## Canon A. H. Davis To Be Honoured

A luncheon under the auspices of the Missionary Committee of the Diocese of Montreal will be held in Anglican House in honour of Canon A. H. Davis, D.D., Tuesday, January 8th at 12.30 p.m.

The chairman of the Missionary Committee Ven. Archdeacon I. M. Lidstone, will preside at the luncheon and Canon Davis will speak on his visit to overseas countries. He went abroad for six months on behalf of the Board of Management and Executive Committee of the M.S.C.C. to visit the overseas work of the Canadian Church in the following areas of the world—Jordan, India, Pakistan, Hong Kong and Japan. During that period Canon Davis attended the General Synods of the Church of India, Pakistan, Burma and Ceylon in Colombo, Ceylon, of the Church of South India in Trichinopoly, South India, and of the Nippon Seikokai in Kobe, Japan.

Canon Davis was born in England, but educated in Toronto where he received his B. A. at University College, University of Toronto and L. Th. from Wycliffe College, Toronto, and later an honorary D. D. from the same college. He served in England for a time, but returned to the Diocese of Niagara where he was rector of Holy Trinity Church, Welland, and Archdeacon of Lincoln and Welland prior to his appointment as Field Secretary of the M. S. C. C.

## Expansion Is Scheduled For 'The Examiner' As Change In Paper's Ownership Announced

The Examiner starts the New Year with expansion plans that promise to give this newspaper new high standards of service to the community.

Hugh E. McCormick, founder of The Monitor in 1925, has announced that he has sold a controlling interest in the Monitor Publishing Company Limited to Monitor Publishing Enterprises Limited. He will remain at the helm, continuing as president of the firm he started and built.

Newly associated with Mr. McCormick will be John W.

Sancton, like Mr. McCormick a native of Notre Dame de Grace, as managing director and publisher of the Monitor group of weekly newspapers, which includes The Monitor, The Verdun Guardian and The Examiner in Westmount.

Added to the board of directors as well will be Miss Margaret Aitken, M.P., and Kenneth Hatton, for six years a key member of the organization particularly in sales and service on the company's major printing products. Under its new expansion

plans, Monitor Publishing Co. Ltd. will carry on and further develop the growing field of weekly newspapers and rotary commercial printing in which it has been a pioneer and pre-eminent in the Montreal area.

The firm moved into its present extensive plant at the foot of N.D.G.'s Hampton avenue in 1936, where the business has continued to grow. In addition to its own three papers, the company regularly prints eight other weekly papers and large house organs as well as a wide range

of commercial rotary-press products, including colored and black-and-white circulars in large volume for the retail trade.

Mr. McCormick is a well known sportsman-editor, who, after early experience with the Montreal Standard and Montreal Herald, launched The Monitor weekly in his native Notre Dame de Grace suburb to serve the rapidly expanding Montreal West-end district. He launched the Westmount Examiner in 1930 and purchased the Verdun (Continued on Page 2)

## Boy's Parliament at LCC Debated Interest Subjects

The youngest Canadian Boy's Parliament prorogued here Saturday noon at Lower Canada College, where for four days, fifty delegates between the ages of 14 and 21 debated matters of public interest.

The parliament, sponsored by the Council of Christian Education, is to promote "Christ-centred boys' work" throughout Quebec province.

George S. Mooney, co-director of the city's tourist and industrial bureau, executive di-

rector of the Canadian Federation of Mayors and Municipalities and director of the St. Lawrence Municipal Bureau, acted as lieutenant governor, reading the Speech from the Throne.

Mr. Mooney complimented the parliament on its "considerable growth during these last few years."

He said that three boys had been selected from each church and that the Quebec Boys Parliament was the youngest in Canada.

The Parliament is patterned after that which governs this country and gives each of the delegates a "working knowledge of parliamentary procedure while tying them to the work of their church."

Before being accepted into the Parliament each of the boys signed the "Oath of Allegiance" to the "King of Kings."

### Many Bills

Among the bills to be enacted is the Finance Act 1957. The boys will try to raise \$1,200 to further their work throughout the province. A resolution regarding "Christian life and duty" in which the boys are challenged "to meet God face to face" will also be drawn up. A

bill to amend the Publications Act was discussed.

Leaders of this year's parliament were: Speaker, Don Luke, of Westmount; premier, Kent Garrett, of Montreal West; leader of the opposition, Buddy Oliver, of East Farnham; ranking cabinet minister and minister of devotional affairs, Douglas Warren, of Lachine; minister of finance, Ross Bailey, of Valois; minister of boys' work, Ronald Gibbs, of Danville.

Others were: minister of publications, David Vidler, of N.D.G.; deputy speaker, Warren Brown, of Cowansville; clerk of the house, David Osborne, of Valois, and sergeant-at-arms, John Malorni, of Montreal.

Chaplain for the Parliament was Rev. Kenneth Gillespie of Toronto.

Bible study courses and leadership training sessions were conducted by Prof. John Hughes, retired head of the education department at McGill University, and E. G. Jones, Rev. George Connolly, and Rev. J. Lehman.

Ted Jones was registrar, and recreational direction was under Walter Gillen.

The young delegates ate, slept played at Lower Canada College during their stay. The school's student body was away for the Christmas holidays.

Active in community affairs, Mr. McCormick is a governor of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital, a former director of the Montreal Advertising and Sales Executive Club, a past president of Montreal Westward Rotary Club and a past president of the N.D.G. Business Men's Association. In August he was chairman of the 37th annual convention of the Canadian Weekly Newspapers Association at Murray Bay, Que., and elected its second vice-president. Last year he represented the CWNA at the Commonwealth Press Union meeting in Australia and this year led a CWNA tour of Europe.

Mr. Sancton is, like Mr. McCormick, a native of Notre Dame de Grace. He was schooled here and in Westmount and is now a resident of Hampstead, part of the Monitor's west end area. He, too, started in newspaper work as a schoolboy and has served on the Sherbrooke Daily Record, The Gazette of Montreal of which he was onetime city editor, the weekly Stanstead Journal of Rock Island, Que., of which he was owner-editor-publisher, and the Daily Gleaner, Fredericton, N.B., as managing editor. Latterly he has been studying newspaper production methods in the United Kingdom and, since his return, has been on the editorial staff of The Montreal Star.

Miss Aitken is a nationally known newspaperwoman, a daily columnist with the Toronto Telegram and the Vancouver Herald an author and a member of the Federal Parliament.

Mr. Hatton has been in the newspaper and printing business for over 15 years and published the Suburban News on the South Shore. He also was advertising manager of United Amusement Corp. Ltd., Montreal's largest moving picture theatre chain, prior to joining the Monitor organization in 1950.

Other continuing directors of Monitor Publishing Co. Ltd. are Harry B. Houghton, general manager, and Harry V. Stoddard, director of advertising.

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## No Peace On Earth, Ill-Will To Men Is Evident In Israel At Year's End

(Jack Hirshberg, former local resident and Monitor Hollywood correspondent, sends this column from abroad, where he has been covering the making of a motion picture with a Paris locale, and looking into the Israeli-Arab war while the chance offers.)

ABOARD EL AL FLIGHT, January 2 — Once you've downed a few whiskey sours and re-read the European edition of Life there isn't too much to do but think as El Al's Constellation wings its way from Israel to London, the blue Mediterranean below and Rome ahead.

And there is plenty to think about, thoughts to be crystallized, memories to be orientated. You recall with a smile, for instance, the sign in a Tel Aviv shop window:

"English Spoken Here; American Understood!"

And you remember your aching feet on Saturdays. Buses do not run in Israel on the Sabbath. You drive your own car — or walk.

Your thoughts wander to the young Israelis who till the soil with one eye constantly on the lookout for invaders and one ear constantly alerted for the sound of sniper fire.

And the picture in your mind's eye dissolves to show once again the orthodox, bearded Jews who of their own accord live in the old Jerusalem ghetto, a sect unto themselves which still refuses to recognize the independence of their own state. Here a woman cuts off all her hair when she marries, and remains shaven all her life in order not to appear attractive to other men.

You cannot help but wonder how the poor husband feels about it, though.

\* \* \*

You are cheered as you remember Christmas in the Holy Land, and the gay lights on the YMCA tower across the street from the King David Hotel (where, incidentally, the menu is in neither Hebrew nor English but in French). You do not readily forget standing at the Mandelbaum Gate which separates Arab and Israeli sectors of the divided city. The "gate" is merely a barbed-wire barrier across the road outside a home once owned by the Mandelbaum family. The house is now a shambles. It caught gunfire from both directions.

Happier, perhaps, are recollections of balmy nights at the movies — the current hit is "The Constant Wife" starring Rex Harrison with dialogue in English and Hebrew subtitles — or listening to the Israel Philharmonic as its shirtsleeved musi-



cian cheek may be admirable, but there is a point of no return.

\* \* \*

When will it end, this war which has never stopped since Israel was born? When will the world's youngest democracy be allowed to settle down and devote its full energies to the chore of providing a better life for Jew, Moslem and Christian, alike?

I put the question to the 48-year-old editor of a major newspaper.

"Peace? Never in our time. I'm afraid", he replied.

\* \* \*

Yesterday I looked at the neglected Judaea hills, at the Dead Sea (the lowest place on earth), at the Moab Mountains where Moses stood when over 3,000 years ago he told earlier refugees from Egypt to enter the land of Canaan. I noted the walls of the Old City and the two black domes of the Mosque of Omar, the second most important religious place for the Arabs. On this spot were built the temples in King Solomon's day.

I gazed at the Mount of Olives with a Russian church at its summit, and nearby the oldest Jewish cemetery in the world. Just below it is the Garden of Gethsemane and the Tomb of the Holy Mother and not far to the left is Mt. Zion where King David is popularly believed to be buried, though his tomb has never been authenticated.

In this vital area were born the world's three dominant religions, all preaching pretty much the same lesson of brotherly love and the sanctity of the individual because the individual is the creation of the Supreme Being.

As our plane shoots through the starswept sky toward Lon-

don and home you wonder how so many people can pay lip service to so exalted a concept — yet ignore it in their daily actions.

Perhaps, you tell yourself . . . perhaps 1957 will bring the dawn of common sense to a world very much in trouble.

\* \* \*

Poker is outlawed in Israel, as are craps and 21, but bridge is okay and a national lottery raises vast sums of money.

Too frightening ever to forget are the urns containing ashes of those cremated in Hitler's hate ovens — and the yellow bars of soap which you learn were made from the human fat of murdered German Jews, with a few Catholics tossed in for good measure. You realize, too, that Hitler's spirit still lives when you dial Egyptian radio and hear the big lie as broadcast by Colonel Nasser's propaganda machine, organized and run by a former lieutenant of Herr Joseph Goebbels.

You think back to dinner in the lovely gardens at the King David Hotel where the cool of the night is shattered every so often by a trigger-happy Jordanian sniper on a hill close by. But, while the visiting correspondent notes such matters he notes, too, that they fail to distract the residents from their day-to-day living. Here murder is commonplace, and time is too precious to waste on worry. Israelis, with much patience, take killing and suicide commando raids in stride, hoping the United Nations will act to protect them.

When no such action is forthcoming they move to protect themselves. Turning the other

## March Of Dimes

Salk vaccination programs undoubtedly contributed to the decline in incidence of poliomyelitis in Canada during 1956, although, unfortunately Quebec, with a 40 per cent increase in paralytic cases, was an exception.

The Salk formula, and possibly other vaccines not yet perfected, should in time reduce polio to a relatively minor position among crippling diseases, but there is a numerous group that the Salk program cannot help.

These are the thousands of children and adults who have been crippled by the disease. Salk vaccine can safeguard people against getting polio, but it cannot help those who already have it.

Rehabilitation programs — physio — and occupational therapy, speech, therapy, hydrotherapy, reconstructive surgery, prosthetic appliances, economic aid, and vocational training — must be provided for these people for whom the Salk vaccine came too late, as well as for those for whom the vaccine has not proved effective.

One of the tasks the Quebec Chapter, Canadian Foundation for Poliomyelitis, has undertaken is a survey to discover all polio cases in the Province of Quebec that are in need of rehabilitation and to bring to them the skills of modern physical medicine and other rehabilitation care. Another of the chapter's programs is the training of physiotherapists and other personnel to carry out the rehabilitation programs.

In its 1957 Campaign the chapter's Quebec March of Dimes is seeking \$120,000. The figure is approximately equal to the total cost of the chapter's rehabilitation programs during 1956, when 500 cases were added to its active case load. The chapter is now caring for 1,050 active polio cases. The survey will without doubt add considerably to this load.

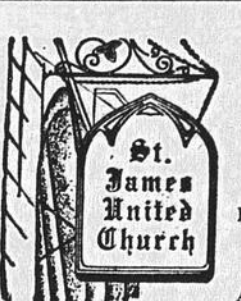

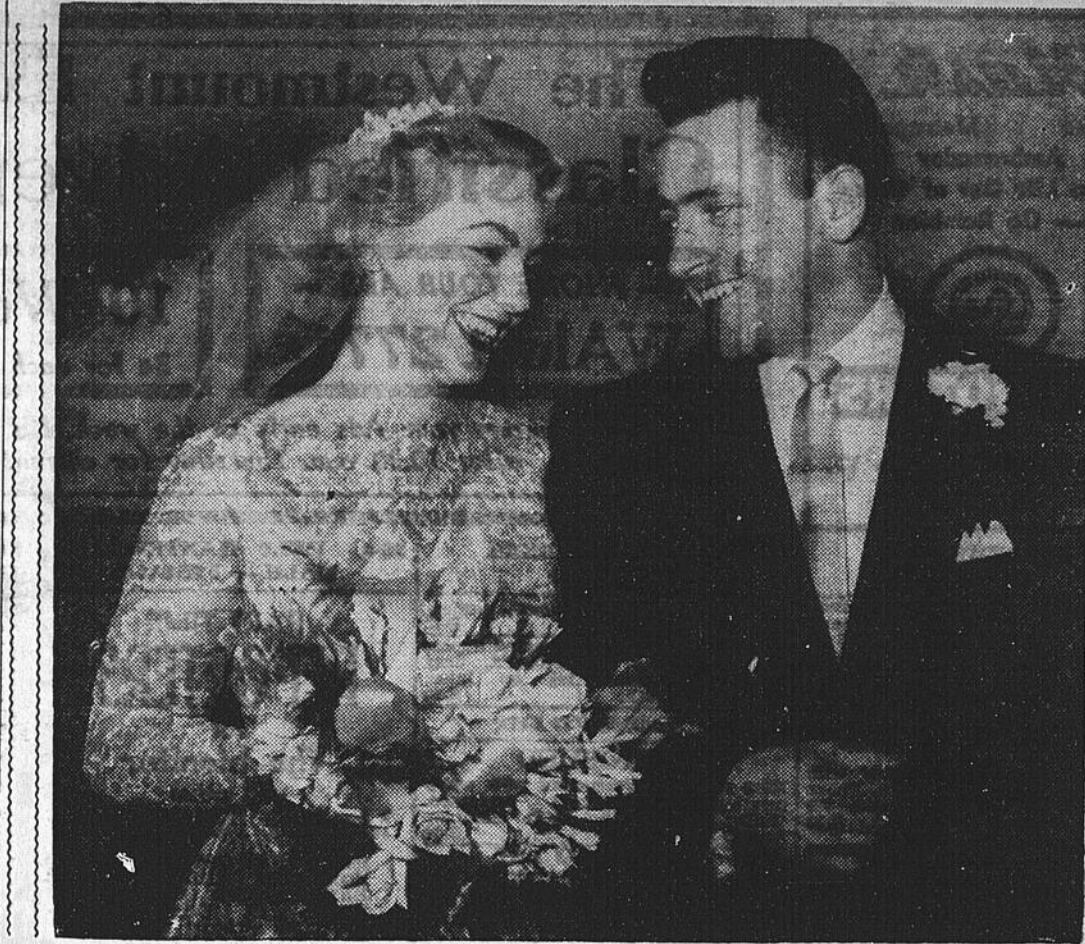

### Homemaker Service Demand, Is Greater Than Welfare Supply

The Family Welfare Association can provide homemaker service only in families where more than one young child needs attention during his mother's illness or because she has deserted her family, according to Miss Henrietta Harvie of the Red Feather Association. The Montreal service is one of the oldest in the country and will be participating in the national committee recently established by the Family and Child Welfare Division of the Canadian Welfare Council. The first meeting of the new committee was held in Toronto earlier this month.

Homemaker service consists of placing a qualified housekeeper in a family's home, to act as a substitute mother during the real mother's absence, Miss Harvie said. A shortage of workers and the high cost of the service has limited it so far, and the demand always exceeds the supply.

The new committee's long term purposes are to promote extension of service and develop national standards. So far, help has only been available to families with young children and no service has been given to the elderly or the chronically ill, both groups which definitely require homemaker service, Miss Harvie said.

### "Mayflower" Will Have Towels from Scotland

When the modern reproduction of the "Mayflower", the ship in which the Pilgrim Fathers sailed from the Old to the New World, leaves Plymouth next spring, she will take with her some examples of Scottish craftsmanship. One firm in Scotland is donating the sails made from Scottish flax, another the rigging, and a third is providing the linen towels for the ship's company.

Considerable research went on before the designers of Robert Stocks and Company Ltd., of Kirkaldy, finally began work on these towels, for the idea was to weave them as would have been done in the 17th century. As a tribute to the 20th century, they also show reproductions of the ship and the legend "Mayflower 1620". Red, blue, green and yellow have been chosen as the basic colours, and after the ship has left on its voyage, similar towels will be on sale in overseas markets.
