Yesterday morning, in the Court of Queen's Bench, Mr. B. Devlin, of counsel for Robert Notman, in accordance with the suggestion of Judge Drummond, presented the following petition to have Notman brought before the Court.

THE PRISONER OF THE SAID ROBERT NOTMAN, at present confined in the Kingston Penitentiary.
