

Dorchester demolition may begin Wednesday

Work on Westmount's Dorchester boulevard — for the long awaited widening — may begin Wednesday. The City is now calling for tenders for the demolition of some 14 properties in the area.

Bids will be opened at noon Monday. If one is deemed acceptable, council will be asked its approval that same evening at the regular monthly council meeting, a City Hall spokesman said this week.

The purchase of these properties for \$408,250 was approved on November 12. Highest amount authorized was \$108,000 for the property at 4981 Dorchester. The other payments to owners on Gladstone and Dorchester ranged from \$8,500 to \$39,000.

Deadline set

"Property owners were advised in January that the city would require the sites after October," the spokesman said. "And last month they were advised that final deadline is December 31."

Properties on the north side of Dorchester, the south side of Tupper between Atwater and Hallowell are affected. Buildings (Continued on page 2)

THE END

Cables sent to Mrs. Kennedy

In cables to Mrs. Kennedy and to the Speaker of the Senate and the House, Mayor C. H. Drury extended the sympathy of the people of Westmount on the death of President Kennedy, Friday afternoon. Flags on local public buildings were immediately dipped to half mast and by 3.30 p.m. three cables had been sent:

To Mrs. John F. Kennedy, "The Mayor, Council, and the citizens of Westmount share with you your great loss, and tender their most sincere sympathy."

To the Speakers of the Senate and the House of Representatives: "The Council, Mayor and all the citizens of Westmount share your loss of a tremendous leader."

Resident still seeks to halt Greene development

Elector-proprietors have given the go-ahead to the \$20,000,000 high rise apartment, office building and shopping mall project planned for the Greene avenue area, but one resident, at least, is still mustering forces to halt the project for a "re-examination."

He is John J. Segulier, developer of the ten million dollar "4300 Western" apartment block. He says that the City of Westmount is attempting to pass a zoning by-law for the project "in a hasty manner" and "without giving the matter proper thought which is unfair to the merchants who pay business tax and whose operations are restricted to the business zone." He also said he believed that the City was trying to "push through" the by-law. "It is strange that they should handle this matter in such an off-hand way," he added.

Restore dignity

Five proprietors in the area apparently agreed with him and voted against the by-law. This was half the number needed to force a referendum. Other property owners and merchants declared that the proposed development would "restore the dignity and prestige of eastern Westmount."

About 70 persons turned up for the public meeting Friday morning. Only actual property owners in the area were al-

lowed to address council. Mayor Drury told the session that "many hours of thought were given to the development by City Council, the Architectural Committee and its staff, all working in the best interests of Westmount and its citizens." He responded quickly to a question from the floor posed by Rev. Alex Mellor, minister of the Church of the Advent, who asked if liquor would be served anywhere in the development. The answer was a firm "no."

M. L. Silverson, owner of the property at 1347 Greene then declared that he was all for the improvement of Westmount but said that developments should not be confined to any one single area. O. Mauer, owner of property at 1370 and 1380 asked why the public meeting wasn't called before the project reached "this late stage, before the developers had gone ahead and acquired 100% of the properties." Mayor Drury said that developers had to acquire the land before any concrete plans could be drawn up. "It would be impossible for them to assemble any sizable parcel if the matter were brought up beforehand," he added.

An equal number of residents spoke in favor of the project. "The construction of a multi-million dollar apartment house and shopping properties can only improve business and increase property values," declared Max Sacoransky, proprietor

WMA's candidates for the School Board posts and for two municipal seats will be announced at the Association's semi-annual meeting on December 10. The terms of Alderman P. A. Ouimet, Commissioner of Public Works and of D. N. Byers, Public Health and Welfare, expire this year.

Local directory work is started

Work on the latest edition of the Westmount Directory and Year Book is now nearing completion and it should be distributed early in January.

A spokesman for the distribution firms which makes up the book told The Examiner this week that while many pages of the directory are closed, "we are still able to take corrections from residents on others."

YMCA campaign is short of objective

The Westmount YMCA 1963 financial campaign closed officially last night. While all receipts have not been tabulated the executive believes that about 90% of the \$10,950 objective was collected.

W. D. Macdonald, Chairman of the Westmount division, commenting on results to date, said, "We reached our objective last year but it took us till March, 1963 before the final card was completed. We sincerely hope our prospective givers will co-operate with our canvassers in sending in their donations without delay."

G. L. Welton, Executive Secre-

tary, said "We are slightly ahead of the same period last year, but we are worried about the 328 cards still unreported. The success or failure of the campaign is in these cards. We are confident our workers will complete every card as soon as possible thereby guaranteeing that Westmount 'Y' will reach its objective."

During the three week campaign period November 11-28, 89 volunteer workers, divided into 20 teams visited 1,100 Westmount homes and firms.

Mr. Merriman reported that

"I feel that the value of the small private society such as ours is that we are able to give immediate emergency assistance with the minimum of red tape... this is rewarding work," said Miss Haslam.

Archbishop John Dixon, Arthur L. Melling, Westmount, and Henry G. Norman, of Hudson Heights, Que., were named Honorary Presidents at the meeting. Rt. Rev. R. Kenneth Maguire, Lord Bishop of the Diocese of Montreal, was appointed Honorary Vice-President.

The Students council rented a large projection type television apparatus and students were able to watch portions of the funeral ceremonies on a ten foot square screen set up in the auditorium.

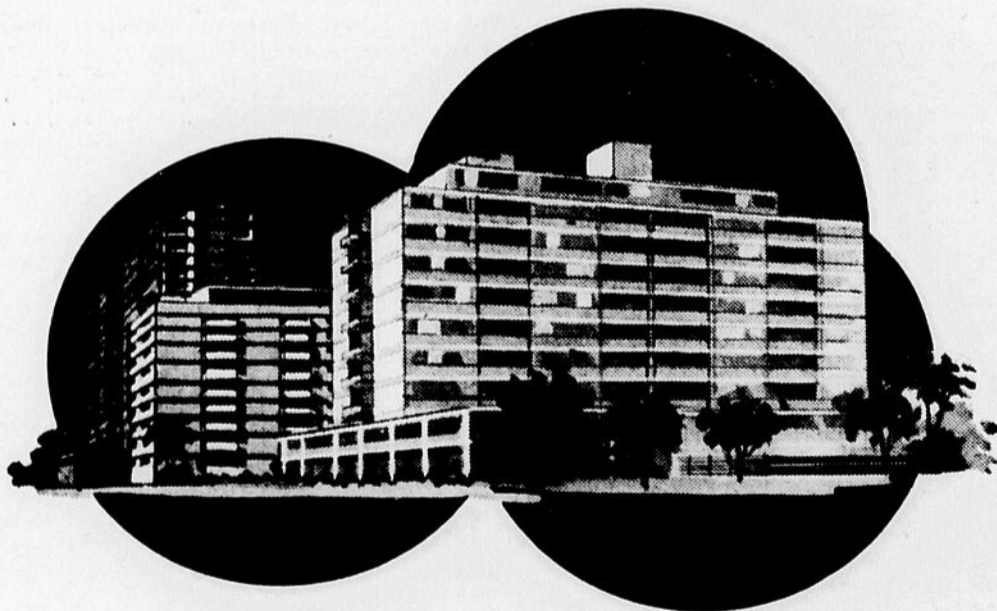

Westmount Hobby Show interest is growing

The Executive Officers for the 27th Hobby Show have been hard at work recruiting the three dozen or more "committee officers" to operate the Show during the Easter Holiday — April 1-2-3-4, 1964.

The main Executive is: general chairman, Miss Doreen Connors; vice-chairman, Chris Blair; secretary, Miss JoAnne Cohen, YMCA Staff Advisor, Ron Watt.

This is the first time in many years that the Hobby Show Executive has started so soon to prepare for the next Show. The success of last years Show has stimulated a great deal of interest on the part of the teenagers who organize it and the younger committee members who worked on the groups last year.

Over 160 young people worked on committees, helped guard exhibits or did many other odd jobs in the 26th Show. There were over 250 exhibitors and competitors and over 600 exhibits in the last Show. This was over three times that of any previous Show. It has also been estimated that over 10,000 working man-hours went into its preparation.

A new age group has been introduced. This is called the Bantams for boys and girls 8 years and under. Other age groups are: Junior — 9-11 years, Intermediate — 12-14 years, Senior 15-17 years. There will also be another trophy added to the existing four. There may also be two more trophies added to the Gymnastic section of the Show.

The Gymnastic Competition will see many changes this year, because it will be restricted to Westmount youngsters only and

will be designed to help youngsters who are just learning gymnastics and will also be able to compete at their own level of standards rather than against someone who competes in other Provincial Gymnastic competitions.

The YMCA Youth Committee has taken on the task of preparing the "spectacular" Live Displays and Special Events that will take place during the Show on one or two evenings. These are designed to stimulate youngsters with NEW ideas for hobbies or how to improve the ones they now have.

In about two weeks there will be a special Bulletin circulated to Everyone who exhibited, competed in or was on a committee OR had any official part in the 26th Hobby Show. Applications will be accepted from any boys and girls who are interested in working on one of the Hobby Show Committees. These applications will be reviewed by the Executive for final approval and appointment to a committee. Forms will be available from Ron Watt, after chirstmas.

All subway work in this municipality will be done by Montreal, under contract. Plans call for construction of main subway platforms astride the Westmount-Montreal border.

Beyond the station tracks will the subway through Westmount extend to within 100 feet of Greene avenue to be used at first for storing trains and later possibly "for the extension of Western, officials reported.

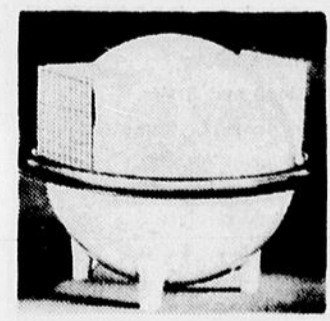
Hart Singers plan debut here Dec. 5

26 Years Ago in The Examiner Nov. 24, 1937

The crying need behind the demand for a Metropolitan Boulevard is for a Western outlet from Montreal, a local traffic engineer declared this week at a Westmount Municipal Association meeting.

He said the route he advocated would lie south of the CNR right of way from Ste. Anne de Bellevue to Dorval where it would branch into two, one route following the present Cote de Liesse and the other continuing along the railway route to Ville St. Pierre, where an overpass would bring the road over the railway and into the city.

Montreal, he held, is a terminal city and not a bypass town and the proposed Boulevard should lead directly into it. The northern branch of the route proposed by the government would serve traffic going to the northern part of the city while the southern branch would provide direct access to the central part of the metropolis. He said that the distance was considerably shorter via the southern route.

The greater percentage of the population, he said, lives south of the railway tracks between St. Anne's and Lachine and the southern route would be of more use on that account than the northern one. The new highway would relieve congestion on the Lakeshore road, he said, and would be considerably cheaper to traffic, as most of it went to the southern part of the city anyway.

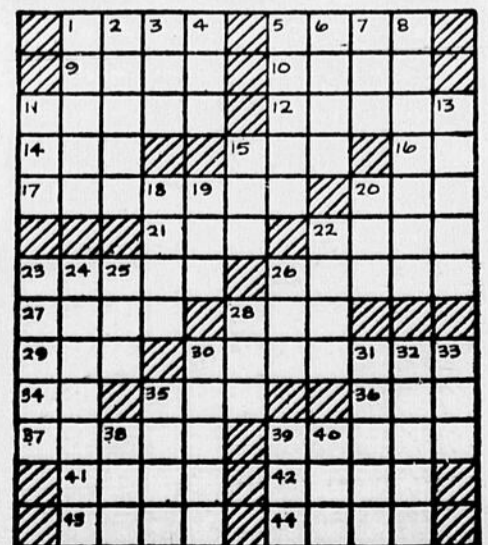

Much discussion, but no opposition to \$865,000 municipal loan by-law

The City's \$865,000 loan by-law met no opposition last Thursday night at a public meeting for all elector-proprietors in Westmount. About 25 residents took more than the usual interest in public work bills and questioned council for 40 minutes. The bill was then unanimously passed.

The loan covers the cost of sidewalks, park improvements, purchase of equipment and property construction of and improvements to public buildings and for the creation of a parking lot on Greene avenue.

The complete text follows:

Whereas it is necessary to provide for the carrying out of certain public works and for the purchase of equipment and property as hereinafter more particularly set forth;

SECTION ONE —

The City, as and when determined by the Council during the next twelve months or within such other period as the Council may hereafter decide, shall proceed to construct and improve sidewalks, parks and playgrounds, plant and equipment; to purchase property and equipment, the whole as hereinafter set forth.

SECTION TWO —

The City may issue debentures from time to time to the total face value of Eight hundred and fifty-six thousand dollars (\$856,000), the proceeds of which shall be applied to the cost of the said works, equipment, improvements and property as hereinafter more particularly provided.

SECTION THREE —

The particulars and estimates of the cost of said works and improvements are set out in Groups "1", "2" and "3" of this section as follows: —

GROUP "1" (Period of assessment 10 years)

Radio communication equipment for Police Force.

Emergency equipment for Civil protection.

Equipment, refurbishing and lighting improvements for Victoria Hall, \$15,500.

Discounts, debenture issue expenses and contingencies \$1,500. Total — \$17,000.

GROUP "2" (Period of assessment 20 years)

Renovation to lower corridor, restrooms, Oak and Green Rooms in Victoria Hall.

Reinforcement of floor slab in apparatus of floor slab in apparatus area in No. 2 Fire Station \$16,750.

Sidewalks at various locations \$50,000.

Discounts, debenture issue expenses and contingencies \$5,250. Total \$72,000.

GROUP "3" (Period of assessment 30 years)

New buildings and improvements in Corporation Yard, \$200,000.

Land for and construction of Parking Lot on Greene Avenue, \$210,000.

Alterations to building at City Hall, \$200,000.

Improvements, Westmount Park.

Ski run at Summit Park, \$100,000.

Catch basins in various locations, \$700.

Discounts, debenture issue expenses and contingencies \$56,300. Total \$767,000.

Grand total \$856,000.

SECTION FOUR —

If the actual cost of any such works or improvements shall be less than the amount of the estimated cost thereof as set out in Section Three, the balance of such amount may be used to defray the cost of any of the other works and improvements mentioned in said section.

SECTION FIVE —

Debentures issued under this by-law may be serial debentures or straight-term debentures and shall be payable as follows: —

a) If they are serial debentures — Those to be issued for the purposes mentioned in Group "1" of Section Three shall be payable in ten annual instalments, during the ten years following the date or dates of issue, at the times and in the amounts set forth in Schedule "C" attached hereto;

Those to be issued for the purposes mentioned in Group "2" of Section Three shall be payable in twenty annual instalments, during the twenty years following the date or dates of issue, at the times and in the amounts set forth in Schedule "A" attached hereto;

Those to be issued for the purposes mentioned in Group "3" of Section Three shall be payable in thirty annual instalments, during the thirty years following the date or dates of issue, at the times and in the amounts set forth in Schedule "D" attached hereto.

b) If they are straight-term debentures —

Those to be issued for the purposes mentioned in Group "1" of Section Three shall be payable at the expiration of ten years from the date or dates of issue;

Those to be issued for the purposes mentioned in group "2" of Section Three shall be payable at the expiration of twenty years from the date or dates of issue;

Those to be issued for the purposes mentioned in Group "3" of Section Three shall be payable at the expiration of thirty years from the date or dates of issue.

SECTION SIX —

The said debentures shall be issued in denominations of one hundred dollars (\$100.) or in such multiple or multiples thereof as the Council may determine, and all such debentures shall bear interest at a rate not exceeding six percent (6%) per annum payable half-yearly on the first day of May and the first day of Nov-

ember in each year, which interest payment shall be represented by coupons attached to each debenture and bearing the number thereof. These coupons shall be payable to the bearer only at the same places as the principal.

SECTION SEVEN —

The rate or rates of interest shall be determined by resolution of the City Council at the time of issue.

SECTION EIGHT —

The said debentures shall be made payable to bearer or the duly registered holder thereof in lawful money of Canada at their face value at the main office of the Bank of Montreal in Montreal or at any branch of the said bank in Canada.

SECTION NINE —

The said debentures shall bear the seal of the City and shall be signed by the Mayor and the City Clerk in office at the time such debentures are issued and each coupon shall bear a facsimile of such signatures.

SECTION TEN —

The said debentures shall bear such date or dates as the Council may order or direct when deciding to issue them or any of them, and the Council by resolution may order that any such debentures may be sold at one time or from time to time and may arrange from time to time to provide for the cost of any of the said works by pledge of said debentures or any of them.

SECTION ELEVEN —

The said debentures shall not

be subject to redemption by anticipation.

SECTION TWELVE —

In order to meet the interest payments on all said debentures and to provide for payment of the instalments of principal if serial debentures are issued as aforesaid and in order to establish a sinking fund if the said debentures are issued for a straight term or terms, a sum sufficient for such purpose shall be raised by means of a special general assessment against the taxable immoveable property of the whole City made each year according to the valuation roll in force in such year from the date or dates of issue as aforesaid, and during the said periods of ten, twenty and thirty years as the case may be and at such time as the Council by resolution may determine, and for that purpose a special tax is hereby imposed on said immoveable property; and the proceeds of all such assessments shall be applied to the payment of the said debentures and interest.

SECTION THIRTEEN

The present by-law shall come into force according to law.

WHAT GRADE? — SURPRISES!

Some years ago, 1959 to be exact, I wrote a column entitled, "Grievous, Glorified Grading" which certainly caused extensive comment. I compared the gradings of the identical selections in the McGill University, The Royal Conservatory (University of Toronto) examinations and the Piano Teacher's Guide by Schirmer Publishing Company. (Now out of print).

The differences of opinion for the same pieces are really astounding. Lately, I have had to explain several times that certain pieces may be more difficult for one person than another. At one of the addresses I gave at Westward Rotary Club, I mentioned publicly that the compositions in the Intermediate Piano Examination Book could be found in Toronto or Royal if you prefer, grade nine. (The selections in this McGill exam book continue to be recognized as Grade Nine, if the student wishes to use the Intermediate book instead). Since that time McGill has changed to the

numerical grades instead of "Primary" up to "Highest." Numerous pieces do not correspond in grading.

Many queries

The reason for today's article stems from queries about the Festival pieces. What is chosen is the opinion of the selection committee and the entrants must abide by their judgement, it is final.

For the third time the Prelude in F major, a very pleasant work by Canadian composer Godfrey Ridout is a test piece but each time it is in a different age group. This is surprising, isn't it?

Last year it was in the 13 years and under age group in the Music Contests of the Notre Dame de Grace Arts and Letters Festival — this year it is listed in the 11 and under for the Montreal-Kiwanis. The first time it appeared was in the 14 years and under (if memory serves) in the N.D.G. Contests several years ago.

Another piece in the N.D.G. last year was Beethoven's Bagatelle in E flat, opus 33 no. 1, listed for the 15 years and under group. The same number is in Grade 9 exam McGill and the Schirmer Guide Grade Three.

The Golliwogg's Cake Walk by Debussy, grade 9 McGill was in the St. Laurent Music Festival 1963 for 17 years and under and in the Quebec Festivals 1960 for the 16 and under group.

Several pieces in the Toronto Royal Conservatory of Music Grade V bring a surprise. The first selection in the book, a Sonatina by Schmitt was the test piece for the Montreal-Kiwanis last year 12 years and under . . . the next piece, Mechanical Doll by Shostakovich was in the 11 and under Montreal-Kiwanis and in the N.D.G. Music Contests for the 9 and under!

This year "In The Village" by Mirsalis (same book Grade V) is for the 10 and under for Montreal-Kiwanis and on page 26 (same book) Little Prelude no. 2 by Bach is a test piece this year for Kiwanis, 12 years and under.

So we have in the Toronto Grade Five Piano Exam book pieces for 12 years, 11 years, 10 years and 9 years!!!

Grading is a matter of opinion and the number of years a pupil has studied must be taken into consideration. Ability and Amount Of Practise are two other factors.

To close today's article, I will quote the last paragraph of the article which I referred to from 1959 because it holds exactly the same weight today. "WHAT DOES GRADING MEAN? IS IT RAISED TO BOOST THE EGO OF THE PLAYER? IS IT MADE A HIGHER NUMBER TO MAKE A PARENT THINK HIS CHILD IS BETTER THAN HE IS? OR IS IT TO CAMOUFLAGE THE LOWER STANDARDS OF THE PRESENT ERA?"

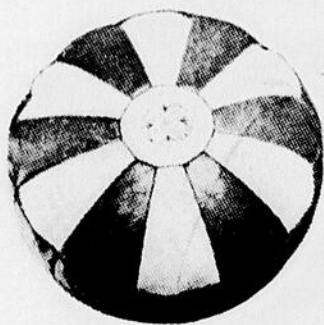

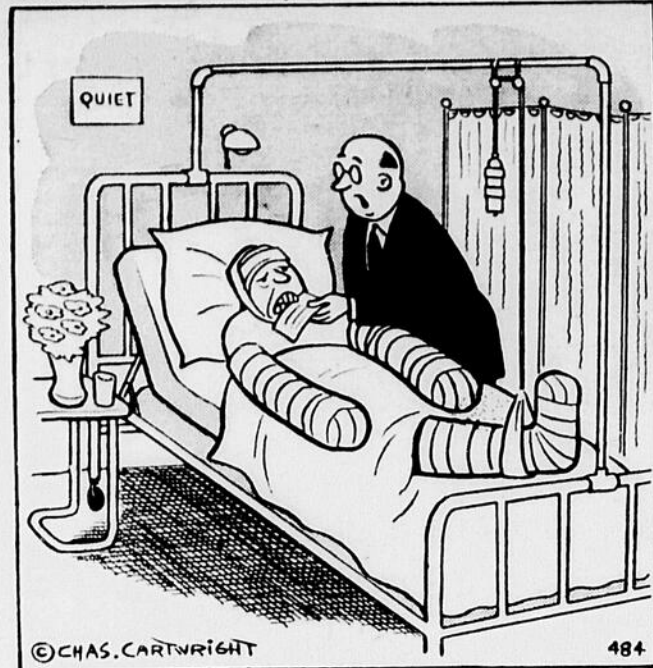

Safe-Driving Week begins this Saturday

"If there's any reason why a single person should die in traffic between December 1 and 7, we would like to know what it is," said W. Arch Bryce, executive director of the Canadian Highway Safety Council.

December 1 to 7 will be Safe-

Driving Week in Canada, sponsored by the Council with the assistance of provincial and municipal safety organizations, the news media, police, clergy, magistrates, judges, women's and youth groups, service clubs and many others.

In 1962, 70 persons died on the roads and streets of Canada between those dates. In 1961, 55 died during Safe-Driving Week. Unless motorists and pedestrians have come to realize the futility and peril of inattention, carelessness and stupidity in traffic, CHSC fears the nation's road toll between December 1 and 7 this year will reach 56. That includes six in British Columbia, nine in the prairies, 21 in Ontario, 13 in Quebec and seven in the Atlantic provinces.

"The simple solution," said Mr. Bryce, "is 'drive and walk safely'. But unless every individual driver and walker forces himself to know the dangers of modern-day traffic, such a simple slogan is of no help at all."

Medical centre is planned

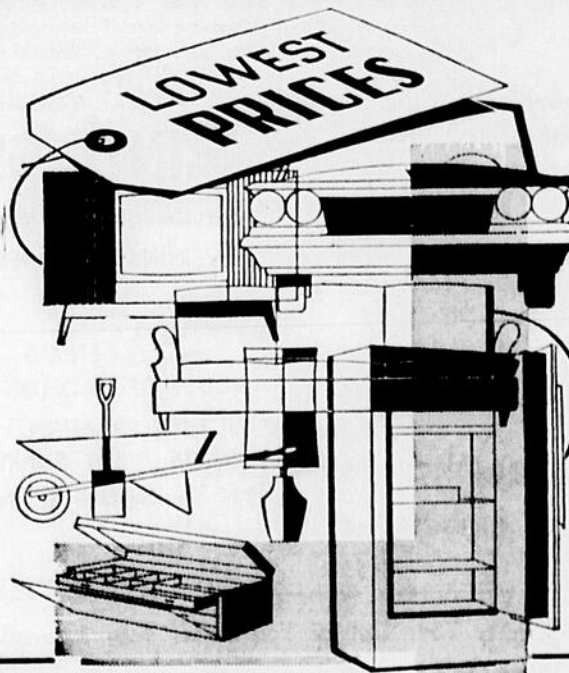
