

'WESTMOUNT STORY' TOLD

Mayor Gives City's Facts To Electors

Westmount's Mayor J. A. DeLalanne — following annual custom — took a well-filled brief case to the annual meeting of the Westmount Municipal Association Tuesday night and let the citizens in on the facts of the case.

The city, he said, is doing well in all departments.

The annual report, he indicated, revealed an active and progressive year.

Perhaps from a news standpoint, the mayor's most pertinent remarks had to do with traffic and transportation when he gave assurance that the tram cars within the next twelve month would be replaced by busses.

Mayor DeLalanne said trams will be removed from St. Catherine and Sherbrooke streets, Greene and Victoria avenues and also from the Boulevard.

Reporting on use of Victoria and Grosvenor avenues as one-way streets, the mayor said the traffic change was working well.

Mayor DeLalanne said additional signals will be installed at Westmount and Grosvenor avenues, Cote St. Antoine road and Grosvenor avenue and Western and Claremont avenues. Improvements will be made to the traffic lights at Cedar and Mount Pleasant avenues.

He said per capita loss from fires in Westmount in 1953 was the lowest in the country — \$1.65. Westmount has had a per capita loss of \$2.15 for the last decade, the lowest year being 1947 when the per capita loss was 86 cents and the highest recorded the preceding year when the per capita loss was \$3.74.

He reported a small turnout for the polio vaccination program. On the

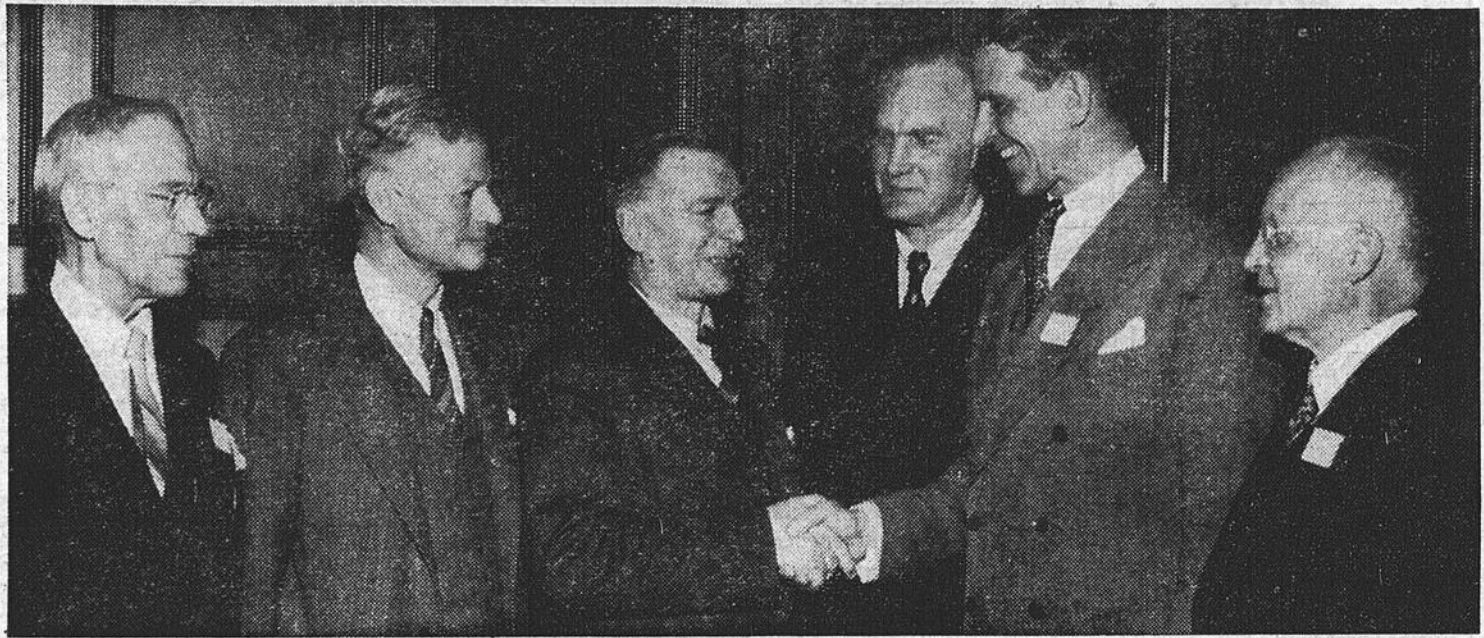

Public Taste Said Slowing Radio Changes

Only the public's dislike for change is standing in the way of widespread use of a far superior type of radio, among other electrical appliances.

Dave Campbell, of Melody House, pointed this out Wednesday in an address before the weekly meeting of the Rotary Club of Westmount.

"The radio as we know it today is changing so rapidly that the customer's willingness to accept new advances is the biggest problem," he said.

He told of transistors — tiny enough to permit a wrist radio — taking the place of tubes.

"But the public is used to buying big radios, and so refuses to accept this miniature — but superior — model."

Mr. Campbell also described changes in television. "Picture tubes, the biggest part of a television set, will remain on the face or screen section, while the gun or neck of the tube will shorten and shorten, until a two or three inch glass panel will make up the picture.

"The bulky chassis will fit in the bottom of that tube. Imagine a 21 inch television set, 21 inches wide, four inches thick. It will work properly, but will you, the public, be ready to buy?"

Mr. Campbell warned people against taking the words of servicemen as gospel, without checking facts.

"To train a serviceman to enter a home and repair an appliance without commenting on every appliance in the home, let alone stopping him from condemning the one he is sent to repair . . . is a major job, and women take every word they say as Gospel, without checking the facts."

He said this is logical, for the men are representing the company and are supposed to be interpreting company policy.

"I can assure you, though, that it is not our policy to tell a woman who has paid two or three hundred dollars for an item a couple of months ago, that what she bought is a lemon and not repairable.

"Yet we have had to dispense with more than one serviceman for that reason. Not that the appliance was unrepairable, but just that he was too lazy to investigate the complaint properly, and was only content to change a fuse or a tube, etc.

"That type of serviceman we feel we do not need," he said.

Mr. Campbell said buying appliances was largely a matter of personal choice. He advised prospective buyers to "take a long slow look," and to look at competitive makes.

He said it was important to get service at more than one place "for if a manufacturer has all service done by one source only, there is a tendency over the years for that company to forget the competitive aspect of all business and gradually the prices of parts for the appliance you own which is no longer under guarantee, start to get more expensive."

Mr. Campbell said today there is not only a buyers' market, "but it is also a non-price maintenance market."

"I agree that the resale prices set on a good many appliances are out of line. They were originally set to allow for trade-ins, for customer service, for merchandise on trial, and a multitude of smaller services, which have now disappeared. The public has decreed that they would prefer to buy these appliances at a lower price and take less services. That's why today when you buy a television set, your guarantee covers parts replacement only, for a specified period only with all labor being charged as you order it, or repurchase."

CAMP LEWIS

Camp programme is carried on, on an Indian Motif and each section is named after a Canadian Indian tribe and each cabin is named after a bird, fish, animal or mammal found in Canada. The highlight of each camp period is the camp elections for the Tribe Council in which all campers participate. The last day of each period is given over to the trials and initiation ceremony for the Council.

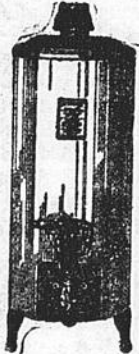

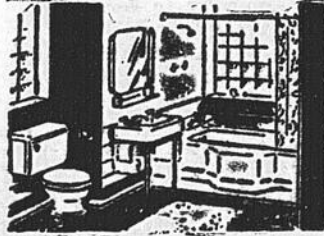

Local 'Y' Participates To Aid Less Fortunate

This month our local Y.M.C.A. is participating in an annual effort to help the Y.M.C.A.s in less fortunate countries than our own. This World Service program is now operating in 78 countries of the world.

In Liberia, just four years after World Service man Dave Howell launched the "Y" in his own house with a ping-pong table and a bunch of kids from the streets, the "Y" is operating in six cities, with 18,000 people directly reached by its program. A long step forward this year was the erection of Monrovia's new building. The growing strength of Liberia's "Y" is reflected in its expanding membership (300 in two years), in its spread to other cities and interior villages, in the national acceptance of the "Y"-sponsored Week of Prayer and Father and Son Week, in the wholehearted support given to the building program. Hi-Y clubs operate in all but one of Liberia's high schools, and the National Older Boys' Conference this year brought delegates from all sections of the Republic.

In Egypt, over 82,000 people benefited from "Y" activities in 7 Egyptian cities in 1953. Training courses in Alexandria and Cairo helped swell the total of volunteer leaders in the Egyptian "Y" movement to 625. In Alexandria, graduates go into graduate field work, many of them averaging from 12 to 18 hours of voluntary service weekly at the "Y". Similar programs are being developed in Assiut, Minia, Sohag, and Fayoum.

Especially significant in the Egyptian "Y" picture is its work with boys. The self-governing Boys' Department in Cairo and the model boys' parliaments train youths in democratic citizenship. In Assiut a boys' build-

Dr. Laycock Stresses Value Of Pupils' Participation

Many westenders participated in an Institute on Mental Health And The Normal Child, held Monday and sponsored by the Rotary Club of Montreal and the Montreal Council of Social Agencies.

The all day sessions finished with an address by Dr. S. R. Laycock, former dean of education at the University of Saskatchewan. He said teachers talked too much in class, and advocated more participation by pupils.

"There should be a great deal of pupil participation. The ideal class is a co-operative group where the teachers and pupils together are thinking through a topic or pursuing an activity," he said.

"The worst teaching I know of is in the universities. In many cases students have no chance for participation."

Some 175 Catholic and Protestant teachers, along with many social workers, participated in the Institute.

Morning speakers were J. W. Perks and Dr. E. McCracken, who considered The Educational Environment in Greater Montreal - Present And Future.

In addition Dr. Laycock spoke on Implications Of School Prac-

tices For Mental Health. Chairmen of this discussion were Mr. Justice Ralston and Dr. H. Cruikshank.

Group discussions featured the afternoon, with themes of Discipline as a factor in mental health; the curriculum as a factor in mental health; administrative practices as factors in mental health; teaching methods as factors in mental health.

Leaders were Father S. Govenlock, Hebert Matthews, Dr. E. McCracken, Prof. D. C. Munroe, Dr. Taylor Statten, and Dr. E. C. Webster.

Recorders were Martin Fleming, Arthur Glashan, Dr. Lorne Hamilton, K. H. Oxley, John Perrie and Anthony Vaupshas.

Group reports were presented, and discussed by a panel of Dr. Laycock, Dr. B. Silverman and Dr. M. Barbeau. Prof. Munroe acted as chairman of a discussion and question period.

Day sessions were held at the School for Crippled Children on Cedar avenue, and the evening meeting was at the High School of Montreal.

'Living' Benefits

Insurance Payments Increase, Meet Needs of Public

Canadian families received approximately \$1,200,000 on every working day during the past year from their life insurance companies. These payments were paid to many thousands of policyholders and beneficiaries.

Death benefits alone averaged more than \$450,000 each working day, with payments being made under about 300 policies.

Aggregate payments for all types of benefit were greater than \$302,000,000 in 1954. This exceeded the previous year's

figure by more than \$25,000,000 and was \$150,000,000 greater than 10 years ago.

The 1954 payments brought to more than \$2 billions the aggregate received by policyholders and beneficiaries in Canada since the close of World War II.

The increase in life insurance benefit payments in recent years is primarily a reflection of the increased ownership of life insurance. During the last ten years, ownership has risen 153 percent. All these claim figures demonstrate the increasing social-economic contribution life insurance makes to Canadian families.

Death benefits alone totalled over \$113,000,000 last year. This was about \$50,000,000 more than 10 years ago and represents nearly a 78 percent rise in the decade.

Payments to living policyholders came to more than \$189,000,000 in the form of matured endowments, disability payments, annuity payments, cash surrender values and dividends to policyholders. These "living" benefits represented 63 percent of total benefit payments.

In recent years life insurance has come more and more to be used for meeting the needs of living policyholders.

Rev. A. Jackson Speaks At Advent Church Sunday

The rigors of a hard early life served as lessons in understanding for a young Anglican priest who will be here Sunday as guest preacher at the Church of the Advent, Wood and Western avenues, at 11 a.m.

"We walked to and from school — a mile away — in 62 below zero weather. There were nine of us: my youngest brother was drowned in the Saskatchewan river. To take my upper grades, I worked in a small town where there was a college. Later, I waxed floors, kalsomined and painted, washed dishes and tutored boys in Latin and chemistry — anything to earn a little money while I did my university studies. I lived in a basement and we were often hungry and cold, but I'm glad of that experience because it helps me understand others' problems."

The description is by Alan Jackson, who will be in Montreal this week on his way back from England to Saskatchewan, where he had charge of several parishes before his Bishop sent him to study and travel.

Alan Jackson's first church was 14 years building. 200 stones were picked by hand by the men and boys of the district and carted to the church site. A master builder, with one prairie church to his credit, gathered limestone rock and burned it in his private kiln to use in the masonry.

At last it was finished and Rev. Jackson was inducted as rector. He wrote: "Every day brings fresh cause for rejoicing. I wish people in the cities could realize the fun and thrill of being a country priest."



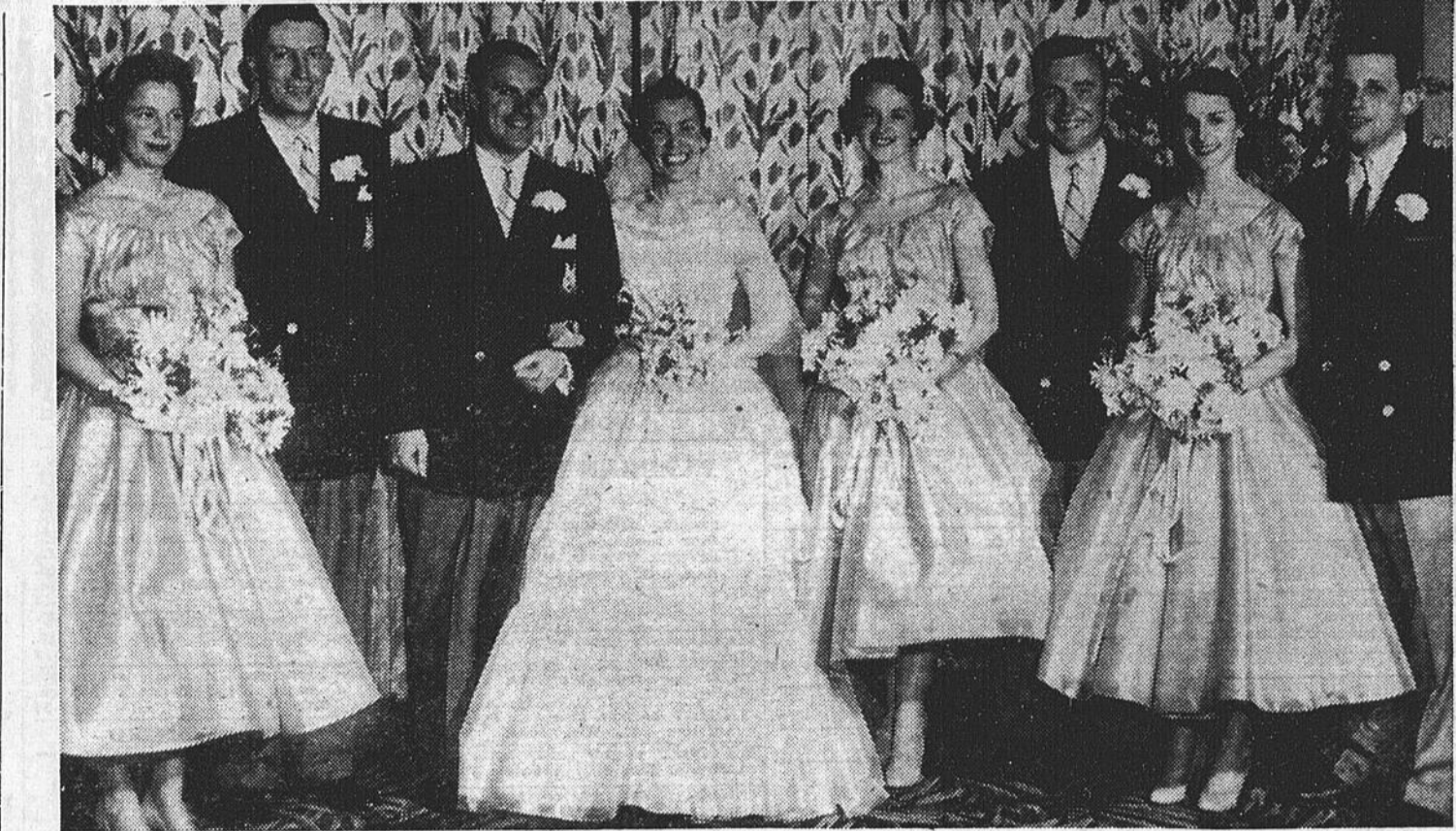

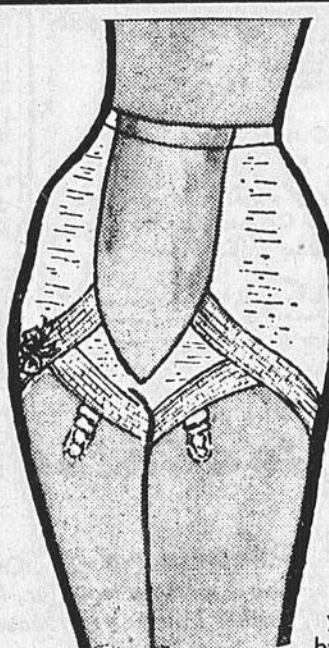

Deplorable Conditions For Mental Cases Said To Be Disgrace To The Province

The use of the Protestant Women's Jail for the detention of women on remand to determine whether or not they are insane drew a protest Tuesday from the Montreal Council of Women.

"The jail, while clean and well cared for, is a small institution," Mrs. Helena F. Reusing, president of the council, said at a press

conference in the University Women's Club. "It houses a maximum of 50 women. The shouts and screams of the poor mental cases can be heard all over, day and night. The task of feeding and caring for them takes most of the matron's time, so that no program of rehabilitation for the sane inmates is possible."

Letter Ignored

A letter sent by the council to Premier Duplessis has received no response, Mrs. Reusing continued. "We have been trying to get this situation changed since 1948, and so far we haven't been able to get anywhere. We were referred to Le Comité d'Hospitalization, a provincial body which has been set up to consult with hospitals. Even there we have been able to get nowhere; we couldn't get an appointment with Dr. Gerard LaSalle, and now we are told he has gone to Europe."

Mrs. Reusing said that the situation at the Protestant Women's Jail developed in November, 1948. Up until that time the Sisters of Good Shepherd, whose institution is in the same building as the jail, cared for Roman Catholic women on remand to determine whether or not they were insane.

Jail Chosen

"At that time the sisters refused to house their mental cases any longer, stating that it was too difficult. The provincial government rented a small place in Ville St. Laurent for these women, but it was quickly filled up. Then the Protestant Women's Jail was chosen as a place in which to keep these cases. Since the matron-in-chief is a civil servant, she could not refuse to take them in."

The only place where these women could be kept was in the eight punishment cells. "These cells are intended to be used to lock up a refractory woman prisoner, for only a few hours at a time. They contain room only for a cot, a narrow space on one side to move in, and a bucket."

Situation Worsens

The situation has been getting worse instead of better through the years, Mrs. Reusing continued. "About a year and a half ago, one of the jail's two large dormitories where regular inmates live was taken over for the mental cases. As a result, all the regular inmates, young or old, sick or well, first offenders of veterans, must sleep together in one large room."

A small room off the kitchen provides quarters for three or four prisoners. Mrs. Reusing added. "All other sleeping space is used by Roman Catholic mental cases."

The lack of adequate care for the mental cases is obvious, the council president said. "This should not be tolerated in our modern society, where mental illness is no longer regarded as incurable. Further, their presence in this crowded jail makes the application of up-to-date prison procedure impossible. The fact that this situation has obtained for six and a half years is a very poor record for the province of Quebec."

She pointed out in conclusion that none of these mental cases can be classed as criminally insane. "It is really shameful to keep them locked in these cells which would not be considered good for your dog."

Eggs In Potato Nests Good Economical Dish

Last week in Washington, D. C., we talked with Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson. He called our attention to the vast supply of fine eggs on the market, at low prices, and hoped we would make that protein fact known to our readers. The secretary is a family man. On his desk were pictures of his children. "Eggs are a wonderful food to raise children on," he said. "Especially when they are as reasonable as they are today."

Then he gave us two recipes from the department food experts. Here they are:

Eggs in Potato Nests (Serves 4)

One and one-half cups left-over mashed potatoes; 5 eggs; salt and pepper.

Mix potatoes with one of the eggs. Shape mixture into 4 balls and place on greased baking sheet. Press centers of balls to make cups. Break an egg into each cup and season with salt and pepper. Bake in a moderate oven (325 degrees F.) 20 to 25 minutes or until eggs are as firm as desired.

"Torero Pink" Make-Up Gives Spanish Allure

Choose a light shade of Silk-Tone foundation, the closest in color to your skin tone, from the shades Crackerjack, Peachbloom, or Mauresque — and cover the entire face. Polythene Supporters Keeps Heel In Shape

"Junior! Unlace your shoes before you step into them!" is a familiar cry in homes with children.

Junior and his mother will be glad to hear that shoes are now being made in Canada with backs which spring right up again instead of crushing when stepped on.

The material which provides the bounce is polythene, the tough flexible plastic which goes into unbreakable tumblers and other familiar household articles.

The heel part of any shoe is made with a semi-rigid insert called a "Counter" placed between the shoe lining and the outside leather to keep the heel in shape. Traditional counter materials have been cardboard-type fibre or tough sole leather. Today at least one large Canadian manufacturer is producing shoes with a moulded piece of polythene in the heel.

Fibre counters begin to lose their shape and usefulness within three or four weeks of active wear. Leather ones stand up for a few weeks longer. Even with the hardest wear it will outlast the rest of the shoe. Because the plastic is flexible as well as strong, it gives perfect comfort.

Manufacturers predict that this use of polythene may be a revolutionary development in the shoe industry. And if it keeps Junior's shoes from sagging at the heels, millions of parents will cheer, "Hurrah for the revolution!"

Elegant Shaped Wine Bottles Utilized For Pseudo-Pottery

Rough-textured pottery has a prominent role in modern home decoration and many women have taken up pottery-making as a hobby. But if you've neither the skill nor the inclination to tackle the art, here's a short-cut.

All you need is an empty wine bottle — one with an elegant shape — and a tin of plastic wood. Plastic wood handles like putty and hardens into wood and it is used to fill cracks and holes in wood. It is excellent for mending loose chair rungs or repairing handles on knives. You can get it from a C-I-L paint dealer or at a hardware store.

The shape is the thing which worries all serious workers-in-clay. But here you have the jump on them — you start with the already perfect shape of the bottle and simply plaster it! Work carefully and methodically, using a little plastic wood at a time and smoothing it on with a knife. Don't make it too smooth, of course — the roughness is half the beauty. Cover every bit of the bottle, from neck to base with a thin coating.

Plastic wood sticks to the fingers just as persistently as it does to the bottle, but there's a way to avoid that nuisance. In the same store where you buy plastic wood you can get a hand cream called "Pro-Tek" which prevents paint from sticking to the skin. It also sheds the plastic wood. Nail polish remover is also effective.

Italian wine bottles which come in little baskets have beautiful shapes, but they have a grave disadvantage — they're perfectly round on the bottom! That can be remedied by building a flat base with heavy cord and household cement. Coil the

cord to form a little cushion for the bottle to sit on, then stick the cord and bottle together with a liberal application of cement. When covered with the plastic wood, the base will look like part of the bottle.

Let the plastic wood dry — it will take half an hour or so — and then paint your creation. Use any odds and ends of paint you have in the house. Have fun mixing different colors and dabbing them on the bottle. Earthy browns and greens are most ef-

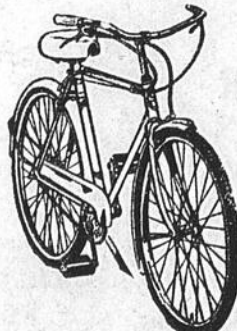

Slow Pitch League Planned For Westmount

Slow pitch softball will make its debut this summer in Westmount, if proposed plans for a league here materialize.

In response to many calls from residents, the Westmount Recreation Department this week is sending out notices to several local organizations, inviting participation in the new game.

Basically, slow pitch changes softball from a game dominated by strong pitchers into group participation — a criticism of the sport ever since hurlers learned how to take complete charge of the game.

Slow pitch has enjoyed outstanding success in many parts of the United States with recreation and house leagues the chief benefactors. The major change is that a ball must be pitched at a slow speed and with a compulsory arc on it, thus depriving the pitcher of the speed and stuff

that has led many to term him 90 per cent of a softball team.

Recreation superintendent E. A. Rothwell decided to see about organizing a league here after receiving several calls on the subject. Previously the Snowdon Married Men's League had decided to switch to slow pitch, the first group in the city to make the change.

Anyone interested in playing or organizing a team is invited to contact either Rothwell or Johnny Garland at FI. 6975.

According to the Westmount head, "this game may seem like a pushover but if one looks at it from the right angle it can be seen that the only thing easy about the game is the fact that most batters will hit the ball. The fielding becomes very difficult because of the hitting and base running is tougher because of increased distance."

The game of slow pitch has been termed a boon to both young and old by its adherents. Necessity is the mother of invention, they say, and slow pitch came about because there was a definite need for it.

American officials in slow pitch centers say it gives a wider range of opportunity to play softball with a semblance of ability. Cincinnati provides a ready example of its pull. There are three fast pitch leagues operating there with 20 teams and 300 players. This compares to 110 slow pitch leagues, with 800 teams and 12,000 players.

Another big reason for its rise has been the reluctance of personnel directors who became discouraged as leagues were monopolized by single teams with outstanding pitchers, and refused to sponsor teams.

They also felt it unwise to put

a strain on labor-management relations, because hiring a man simply because of his pitching ability tended to create ill-will among other employees.

There are official slow pitch rules, and every year a world tournament is held in tracing the growth of the game, expert opinion believes it is more interesting and more skillful than fast pitch at all positions except pitcher.

The rules allow 10 players instead of nine. A legal delivery is a ball pitched underhand to the batter at a moderate speed with a perceptible arc of not less than one foot and that reaches a height of not more than 10 feet before the ball reaches the plate. After each pitch that isn't hit, the ball must be returned to the pitcher. The strike zone ranges from shoulder to knee, and the batter is retired if he tries to

bunt. Runners may not lead until the ball crosses home plate. A regulation softball is used, and pitching distance will probably be at 43 feet.

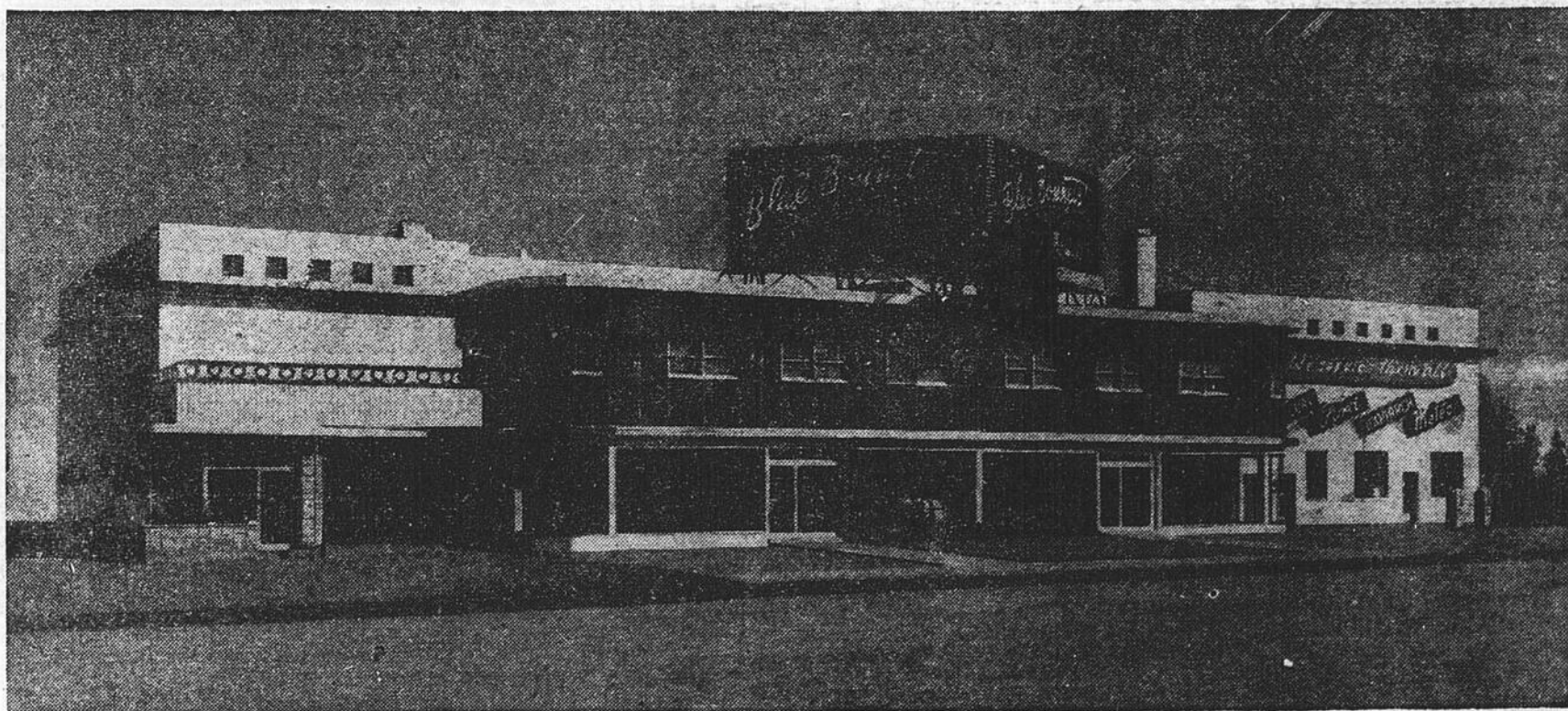
