Impressive Ceremony Held At War Memorial

Westmount honoured its war dead at an impressive civic and military ceremony at the War Memorial on Sherbrooke Street Sunday afternoon.

At the Cenotaph and along the route of the parade large crowds turned out. The religious service at the War Memorial was conducted by Hon. Major Rev. G. F. Leigh, E. D., chaplain of The Royal Montreal Regiment who led prayers for all those who had made the supreme sacrifice, for our country, for those on active service and for peace.

He prayed "that we should turn to God in this time of trouble and to pray that in accordance with Thy Holy Will; take away whatsoever hinders the nations from unity and concord and for the restoration of a rightful and abiding peace."

It seemed to this observer that those attending the Remembrance Day Service this year were a little more subdued than in other years and that the hymn was sung with more fervour and that more joined in reciting The Lord's Prayer.

The impressive military ceremony, the sentries with reversed rifles and bowed heads, the playing of the Last Post, the two minutes silence followed by Reveille, the sharp words of command to the army personnel, the laying of the wreaths, and the singing of the national anthem all lent dignity to the service.

The band and drums of the R.M.R. in full scarlet uniform replete with white spiked helmets added a note of pomp to the drab khaki of the army personnel. The service was carried through with split second timing. Mayor J. S. Cameron, laid the first wreath on behalf of the City of Westmount, followed by representatives of The Royal Montreal Regiment, 58th Westmount Rifles, the Ladies Committee of the Royal Montreal Regiment, The Westmount Municipal Association, other civic bodies and societies. Many wreaths were laid on the base of the War Memorial by relatives of the fallen and members of the general public.

Accompanying Mayor Cameron in front of the War Memorial were Major Gen. C. B. Price, honorary Colonel of the R.M.R., Brig. J. Aird Nesbitt, the Aldermen of the City. Following the ceremony the parade under the command of Lt.

General Macklin Urges Offence As Best Defence

Major-General W. H. S. Macklin, adjutant general of the Canadian Army, speaking at the annual dinner of the Officers' Mess of the Royal Montreal Regiment, held in the armory on Friday night, told his listeners that Canada should think more in terms of offence than defence.

"You can't win a war by staying on the defensive. We should pay more attention to the things we are fighting for than the things we are fighting against," General Macklin said.

"We must not think that Communism will not strike here," he continued. "The people of Czechoslovakia, who had a liberal democracy, never for a moment thought that the Communists would take over their country. But that liberal country has gone down to an awful terror."

General Macklin has only recently returned from a trip to the United Kingdom and his remarks were based on conclusions reached during his journey abroad.

Russia Wants War

"Russia does not want peace, but war and world revolution," he said. He warned against taking the Russian propaganda program lightly. "They are winning hands down in the battle of words," he said. "They are busy prostituting words, and their methods of twisting words is one of their most dangerous devices."

In the course of history, General Macklin said the Russian people have become a very suspicious race. "Today all foreigners are potential enemies in their eyes."

Speaking of the part played by Russia in World War II General Macklin said, "they became our allies through no volition on their part. They were attacked and turned to us for help."

Mayor Cameron, speaking on behalf of the City of Westmount paid tribute to the regiment's fine record and its great tradition of loyalty. Col. J. P. C. MacPherson officer commanding the regiment was in the chair.

Otto Strasser Who Lived Here Asks Vatican Aid

Otto Strasser, the former right hand man of Adolphe Hitler, but who later fell out with the Fuhrer and made his home during the war in Westmount, has appealed for Vatican aid to get him back to Germany.

Strasser is now living in the Maritimes and has been refused a passport by Canadian authorities. The appeal has been made on his behalf by one of his representatives living in Munich.

The representative, Waldemar Wadsack, in a letter to Msgr. Giuseppe Zabkar, a state secretary at the Holy See, said the West German Government has refused to restore Strasser's German citizenship. Canada has rejected six passport applications by Strasser, the letter said.

Strasser, who has been trying to return to Germany where Nationalists are said to want him to form a party, clashed with Hitler in 1930 and founded the Black Front, a revolutionary group outlawed when Hitler came to power in 1933.

Hitler took away his German citizenship while Strasser was living in Vienna as a refugee. He now is in Bridgewater, N.S.

Over a hundred members of the Current Events Club of Westmount Senior High School jammed Room 3 last Wednesday, November 7, to witness a fiery debate on the resolution, "Resolved that Fraternities and Sororities are Beneficial in General."

Derick Dawson and Bob Webster, who comprised the affirmative team, maintained the following points: that Fraternities and sororities help college spirit by assisting in the preparation for big events; intimate, closely-knit, social groups enable young men and women to cultivate friendships more easily; and fraternities and sororities do a lot of good by sponsoring worthwhile campaigns.

To support this latter statement, they cited the case of the blood donation contest at McGill and pointed out the fact that at Southern Methodist University in Texas, fraternity brothers aid in community welfare projects. exchanging ideas with upperclassmen who might offer good advice to the freshmen and further the development of their interests.

Carol Usher and Mhairi Cleg-horn, who composed the negative team, said in effect: that one of the main defects of fraternities and sororities is their system of "rushing", which often results in persons of only wealthy and influential status being admitted to their organizations; the atmosphere of the "rushing" season is insincere and artificial; and that fraternity and sorority pledges are often not carried out. They also stressed the fact that many persons who would make good "sisters" or "brothers" are prevented from joining fraternities and sororities because of discrimination or the prohibitive costs. In addition, they emphasized the undemocratic nature of fraternities in a would-be democracy.

Amid some tension, there followed a popular vote which turned out to be by no means one sided. Nevertheless, the decision was awarded to the negative team.

The enrollment for the Club's excursion to the session of the legislature at Quebec City was taken during the meeting.

Easy Living Bad For Youth Rotarians Told

The failure of present day youth to accept the responsibilities of their age was stressed by Kenneth P. Greenaway, past district governor of Kiwanis International and executive secretary to the president of Zeller's Co. Ltd., at the weekly meeting of the Westmount Rotary Club.

Mr. Greenaway said "there is something in our easy living today that has a tendency to prolong adolescence." He added that "this seems to be an occupational disease."

Speaking on the moral, spiritual and economic tendencies of the last 20 years and urging a revamping of our present principles, he stated that "not for 150 years has law and order fallen into such ill repute."

Unlike the youth of a past decade, the speaker stated, the young applicant for employment today has four immediate questions to put to the personnel official:

1. "What will I be paid?"
2. "When are my vacations?"
3. "What kind of a pension can I expect?"
4. "When can I expect my first raise?"

False Materialism

Mr. Greenaway said that the cause for the present attitude among young people stems from "a false materialism and that something-for-nothing philosophy that has arisen in the last 20 years." He added that the same attitude was not evident among the men who founded Canada, or those who had helped develop the nation.

The speaker also criticised what he termed the "innocent group", which, he said, urged social and economic reform based on an un-

sound philosophy of "more for less."

He stated that often the loudest voice in our age gets too much attention in our public affairs and therefore those whose ideas were too often weak, received the greatest amount of publicity. The lack of personal initiative today, he said, can be seen in the many cure-all economic theories now at large. The speaker stated that his distrust of socialism came from a fear that more socialism means less liberty. "Moderate socialists", he added, "do not long remain moderate; too soon they succumb to the cries of the fanatics."

Spiritual Problem

A third problem that has arisen in the past 20 years, the speaker stated, is a spiritual one. He said, "this age is too far from the worship of God; the worship of idolatry has taken its place."

With regard to moral principles, Mr. Greenaway said, "today

He stated that many of our present problems are by-products of the depression and the Second World War, but at the same time he warned that "you can't put down wrong numbers and expect to get the right answers."

Receptions were held in the Officers, Sergeant's and Men's messes for relatives and friends.



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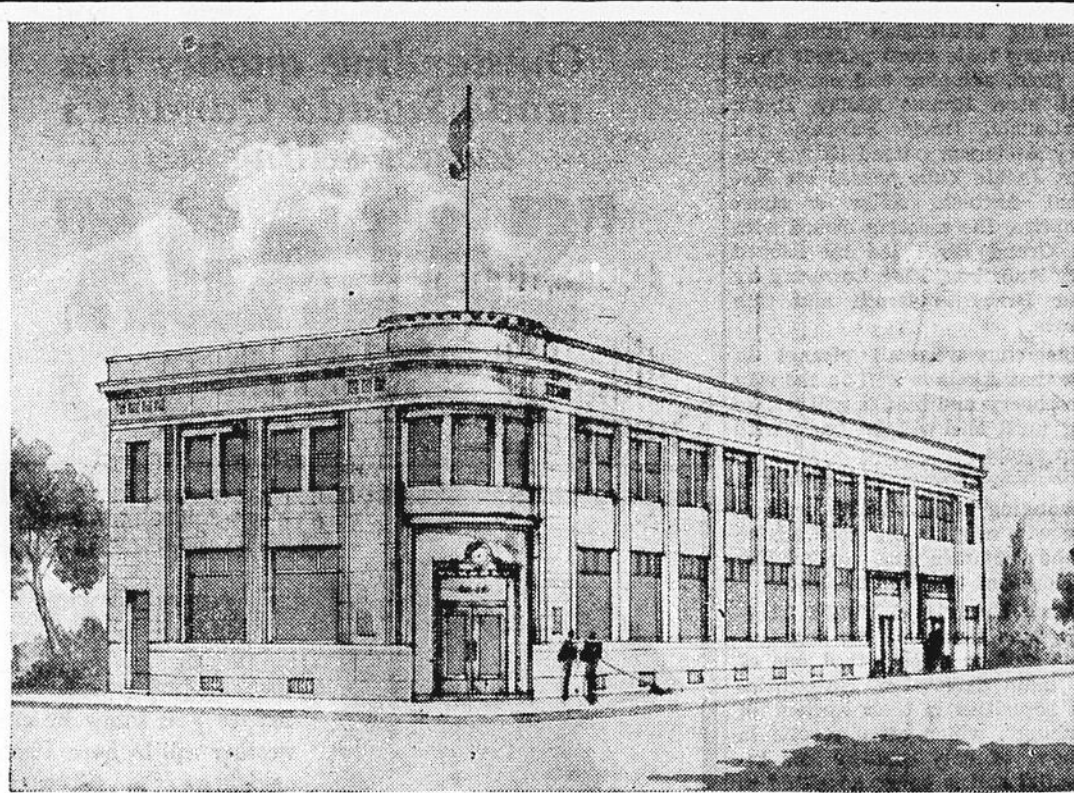

BOOK REVIEW

CANADA'S CENTURY, by D. M. Le Bourdais. Published by The Methuen Company of Canada, Ltd. Distributed by British Book Service. Price \$4.

The author, an eighth-generation Canadian, is fitted by background, temperament, and experience to write this inspiring volume. Of sturdy French-Canadian descent, but born in the Cariboo country of British Columbia, his early life was spent in the West, including six years on the Prairies. For the past twenty-five years his home has been in Toronto.

Canada and its affairs have been his principal theme for thirty years. He has seen all parts of Canada at first hand from the Pacific to the Atlantic, and from the U.S.A. border to the Yukon. Although interested in our great country as a whole, the Far North holds a special attraction for him. He wrote a biography of the Explorer Viljalmur Stefansson, and in 1924 was a member of an Arctic expedition.

He believes that geography plays a much more important part in the destinies of people than is generally realized. Among other volumes, he wrote the text of a school geography, as well as most of the Canadian section of the "Encyclopedia Arctica". Both the specialist and the general reader will find much of interest in this clearly written and useful volume which should find a place in all our Public Libraries and also many private libraries.

Mr. LeBourdais is not content

to merely give a geographic description of Canada. Having an intense, well founded faith in the amazing possibilities of Canada, he applies that faith to his well informed knowledge of the Canadian scene and arrives at the conclusion that the great Canadian statesman, Sir Wilfrid Laurier was not exaggerating when he stated that the twentieth century would belong to Canada.

The volume is dedicated: "To Louis who Loved the North".

The Frontispiece is from a striking photograph of a section of Peace River Canyon.

There is a boiled-down but revealing map of Canada.

There are many beautiful photographs throughout which add much interest to this useful volume. In all there are 18 illustrations.

The maps and end-papers were drawn by F. P. Lloyd.

There is an extensive Bibliography and a carefully prepared and helpful Index. There are 17 chapters all filled with deep interest.

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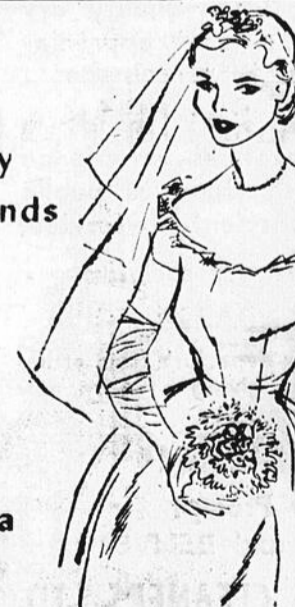

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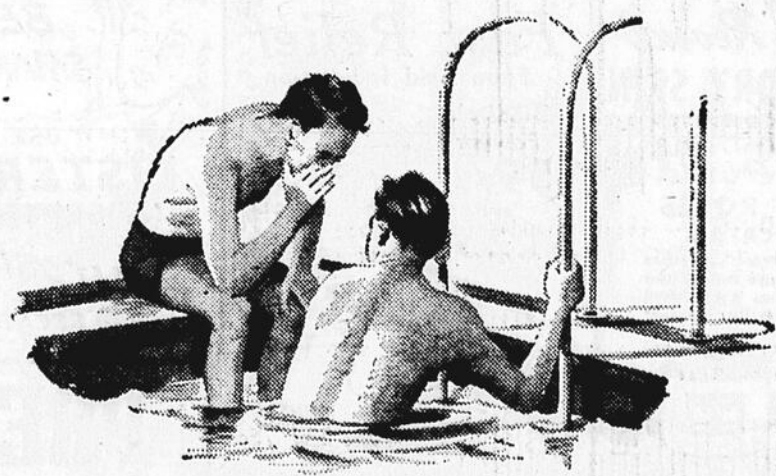
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
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
