A Little Courtesy.

The other day a gentleman entered one the largest stores of this city in pursuit of an article the price of which he knew would scarcely exceed the cost of postage on an ounce letter. The fact of its insignificance and that it was rarely called for made it hard to find. One clerk after another was enlisted in the search, till finally they were joined by the proprietor before success crowned their efforts. Somewhat mortified at the amount of trouble he had caused, the customer began to apologize, when he was silenced by the proprietor with, "My friend, it was no trouble; it was business. We have experienced full as much pleasure in finding that for you as you have in receiving it. If you insist upon calling this trouble, please remember that we like to be troubled."

That merchant made an investment by his courtesy. He laid up treasure where moth and rust does not corrupt, and it wasn't laid up in heaven, either. He secured the patronage of a man, though he did not know it, who sometimes makes purchases that are worth the while. Without intending it he cast some bread upon the waters. His experience is liable to be the experience of any man who cultivates amenities rather than the asperities; even though it were not so, though the reward does not come back in pounds, shillings and pence, still the practice of amenities pays. It cultivates an even temper, it staves off congestion, it invites a green old age. Like virtue, the practice of the amenities of life is its own reward. —*Cincinnati Times-Star.*

One most important fact came out at the Teachers' Convention, at Lennoxville, viz., that a teacher whose school house or outbuildings are in bad order, and remain unrepaired after the fact has been reported to the Secretary-Treasurer, should send a post card to the School Inspector. He will then write both to the Secretary-Treasurer and to the Department of Public Instruction, who will also write to the Secretary-Treasurer. If both these letters are wilfully disregarded, the grant to the whole municipality will be stopped.

The New York Times speaks of the manner in which the Republican majority in the United States senate is discussing the fishery treaty in the following terms: "The Republican Senators have been dealing with a solemn compact intended to settle an international difficulty of great moment in the spirit of reckless demagogues. They decide in advance against it because it was negotiated by authority of a Democratic President and would confer prestige upon the administration if ratified, and they hope by misrepresenting its provisions and slandering the motives of the negotiators to work upon prejudices and passion to party advantage." This is severe but just.

TROOPS FOR SOUTH AFRICA—London, July 13.—One of the British regiments now in Egypt has been ordered to Zululand. A regiment from Aldershot will replace it in Egypt. It is generally believed that serious trouble will soon ensue in South Africa.

An order-in-council has been passed rescinding the order-in-council of the 30th December, 1884, which brought the Canada Temperance Act into force in the county of Stanstead. This is the final touch to the recent vote in favor of repealing the act.

Mr. Dickey, Conservative, is elected for Cumberland, N. S., by about 700 majority, over Mr. Casey, Prohibitionist.

The Emperor William has agreed to the proposal that his mother shall bear the titles of Empress and Queen Frederick.

The Mercier Government has granted \$3,000 indemnity to the proprietors of horses and cattle burned at the Sherbrooke exhibition last fall.

L'Univers says that the persistent hostility of the Italian Government will compel the Pope to leave Rome, and that the question of a new seat of Government is being earnestly discussed.

The Scott Act was repealed in Arthabaska on Friday by one hundred and forty majority. The Act had worked well in most of the county. But little interest was worked up and the vote was very light.

A duel was fought in Paris last Friday, between the French Prime Minister Floquet and Gen. Boulanger. The latter was badly wounded in the neck, with a sword, M. Floquet only receiving a few scratches. Boulanger's popularity is said to be on the wane.

A STRUGGLE FOR LIFE.—Capetown, July 14.—The cause of the terrible calamity at Debeers mines was as follows: While the shifts were being changed the hauling wire broke and the skip rushed down the shaft with frightful rapidity. The oil lamp was broken and quickly ignited the wooden casing of the shaft. Flames in great volume shot up the shaft and the mine was soon filled with smoke and the lights carried by the miners were rendered useless. The panic-stricken whites in their efforts to escape became massed together in the galleries and were suffocated. The rescuers who explored the mine were compelled to use dynamite to clear the passages of corpses. The damage to the mine is estimated at \$100,000.

Very few people have any idea of the vast acres of Government land held by alien landholders in the United States. The largest tract, 4,500,000 acres, is held by the Holland Company of New Mexico. An English syndicate holds 3,000,000 acres in Texas; Sir Edward Reid and a syndicate in Florida own 2,000,000 acres; 1,800,000 acres belongs to an English syndicate in Mississippi; 1,700,000 to the Marquis of Tweeddale; 1,300,000 to the Phillips-Marshall Company of London, and 1,600,000 acres to a Germany syndicate. These comprise the larger landholders. There are, however, a score or more of persons and syndicates owning less than 750,000 acres. The grand total foots up to 20,747,000 acres of Government lands held by aliens in the United States.
