B R U S S E L S, September 21.

WE have no doubt here, that the Emperor will join France to stop the progress of the King of Prussia in the United Provinces—and all is in motion on the frontiers of France. Affairs in Europe are in such a situation, they may be compared to a cobweb, which you cannot break one thread of without shaking the whole. France and the Emperor will not sit still, and let the King of Prussia give laws to the United Provinces.

Vienna, Sept. 15. Letters from Hermanstadt, say, that the second division of the Turkish fleet having sailed towards Oczakow, had intercepted four large Russian ships of war, which had been launched in the presence of the Empress of Russia, and had sailed down the Nieper, in order for completing their armaments at Sebastianopolis. The Turkish fleet afterwards sailed towards the coasts of Taurida.

Poland, Sept. 5. The Ottoman land forces on the frontiers of that empire consist of 300,000 men, and its naval power is composed of 80 sail of shipping, most of which are proceeding in the Black Sea. The army near Oczakow contains 60,000 men.

L O N D O N, October 8.

A correspondent at Amsterdam writes in a postscript, dated at seven o'clock on Monday evening, "that Amsterdam had not then surrendered. Water was so scarce when the letter came away, that they gave after the rate of an English shilling for a quart bottle of it. The communication between Amsterdam and Haerlem was then cut off by the Prussians."

October 9. The sum of the answer of the French Minister to the peremptory requisition of Mr. Grenville, might be conveyed in the words of Shakespear:

"For though we do not seek a battle as we are,

"Yet as we are we will not shun it—

"So tell your Master."

Extract of a letter from Paris, (express) October 3.

"War cannot be more talked of in London than it is bandied about in this city; nor are the preparations in England, probably, more vigorous than in France. Indeed this Cabinet have been playing fast and loose very long with you. Ever since Commodore Gower was called out, now three months ago, the French Cabinet took the hint, but they have been secret in all they have done. The Christian King hath appointed Mons. de Nieuville, who is of his own household, to carry to Berlin his Majesty's ultimatum in respect to the Princess of Orange, and the present situation of affairs in Holland; and he is set off for that capital. The Russian Envoy has frequent conferences with the Bishop and the Count de Montmorin, who at present do all the business of the foreign departments; and be assured they are by no means slovenly performed."

B R U X E L L E S, 21 Septembre.

NOUS ne doutons point ici que l'Empereur ne joigne la France pour arrêter le progrès du Roi de Prusse dans les Provinces Unies—et tout est en mouvement sur les frontieres de France. Les affaires sont en Europe dans une situation qu'on peut comparer à une toile d'araignée; dont on ne peut casser un fil sans ébranler le tout. Vienna, 15 Septembre. Des lettres de Hermanstadt disent, que la seconde division de la flotte Turque ayant fait voile vers Oczakow, avoit intercepté quatre gros navires de guerre Russiens, qui avoient été mis à l'eau en présence de l'Impératrice de Russie, et avoit descendu le Nieper pour compléter l'armement de Sebastianopolis. La flotte Turque fit voile ensuite vers les côtes de Tauride.

Pologne, 5 Septembre. Les forces de terre Ottomanes sur les frontieres de cet empire consistent en 3 cens mille hommes, et sa force navale est composée de 80 vaisseaux, dont la plupart vont dans la Mer Noire. L'armée près d'Oczakow est de soixante mille hommes.

L O N D R E S, 8 Octobre.

Un correspondant d'Amsterdam écrit par apostille, en date de Lundi 7 heures du soir, "qu'Amsterdam ne s'étoit pas encore rendu—que l'eau étoit si rare lorsque cette lettre partit, qu'on la payoit un chelin sterling la pinte—que la communication étoit coupée entre Amsterdam et Haerlem, par les Prussiens."

Le 9 Octobre. On pouroit rendre en somme la réponse du Ministre François à la requisition péremptoire de Mr Grenville dans les termes de Shakespear.

"Quoique nous ne cherchions pas le combat tels que nous sommes,

"Nous ne l'évitons cependant pas dans la situation où nous nous trouvons;

"Dites le à votre Maître.

Extrait d'une lettre de Paris, (venue expresse) du 3 Octobre.

On ne peut pas plus parler de la guerre à Londres que l'on en discute en cette ville; ni les préparations ne sont probablement pas plus vigoureuses en Angleterre qu'en France. A la vérité le Cabinet François vous à longtems leuré. Depuis qu'on a fait sortir le Commodore Gower, il y a à présent trois mois, le Cabinet de France a entendu ce que cela signifioit, mais il a tenu le secret sur tout ce qu'il a fait. Le Roi de France a appointé M. de Nieuville, qui est de sa maison, pour porter à Berlin la finale résolution de sa Majesté, relativement à la Princesse d'Orange, et à la situation des affaires en Hollande, et il est parti pour cette capitale. L'Envoi Russe a de fréquentes conférences avec l'Evêque et le Comte de Montmorin, qui à présent font toutes les affaires des départemens étrangers; et soyez assuré qu'elles ne sont pas mal conduites."

Extrait of a letter from a gentleman in Sunbury, to his friend in Savannah, (Georgia) dated the 24th of October.

"We had a man scalped the other day within 18 miles of this, and the house and crop of a planter near the Altamaha burnt down last Saturday. Works will be thrown up round us in a day or two, and five or six pieces of cannon mounted."

Extrait of a letter from Augusta, (Georgia) dated October 7.

"I once thought I would never engage in a military life, but the alarming situation of this country with respect to the Creek Indians, I fear, will require the utmost exertions of its citizens. Our frontiers are infested with those savages; repeated skirmishes have ensued, with various determinations, though upon the whole our success has been equal to our expectations. On the 21st of September, General Clarke, with 150 volunteers, engaged an equal number of Indians; the action was obstinately maintained for four hours and an half, when victory declared in favour of the General. The Indians had 25 killed, and between 40 and 50 wounded, together with their packs, kettles, &c. taken. Our loss was 6 killed and 11 wounded, since which we have been very quiet. Our assembly meets the 15th instant, measures will then be adopted for carrying the war into their country."

Extrait of a letter from Fort-Pitt, dated October 25.

"A number of people have been lately murdered within twenty miles of Catfish—I must take the liberty to tell you that it is my opinion, if something is not immediately done to settle matters, a general Indian war will be the consequence.

"Since writing the above, I am informed of a number of people being killed, and that the Indians are not far off and have four scalps with them that have been seen. I am preparing to-night, and shall march against them to-morrow, having procured two friendly Indians as guides."

Q U E B E C, JANUARY 24.

Friday last being the anniversary for celebrating Her Majesty's Birthday, in the forenoon there was a numerous Levee at the Castle of St. Lewis, when His Excellency the Right Honorable LORD DORCHESTER received the Compliments of the principal Gentlemen, Civil and Military, of the Garrison, on the occasion; at noon a Royal Salute was fired from the cannon of the Garrison, and three Volleys from the Troops on the Parade; and in the evening His Lordship gave a most splendid Ball and Supper to a very numerous and brilliant Assembly.
