HOUSE OF COMMONS STILL FACED WITH HEAVY LEGISLATIVE BUDGET

Qualified Observers Regard Ten-Day Easter Recess as Barely Halfway Mark of Present Session—Unemployment Relief Measure to Receive Right of Way Today—Announcement of Public Works Programme and Farm Loan Scheme Expected within Few Days.

Ottawa, April 9.—With two or three months of solid work ahead of it, the House of Commons resumes its sittings today. Most observers regard the ten-day Easter recess as scarcely the halfway mark of the session and the bulk of an unusually heavy budget of legislation remains to be attended to.

The House of Commons meets this afternoon but the Senate will not resume until Wednesday. Before the end of the week several of the numerous committees already at work will have resumed their sessions. The first of these will be the Stevens' committee on price spreads and mass buying which meets on Tuesday to continue its probe into the livestock business.

Hon. D. G. McKenzie, Minister of Agriculture for Manitoba, will head a delegation from the livestock committee of the Manitoba Legislature which will lay its views before the committee. Like the agriculture committee of the Ontario Legislature that body has been inquiring into the ills that beset the livestock business and the reason the farmer receives such low prices for his animals. Before Easter members of the Ontario committee visited Ottawa and laid the result of their inquiry before the mass buying probe.

At a later stage of the inquiry representatives of department and chain stores, which were under fire from small retailer representatives earlier, will be given a hearing. No date has been yet fixed for their testimony.

The Unemployment Relief Bill is

likely to be the first business before the House of Commons. The Government was balked in its effort to get the measure through before Easter by a stubborn opposition which may continue for some days. Until it is passed the Dominion Government has no authority to pay out money for relief.

In a few days Prime Minister R. B. Bennett will give the House a statement of the legislation yet to come. Two important measures forecast are the bill to provide for the public works programme, the Government intends to launch as part of its drive to hasten economic recovery and a bill to permit farmers to secure relief from their debt burdens. Linked with or complementary to the latter measure will be a scheme of intermediate credits for agriculture.

Added to the Natural Products Marketing Act now before the House the two bank bills now before the banking and commerce committee and the insurance and shipping bills now before the committee of the Senate, these measures make up perhaps the most ambitious programme of legislation attempted by Parliament at a single session in many years.

SURVIVORS OF CLIFFSIDE DISASTER FLEE LOCALITY

Few Residents of Fishing Hamlets Care to Linger Long at Dread Spot that Was Turned into Death Trap Saturday.

Oslo, Norway, April 9.—Survivors of the cliffside catastrophe in which more than fifty persons died on Norway's west coast, were reported fleeing the locality today.

No further rock falls were expected, but it was believed few residents of the fishing hamlets of the Tafjord and Foraa would linger long at the dread spot turned into a death trap by rushing waters Saturday.

Sleeping residents of the two villages, on opposite sides of Kornsnes fjord, were trapped by great waves which rolled up after a great weighing thousands of tons fell into the sea.

Ships bearing relief supplies were en route from Alesund to the scene of the disaster, Norway's worst in years.

Old-time residents recalled today that years ago there were predictions that some day the cliff would fall into the sea, sending, as it did Saturday, a mighty wall of water over the flimsy houses in the villages.

UNIFORMITY LACKING IN MOVE TO ADVANCED TIME

Cities Adopt Daylight Saving at Various Times Between April 28 and June 15—Majority Revert to Standard Time on September 30.

Ten Canadian cities will push the clock ahead one hour at midnight on April 28th with nearly as many joining the daylight saving brigade during May and June, a survey by the Canadian Press revealed today. Only one western city plans to adopt "fast" time.

These cities will move the hour hand ahead thirty minutes at midnight on April 28th—Kingston, Niagara Falls, Welland, St. Catharines, Toronto and Ottawa in Ontario, and Montreal, Quebec, Three Rivers and Sherbrooke in Quebec. All except Welland will return to normal time on September 30th. Welland changes September 3rd.

At midnight on May 5th, Guelph and Hamilton, Ont., and Regina, Sask., will change to daylight saving time. Guelph changes back on September 3rd, Hamilton on September 15th and Regina on October 7th. Moncton will have summer time from May 20th to September 30th; Saint John from May 26th to September 30th. Sudbury joins the movement on June 2nd and Belleville probably on June 15th, though the question has not been definitely decided.

PRESIDENT OF IRELAND AGAIN SHOWS TEMPER

De Valera Makes Dire Threats Against Touring Theatre Company Should Certain Songs Be Sung.

Dublin Irish Free State, April 9.—A new crisis in Irish Free State politics was anticipated today with announcement by the government that local administration elections would be held June 26. The elections will be contested by the two major political groups.

Observers said the platforms of the two main parties, the Republicans of President Eamon de Valera and the United Ireland Party of General Eoin O'Duffy, were likely to provide an accurate index of strength of the groups.

Meanwhile O'Duffy is working hard to perfect organization of his party throughout the country.

The President extended his authority by banning from the Abbey Theatre Company's North American tour a play by Eugene O'Neill, "The Western World," and Cagney's "Plough and Stars." If the theatre group should disobey him, he threatened he would discontinue its government subsidy.

O'Duffy, speaking yesterday at Tallamore, accused the President of having a "policy of terror" and himself up as the "forerunner of Irish politics," seeking to bait John Bull into snarling so that he might appeal to the country with a cry, "Don't fling me to the British."

President de Valera speaking at Carrigrohane, said the British market had gone as far as the Free State was concerned and that it would never return.

Violent incidents during the week-end included an attempt to burn down Clifden Hall at Galway during a meeting of the Gaelic League.

The removal of parts of the railway tracks near Tallamore to prevent O'Duffy supporters from attending a meeting; a raid by armed, masked men on a special constabulary arms warehouse at Ballymena in Ulster. The raiders escaped with a quantity of rifles, revolvers and thousands of rounds of ammunition.

SUBSISTENCE GARDENS TO BE PLANTED

New York, April 9.—Between 65,000 and 75,000 subsistence gardens will be planted this spring in the State of New York to furnish vegetables to the needy, W. E. Georgia, agricultural director of the state temporary emergency relief administration, announced today.

EXPECT INSULT TO LEAVE FOR U.S. WEDNESDAY

Third Secretary of American Embassy Designated to Accompany Former Utilities Operator on Homeward Voyage.

Istanbul, April 9.—United States Ambassador Robert P. Skinner announced today that Samuel Insull might be placed aboard a vessel sailing for United States on Wednesday.

He said American agents expected to reach a final decision within a matter of mere hours.

If the Chicago fugitive is started on his homeward voyage on Wednesday, it will be aboard the export boat Executive.

He said that no difficulty was anticipated in returning Insull for trial on embezzlement and fraud charges in Chicago. Burton Y. Berry, third secretary of the American Embassy, has been designated to accompany the former utilities operator.

The action will force cancellation of several weeks, booking in Nagoya and Osaka.

U.S. SOFT COAL OPERATORS OPEN WAR ON SHORTER HOURS MANDATE

Armed with Injunction Restraining N.R.A. Officials from Enforcing Terms of Seven-Hour-Day Amendment, Operators from Five States Mass Forces to Prevent Order Becoming Part of Permanent Code—Declare Order Only Stop Gap Measure.

Washington, April 9.—Soft coal operators from five States massed forces today to overthrow the N.R.A. mandate for shorter hours and higher wages.

The battle ground was the floor of N.R.A.'s public hearing on the recent amendment to the United States bituminous coal code. This extended the seven hour working day and a compensating increase in wages to all soft coal mines.

Administration officials conceded the order was one of the most drastic steps in code-making yet taken by Johnson. They pointed out, however, it was purely a stop-gap measure designed to prevent approximately 200,000 miners from going on strike upon expiration of the old wage scale last April 1st.

BRIDGE BADLY DAMAGED WHEN STRUCK BY ICE

Six Wooden Piers of Structure Spanning Richelieu River at St. Johns Washed Away Early Yesterday Morning—Trains Had to Be Diverted.

St. Johns, Que., April 9.—Six wooden piers of the Central Vermont bridge, a railroad structure spanning the Richelieu River here, were broken and carried away when struck by a large mass of moving ice. The entire bridge, that lies between St. Johns and Berthville, was threatened with destruction.

The mishap occurred early yesterday morning and when the bridge crew heard the cracking of the bridge structure, they promptly notified the bridge authorities at St. Albans, Vt. The latter immediately rushed a mechanical pile driver to the scene at the same time notifying railway authorities to prevent any trains from passing on the endangered bridge.

Two passenger trains, from Boston and New York, were diverted, the detour being made via Alburg, Vt., and Canby, Que. With the pile driving apparatus, a squad of men helped repair the bridge and late yesterday afternoon the entire damage had been completely repaired.

At 6:10 o'clock last evening the Central Vermont Boston-Montreal passenger train was able to travel via the repaired bridge.

NEW MAYOR FOR MONTREAL BEING ELECTED TODAY

Atmosphere in Many Wards Charged with Tension as Electors Went to Polls This Morning to Choose Mayor and Elect New City Council.

Montreal, April 9.—Atmosphere in many wards was charged with tension today as Montreal electors went to the polls to choose a mayor from four candidates and elect a new city council. Fears were held in some quarters that a more hot-headed portion of the people might stir up trouble. Police took extraordinary precautions to be in readiness for disturbance.

Principal battle for the mayoralty was conceded to be between Camille Houde, once leader of the Conservative party of the Province of Quebec but now "of no party"—his own words—and Dr. Anatole Flaherty, a member of the Legislature for Montreal-Mercier who has the official backing of the Provincial Liberal party.

But both candidates had an eye cocked on a "dark-horse," Saluste Lavoy, K.C., lawyer and soldier who, entering the campaign late, has been attracting more and more people to his meetings. Supported by steel-helmeted former soldiers who wear swastikas on their arms, Mr. Lavoy has met considerable criticism from the presence on his platform of two speakers noted for their attacks on the Jewish race.

POLICEMAN INJURED BY FALLING SIGN

Winnipeg, April 9.—Constable Alex McDonald was in hospital today with a severe scalp wound, suffered when a hundred-pound sign fell from a second storey of a downtown building and struck him.

Physicians said the helmet the constable was wearing eased the blow or he would have been killed.

PRESS REPRESENTATIVES RECEIVED TODAY BY POPE

His Holiness Delivered Heartfelt Eulogy of Press and Thanked Newsmen for Their Work During World-Wide Holy Year.

Vatican City, April 9.—Writing a new footnote to church history, Pope Pius XI received foreign correspondents this afternoon, the first time any Pope has received them in a body.

His Holiness delivered a heartfelt eulogy of the press and thanked the newsmen for their work during the world-wide Holy Year.

The audience took place in the consistorial hall. Correspondents from twenty-five nations all wore the required full evening dress, demanded by Vatican ceremony.

Pope Pius first made a circle of the correspondents, speaking a word or two with each. Dressed in white, the Pontiff then ascended to the crimson throne chair. Speaking in French he said he was happy to have made their acquaintance, that he himself had arranged the audience and that they were welcome in the house of "the common Father of all."

BRITAIN MAKES MOVE IN REICH ARMS PROPOSAL

Sir John Simon Tells House of Commons "Very Serious" Consideration Being Given to Increased Budget.

London, April 9.—Sir John Simon, Foreign Secretary, told the House of Commons today that the Government is giving "very serious" consideration to Germany's contemplated increased expenditure in her army, navy and air forces.

Sir John was cheered by the House as he made the announcement. He declared:

"I have instructed our ambassador at Berlin to make inquiries of the German Government on the subject."

Parliament was reconvening after its Easter recess for the session which will end in July.

Sir John refused to be drawn into a discussion of the possibility of strengthening the British air force to a point at which it would be as strong as the air force of any other nation.

He said only that he could not add to the statement made by Stanley Baldwin in the debate on March 8 on a re-approportionation of the Marmes of Londonderry, Secretary for Aviation, and others made plain Great Britain's determination to strengthen her armaments if other powers persisted in building up theirs.

It was in this debate in the House of Commons that Mr. Baldwin revealed the Government was ready to summon an air conference with western powers "the next morning" should the present disarmament negotiations fail.

The German budget shows that in the coming fiscal year the army and navy is to receive \$357,000,000 as compared with last year's appropriation of \$268,000,000, while aviation is to get \$83,600,000 as compared to the \$28,000,000 which it received last year.

The total German budget was balanced at \$2,583,312,000.

ACCIDENTS IN ONTARIO CLAIM LIVES OF FIVE

Drownings, Fire, Train Accident and Auto Mishap Responsible for Series of Week-End Fatalities.

Toronto, April 9.—Accidents claimed five lives in Ontario during the week-end. Two persons were drowned in the ice clammers of Halifax harbor, while a woman was killed by a train; and an auto mishap claimed another life.

Mrs. J. Sheldon, of Waterford, was killed instantly when she was struck by a Michigan Central Railway train. The two men drowned were Rigi Proebel and Charles Adams. Proebel's body was found floating in a ditch in Mersea Township. Friends said they believed he had stumbled into the ditch. Adams' body was found in Lake Ontario at Toronto on Saturday.

Adams, who came here from Calgary, is believed to have stumbled and fallen into the water.

When fire damaged the home of Frank J. Aikens at Toronto, his five-year-old adopted son, Joseph, was burned to death. The boy was found beneath a bed upstairs where he had fled when the flames broke

PROSPECT BRIGHT FOR AGREEMENT ON MINIMUM WORLD WHEAT PRICE

Major Exporting Nations Also Ready to Grant Argentine Demand for Increased Export Quota—United States, Canada and Australia Still Unable to Sink All Differences on Fixed Price for Wheat—Early Statement on Result of Deliberations Expected.

Rome, April 9.—The World Wheat Advisory Commission today resumed sessions with the prospect something might be done to fix minimum prices for wheat and that the exporting nations might consent to allow Argentina a larger export quota.

Only six spokesmen were heard Saturday on the minimum-price question and it was expected the rest would speak today. After that the Commission probably will prepare an authoritative summary of the views expressed.

After Saturday's session Andrew Cairns, Canadian secretary to Permanent Wheat Committee, said delegates were "generally sympathetic" to the idea of establishing a minimum price.

It was recalled, however, that while Canada and Australia were among those favoring the proposal the United States is the leader of those opposed to it.

It was learned last night that Canada, Australia and the United States are inclined to view favorably the request of Argentina for a higher quota. Argentina based its request on the assertion that she has expanded her wheat acreage less rapidly than some other countries and that she signed the London wheat agreement last year knowing she would have a poor crop.

Argentina was said to argue also that the countries which had increased their wheat acreage rapidly in recent years were to some extent responsible for the present wheat problem.

CIVIL STRIFE FEARS CHECK STRIKE PLANS

French Public Servants Decide to Undertake Parliament Campaign to Avert Pay Reductions.

Paris, April 9.—Held in check by the spectre of civil strife, thwarted Government functionaries began to abandon plans for a crippling general strike in favor of a campaign to force Parliament to annul the pay-cutting decree of Premier Gaston Doumergue.

Loud threats of "direct action" divided sharply, and public employees turned to the forthcoming battle over parliamentary ratification of the Premier's order.

One-third of the 800,000 Government workers were dropped from the payrolls and the salaries of the rest were trimmed ten per cent. in the Premier's fight to balance the budget and against devaluation of the franc.

Fears of precipitating riots between political extremists, who were rumored to be arming for a "Fascist war" it was believed, were responsible for the functionaries' change in tactics.

Several persons were injured, however, in a battle of knives and clubs between 200 Socialists and members of the Nationalistic Solidarite Francaise yesterday in front of the Arch of Triumph in Paris.

The theft of sixty rifles, pistols and ammunition was discovered at a Lyons arms store.

Threats of punishment by Andre Malraux, Minister of Communications, stopped noisy "folded arm" strikes in post offices and the telegraph bureaux.

The Government sought to placate the embittered functionaries in a lengthy denial of rumors they would be hit harder in further decrees.

New decrees lopping more than 1,000,000 francs, about \$66,000,000, from war veterans' pensions were expected to stir further unrest in the coming week, but the Government hoped to avoid trouble by an appeal to patriotism.

Former Premier Edouard Daladier revealed in a speech in his home district of Orange that the only alternative to his resignation after fatal rioting February 6 was pitting the French army against the discontented "new spillings of blood."

M. Daladier blamed Fascists for the February riots in Place de la Concorde.

TWO HALIFAX CANOEISTS NARROWLY ESCAPE DEATH

Two Youths Plunged into icy Water of Halifax Harbor When Their Canoe Overturned.

Halifax, April 9.—Two young canoeists missed death narrowly on Sunday when their overturning craft plunged them into the water among the ice clammers of Halifax harbor's northwest arm.

Charles Walters, aged twenty-two, swam through the chilly waters to shore. Bertram Herman, aged nineteen, clung to the capsized canoe until rescue came. His brother, Frank, member of the Halifax Mi-

mass boat-racing crew, which competed in the Olympic games, reached the spot in another canoe with a companion, and saved the boy.

Fred Cheer, twenty-five-year-old Stratford lineman, was the victim of the auto mishap. He was found dead, his head buried in mud of a ditch near St. Mary's. It is believed his car got out of control and was thrown into the ditch.

Trade and commerce is carrying things from where they are plentiful to where they are needed; and taking as much back as you can get for what you took.

THINGS THAT ARE NOT DONE.

That men have become exuberantly intoxicated with the acclaim of the multitude is shown in a long line of historical precedent. Men in office are always inclined to exceed their authority.

Newly-elected officials are often taken that way. The success or excess of authority grasped by Mussolini, by Hitler, and by other self-selected dictators, has excited the admiration of a type of men who in their school days would be called "bullies" by their comrades.

The latest man to fall a victim to this mania is Premier Pattullo, of British Columbia, who imagines himself a Young Cromwell, and who wishes to scrap all precedents as bubbles, and all constitutions as mere baubles. The Cabinet is to be empowered to make new laws and to enforce them even to the point of imprisonment and fine, the Legislative body is to be merely an echo.

In the language of "La Flâneur," we can see his finish. With the advice of the wise old skipper, "Pipe down, laddie."

A trip in the Pacific, with a look at thyself, will result in the exaggerated ego being reduced by a comparison of man with true magnificence.

Mr. Pattullo is taking political success too seriously.

WHAT HAVE YOU DONE, GENTLEMEN? ONE LITTLE THING?

From the six counties surrounding the City and County of Sherbrooke we sent to Ottawa in July, 1930, six supporters of the Conservative administration which now directs the affairs of the country.

We have asked now, after four years:

"Gentlemen, what have you done for our country, for my constituency?"

The Record represents these counties and is the ranking authority over these members, and has a perfect right to put the members on the platform and ask them this question. It would not be cricket to wait a year to ask this question and then spring it upon the members.

Categorically, we want now from each member in each of the six counties a resume of what they have accomplished, not just what they may have tried to do.

Members may ignore this question, waive aside our right by all the rules of precedence and exigence, to ask for an interim accounting, but we advise them that we persist with all the power of the Chief Speaker for the people, our concern.

Money is being spent and squandered all over Canada in quite good-sized gobes. Has any of it come our way?

From our own pen point we can view savings which we have effected, mounting up into the hundred millions, savings of spendings which had gone placidly on but for our Dominion-wide protest.

Yet money has been spent, millions. Did we get any of it within our counties?

Did our members advance one single idea for the betterment of service in the Eastern Townships? We lost a postal inspectorate office—just closed down for no reason, no saving.

Did we get a branch tax inspector's office? Why should we, in this compact corner of the province, standing geographically distinct, and at one time considered as the making of an individual province—why should we have to journey all the way to Montreal to pay income taxes? Yet, some of our people have had to do it when the clerks get their figures twisted. That is a minor matter, perhaps, but it takes only a few minutes to make majors.

Members from Shefford to Compton may deny any right, as Editor, to call for an accounting, but it is done thus early in their own interests, for it takes six months for any candidate to properly prepare himself for the one great day.

Is the Sherbrooke member exempt from service? He is not. My long experience in parliamentary work and procedure, is that the member in opposition, be he diligent, courteous and unobjectionable in manner, can accomplish more for his constituency than can a member who placidly accepts the shackles of partyism and trails in goose-step line.

The members for Richmond-Wolfie and for Shefford are handicapped. They can only think in one language. And when they are addressing the main body of the House they are talking as though on the steps of the parish hall. Nobody understands

them, that is nobody except others of the narrow parashional view.

At Quebec a member from the back counties is quite at home in both his language and his tabac, but there are young sprigs of Quebec lawyers who go down to the far-off counties and tell them that a member cannot qualify for the Quebec House unless he can think and talk in both languages. Deceptive, of course, but what would you expect.

Richmond and Shefford are poorly represented, for in Ottawa the commercial language is absolutely necessary, and a speaker in French is just talking to himself. To the majority he is just making pleasant musical noises to please the Deputy Speaker. These men are termed "sleepers."

No father of a family will handicap his children to-day by sending them forth lacking a knowledge of the universal commercial language.

Yet these two counties send men who cannot speak intelligently to their fellow-members at Ottawa.

With the member for Huntingdon always ready to join the compact of this province within a province, we might have gotten some recognition. But we did not even get one of those jocular things they call a "Minister without portfolio," which was the last-moment sprat thrown at us by the unlamented King administration.

Gentlemen of the Commons, all six of you, take your pen in hand and tell your constituents, all Record readers, what have you done within the first four years. These columns are open to you. They will not be in the future unless a response comes now.

The Newspaper lives through the long years. Not a single public man of 1897 is actively alive to-day. The wheel turns. We are always on the driver's box solely by reason of experience in knowing how to win an election.

It may not be convenient for the members to indite an accounting just now. Nor may it be convenient for the Record to print it other than now.

KEEP OUT THE INTERLOPERS.

The Curling season is over, but we still have our memories of a successful season, and of a reawakening during the past few years.

Tennis rackets and golf clubs are being taken out, dusted and polished. Daylight saving, with the long twilights, is just around the next corner in the almanac.

Softball teams will soon decorate the squares, parks and parade grounds. In this league there should be a line drawn between the big shop leagues and the little fellows who see in it only a chance for free advertising. Such leagues as may be formed should close the door against free publicity seekers.

The Sporting Editors are the final arbiters in eligibility. They will draw the line tight. Teams that are hired will be fired from notice.

Hard baseball has pretty well killed itself in the ranks of amateurs.

As usual, the school boys will set the pace, and their joy is in playing the game.

EDITOR'S NOTE BOOK.

With an over-abundant supply of sugar cane in the South, and the United States Congress threatening to put a quota on the sweets of life, we are paying six cents a pound for sugar whilst it is selling at four cents across the border. We do not grow sugar cane. Our beet root sugar crop is about the size of a tea cup to a car-load. But the children pay fifty per cent, more for their candy and their temperance beverages. This is intemperate taxation in a dual sense. Oh, yes, we need the taxes, but why lighten the load on luxuries and put it on any necessity of life, such as meat, drink, washing and lodging. This is not war time. We are not called upon to starve our bodies, or unduly reduce the standard of living.

The sale of liquor under Government control was loudly touted a few years ago as a means to gain an income for the upkeep of hospitals. We have not compared the income with the outlay in Quebec, but that province has profited \$50,000,000 in the trade since the inception of Government control. We are being urged now to legalize lotteries for the sake of the hospitals, even though more than half the patients pay their way. After the lotteries contribute, to what further depths do we descend in search of tainted money?

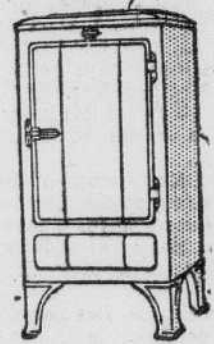

FIND MAY SOLVE BROOKLYN MYSTERY

Brooklyn, N.Y., April 9.—A
seven year search for a Brooklyn
woman extended today to Kitchen-
er, Ont., where a woman's skeleton
was found last Wednesday in a
sand pit.

Brooklyn attorneys were in touch
with authorities in Kitchen-
er, believing the find might solve the
mystery of Eugenia Cedarholm's
disappearance in 1927.

The woman, who was twenty-
seven, suddenly vanished, leaving a
\$60,000 house on Schermerhorn
street. The seven year search for the
woman will end next November. At
that time the woman may legally be
declared dead.

Proceedings to settle the estate
are pending in Surrogate's Court.
A Brooklyn newspaper at one
time offered a \$500 reward for in-
formation about the woman.

One chapter in the celebrated
case was the conviction of Edward
Lawrence Hall, who had lived in
the woman's house, on a forgery
charge.

It was charged that Hall signed
Miss Cedarholm's name to a lease
on the house. He claimed to be her
husband, but refused to tell where
she was.

Hall is serving a twenty year sen-
tence in Sing Sing prison.

holm visited frequently in northern
New York and Canada.

MONCTON SQUAD WAS BEATEN IN SERIES OPENER

Allan Cup Holders Victims of Biggest Hockey Upset of the Year When They Drooped Unexciting International Amateur Series Opener to Detroit White Stars.

Toronto, April 9.—In its very first official test of the year against the United States game, Canadian amateur hockey has fumbled and lost at least some caste. The comeback attempt is to be staged tonight.

Out of a slow, unexciting opening skirmish in the first North American title series, Detroit's White Stars, United States champions, emerged with a two to one overtime victory over the Moncton Hawks. Allan Cup holders, who required official urging to take part in the series in the first place.

The second game will be played tonight. If the Hawks win this one, the teams will play a deciding contest Wednesday night. A gallery of 2,000, that would have been extremely bored with the proceedings had not the White Stars been delivering the biggest hockey upset of the year, seemed to get a kick out of the American win.

Pete McMahon, a giant 240-pound goaltender, native of Brockville, Ont., was the largest obstacle the Hawks faced in the series. McMahon had difficulty outskating the White Star forwards and they swarmed around the Detroit cage probably two dozen times, seeking in vain for a weakness in McMahon's armor.

The big fellow, amazingly active, dove into at least six shots that seemed certain to beat him. He kicked out drives for the corners and caught the high ones with his hands. Even when the Hawks threw rubber at him for minutes on end, McMahon showed no signs of letting down the barrier.

The Hawks dalled a little in the first period doing little backchecking and attacking casually. Even at that they outplayed the slower White Stars who broke through occasionally to provide goalie Jimmie Foster with an exciting moment. The exchanges were entirely without enthusiasm.

The American champions started to find themselves in the second stanza. Aubrey Webb led several threatening drives into Moncton territory before a play called Jimmy Sullivan, former Markdale, Ont., and St. Michael's College player, passed to Bigham who relayed it to Robbie Robson and the defenceless net in front of the Hawk cage, fired a goal.

The Hawks attacked somewhat vigorously for the rest of the period, but the better they could do was tie it up. Bill Miller sifted through the whole Detroit line-up and feinted McMahon from his cage before flipping the rubber into the empty net. Dad James and Aubrey Webb missed fine chances to send the Hawks out in front as the Canadian champions turned it on.

Actually it was midway through the third period before the crowd realized that the Hawks were fighting for a goal and that the goal wouldn't come. The Allan Cup winners staged raid after raid driving right up to McMahon's doorstep a half dozen times. But they couldn't beat the giant.

During one rush, Sammy McMahon, Hawk left winger, was accidentally cut across the face by Gordon Hunt's stick and was forced to retire. He was not badly hurt but did not return to action. At times Moncton charged five abreast and kept the puck inside the Detroit blue line. The White Stars always cleared.

The ten-minute overtime period was less than half over when the Americans—all naturalized Canadians except two—punched in the winning goal. It was a Bigham-to-Sullivan-to-Hunt play and Hunt took the final pass right in the Moncton goal mouth, scoring with a high shot.

The Hawks started the game at ten to one favorites. They benefited from penalties, Detroit drawing nine of the thirteen meted out for minor offences. They probably will be fairly heavy favorites before game time tonight, too.

BRAZIL WITHDRAWN FROM DAVIS CUP COMPETITION

New York April 9.—Brazil will not send a team to the United States this spring to challenge the winner of the North American zone for the right to compete in the European zone Davis Cup final, the United States Lawn Tennis Association's Davis Cup committee announced today.

The decision of Brazil to forfeit its place in the all-American inter-zone final was announced simultaneously with the confirmation of the Wilmington Country Club as the site for the matches between Canada and the United States, and the selection of the Baltimore Country Club's courts for the matches between the winner of the Canadian-American series and Mexico.

Financial reasons were believed to have prompted Brazil's withdrawal.

TWO MONTREAL TEAMS ADVANCE IN PLAY DOWNS

Nationales and C.P.R.A.A.A. Continued Along Dominion Basketball Trail Over Week-End—Y.M.H.A. Intermediates Bowed in First Game to Brockville.

Two of Montreal's title-seeking basketball teams advanced a step along the Dominion playdown trail and a third returned home with a deficit which it should not find difficult to overcome when the second game of a home and home series is played in the Metropolis next Saturday night. The Nationale aggregation reached the Eastern Canada senior cage semi-final by handing a second straight defeat to the Gleebe Collegiate Grads, while C.P.R.A.A.A. provincial junior monarchs, disposed of the Ottawa High School of Commerce in the first round of the playdowns.

The Young Men's Hebrew Association, Quebec's intermediate contenders, lost the first tilt of a two-game series with the Brockville Rowing Club and play the second contest in Montreal facing a seven-point deficit.

The Nationale quintette earned the right to oppose Windsor Assumption College in the Eastern Canada semi-final by eliminating the Gleebe Grads by a round score of eighty-six to forty-one. Victorious to the tune of fifty-one to nineteen in the return game in Ottawa on Saturday and emerged on the long end of a thirty-five to twenty-two count.

For the second successive time, C.P.R.A.A.A. came from behind in the second game of a home and home series to win the round. They won the provincial title which had remained in Sherbrooke for two years by overcoming the nine-point advantage which the Sherbrooke Regiment had gained in the Eastern Townships centre and on Saturday brought the hopes of the Ottawa School of Commerce to an end by winning a seven-point margin and winning the round by a deficit of nineteen points.

With Lanther and Cooney leading the offensive, the Railroaders adopted smart tactics to oust the Ottawa champions by a score of thirty-seven to eleven over the week-end, and a count of sixty-five to forty-six on the round. Seamen as well as landmen have admitted a jolt from their first glimpse of the Endeavour's great hollow steel mast, just about completed in a nearby yard. Although the spar measures 197 feet in length, its maximum diameter is said to be only fifteen inches.

BODY OF JULIAN STILL IN UNDERTAKING PARLOR

No Decision Yet Reached as to Disposition of Body of Canadian-Born Petroleum King Who Died in Poverty.

Shanghai, April 9.—The International Funeral directors, a local undertaking firm, are beginning to wonder what to do with the body of C. C. Julian, the former Winnipeg newspaper and oil operator who killed himself.

Upon orders of British authorities, after the Canadian-born fugitive from Oklahoma justice took poison on March 25th, the firm prepared the body and made arrangements for a simple funeral and burial.

Then came instructions from Julian's sister in Los Angeles, Mrs. Viola Greenhow, to have the body cremated and the ashes sent back to United States for burial.

Officials of the International Funeral Directors said today, however, that no money had been received for expenses, despite repeated queries sent to Los Angeles.

Th wife of the one-time millionaire who died in poverty was said to have sent funds from her home in Winnipeg to "ensure burial."

Yet the body now is lying in an obscure corner of the undertakers' parlors, giving the sister in Los Angeles time to claim the ashes if she still desires.

Mrs. Julian went to Winnipeg from Los Angeles after Julian's first large petroleum enterprise was closed. She has resided there with her two daughters.

SHARP DECLINE IN FRUIT PRODUCTION IN PROSPECT

Higher Prices May Prevail in Ontario and Quebec, but Not to Extent Sufficient to Compensate Growers for Reduced Crops.

Ottawa, April 9.—A sharp reduction in the production of fruit this year is in prospect for Ontario and Quebec owing to the damage done to fruit trees by the severe winter, according to M. B. Davis, Dominion horticulturist.

In consequence, higher prices for fruit may prevail but not to an extent sufficient to compensate growers for their reduced crops. Mr. Davis estimated the drop in production might range from thirty to forty per cent.

In some localities, Mr. Davis said, the frosts had caused permanent damage to the trees. In most it would take two or three years of natural growth to overcome. Fruit growers had a surplus for export last year but none is anticipated this year. Apples, peaches, plums, pears and cherries are all affected.
