UNITED STATES NEWS.

FROM WASHINGTON TODAY. New York, Dec. 6. No cable despatches of today's date have yet (3 P.M.) been received at the Telegraph office.

THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE.

The conclusion of the President's message came on late last night:—

Our despatches are a subject to which I called your special attention at the last session, and suggested that we will in the future have to look more to the countries south of us, and to China and Japan for our revival.

WASHINGTON, DEC. 6.

A resolution offered by Sherman was adopted, calling upon the Secretary Treasurer for copies of regulations prescribed by him for transportation of goods in bond from foreign countries through the United States to Canada.

NEW YORK, DEC. 6.

The Times' Washington special says:—General Butler will improve on an early opportunity to introduce a Bill into the House authorizing the President to carry out the policy of reprisal, indicated in the message, in retaliation for the seizure of fishing vessels by the Canadian authorities.
