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Many Acclamations Recorded In Wednesday's Municipal Nominations

Wednesday was nomination day in many municipalities throughout Pontiac County. Of the ten municipalities who have council seats now vacant, 6 elected each of their three new councillors by acclamation. The other four each placed at least one seat in contention and Shawville ratepayers nominated 10 men for three vacancies. Nominations are as follows:

Waltham—

Returned by acclamation were Guy Rochon, seat 1; Lloyd Murray, seat 2; Paul Pilon, seat 3.

Leslie, Clapham, Huddersfield

Returned by acclamation were Albert Bretzloff and Lionel St. Aubin. George Bretzloff was elected by acclamation to take over the seat previously held by Otto Hahn.

Litchfield—

Returned by acclamation were Mel Brown, Alfred Jay and Freddie Crawford.

Thorne—

Returned by acclamation were Albert Dahms, seat 1; and Austin Sparling, seat 3. Two men were nominated for seat five, previously held by Theo Steinke. Nominees are Ebert Turcot and Walter Yach. (As we go to press Secretary Theo Bretzloff advises that Walter Yach has withdrawn, leaving Ebert Turcot elected by acclamation.)

Clarendon—

Returned by acclamation was Ivan Lewis, seat 2. Retiring councillor Henry McCord and Melvin Stanley have been nominated for seat 5. Retiring councillor Grant Eades and Joe Smiley have been nominated for seat 6.

Shawville—

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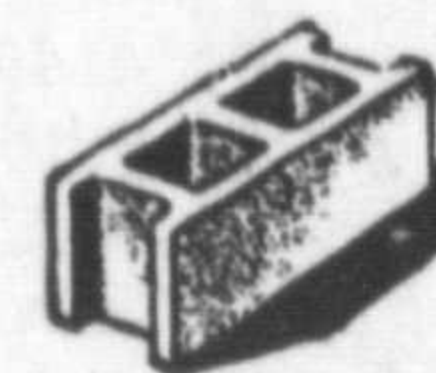
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Shawville Native Thomas A. Hobbs Passes At Brock, Sask.
