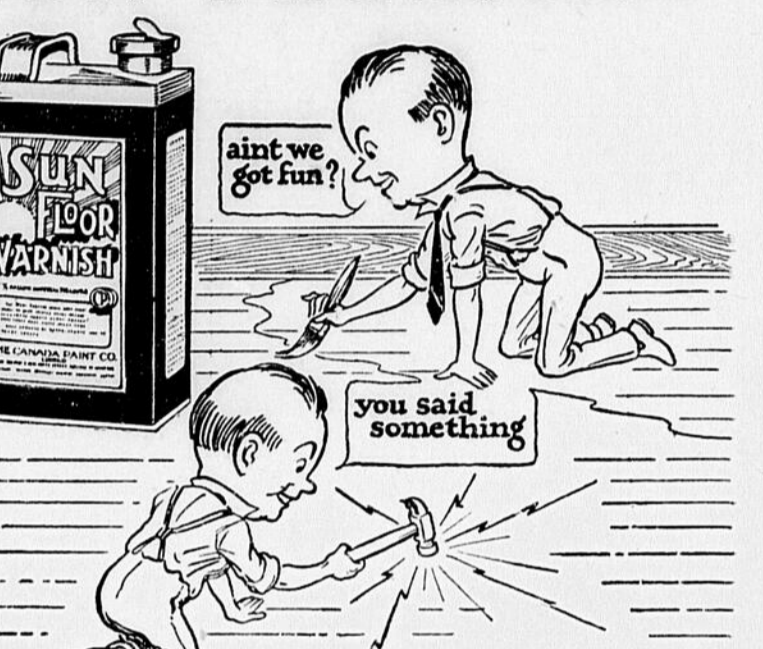

After an absence of some years from these columns, it is a real pleasure to feel that I have nothing else to do but pick up my pen and write as I feel about the things that interest me most.

By a trick of fate, I have been administered a dose of medical advice, gently but firmly expressing the view that my physical welfare would greatly profit, if I would but take a solemn vow to remain in bed for a period of several weeks.

I have had ample opportunity recently to watch them and study them in all their phases; I have talked with them fully and gauged their outlook on life and plumbed the thoughts they carry about with them.
