Suffering an unexpected seizure while attending an auction sale, Carl F. Steinke collapsed on June 21st, and after being rushed to Blind River Hospital, died without regaining consciousness at 5.45 on Thursday morning.

Born in Ladysmith on October 7th 1880, a son of the late Mr and Mrs Julius Steinke he received his public school education there.

Upon reaching manhood, he moved to Massey with his parents and engaged in blacksmithing, later in company with his late brother Gustav, he operated a general store, which he disposed of in 1946, and retired.

His jovial and friendly disposition won for him a large host of friends which was evidence by the large gathering at the funeral, on Monday.



Mayor of the United townships of Leslie, Clapham and Huddersfield; Thomas O'Brian Esq. Mayor of the township of Litchfield; Alfred Belac Esq. Mayor of the United townships of Mansfield & Pontefract; S. Wyman MacKechnie Esq. Mayor of the townships of Onslow South; Roy Elliott Esq. Mayor of the village of Portage du Fort; Basil Stanton Esq. Mayor of the village of Quyon; Reuben Smith Esq. Mayor of the village of Shawville; Simon Downey Esq. Mayor of the United township of Sheen, Esher, Aberdeen and Malakoff; Ernest Schwartz Esq. Mayor of the township of Thorne forming a quorum. The Secretary Treasurer being also present.

The roll is called and Councillor Paul Donigny comes forward and subscribes to his Oath of Office.

The minutes of the last quarterly session of March 8th, 1950 are read and it is moved by Councillor Thomas J. McGuire, and seconded by Councillor Roy Elliott that the minutes of the session of March 8th, 1950 be adopted and signed without amendment.

Correspondence received and sent since the last session is read to Council. This Council's letter to the Department of Game and Fisheries accompanied by a copy of the resolution of March 8th, 1950 relative to the existing Game Laws in this County, and the Minister's reply dated April 11th, 1950.

A representation from the Hotel keepers of the County appeared before Council requesting the passage of a resolution approving the sale of liquor, by the bottle only, in hotels where the local Council permits.

Hilliard Beattie that a letter be written to Ray Johnston M.L.A. asking him to urge the Department of Lands and Forests to abolish this permit system where by long delays are frequently entailed between the time of application and the issuance and reception of the permits, with great inconvenience to the shipper.

It is moved by Councillor Alfred Belac that this Council request the Quebec Liquor Commission to permit the sale of liquor by the bottle in Hotels in the County, in those sections where the local Council approves. A vote is taken showing 11 in favour and 4 against. Motion is declared. Carried.

It is moved by Councillor S. Wyman MacKechnie, seconded by Councillor Roy Elliott that the Quebec Liquor Commission be urged to more stringently enforce the liquor laws of the Province in this County, and to direct every possible effort to stamp out bootlegger menace.

It is moved by Councillor I. P. Cahill, and seconded by Councillor Thomas J. McGuire, that this meeting do now adjourn.

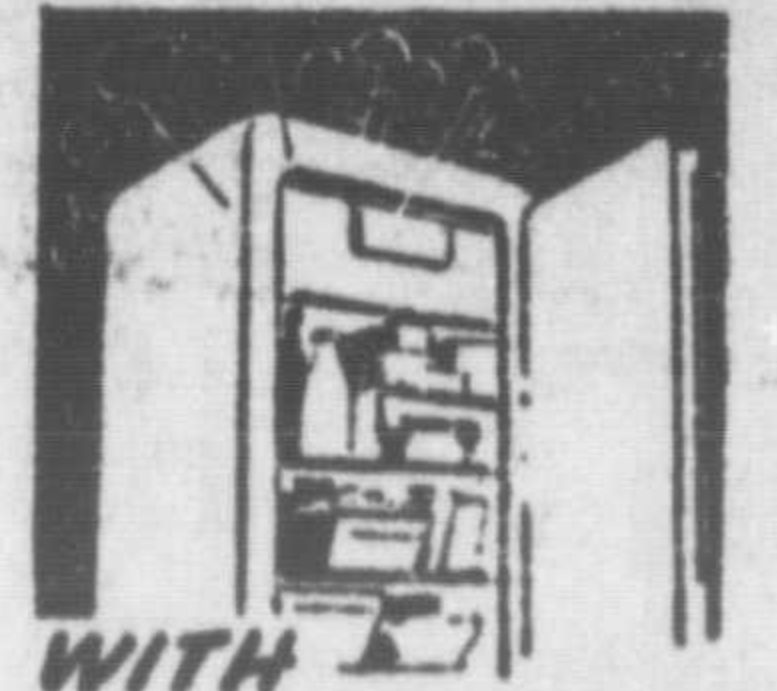

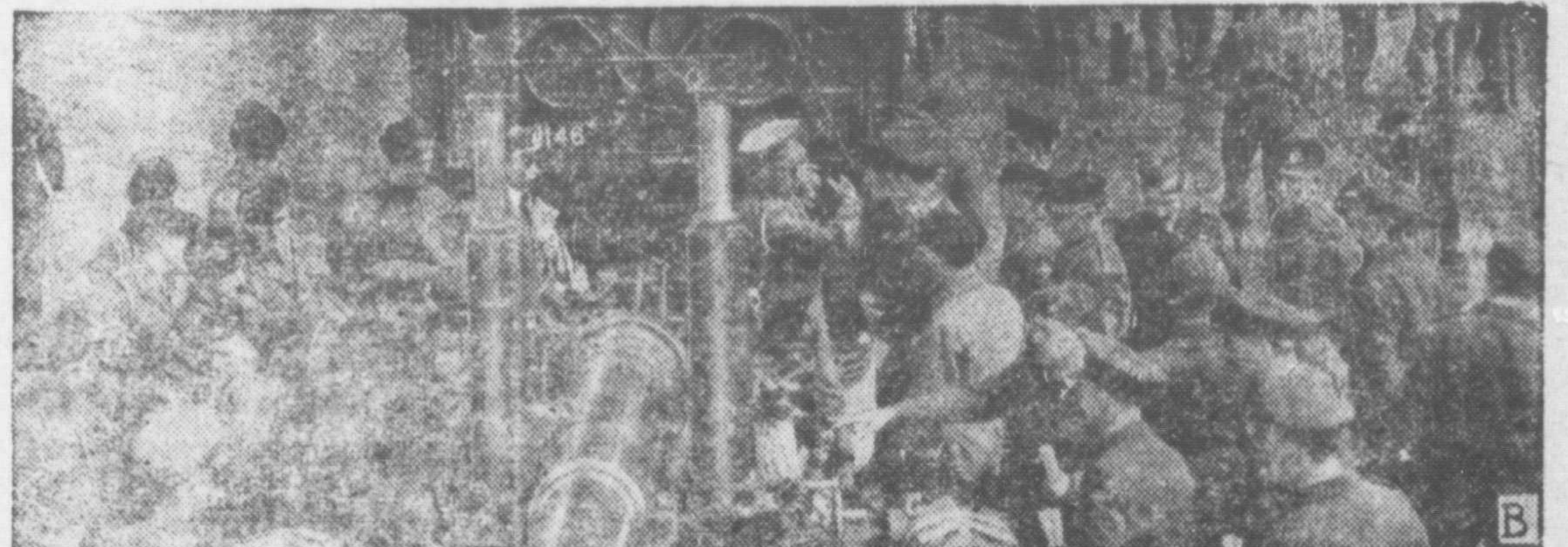

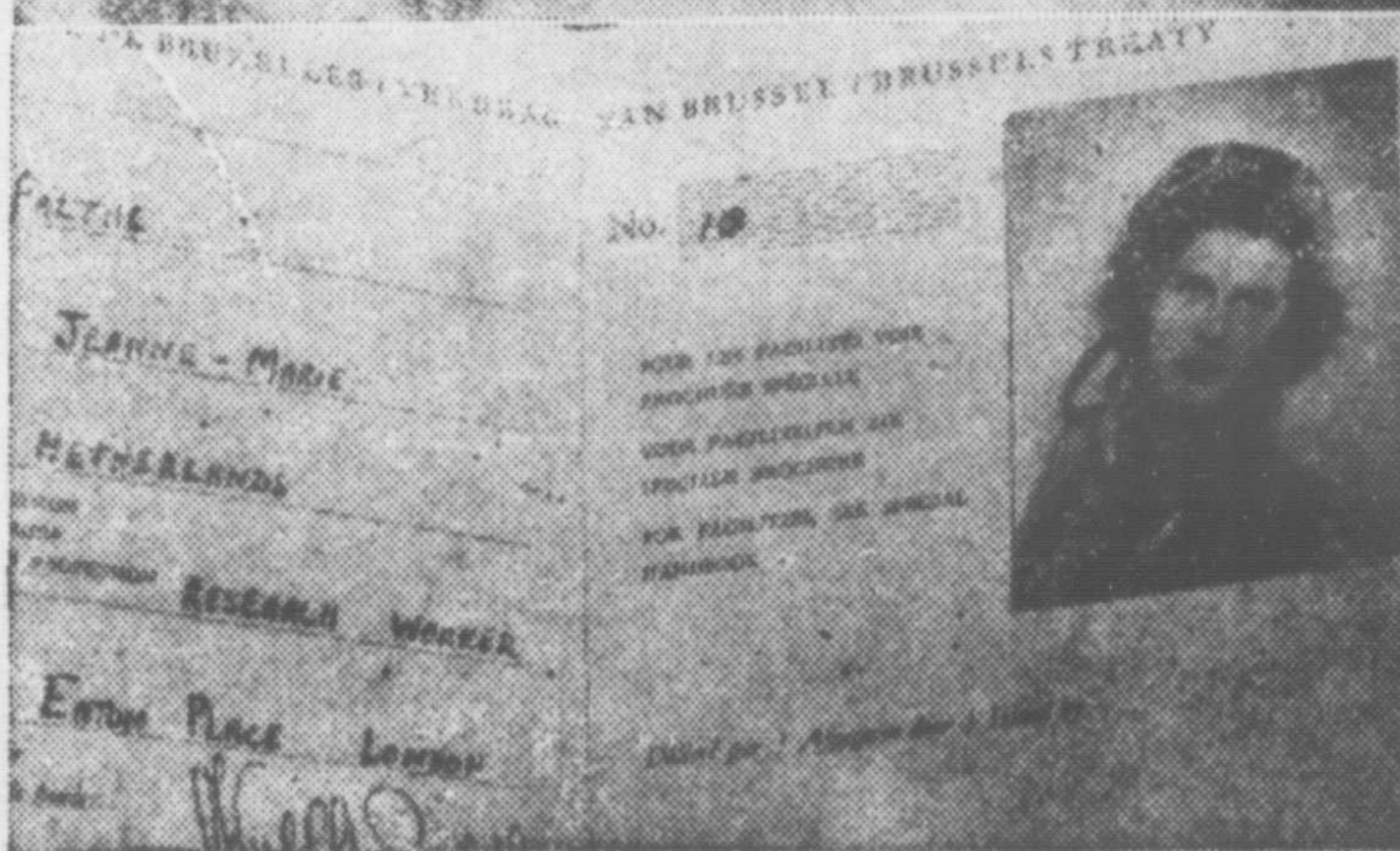

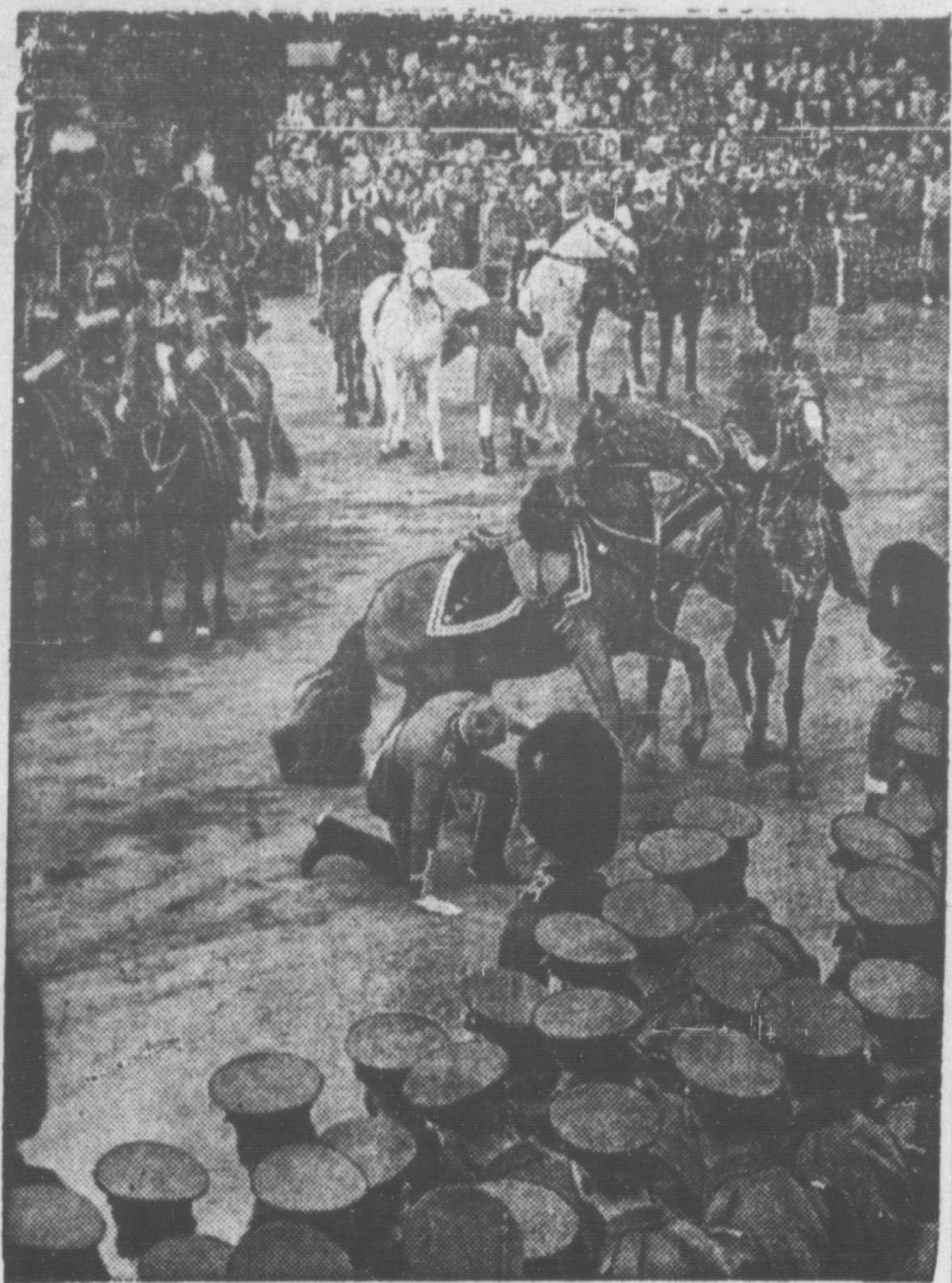

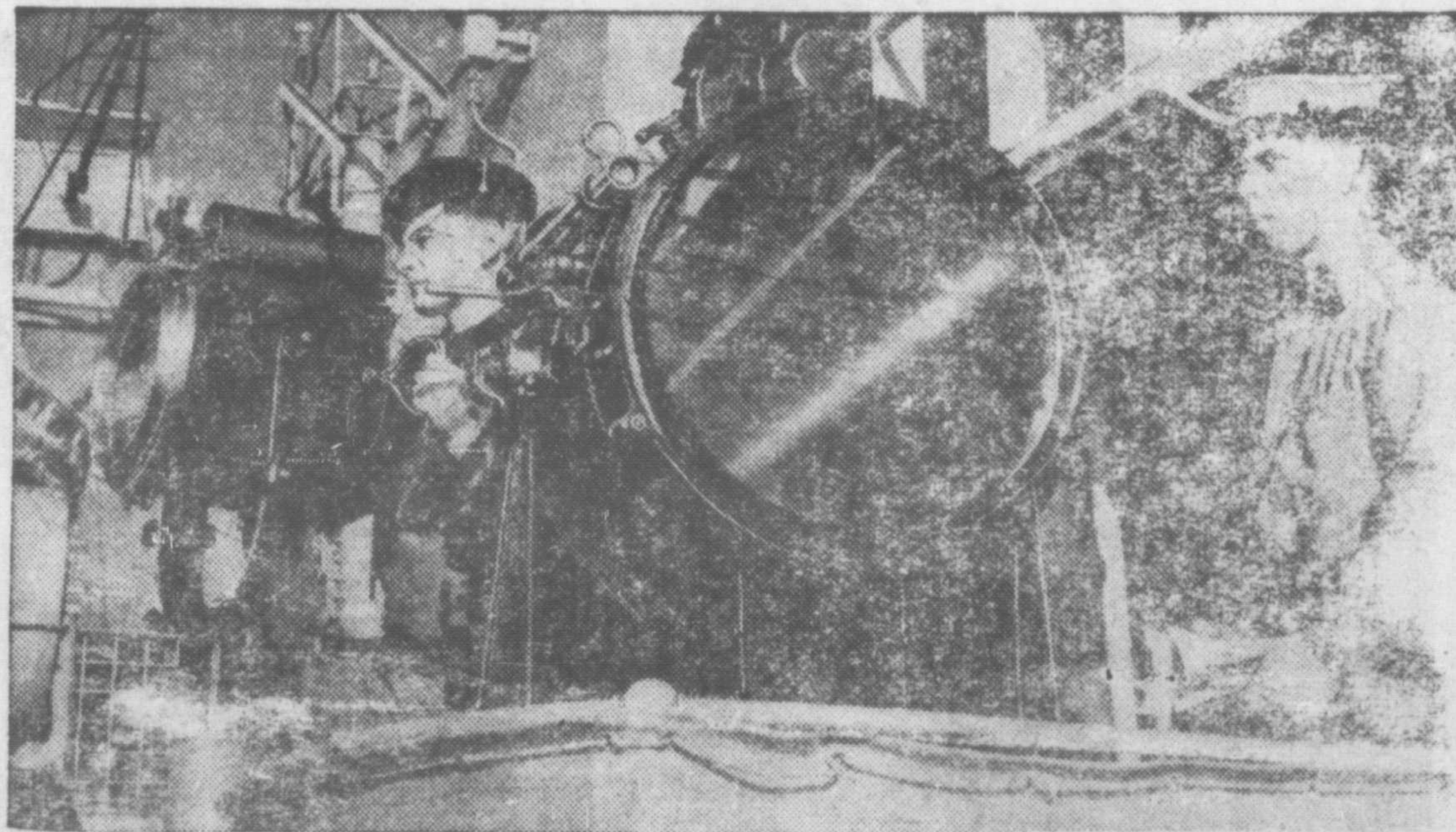

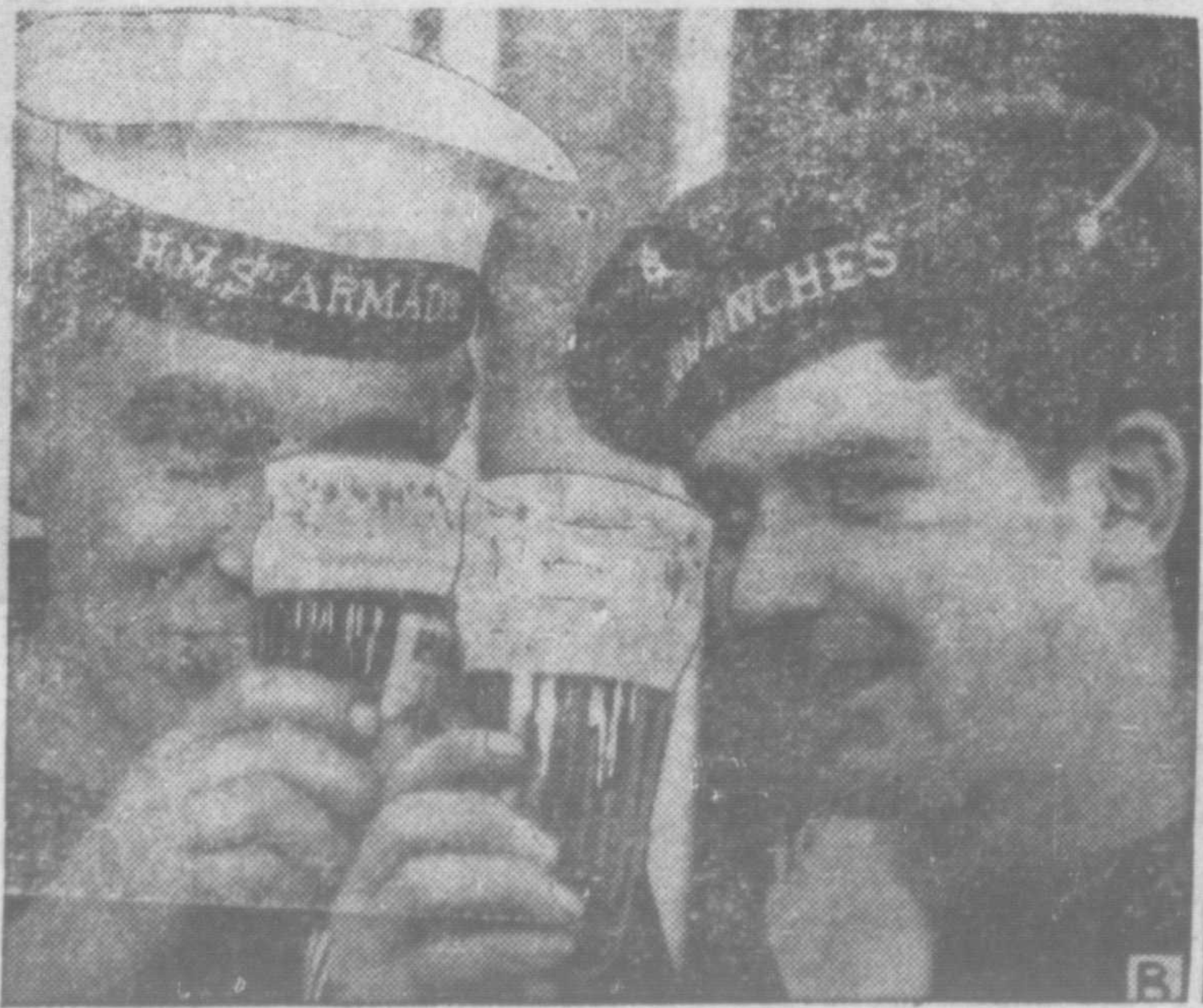
