## POLITICIANS FIGHTING.

*A Conservative Objection to Turncoat Liberals—The Premier in the Field.*

The polling in Two Mountains took place on Saturday. Mr. Champagne, who resigned his seat, on being threatened with a suit for disqualification, is the ministerial candidate, and at one of his meetings Mr. Mousseau spoke, defending Mr. Chapleau's administration and urging the claims of the candidate.

Mr. Beauchamp, the other candidate, is also a Conservative, but attacks Mr. Chapleau's sale of the North Shore Railway and his whole policy, and supports the De Boucherville-Ross faction. The Liberal leaders are rather inclined to the ministerial side, but the greater enthusiasm is shown by Mr. Beauchamp's supporters, who claim a majority of 150.

In Vaudreuil, Mr. F. X. Archambault Q. C., of Montreal, formerly a Liberal politician but since then understood to be a supporter of Mr. Senechal and now a supporter of the Mousseau programme, opposes himself to Dr Lalonde, who is a simple Conservative. The following is from *Le Courrier de Montreal*, (Conservative): "Mr. Archambault may have talent, but this quality has too often been chosen as the ministerial candidate. In order that talent may be appreciated, it seems that it must be the talent possessed by some one who has been a Liberal. Thus, then, it is understood. The role of Conservatives is to efface themselves in order to give place to the new allies of our governors."

## THE LUMBER TRADE.

Lumber merchants do not anticipate a very brisk fall trade. The demand for deals in the English market has declined, and Albany, New York, and Chicago markets are also weak. The fact that many American lumber dealers have engaged piling ground here, instead of shipping their timber away this fall, is considered significant. Leading lumbermen here are taking advantage of the experience of former years, and preparing for a slack season. Freight is now very low, many barges being laid up, and the stock of lumber now held here is larger than at any previous period. The general opinion is, however, that the depression will be of short duration. The only effect of the high tariff on the lumber business has been to increase the cost of production. No one pretends that the English or American markets are in any way affected by the N. P.—*Globe*.

Colonel Sterling, of the Coldstream Guards, had a very narrow escape when he was wounded at the camp on Tel el Kebir. He was looking through his glasses when a bullet struck his hand, taking off one of his fingers; passing downwards, the bullet struck the Colonel's revolver, which he had brought round in front of him, and found its billet in the case. Had the revolver not been there, Col. Sterling would certainly have been killed.

**THE STRANGER IN LONDON.**—That the great city will ere long be hardly recognisable by its former denizens, all the world knows. The visitor passing up the Thames now finds his eyes gratified by the many handsome edifices recently erected. As he reaches the famous Victoria Embankment, there rises over him on the right hand the new Times office, and on the left hand the new tower crowned works of Messrs. James & Co., both phases of Italian architecture. It may be said that these two buildings are types of the far-reaching business energy of the nineteenth century, for it has resulted from such means that these two establishments have brought themselves to the fore, and that the annual issue of each has come to be estimated by millions. During the last year, the number of copies of the Times issued is estimated at 16,276,000, while the number of packets of Bourn's Cocoa sent off in the same period is computed at 14,749,695. The latter is a large total, when it is borne in mind that in 1830 the consumption of Cocoa throughout the whole kingdom was but 425,382 lbs., there then existing no preparation of it such as this, which by the simple addition of boiling water would yield a palatable drink. ## THE VATICAN AND ENGLAND.

The London *Standard* correspondent telegraphing on Sunday night, says:—I learn on the best authority that at the Vatican there exists what my informant calls "a well founded hope" of Mr. Errington's return to Rome this winter. Some private communications have already been made to that effect. The Vatican has by no means abandoned the hope of re-establishing diplomatic relations with England; the Pope having frequently occupied himself in going over the principal points to be considered, being always thrown back, however, by the formidable obstacle presented by the British Constitution, which will not admit formal diplomatic relations except with reigning Sovereigns.

## FAILURES AND THEIR CAUSES.

The commercial failures in Canada for the quarter ending October 1st show an increase of above 100 percent over the failures for the same period last year. This fact is pointed at with significance. Failures are sure and certain so the Government has stimulated speculation and overtrading. The banks might have been more conservative. Their discounts and loans have never reached such a total into many millions before. The importers, too, have been more enterprising than discreet, if the return of imports means anything. And still ministers travel round the country including false ideas of political economy, and encouraging all classes of people to live beyond their means under the belief that Providential Tilley can make everybody rich. *Waterloo (Q.) Advertiser*.

## JOHN BRIGHT'S RESPONSIBILITY.

Mr. Bright is exactly as responsible for the Egyptian war as Lord Aberdeen, Lord Palmerston or Lord John Russell was for the Crimean war. He was a member of a Government which sanctioned the Joint Note of January and the Ultimatum of May, and he is as responsible as Lord Northbrook himself for the despatch of the fleet to Alexandria and for the instructions in obedience to which the British Admiral bombarded the forts. — *Pall Mall Gazette*.

## THE ONTARIO ELECTIONS.

The Toronto *Mail* accuses Archbishop Lynch of having interfered in the Provincial elections, and ascribes the result to his influence. It says that he stated in a recent sermon:—"There are two kinds of Irish—noble Irish, who might be in rags but have true nobility of spirit, and dastard Irish, who would sell themselves for a situation. Some Catholics would keep in with the Orangemen and let in an Orange Government. As far as we can we will prevent the present Ontario Government being put out."

## A NEWSPAPER'S MASTERS.

*La Minerve* has been taken to task by the *Journal of Three Rivers*, for defending a gentleman who accepted a decoration from republican France, the Montreal paper being accused of "belying its past and the private opinion of its masters." *La Minerve* thereupon makes its declaration of allegiances as follows:—"In religion *La Minerve* recognises as its only masters the Pope and the bishops, and in politics it gives its confidence to the chiefs whom the Conservative party recognises as such."

## A STRANGE SUICIDE.

On Tuesday last a suicide occurred at the little village of Boucherville under the most strange and painful circumstances. On the third of the present month the victim, a young man named Deragon, was married to the daughter of one of the farmers of the place. During the festivities which ensued the young man was noticed to be very gloomy, but nothing was thought of this. The day after his wedding he went to work as usual. On the Tuesday after his marriage he appeared more distressed than ever, and after dinner left his house and walked in the direction of the river. His wife alarmed at his manner watched him from the window and saw him approach the waters' edge. He then waded in the stream up to his knees when he stooped over and kept his head under water until he died of suffocation. His wife gave the alarm, but when assistance arrived the young man was dead.

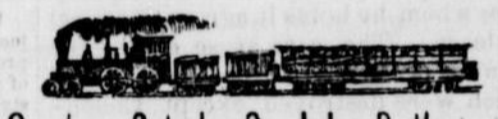

Sir A. T. Galt leaves for England on Saturday next.

No party has a majority in the new German Parliament as a result of the elections, but Bismarck is the real majority there no matter what the nominal one is composed of.

A contemporary comments upon the disgrace it is to see wire pulling and personal solicitation going on in connection with judgements and chief judgements. It is always the least qualified man who makes the most desperate efforts to get himself appointed to a public office.

Contractors on Government Railways and Canals complain that they are unable to procure estimates for the settlement of their claims on these works, some of which have been completed for three years. One of the reasons assigned for the delay by the Department is the absence of Sir Chas. Tupper.

It is rumored that several of the Quebec Judges, men in full possession of their faculties, and physically strong better qualified, indeed, for the discharge of their high duties than ever they were—are to be superannuated. The superannuation of Judges in Quebec has become a great scandal.

The promoter of the Bay Verte ship railway across the isthmus connecting Nova Scotia and New Brunswick having succeeded in enlisting the interest of British capitalists in the project, the ground is being surveyed at their expense. Some fine day the Government may be surprised at the acceptance of the liberal subsidy granted at the last session of Parliament

A good thing is likely to be made by the Quebec Wrecking Company out of H. M. steamship Phoenix, wrecked lately at East Point, Prince Edward Island, as their foreman reports she can, Phoenix like, be raised. The men of her name has been, as the records of the Admiralty show, borne out by a long series of namesakes which have risen, as it were, each from the wreck of its predecessor.

The editor of Le Canadien, Mr. Tarte, on the Parisian, writes as follows to his journal:—

"Saturday's post brought us the Globe which prophesies a glorious future for French Canadians, if they will only learn to speak English. Of all the passengers on board there is not a single French Canadian who cannot both write and speak the language of Shakespeare. Of all the two hundred English who are our companions, two or three only are able to understand French. Sunday on board ship is more or less pleasant. I think Sunday most lonesome away from home, from the family, from the church bells. The Protestants set us a good example. As I write a number of them are reading the Bible and praying to God. I admire them for this; they have the courage of their faith, and practice it regardless of human respect. Many Catholics on board do not do as much. How many amongst us would be brave enough to tell his beads in public, before the whole cabin on his knees."

If we are to judge by the criticisms of the French Conservative press it is evident that at the approaching session of the Local Legislature there will be a serious conflict between the two wings of the Tories. Le Courier de Montreal is manifestly unwilling to accept the present situation, while L'Evenement points out that the elections now going on in this province are not between Liberals and Conservatives, but between the two factions of the latter party.

The London World remarks that somebody ought to be shot for the waste of money in paying for labour in Egypt. At Ismailia for instance says the World, "contractors offered to furnish labour at five francs per day. The offer was declined, after an ineffectual attempt to beat it down. But now they are actually paying gangs of Levantine rascals eight shilling a day each. During the hours of work this canaille can be seen laboriously picking leaves off the roadway on which rails are being laid."

"STILL THEY GO."—One of the most familiar faces among steamboat men in the Lower Town is about migrating with his family eastward, Mr. Thomas Morrill, more familiarly known as "Tommy," has accepted a position in the same line of business with his brother-in-law, of Messrs. T Gray & Co., a large firm of tug owners at Hull in England. Having grown up with the ship chandlery and steamboat business of this port, he was thoroughly posted in all local vessel and shipping matters generally. Always kind and obliging in imparting information to those seeking it, he will be missed from his old haunts about Peter street and the docks.

BARK SAMARANG.—This vessel, outward bound, went ashore on Green Island on Saturday night, but subsequently got off and returned to port last night in tow of tug Conqueror. She is reported leaking and will be discharged and surveyed. The vessel seems to have begun her voyage disastrously having when getting under way fouled the bark Craigs, lying at anchor at Indian Cove, and had to return to port. The tug, we hear, gets \$2,000 for hauling her off.

RIGHT OF A SUB-LESSEE.—Mr. Justice Mathieu has decided at Montreal that a sub-lessee cannot be compelled to throw up his lease of a store when a house is partly burned and the party from whom he holds it agrees to cancel his lease. The case arose out of the burning of the Herald premises, all of which were destroyed except Cohen-thaler's jewellery store. The owner of the latter was ordered to leave in order to enable new purchasers to build, but this he declined without ample compensation. His plea was pronounced legal and binding, his lease having some time to run.

THE CHLOROFORM CASE.—The Coroner's inquest into the death of young Shea from chloroform, while undergoing a medical operation, resulted in a verdict of accidental death.

FAST PASSAGE.—The Norwegian ship Progress, Captain Bull, arrived at London on Friday, having made the passage across from Bic in sixteen days. This is certainly fast sailing for a Quebec timber ship.

SNUG LOADING BERTHS.—The new Louise Basin is becoming a favorite place for vessels to load. A large number have taken in their cargoes there this season.

ARRIVED OUT.—The Allan steamship Parisian, from Quebec, arrived out yesterday. The steamship Corean, from Quebec for Glasgow, arrived to-day.

LAID UP.—Two of the pilot schooners have been stripped of their sails and rigging and laid in Louise Basin for the winter.

MILITARY.—Lieut. Thomas Mayne, 17th Regiment, has been promoted Captain. Everyone will remember the gallant officer when color-sergeant in the same regiment and drilling our volunteers.

TOLL GATES A NUISANCE.—An effort will shortly be made to have the toll gates removed a considerable distance further into the country.

The Recent Riots—Arrests. Paris, Oct 23.

Among the persons arrested on suspicion of being connected with the riots at Mont Emales mines, is one Faure, who is alleged to have been a long time in communication with the Nihilist Prince Kapatkine.

Serious Riot Yesterday. Lyons, Oct 23.

There was a riotous demonstration against the municipality here yesterday in consequence of their having suppressed admission to the opera. The police were unable to cope with the crowd. The gen d'armes cleared the street. At two this morning there was an alarming explosion in the restaurant attached to the theatre. Two reports were heard under one of the tables. There were 200 people in the restaurant, who rushed hurriedly into the street. A third and more formidable explosion then occurred, which shattered the tables, mirrors and other articles and seriously injured three persons. It is stated that three men who entered the restaurant ten minutes before the first explosion left small bombs under the table.

Elected a Deputy. Perpignan, France, Oct 23.

Floquet, Prefect of the Seine, has been elected a member of the Chamber of Deputies, defeating Magnon (radical) by 1,100.

La ge Fire Raging. St. Petersburg, Oct 23.

A fire broke out this am in a large lumber yard near the river Neva, and is still raging. Proclamation Revoked. London, Oct 23.

Clifford Lloyd states that at his recommendation the Lord Lieutenant, in consequence of the improvement in the state of the country, has revoked the proclamation of Loughrea and the neighboring districts.

A cable despatch announces that much consternation prevails at Cyprus on account of rumours that it is possible the island may be given up to Turkey. Lord Dufferin has notified the Porte of England's willingness to consider proposals of peace in Egypt, to be submitted when the Conference meet again. The Swiss authorities are convinced that the men enrolled in Switzerland for the Egyptian gendarmerie are destined for the nucleus of a foreign military legion for the Khedive.

Passengers of ss Harder Arrived. Plymouth, Eng, Oct 23.

The ss Gelleri, with the passengers of the wrecked steamer Herder, has arrived. The Turf. Newmarket, Oct 23.

In the race for the Trial Stakes, three year olds and upwards, "Valentine" won; "Sutler" 2nd; and "Schiller" 3rd. Six ran. In the race for the Criterion Stakes, two year olds, "Macbeth" won; "Expert" 2nd; and "Ithuriel" 3rd. Keene's "Bolero" and two others also ran.

The sentence of death recently passed upon the old man Rowland at the Kent assizes, for the murder of his wife, has been commuted to imprisonment for life.

The man Leveque, recently sentenced to be hanged at Winnipeg for the murder of a companion, is an Ottawa man. A petition, largely signed by Ottawaites, has been presented to the minister of justice asking a commutation of his sentence.

A minstrel troupe has been organized here under the auspices of James Brower.

Among the cases down for hearing at the session of the Supreme Court, which will commence in this city tomorrow, are several of a very interesting nature and which involve a very important question concerning the responsibility of the government for damage done to passengers on their railways.

Sir John and Lady McDonald left today for London.

Sir Alex Galt returns to the city tomorrow previous to sailing for Liverpool on Saturday next.

The demand for labor on railways keeps up the exodus, but it is one which all business men like to see. There is not a train now leaving Ottawa but what takes out large gangs of men to work on railway extensions. The Canada Pacific continues to send out the greatest number, and that company and the lumbermen combined pick up, at good wages, all the labor that can be found about Ottawa now.

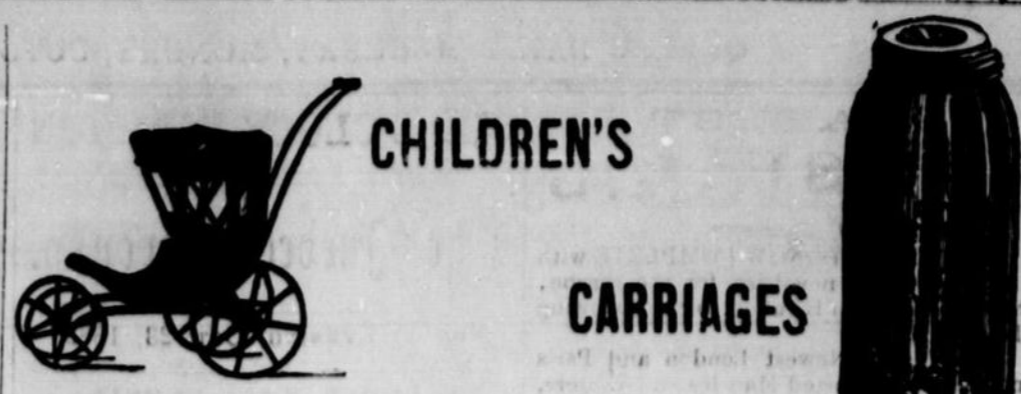

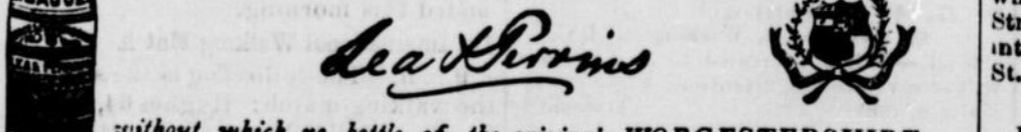
