Aide friendship got contracts Dorion is told

MONTREAL (CP) — Guy Masson told the Dorion judicial inquiry Wednesday that his friendship with a ministerial aide helped him get construction contracts and on one occasion gain access to a dinner apparently intended only for executive assistants of cabinet ministers at Ottawa.

The heavy-set ex-organizer of the Liberal party for Chambly, Que., elaborated for six hours on his earlier testimony that he accepted \$1,000 to look in Ottawa for possible means of freeing Lucien Rivard. Rivard has been held in Bordeaux Jail since June 19 pending extradition to the United States on a narcotics charge.

★ ★ ★ Canadians indicted in Texas

DALLAS (CP-AP) — District attorney's files here show that four Montreal men and an American had been indicted by a U.S. federal grand jury in Houston last May in connection with smuggling heroin into the United States from Mexico.

The files indicated that Lucien Rivard, 49, Charles Emile Groleau, 55, Joseph Raymond Jones and Julien Gagnon, 35, all of Montreal, and Frank Coppola, 37, of Milford, Conn., had been indicted May 27, 1964, on charges of conspiring to smuggle 76 pounds of pure heroin across the Mexican border at Laredo, Tex.

Rivard now is in jail in Montreal awaiting result of legal action to have him extradited to the U.S.

An inquiry is under way before Mr. Justice Frederic Dorion into allegations of bribe offers and political pressure aimed at freeing Rivard on bail.

The smuggling allegedly took place in October 1963, and other acts of smuggling occurred between January 1963 and May 1964.

William Jackson, assistant U.S. attorney, assessed the value of the heroin at \$56,000, 000, if sold at illicit underworld prices.

Fire badly damages construction school

A noon-hour fire heavily damaged the Construction Workers' Apprenticeship Centre in Sherbrooke yesterday.

The blaze which originated in the paint shop on the second floor of the two storey building on 977 Galt Street West was believed to have started at about 12:15 p.m. during the school's lunch time.

The quick arrival of Sherbrooke firemen saved the building and halted the fire from spreading into the paint store room which would have exploded, a school teacher on the scene said.

No one was injured by the fire, but two Sherbrooke firemen Roger Barlow and Benoit Dubois were temporarily overcome by the smoke.

The fire was first detected at about 12:15 p.m. by a student who gave the alarm. Roche Duquette, the school's janitor, called the fire department.

CHIEF DIRECTS

Eight fire trucks and about 30 men of Sherbrooke's Fire Department number, one, two and five stations answered the two-alarm call. The fire fighting crews were directed by Sherbrooke Fire Chief Percy Donahue. Also assisting the fire fighting were, Assistant Chief Charles Audet, Captain Theodore Degraze and Captain Leopold Lessard. Sherbrooke Fire Inspector Lieutenant Maurice Lemieux was also on the scene.

Nine ladders were used to control and contain the blaze which originated in the paint shop. The main flame was quickly brought under control but the fire spread through the paint shop into the electrical shop next to it, due to the condition of the wooden floors and walls of the 40-year-old building, one of the school's nine instructors said.

The entire second floor of the two-storey building was engulfed with dark and thick smoke clouds which allowed sparks to ignite small flames.

It was one hour before all the flames were under control, after the firemen battered holes in the roof with their axes in order to direct their streams of water at the isolated fires.

The Sherbrooke firemen remained at the school combating the clouds of smoke and smoldering fires until 3 p.m. The last fire truck left the scene at

Premier of Iran shot; recovering

TEHRAN (Reuters) — Premier Hassan - Ali Mansour of Iran today was shot twice, in the neck and in the pelvis, by a student as he prepared to enter the Majlis, the lower house of Parliament.

The premier, 41, was taken to hospital where sources said doctors operated to remove bullets from what were described as two serious wounds. The operation was followed by a blood transfusion.

A government statement broadcast by Tehran Radio

quoted doctors as saying his condition is satisfactory. The statement said the premier was shot by a young man named Mohammad Bokharai, while leaving his car.

Sources said the assailant, a high school student between 18 and 20, was under questioning by security authorities.

Eyewitnesses said the attacker fired several shots. They claimed they also heard several shots fired simultaneously from other directions indicating he may have had accomplices.

Mansour, 41, was named premier by the Shah last March. An expert in economic and social affairs, he headed the New Iran Party, composed mainly of progressive intellectuals.

Mansour's main task was to advance the Shah's reform program, which includes transfer of land from the landlords to the peasants and giving women a voice in the government.

Quebec legislature opens

Pension plan details expected in throne speech

QUEBEC (CP) — The Lesage administration presents its 1965 program today at the opening of the fourth session of the 27th legislature.

Main item in the speech from the throne to be read at 3 p.m. EST by Lieutenant-Governor Paul Comtois probably will refer to the pension plan the government hopes to get into operation by Jan. 1, 1966.

The contributions it will draw from 2,000,000 workers are aimed as much at building up funds for Quebec's development as at providing social security.

Just before a record 120-day session ended last July, Liberal and Union Nationale members passed a resolution approving the pension plan idea.

The overflow from last session includes the unprecedented three-year suspension of Yves Gabias, 44, Union Nationale member for Trois-Rivieres. It came after he was unable to back up charges of corruption against a cabinet member.

Procedural experts aren't certain just what course the Liberal government and Union Nationale opposition will take if Mr. Gabias enters the House, but indicate he would be removed by the sergeant-at-arms. Mr. Gabias angrily promised last summer to take his seat in 1965, but he would only say in interviews this week: "You'll see Thursday."

The session itself is expected to feature strenuous debate on a resolution to have control of the British North America Act pass to Canada from Westminster. The Union Nationale position is that the provinces and Ottawa should work out constitutional amendments before this move is made. A bipartisan legislative committee on the constitution isn't expected to report this session.

Besides the pension plan, at least 60 pieces of legislation are likely.

Quebec's 26,000 civil servants and the province's well-organized teachers are seeking the right to strike, and labor laws affecting them will be drawn up this session.

Mining growth in Quebec was the greatest in Canada last year, and a mining act which predates the iron ore developments that began in the northeast 20 years ago will be revised.

Dief's record in Quebec gets praise and blame

Quebec leader Leon Balcer, a former transport minister, is quoted as telling party President Dalton K. Camp that "on every issue touching the taproots of Confederation, the hopes and aspirations of French Canada have been distorted, misrepresented and ignored."

Mr. Balcer's remarks are taken from a letter the Montreal Gazette says he sent to Mr. Camp following the 10-member Quebec caucus' public demand last week for a leadership convention.

When he took office Mansour said Iran would remain a faithful member of the Central Treaty Organization, the Middle East defence alliance which includes Britain and the United States.

The "aggressive designs" of President Nasser of the United Arab Republic in the Middle East and Persian Gulf, and told the Senate that the U.A.R. had launched a propaganda campaign against Iran.

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Churchill: 'No change'

LONDON (CP) — There was no change in the condition of Sir Winston Churchill, now in his seventh day of grave illness, his doctor said today.

Issued by Lord Moran, Churchill's physician, at 12:16 p.m., the bulletin announced: "There is no change in Sir Winston's condition. There will be a further bulletin this evening."

Moran had indicated Wednesday night that Churchill's condition was at its lowest ebb yet. Medical experts felt that even the powerful Churchill constitution may soon fail as he battles on grimly against the ravages of a stroke.

Moran visited Churchill three times Wednesday before issuing a 9:30 p.m. bulletin, the 13th since Churchill was afflicted Friday by a cerebral thrombosis. The bulletin said: "The weakness of Sir Winston's circulation is more marked. There is nothing else to report."

The Daily Telegraph's medical correspondent says the bulletin indicates that "what have been days of waiting now may be shortened to hours."

"The report of weakened circulation reveals that blood pressure is dropping and general body functions must soon fail."

Judge Turmel to head fake vote slip hearing

MONTREAL (CP) — Judge Benoit Turmel of Sherbrooke has been appointed to preside at a hearing in to Quebec's fake voting slip case to be heard here Feb. 8.

The appointment was confirmed today by Judge Armand Cloutier, in charge of assigning sessions court justices.

Jean-Paul Boisjoly, 46, and Marcel Sauve, 32, have been charged with perjury, obstructing justice, and inciting others to commit perjury in connection with the 1964 seizure of false identification certificates required in the Quebec provincial election of that year.

Police seized 4,000 slips in a downtown railway station locker two weeks before the election.

Several other persons were convicted and given jail sentences on similar charges arising from the case.

Show Business

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — When the 1964 academy award nominations are announced Feb. 23, it is extremely unlikely that they will include any movies produced by American-International.

Its owners couldn't care less. They'd much rather continue winning their awards at the box office.

The brains behind American-International — known in the trade as A-I — are a former theatre owner named James H. Nicholson and lawyer Samuel Arkoff. They are the men who produced Beach Party, Muscle Beach Party and Bikini Beach, not to mention countless Edgar Allen Poe stories starring Vincent Price, Boris Karloff and others.

Their releases for 1965 also aren't destined for the Oscar derby: House at the End of the World, Ski Party, How to Stuff a Wild Bikini, Sergeant Deadhead.

Nicholson explained his philosophy: "A lot of the academy award type of pictures are aimed at the older audience. We're not interested in the old folks; most of them stay home and watch television, anyway."

AIM AT YOUNG CROWD
"We're aiming for the young crowd. I believe I read somewhere that half the world's population is under 25. That's a big audience. And they are the kind that like to get out and go to the movies. We'll continue trying to give them entertainment."

The A-I formula: Find a gimmick and fly with it. The Poe thrillers turned into a bonanza. But horror comedy was a dud and was quickly abandoned.

Beach Party proved to be A-I's biggest hit. Produced for \$750,000, it has grossed \$3,500,000.

"We start with Frankie Avalon and Annette Funicello," Nicholson said, "and add some solid performers like Robert Cummings, Buster Keaton, Buddy Hackett, Dorothy Lamour or Paul Lynde. Then we find as many ways as we can to get girls into bikinis."

Nicholson said the films have been criticized by moralists—but only on grounds of the acres of skin exposed on the Santa Monica sands.

"Frankie and Annette never talk about sex in the pictures," he said. "In fact, they're always talking about getting married. What could be more moral than that?"

Name Quebec committee for redistribution

OTTAWA (CP) — Dr. Ogden Glass, principal and vice-chancellor of Bishop's University, has been appointed to a committee to study the redistribution of federal ridings in Quebec.

The four-man committee, one for each province, have a year to revise electoral maps.

Other members of the Quebec committee are Mr. Justice Paul Langlois, Montreal; Mr. Francois Drouin, Quebec, chief electoral officer and chairman of the legislature sub-committee on provincial redistribution; and Nelson Castonguay, chief electoral officer for Canada.

For politicians, the results of redistribution may be painful. Fewer than a dozen of the present 263 ridings are expected to escape change. The commissions' maps will be final; MPs can ask the commissions to reconsider, but Parliament cannot change the maps by itself.

Each commission has four members. By law, one member is Federal Representation Commissioner Nelson Castonguay, chief electoral officer.

Chairman of each commission is a superior court judge chosen by the chief justice of the province, also as required by law.

Following is the membership of each commission in the Atlantic provinces.

New Brunswick — Mr. Justice W. Arthur I. Anglin, Saint John; Dr. A. J. Boudreau, professor of political science at the University of Moncton; Sheriff Emmet M. Lyons, chief electoral officer, Fredericton.

Newfoundland — Mr. Justice Harold George Puddister; Dr. Raymond Gushue, president and vice-chancellor of Memorial University; Magistrate George E. Trickett, chief electoral officer, all of St. John's.

Prince Edward Island — Mr. Justice George J. Tweedy; Professor J. Frank MacMillan of St. Dunstan's College; and W. J. MacKay, chief electoral officer, legislative clerk and deputy provincial secretary, all of Charlottetown.

Nova Scotia — Mr. Justice Vincent J. Pottier; Alexander Douglas Muegh, prothonotary (chief clerk) of the N.S. Supreme Court of Sydney; Herbert F. Grant, chief electoral officer and registrar of joint stock companies and securities, Halifax.

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25 Windsor families left without water

WINDSOR — (Staff) — Windsor families living between 6th and 10th Avenues were without water for eight hours yesterday afternoon and evening.

Due to a fire hydrant which was being installed, the citizens of the higher sec-

tions of the town were without water from 1:30 to 8:30 p.m., G. R. Lemire, general superintendent of public works in Windsor said today.

He said about 25 families were without water.

A fire hydrant was installed yesterday behind the municipal garage.

The hydrant was being connected on the main line pipe between the reservoir and the town, and this resulted in a temporary decrease in water pressure, said Mr. Lemire.

Says no need to run mills on Sundays

MONTREAL (CP) — Quebec's pulp and paper companies have not yet proven their need to operate mills Sundays, the Confederation of National Trade Unions said today.

The Quebec - based labor group made the statement in a brief submitted to the Quebec government commission investigating the necessity for Sunday operation of pulp and paper mills.

Text of the brief was released to the press before presentation. The companies told the commission earlier that Quebec is the only province where Sunday operation is not permitted. They said Quebec is losing its share of world markets to other provinces and Western nations, but its competitive position would be improved through lower production costs if mills were allowed to operate continuously.

New closing hours announced for all stores in Asbestos

ASBESTOS — (Special) — New opening and closing hours have been announced for the stores in Asbestos, as rendered by a court judgment issued in Sherbrooke last week by Judge Louis Pelouquin.

Effective immediately, the following hours are in force.

Monday, grocery stores, closed all day, other stores, open from 1 p.m. to 6 p.m. Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, grocery stores, open from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. with other stores open from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Friday, grocery stores, open from 8 a.m. to 9 p.m. and other stores 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. Saturday, grocery stores, open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. with other stores, 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. closing.

When a holiday falls during a week, then, the grocery stores will remain open on the Monday.

The St. John Ambulance organization of Asbestos gave 1321 hours of service during the 1964. From the time of the official opening of their quarters on May 1962, the group has been called out to attend at various functions in the area. Traffic fatalities increase in Asbestos

ASBESTOS (Special) — Five persons were accidentally killed in motor vehicle accidents in the town during the course of the past year. Twenty-three persons were injured in a reported 242 traffic accidents.

In 1963, one person was killed with forty injured in a registered 280 accidents.

The patrol made 247 escorts to local banks compared with 127 escorts in 1963; 145 persons were arrested; 22 persons requested over - night protection; 34 summons were served; 22 persons appeared in magistrate court with 12 in the municipal judges chambers; 31 persons appeared in municipal court with 13 appearing before the Welfare Court in Sherbrooke.

Seventy-two persons were fined, nine were given prison sentences; 16 persons had their motor vehicle licences suspended.

As strike continues

City liquor supply dwindling rapidly

As the Quebec liquor board strike drags on and thirsty Quebecers become thirstier, the liquor supply at Sherbrooke bars and restaurants is reported to be going very, very fast.

Most Sherbrooke bars report that they can continue serving hard liquor for at least a month, although one Sherbrooke hotel manager says he may run out in three weeks.

Wine at restaurants and hotels is running very low. Some restaurants have no wine at all.

Several hotels report that popular brands of hard liquor are sold out, and a number of other hotels and restaurants report popular hard liquors and wines are running low.

A number of hotel officials refused comment on their existing supplies.

Two Sherbrooke liquor serving restaurants report that they have only enough wine for this week.

One of the restaurant owners said he has only whisky in stock and that his few bottles will be gone in a few days.

Hotel managers questioned reported no significant rise in business with thirsty patrons who spend more than their usual drinking time in bars and not at home.

Two Sherbrooke hotel managers said that receipts held in their hotels were rapidly depleting their supplies of both hard liquor and wines.

"We cannot fill any special requests" said one of the managers. He hinted that depending on how thirsty people get, his hotel might not be fulfilling any requests in a few weeks.

Police car damaged in collision

A car crashed into the rear of a stationary Lennoxville police cruiser, and deflected the cruiser into another parked car in Lennoxville last night.

Const. Lorne Ross, of the Lennoxville municipal police force, said he had parked his cruiser on College Street behind a truck which was having mechanical difficulties.

Andrew Patton, estimated by police to be about 35 to 40 years old, collided with the rear of the police cruiser. The police cruiser then deflected into a car on the other side of the street.

Constable Ross was sitting in the cruiser when the accident occurred.

The third car involved was driven by Charles Dupuis, 34, 540 Malouin Street, Sherbrooke. He and his wife, the only passenger, were not injured.

Mr. Patton was not injured. Constable Ross was examined at hospital but later released.

Constable Ross told the Record this morning that \$900 to \$1,000 damage was done to the police cruiser. He estimated the damage on Mr. Patton's car at \$450 and Mr. Dupuis' at about \$400.

CN, CP merge in song only

MONTREAL (CP) — For a minute it looked like a takeover bid that would have shaken the nation.

The president of the giant CNR, bearded and top-hatted, consulted with the president of the CPR, similarly rigged out. Some 400 guests, many top Montreal businessmen, waited expectantly.

Then the two railway magnates hit a harmonious note and out of their strange Wednesday night conference came the familiar strains of I've Been Working on the Railroad.

Donald Gordon, CNR president, and R. A. Emerson, head of the CPR, were in a clownish mood.

Both had bedecked themselves in mock-beards, sideburns, funnel-hats and early 19th-century suits for the annual get-together of Montreal's raucous, once - a - year institution, the Beaver Club.

If the strike does continue, and Sherbrooke hotels do run out of hard liquor and wine,

there is no proposed plan except to serve beer, Claude Genest, of the Sherbrooke Hotel Owners Incorporated said yesterday.

The Sherbrooke detachment of the RCMP reported that there has been no increase in the number of stills operated during the strike.

An RCMP officer said that he hopes that stills will not start to spring up if the strike continues.

RC school tax is lowered in Richmond

RICHMOND — (Staff) — The tax for the Richmond Catholic School Board is being substantially reduced from last year's rate of \$2.24 per \$100 of evaluation.

The rate will be fixed temporarily at \$1.88 but later may be raised slightly, board secretary Gerard Blais said today.

Mr. Blais said that last year the department of education had forced the board to increase its rate from \$1.30 to \$2.24.

The commission thought there must have been an error in this increase so it hired a specialist to make a study of tax needs, he said.

After the specialist's report was sent to Quebec City the department agreed and recommended that the tax rate be lowered.

The board's budget for the present school year has been submitted to Quebec but the department has asked that several corrections be made on it. These corrections may increase the tax rate, said Mr. Blais. However, the final rate will still be lower than that of last year.

The Richmond Catholic School Board services 1,500 students, 1,200 French-language and 300 English-language. High schools are operated for both language groups.

The board includes seven localities: Richmond, Mel-bourne, Melbourne Township, Shipton, Cleveland, Ulverton and Kingsbury.

The clinic will be for all types of children's diseases and in addition there will be vaccination for smallpox for those requiring it.

The new building, on 1800 Roy Street, will be inaugurated in a ceremony starting at 4 p.m. The centre is to be the new headquarters of the city electrical department.

President Johnson reassures allies

Highlighting the inauguration address of President Lyndon Johnson Wednesday was his declaration that the United States would be unrelenting in its determination to work for the liberation of man in any part of the world.

Rejecting any trend toward isolationism, the President stressed that the achievement of this goal was inherent in the American way of life, that freedom at home could not be assured without freedom abroad.

He declared that changing conditions throughout the world have increased the responsibilities placed upon his nation which might mean the ending of American lives and the spilling of American treasure "in countries we barely know" as the price change has demanded of conviction.

With a call to his people to abandon any parochial views he said his fellow citizens must make one thing clear to the world:

"We aspire to nothing that belongs to others. We seek no dominion over our fellow men, but man's domination over tyranny and misery."

His reassurances should be comforting to United States allies in all parts of

the world who might have been fearful that in his search for a great America he could forget those nations to which the U.S. has promised support.

Actually, his foreign policy appears basically to be a projection of his domestic hopes, which were that Americans "join reason to faith, to transform our new unity of interest into a new unity of purpose."

His visions of a greater America and a greater world are not based on the hope of an early victory or even of a complete victory.

Rather there would be the excitement of becoming — always, becoming, trying, probing, falling, resting and trying again — but always gaining.

In this declaration President Johnson perhaps has given the real reason why so many improvement programs appear a failure.

Too often it is felt that progress can be achieved to a certain point at which victory can be declared final. Forgotten is the fact that man is an ambitious animal, devoted to change and progress.

The energy and originality required to achieve one goal only open up new fields of progress and challenge.

Confusion clouds automobile pact

The new automotive free trade agreement recently signed between Canada and the United States has been hailed as a masterpiece of statesmanship. But to most residents of the United States and Canada it appears a masterpiece of confusion, with no real assessment of its values being possible for four or five years—even if the treaty is approved by the United States Senate.

Canada has abolished its 17½ per cent duties on American-made cars entering Canada, as well as corresponding duties on American-made parts of a kind made in Canada. But Canadian car prices are not expected to go down for some years, the savings being retained by the companies to finance expansion because the latter have undertaken to increase production by 1968 by one-third above normal growth.

But no definition of normal growth has been given nor have the letters of assurance from the companies been re-

vealed. While such assurances have been considered an essential part of the treaty, they have no legal standing and cannot be enforced.

Nor can any estimate be obtained as to the number of additional Canadian jobs to be created. Nor is any hope given that the present 2-1 ratio between Canadian car consumption and production will be reduced.

Confusion even exists as to the position of British and European car manufacturers. They have been assured their position in the Canadian market will not be harmed, but they are being urged to establish plants in Canada to offset the disadvantages that may result for them.

However, the agreement represents a new approach to an old problem, that of the heavy deficit in foreign exchange created by Canada's imports of cars and parts. Perhaps time will prove its advantages for all concerned, in which case it could become the guideline for free trade agreements in other fields.

Lettuce as substitute for tobacco

Recurring arguments over the ill-effects of tobacco smoking, and especially over the evils of cigarettes, have raised another possibility that is grim indeed. Recently the research department at Lankenau Hospital in Philadelphia announced that it has made smokes from lettuce.

Its announcement was followed up by a statement from an Oklahoma firm that it will begin production of salad type cigarettes for distribution in that state and in Texas.

Lankenau researchers have concentrated thus far on the effect of tobacco and lettuce on the human circulatory system. They claim there are important

differences in the effects of tobacco and lettuce cigarettes on respiration, blood pressure and pulse rate.

They recommend lettuce as a substitute for nicotine because it contains no toxic agents of its own, has a fibre of the right consistency and is easy to grow.

The Oklahoma manufacturer pioneering in lettuce fags will promote them as "the cigarette you can live with" and which is satisfactory both to the taste and the family physician."

Perhaps the new development may be welcomed by vegetable growers of Canada and the United States, but somehow or other to the smoker it will recall his early experience with corn tassels as a substitute for tobacco.

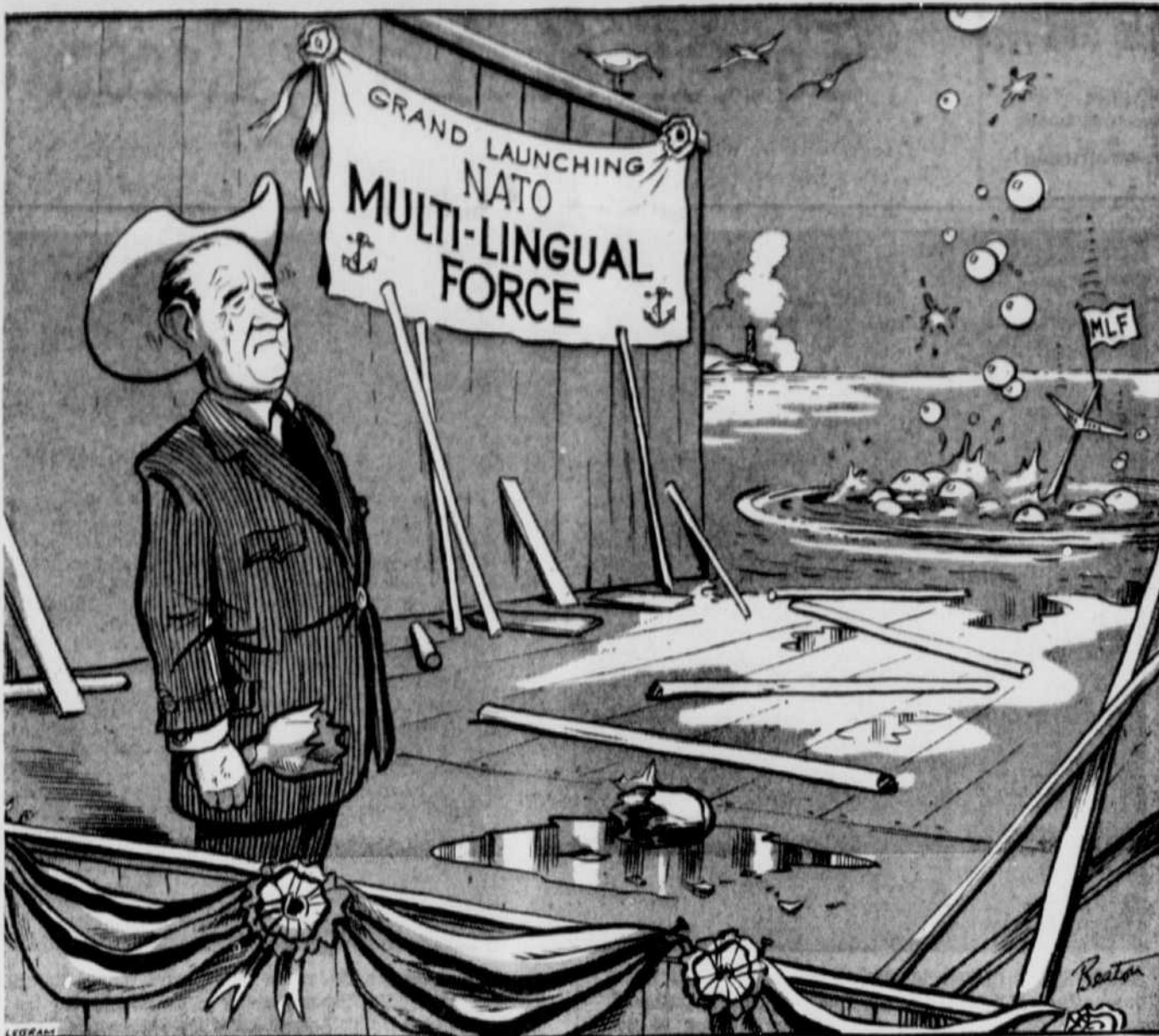

understanding of or contempt for naval sensibilities, the general presided at launching of a new naval vessel after the flier couldn't make it at the last moment.

The flag order appears equally stupid. It is true that at times the RCN has been accused of aping the Royal Navy. Indeed, in his report urging reforms after naval riots in Halifax right after the war, Admiral Roland Maigu recommended a bit less of the British navy environment. The White Ensign which RCN ships have

traditionally flown at the stern is identical with the Royal Navy's ensign. Present admirals issue pacifying statements but ex-admirals and commodores are outraged. As one ex-officer points out the White Ensign "is a kind of regimental banner for the Navy," and the Army is allowed to retain its regimental flags.

Just a little of tact, an ounce of understanding at Ottawa could have averted this unhappy incident. It is just the first small proof that the one-man-at-the-top defence setup will break down under practical conditions.



Nighttime peace shattered

Wave of violence sweeps London as many guns suddenly appear

LONDON — (NEA) — Muggings and other senseless crimes of violence that have plagued New York and other big cities now threaten to become a familiar part of city life in Britain.

Parts of London are becoming unsafe to ordinary law-abiding persons after dark as young hooligans roam the streets, bent on destruction.

In the last week in December 1964, muggings alone accounted for three murders in London, two of which took place outside of pubs. All of these killings were apparently motivated.

There are two new factors which make the present wave of violence different from preceding ones, and which give the police cause for alarm.

One is the increasing use of firearms, usually shotguns by young hoodlums out for kicks.

In the past, teen-ager gangs used their fists mostly when ever there was a rumble, although the odd bicycle chain or flick knife made its appearance.

But in recent weeks young gangsters have terrorized their rivals by firing at them with shotguns from speeding cars, making sedate London resemble Chicago of the 1920s.

Smashed-and-grab gangs now go armed with everything from sawed-off shotguns to pistols when they raid a bank, a practice which has hitherto been rare in Britain, whose police are unarmed.

An unwritten code long existing between the underworld and the police holds that as long as one side did not take up arms, the other would refrain from using firearms. Until recently, this understanding has worked remarkably well.

But now gunplay has become contagious, and even youngsters have taken to firing at trains with their air rifles.

The other factor that worries police is the seeming public indifference to violence in the streets, with bystanders slow to go to the aid of victims who are being attacked.

In order to counteract this indifference Scotland Yard recently called on the public to "have a go" at criminals such as bank raiders, providing that the circumstances were right.

This brought the wrath of the British Safety Council down upon Scotland Yard's head. To advise the public to "have a go" at armed criminals is "madness" and "suicidal," the council claims.

Not only would such by-

standers get in the way of the police, but they'd risk losing their lives without preventing criminals from escaping.

"You are not being a coward if you keep out of these affairs and let the police deal with them," Graham Spiers, an official of the safety council, explains.

After President Kennedy's assassination the British viewed with horror the ease with which firearms can be procured in the United States. But the situation is little better here. Anyone over the age of 17 can buy a shotgun across the counter.

Most of Britain's shotguns are imported. More than 42,000 were imported in the first 10 months of 1964 from Spain, Italy, France, Belgium and Czechoslovakia — a big increase over the 25,000 brought into Britain in 1963.

Many of these shotguns find their way into the hands of sportsmen and farmers. Britain is still sufficiently rural for large numbers of amateurs to go potting rabbits regularly on weekends.

Police are more concerned about the vast armory of stolen shotguns that has been built by the underworld through raids on gunsmiths' shops. More than a dozen shops have been raided in the London area in the past two months.

The first International Convention for Safety of Life at Sea was held in London in 1913 as a result of the sinking of the 46,000-ton liner Titanic in 1912 with a loss of 1,513 lives. The Titanic had only 1,178 boat spaces for the 2,224 persons aboard. Rules were made requiring that every ship have lifeboat space for each person, that lifeboats be held, and that all ships carry enough radio operators to maintain a 24-hour watch.

OTTAWA — The Canadian-American agreement for division of the North American auto market between the two countries on an equitable basis is so sensible that the wonder is that it hasn't been attempted before this.

Perhaps the answer is that in the past the economic pressure for this step hasn't been great enough, and the psychological factors haven't been right.

The idea has been bruited about for years, because it has long seemed logical to adapt to the auto industry the integrated continental production system that the farm implement industry has developed since World War I. With neither country levying tariffs on agricultural equipment, the major farm implement manufacturers operate plants in both countries and divide production of the various types of equipment among their various plants without regard for the international boundary — so that a plant in one country would produce all the tractors, say, for North America and for export, while a plant in the other country would produce all the combines or all the seeders.

★ ★ ★

The Bladen royal commission on the automotive industry called attention to the example of the farm implement industry in 1962, but considering the political upheavals at the time it's hardly strange that the idea didn't germinate into quick action. It had to await the second year of the Liberal administration.

It also had to wait upon psychological factors for receptivity in Washington, and in the auto capital of Detroit. It needed the rapprochement between Ottawa and Washington that flowed from Hyannisport to revive the spirit of Canadian-American cooperation, and it needed the climate of the Kennedy Round to predispose Washington towards tariff cutting.

The auto industry is private enterprise at the zenith of its development, proud of its achievements, strong in its power — and in peacetime also beyond the authority of Washington and Ottawa so far as its manufacturing decisions are concerned. It could not be ordered; it needed to be convinced that the Ottawa plan was in its interests as well as those of Canada.

★ ★ ★

With Canada consuming 7.5% of continental auto production but producing only 4%, the target set by the government for Oshawa and Windsor is a one-third increase in production over normal growth by 1968. In getting industry's acceptance of this goal, which of course had to be approved in Detroit, the government wisely left it up to industry how to achieve this goal.

If the farm implement example is followed, as would appear logical, General Motors at Oshawa might produce all the Buicks for the continent, achieving lower unit costs by greatly extended production runs, while GM in Detroit might produce all the Chevys, Pontiacs, Olds and Cadillacs.

Canadian car prices won't get down near the US level for years. That's a living standard increase we will have to earn by increased productivity and efficiency. But it's imaginative programming like this auto plan that will give us those increases, and the jobs needed for the million-plus explosion expected in the labor market by 1970.

TODAY IN HISTORY

Carry Amelia Nation wrecked a saloon in Wichita, Kan., dramatizing a crusade in favor of prohibition, 58 years ago today—in 1907—and entered American folklore. Born in 1846 in Kentucky, she married a drunkard and their brief unhappy life together prompted her saloon-smashing career later. With hymn-singing women, or alone, she would march into a saloon and with a hatchet smash the stock of liquor. Her efforts reached their peak of frenzy in the 1890s which led to scattered and temporary efforts at law enforcement. She also lectured in Canada and the U.S., often speaking between acts at carnivals.

She attempted to destroy not only alcohol but tobacco, foreign foods, corsets and barroom-style nude paintings. She died in 1911. 1924—Russian leader Nikolai Lenin died at the age of 54.

Elections were held for chairman and the member-at-large, department of education

adviser Frank Heath reported today. The other board members were elected by acclamation, he said.

Headquarters for the regional board will be at Cowansville. (The region comprises Brome, Missisquoi and Shefford counties.)

The first meeting of the regional board is to be held February 1.

Mr. Heath said that an important meeting of education officials from across the province is to be held tomorrow and Saturday. Minister of Education, Paul Gervin-Lajoie, is to brief those attending on all aspects of education reforms.

About 12 planning committee

members, regional board members, and school principals from Bedford District are to attend the meeting.

Chairman of the Board of Delegates for the district is Col. O. B. Rexford, of Foster, said Mr. Heath.

This body is composed of three delegates from each local school board included in the regional board.

The Board of Delegates elects the regional board, choosing chairman and member-at-large, and appoints an auditor. The regional board makes a report to it once per year, said Mr. Heath.

Present at the meeting were eight local school boards.

Six of these boards have high schools. They are: Granby, Waterloo, Knowlton, Sutton, Cowansville, and Bedford.

The two other boards present were Farnham and Stanbridge East.

The Clarenceville School Board was not present at the meeting, he said. It attended early meetings on regional planning but is presently not certain whether or not it will join the board.

A regional planning committee, set up to make a complete report on school facilities and needs, had been set up in late 1964, said Mr. Heath.

This committee will make recommendations on important questions such as the building of a regional school for the district.

Target date for the completion of the report is April 1, said Mr. Heath. The report will then be presented to the regional board which will modify it, if it wants. The report will then be sent to Quebec for approval. It is unlikely that it will be made public before being approved by Quebec, he said.

The planning committee is composed of 16 persons from

the region. Also attached to the committee will be Mr. Heath and one observer from a similar planning committee set up for the Roman Catholic regional school district of Missisquoi.

Planning committee members were picked to provide representation from the different groups in the community, said Mr. Heath. District representation is less important than socio-economic background for this body.

• Mrs. D. McIntosh, of Bedford, high school teacher;

• R. Milleneham, of Sutton, service clubs;

• S. Mount, of Knowlton, agriculture;

• K. Elvidge, of Cowansville, business administration;

• A. Robertson, of Granby, industry;

• Mrs. R. Thomson, of Abbotford, women's institutes.

Mr. Heath noted that discussion of the regional school board idea started two years ago in the Bedford District, to consider the teaching of grade 12. Since then it developed to include other problems.

Drilling going ahead on new Sutton water supply

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White man's law officer is heavy-handed in Selma

SELMA, Ala. (AP)—As individuals, Wilson Baker and James Clark, the top law enforcement officers in Selma, have an unshakable belief in segregation.

But they have little in common in applying that philosophy to the handling of racial unrest. As sheriff, Clark follows the hard-core line of white supremacy, meeting Negro civil rights demands with a massive show of force and arresting those who disobey him. More than 200 have gone to jail this week.

Baker, the city's new public safety director, has told his officers to put their personal feelings aside and face the changing conditions brought about by passage of the civil rights law. Thus a troubled city caught

in the drama of the year's first major racial struggle is beset at the same time by a conflict of authority in law enforcement.

Clark has become a symbol of "white man's law." His heavily armed deputies, with their clubs and electric prod poles, have even travelled into other counties to help put down Negro demonstrations.

Sheriff Clark, chief law enforcement officer in the county, has played the part. He took full charge of the handling of racial trouble in Selma last year with the approval of the city administration then in power.

But a new mayor, Joe Smith, took office last October and made it plain that no longer would the city surrender its policing responsibilities to the sheriff's office.

Baker, a one-time Selma police captain, gave up his job with the University of Alabama as a law enforcement instructor to return here in the newly created role of public safety director.

With a promise to enforce the law impartially, regardless of race, he appealed to city residents to face the reality of the civil rights law and meet it "with dignity."

When Negroes began their mass meetings at the start of the year, the army of sheriff's deputies who once stood watch had been replaced by a smaller, less conspicuous force of city policemen.

GAVE WARNING
And this week, when the Negroes began their wholesale tests of public accommodations and renewed their voter registration campaign, Baker notified them they would be arrested if they violated the law but not until then.

They marched to the courthouse and Baker refused to arrest them for parading without a permit because, he said, it was not a parade. Police accompanied them along the route to make sure they walked in small groups and not in a continuous procession.

At the courthouse, Clark wasted little time in ordering the Negroes to use an alley entrance to the building and sending them to jail when they refused. Later he went word to Baker that Negroes were blocking the sidewalk, asking in effect "what are you going to do about it?" The city police director ordered the Negroes to line up in single file to keep the sidewalk open. When they complied, he

found no reason to arrest them. But the sheriff did. He told the Negroes to disperse, and sent them to jail when they failed to obey.

News flashes from around the world

VICTORIA (CP)—The Canadian stage production Spring Thaw opened its 18th season here Wednesday night in two performances before near-capacity audiences in the 1,500-seat Royal Theatre.

Spring Thaw this year is booked for an eight-month tour of 44 Canadian cities and towns. Critic Bert Binny of the Colonist said the premiere "tended to resemble a rather damp firecracker which smolders, sputters and flares intermittently but which finishes with a real, terrific bang."

Audrey Johnson of The Times described it as a "bright, bouncy balloon filled with laughing gas," but said there were moments "when the balloon sank to earth with a soft but unmistakable thud."

LONDON (CP)

A young Canadian tycoon in British business is switching to the educational field to head Britain's first major business school, it was announced Wednesday.

Arthur F. Earle, 43-year-old Torontoan and British head of the Hoover organization, has been appointed principal of the new government-aided London Graduate School of Business Studies.

The appointment has excited considerable interest with Britain striving to modernize business and improve its export position. Earle, said to be giving

up one of the best-paid jobs in Technology Minister Frank Cousins. They are running in the first contests since the fall general election.

Both were expected to win easily. Attention was focused on the size of their victories as a clue to whether Prime Minister Wilson will call an early general election some time this year.

The first floor of the apprentice shop where expensive building machinery is situated was also heavily damaged by water. The water from the second floor came through in streams leaving a foot of water in some parts of the first floor.

The cause or the actual time of the fire could not be pinpointed since the fire broke out during lunch time when the students were eating in the school's first floor cafeteria and the class rooms and work shops were deserted.

But at 11:50 a.m. the students begin their lunch hour and it was within minutes after that that the fire was discovered.

Jean Paul Beauchemin, a school instructor whose shop is next to the paint shop, said that he was eating lunch with the students when the fire alarm was given. He went upstairs to the paint shop and when he opened the door, the fire was right at his feet.

SAW NO DANGER

Jean Benoit, the instructor of the paint shop, first heard of the fire when he returned to the school after lunch. There was no sign of anything that might indicate a fire or old rags which might induce fire when he left the shop for lunch, he said.

The clouds of smoke and half-foot deep water made it impossible to give any cause of the fire at the time said an official of the fire department.

Most of the 125 students of the apprentice school were eating lunch in the cafeteria on the first floor when the fire began. All afternoon classes were cancelled due to the thick clouds of smoke which penetrated all the seven work shops of the school.

Four years ago the apprentice school, which receives federal and provincial aid, moved into the building which had housed the Orient Hosiery Company.

REMODELED

The apprentice school remodeled the two-storey hosiery factory into a nine-shop trade school with three shops on each floor, including the basement, and each shop containing a class room, machine room and a store room.

Each shop specializes in a trade which the school offers from carpentry to bricklaying. The second floor was used for the electrical shop, tinseling and paint shops.

At the administration office of Raymond Metras, the director of the school, an official said that the damage would run well into the thousands of dollars.

FEED ON RODENTS

TORONTO (CP)—J. J. Pigott of Toronto, vice-president of Pigott Construction Company Limited of Hamilton, said Wednesday night his company has filed a lien in Charlottetown for \$1,250,000 against the Fathers of Confederation building complex in Charlottetown.

He said in an interview that the filing of the lien was a necessary first step before a suit could be filed.

Officials of the company also asked the Supreme Court of Prince Edward Island to name an arbitrator for the owners of the buildings, the Fathers of Confederation Memorial Citizens' Foundation.

OTTAWA (CP)

Eugene Forsey, research director for the Canadian Labor Congress, Wednesday saw an urgent need for constitutional reform but thought the Fathers of Confederation wrote a basically sound document.

Dr. Forsey, a constitutional expert, told a luncheon of the Ottawa Confederation Club that existing central government powers, as delegated by the British North America Act, must remain substantially intact if Canada was to remain a recognizable political entity.

Why do Canadians traditionally put off until spring many operations that could as well be completed during the winter months?

There are a number of reasons. The man who intends to repair or improve his home, for example, waits until spring because he does not believe it is possible to do the job in the winter; or because he thinks it will be too cold for men to work.

But perhaps the most common reason is "pure habit." Every homeowner who operates in this fashion is doing an injustice to himself and his investment.

Like everything else a house has a normal rate of deterioration which can be retarded only if proper maintenance is carried out. The homeowner who develops the habit of watching the points where trouble is most likely to occur protects his investment by checking the normal rate of deterioration.

By having repairs done in the winter he assures himself the highest possible return should he wish to sell his house in the spring.

By having minor repairs completed when they appear he prevents them developing into major repairs requiring the outlay of an increased amount of money.

Small repairs can certainly be done more quickly in the winter when there is a surplus of tradesmen seeking employment.

Another reason which should appeal to all good citizens is that he provides employment for skilled craftsmen when it is needed most and in so doing decreases community welfare costs.

No matter how carefully a contractor builds a house certain minor defects can be expected to appear while the house is comparatively new.

Normal settling can cause plaster hairline cracks and sticking doors and windows. Damp basements can be caused by foundation cracks, blocked drain tiles or condensation caused by moisture entering and condensing on cold wall surfaces or water pipes.

But whether the defect is a minor one or has developed into a major repair job the homeowner should call upon skilled tradesmen to carry out

repairs as soon as possible. And the best time to have these repairs attended to is during the winter. Skilled tradesmen are available, material is in plentiful supply and the providing of winter works reduces community welfare costs, which come out of the pockets of homeowners in this community.

REMOVE OLD FINISH

To completely refinish wood furniture it is often necessary to remove all of the old finish before bleaching, staining or other wood finishing operations can be properly carried out. For this job, a good grade of commercially prepared chemical paint and varnish remover should be used, says the Paint Industry Council.

Adequate shelving in kitchen eases work

The kitchen probably gets more attention from architects and designers than any other part of the house. One of their main concerns is providing as much cupboard space as possible without interfering with other kitchen uses. The bare minimum is 24-feet of shelving and eight feet of counter space. Still, this is far from ideal. The housewife, it seems, can never have too much storage and work space in her kitchen.

General specifications for kitchen cupboards are: counter top 36 inches off the floor; base of counter to be recessed about four inches to allow room for the feet; top shelf to be not more than 6½-feet above the

floor level. Variations of an inch or two may prove helpful as the standard design may be too high in some cases. But the counter top should never be less than 32 inches above the finished floor level. Manufacturers of stoves, washing machines, dryers, and kitchen units have adopted the 36 inch height as the one best suited for the average housewife.

Kitchen cupboards may also be bought ready-made or may be assembled from pre-cut materials. Kitchen cupboards built on the site should be nailed to solid backing, preferably to the house frame itself.

Lumber for shelving should be planed on all sides. Even the

underside of the shelves should be finished in an acceptable manner. Plenty of cupboard space is needed in the kitchen but drawers are also indispensable. Housewives are often willing to sacrifice some of the shelving or open storage space under the counter in order to have a tier of drawers.

Drawers should be built to slide easily. Formerly, wooden drawers were held together with glued mortice and tenon joints. Today, few carpenters or cabinet makers go to this trouble. There is nothing wrong with a nail joint but if the parts are also glued some of the wracking which tends to pull out the nails can be prevented.

There is a variety of materials for covering counter tops. The ideal material would be one that does not scratch, is not marked by a hot pan, and one from which stains can be easily removed. To reduce clutter and cut down on broken dishes the covering material should be resilient. Probably no product on the market is ideal in all respects but many meet two or more of these requirements.

The moulding along the rim of the counter should preferably fit flush with the counter top. This type of moulding may cost a few cents more per foot but it also makes it easier to keep the counter clean and there is less tendency for water, dirt and greases to collect along the edge.

ABC's of color ease choice

In the last few years psychologists have discovered that color is one of the most dynamic forces affecting human emotions. Color can cheer, or depress; can aid digestion, or reduce the appetite; can give a feeling of warmth or coolness.

A good rule to remember is to let one color dominate and unify. It should be a subdued tone, when it is covering a wide surface like a wall, and it should be chosen after considering the most suitable paint to use. Some paints are easier to apply and dry faster than others. A paint such as satin latex, for example, is ideal for walls. It is very easy to use, dries in a matter of minutes and has no painty odor, so furniture can be replaced the same day.

Some colors, like people, are cool and restful. Blues, blue greens, greys and violets, are the "cool" colors of the spectrum and they are used to best advantage in rooms facing south and west which get lots of sunlight.

There are many ways of arranging for kitchen storage. But whatever the style, the sound point of the home; a housewife can put up with many things shelving, cupboards and drawers, but she seldom gets accustomed to "kitchen troubles."

Nick Altrock baseball's funny man dies at 88

WASHINGTON (AP) — Nick Altrock, one of baseball's most famous funny men, is dead at 88.

Altrock died Wednesday night after a lengthy illness. He had suffered a stroke 2½ years ago.

Once one of the American League's top pitchers, Altrock developed a sore arm and entered the comedy field, where his zany antics first captivated baseball fans and, later, vaudeville audiences.

The showmanship first came to light when he pitched for Los Angeles in the Pacific Coast League before the turn of the century. One day, he gave up a walk and then picked off the runner.

Pleased with himself, he purposely walked seven more men during the game, picking off six of them.

As a comedian, Altrock worked first as a single, capitalizing on a shadow-boxing routine, one-man wrestling bouts, juggling and mimicry. Then the late Clark Griffith, owner of Washington Nationals, teamed him up with another clown, Al Schacht.

The two became fixtures at World Series contests and were a big drawing card for the Nats both at home and on the road.

They were headliners in Vaudeville and even made a movie in Hollywood. They feuded in the early 1930s, and although the act continued, they seldom spoke to each other.

The act finally was broken up when Schacht became a coach for Boston Red Sox in 1934. As a left-handed pitcher, Altrock had a lifetime record of 84 victories and 75 losses.

Sooner or later, a traded player comes back to haunt his former National Hockey League club.

Billy Hicke did it to Montreal Canadiens less than two weeks ago when he scored three goals in a Saturday night game to lead New York Rangers to a 6-3 victory at the Forum.

It was Dick Duff's turn Wednesday night. His effort was less spectacular, but his second-period goal in Toronto stood up as the winner in a 2-1 decision for the Canadiens over the Maple Leafs, his former teammates.

In the only other game Wednesday night, Chicago Black Hawks outshot lightly Boston Bruins 40-17 in romping to a 7-1 victory over the visitors.

Canadiens' win preserved their two-point lead over Chicago atop the NHL standings, while Toronto, still in third spot, dropped to three points behind the Hawks.

Duff, who came to Canadiens from New York after being traded last year by Leafs, banged his goal in at 7:50 before Toronto goalie Johnny Bower could move.

That goal must have made Duff unhappy, but he did not complain about the opening goal, scored three min-

utes earlier by Claude Larose. "I had it, and lost it, and had it again," Bower grumbled, "but it finally went over me."

The victory was the third in three starts for veteran Lorne (Gump) Worsley since being called up from Quebec Aces of the American League to sub for Charlie Hodge.

Worsley stopped 30 shots, but his shutout bid was spoiled when Jim Pappin steered in Bob Baun's blueline shot at 12:17 of the second period. The goal was only the fifth that Worsley has allowed in three games. The third period, like the first, was scoreless.

Three minor penalties were assessed to each side. Montreal defenceman Jacques Laperriere drew a 10-minute misconduct when he argued about a high-sticking call.

In the sloppily played Chicago contest, Bobby Hull scored his 37th goal of the season but actually lost ground to teammate Stan Mikita, who picked up two goals and an assist.

The other Chicago scorers were Pierre Pilote, Bill Hay, Al MacNeil and rookie Fred Stanfield. Johnny Bucyk saved the Bruins from a whitewashing when he scored the first goal

of the second period to make the count 3-1.

BUILT 3-0 LEAD
The Hawks led 3-0 after the first period and 6-1 after the second.

Pilote opened the scoring when he trapped the puck near the Boston blueline and drove a 35-footer past Bruins goalie Eddie Johnston. Four minutes later, Mikita made it 2-0 on a short poke after Johnston made four saves and was flat on his back.

Hay tallied less than a minute later when he rapped in Stanfield's rebound.

Bucyk netted his 15th goal of the season on a pass from Murray Oliver, who stole the puck near the Chicago net.

But Chicago roared back a minute later. Stanfield slipped through the whole Boston defense and scored on a 20-foot blast.

Hull hit four minutes after that, driving in Chico Maki's shot, and MacNeil made it 5-1 on a long screened shot at the eight-minute mark.

Nikita closed out the scoring in the third period when he put a 15-foot backhand past Johnston.

The embattled Bruins visit Detroit Red Wings for tonight's only scheduled game.

Three team eight-player deal completed in AL

CLEVELAND (AP) — Rocky Colavito, a slug-ging outfielder, traded away by Cleveland Indians in 1960, returned to the Indians Wednesday in a three-team, eight-player deal in the American League.

The Indians gave up catcher John Romano, pitcher Tommy John and outfielder Tommie Agee to Chicago White Sox.

Chicago sent veteran outfielder Jim Landis and Mike Hersherberger and a starting pitcher to be named later to Kansas City Athletics and catcher Camilo Carreon to Cleveland.

General manager Pat Friday of the Athletics described the pitcher coming to his club from Chicago as a player of "tremendous potential with the ability to become an outstanding player."

It is believed he will be Johnny Buzhardt, who had a 10-8 record last season, Fred Talbot or Dave DeBusschere.

Colavito, traded by the Indians to Detroit Tigers and Harvey Kuenn, had a greater personal following among Cleveland fans than any other player of the last 10 years. The muscle-flexing, handsome outfielder has fan clubs of girls, who protested vigorously when he was traded by Frank Lane, then Cleveland general manager.

NEGOTIATIONS WERE LONG
"When you get a chance to get someone like Colavito, you don't miff it," said Gabe Paul, Cleveland's general manager, adding he had been negotiating the deal for months.

Paul said he figures the acquisition of Colavito will make the Indians, who finished sixth last year, a pennant contender next season. Colavito blasted 34 home runs and knocked in 102 runs with a .274 average last season for the last-placed Athletics.

He said John, a southpaw, may have been pitching staff which was weakened after the departure of left-handers Don Mossi and Frank Baumann.

Carreon, 27, was one of three catchers used last season by the White Sox, who finished a game behind New York Yankees. He was out much of the season with injuries.

Friday said the Athletics gave up Colavito "with a great deal of reluctance." But he said that last year, with Colavito and Jim Gentile in the lineup, "we tried to overpower opponents. It didn't work out too well. We had one of our worst seasons."

FENCES MOVED BACK
He said that since fences in the Kansas City stadium have been moved back, the Athletics need defensive ability and speed.

"It is wonderful news," Colavito said at his home in Reading, Pa. "I am very happy about the trade."

In nine seasons in the American League, Colavito has hit 302 home runs. His best year was 1961, when he had 45 homers, 140 runs batted in and a .290 batting average for Detroit. His power and popularity should stimulate Cleveland's shaky attendance.

Colavito played four years with Detroit before being traded to Kansas City.

Romano, 30, twice the American League's all-star catcher, complained publicly this week because he had to share catching duties with Joe Azcue, 26, batted .273 last year, hitting four homers and knocking in 34 runs in 83 games.

"I'm sad to be leaving Cleveland," said Romano, "but happy to be going back to my old home club."

Romano started in the majors with the White Sox in 1958 and was traded to the Indians after the 1959 season. He batted .241 last year, with 19 homers and 47 runs batted in. His best year was 1961, when he batted .299, hit 21 homers and knocked in 80 runs. A broken hand hurt his performance in the 1963 season.

Carreon batted .274 in 37 games for Chicago last year. John, 21, was 2-9 for the Indians last year and spent much of the season with Portland of the Pacific Coast League, finishing with a 6-6 mark there.

Agee, 22, hit .272 with Portland, then finished with the Indians. He batted .167 and is regarded as a top-flight defensive outfielder.

Hersherberger, 25, had been with the White Sox since 1961. He batted .230 last season. Landis, 30, started his major league career with the White Sox in 1957. Last year he batted .208.

The trade was the Indians' second this winter. Last month they sent utility man Woodie Held and first baseman - outfielder Bob Chance to Washington for outfielder Chuck Hinton, who also can play first base.
