Vocational Guidance Subject Of Talk

Gordon Hagen, principal of The High School, Shawville, addressed Shawville Rotary Club on the subject of Vocational Guidance last Monday night.

The object of a vocational guidance program is to help each pupil enter into an occupation suitable to him. It is important that the correct choice be made because it makes a happier life for the individual; because everyone should be successful in their occupation; and because it saves the individual money which would otherwise be lost in switching from one type of occupation to another.

Part of the problem in considering the need for vocational guidance, arises from the fact that no two individuals are alike. The needs of each are different; and there are thousands of types of occupations (over 38,000 listed for the United States) from which a choice must be made.

A primary aim of vocational guidance in the school is to familiarize the pupils with various occupations available locally, at a distance, and occasionally, in foreign countries. Another object is to help keep in Canada those entering the work force. Only by remaining in Canada, said the speaker, can we build up the country economically.

On the subject of what is being done now at Shawville High School in the way of vocational guidance, Mr. Hagen noted that a good start had been made by Mr. Tolhurst by way of instituting I.Q. testing. This is done, not so as to label a student "dumb" or "smart" but to indicate to his teachers in a general way what he can accomplish. A program has recently been started of counselling in Grade XI, under which each student in that grade will have an interview with the principal, during which the occupational interests of each will be ascertained, and assistance offered to each in reaching a decision. One of the aids now being offered by the school in this connection is a file of occupational monographs, each of which deals with a specific occupation; and stating everything about that occupation which a prospective entrant to it should know.

In the more junior grades, grades 7, 8 and 9, a course of group guidance is now going forward. This plan may later be extended to take in Grades X and XI. The object of the course is to assist the students in the planning of their occupations.

Plans for the future at Shawville High School include the use of aptitude tests in helping some students find the occupation for which they are best suited. These tests will be given to those students who will profit from their use.

In closing, Mr. Hagen stated that he would welcome the assistance of the service clubs in the vocational guidance program. Service clubs have, in the past, proved of inestimable value in helping students choose their life's work, he said.

The speaker was introduced by Dr. Wally Hodgins and thanked by Joe Russell, who assured him of the full co-operation of the Rotary Club in whatever capacity it might be required.

Visitation Program Pronounced Success

In hundreds of Protestant churches throughout Canada in November, laymen and laywomen visited the homes of all persons connected with their church. In Ottawa alone, 2,500 visitors called on 15,000 families presenting the church's claim upon their time, talents and treasures and urging them to a deeper commitment of themselves and their possessions to Christ.

St. George's Anglican, St. Andrew's United Churches in Campbell's Bay, and St. George's Anglican Church in Portage du Fort held such a visitation during the past two weeks. At Commissioning Services held during Morning Worship, 46 visitors were "sent forth two by two" to visit in the name of Christ.

Out of approximately 150 Protestant families in Campbell's Bay, 130 were called on by these lay ministers. In Portage, all Protestant families were visited. The overall response was that 97% of those visited pledged themselves to the 1960 programmes. All members had been invited to share in the planning of the 1960 programme proposals which were unanimously accepted at each church congregational dinner.

The major item in the Portage programme is the purchase and renovation of a building presently owned by the Pentecostal Church. This will meet the acute need of St. George's congregational for a centre of Religious Education and Christian fellowship.

The merit of this form of evangelism is undisputable in the minds of those who visited. Young men of the churches were heard to say "This was the best afternoon I have spent for a long time." "My part of the visitation was very inspiring and I enjoyed talking to the different families very much." "The families were impressed to see members of the church visit them to tell the story of Christ's work in His Church." "I was able to meet friends on levels that before Sector never happened." The many reports such as these testify to the great worth of the Sector Plan of visitation as a means of spiritual awakening within the Christian Church.

Local Union 5656 is now working under its first agreement with The Hilton Mines, and all officers are anxious for education and better understandings, so that they will better serve the Local; and better know their rights and responsibilities in the trade union movement.

Letters to The Editor

School Bus Safety

The Editor, The Equity,
Sir,

During the past few weeks, with the co-operation of your paper and the local and central school boards, a great deal is being done to emphasize the need for the support of the public at large in maintaining the safe conveyance of school pupils throughout the county.

I think it only fair to the school boards and their employees to point out that this campaign is being carried out not because of any deterioration in the safe transportation of the pupils, but an earnest desire to maintain and improve the excellent record already established since transportation first started some years ago.

At the safety meeting recently held in Shawville, and which was attended by drivers and board members from every Protestant board in the county who are transporting pupils, and also by drivers from some Separate school boards, the Chairman of the Central School Board paid tribute to the excellent record established by the school bus drivers in the county over the years in maintaining an accident free record. This was endorsed by all others present at the meeting, and is worthy of commendation by the public at large.

School boards and their employees are governed by regulations concerning the conveyance of pupils; and these regulations are being followed in order to afford maximum protection for all concerned in the case of something going wrong. For the sake of SAFETY do not expect them to violate any of these regulations to suit individual cases.

At the above mentioned meeting it was evident that ninety percent of the problems facing the boards and their drivers occur on the highways. In addition to the Regulations covering the Conveyance of pupils; school boards, their employees, and the PUBLIC AT LARGE, are governed by the Provincial Traffic Rules and Regulations. This then is the heart of the matter. There is no doubt that any judgement made as a result of an accident will be based on these regulations. Once a bus is on the highway, or on any back road, the safety measures, instructions, etc., issued by the board to the driver will be largely dependent upon the co-operation of the public in following the traffic regulations.

Board members are elected by the public and charged with the operation of the electors' school systems. On the highway everybody is a board member so far as the safe transportation of the pupils is concerned, and governed by the same regulations.

So far as the parents are concerned in this campaign, do not leave everything up to the teachers and drivers. Take a few minutes to instruct the children on the proper and safe way to cross the road, instruct them to wait for the bus on the right hand side of the road off the pavement, let them wait for the bus and not tear across the road at the last minute, and help maintain the individual discipline in the vehicle. Support your board and drivers in their efforts.

This is one campaign that takes absolutely nothing out of your pocket, only your co-operation. It could take an awful lot out of your pocket without your co-operation.

I feel compelled to enlighten him that I was ordained to conduct the Services of Worship, to be a pastor to the people where appointed, preach the Word of God and Administer the Sacraments. This he will find in page 635 of the Book of Common Prayer. My chief concern is endeavouring to carry out this to the best of my ability, and there is One to Whom I am responsible for doing so.

Let me emphasise that I was not ordained to patrol after cars, or snoop around dance halls, to see who is drinking. We are paying men to enforce these and other laws. Surely your correspondent has lived long enough in

this province and district, to know why these laws are not enforced. If not I shall be glad to tell him. With my knowledge and his enthusiasm who knows what we might accomplish?

I share your correspondent's concern for our youth. There are within my congregation many in whom I have the greatest confidence and enjoy their friendship. However the church is a family, made up of people of all ages; that I would not dare try to segregate, and I am extremely happy to have all ages share the worship. "The family that worships together stays together". Of course the church also has its social side. I do not believe that a true Christian can live in isolation. Therefore it always affords me the greatest pleasure to join with the young, not so young and the older people in happy, healthy recreation of any kind.

1959 Borrowings From B of M Highest Ever

More Canadians borrowed more money from the Bank of Montreal in 1959 than ever before, according to the bank's annual statement, released here this week by Gilmour Dowe, manager of the Shawville branch.

Commenting on the bank's 142nd year of business, he said the unprecedented demand for credit of all kinds money periods of modern times. In total, B of M loans came in one of the "tightest" were more than 25 per cent above the 1958 figure — 1,772 million compared with \$1,416 million.

These included a 32.55 per cent boost over 1958 in NHA mortgage loans, from \$171 million to \$227 million, enabling more people to buy homes of their own.

To cope with Canadians' loan demands, the bank reduced its security holdings by more than a quarter. These are now reported at \$886 million, or 28 per cent lower than a year ago.

Stronk Liquid Position

As a result, although the B of M maintains a strong liquid position, "quick" assets now stand at \$1,578 million, or 51.6 per cent of all liabilities to the public, versus 62.1 per cent at October 31, 1958.

Deposits show a little change at \$2,998 million, compared with \$3,038 million a year ago. The same is true of total B of M assets, which stand at \$3,259 million, against \$3,277 million in 1958.

The bank's earnings for all of its 810 offices in Canada, and abroad totalled \$24,833,660 before income taxes. Provision of these tax bills, however, took more than 50 per cent of the earnings, or \$12,642,600, so that the net

profit was \$12,191,060, or \$1,830,370 more than in 1958.

The 21,000 B of M shareholders received dividends totalling \$10,684,730 on the basis of \$1.85 per share — or \$1,957,870 less than the tax bill.

The year's operations included issue of "rights" to 675,000 new shares of capital stock. When completed, this issue will bring the B of M paid-up capital to \$60,750,000, the largest of any Canadian Bank.
