As in the course of events British Columbia is soon to enter the Dominion of Canada it may be of interest to the readers of THE STAR to hear something of the physical, social and political aspects of the country as they strike a Canadian tourist.

What this country wants is population. It abounds in everything but men, women, and children. There is a vast province without inhabitants. There is room enough for millions.

Victoria, the capital, is the chief town, and is situated on an arm of the bay. Its approach presents a combination of beauty and grandeur that the traveller does not anticipate.

Corse Castle, the residence of the Governor, is about a mile from the city, on a rocky elevation commanding an extensive view of land and water.

The Indian population is supposed to range from 40,000 to 60,000. They are in a state of the most degrading paganism, and their intercourse with the whites, for the most part, has been for their degradation and benefit.

On Sabbath, the 18th of April, I attended the services of the Wesleyan Church, in the morning, and were addressed by the Rev. Thomas Crosby, who has acquired the Nanaimo Indian tongue and speaks the language with great fluency.

Many of the miners especially, have come alone to this country. There is not one woman to a score of men in the mines. There is the absence of restraint; they are undisciplined by the powers of a home, without wife and children; and the give rein to lust, and become notoriously wicked.

The Coolest yet—The New York Herald asking whether the Washington treaty will be acceptable to the American people? Truly, some people are never satisfied.

It is given out that the English members of the High Joint Commission will make a trip to Niagara Falls, and perhaps down the rapids of the St. Lawrence to Montreal, and thence across to Boston.

The House of Assembly of New Brunswick has unanimously condemned the Washington Treaty. The annexation press predict speedy absorption into the United States as the necessary consequence if the treaty is ratified.

Parsons engaged in building operations should be compelled to provide a temporary sidewalk, and replace the original substantially and in good order when the job is finished.

That notorious divorcing state, Indiana, has just passed an act which requires a three years' residence in the State to enable dissatisfied parties to apply for a divorce, and in case the divorce is sought for acts committed in another State, it must be shown that such acts are legal grounds for divorce in the State where they were committed.

The deposition of the Imperial family of France shattered a belief that was almost universal. Euxine was declared to be the wife, and her shoulders were made to bear the responsibility of every fashionable folly which broke upon us.

The volunteers yesterday added another leaf to their laurels. Two priests, accompanied by a gang of the scum of America, attempted to set at naught the laws of the land, but were speedily put to flight by the Simcoe volunteers.

Well done, boys! Whether it be a horde of Fenian cut-throats and hen-roost robbers or a crowd of brutal blackguards, the sight of your gleaming bayonets is sufficient to put all to the rout.

The bridges on the Intercolonial Railroad are to be of iron. Clark, Revere & Co., an American firm, are reported to have been awarded the contracts for those of two hundred feet span, and the Fairbairn Engineering Company of Great Britain those of one hundred feet and under.

By rights Canada should be able to do at least this latter portion of the bridging herself. "But then, you know, our imports would be so much reduced," says the Government, "Great imports, great prosperity."

How about the fact announced in the Government organ of Ottawa that the country is getting poorer year by year at the rate of a million dollars per annum?

We hear that the Island Park is likely to be an established fact at no distant day. We apprehend that the Dominion Government has but to be asked in order to ensure the site being made over to the city.

This making over would be a mere formality, as the park to all intents and purposes would belong to the Dominion, only with its beauty greatly enhanced by the labors of the landscape gardeners.

It is proposed to run two small steamers, one from near the Wellington Bridge, for the West end people, the other from about Jacques Cartier Square, to accommodate the East. The trip would be no small attraction.

If the summit of the Mountain can be easily acquired, we say acquire it by all means, but we cannot advise the expenditure of a million dollars for the purpose.

It is now proposed to introduce the system of narrow-gauge tracks for street railways in small cities, where tracks of the ordinary width would not pay.

We beg to protest against the practice of dividing the cost of public improvements between the Corporation and the residents in the immediate vicinity of such improvements.

This is the city of Montreal; public works, such as opening up, widening or repairing streets, making squares, avenues or parks, are for the good of the city; and not to benefit one man or one hundred, but the whole population, therefore the "city" should bear the cost.

The main characteristic of citizenship. Men live in cities for mutual benefit; they contribute into a common fund, and bear a common burden. In return, they expect that which is called the Corporation to ad-

If, when a street requires paving, the citizens resident or owning property thereon are compelled to pay a greater proportion of the cost than those who live around the corner, citizenship is a myth, and the "citizens" are victims of misplaced confidence.

All public works should be paid for by a general assessment—all reap the benefit; all should share the cost. Take the St. James street paving for instance, has not the state of that street been a shame and a disgrace to the city for years? Yet it is the chief street of the city; the Broadway of Montreal. No one denies that the street requires thoroughly overhauling, yet when an expression of opinion to that effect is made we instantly find the city divided into two parties—the Corporation and the property owners or tenants on the said street. The former, which should be the only party, as representing the citizens, demands of the latter that they pay half the cost, while the other half is distributed over the city, and consequently would be a further dig into the pockets of the minority. The pavement that would be taken up is intrinsically worth more than that which it is proposed to lay down!

There ever such a barefaced piece of Avaricious rascality?

It is the same with the old burial grounds that it is proposed to convert into squares; the Corporation propose to pay one-third, and the residents near by are asked to fork over the balance. The parties to such agreements as this can only be correctly described as knaves and fools. We advise all to cling to their citizenship, and scout these most unreasonable proposals. As we said before, public works for the public benefit should be paid for by public money.

THE FAZE FIGHT. The principals in the Macco-Ooburn fight, together with some 1,500 or 2,000 spectators, landed near Fort Byers, Ont., yesterday forenoon, and attempted to have their match on the 10th inst. It is said that they sparred for an hour and a half, and neither was hit, but that is simple nonsense; and if such was the case, it would show pretty conclusively that the match was a farce, got up to amuse green spectators. We do not believe the men fought at all, and we are glad that the Simcoe Volunteers interfered so promptly and prevented this disgraceful scene taking place on Canadian soil. The combatants were left to their fate, and it is expected will fight to day. If the Americans like to fight, let them do it in their own country, and not endeavor to disgrace the name of Canada by such brutal exhibitions as two men coolly and deliberately trying to pound each other to death.

IN FRANCE. Port Vanvres captured and evacuated—Ressel arrested but escaped—Both sides mass their troops—Thiers announces to the Assembly the signing of the Treaty.

Port Vanvres was captured last night by the Versailles troops, and was held for a short time. The news has been a desperate fighting to-day. The fort is in a very dilapidated condition, and it will become imperative upon the forces of the Commune to evacuate it. The Government troops make daring attacks on Neuilly and Anvers.

The Rev. Canon E. Baldwin, of Toronto, arrived in this city yesterday, after his leave of absence, which he spent in England. Today he is to be made the recipient of a handsome testimonial in plate and money.

The Scott Centenary celebration at Toronto has taken any definite shape. Many schemes have been proposed by the Joint Committee of the St. Andrew's and Caledonian Societies, but none have been adopted.

Sheffield mountain, one of the two sentinels at each end of Granby, was hoary with snow on Tuesday last which lays on the adjoining hills in great masses. The fall was fully three inches deep. Snow in May is the poor man's manure.

The foundation stone of the Great Western Air Line Bridge, to cross the Grand River at Cayuga, Ont., was laid with Masonic honors yesterday afternoon, at 3 o'clock. The ceremony was exceedingly interesting. Most Worshipful Brother James Seymour acted as Grand Master.

It is thought that the trial of Boutton and Park, two of the men implicated in the woman-peddling affair of last summer, will fall at the present term, as the sitting of the Court will expire at midnight of Saturday. The proceedings will have to be commenced probably de novo some months hence.
