CHINESE REDS HAVE CROSSED HAN RIVER

World News In Brief

Hong Kong, Jan. 4.—(P)—A press report said today that "thousands" have been executed within the last two months inside communist China.

Thousands more are reported undergoing mental and physical rigors of newly-formed "re-education" camps springing up throughout the country, largely in the always-dissident area of south China.

Rome, Jan. 4.—(P)—Communist-dominated labor unions staged a brief protest strike in Rome today against government action allowing increases in rents which have been frozen since the war.

Buses and trams were stopped 10 minutes. Other workers quit their jobs for 30 minutes.

Catania, Sicily, Jan. 4.—(P)—Europe's tallest volcano today went into its 40th day of violent eruption amid increasing fears worse may be yet to come.

The government of Catania, 20 miles south of the half-mile wide lava stream spouting from the snow-crested eastern slopes of Mount Etna, said in a special announcement:

"Serious concern is begun to be felt because of the continued violence of the eruption."

Dublin, Jan. 4.—(Reuters)—Theatres and restaurants all over the Republic of Ireland have become unofficial banks to keep the business and social life of the country moving during a strike of bank employees.

"Please tender exact amounts in payment," the acting bankers announce outside their premises, and they arrange that all small change they collect is passed back into general circulation as quickly as possible.

Because of this—and because Christmas shopping put record sums of money into circulation—the country's 750,000 workers received their full wages last week. Most employers are confident they can repeat that achievement next Friday.

Evansville, Ind., Jan. 4.—(P)—Fire swept through the centre of the business district of this southern Indiana city early today, destroying nine stores. Loss was estimated at \$2,000,000.

Augsburg, Germany, Jan. 4.—(P)—Ilse Koch, the accused "Red Witch of Buchenwald," today gave up her two-day-old hunger strike. After a hearty breakfast, she munched an apple during pauses in her trial on charges of inciting murders and tortures of Buchenwald concentration camp inmates.

Detroit, Jan. 4.—(P)—More than half of the late Henry Ford's \$80,319,445 estate went to pay taxes, it was learned yesterday. A reported filed in probate court, the motor magnate's grandsons, Henry II, Benson and William Clay Ford, listed the tax total as \$41,114,529. It was the fourth and final accounting of Mrs. Clara Bryant Ford, executrix of her husband's estate until she died last September.

Pincer Movement Threatens To Cut Off U.N. Troops At Inchon, Force Evacuation

Order To Abandon Seoul Came As Surprise To Men

An Ai. Base in Southern Japan, Jan. 4.—(P)—The order to abandon the South Korean capital of Seoul and defence north of the city came as a complete surprise to allied front-line units who had just been told to hold their positions at any cost.

When the carefully-blueprinted pullback began, other United Nations units along the front began to move southward through the virtually-deserted city while troops of a British brigade fought a successful delaying action.

The rearguard defence then was taken over by an emergency regiment, which held the line while the British troops passed through to the rear.

At about midnight the British troops were ambushed by an enemy force of undetermined size just north of Seoul. The tommyes fought their way out of the trap but suffered some casualties. Helicopters were sent to bring out the British wounded.

After the others had cleared the smoke-covered city, the American regiment moved through the deserted streets on its way to the pontoon bridge over the Han river. Fires burned unopposed through-out Seoul.

The withdrawing Americans occasionally saw little children separated from their parents, wandering aimlessly down the empty streets.

The plan called for the narrow floating bridge to be blown after the last U.N. troops were on the south bank. Royal Engineers from the British brigade handled the demolition job.

Engineers from American units

had broken up much of the ice across the Han. Assault boats were busy plowing back and forth removing supplies and the last troops.

By mid-morning the last American elements had passed over the bridge to positions south of the river.

For the second time in six months of war, Seoul was again in the hands of Red invaders from the north.

San Francisco, Jan. 4.—(P)—Don Whitehead, veteran Associated Press war correspondent, predicted yesterday that the communists will drive the United Nations out of Korea, but it will be a fighting withdrawal.

The Red manpower is just too much for the allies, he said in an interview on his return from five months at the front.

"We can hold a beachhead in Korea indefinitely if we are willing to spend the manpower," he said. "But Korea isn't the place for a major effort against communism."

"We haven't enough men to fight the kind of Indian warfare we are fighting in Korea."

"We can't beat 'em on a manpower basis. We can only hope to beat 'em on a production basis—out-produce them and wreck their production facilities."

London, Jan. 4.—(P)—"They just ran and ran and ran," said a British radio last night described the American defeat by Chinese communist "volunteers" in the Changjin reservoir area last month.

Communists Press On After Eighth Army Quits Seoul

Tokyo, Jan. 4.—(P)—Communist Chinese hordes today seized abandoned, fire-gutted Seoul and smashed across the frozen Han river to battle retreating allied forces west of the South Korean Capital.

The Reds were moving swiftly in a giant pincer movement aimed at shoving United Nations troops into the Yellow Sea at Inchon, Seoul's big port 18 miles to the west.

U.S. Eighth Army headquarters said Reds in estimated battalion strength were across the Han and fighting an allied unit one mile west of Seoul at

U.N. WILL DECIDE

Washington, Jan. 4.—(P)—President Truman said today that United States forces will not bomb China without United Nations sanction.

He made this clear at a press conference in which he again expressed hope that a Third World War can be avoided this year.

He also said, in response to questions as to what point would have to be reached before he would have to consult Congress on a declaration of war, that if the proper time arrived, the proper action would be taken.

He hopes the time will never come when he would have to ask for a declaration of war, he said, adding that the time has not come yet.

Commonwealth Prime Ministers Meet To Discuss Means Of Averting War

U.N. Moves Slowly On Korea

London, Jan. 4.—(P)—Grave leaders of nine Commonwealth countries in vital talks opening today sought ways to halt the march of communist imperialism and to avert a third world war.

The prime purpose of the 10-day conference is to co-ordinate more closely the fight of Commonwealth countries against communist encroachment.

Defence policies of the vast group—covering more than 500,000,000 people in five continents—in case a new world war does start were placed high on the list of subjects the ministers are to ponder.

Prime Minister Attlee, who opened the talks at 10 Downing street, was expected to take the line that the Commonwealth should work more actively for peace and not simply be a group of powers passively awaiting war.

He was expected to explain, too, why Britain is putting new divisions into Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's new Atlantic army command in Europe at a time when the situation seems ever more critical.

Asia. Attlee believes such action is the best means of safeguarding the Commonwealth as a whole.

Canada is represented at the parley by Prime Minister St. Laurent, who spent most of yesterday attending to private business.

In the evening he attended a special service in Westminster Abbey and a reception at South Africa house. The King and Queen were at the Abbey service.

There was some evident concern among delegates over the absence of Prime Minister Liaquat Ali Khan of Pakistan. He declined to attend the conference because of Attlee's refusal to place the Pakistan-India dispute over Kashmir on the formal list of subjects to be discussed.

The first act of the conference today was to send Ali Khan a telegram urging him to attend the parley.

The talks are also expected to range over:

1. Problems of western European defence. Attlee will report on his talks with President Truman and the decisions of the 12 North Atlantic treaty organization members at their Brussels meeting last month.

2. Commonwealth policy towards communist China, including the situation in Korea and Formosa.

3. Possible preparation of a peace treaty with Japan, with or without Russian concurrence, and Japan's possible inclusion in Far Eastern defence plans.

4. The possibility of creating a Pacific pact similar to the North Atlantic treaty.

5. Defence of the Middle East.

6. Distribution of essential raw materials.

London, Jan. 4.—(Reuters)—When Prime Minister Nehru of India drove up to 10 Downing Street today to attend the Commonwealth conference, a young Indian, standing on the edge of a cluster of photographers, shouted twice: "Malan and his fascists are inside."

Police escorted him to the far side of the road. He told them he was a law student and was referring to the South African policy of racial segregation.

The young man referred to Prime Minister Daniel Malan of South Africa. The alling Malan is represented at the talks by interior minister Theophilus Donges.

Four-Storey Vancouver Hotel Burns

Vancouver, Jan. 4.—(P)—Firemen stood guard throughout the night at a smouldering newspaper store where a three-alarm fire launched a multi-pronged attack yesterday.

The fire, a three-hour rampage, destroyed the four-storey Parks Hotel.

Forced 75 guests to flee for their lives.

Sent 15 firemen to hospital.

Caused the Vancouver Daily Province to run off its final edition on the premises of the Vancouver Sun, its afternoon rival.

And destroyed 500 tons of newspaper, worth \$54,000.

The fire also gutted the restaurant on the ground floor of the 72-room hotel. Fire department officials have set total damage at more than \$100,000.

The storehouse was in the basement of the hotel, which adjoins the Daily Province building on downtown Pender Street. Smoke damage was reported heavy in the newspaper's circulation offices.

The Province was hopeful, however, that it would be able to run off all editions today on its own presses.

Cause of the fire was not known. Fire wardens reported the blaze, marked by volumes of dense smoke, was under control by 4:00 p.m. yesterday, three hours after the outbreak. But the fight was by no means over. Thick smoke prevented fighters from reaching the heart of the blaze.

H-Bomb Test May Be Made This Spring

New York, Jan. 4.—(P)—Hydrogen bombs are considered possible by science writer William L. Lawrence—in fact, he tells a new way by which they may be made successfully. He does not say success is certain.

And Lawrence forecasts, as speculative, one type of atomic explosion that might kill everyone on earth in a single flash.

Lawrence, a New York Times science reporter, gives his ideas in a book, "The H-Bomb," published today (Knopf). He was the only reporter invited to pass military secrecy barriers and see everything in the making of atom bombs.

Lawrence comes up with a new device to insure the possibility of an H-bomb explosion. This is a booster, a mixture of the two forms of heavy hydrogen, deuterium and tritium. There are three kinds of hydrogen, the ordinary or lightweight, the doubleweight known as deuterium and tripleweight known as tritium.

An H-bomb is made by surrounding an ordinary A-bomb with one or more of these three forms of hydrogen, liquefied at 420 degrees Fahrenheit below zero. There is only a few millionths of a second for the atom bomb to detonate the hydrogen, before the A-bomb blast blows the hydrogen so far away that it cannot be exploded.

Lawrence shows that ordinary hydrogen heats up far too slowly to be used. Deuterium alone also is too slow. Tritium is fast enough to explode, but Lawrence says it is too expensive to be practical.

But a small amount—a few hundred grams—of tritium mixed with deuterium heats faster than any form of hydrogen alone. Possibly, he says, fast enough for this booster to be added to a deuterium bomb and make it explode.

Lawrence says the H-bomb will be a real weapon against armies in the field or on the march. Because an H-bomb's explosion will nearly totally destroy by blast everything within more than 300 square miles, and will burn or start fires over an area of more than 1,200 square miles. This, he says, will really stop or impede marching military forces.

It is within the realm of possibility, says Lawrence, that an H-bomb may be tried at Eniwetok this spring or summer. This first bomb will not be a thousand times more powerful than an A-bomb. The size will not matter, for if a small H-bomb can be made, a big one can too.

Among bombs of the future, which will depend on discoveries not yet made, Lawrence lists a positron explosion. Positrons are positively charged electrons. They appear in nuclear reactions and last only millionths of seconds.

They sometimes unite with a negative—or ordinary—electron. Then both are annihilated and change into a flash of gamma rays, which are pure radioactivity of the most dangerous kind.

A discovery that would release positrons in large numbers, Lawrence writes, "would open possibilities of horror alongside which those of the H-bomb would be puny."

This possibility "may envelop the earth in one deadly flash of radioactive lightning that would instantly kill all sensitive things."

Stepped-Up Air Training Program Planned By Canada

Ottawa, Jan. 4.—(P)—Canada is preparing to triple the pace of trainees entering her flying schools by the end of 1951 as a major contribution to joint western defence that will make her once again a vital airpower of democracy. Officials estimate there may well be 2,200 potential airman training here by then.

A swift, sharp, costly expansion was indicated last night by Defence Minister Claxton in announcing that Canada "now is offering . . . to increase substantially" the numbers of airman to be trained here for her North Atlantic Pact allies.

The figure now stands around 300, with 100 or more Europeans here and 200 Britons coming, this month.

Mr. Claxton mentioned no new figures, but it is estimated reliably that the government is willing to boost the North Atlantic Treaty Organization total to at least 1,000—with the bulk coming from Britain—while preparing to absorb 1,200 Canadians this year.

That would mean some 2,200 potential air crew in training at year's end, or roughly three times the 1950 total. R.C.A.F. experi-

Producers Of Meat Face Competition

Ottawa, Jan. 4.—(P)—New external factors are facing Canadian meat producers. But government officials say they expect the meat price structure can stand the competition.

Four new developments—recent or emerging—are:

1. C. Indian imports of New Zealand meat—mostly lamb—for the first time since 1940. New Zealand produces meat to sell mainly under contract with the United Kingdom at prices much lower than those current in Canada. Some officials believe New Zealand imports would "ruin" the Canadian product, but New Zealand trade sources say they would not.

2. Opening of the United States market to Canadian pork products, a move expected to be announced within a few days. Pork in the U.S. normally sells at prices slightly lower than those in Canada. Agriculture Minister Gardiner predicted a few months ago that opening of the market would tend to lower the price of Canadian pork.

3. Opening of the Canadian market to American pork, thus increasing the supply in Canada of cheaper cuts. The controls, lifted partially for special imports last year, were wiped out Dec. 31.

4. Collapse of 1951 Anglo-Canadian bacon negotiations, disclosed last Saturday. This will tend to increase availability of supplies in Canada, stimulated by greater production through abundance of low-priced feed.

Normally, all these factors would tend to reduce the entire meat price structure.

But officials say that demand for meat in Canada is high and note that stocks held in storage were 62,000,000 pounds at Dec. 1, much less than the 75,000,000 pounds in storage a year previously.

Imports of fresh meat from New Zealand therefore are relatively important. A Wellington dispatch said that the New Zealand meat producers' board will ship 5,000 tons shortly—3,600 tons to the United States and 1,400 tons to Canada. Another 1,000 tons may be made available later.

Canada produced about 45,000,000 pounds of mutton and lamb last year. Wholesale prices have

Canada Supplies 54 P.C. Of Newsprint In World

Montreal, Jan. 4.—(P)—The Newsprint Association of Canada reported today that Canada in 1950 accounted for 54 per cent of world newsprint production and 81 per cent of world exports.

In 1950 Canada had an estimated production of 5,275,000 tons, compared with 5,176,000 tons in 1949 and a pre-war 1935-39 average of 3,337,000 tons.

The 1951 forecast-estimate is 5,400,000 tons.

Since 1947 Canada has been producing above rated capacity. Operating ratio in 1950—production as percentage of rated capacity—was placed at 100.7. For 1951 it is estimated at 100.7.

The United States, Canada's heaviest newsprint buyer by far, took 89 per cent, or 4,710,000 tons, of Canada's total shipments. Other countries took 215,000 tons, or four per cent, and shipments within Canada were 350,000 tons, or seven per cent of her production.

Estimated percentage for 1951 shipments are the same to the U.S., five per cent to other countries and six per cent within Canada.

Since the war Canada's shipments to countries other than the U.S. have been falling off—from a pre-war 22 per cent and 15 per cent in 1946 to four per cent last

West Will Ask Russia To Clarify Proposal For Talks

Washington, Jan. 4.—(P)—Britain, the United States and France will send Russia a new note in a few days asking clarification of Moscow's latest proposal for a big four meeting. Some officials here consider Moscow's proposals deliberately confusing.

While drafting the new note, the western powers are pressing forward with plans for creation of a western European defence army, including German units. Hope of disrupting these plans is generally regarded in Washington as the major reason for Russia's talking about a four-power conference now.

State Secretary Dean Acheson and Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, recently named allied commander in Europe, arranged to meet today for a discussion of the task which awaits Eisenhower—the organization of the European force within the framework of the North Atlantic treaty.

Responsible officials say there is no intention in this or any other important western capital to permit Soviet diplomatic manoeuvres to divert or slow down the defence preparations. On the contrary, Eisenhower's talk with top

Washington authorities and his impending trip to Europe are expected to have the opposite effect. The three western powers, nevertheless, have agreed not to close any door to negotiations with Russia which provides a real chance of easing world tension.

Out of this basic attitude, and despite deep skepticism about Russia's intentions, rose the plan to send Moscow another note.

That this will ask a clarification of Russia's position on a big four meeting was indicated by Acheson at a press conference yesterday and later confirmed by other officials. A final draft is expected to be worked out by Washington, London and Paris late this week or early next week.

Acheson himself did not call the Russian note confusing but he did say a further explanation of what the Russians were getting at was required. Actually some of the experts who have been puzzling over the document since it was received here Monday have found whole sentences they could not understand.

The suspicion that the wording was deliberately vague arises from the fact that confusion may be viewed in Moscow as a useful weapon.

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Widely-Travelled Chinese Speaker Tells Y's Men Of Mysterious East

There was some confusion as to the name of last night's guest speaker at the first Y's Men's Club meeting of the year, which was held in the Y.M.C.A. Club member Ed Loomis introduced the young Chinese gentleman as Lee Kwong. Gordon Whatley persisted in calling him that in a "thank you" speech at the end of the meeting. But that's all wrong—at least on this continent. "Lee is my family name," the speaker said. "Therefore, in America, I should be known as Kwong Lee. In China, however, the family names come first and I would be referred to as Lee Kwong."

He introduced the Y's Men to a great many of the mysteries of the Orient but for the most part he didn't attempt to explain them. "East is east and west is west," he quoted. "In the Orient, we do everything in a manner opposite to yours."

"In writing, you start at the left-hand corner. We begin to write on the right-hand side and write downwards."

"White is your symbol of purity. In China, white is the color for mourning. Similarly, 'red' spells danger in the west and prosperity in the east."

Born of Chinese parents in Hong Kong, Mr. Kwong, (he doesn't mind our using his given name last) at an early age moved to Malaya with his parents, his father being a British civil servant. He has travelled extensively in the Orient and on this continent. Recently he took an engineering degree at U.C.L.A. A licensed pilot, he hopes to enter the field of aircraft engineering in Montreal. During the war, he served with the British Army in the Far East.

Mr. Kwong was most disparaging of the far eastern peoples. "Malayan fishermen are philosophers," he said. "If they have 15 or 20 cents in their pockets their attitude is, 'why worry?'"

The British government has tried to educate the Malaysians for better things but even today they are not ambitious enough to be anything but fishermen, gardeners, chauffeurs, or policemen. He noticed that the Chinese people took the initiative in commerce and industry in the overflow nations to the south of China.

In India, Mr. Kwong stated, the masses are not much—mostly laborers and farmers. The Indians, like the Malaysians, had no great love for the British but, compared to other nationalities, including Americans, they thought the British wonderful people.

Mr. Kwong expressed some hope for the Orient. He said that in Borneo a tribe who only three generations ago were human flesh eaters were now civilized, wore western clothing and had produced some medical men of their own.

Brought up a Christian, Mr. Kwong thought that communist agitators were responsible for some of the religious riots in the far east.

In explaining some of the strange behaviour of the Orient, Mr. Kwong said that the Moslem is dead set against killing HIMSELF. But he believes he must kill SOMEBODY and have somebody kill him afterwards. This, Mr. Kwong said, explains why a Moslem might stab to death a half dozen people and when sentenced to death by a court would shout happily: "Allah, Allah, I go to heaven."

The Y's Men's Club are thinking of forming a darts team to enter a proposed city league. Mel Porter suggested forming a team and the members were asked to decide by next week. Gordon Whatley suggested forming a club hockey team which could, perhaps, challenge other service clubs of Sherbrooke. J. Edward Shortt spoke of the forthcoming Y.M.C.A. giant convention to be held in Cleveland June 21-24, to mark 100 years of Y.M.C.A. on this continent.

President Truman and Prime Minister St. Laurent are scheduled to address this convention and all clubs affiliated with the "Y" are invited.

President Ernest Chalut presided at the meeting and seated at the head table with him were: Ed Loomis, Murray (Perk) Johnston and John Mathias.

Many Eastern Townships Municipalities Will Hold Their Elections Next Week

Numerous Eastern Townships municipalities will be included among the nine hundred Quebec townships, villages and other rural municipalities which will select their civic administrators later this month.

Under the provisions of the Municipal Code, the provincial legislation which governs the operations of these units, nomination day will be January 10, next Wednesday, and in the case of contests the voting will take place the following Monday or January 15.

These elections are held annually but in one year three councillors are elected for two year terms and the next year a mayor and three councillors are elected. The municipal councils comprise a mayor and six councillors. This year the mayoralty elections are scheduled in most municipalities and there are indications of keen fights in several districts.

In some four hundred other municipalities coming under the Municipal Code the elections will be held in May and June. These are villages and townships whose populations include a large number of summer residents or where the roads are traditionally bad in the winter months.

Larger municipalities covered by the Cities and Towns Act will hold their elections in February while cities with special charters will vote at a time prescribed in these acts.

Two more garages were slightly damaged by water and heat. The roof of the garage broke out in one hour after the fire broke out at 1:30 p.m. EST. The blaze was brought under control within two hours.

Notre Dame Voted Flop Of Year In Football

New York, Jan. 4.—(P)—Notre Dame's football team was voted the "Disappointment Of The Year" in an Associated Press Poll today as the result of its four losses last season, an event as rare as a snowfall in July.

The Irish had been named the "Team Of The Year" in 1949. They were picked as the probable 1950 champions in a pre-season poll and they had run up 39 games without defeat when Purdue beat them 28-14 Oct. 7.

Before the curtain fell, Indiana, Michigan State, and Southern California made up for years of frustration by whipping famed Notre Dame, synonym for success in football.

A total of 133 sports writers and sportscasters, out of a panel of 212, voted the fighting Irish as the "Flop" of 1950. On a basis of three points for a No. 1 pick, two for second and three for third, Notre Dame had 486 points for the dubious distinction.

The runner-up position went to Joe Louis, the former heavyweight champion, whose amazing string of triumphs and records fatten the record books. The Old Brown Bomber's comeback was ruined by the flashing fists of Ezzard Charles in a 16-round bout in Yankee Stadium. He got 156 points.

Behind the former heavyweight boss came Boston Red Sox, a perennial contender in the "Flop" league, with 123 points.

"Ox" Grossa Should Retire, Says Louis

Detroit, Jan. 4.—(P)—Joe Louis suggested last night that the chairman of the Pennsylvania State Athletic Commission "not the Brown Bomber—retire 'for the good of boxing'."

He announced in the dressing room after he gained a technical knockout over Freddie Besboro in the fourth round that he was sending a telegram to the Governor of Pennsylvania demanding the removal of Chairman John (Ox) Da Grossa.

Da Grossa said recently that Louis should retire for "the good of boxing."

"I think Da Grossa should retire instead of me," Louis boasted. How did the idol of Detroit fight fadom feel compared with his recent bout with Cesar Brion of Argentina?

"No comparison," he commented. He said his best fighting weight is about 210. Louis said Besboro fought much like Arturo Godoy and Tony Galento. He said the blond Harrisburg, Pa., battler never had him in trouble.

Besboro, his face battered almost to a pulp, sat dejectedly in his dressing room next door.

"If it wasn't for this eye it would have been a hell of a fight," he told reporters. "I don't say I'd have beat him but it would have been a hell of a fight."

Reese And Barney Sign With Brooklyn Dodgers

Brooklyn, Jan. 4.—(P)—Harold (Pee Wee) Reese, veteran Brooklyn Dodger shortstop, yesterday returned his signed contract for a reported \$300,000 salary.

The 31-year-old club captain told Vice-President Buzzie Bavasi in a phone conversation he regarded 1950 as an "off year" and looked for a comeback next season.

Reese underwent a hernia operation a year ago. He was slow regaining playing condition and did not hit his real stride until late in the season. He wound up hitting .260 in 141 games, a drop of almost 20 points from 1949.

Although Dodge officials announce no salary, it is understood Reese signed for the same pay as last year, about \$300,000.

Pitcher Rex Barney, who has failed to measure up to the promise he showed in 1948, also was signed. Barney reportedly will get the same salary he got a year ago, about \$120,000.

Fairmeade Bought By Cobb And McKinley

Wilmington, O., Jan. 4.—(P)—Sale of Fairmeade Farms, well known trotting horse breeding farm near here, was announced yesterday.

Eddie Cobb and McKinley Kirk, trotting horse trainers, drivers and breeders of Washington Court House, Ohio, purchased the farm from W. J. Galvin, Ohio publisher who established the farm many years ago.

The farm was once the home of the late Bert Abbe (1:59 4/5), great Ohio sire. Many other famous trotters and pacers also were bred there.

Cobb and Kirk also bought Wilmington IV, 1:59 1/2, Bert Abbe's fastest son and already a two-minute sire.

Fred Wilt Awarded Sullivan Trophy

New York, Jan. 4.—(P)—Fred Wilt, 23-year-old Indiana University graduate who runs in the colors of the New York Athletic Club, today was named as winner of the James E. Sullivan Memorial Trophy for 1950.

The award has been presented annually since 1930 to the amateur athlete "who, by performance, example and good influence did the most to advance the cause of good sportsmanship during the year."

Wilt won by a substantial margin in the ballots cast by 479 members of a tribunal of experts. He received 166 first place votes and, on a 5-1 scoring basis, a total of 1197 points.

Runner-up for the second straight year was Joseph Verdure of Philadelphia, 1948 Olympic breast stroke swimming champion, with 114 first and 1013 points.

Dick Atlessey, world-record breaking hurdler from Southern California, was third with 104 firsts and 838 points.

Wilt earned a place as the outstanding American runner at distances from one mile to 10,000 metres during 1950. He won the U.S. outdoor 5,000 metres championship, ran the mile consistently at 4:12 or better and the two miles at nine minutes or better.

Robert Called Up By Canadiens For Tonight

Montreal, Jan. 4.—(P)—Montreal Canadiens of the National Hockey League last night called up Claude Robert from Cincinnati Mohawks of the American League.

Robert will be a utility forward when the third-place Habits meet Boston Bruins here tonight. He will replace Billy Reay, out with an injured back.

Robert played last year with Chicoutimi Saguenays of the Quebec Senior League and before that with Montreal Royals of the same loop.

Personal Suit Against Virgil Trucks Settled

Cleveland, Jan. 4.—(P)—A \$32,000 personal injury suit brought by a hotel right manager against pitcher Virgil Trucks of the Detroit Tigers was settled in court.

The amount was not disclosed, but Edward C. Stanton, Trucks' lawyer, described it as "very small."

Charles F. Heidler, night manager at the Hotel Statler, charged the player hit and kicked him when he and a house detective went to Trucks' room on Sept. 20, 1946, to ask a woman to leave.

Richardson Receives Scare From Rochon

Tampa, Fla., Jan. 4.—(P)—Hamilton Richardson, the national junior singles champ from Baton Rouge, La., had the tennis scare of his young life yesterday when he barely squeezed by Montreal's Henri Rochon in the third round of the Dixie Tennis Tournament.

Richardson edged Rochon 6-2, 1-6, 6-4. The left-handed Canadian gave him trouble all the way and in the third set had the Louisiana youngster 4-3.

Gardner Mulloy, David copper from Miami, began defense of his Dixie title by brushing off Henry Wagner, of Tampa, 6-1, 6-4.

Stan Breard To Manage Drummondville Cubs

been running at about 60 cents a pound for dressed lamb, compared with about 20 cents a pound in New Zealand.

However, New Zealand trade sources said that by the time the New Zealand lamb reaches Canada, added transportation and handling costs will boost the price in this country.

Decision to open the American market to Canadian pork already has been made on C-binet level. It remains only for an Order-in-Council to be signed before the policy is announced.

The Canadian market for American pork was closed in 1947 as a dollar-saving measure. All of the remaining emergency exchange conservation controls were withdrawn Jan. 2. Pork controls were removed Dec. 31.

The Anglo-Canadian bacon negotiations collapsed when the Cabinet declined to accept the British offer of 29 cents a pound for Canadian wildside sides.

Officials said that one of the reasons for the collapse was the Cabinet decision no longer to subsidize food shipments to Britain.

Last year the government purchased bacon at 22 1/2 cents a pound and sold it to Britain for 29.

This year the government will continue to support the market at 32 1/2 cents. Any bacon it gets—and it doesn't expect to obtain any important quantities—will be made available to Britain or any other country at best prices the government can get.

Magog Show Includes Two New Numbers

Magog, Jan. 4.—The already very complete program of the Magog Lions' Club Variety Show January 18 and 19 will have two new attractions added, both under the able direction of Ernest Hooper, well-known Magog musician.

A quartet made up of Real Jean, Laurent Beaudry, Arthur Roy and Robert Johnson, accompanied on the piano by Miss Jean Hooper, will be heard. Mr. Hooper's orchestra specially formed for these performances will play popular numbers.

The appeal court ruling reversed a previous judgment of the Superior Court in which all actions of the Travelers were dismissed.

The judgment arises out of insurance contracts for \$250,000 taken out by the Furniture School, a provincial government institution. Seven policies were taken out in February, 1940, of both companies and contents and later two additional policies were taken with the Travelers of Hartford, Conn., for \$10,000 covering objects of art and furniture forming part of a museum collection at the school.

Another policy covered "paintings, sculpture, water colors, pottery and other work of art loaned to the school for exhibition in its salon."

All policies were in force July 2, 1940, when fire broke out in the school causing \$83,922 damage to the contents of the building which included \$7,700 to articles covered by the Travelers policy. The seven insurance companies that entered the risk declined to contribute as required by the Quebec Insurance Act on the ground that the contents were not insured within terms used in their policies.

They claimed they were not responsible for loss of art objects, excluded from their coverage. As a result the Travelers Insurance paid the loss, obtained a transfer from the corporation and instituted four separate actions against respondent companies for amounts aggregating \$7,700.

Mr. Justice Casey held that the word "contents" in respondent companies policies is so defined that it embodies objects of art. Mr. Justice St. Germain held that the policies of the respondents did not conform to the statutory conditions of the Quebec Insurance Act which states that all variations in a policy must be clearly designated.

The respondent companies were: Compagnie Francaise du Phenix; La Compagnie d'Assurance du Canada Controle l'Incendie; La Nationale Compagnie Anonyme d'Assurance Contre l'Incendie et les Explosions; Commerce Mutual Fire Insurance Company; Stanstead and Sherbrooke Fire Insurance Company; Mercantile Fire Insurance Company; and Mutual-quo d'Rouville Fire Insurance Company.

to quit the ancient, devastated South Korean capital today.

They blew the last bridges over the frozen Han river at noon. Nearby Kimpo afield was abandoned after its installations went up in an awesome tower of smoke and flame.

A United Nations fleet, including Canadian units, stood off the west coast ready to evacuate U.N. forces south and west of Seoul.

Only a frightened fragment of Seoul's normally 1,500,000 population remained in the ruined city. Among the bewildered civilians unafraid or unwilling to leave were old children, wandering aimlessly. Dusty roads to the south were choked with military traffic and a pitiful mass of humanity.

AP correspondent Stan Swinton reported the order to abandon Seoul and its defenses to the north came as a complete surprise to allied front-line units. They had earlier been told to hold at any cost.

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Says Industry Timid On Nationalization

London—A call to leaders of private industry in Britain for an all-out fight against nationalization has been issued by L. D. Gammans, Conservative Member of Parliament for Hornsey.

Addressing the fall conference of the Institute of Directors, Mr. Gammans charged that nationalization was the biggest swindle foisted on the British public since the South Sea Bubble.

The trouble, he said, was that private enterprise, with a few exceptions, had tended to let the fight go by default. If industrialists were asked for information to be brought out in a debate on the subject, the reply was: "Oh, no. Don't ask me. Try someone else."

Mr. Gammans suggested that too many industries were enjoying controls and fixed prices with enormous advantages to those who happened to be in that industry back in 1939.

"Drop this ridiculous pretence that industry has no interest in politics," he urged. "Stop any attempts at feather-bedding. We who represent the people in Parliament have the rifles, but industry must have the courage to give us the bullets."

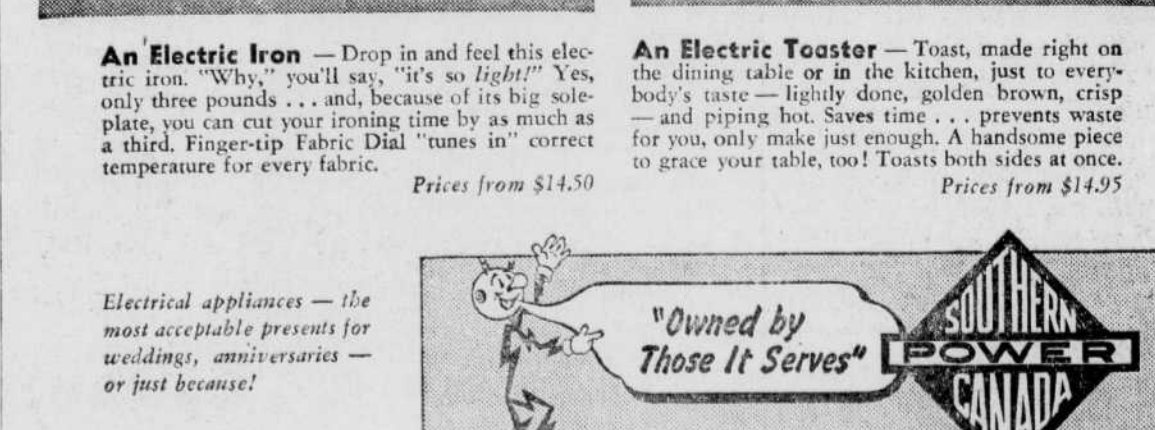
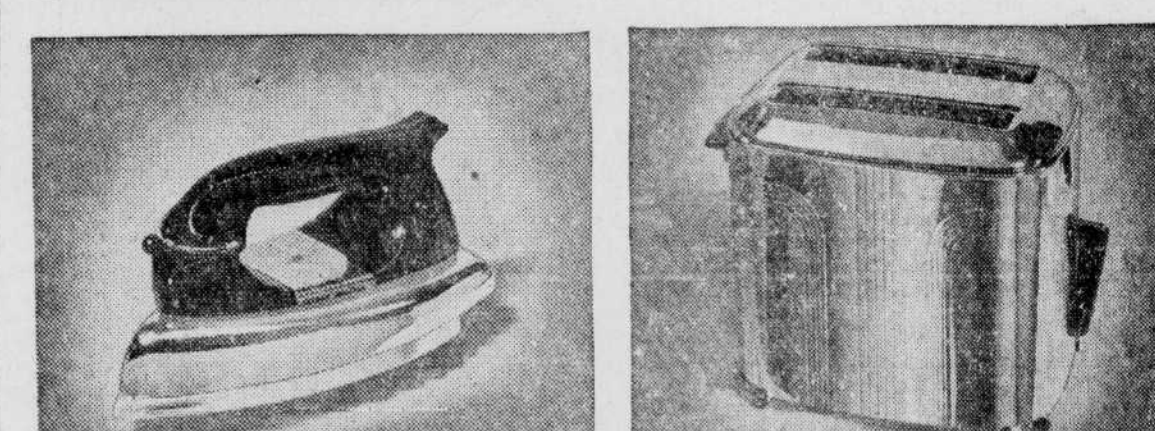
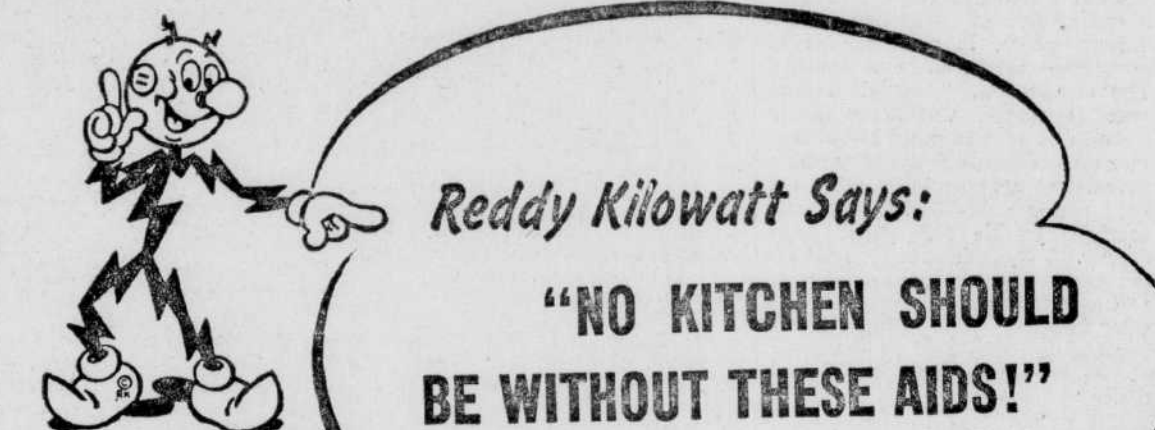

The Doctor Says

KNOWLEDGE OF HYGIENE
NEEDED TO RID CHILDREN
OF PINWORMS

Tiny white worms in the lower intestines are usually pinworms or seatworms. These are only one kind of animal parasite which can lodge in the bowel, but like the others pinworms often interfere with the general health, and are difficult to get rid of.

Pinworms are most common in children, especially among those in large families or in children living in institutions. They are comparatively rare in families in which separate bedrooms are used.

This is because the worms get on the bed linen, pajamas and other clothing and are picked up by others who come in contact with such objects. When children live in an institution or dormitory or when several use the same bedroom the spreading of the worms from one person to another is easy.

The eggs from pinworms are usually laid on the skin and mucous membrane near the outlet of the bowel. This causes severe itching. In fact the itching can be

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Price Raise Brings Rush For Woolens

London—The first big price rise in household woolens hit the British housewife in the midst of Christmas shopping.

A 66 2/3-per-cent increase in the price of blankets, scheduled for Jan. 1, sent December's shoppers scurrying to the blanket counters. Many stores, sold-out of lower-priced blankets, encountered queues from disappointed customers demanding if this meant that existing supplies were going "under the counter" till prices rose.

"This is an unfair slur on the retailer," said John Ramage, director of the drapers' chamber of trade. "The shopkeeper has nothing to gain by such a method. His price margin is always strictly controlled."

Ramage said shops receiving heavy deliveries of blankets in the morning were sold-out within a few hours. "There has been an unprecedented sales rush."

The new prices mean an increase of nearly \$2 10s. (\$7.50) on single-size blankets and almost \$3 10s. on double-size.

"Blankets sold in 1950 for one guinea will now cost 10 guineas," said S. H. Leake, deputy-chairman of one of the larger chain stores. "We are expecting big sales resistance to the new supplies. At present, young newly-weds who cannot afford an elderdown, make do with an extra blanket. Now it looks as if many will have to go without the extra blanket."

Another price boost directly affecting the home is the increased cost of knitting wools. Wool prices have risen 400-per-cent since 1939 and housewives are feeling this keenly. Baby wools costing 10d an ounce in 1942, now cost 2s 1d. and may rise to 3s 3d.

Lord Wilson, president of the Board of Trade, however, announced that price-control—removed from knitting wool in May, 1950—would be re-established Jan. 2. The board is also considering control of manufacturers' prices.

This means that some wool prices will fall, but the board warns: "It does not mean that prices may rise in the future. Present prices do not yet reflect the full effect of the heavy increases in raw wool prices."

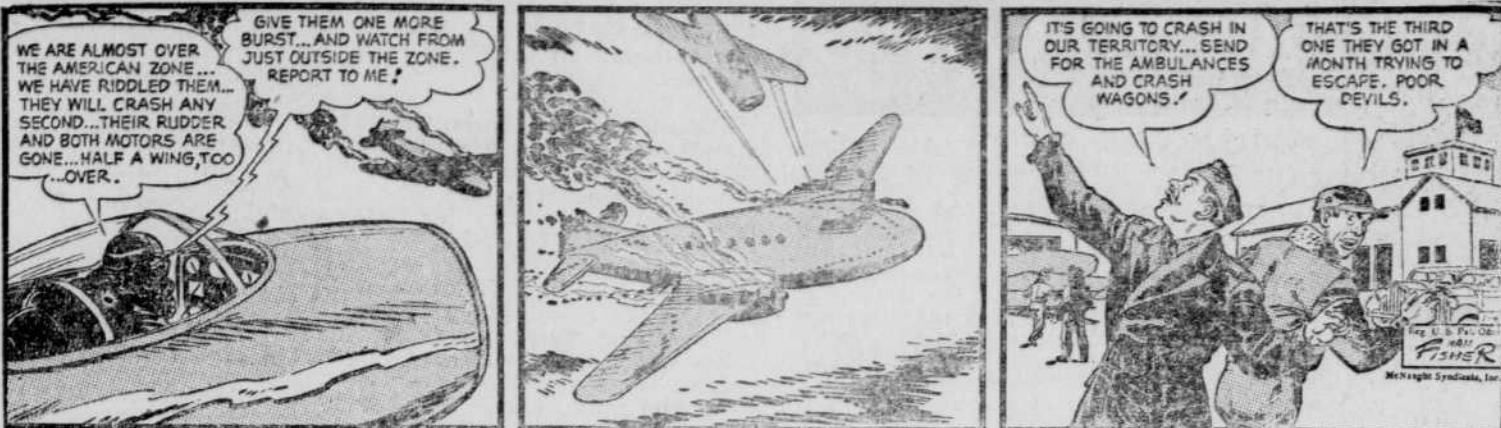

Rearmament Costs Shade Britain's Economic Advance

London, — Britain in 1950 began to pay her way as a trading country, but raising raw-material prices and a full-blooded rearmament program permitted little relief.

Domestically, in increasing cost of living became the main concern. In the first six months of the year, the country's economic climate changed radically and remarkably. Almost without anybody noticing it, "boom" began to replace "crisis" in talk of Britain's external economic position. From January to June, the sterling area's gold and dollar reserves—so low the previous autumn that Britain drastically devalued the pound sterling—rose by £262,000,000 (\$766,000,000 at the present rate of exchange).

Britain herself accounted for

only \$36,000,000 of the increase. The rest was provided by Marshall aid and increasing sterling-area sales to the dollar countries. These commodities sold at booming prices, prompting economists to warn that the increase might be only temporary. But production in Britain was up nine per cent and the country seemed ready to reap the benefits of post-war efforts.

Then came Korea. The United Nations decision to try to halt aggression meant bigger arms programs in the free countries. Stockpiling of strategic commodities, principally by the United States, sent prices soaring. Britain decided that rearmament and the dollar-export drive—now finally gaining momentum—must share priority. But there were many difficulties. At the year's end, some manufacturers complained they could not obtain materials for dollar industries because of the switch to war production. Diversion of manpower posed similar problems.

The rise in gold and dollar reserves led to the announcement, Dec. 14, that Marshall aid to Britain will be suspended Jan. 1 instead of running to 1952. If Britain's position should take a turn

for the worse, however, they may be resumed.

The suspension followed meetings in London of the new Chancellor of the Exchequer, Hugh Gaitkell, with Marshall aid officials. Gaitkell replaced Sir Stafford Cripps, who resigned for health reasons.

The improved balance-of-payments position also brought demands from Canada for more British dollar purchases there, and food contracts announced in December indicated a change in the policy of slashing dollar imports embarked on in 1948 and 1949 when the payments crisis was at its peak. But official opinion discouraged speculation that sterling revaluation and free convertibility might be at hand.

For the individual consumer, the year started brightly. The political statement produced by the February general election was followed by a number of new freedoms. Gasoline, soap, canned meats, biscuits and other groceries came off the ration. The points system of rationing was abolished. Restaurants were allowed to remove the five-shilling (about 75 cents) limit on meals. The range of tax-free "utility" clothing and furniture was improved and extended.

But the picture darkened in the closing months of 1950. Food minister Maurice Webb, who last spring and summer spoke of improving the country's larder, noted that since then he had been confronted with demands for higher prices from practically all British suppliers. There were strong hints that some of the controls removed early in the year, particularly those on fish, might be restored. The official cost-of-living index rose by two points. Reduced spending was reported on luxury items.

Housing ranked as the No. 2 domestic worry. The conservatives promised if elected to set a target of 300,000 houses a year, but the Labour government stuck to

its figure of 200,000. Modernization and extension of industrial plants proceeded according to plan, despite record exports and growing defence needs. The nationalized colliery, gas and electricity industries embarked on ambitious long-term plans of development; but in the early winter months a threatening coal shortage forced Britain—once the world's greatest coal-exporting country—to announce coal would be imported from the United States.

The nationalization of the iron and steel industry became assured in 1950 but will not take effect until 1951. Among privately-owned industries, the chemicals trade published plans for a 70-per-cent increase in output capacity within five years. Socialists plan to nationalize such further industries as insurance, sugar, minerals and cement apparently have been shelved.

The government-sponsored "wagefreeze" which served to curb wage increases during its three years of operation, was finally abandoned after months of pressure, and adjustments took place in several industries. The policy of dividend limitation, never legally binding, was less rigidly in force.

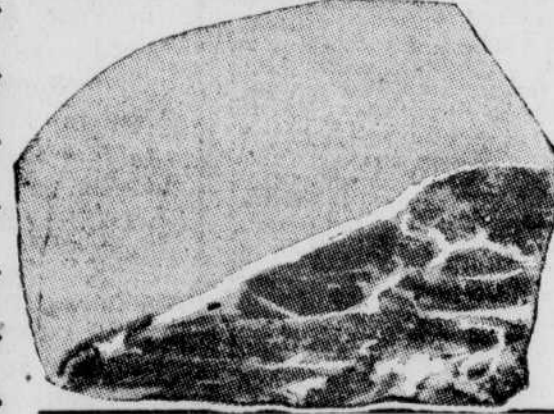

Great Lakes Shipping Has Ended

One of the busiest navigation seasons in recent years ended this week on the Great Lakes.

Marine men said they still were toting up over-all tonnage figures. But a Canadian Press survey today showed that the 1950 movement of grain and iron ore compared well with the big years of 1942, 1947 and 1948.

As the lean lake freighters eased into winter berths, leaving only a few oil tankers on the lower lakes still plying the great inland waterway, the Lake Superior Iron Ore Association in Cleveland reported that the vessels moved 78,205,881 gross tons of iron ore this year or 8,849,412 tons more than in 1949. The record peacetime time year was 1948, when ore tonnage was 82,927,192.

Tonnage this year through the Sault Ste. Marie canals linking Lakes Superior and Huron was estimated at 105,022,467. That was surpassed only by the 1942 season, with the record of more than 120,000,000 tons, and by 1947 when total tonnage was roughly 111,000,000.

A late start—most ports saw the first ships of the season about April 20—curtailed this year's activities. But reasonably good weather at the end of the season helped the lake sailors. There were no marine disasters this year along the lakes.

Less grain than usual went into winter storage at Sarnia, Port Colborne, Owen Sound and other ports. Shipping men attributed the decrease partly to a small wheat crop on the prairies and partly to an unusually large amount of storage grain being handled at Buffalo, N.Y.

Toronto harbor officials said they expect about 40 ships to be in winter berth there when the last vessel ties up. Port Colborne's winter fleet numbers 20, Port Weller's 17, Hamilton's 11, while Owen Sound will have eight large craft, Sarnia three and Sault Ste. Marie one.

The Sault Ste. Marie canals, both Canadian and American have closed for the year. The Welland Canal between Lakes Erie and Ontario was officially closed Monday night but arrangements were made to let straggling oil tankers through the locks during daylight.

Last night Detroit Red Wings found out what it was like to be kicked in the teeth by a doormat. The Red Wings, leaders of the National Hockey League, came to Madison Square Garden looking for easy pickings against the last-place New York Rangers—a team they had beaten five times and tied once in six previous meetings.

And the Rangers kicked their teeth in with a 5-3 victory.

Edgar Laprade, a veteran centre who had the fans whispering "has been" most of this season, scored a goal and set up two more.

Eddie Kullman, who hasn't escaped the minors for a full season since he broke into pro hockey three years ago, also had a goal and two assists. Linemen Tom Leswick, whose main claim to fame this year is league leadership in penalties, sank the clincher.

Defencemen Frank Eddolls and Allan Stanley, both of whom have never quite lived up to the "promising" tag they received in their rookie years, were the other Rangers goal getters.

Detroit's Abel-Howe-Lindsay line, the highest-scoring threesome in the league, didn't pick up a point. Second-stringers Jimmy McFadden, Jim Peters and Marty Pavelich—allegedly the Wings' defensive line—scored their club's three goals.

The victory moved Rangers within a point of Chicago Black Hawks, Montreal Canadiens and Boston Bruins, all tied for third place and gave them a chance to vacate the cellar for the first time this season.

Meanwhile the chastened Red Wings entertained Chicago tonight in another effort to increase their one-point lead over the idle Toronto Maple Leafs. The Bruins visit Canadiens in an effort to break the third-place tie.

Abe Greene, N. B. A. Commissioner, Predicts Boxing May Lose Place As Major United States Sport

Paterson, N.J., Jan. 4.—(P)—The doctor who prescribes an amputation for his patients isn't the more popular for his frankness, but he at least saves the patient's life.

At the risk of being accused of wearing sackcloth and ashes for a sport still very much alive and kicking, I predict that unless boxing takes a good hold of itself in 1951, it is likely to lose its place as one of the major athletic activities of the United States.

All the protests about boxing's hardy comeback nature and its ability to withstand the assaults of reformers and other adversaries in the past just so much whistling while passing the cemetery.

Boxing needs a doctor—and unless an expert medico comes to the bedside within the next few months, not even miracle drugs will be able to rescue it from its own sleeping potions.

There are three major points boxing should concentrate on immediately:

1. A stronger U.S. National Boxing Association—including New York as a member—with more direct power and authority to enforce uniform regulation;
2. More sport and less commercialism;
3. A better public relations system to tell something of boxing's past history, its contribution in wartime and its opportunities for underprivileged youths.

Barking at the critics isn't the answer. Taking away the sore spots at which the brick-throwers toss their ammunition will cure the condition.

Television unquestionably has taken a heavy toll of boxing. TV has cut the foundation from under the small clubs. Few clubs are operating except where supported by a TV-guaranteed foundation.

In addition to killing off the incubators which have been the lifeblood of boxing in the past, television has carried on where radio left off in parading a display of non-descript main events which has encouraged public contempt and disinterest in the sport. Youngsters who should still be boxing preliminaries have been gobbled up for main events, even though they sometimes are so woefully unskilled as to invite public derision.

Champions who freeze titles for ridiculously long periods and "smart-alec" managers who don't understand the meaning of a build-up but insist on handicapping opponents to the point of prostrating match-makers and promoters, have combined to kill off interest in their divisions.

Citation To Return To Races, Says Jones

Arcadia, Calif., Jan. 4.—(P)—Trainer Jimmy Jones of the Camel Stables said last night that Citation, world's leading money-winning horse, will return to racing.

Citation will be shipped from Lexington, Ky., to Santa Anita track here. The horse has not been named for any of the big events here but will be conditioned at the Arcadia track.

Citation, with winnings of \$638,630, may become the first \$1,000,000 winner. He hasn't raced since he was beaten by Noor in the Golden Gate handicap last June.

Joe Louis' Fans Say He's Still Best In Business After Smashing Victory Over Beshore Last Night

Detroit, Jan. 4.—(P)—Joe Louis' tremendous home-town following argued vociferously today, in the wake of Joe's smashing victory over outclassed Freddie Beshore last night—that the old Brown Bomber is still the best heavyweight in the business.

Louis took another step up the comeback ladder by stopping Beshore handily in two minutes and 48 seconds of the fourth round of a scheduled 10-rounder.

Referee Johnny Weber halted the one-sided battle to save the bloodied Beshore, his left eyelid badly cut and his nose battered, from further punishment.

Ex-champion Louis' many rooters—13,096 fans paid \$41,425 to see the scrap—pointed out that it took current champion Ezzard Charles 14 rounds to finish Beshore last August.

That Beshore's crowding, wild-swinging tactics were tailor-made for Louis nobody would deny. But the experts were virtually unanimous in their belief that Louis showed remarkable improvement in disposing of the Harrisburg, Pa., ex-sailor in such workmanlike fashion.

Joe's lethal right hand, seldom thrown in his losing battle with Charles last summer or in his most recent so-so bout with Cesar Brien, was powerful. It was equally effective in six-inch straight punches or in uppercuts. His famous left jab was sharp and shattering.

At the finish, the 36-year-old Louis was unmarked and not even breathing heavily. His trim weight of 210½ testified to his good condition. This was nearly eight pounds less than he weighed for his "post-retirement" title fight with Charles.

In the third round, Beshore bent low and pushing at Louis from the opening going, looked his best in the first round. In fact two of the three ring officials rated the round even.

The second was all Louis. The Brown Bomber held the crowding Beshore back to score with numerous short but damaging head and body blows.

In the third a grazing hook cut Beshore's eyelid. Blood from this and his nose, injured earlier, covered Beshore's face.

When the round was over Dr. Joseph Canahan looked at Beshore's eyelid. He said the fight could go on but told Weber to stop it if the cut started bleeding again. Soon after the fourth round started blood began pouring from the eyelid.

In the International Boxing Club officials said Louis' next fight will be Feb. 7 at Miami, Fla. The probable opponent is Johnny Holman of Chicago.

Asked whether he is anxious to try again for the title soon, Louis said he is aiming "only for my next opponent, whoever that is."

May Buy Tarpaulin For Varsity Stadium, Scene Of Grey Cup Tilt; Decision To Be Made This Month

Toronto, Jan. 4.—(P)—The University of Toronto may buy a tarpaulin to protect the playing field at Varsity Stadium—scene of Canada's annual Grey Cup football final.

Warren Stevens, the University's Athletic Director, said yesterday the Athletic Board is collecting information on performance of tarpaulins and their cost. It may reach a tentative decision before the end of this month on whether it would be a sound investment.

The tarpaulin question was first thrust to the front after the 1949 East-West game when Montreal Alouettes defeated Calgary Stampeders 28-15 on a treacherous patchwork of ice-covered strips and snow-melted blotches. Demands for protection for the field rose again after the 1950 game when Toronto Argonauts rolled to a 12-0 triumph over Winnipeg Blue Bombers in a sea of mud.

Both years, a snowstorm hit the Toronto area a day or so before the game. In 1949 the weather remained cold and on snafu portions of the field the ground was hard. In 1950 a sudden rise in temperature led to a soft field, ripped up in places by snow-removal equipment.

A Canadian Press survey—carried out in the one-year interval between games—showed that United States universities in the "cold belt" from Massachusetts to Minnesota use tarpaulins and get good results. A New York manufacturer said he would supply a tarpaulin for \$8,000 exclusive of Canadian import taxes.

Stevens said the Athletic Board's study is aimed at discovering the best kind of material, how much it costs a square foot, how well it will shed water and resist cold. If the Board decides in favor of a tarpaulin, it will send its recommendation to the University's Board of Governors for action.

He thought a tarpaulin might not solve all weather problems, especially if the temperature drops below 25 degrees. A Michigan-Ohio State game in the United States was delayed because the tarpaulin froze to the field in 10-degree weather. There was similar trouble at a recent professional game in Cleveland.

The University has price quotations from several manufacturers. Some want \$23,000 for a tarp. One offered to make up an electrically-heated blanket—but there was no mention of a cost figure which would be fabulous.
