PROVINCIAL PARLIAMENT.

OF
LOWER-CANADA.
HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY,
FEBRUARY—1817.

SATURDAY, 15—The bill for granting a Pension to Mad. Panet, widow of the late Speaker, was read a third time, passed and sent to the Legislative Council.

Resolved, by a Committee of the whole house, that the sum of £6000 currency, be granted to the ladies of the Hotel Dieu of Quebec, to aid them in erecting new wards for the sick; which was concurred in by the house and a bill brought in for the purpose, and read for the first time. The second reading ordered for Monday.

A Committee of the whole reported amendments in the bill for continuing the act for regulating Bakers, and for repealing the ordinance therein-mentioned; which were concurred in by the house. Ordered to be engrossed.

The house went into Committee on the roads and bridge acts; also to consider whether it is expedient to augment the allowance to the Inspectors of the roads within the cities of Quebec and Montreal.

The Committee reported that they had formed several Resolves—Ordered to report on Monday.

The Bill to authorize a Census and Statistical returns of the Province of Lower-Canada was read a second time—referred to a Committee of the whole for Tuesday.

The Special Committee on the petition of J. B. Bodard, surveyor, reported.

Resolved, That an humble address be presented to His Excellency the Governor thereon.

Resolved, That an humble address be presented to His Excellency the Governor in Chief, praying an advance of £500 cy. to the Clerk of the house, on account of the contingencies of the present session.

Ordered, That a Bill be brought in in favor of the Students at law who served during the late war, which was brought in accordingly and read for the first time. The second reading was ordered for Wednesday.

A like Bill was ordered to be brought in in favor of Students for the profession of Notary who served during the late war. Read for the first time. The second reading ordered for Wednesday.

Resolved, That the order of the day for the 22d of this month, for taking into consideration the Message of the late Administrator in Chief to the Assembly of this Province, bearing date 2d Feby. 1816, be postponed to the 19th March next.

Read a second time the Bill for repealing in part the Army-Bill Act.

Referred to a Committee of the whole for Monday.

Ordered that it be an instruction to the Committee to consider whether it is expedient to extend beyond the duration of the said Act for the facilitating the circulation of Army-Bills, any of the provisions contained therein for the support of the Army-Bill Office.

The House in Committee reported a Resolve on the expediency of repealing or amending the existing Laws respecting the Lumber Trade, in which the House concurred.

Ordered that a Bill be brought in for the purpose, which was brought in accordingly and read for the first time. The second reading ordered for Wednesday.

Read a second time the Bill for the more effectual administration of the office of a Justice of the Peace in the different Districts and for the more effectual prevention of thefts and other felonies.

Ordered, to a Special Committee of five Members with power to send for persons, papers and records.

Ordered, that it be an instruction to the Committee appointed to bring in bills on the Resolves of the House of yesterday, relating to the Country Parishes, to prepare and report a bill to indemnify Major-General Wilson and the persons concerned in advising the Embargo laid by the Proclamation dated July, 1816.

Read a second time the bill for Joseph Roy's intended bridge over the River Jesus, in the County of Eglarham. Referred to a Special Committee of five Members.

WEDNESDAY, 19.
Mr. Speaker informed the House that he had received the following Documents from His Excellency the Governor in Chief, which were read, and are as follows:

MONTREAL, February 14, 1817.
SIR,
As I find that the House of Assembly is proceeding under a Committee, upon a Petition presented to that House, by Samuel Sherwood, one of the Members thereof made early in the Session of the present Legislature, wherein he has stated that I had absented myself from sitting in, and holding a Court of King's Bench for the District of Montreal, on the first ten days of the month of March last passed, whereby the said Court was not held, and the Law of the Land was dispensed with contrary to the Bill of Rights, and as this assertion may imprudently be brought forth,

as a charge against my official character and duties; in a case where the prerogative of the Crown has been legally exercised, and when the conduct of its officer is not culpable, I am impressed with the duty of presenting to Your Excellency my conduct, and the exercise of the prerogative, in respect to my duties upon holding the said Court, in the month of March last.

Your Excellency will perceive by the inclosed Letter, the express injunctions of His Excellency the Administrator in Chief, and may be a better judge than I can presume of the reasons that occasioned his exercise of the rights of the Sovereign in respect to my duties. And Your Excellency will justly appreciate how far the Assembly should be permitted to proceed, in a formal charge, which, I submit, could not take place were that House officially apprized of the circumstances attending the conduct that had superinduced a supposed Culpability in a Servant of the Crown.

And the said Documents were referred to the Special Committee on the Petition of Samuel Sherwood, Esq.

We think it our duty to correct an error which has inadvertently crept into the publication in our last number, of the proceedings of the house of Assembly, relating to the Resolution for laying an Embargo; and we feel it the more incumbent on us, from understanding that the strength of argument, in the discussion of the subject, went to impress on the minds of the Members, that our Legislature had not the power to prevent the exportation through the St. Lawrence of any produce of a Sister Province.

ERRATUM.

In the Resolution of the House of Assembly, reported on Friday the 14th instant; for "That an Embargo be laid on all wheat, flour, biscuit and every other grain, to prevent the exportation of such wheat and flour as may be imported into the Province."
