SIX O'CLOCK.

AMERICAN NEWS.

NEW YORK, Oct. 1. Stocks active. Sterling Exchange 94 to 97. Gold 43. The Post says:—Lions are rather more active, the demand being readily met at 7 per cent. Stocks feverish and unsettled; Governments inactive. Railroad shares dull, closing firm. The Croton National Bank was closed this morning by the Government examiner, for not redeeming the circulating notes in lawful money on demand. The capital was \$200,000, a part of which appears to have been lost. The circulating \$180,000 is, of course, secured. It is thought the depositors will all be paid eventually.

SPLENDID PASSAGE OF THE SS. AUSTRIAN.

By a Cable message, Messrs. Allans, Roe & Co. learn that the steamer Austrian, Capt. Aiton, which sailed hence on Saturday, 21st Sept., arrived home on Monday, the 29th inst., making a fast passage of 8 days.

The amount collected at the Custom House to-day was \$1518.32.

THE SEASON.—The first of October is marked by the season's most glorious, bright, cheerful weather of the autumnal period of the year. The thermometer touched the freezing point on Sunday night, and last night fell to 31°.

THE COMMANDER OF THE FORCES.

Lieut. General Sir Charles Windham, who succeeds Sir John Michel as Commander of the Forces in Canada, arrived by the *Hibernian*.

HOWE'S BOMBAST.

Joseph Howe said in Windsor, N.S., on Wednesday:—"I go up to Canada, and advocate the repeal of the Union. If I cannot get it there, I will appeal to the British Parliament; if I cannot get it there, I will appeal to the civilized nations of the world."

PROVINCIAL DEPARTMENTS.

The Ottawa Times of yesterday says:—"We understand that the visit of the members of the Local Cabinets to the capital had special reference to the completion of the organization of the several Provincial Departments, and the arrangement of matters of detail respecting the separation and division of such affairs as have been heretofore common to both."

A NEW ORGAN.

Yesterday's Montreal Daily News says:—"We hear a project is on foot to establish in Montreal, a joint stock newspaper, to represent Irish sectionalists in the Dominion. It is said a good many shares have been taken up, and promises of support have been received from various parts of the country. We can have no hesitation in saying that while we should hail the advent of a newspaper advocating the interests of the Irish or any other element in the community, we are slow to recognize that those interests are otherwise than identical with those of the body politic, and we cannot but stigmatize as injurious and anti-national any attempt to establish a purely sectional organ, whose tendency must be to embitter prejudices which ought to be foreign to our soil."

COURT OF QUARTER SESSIONS.

The October session of this Court commenced to-day.—Judge Maguire presiding. The Grand Jury, Mr. Peter McNaughton, Foreman, having been sworn in, were informed by His Honor, in a brief charge, that in addition to several indictments for larceny and assault, bills for conspiracy and riot would be submitted. These prosecutions arise out of the recent strikes by workmen in the Coves, on both sides of the river, and His Honor explained to the Grand Jury that, although any number of men may agree among themselves not to work under a certain rate of wages, and endeavor by argument and persuasion to induce others to join them, yet if they resort to intimidation, or molest or assault others, in order to carry on their strike, they become criminally liable, and may be indicted and punished. The Grand Jury having retired to their room, returned into Court shortly after with "a true bill" against Etienne Simard, for unlawfully opening a post letter. John Larn, a soldier of the Royal Artillery, was put upon his trial for stealing a cloth cape. The witnesses in support of the charge having left the country, the prisoner was acquitted.

SILVER AND GOLD.

The Eastern Township Mines are beginning again to be heard from. Mr. Pope has been quietly going on with mining operations in Lingwich, on the Arnold river, with fair success; and now he has, it is said, struck a vein, which yields \$200 of silver and \$86 of gold to the ton. Some specimens of these precious metals he has shown to the *Sherbrooke Gazette* and the *Pionier de Sherbrooke*.

INCREASE OF THE ACADIANS.

The French population of Nova Scotia has, it seems, been increasing in numbers with marvellous rapidity. The ratio of increase, without the aid of immigration, has been 40 per cent in ten years; whereas the whole population of the counties where they reside has only increased at the rate of 24 per cent in the same time. French statisticians therefore think that, with an immigration of French Canadians, the French element will soon preponderate in some of the counties of Nova Scotia.

The Halifax Chronicle, Mr. Howe's organ, in speaking of the new light which the members of the Imperial Parliament will now obtain regarding the sentiments of the people of Nova Scotia, says:—"They will place Canada, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia in their old position."

Venerable friend, you are greatly mistaken. We are ages past our old position.

The Richmond, E. T., *Guardian* says that Mr. Howe's shoe factory at Danville is fast approaching completion. It is quite a large building, 90x25, all of stone and brick, three stories in height, and will be ready for use the ensuing spring.

Grand Vicar Walsh, of Toronto, has been appointed Bishop of Sandwich, and received his Bulls early last week.

We do not believe the half has been told of the ravages of the yellow fever in the Gulf States this summer. The details publicly given are frightful enough, but they by no means tell the whole story. A private letter from an entirely authentic source states that the number of cases this season in Galveston alone amount to seven thousand, with one thousand deaths. Of course the number is far greater in New Orleans. This one redeeming feature of this year's epidemic is the mitigated form of the disease, as shown in the comparatively small number of deaths where every case may well be presumed to be fatal; or it may indicate a better knowledge of the treatment of the disease. New York is still full of Southerners, who wisely refrain from returning at present, and it is decidedly unsafe for unacclimated Northerners to go to the Gulf cities now. The first cool weather will check the disease, and the first frost will be pretty sure to kill it for this year.

The *Sherbrooke Gazette* understands that there is to be a meeting of the members of the Medical profession of the District of St. Francis at Lennoxville, to-morrow, to elect Delegates to the Medical Conference at Quebec. It is also intended to take measures to organize a Medical Society for the District.

EARTHQUAKE.—The *Huntington Journal* says:—"A pretty sharp shock of an earthquake was felt all over this District about two o'clock on the morning of Sabbath last. A large shed in rear of this office was moved several inches off its original foundation." The *Plattsburgh Republican* also says on Sunday last, at a little past 2 o'clock, a severe shock of an earthquake was felt in Ellenburg. People were awakened from their sleep, and many were alarmed. It lasted about 20 seconds. We learn further that the shock was felt in several other towns in the county, and in Plattsburgh.

CURE FOR RAILWAY ACCIDENTS.—The switchman, through whose negligence an accident occurred at the Whitty Station of the Grand Trunk Railway on the 24th May last, has been sentenced to twelve months imprisonment in the Penitentiary, the jury having returned a verdict of manslaughter.

THE SS. HIBERNIA, Captain Brown, from Liverpool on 19th Sept., passed Father Point at 3.30 a.m. She brings 55 cabin and 288 stowage passengers. She reports having experienced strong westerly gales during the passage, and passed the ss. *Austrian* in lat. 55.14 long. 38.10. Lieut. General Windham is a passenger.

THE "STREETS OF NEW YORK."

This play of Bourcaud, long popular in the States, was produced at the Music Hall last night, for the first time in Quebec. The audience, which was larger than any we have seen in the hall since the season commenced, comprised many of the aristocracy of the city. Mr. Carden, as Badger, played his part well, while Mr. Placide, as Puffly, and Mr. Virgilio Bowers, as Dan the fireman, sustained their already well merited reputation. To-night will be reproduced "It is never too late to mend." To-morrow night, the great Irish drama entitled, "The Colleen Bawn."

ST. GEORGE'S SOCIETY.—At the quarterly general meeting of this Society, held last evening at Russell's, in addition to the admission of new members, an unusually large amount of money was voted from the charitable fund in aid of local calls for the descendants of Englishmen.

MAXIMILLIAN'S REMAINS.

APPLICATION FOR THEIR DELIVERY.—THE MEXICAN GOVERNMENT REFUSES TO GIVE THEM UP FOR "SEVERAL WEIGHTY REASONS." The following is the correspondence that has passed between Baron de Lago, Baron von Magnus, Dr. Basch, and Minister Tejada in relation to Maximilian's remains. BARON DE LAGO TO MINISTER TEJADA. Tacubaya, June 19, 1867. Citizen President: I request that you will have the goodness to allow me possession of Maximilian's remains, so as to remove them to Europe. BARON DE LAGO. MINISTER TEJADA TO BARON DE LAGO. SAN LUIS POTOSI, June 20, 10.15 p.m., 1867. Baron de Lago, Tacubaya:—The President of the republic has ordered me to say to you, in reply to your telegram of yesterday, received to-night, that for weighty reasons you cannot be allowed to dispose of the remains of Maximilian. S. LERDO DE TEJADA. BARON VON MAGNUS TO MINISTER TEJADA. SAN LUIS POTOSI, June 28, 1867. Excellency Senator Don Sebastian Lerdo de Tejada:—The Prince, while a prisoner at Queretaro, on the eve of his death, in a letter signed by his own hand and addressed to General Escobedo, expressed a wish that his mortal remains might be confided to me—Dr. Samuel Basch, family physician of the deceased, and myself—to the end, that Dr. Basch should accompany his body to Europe, and that I should see to having it embalmed and to all that regards its removal to Europe. In compliance with the wish of the deceased Prince, which he verbally made known to me, the removal of his remains should take place without any demonstration, and in such a manner as to avoid carefully anything that may excite such or even arouse public curiosity. Hence I reiterate the request which I have had the honour to lay before your Excellency to the effect that you will have the goodness to give the necessary order so that the mortal remains may be intrusted to me, and I will comply willingly with all that may be required as to their removal to the coast and on board of one of the vessels of the Austrian navy stationed at Vera Cruz. I avail myself of this occasion to renew the protestations of my highest consideration. A VON MAGNUS. MINISTER TEJADA TO BARON VON MAGNUS. SAN LUIS POTOSI, June 30, 1867. BARON A. VON MAGNUS, &c., &c., &c.:—Senior—I have received the communication which you had the goodness to address me yesterday on the subject of the Archduke Ferdinand Maximilian, of Hapsburg, having on the eve of his death expressed the wish that his mortal remains might be entrusted to you and Dr. Basch for their removal to Europe. THE EASTERN QUESTION REVIVED.

The London Times says the time is at hand when the policy which impelled the Western Powers to the war of 1854, and which has been maintained by them with more or less zeal and constancy ever since, must be tested by the event. The Ottoman Power has within the last year been more seriously threatened than at any time since the peace of Paris. That pacification of Europe left the enemies of the Turks disheartened and exhausted. Dispute in disappointment were the Greeks, a people who though unable to control the course of affairs in the East, pursue their policy of ambition with a steady tenacity which knows no rest or change. They felt that failure so much that it led them to serious and sustained even against their own friends, the Russians, who had, as they said, promised so much and performed so little. As for themselves, they clearly saw they had made a mistake. They had defied Powers which could crush them in a moment. A regiment of two of French and a regiment of English soldiers had been sufficient to paralyse the Court of Athens, and a moderate force of Turks had repressed the movement on the frontier. After the first transports of humiliation, however, the spirit of antagonism to the Turkish power revived. The Hellenes have since played their part with exceeding skill, and with little success, having learned by experience the defects of their former policy. From the time of his failure the unfortunate Otto was doomed. When a suitable opportunity offered they rid themselves of him and his Queen, and made the revolution an occasion for advances towards that one of the Western Powers which had most constantly disconcerted their ambitious schemes. How they got King George and the Ionian Islands need not be told. Having made their peace with the Western Powers and conquered, as they think, the special good will of England by their civility, having also a new King connected with the highest reigning houses of Europe, the Greeks have returned within the last year to the task of assailing or undermining the Ottoman Government.

The Russians have in the meantime shown a bolder policy than at any time since the war. Although their action is necessarily to a certain extent secret, inasmuch as they are professedly at peace with the Sultan, and bound by treaty to respect his dominions, it cannot be doubted, and, indeed, they would hardly deny, that the schemes of the Greeks have their sympathy and encouragement, that everywhere discontented Christians are taught to look to St. Petersburg for a deliverer, and that considerable sums are spent in extending Russian influence among the populations which, directly or as tributaries, are subject to the Sultan. It is needless to say much concerning the other Powers. France has exhibited a strange vacillation. The Emperor in this, as in some other matters, appears as if he had no settled purpose, but allowed himself to be moved this way or that by what seemed to him the public opinion of his people or of Europe. Thus, although the leader in a war the object of which was to preserve the integrity of the Turkish Empire, he became a party to the quadruple alliance which within the last few months endeavored to induce the Sultan to sacrifice the island of Candia to a similar invasion of the province on the Helles frontiers. Within the last few weeks the visit of the Sultan to Europe has somewhat improved the situation of the Porte, but, with such unrelenting enemies and such lukewarm friends, it cannot but be exposed to the greatest dangers. Of all its neighbours, only England and Austria are really favourable, and their good will arises more from the notion that the downfall of Turkey would exalt their own rivals than from any real friendship for the threatened Power.

It may be, however, that the Turks will realize the prospect that promises improvement in their things are at their worst. A few months ago they were seemingly at the bottom of fortune's wheel. Any turn it could make must bring them upward, and they have certainly had something to encourage them in the most recent events. The Sultan's visit has shown that the people of both France and England welcome the advances he has made towards them; the Cretan insurrection has been suppressed and will, at the most, only linger as an unimportant guerrilla in the mountains. The French Emperor has returned to the earlier policy of his reign, and it is understood that instructions have been given to discourage intrigue and insurrection in other provinces of the Turkish Empire. The Porte is, for the present, successful; it has even gained a little naval victory, and, all things considered, is in a better position than could have been expected six months ago. We hear, therefore, much of reforms and improvements of administration; the Sultan is reported to be desirous of imitating the great things he has seen in the West, and Fued Pasha is too shrewd a man not to take advantage of a favourable wind. That he earnestly hopes; that the Sultan and his advisers will recognize that there is something more in government than the fighting of enemies and the taxing of subjects; they must wish who desire the maintenance of the Ottoman State. Though not enthusiastically sanguine, we have hope, and are glad to welcome any one who, writing with knowledge of the subject, makes suggestions in sincerity and good faith. Such a person is the author of a pamphlet called *Some Notes on Turkey*, which has just been published. There is not much in these Notes which will be unknown to those acquainted with Turkey, and it may also be said that the principal recommendations have been often urged on the Porte and the great Powers by former writers. But this does not lessen the value of the work, for, indeed, the very fact that the same general features should be noticed by different observers, that all should perceive the same defects and indicate the same remedies, is rather a proof of the correctness of their common views. We may, therefore, recommend the *Notes* as giving in a small space a tolerably accurate idea of the present state of the Empire. The author is evidently well-disposed to the Turks as a race, as he has, like many Englishmen acquainted with the East, a strong dislike to the Greeks. The faults of the Turkish system of government are briefly but plainly sketched. The taxation is in some respects oppressive, and is often levied in a manner most unjust and even absurd. The men in high places are highly paid, the underlings miserably. The Turks are too ignorant or too lazy to carry out their own enterprises, and financial operations or public works are placed in the hands of foreigners, who are sometimes incompetent, sometimes jobbers, sometimes worse. The writer bears witness that in many parts the Christians are gaining ground on the Turks, even in the possession of landed property, partly on account of their superior intelligence, partly on account of the necessary order so that the mortal remains might be intrusted to me, and I will comply willingly with all that may be required as to their removal to the coast and on board of one of the vessels of the Austrian navy stationed at Vera Cruz. whole population, and abolish the "capitulations" by which for three centuries France, followed by other Powers, has exercised rights of sovereignty over men living in the Sultan's dominions. These capitulations have now been abolished by the admission of great numbers of Christians to the status of French, Russian, or Austrian subjects, and the withdrawal of them from the ordinary administration of the law, that justice and regular government are impeded. It will be seen that the recommendations of the pamphlet are sweeping enough; and a Turkish minister must certainly be a bold man if he would brave the storm the Christians would raise at any attempt to bring them under the constitution, or to take them from under the protection of their respective countries. Yet these are difficulties which the Porte has been often advised to face boldly; or can it now avoid the conviction that if the relations of its two classes of subjects remain as at present, the exhaustion and impoverishment of the Mussulman population must be the result. It is the Mussulman now who is becoming the oppressed man. Under the new system he pays taxes like his Christian neighbour, he is more at the mercy of tyrannical officials, inasmuch as he has no council to fly to, and, above all, he has to supply the whole armed force of the state. A supremacy which in a few years will be merely nominal is but a small recompense for such disadvantages.

LACROSSE CONVENTION AT KINGSTON.

A convention of delegates from the different Lacrosse Clubs throughout the Dominion was held in Kingston, on Thursday last, 27 Clubs in all were represented, 42 delegates in all being present. The convention was organized at 9 a.m. in the Temperance Hall, by the appointment of Mr. N. Hughes, of Montreal, to the Chair, and Mr. W. G. Beers as Secretary. It was then moved by G. T. Langan, seconded by W. L. Maltby, that Messrs. Kavanagh, of Ottawa; Falconer, of Kingston; Dr. Parke, of Quebec, and Brady, of Caledonia, be appointed a Committee on Credentials. Carried. Langan, Kavanagh, Beers, May, Maltby and Stuart. The convention then adjourned to meet at half-past seven p.m., in the Council Chamber, and receive the report of committee. EVENING SESSION. The convention resumed its session at 9.30 p.m., in the Council Chamber, N. Hughes in the chair. The committee reported, submitting a draft of constitution and by-laws for the guidance of the National Association, which, with some slight modifications, was adopted. Much credit for the success of the Convention is due to the indefatigable efforts of Mr. L. Cushing, Secretary Montreal Club, Mr. G. T. Langan, Mr. W. G. Beers, Montreal, Wm. Stewart, and Alex. Falconer, Secretary Kingston Lacrosse Club. The delegates express gratitude to the latter gentlemen for many acts of kindness. The convention will meet next year in Montreal, and the succeeding year in Kingston.

NEW YORK, Sept. 30.

A Washington special says it is probable the trial of Jeff Davis will be considered in a Cabinet meeting before the Attorney General gives District Attorney Chandler of Virginia any official advice. The Herald's New Orleans despatch says: Dr. W. Cleary, Fenian Head Centre of Louisiana, and Capt. J. W. Murphy, a noted Fenian organizer, have died of yellow fever. The interments on Friday numbered 67. CINCINNATI, Sept. 29. Two men entered an Adams Express car on the Ohio and Mississippi Railroad at Seymour, Indiana, last night, secured the messenger, and robbed the safe of about \$10,000. The robbers escaped. NEW YORK, Sept. 30. A young Scotswoman named Hugh Crawford Pollock, who arrived in this city about two years since and shortly after enlisted in the 5th U. S. Cavalry as a private soldier, has by the death of his father, in Scotland, fallen heir to a baronetcy and £5,000 a year. Gen. Grant has discharged Pollock from the service. For some months past the youthful baronet has been discharging the duties of farmer of his regiment. The liberal papers of France publish the following confidential circular issued by Marshal Bazaine while in Mexico:—I request you to make known to the troops under your command that I do not allow prisoners to be made. Every person, no matter when taken, with arms in his hands, will be put to death. No exchange of prisoners will be made for the future. Our soldiers must be made thoroughly aware that they ought not to surrender their arms to such adversaries. This is a war to the death—a struggle à l'outrance between barbarism and civilization which is now entered upon. Both sides to be killed has become necessary. BAZAINE, (Signed) Marshal commanding in chief.

NEW YORK, Sept. 30.

The great gale of last night and to-day was very severe on the Hudson, causing considerable damage to vessels and cargoes. So far as known, no lives were lost. The Rev. Dr. John M. Keils, for 35 years pastor of the old Rutgers street congregation, died here this morning. KEENE, N.H., Sept. 30. Three inches of snow fell to-day in Nelson, near here. NEW YORK, Sept. 30. The National Bank at Whitestown, Oneida county, is reported as failed. Its capital, \$120,000, is understood to be wasted. NEW MILFORD, Conn., Sept. 30. Jno. J. Conklin, cashier of the First National Bank has absconded. His default to the bank, about \$50,000, was caused by stock speculation.

The number of interments from yellow fever for the 24 hours ending at 6 o'clock on Sunday morning was 61, and the number during the 24 hours ending at 6 this morning 67. MOBILE, Sept. 30. There have been but three deaths from yellow fever during the last two days.

THE OAKS COLLIERY EXPLOSION.

TWO HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-SIX BODIES IN THE MINE. An examination of the Oaks Colliery in England has been made by an exploring party. It consisted of two volunteers, who, attired in armor suits, proceeded along the south level, a distance of some sixteen and a half yards. They were without lights, but each carried the end of a string, by means of which he was enabled to signal to his companions at the bottom of the shaft. They were supplied with air from portable pumps on the top, which were found to work admirably. They groped about on each side as they went along, but no traces of human remains were discovered. They found no trace of existing fire. The box-hole is still covered with debris, consequently the bodies supposed to be there cannot yet be reached. So far everything indicates that there is no standing fire in the workings—at least, in the vicinity of the bottom, and there is now a strong feeling that there should be extra shafts and more energy displayed in recovering the bodies, seeing that on Tuesday the men were only down some three or four altogether. What the explorers will have to endure may to some extent be imagined from the fact that there are the carcasses of no less than forty-two horses in various parts of the pit, the first stables being about one hundred yards from the box-hole. With regard to the number of bodies in the workings, it may be stated that at the time of the first explosion, on the 15th of December, there were three hundred and forty persons at work in the mine. In addition to that number there were twenty-seven persons—four belonging to the colliery and twenty-three volunteers—who were killed by the following explosions. Of that total of three hundred and sixty-seven persons, there were got out, altogether, eighty-one, of whom nineteen were alive and burnt, one alive and not burnt, twenty-five dead by burning, and thirty-six dead, but not from burning. Of these got out alive only six now survive, so that there will be at the present time no less than two hundred and eighty-six bodies buried in the workings.

The United States gunboat "Lackawanna" is at anchor off Brooks Island, proving the actual existence of this lately discovered island which has been pronounced a myth. It is situated in the 28th degree of latitude, with good anchorage for the China steamships in eight fathoms of water. It will be used as a depot for these steamers, and a schooner has already taken an instalment of supplies.

Mr. Heuter tries to fix upon the *Levant Herald* the responsibility of falsehood about the release of the Abyssinian prisoners. The editor of that journal, now in London, protests against the imputation, and points out that in the first instance Mr. Heuter published the news as received direct from the British Embassy at Constantinople.

Haloxin is the name of a new species of blasting powder, which rather cleaves than crushes, a valuable property if used in coal mines; it will neither ignite spontaneously, nor by friction, nor by percussion, and its explosion gives rise neither to deleterious gases nor smoke. It is twice as bulky as gun powder, but is one-half more powerful, and is composed of sawdust nine parts, charcoal three to five parts, and nitre forty-five parts.

AFTERNOON DESPATCHES.

AMERICAN NEWS.

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 30.

The funeral of Gen. Sterling Price took place to-day, and was the largest ever seen in this city. WASHINGTON, Oct. 1. All the statements heretofore published regarding the trial of Jeff Davis have been mere surmises, and the Government has not authorized them, nor has it made any intimation of what it intends doing. It is supposed, however, that the Government will ask for further delay when the trial comes on, in November next, and that the counsel for the accused will then make a motion to enter a *nolo prosequi*.

INDIANAPOLIS, Sept. 30.

Three fires occurred at Madison, Ind., during the last 24 hours, which are supposed to be the work of incendiaries. SAVANNAH, Ga., Sept. 30. A Boston mullatto named Bradley had a gathering here of about 1,000 negroes. In the course of his harangues against white men he was interrupted and a melee occurred. A large force of police charged through the crowd. The military came to their aid. The muskets brought in by a large band of country negroes were taken by the police. LATER.—The city is now quiet. Disturbances are still threatened between the country and conservative city colored people. The military will remain under arms, but their services will probably not be needed.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 30.

The Central Pacific Railroad Company are preparing for the winter by roofing in the most exposed portions of their track. Large quantities of freight are now crossing the mountains. An Oregon and California stage company has been organized. They will transport mails and passengers from Sacramento to Portland, a distance of 700 miles.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 30.

Our consul at Demara, under date of Aug. 30, reports that yellow fever had again made its appearance there, principally among the seamen in the harbor.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 30.

The steamer Sierra Nevada brings advices from Alaska to the 20th Aug. The Copper River country is reported by the Indians and Russians to be rich in gold, copper and coal, but the savages are very hostile and warlike. The Russians, Finns, and Germans are glad to be annexed to the United States. All kinds of common vegetables are raised, and fish are very plentiful. Deer sell at 80 cents each. There is a great excitement at Victoria over the supposed volcanic eruption 65 miles distant. The colonist rejoices in the prospect of a union of British Columbia with the Canadian Dominion.

[TO EDITORS.—The Newfoundland wires are down, and there is no communication with Heart's Content.]

The amount of tonnage entering and clearing from British ports has doubled in fifteen years. Carolina recently had an interview with the Duke d'Annam, her uncle, and the Prince de Joinville. She recognized them and conversed some time, but took leave of them with coldness because they would not mention Mexico.

An English baker recently sued a man for a wedding cake ordered by the prospective bride, but as it appeared that the man had quarrelled with his fiancée before marriage for indulging in such extravagance, verdict was given for the defendant.

At an organ concert in Banzer, in which a descriptive piece representing a storm was played, one old citizen was heard to mutter something about having no umbrella, and another declared he could distinguish the words of the vesper hymn though there were no voices.
