Three running locally

Three candidates are in the field in the Westmount riding for the April 29 provincial general election.

The present member, Liberal J. Richard Hyde, has not as yet been named.

Surprise entry in this ultra-nationalist constituency is a standard-bearer for the ultra-nationalist Parti Quebecois, 36-year-old management consultant Pierre De Broux, 2255 Chomedey street. Mr. De Broux is a McGill University graduate.

And selected last night for presentation to a Social Credit nominating convention here was Robert E. S. Morgan, 44-year-old school teacher. Now resident of Chateauguay, he is a former Westmounter who attended Queen's, Argyle, King's and Westmount Junior High schools.

Standing for the National Union government party will be Wesley H. Bradley, QC, former Westmount School Commissioner. He resides at 1320 Sherbrooke street west in Montreal and until recently at 6 Belfrage road, Westmount.

This week there had been no word from local provincial Liberals.

Holiday weekend:

One thing seems for sure: there'll be no mail on Friday

If mail service has been uncertain - to say the least - in recent weeks, one announcement by post office seems certain:

There will be NO mail delivery on Good Friday. Montreal's postmaster adds, somewhat redundantly, that there will be none on Holy Saturday, either.

Service to boxholders will be provided from 8 am to noon at the main post office downtown, both days, and at postal stations, including Westmount's, Saturday only from 9 am to noon.

Sub-offices will be closed Friday, there will be "regular service" for reception and despatch of mails both days, Sunday service will be provided for special delivery and street letter box collections - staff disrup-

tions permitting - on Friday, with what again is described as "regular service" on Saturday.

In capital letters the announcement was "Regular weekday service will be given on Easter Monday, March 30." Then, "Administrative offices will be closed".

More particularly in Westmount, all but essential civic services will be closed from Thursday evening until Tuesday morning, with the exception of the Westmount Public Library which will be open as usual on Saturday only, from 10 am to 6 pm.

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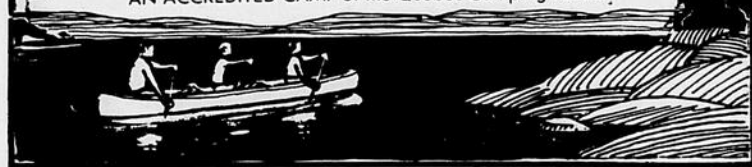
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ROYAL MONTREAL REGIMENT IN THE FIELD

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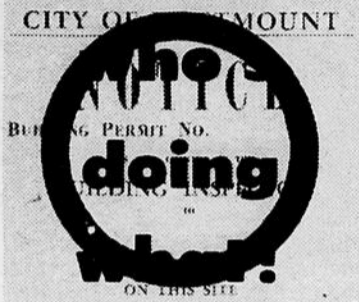

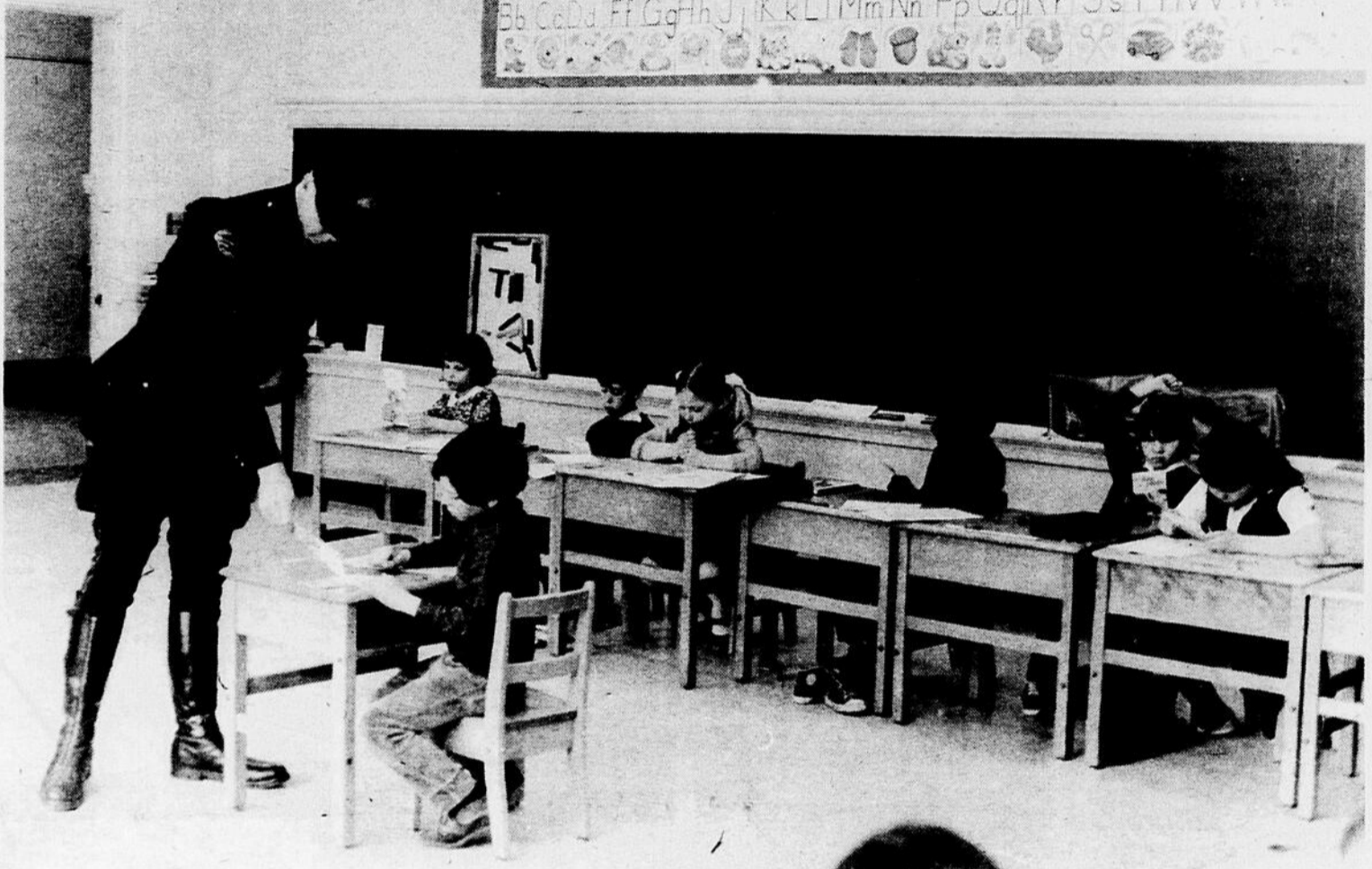
Residents over a wide area of Westmount and beyond late last Wednesday night and into Thursday morning were reporting "strange odors" and "smell of gas."

We Say

Some things Mr. Drury didn't say

Having invited Mr. Drury — as our local MP, as Treasury Board president and as senior representative of the federal cabinet from this area — to comment on the Montreal area postal crisis, we thank him for doing so this week for his column appearing on this page.

There is no federal matter of greater concern at the moment to the majority of his constituents, and what he has to say will be carefully read.

It must, of course, be read, keeping in mind that in the interest of cabinet solidarity he expresses an official government view. To have expressed even a modicum of sympathy for the citizens to whom the postal disruption has been increasingly inconvenient, worrying and costly would, we suppose, be an implied criticism of his colleague, Postmaster General Kierans, and his handling of the two-month-old worsening crisis.

Nor is there any hint of the cabinet split over Mr. Kierans' performance, reports of which have not been denied.

Therefore, it can be understood why there is little light shed on the inexplicable handling of the Lapalme drivers' dispute, other than the already known fact that 28 drivers are being prosecuted.

Which of course has done nothing for embattled Montrealers: this week the blockades of the main post office have gone on by the drivers at liberty, and mails continue to be delayed.

Mr. Drury may forgive us

It should go without saying that *The Examiner* very much regrets the uncertainty of delivery of the paper each week to its subscribers, who are served exclusively by mail. Under normal circumstances, service is excellent with all our Westmount readers receiving their copies by Friday post. Though as usual we have delivered bags, sorted by individual postal walks, bags have either failed to reach the Westmount postal station or carriers have failed to deliver the paper as usual.

for also suggesting that he is careful not to be critical of his colleague, Solicitor-General George McIlraith, responsible for the RCMP. The fact remains that the big, Westmount-based establishment of "The Horsemen," as local policemen left to bear the brunt of the federal force's responsibilities sneeringly call them, have taken no known role in Ottawa's own mail problems here.

It is not a question of Mounties guarding street-corner letter boxes or making local arrests, but basic protection of the mail while in post office possession — to see that it is not delayed or interfered with or that post office workers, including Lapalme drivers, are not intimidated.

Regarding the negotiations with the postal unions, Mr. Drury speaks with free authority. This is in the direct purview of his department. Most of us who have dealt with unions know the problem, and we have the greatest sympathy with Mr. Drury's negotiators.

However, we cannot agree that the drivers' dispute and postal agreements are "quite unrelated." Greater alacrity in those negotiations would have neutralized the very understandable fear that forthright dealing with the Lapalme dispute when it erupted eight weeks ago might have precipitated a general postal shut-down.

There is general satisfaction that Westmount's skilled Carl Goldenberg was brought in, however late, to attempt to clean up what the government, with all its vast resources, appeared unable to do for itself.

We don't necessarily recommend the draconian military measures used this week in the U. S. postal walkout. But they, at least, have the quality of decision and forthrightness — singularly lacking in Ottawa's bumbling, division and temporizing to the cost of its own citizens and disservice to its own servants.

False fire alarms never were in the same relatively innocent

The postal situation

I must take exception to an editorial which appeared in *The Examiner* recently criticizing the federal government both for the postal dispute in Montreal and for delays in negotiating agreements with postal employees (two subjects that are quite unrelated).

First of all, let me repeat what I said in a previous article on the current postal situation on the Island. The federal government does not condone the disruption of services, violence and intimidation that have occurred in recent weeks. No government which pretends to represent its people in a responsible manner could approve of such tactics and methods employed by a small group of irresponsible people.

Local police role

However, contrary to the editor's opinion, it is not for the federal authorities to arrest these people whatever the offence may be. Commission of a federal offence (which delaying of the mail or abandonment of mail trucks is)

boyhood escapade category as, say, pinching apples from a backyard tree.

Rather, they long have been regarded as the work of sick minds, utterly the opposite of any suggestion of manliness.

Apart from the character and makeup of the perpetrator, there always has been the great danger every false alarm creates for firemen conscientiously answering such calls and innocent citizens, both motorists and pedestrians, along the route of the fire equipment.

Several new dimensions are added when it is not simply a pulled alarm box but a telephoned warning that a bomb or explosive device has been placed somewhere, usually in a school or other public building. There is the risk of panic or at best, deep concern and loss of time for the occupants.

False bomb alarms have become all too frequent recently in Westmount. Schools are the targets. Students almost invariably are responsible.

Monday there were two, in the morning at Westmount Park School and over the noon hour at Westmount High School. Tuesday, there was another at the high school. WHS had one last week.

We don't ordinarily report these as anything but "false alarms" — we don't propose to give young devils the satisfaction nor others the idea.

But the time has come to tell irresponsible youngsters of Westmount and their parents that the "game", if it ever was that, is becoming very risky indeed for the players.

Last week we reported two 14-year-old boys before Social Welfare Court on the grave charges which result from getting caught. This week, we report the arrest of a 13-year-old. There'll be more.

So kids: think twice before you pull the bomb-hoax stunt. No longer can you risk boasting about it to a friend, so there is no satisfaction in it. And the authorities not only have a line on you but can now pull it tight while you're in the very act.

does not mean that federal officers (RCMP) make the arrest. Although a federal offence may have been committed and federal authorities might become involved in the matter, the initial responsibility for making an actual arrest lies with the local or municipal authorities.

If a person were caught tampering with a mail box in the City of Westmount, that case should be reported to Westmount Police, not to the RCMP. I hope, then, the lack of evidence of Mounties on every street corner in my riding does not lead people to believe that violence and interference with the mails are being condoned or being permitted to continue. In point of fact, this week some 28 drivers of G. Lapalme Inc. were committed to trial for delaying delivery of the mails.

Upon the advice of the federal department of justice, the post office decided several weeks ago under the provisions of the Post Office Act to take legal action against several truck drivers of G. Lapalme Inc. Last week these drivers appeared at preliminary hearings and on Monday of this week were committed to trial. So, contrary to public opinion action was initiated some time ago against those responsible for the disruption of mail services.

I might add that since the appointment of Carl Goldenberg to look into the postal dispute, the post office has refrained from further prosecutions in the interests of a peaceful and fair settlement of the current situation.

The other point raised by the editor was that the *Examiner's* sympathy was swinging to the letter carriers and postal clerks in the post office because their new contracts are months overdue. It is quite true that negotiations between the federal government and the postal unions' agent, the Council of Postal Unions did extend some months beyond the end of the previously existing agreement which terminated on September 30, 1969. However, I do not understand how the editor (or anyone) can conclude that the blame for such a delay in successfully negotiating a new contract should automatically be placed at the feet of the federal government.

Collective bargaining in the federal public service, although a recent innovation and despite certain time lags, has worked well. It is a process which requires considerable effort and expertise from both the parties concerned. In the specific case of negotiations between Treasury Board officials and the Council of Postal Unions, I might say that the wage demands of the employees were only presented to the government in February and only after the federal government had made its wage proposals known to the union membership. The negotiations reached an impasse and a conciliation board will be reviewing the situation imminently.

Two parties

The important thing to bear in mind when considering any such negotiation is that there are two parties involved whose views are often in conflict. The easiest and fastest method of concluding a

Thirty-five years Ago
March 22, 1935

Even in 1935 there was educational change and discussion in Westmount.

"Definite decision to bring about 'radical change' in the school system of Westmount was voiced with acclaim Friday night at a mass meeting of citizens and the school commissioners in Westmount High School when hearty approval was given the plans of the school commissioners to form an elementary high school in the new Argyle building, now nearing completion.

"Radical changes in the school system will involve ending the elementary grades at the seventh, 'scrambling' all seventh grade pupils and during the year routing them into three different courses: a general course, a commercial or business course, and an academic one."

Twenty-five Years Ago
March 23, 1945

Twenty years before Canada got its own flag, the issue was discussed editorially by *The Examiner*.

"The Maple Leaf, the Canadian Army newspaper overseas, has this to say editorially on the subject of a distinctive flag for Canada.

"For years we Canadians have recognized the maple leaf as the emblem of our home country. Let us have our national flag and let's have the maple leaf as the predominant emblem!"

"The point is well taken but nevertheless we disagree. We are not in favor of departing from tradition too far in this matter."

Fifteen Years Ago
March 25, 1955

"A series of special events — reaching a climax with a gala program tomorrow — is being sponsored by the Unity Boys' Club Week, which started Monday.

"The week and its events are designed to show parents and others interested in youth welfare just what goes on in one of the most inclusive clubs in the city — their own club.

"Theme of this year's celebration is Operation Juvenile Delinquency, the desire to encourage the concept of decency in the rising generation."

Also to celebrate the occasion, the Westmount Rotary Club met at the Unity Boys' Club at which Rotarian Don Ross was presented with the Bronze Keystone Award for service.

Five Years Ago

Fatal crash snaps 17-month death-free traffic record

A violent crash in the small hours of Friday on St. Catherine street took a life and snapped Westmount's proud record of nearly 17 months free of a traffic fatality.

Charles Thomas Kingsmill, 26, of Gables Court, Beaconsfield, lost his life at 3:49 am when, driving home alone, he slammed his 1967 Volvo into the rear of a parked POM bakery truck, parked on St. Catherine street on the east slope leading to the Glen. He died almost instantly.

Last death of an occupant of a vehicle on local streets was on Nov. 2, 1968, at Sherbrooke street and Elm avenue. That fatality also occurred in the early-morning hours.

From measurements taken by Westmount Police, it is estimated that Kingsmill was travelling at a high rate of speed.

Headed west, the Volvo struck the rear of the bakery truck, which was unoccupied, alongside the artificial ice rink by the curb, with such force that shackles on the trucks springs were snapped.

The car was virtually a write-off. Its roof was

peeled back with the rear-view mirror grotesquely positioned over the rear seat.

Westmount firemen were summoned to assist in separating the two vehicles and removing the body.

The mishap was first reported by a taxi driver by radio through his dispatcher to the police. A doctor in a Queen Elizabeth Hospital ambulance, promptly on the scene, pronounced the driver dead.

Kingsmill was married with two children. He was in the investment business.

There is no doubt that Shakespeare wrote all that is attributed to him in spite of those who believe otherwise, he said. He had a good education, was a wealthy man and enjoyed an incomparable niche in the literature of the world won, by the 37 plays and hundreds of poems which flowed from his untiring mind.

Shakespeare's influence covered the greatest age of English music with England having a population of only five million with 10 theatres located in London at that time. It was the opinion of the speaker that Shakespeare's poetry is to be enjoyed rather than analyzed.

Introduced by Steve Spire, the speaker was thanked by Bob Layton.

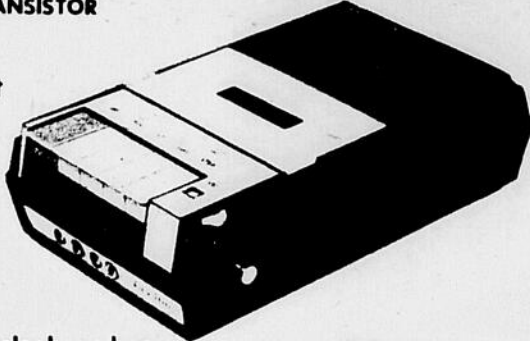

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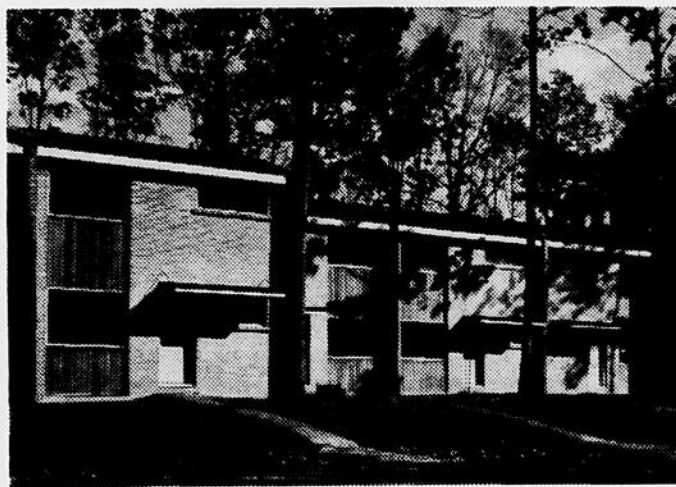
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Bicycle inspection, permits tied together by new rules

announce new program**

Okay, kids. Now hear this. There's a new drill this year concerning your bicycles.

Your machines are going to have to pass an inspection by the Westmount Police and measure up to proper mechanical and safety standards before you can get your license.

However, things are going to be made easier to get your inspection and permit.

Each of the Saturdays of April 11, 18 and 25 there will be a setup at the artificial ice rink in Westmount Park, where inspection and permit-issuing will be done in one fell swoop. There is also the possibility of some free films to be seen, too.

This year Westmount has joined the Bicycle Guild, Inc., by which bikes will be registered on a national basis—to make easier tracing if they are stolen or strayed—as well as locally, by name, by license number and by bike serial number.

This year's licenses will be blue and white plastic, sealed to the bike frame.

The fee, as usual, is \$2.

Six years and under, honorable mention, Carol Turner, The Study;

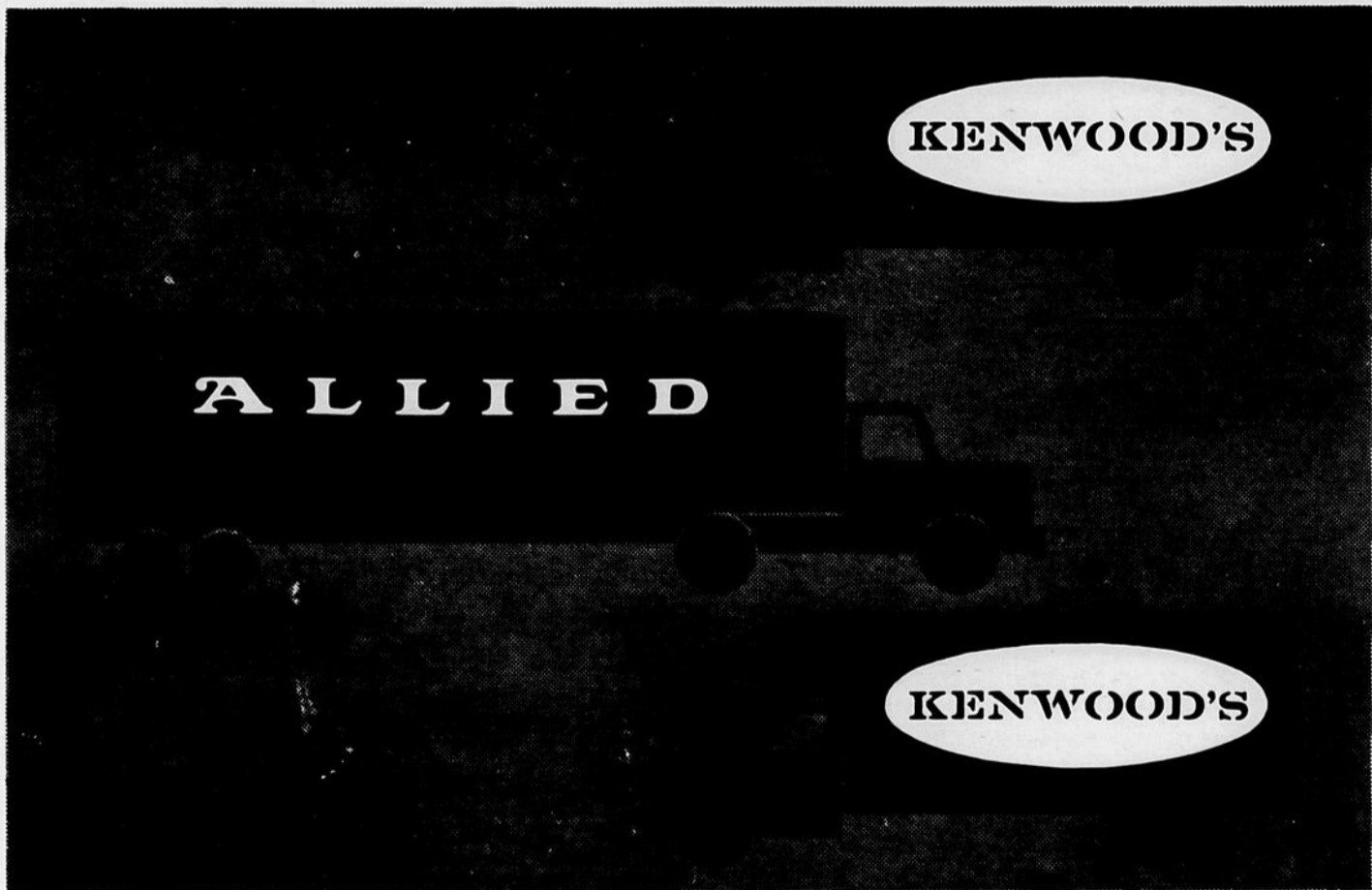

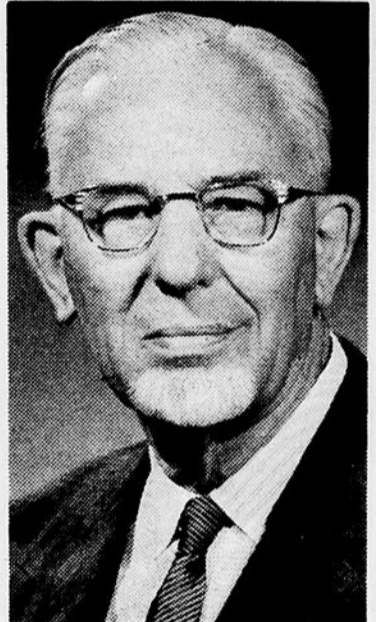

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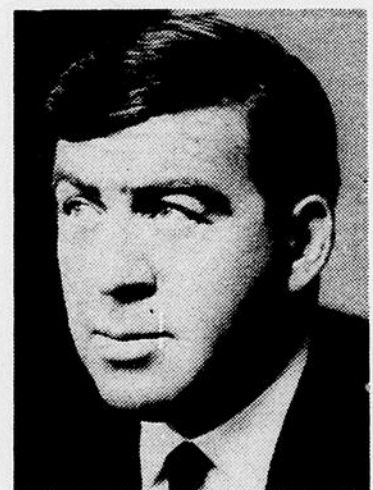


75-voice Harpur Chorale at St. Andrew's Men's Clubs meeting here

Food additives

Many varied convenience foods have been made available to the modern homemaker, which eliminate the need for a lot of peeling, slicing, squeezing, boiling, baking and frying. Many of these foods have been made possible through the use of food additives which preserve food, improve its texture, appearance and taste, or aid in its processing.

For example, additives are used as a preservative in pickles to prevent spoilage; as an emulsifier in salad dressing to help mix oil and vinegar; as a thickener in jam, as a stabilizer in chocolate milk to help prevent chocolate particles from settling to the bottom of the container.

The use of chemical additives in food is strictly controlled by regulations of the Food and Drugs Act administered by the Food and Drug Directorate of the Department of National Health and Welfare. The FDD regulations have established a permitted list of additives which food manufacturers in Canada may use. All additives must meet the rigid conditions and specifications for purity, safety and efficiency. The FDD requires proof of scientific testing before considering an additive to the permitted list.

An additive may not be permitted when it disguises a product and makes it look better than it is; when it deceives the consumer or destroys some of the nutrient value.

Scientists in the Food and Drug Directorate are the nations watchdogs for food additives.

Fear of the dark

Many children at some time or other experience fear of the dark. The child may feel just plain "scared" and not be able to fall asleep. Other times, the child's fears may take the shape of a ghost, a burglar, a snake or some other "scary" character recently seen on television or read about.

If your child is afraid of the dark, do not ridicule his fears or be strict with him. When a child is afraid to be alone in the dark, with his feelings, he shows how badly he needs comfort, love and reassurance, not just at night but during the day too. His self-confidence is suffering a setback. If you have been reprimanding him for trivial misbehavior or battling over such matters as toilet training and eating, it is desirable you ease up on the disciplining and demands, and reassure him of your love and approval of him.

collective agreement is for one side to accede to the other's demands.


Treasury board officials could have said to the unions' agent. Alright we want to get these negotiations over with as soon as possible, state your demands and we'll accept them. This approach may appear ludicrous but it is either that or determined collective bargaining, whereas I have indicated the final acceptable terms are not necessarily presented at the outset.

So the negotiations drag on, and one of the reasons they drag on is because the union agent expects any wage agreement to be retroactive. So it does not matter how long negotiations take because employees know that advantages gained will apply to the period spent on negotiations.

Finally, I might point out that the Council of Postal Unions' counter proposal to the government's offer of substantial increase over a three-year period provided for a contract for one year only which, when you consider the time already elapsed, meant a seven-month contract - clearly time enough to prepare for negotiating next year's contract.
