season and to a fisherman, twelve feet is not very large. Provincial Police traffic officer Oliva Roy asserted: "People have pointed the serpent out to me but all I've seen is heavy swells." Confidentially we thought we heard him say it looked more like a floating log. Legend or no, its proved to be a tourist attraction.

CHARACTER THE KEY

Toronto Globe and Mail.
There is a considerable social uneasiness in the United States over the step rise in juvenile and youth delinquency. The response to the situation has been varied, ranging from strengthened legal penalties to increased recreational programs. In not a few States and municipalities, laws have been passed making parents responsible for the misdeeds of their minor children, not simply in repayment of possible damage done by their children, but also as actual direct punishment for the act committed.

The Children's Bureau of the United States Government recently issued a protest against this policy. Its view is that such forms of punishment are ineffective in the long run, and might make matters worse. Children, it claims, should be held accountable for their acts. This is very sound psychology. A great deal of anti-social behavior may be traced to parental failure to see that a child is made aware that certain actions have unfavorable results.

Nevertheless, there is all too much indifference to the behavior of young people by the parents. Time and again, news stories reveal that when young people have got themselves into trouble, their parents have not had the slightest notion of where they were, what they were doing or whom they were with. This is irresponsibility, too, and just as anti-social in its way as the misbehavior of the children.

One step to attempt to

make conscious of their obligations

has been taken by the City of New York in its famous vandalism law. This provides that in the case of juveniles caught injuring or destroying city property, parents are fined up to \$25. Many efforts have been made to upset that law, but no satisfactory alternative has been offered. While it unquestionably does not supersede delinquency statutes, it does have the direct effect of making the parent aware of his failure to instill proper standards in the mind of his child. This should be regarded as pure gain.

It has been strongly argued that the situation might be dealt with by the creation of more services for counselling, assistance and guidance. In certain cases such aid might help. But it is a poor substitute for positive parenthood. It is not possible to live others' lives for them or protect them from their own failures. Somehow it must be made important in the minds of most people that social conduct is the only acceptable form. Stronger than laws are the forces of social disapproval. It is these which are weak, and many of the difficulties we have are because there are so few moral condemnations these days. So long as anything goes, anything will come. So long as most people excuse bad behavior by looking for reasons for it outside the character of people, delinquency will be a social problem.

POLICEMAN'S DOWNFALL

A policeman's lot, said Gilbert and Sullivan a number of years ago, is not a happy one. And apparently the situation is little changed today, particularly in East Germany. We read of one of these worthies of the law — if they have any law in East Germany — fleeing to West Germany for refuge, and asking political asylum because he had been caught humming the West German national anthem.

That is the sort of thing that makes life hard. We find that the particular tune has a very stirring air. Indeed, some of our churches use this melody to setting of familiar hymns. But apparently the policeman's act in humming "Deutschland Ueber Alles" was somewhat akin to treason. Thus his momentary diversion, and no doubt many a policeman has included in a like practice of humming or whistling as he makes his lonely rounds, produced his downfall. It would suggest that all East German policemen should refrain from humming, since who knows what the tune might be! And what an unhappy lot if an individual is to be denied the right to indulge his musical fancy!

Well, this particular policeman has jumped the fence, and we feel certain that he will quickly learn that the remark of Messrs. Gilbert and Sullivan is particularly appropriate for his former home, but less applicable to the area which lies outside the Iron Curtain.

CHAOS ON THE RETAIL FRONT IN CANADA

Financial Times.
Chaos on the retail front which threatens the livelihood of thousands of small merchants and their employees is already a grim reality in Canada. "Price Wars" and the indiscriminate use of loss leaders as a "come-on" for customers imperils the retail trade as well as many manufacturing industries.

The cause of the unfortunate state of affairs, says Mr. E. G. Burton, president of Simpsons, Ltd., points out, is Ottawa's legislative ban on sale price maintenance, imposed more than two years ago and intended to prevent the very consequences which it now appears to have produced. So long as manufacturers were able to enter into agreements with merchants concerning the price at which their products were to be sold at retail, the "dog-eat-dog" price wars, which are now having such a disruptive effect on business, were rare.

Big firms like Simpsons, have developed brands of their own and are relatively unaffected by Ottawa's resale price maintenance legislation. Those who are grievously affected, as Mr. Burton points out, are the "thousands of legitimate small retailers which are really the backbone of the distribution system as far as manufacturers and nationally advertised lines are concerned."

With unemployment a more serious problem in Canada than at any time since the thirties, common sense suggests that anything as prejudicial to economic stability as existing legislation affecting resale price maintenance should be eliminated.

TO ALLAY THE WORST FEAR

Christian Science Monitor.
When the widely respected Governor of South Carolina, James F. Byrnes, told a correspondent of this newspaper he opposes ending racial segregation in the public schools chiefly because it "will lead to mongrelization," he was voicing the great underlying fear that besets many of the white people of the South.

That fear needs a bit of spelling out to bring it into the focus of the segregation issue. "Amalgamation" (a more objective term than that used by Governor Byrnes) goes on wherever races live in contact. It is the process depends less on the fact of contact than on the traditions and more of the respect of groups and on the amount of racial pride and self-consciousness possessed by each.

matter of course that interracial marriages might become acceptable.

It is always good sense and good strategy in solving a problem to ameliorate its most acute phases first. And a thoughtful Southern woman has made a suggestion to his newspaper which we think worthy of sharing with other good people of the South who are faced with a condition not a theory: "Integrate" the races in the public grade schools and colleges. But at the high-school level "segregate" the sexes. Place girls, white and Negro, in separate high school from boys, white and Negro.

Such an expedient, of course, promises no permanent solution. And there is a strong case for coeducation under most circumstances. But it might allay somewhat the worst of white fears. And it should be acceptable to much of Negro leadership, too. For Negro leaders, generally, teach pride of race and they are no more eager to accelerate amalgamation than are their white brothers. They ask simply by an inferiority imposed upon a whole race.

200 YEARS OF GOLF

St. Thomas Times Journal.
How old the game of golf is nobody exactly knows. Some say, on no better evidence than the likeness of a Dutch word to an English, that it was first played in Holland. Undoubtedly, however, there is a reference to golf being played at St. Andrews in 1552, after which the game came to be popular among the Scots, but it was not until 1754 in St. Andrews that "22 noble men and gentlemen, being admirers of the ancient and healthful exercise of golf met and drafted laws for the game." Thus was established "The Royal and Ancient Club of St. Andrews," which drafted the rules for the game for the whole world until a few years ago when an organization of American golf clubs made a few alterations of their own, including types of clubs and weight of ball. But that was not until long after the top British professionals of about 50 years ago, such as Harry Vardon (whose name is still revered in American golfing circles), James Braid and J. H. Taylor went over and showed Americans how the game should be played. In recent years it is the Americans who have been showing the British how to play, but notwithstanding the sweep of British championships by American players, the people of St. Andrews still squirm when Americans introduce changes.

Golf and the ancient university (founded nearly 150 years before the first golf ball was smacked down a fairway) are the chief industries of the town. When citizens of St.

Jacoby On Bridge

By OSWALD JACOBY

HERE'S A LESSON TO REMEMBER

"When you're playing rubber bridge, make sure of your contract first and then let the extra tricks take care of themselves."

This is a lesson that B. Jay Becker often teaches at the Card School in New York. Becker, whom his fellow experts consider the most careful player in the country, sometimes uses the hand shown today as an illustration of this principle.

West leads the jack of spades, and the average player pounces on the trick with a gurgling glee. He expects to draw trumps and run the diamonds, winning at least five trump tricks, five diamonds, and the ace of clubs.

Our average player is doomed to disappointment. After South has drawn two rounds of trumps, he cannot make the contract. If West is given his trump trick, he will switch to hearts, and the defenders will take enough hearts to defeat the contract.

If South draws three rounds of trumps and then begins the diamonds, West will ruff the third round, then lose three hearts and a club in addition to West's trump trick.

Becker then shows how the game contract should be fulfilled. South must refuse to win the first trick. The defenders cannot safely switch to hearts, since dummy still has a trump to stop that suit. If West continues trumps, or switches to diamonds or clubs for that matter, South can draw the trumps and make sure of four trump tricks, five diamonds, and the ace of clubs for the 10 tricks that he needs for his contract.

India Would Join Asian Locarno Pact

New Delhi, India—(Reuters)—India would be prepared to join an "Asian Locarno pact" to protect states in the northern areas of Southeast Asia, it was delicately learned here today.

According to informed sources two pacts are under discussion by the western powers and India is being kept in close touch with developments.

First is a Locarno-type pact proposed by Britain to take in the northern areas including Vietnam, Laos and Cambodia in a non-aggression understanding with the Communists.

Second is a Southeast Asian Treaty Organization of southern states, including Malaya and the Philippines.

India would join the Locarno type pact but opposed the SEATO as a power-bloc alliance, the sources said.

The Locarno pact, one of a series of treaties signed after the First World War, was an agreement by the signatory powers not to make war on each other but contained no commitment to come to the aid of a country subjected to aggression.

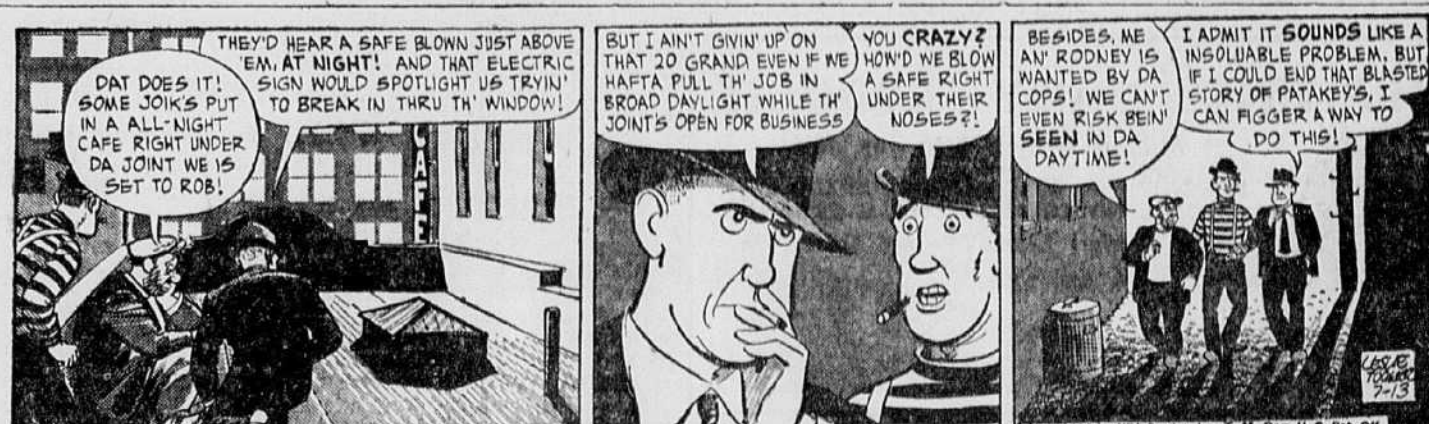

Major League Players' Organization Adopts Constitution; Is Not A Union Says J. Norman Lewis, Their Lawyer

Cleveland—(AP)—The major league baseball players have organized formally into an association with by-laws and a constitution but no dues, J. Norman Lewis, their lawyer, goes out of his way to insist this is no union.

Lewis will receive a reported \$30,000 fee for services rendered in helping the players negotiate a new pension contract with the owners. His fee covers work through October, 1954.

"There is no definite arrangement for the future after October," said Lewis. "We didn't discuss it. That is something 'not' probably will be decided later."

Lewis' fee will come out of the central fund into which all-star game receipts and all-star and world series radio-television cash is placed. According to Lewis, the owners' committee already has agreed to the payment and the players followed suit Monday. Pension payments also are made from the fund.

The 16 current player representatives, one from each big league club, will continue in office until July, 1955, when a general election will be held. The term of office will be two years. The league player representatives also will be elected for two years in '55.

There will be four regular meet-

ings of the player representatives each year.

To assist in handling the pension fund, Allie Reynolds of the New York Yankees and Ralph Kiner of the Chicago Cubs were elected to two-year terms. They will serve on a four-man committee with John Galbreath, Pittsburgh owner, and Hank Greenberg, Cleveland general manager.

When the major league owners meet in New York, July 26, they will receive suggestions from the players.

The players want the right to deal directly with the winter league teams in Cuba, Venezuela, Panama and Puerto Rico. They also want no restrictions on the number of players allowed to participate.

As for spring training, the players want to report no earlier than March 1 and play no exhibitions before March 10. They also ask one day a week free from exhibition games.

Junior No Longer Takes Tent To Lakeshore; 250,000 Children In Canada Offered Modern Facilities

Canadian camping has come a long way from the days when a boy hiked his tent to the nearest lakeshore.

Today, one Ontario open-air paradise for youngsters offers horseback riding, canoeing, swimming and all the comforts of home at \$450 for eight weeks.

It even boasts its own psychologist.

A Canadian Press coast-to-coast survey shows that the 250,000 children who will camp in Canada this summer are heading for more than a health tonic. The strictly modern camp promotes an educational program designed to build character beneath all that sun-tan.

Many temporary camps are set up in Newfoundland and Prince Edward Island every summer by scouts and guides and the other voluntary youth organizations.

Free Camping

Kinsmen operate a camp 20 miles from St. John's where some 40 underprivileged children stay two weeks without cost. St. John's Rotary club operates a camp, on which they spent \$75,000 last year, where crippled children have special beds and physio-therapy exercises.

Nova Scotia has about 60 camps, half of them operated by church groups, 20 by scouts and guides and the remainder by service clubs and commercial organizations.

The Saint John Lions club in New Brunswick sponsors a summer camp for the blind.

Nature Study Courses

Quebec province has 12 summer camps accommodating 2,500 youngsters, in addition to various scout and guide camps catering for 2,500. There are two fresh air camps for children with tuberculosis in the family.

Vancouver—(AP)—Empire Stadium, Canada's biggest and newest, was officially turned over to the British Empire Games organization here Monday.

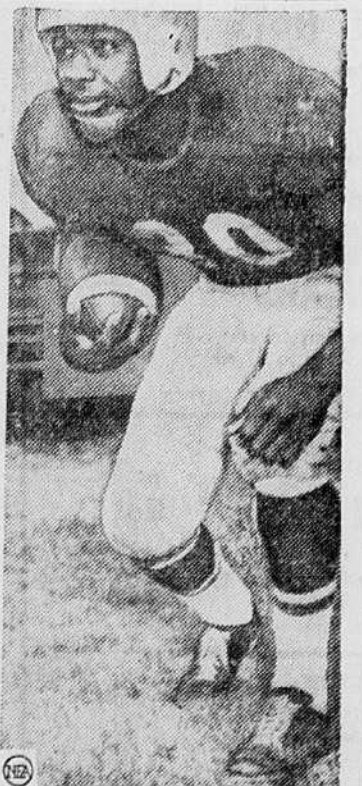

Canada Slight Underdog In Davis Cup Matches Against Chile, Says Dr. Leclerc, Chairman Of Association

Montreal—(AP)—The man who helped choose Canada's Davis Cup team says Canada will be the underdog by a slight margin in the first round of the North American zone tie against Chili in Toronto next week-end.

Dr. Georges Leclerc, chairman of the Canadian Lawn Tennis Association's Davis Cup selection committee, said in an interview here Chile's three-man team is "slightly favored" in all the events at Toronto Cricket Club except perhaps one singles match.

Luis Ayala is considered the best of the Chileans with Ricardo Balbiers second and Andres Hammersley third.

Dr. Leclerc said Canada's No. 1 player, 24-year-old Lorne Main of Toronto and Vancouver, has an edge over Balbiers and can give

Ayala a good hard fight. Bob Bedard, 23, of Sherbrooke, Que., Canada's second-best singles prospect, is rated "about equal to Hammersley" while Paul Willey, 23, of Vancouver, and Toronto's Don Platt, 25, are "a little below any of the Chileans."

"Certainly Chile has a better team than Mexico and Cuba had last year," he said. "That doesn't apply to the Mexican team this year. I haven't seen it yet."

Canada last year edged Cuba 3-2 in the first round and Mexico 5-0 in the second before losing

Main, Bedard, Willey and Henri Rochon of Montreal represented Canada last year. Platt was picked to replace the veteran Rochon this year.

"Main beat Hammersley in the second round at Wimbledon this season," Dr. Leclerc said, "but it took him four very close sets to do it. And Hammersley isn't ranked as high as the other two."

Chile always did well in the European zone in which many more teams play than in the American zone. "The Chileans are underrated," he said.

Ayala and Balbiers make up a strong doubles team. Canada's top doubles players are Main and Willey.

Winner of the Canada-Chile tie will meet the Mexican team, which eliminated Japan 3-2 during the weekend in Mexico City.

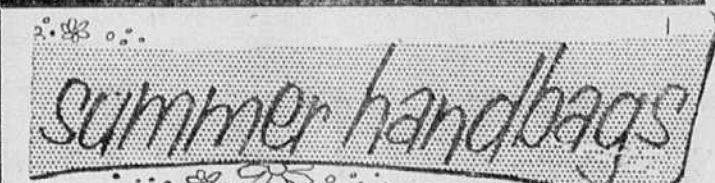
