THE GOVERNMENT TRIED TO FORCE MILITIA ESTIMATES THROUGH.

The Government Tried to Force Militia Estimates Through.

THE OPPOSITION OBJECTED.

And the House Sat Until Yesterday Afternoon.

SIR CHAS. TUPPER INTERVENED.

Sir Wilfred Laurier Explains the Transaction in Connection With the Purchase of His House.

Ottawa, July 11. — The programme of business has been a little shattered by last night's events. Down to midnight the proceedings went forward in peace, if not with harmony. After Sir Charles Tupper had commended part of the policy of the Militia Department, but had condemned the sending of troops to the Yukon, he went home. Afterward Mr. Borden was asked to fulfill his promise for particulars re the late contract, which was to have been given last evening. Mr. Borden insisted that several items of the estimates be first passed, but finally consented to furnish the statement. These statements showed that Mr. Borden was wrong last year when he informed the House that the Government did not pay freight on these goods. The discussion continued on these items until toward morning, when the Opposition asked for adjournment. Mr. Fielding, who was leading the House, declared that the House must pass the whole militia vote but one item, before an adjournment could be made. A million-dollar, including supplies of all kinds for the department, the Opposition members did not feel disposed to be choked off in this manner. Consequently the House adjourned last night and in eleven this morning, when Sir Charles Tupper appeared. The Opposition leader urged the Government to give up its arbitrary course. Messrs. Fielding, Blair, Clarke Wallace and others gave their version of the reason for the deadlock. Finally, on a proposal of Sir Charles, the house took recess until 10 a.m., resuming at three and continuing the discussion of the militia clothing contracts. In the course of the afternoon Sir Wilfred Laurier made a statement in reference to a remark made last night by Mr. Taylor, M.P., bearing on the report that Sir H. W. Bates, of Ottawa, had given Sir Wilfred Laurier the house he lives in. Sir Wilfred said that when he came to Ottawa he bought his house from a man named Leslie, paying \$5000 cash and a mortgage for the balance \$4500. He had given a note for the balance and had not yet been able to pay it. Mr. Taylor accepted the Premier's statement, remarking that he was glad the report had been corrected. Sir Wilfred Laurier said the report probably rose from the fact that he had offered a furnished house, but had declined it.

BATTERY ORDERED TO SOUTH AFRICA.

Making the Fifth Field Battery for the Cape.

THIRTY MACHINE GUNS SHIPPED.

THE GUN CARRIAGES OF THESE BATTERIES ARE BEING PAINTED TO MATCH THE LOCAL COLOR.

London, July 11. — The Seventy-third Battery of Artillery has been ordered to South Africa, making the fifth battery of field artillery now under orders for the Cape. All the gun carriages of these batteries are being painted to match the local color. Thirty machine guns were shipped to the Transvaal to-day.

DIED OF LOOKIAW.

Was Celebrating the 4th of July When He Shot His Hand.

Passaic, N. J., July 11. — Justice J. A. Grosky died last night in this city of lookiaw. On the 4th of July, while celebrating the day, he was accidentally shot in the hand, fetanus developed. Serum was injected into his brain as part of the treatment, but his life was not saved.

VENEZUELAN COMMISSION.

The Attorney-General Continues His Address — Members Photographed.

Paris, July 11. — At to-day's session of the Venezuela Arbitration Commission, Sir Richard Webster, the British Attorney-General, continued his argument in behalf of the case of Great Britain. At the close of the session of the Commission, the members were photographed.

REPORTED LOST.

London, July 11. — The British steamer Marie, Capt. Stovry, last reported at Barcelona, on June 20th, from Sunderland, is reported to have struck on the Island of Usant, off the coast of Brittany, at the entrance of the English Channel and sunk last night during the thick weather. All on board were saved.

THE DRUCE CLAIM.

\$10,000 Subscribed to Prosecute the Case—Another \$10,000 Promised.

London, July 11. — The Pall Mall Gazette says a syndicate in the city has subscribed \$10,000 to prosecute the Druce claim to the dukedom of Portland and that arrangements have been concluded for the subscribing of another \$10,000.

VISITED THE HOUSE OF LORDS.

Invited the Lord High Chancellor to Visit Pennsylvania.

London, July 11. — Prof. Pepper, of Philadelphia, visited the House of Lords this afternoon and was introduced to the Lord High Chancellor, Earl Halsbury, by the United States ambassador. The professor professed to have been invited on an invitation on behalf of the faculty of the university of Pennsylvania to attend the opening of the new Law School.

BOXING MATCH.

A very large audience was present last evening at the Jacques Cartier Hall to witness a boxing match between Ed. Lachapelle of this city and Come Leclere, of St. Hyacinthe, but the spectators were anything but pleased at result of the match. The evening's entertainment commenced with a coon song by Professor Brown and was followed by a four-round bout between M. Galibis, of this city, and M. Morin, of St. Hyacinthe. There was quite a little excitement for the time but Leclere would not put on the gloves again. Naturally those who paid to see a good boxing match were very much disappointed at the result and promised that the next time they would attend a similar contest they would do so in some other place. The referee who knows something about boxing was apparently very ignorant of the Queensbury rules and should not have allowed the pugilists to argue the matter in his presence. If the fight had continued it was a general opinion that Leclere would have won.

OFF TO THE PHILIPPINES.

GENERAL JOSEPH E. WHEELER LEAVES WASHINGTON FOR THE SCENE OF HOSTILITIES — WILL TAKE A SUBORDINATE POSITION.

Washington, July 11. — Gen. Joseph E. Wheeler left Washington this afternoon on his way to the Philippines. I have no plans of campaigning, he said to an Associated Press representative to-day, and shall not know what I am to do until I receive my instructions from Gen. Otis. I should like to have it understood, he continued, that I go to the Philippines in an entirely subordinate capacity. Not only Gen. Otis, but Gen. Lawton and MacArthur will rank over me. It is proper that they should, for while Gen. Lawton and MacArthur were in the field, I have not and deserve to have places superior to my assignment. They may be given me. He said he would not resign his seat in the house.

CONTESTING A DEMAND OF ASSIGNMENT.

A demand of assignment having been made by Geo. Slater & Sons, of Montreal, on Messrs. Polley & Scott, of this city, the latter are contesting the demand on the ground that they are able to pay their just and lawful debts and that the note upon which the demand is made is not yet due. Besides, Messrs. Polley & Scott contend that they did not draft the notes and cheques and drafts upon which the demand is based, neither did they assume the responsibility for the payment thereof.

NATIONAL EDUCATION.

OPENING OF THE GENERAL SESSION AT LOS ANGELES, CAL. — THE GOVERNOR OF THE STATE AND MAYOR OF THE CITY WELCOMES TEACHERS.

Los Angeles, Cal., July 11. — The opening session of the general session of the National Educational Association was held here this afternoon. Governor Case and Mayor Eaton welcomed the teachers. The afternoon programme included responses by W. C. Dougherty, Superintendent of Schools, Florida, H. S. Wesson, E. White, Columbus, Ohio, and J. E. Phillips, Superintendent of Schools, of Birmingham, Ala., and a paper on "What Education has Accomplished," by Prof. Lytle.

THE GRAND DUKE'S DEATH.

The Czar's Manifesto to His Loving Subjects.

GRAND DUKE MICHAEL NAMED HEIR.

St. Petersburg, July 11. — The Official Messenger to-day published an Imperial manifesto worded as follows:

"Our beloved brother, and heir to the throne, the Grand Duke George, Alexandrovich, died at Abbas Tuman, June 28 (old style). The illness which attacked him might, it was hoped, yield to the treatment initiated and the influence of a Southern climate. But God willed otherwise. In submitting without a murmur to the decree of Providence, we call all our faithful subjects to share our deep sorrow with us, and to offer fervent prayers for the repose of the soul of our departed brother. Henceforth and so long as it may not please God to bless us with a son,

the right of succession to the throne devolves according to the precise definition of the law of succession upon our beloved brother, the Grand Duke Michael Alexandrovich.

The remains will be brought here and interred in the Cathedral of the fortress. Telegrams of condolence have been received from Queen Victoria, King Humbert and other sovereigns. The late Grand Duke was an English scholar and an earnest student of naval matters.

THE FINANCES OF NEWFOUNDLAND.

A Deficit of \$30,000 for Last Year.

A SURPLUS EXPECTED THIS YEAR.

ELABORATE PREPARATIONS BEING MADE TO RECEIVE ADMIRAL BEAUFORT AND THE BRITISH SQUADRON — WHAT MR. JOSEPH CHAMBERLAIN INTENDS TO DO.

St. John's Nfld., July 11. — The Colonial budget that was laid upon the table of the House of Assembly to-day shows a deficit of \$33,000 for the last fiscal year. It estimates, however, a surplus of \$30,000 for the present year. In view of all the existing conditions the budget is very favorably regarded.

ELABORATE PREPARATIONS BEING MADE TO RECEIVE ADMIRAL BEAUFORT AND THE BRITISH SQUADRON.

Albany, July 11. — At the meeting to-morrow of the State Board of Charities, Secretary Hebbard will submit a preliminary report of the abuses that have been brought to light in the House of Refuge for women at Hudson. A favorite mode of treatment in vogue for the reformatory for those who disobeyed the rules, the "doche" plan, which was practiced some two years ago under the superintendency of Mrs. Abbott's predecessor. It consisted of placing the refractory prisoner in a cell and then turning a hose nozzle on her, almost drowning her in icy cold water. No matter what the thermometer registered without, this punishment was inflicted the year round, until unwarmed by the officials of the State, when it was promptly abolished.

HAD INTENDED TO RETIRE.

CAPTAIN WATKINS, OF THE SS. PARIS, TO HAVE LEFT THE SEA AT THE END OF THE PRESENT SEASON.

New York, July 11. — Manager Clement A. Grison, of the American Line, said to-day that Capt. Frederick Watkins, of the stranded steamer Paris, whose license was suspended yesterday for two years by the United States local inspectors of steam vessels, was to have quit the sea of his own volition at the end of the present season. At Southampton, where he had a quiet home, where he intended to rest from his labors and enjoy the retrospect of a long and useful career.

THE A. AND L. S. RAILWAY.

A Deputation Wait Upon the Government Respecting Claims.

Messrs. J. B. Belanger, F. J. Caldwell and H. J. Giroux, of New Carlisle, R. W. Le Blanc, of Bonaventure, and J. P. Nadeau, of Cascapedia, arrived in the city on Monday evening and had an interview with Hon. Mr. Marchand. It appears that the gentlemen are creditors of the Atlantic and Lake Superior Railway and they asked the Government to take what may be due to the railway company. The Government will meet the liabilities for construction wages, etc. The Premier stated that the Government would investigate as to whether or not there is anything due the Railway which has not already been transferred, and that they would bear in mind the position of affairs as described by the delegation.

HARBOR IMPROVEMENTS.

Seven Scows to be Used to Fill in Ponds.

The Harbor Commissioners met yesterday afternoon for the despatch of routine business. Mr. J. B. Laliberté, the Chairman, who has just returned from Ottawa, announced that he had obtained from the Federal Government the loan of seven dumping scows, to fill in the space between the outer and inner piers which the Commissioners are now having built at the Custom House Pond. Three of these are small scows and will be used to carry earth to be dredged from the inner basin while the four larger ones will be loaded at St. Croix and towed down. The scows will be here in a week or two.

ORDERED AWAY SUDDENLY.

A FRENCH WARSHIP UNEXPECTEDLY SENT TO ST. PIERRE FROM SYDNEY, C.B. — THE ACQUATIC CARNIVAL.

Halifax, N.S., July 11. — The French warship Ialy has been unexpectedly ordered to leave Sydney to-morrow for St. Pierre and it is suspected that her departure is in some way connected with the French score recently settled at Sydney. She was to have remained at Sydney until the aquatic carnival, which opens to-morrow, was concluded.

SEATS FOR SHOP GIRLS.

London, July 11. — The House of Lords this evening passed the second reading of the bill requiring shopkeepers to provide seats for their assistants by a vote of 73 in favor to 23 opposed. The Marquis of Salisbury spoke and voted against the measure.

DEATH OF A CARDINAL.

Rome, July 11. — Cardinal Teodoro Merlet, Vice-Chancellor of the Holy Roman Church, who was raised to the Cardinalate in 1856, died to-day in his 93rd year.

CLEAR OF THE ROCKS.

London, July 11. — The salvagers have moved the American line steamer Paris astern for a distance of 150 yards, and have shifted the vessel's position slightly to the eastward. They hope to be able to get the after-stroke hole fire afloat. The Paris is now clear of the rocks. The sea is smooth but a heavy fog prevails to-night.

ELECTRIC RAILWAY.

The new branch of the Quebec District Railway Company on Garden and Duane streets, is now nearing completion. The track has been laid and the work of re-making the road is progressing. The overhead trolley wires are now being placed in position and will probably be completed to-day.

SMALL FIRE.

An alarm from box No. 19 called out the firemen to Mr. Wm. McCab's residence on St. Michael Street, which it had not been for the timely arrival of the fire fighters, would have resulted in a serious loss. The fire originated from the explosion of a gas stove, and damage was caused to a carpet and other household effects to the extent of some \$75.

THE LATE MR. SANFORD.

The death by drowning of Senator Sanford, while fishing at his Muskoka resort, removes a man who had been an important figure in the recent political history of Canada, although his name did not come prominently before the public. The late Mr. Sanford was in the inner circles of the Conservative party, and his opinion was highly esteemed by its leaders. As a close and intimate friend of Sir John Thompson he exercised a considerable influence in moulding the policy of that distinguished statesman. It was to Mr. Sanford's Muskoka home that Sir John betook himself when falling health caused his official duties to weigh too heavily upon him. When the death blow came to the Canadian Premier Mr. Sanford, who was in England at the time, represented the Canadian people and accompanied the body of his dead friend and leader when it was brought in state on the Blake to this country. An astute business man, who had accumulated some wealth, Mr. Sanford took an intelligent interest in politics, and might have filled a more prominent place had he not been called so suddenly to pay the debt of nature.

WHO IS RESPONSIBLE.

"There the matter rests, and, as we have said, there it may be allowed to rest until it is settled whether we are dealing with Great Britain or Canada. We cannot hope to come to an agreement with two powers holding conflicting views. If Great Britain is really the suzerain power and final arbiter, it is her duty to enforce her authority over Canada and deal with us. If Canada is the final arbiter, then it is the duty of Great Britain to withdraw wholly and to allow Canada to bear the responsibility for the deadlock." - New York World.

The theory that Canada and Great Britain hold conflicting views on the Alaskan question has been carefully cultivated by a section of the American press. It is intended to create the impression that in reality the British authorities accept the contention of the United States, though to humor Canada they are compelled to pretend to believe otherwise. While this, in correct, would be a tribute to the great influence which Canada exerts over the framers of the Imperial policy, it is one that we cannot accept. If the British Government was convinced that the position of Canada is untenable it would be open to censure for not advising our representatives to recede from it and assume a justifiable attitude. The fact that British statesmen take the responsibility of sustaining the Canadian view of the case, is to those who understand British institutions, a sufficient answer to such utterances as are quoted above, and is also a guarantee that Canada is not making any unreasonable demands. The responsibility for the Canadian position is in good hands. It is shared by the British and Canadian Governments.

AGAIN NEGOTIATING.

Negotiations have been resumed for a fast Atlantic service between Canada and England. The London Times makes this announcement from Ottawa which, if it is well founded, will be gratifying news to all Canadians. It will revive hope that the Government has again become conscious that its declared policy is to secure the service, and that the country wants it. In the new negotiations the Cabinet would do well to remember the offer of the C. P. R.

A RUSSIAN PROJECT.

Russia is undertaking to construct a waterway from the Baltic to the Black Sea, a feat which not only exemplifies the vigor and enterprise characteristic of the Czar's Government, but betrays an anxiety to increase the naval power of the Empire. A writer in the current issue of the Fortnightly Review asserts that this project will make Russia practically unassailable in its own waters, and thus greatly increase its formidable equipment for offense or defense. The waterway, as at present planned, is to be a navigable channel running from Dunamunde, on the Gulf of Riga, to Kherson, on the estuary of the Baltic. It will traverse a comparatively populous section of Russia and will connect such important and prosperous cities as Kiev, Kremchug and Ekaterinoslav with the ports of both termini. Trade with St. Petersburg can be conducted more cheaply by this route than by rail, and the increase in facilities for commerce should be of great benefit to business interests. It is as a naval enterprise, however, that the waterway will be of most importance. If the Trans-Siberian railway will enable Russia to concentrate its army with dispatch at either end of the Empire, the waterway will make it possible for the Government to move its warships speedily and at will from the Baltic to the Black Sea. The waterway, being entirely within Russian boundaries, could be made almost impregnable. Throughout the whole distance of 994 miles no foreign power could hope to interfere with operations on the waterway save at the cost of actual invasion. Moreover, as the writer in the Fortnightly points out, in case of threatened warfare the nation could mobilize

LONDON STOCK MARKET.

New York, July 11. - The Commercial Advertiser's financial cable from London says: "The markets here were quiet to-day, engaged in arranging a small account. The tone was dull with a final hardening in Americans and Africans. Money is still stiffening. The banks got \$250,000,000 to the country for the next ten years, by the time the Pacific is fully developed and earning hundreds of millions, which is feasible at the rapid strides it is now making. I have heard it said that the conditions under which the bridge company are to get the million will be such that it will not be in a position to accept the money. I hope this is false, as it would put all our members in a ridiculous position and create something like a rebellion amongst their supporters."
