ATTACK UPON SOUTHERN EUROPE REPORTED NEAR

Spanish Report Concentration At Gibraltar

Three Aircraft Carriers and Three Battleships Reported Among Concentration of Over One Hundred Warships and Transports at the Rock—Allied Planes Meanwhile Continue Softening-Up Plan.

Big-scale naval activity was reported in progress at Gibraltar today, involving upwards of one hundred warships and other vessels, while in the skies Allied bombers piled up fresh havoc on both the Northern and Southern ramparts of Europe in their pre-invasion "softening-up" offensive.

A dispatch from La Linea, next door to Gibraltar, said three aircraft carriers, three battleships, a number of cruisers and several destroyers left Gibraltar on Sunday night, but observers at La Linea could not say whether they headed into the Mediterranean or Westward into the Atlantic.

In addition, ninety-two freighters along with several transports and destroyers were reported concentrated at "The Rock."

German broadcasts nervously asserted yesterday that June 22 was "Der Tag" for an Allied invasion of Europe, and the Rome radio exhorted the Italian people to emulate Britain's courage under the threat of attack.

From North African bases, Allied planes delivered pulverizing new assaults on the Italian mainland City of Foggia and on Italy's island strongholds of Sicily, Sardinia and Pantelleria.

Italian headquarters acknowledged "considerable damage" at Foggia, hit for the third time in four days, and listed twenty-seven killed and thirty-three injured in the latest attack.

Long-range Allied aircraft from the Middle East also blasted Axis ships in the Aegean sea off Greece.

From Britain, R. A. F. fighter squadrons streaked across the English Channel by daylight today to pummel the German-occupied French coast in the wake of two long sweeps yesterday over Northern France and the Low Countries, where targets included airdromes, communications, docks and war foundries at Zeebrugge, Nieuport and Brugge, in Belgium; Vlissingen, in Holland, and Caen and Cherbourg, France.

German forces launched two strong counter-attacks in the Lischansk area of the Donets river front last night, but were thrown back to their initial position with heavy losses, the midday Soviet communique said today.

Ignoring German reports that the Nazis had launched a strong drive on the Western front above Smolensk, the communique, which was broadcast from Moscow, mentioned only artillery action in that general area and said Russian detachments had scouted German positions there.

Raids On British Coastal Towns Fail To Bring Front Page Story

London, June 1.—(CP Cable)—Residents of Britain's fringe of target towns along the English Channel are always on the front line but seldom on the front pages of the press.

Targets such as London have had their spells of bombings mixed with peace and quiet. But the coastal towns and resort towns have been regular targets almost since the beginning of the air war. Unless there is some special "angle" to a coast raid newspapers generally give only secondary prominence to enemy sorties and attacks which air authorities say are insignificant.

Two of the most prominent cases are the Sunday daylight attack on the Southwest coast resort, identified by the Germans as Torquay, where eighteen children were killed and others were trapped during the bombing of a church.

An attack May 23 on an East coast town, identified by the Germans as Bournemouth, resulted in seven Canadian servicemen losing their lives. Some American soldiers also were killed. Civilian casualties were reported to have been as heavy as in the "Torquay" raid.

CANADA-BUILT TRAWLERS AID COAST DEFENCE

Royal Navy Press Release Reveals that Canadian-Built Craft Are Now Serving in British Waters.

London, June 1.—(CP Cable)—Some of the escort trawlers built in Canada for the Royal Navy now are in service round the coast of Britain, naval headquarters said in a press release issued today.

Some of these ships were built more than 1,000 miles inland, on the shores of Great Lakes. Until the war, many of the men who built them had nothing to do with ships—they had been farmers, lumberjacks, and almost anything but shipyard workers.

These trawlers belong to the "Island" class—named after islands like Hayling, Switha and Skye. The Canadian-built trawlers are named after islands in the Dominion.

Urges That School Teaching Be Declared An Essential Industry

Quebec, June 1.—(CP Cable)—Victor Dore, Superintendent of Public Instruction, says in his annual report to Provincial Secretary Hector Paré that school teaching must soon be declared an essential industry and the salaries of teachers must be increased or quality of teaching in the Province is bound to suffer.

Mr. Dore said that more than one-third of the male teachers in the Province have enlisted in the armed forces since the outbreak of war. Many women teachers have also joined the forces or left teaching for remunerative war jobs.

"Although the vacancies were filled, in general, by married women, the problem has become so acute that 150 persons without diplomas have been allowed to teach in Protestant schools."

"Unless salaries are substantially increased and unless teaching is soon made an essential industry the number of teachers will be reduced again next year and the quality of teaching will again be diminished."

This year, he said, the Government paid to rural school teachers and said that more than 80 per cent of Catholic rural teachers in the Province were now receiving more than \$300 annually. This was due to the fact that the Government last year paid \$1,900,000 in premiums to Catholic and Protestant rural teachers.

This year, he said, the Government planned to grant an additional \$600,000 to municipal school commissions to help them increase teachers' salaries.

The report also told of steps taken to attract more male teachers into rural schools. The Government was attempting to do this through the payment of premiums.

During the 1941-42 fiscal year, 197 rural schools and 45 urban schools were built. Some 499 schools were repaired.

These two towns were reported on the front pages of most of the newspapers of London and the provinces under large headlines and drew editorial comment from one national daily.

Oddly enough the local paper of "Bournemouth" ran the story about the raid on its second page. Because of censorship the newspaper could identify the target of the raid only as a "South coast town." This newspaper played the 2,000-ton Dortmund raid as its front page story.

The "Bournemouth" newspaper reported on the casualties in a "South coast town" in a box, and the only other front page reference to the raid was a brief statement about the number of animals found among the debris after the raid.

London newspapers seldom report more than a half-column on the inside or back pages about any coastal raid. These accounts briefly report the number of casualties, various incidents and quote a few eyewitness accounts. Occasionally more space is devoted to pictures of the raids.

Discount Tale Of Sectionman In Railway Sabotage Attempt

Fort William, June 1.—(CP Cable)—Andrew Kosliuk, fifty-five year old sectionman of Pawtek, Ont., who claims he was shot and wounded by saboteurs, was under police guard in hospital here today.

He told police Sunday he had been fired upon from ambush as he attempted to replace rail spikes which had been removed from the main line track of the Canadian Pacific Railway, near Pawtek, nineteen miles West of here.

Entire United States Coal Mine Industry Paralyzed By Walk-Out

New York, June 1.—(AP)—Work whistles sounded in vain at most Government-operated mines in the United States today as the greater proportion of John L. Lewis' United Mine Workers again followed his injunction against "trespassing" on mine property in the absence of a contract.

Expiration at midnight of the twice-extended truce, which kept the pits operating despite deadlocked wage negotiations, brought no word from the U.M.W. chief to his men. But none was needed. He had made clear previously that the miners would not "trespass" when the contract ran out.

First reports from the coal fields bore out earlier predictions that production of both soft and hard coal by Lewis' 800,000 miners would halt at midnight.

Washington and the rest of the country waited tensely to see what action a Government at war would take to protect its interests as nominal operator of the mines. Without coal, the output of war factories is threatened.

Collective bargaining negotiations between U.M.W. Leader John L. Lewis and the mine operators are scheduled to continue today but thousands of miners in both the soft and hard coal fields stayed away from the pits in the absence of any word that the truce had been extended a second time.

Here is the situation at a glance: Kentucky—Twelve thousand men failed to report for night work in the big sandy field of Northeastern Kentucky after 800 walked out in four Southeastern pits Monday. Harlan County, with 13,000 miners, was counting on being idle.

Pennsylvania—Union men spread the word that there would be no work today.

West Virginia—Six hundred miners, employing 130,000, went idle after only the necessary maintenance men reported for the night shift.

Virginia—Absenteeism hit the night shifts and gave the impression, officially, that the state's 20,000 miners would stay home.

Ohio—Union men predicted a shutdown in Eastern Ohio which employs 16,000 of the state's 21,000 miners.

WARNS AGAINST SYMPATHY FOR GERMAN PEOPLE

London Newspaper Cites Killing of Children in South Coast Town as Reason Against Sentimentality.

London, June 1.—(CP Cable)—"If ever you are tempted to talk about 'those poor Germans,'" remember this picture and what their bombs did to a British church where children had gathered for Sunday School services."

Below that caption the newspaper ran pictures of the shattered and roofless church with its six-foot crucifix swinging from the arch above the ruins where eighteen children, all below the age of fifteen, lie buried.

The Express advocated the development of a system of warnings to be communicated to schools to give children special protection.

"It would be absurd," the editorial said "to mobilize whole communities simply because of this disaster."

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Reserve Army To Take More Important Place In Defence Programme

Defence Minister Ralston Virtually Completes Explanation of Army Requirements in War Appropriations Bill—Air Force to Come Under Scrutiny of House of Commons Members Later Today.

Ottawa, June 1.—(CP)—The House of Commons last night almost scraped the bottom of the bin of army information and was expected today to finish with Defence Minister Ralston and the men in khaki, and to begin its study of air force undertakings and aspirations.

From a barrage of questions aimed at Col. Ralston, the members emerged with the following information:

1—It is planned to train and equip the reserve army to the point that it will be able to defend the shores of Canada if the need arises.

2—About eighty-five per cent of the Canadian requirements of small arms, including rifles, Bren light machine guns and Sten sub-machine guns, now are being made in Canada.

3—Consideration is being given a suggestion that a distinct medical corps be established, offering its services to the army, navy and air force alike, instead of each of these services having its own medical organization.

4—The "forgotten man" of the armed services is the internment camp guard doing a thankless job well, said Rodney Adamson (Prog. Con., York West) who noted during discussion of internment operations that hundreds of British escaped prisoners sometimes were loose in enemy territory, while only one German had escaped from Canada and made his way home. (He was Baron Franz von Werder, subsequently reported killed on air operations).

5—Rejections of men seeking to enlist run about 50 per cent, and of these rejects 35 per cent are due to medical grounds and 15 per cent to nervous and mental grounds.

One sidelight was the revelation by Col. Ralston that he had authorized a special war repellent uniform for the Pacific Coast Rangers, who will engage in a type of guerrilla warfare if ever they are needed. He recalled the authorization was for 15,000 units in all.

This year more will be done for the reserve army in the way of equipment, especially in respect to transport, carriers and similar requirements.

He said defence headquarters was "looking forward to giving the reserve army more responsibility in defence roles, particularly in connection with anti-aircraft work."

Munitions Minister Howe said the production of Bren guns at the John Inglis plant in Toronto was being increased, and this increase probably would continue for some time. The department was dropping two

Chinese Troops Register Major Victory Against Jap Offensive

De Gaulle And Giraud Now At Loggerheads

Chungking, June 1.—(AP)—In one of the greatest Chinese victories of the war, hard-fighting Chinese troops have "completely routed" five Japanese divisions in rough mountain territory Southwest of the enemy's Yangtze River base at Ichang, a special communique announced today.

Retreat trails for two divisions have been cut and the advancing Chinese are moving to surround the enemy in a big encirclement, the announcement said, indicating the objective was to wipe out the entire Japanese force, involving perhaps 75,000 men. The developing victory posed a threat to Chungking, set off by enemy thrusts outward from Ichang a week ago.

Simultaneously with the land advances, Chinese headquarters announced today that "a large number" of Allied heavy bombers and an escort of Chinese fighters teamed up Monday afternoon for the most shattering joint air victory ever achieved over the invaders in China.

The big bombers scattered more than ten tons of bombs on the Ichang airfield, destroying many grounded planes, and on the return trip the bombers and fighters accounted for thirty-one enemy intercept planes—twenty-three shot down and eight more probably destroyed. All the Allied planes returned safely.

The special communique said that Chinese forces now are besieging Changyang, only twelve miles below Ichang, indicating an advance of about twenty miles since the recapture of Yungyangwan, announced Sunday.

By noon Monday, the Chinese said, their vigorous encircling assaults had "completely routed" the five Japanese divisions, cutting off the 3rd and 13th divisions, and inflicting heavy losses in personnel.

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Expanded Agricultural Industry Essential To Post-War Stability

Hot Springs, Va., June 1.—(CP)—An expanding agricultural economy, both in the immediate post-war world and in the years of peace to follow, was recommended to the United Nations Food Conference here today by one of its main committees.

Anticipating a period of acute food shortages immediately after the war, the committee recommended that every country with an agricultural industry capable of expansion, increase its acreage under crops and take other steps to bolster production.

Looking beyond this period, it recommended that production be increased still further in the years to come and that the surplus be distributed throughout the world in an orderly, planned basis, relying on higher standards of living, changed nutrition habits and industrial expansion to provide the demand.

The Canadian delegation to the conference approved this general plan of post-war agriculture.

The recommendations, precedent report reads, "provided that nations act with foresight and at the right time."

It thought that post-war rationing would be one of the means adopted by this central authority to assure an equitable distribution of food after the war.

The recommendations on production, laid down by experts from all over the world, related to almost every aspect of modern-day farming. They ranged from easier credit terms to the maintenance of soil fertility and from the endorsement of producer and consumer co-operative movements to the settlement of new farm lands, by immigration if necessary.

The Committee foresaw the possibility of skyrocketing prices in the period of food shortage immediately after the war and with the recovery of devastated areas and intensified production elsewhere, a fall in prices, a recurrence of the inflation and deflation that followed the last war.

WAR BULLETINS

London — The Algiers radio said today that the French naval squadron at Alexandria went over to Gen. Henri Giraud and the Allies on the day Tunis fell, May 7.

The broadcast, recorded by the Associated Press, added that "this important news had been kept secret for important evident military reasons."

London — A Duisburg plant capable of making 100,000 tons of synthetic oil annually was wrecked in the R. A. F. raid May 12, the Air Ministry announced today.

A growing oil shortage was reported in Germany where about a fourth of the production is synthetic, the announcement said.

The knocked-out plant was the Ruhr Chemical A.G. and an associated company, Ruhr Benzin A.G.

London—Hope has been all but abandoned that eighteen children buried in the ruins of a bombed church in a Southwest coast town would be rescued alive. The town, which the Germans say was Torquay, was raided Sunday by fifteen Nazi fighter-bombers. Three Sunday School teachers also were lost.

instance, reported the South coast raid of May 24 in one-half a column but ran five pictures. Three of them showed damaged buildings, A.R.P. workers clearing debris of the raids and their effect on the town as a whole.

The raids were considered so insignificant by the news editor of one London daily that he suggested they were being "overplayed" by the press.

"If you want to help the Germans you have only got to play the raids up," he said. "Of course it's a sad thing when children and innocent victims are killed but what effect has such a raid on the course of the war?"

The Daily Mirror said in an editorial today that there is no point in denouncing the attacks as "purposeless, sadistic and wanton."

"Sneak raids are not purposeless," said the Mirror. "They are undertaken with three main objectives in view. It is part war nerves, it ties down defences and it is a valuable means of training pilots and crews."

German propagandists talk about new heavy bombs being dropped on Britain but they fail to tell their listeners that the aircraft they are using for the sneak raids are Focke-Wulf 190 fighter-bombers capable of carrying a bomb load of not more than 1,000 pounds.

Germans are not told that since the start of this year only a score of raids have been made against Britain by more than twenty aircraft in each attack and that sixteen per cent of the total number of machines sent here since the first of the year have been destroyed.

By comparison, the R. A. F. sent over several thousand heavy bombers in two types of which carry bombs of greater weight than any dozen raiders the Germans have sent over Britain with a total bomb load almost equal to the 37,000 tons of bombs dropped on Germany during the whole of last year.

Contrasted with earlier Germany raids on Britain when Nazi aircraft were overhead for hours, today's

A father protected his child with his own body, when the raiders came, and was killed by a cannon shell. The child was only slightly injured.

sneak raids rarely last longer than a minute or two.

Fighter-bombers come in fast and low, machine-gunning and bombing as they streak across town and head out to sea again. The damage they cause and the dislocation to public services is in no way comparable to the earlier raids on bigger targets, even considering the actual weight of the attack in relation to the size of the target.

An indication of what Britons think of these sneak raids lies in the fact that many of the resorts on the South and East coast are more crowded today than at any time since the war began. Torquay is thronged with holidaymakers and Bournemouth is busier now than it has been since the end of 1939.

In closing, Mrs. Carr expressed her thanks to all the committees who assisted in making the year's activities a success and she said that she hoped that in the future the same co-operation would still be forthcoming.

The work accomplished by the War Service Committee was reviewed in the report of Mrs. Gordon Miller, which was read by Miss Ruby Hunt, the Secretary.

"I feel quite confident," Mrs. Miller said, "that the efforts of the War Services Committee of the Y.W.C.A. during this past year have aided in no small way in helping to maintain the morale of the men in uniform stationed in this vicinity."

In outlining the work done by the Committee, Mrs. Miller said that except for two unfortunate incidents the year's programme had been worthwhile and highly successful. She said that 14,364 servicemen had attended the Rendezvous and that 7,489 had visited the Hostess House. These were two buildings taken over by the committee and put to use for the entertainment of the soldiers and the airmen. His presentation will be based on the theme of his broadcasts which have found a favorable reaction among Canadians.

CONDITION REMAINS CRITICAL
Hospital reported today that the condition of Philomen Roy, sixty-nine, of Megantic, remained critical. Roy was taken to the institution during the week-end suffering from a fractured skull which he is believed to have received in a fall down a flight of stairs at the American House on King Street West, according to Sherbrooke Police.

Following an investigation yesterday, police discounted any foul play in connection with the case. Roy apparently lost his balance and fell, his head striking the cement floor. Hospital officials are holding little hope for his recovery.

Dances and social gatherings were held throughout the year and the committee supplied partners for the dances and the social functions. Arrangements were also made by this committee for dinner invitations for the men in uniform and 710 were issued.

Mrs. Miller said that the most successful project of the year was the redecoration of the Hostess House at Windsor Mills. This house was made into a residence where visitors to the school could stay for a short period of time. Lunches and meals were also served here to the girls working at the school and it was in this building that the airmen spent their leisure hours. The destruction by fire of this popular building was a loss to the committee but the good work was still carried on in the Recreation Room of the school.

The Convent also expressed the appreciation of the Committee for the valuable advice and financial assistance received from the Citizens' Committee and a vote of thanks to all who had given of their time or who had donated food and furnishings was also in order.

In closing her report Mrs. Miller said that she was leaving the work which she had been doing in this district with great regret, but that she was going to continue her work in new fields. She said that she would never forget the kindness and co-operation which she received from the people of Sherbrooke, and she said that she hoped that the work would continue with the same success as it had obtained in the past.

The financial report for the MacKinnon Memorial Building revealed a surplus for the year of \$1,324.54, the revenue for the year amounting to \$7,765.74 and expenditures to \$1,471.98 plus \$77.44 depreciation on the stoker.

Biggest revenue was found in sundry donations and subscriptions, which amounted to \$2,737.79 with interest on investment securities accounting for \$2,356.38. In the expenditure column, salaries took up \$2,381.25 and repairs and renewals \$615.81.

The Howard Residence had an operating deficit for the year of \$154.15 and a net deficit through depreciation deductions for the stoker and refrigerator of \$272.18. Revenue amounted to \$7,132.97, including \$6,424.48 from boarders, and expenditures to \$7,567.52, including \$3,181.91 for provisions and \$2,115.43 for salaries and wages.

The statement of the War Services Fund revealed cash on hand at April 30, of \$189.23. The receipts for the year amounted to \$1,228.02, and included among the many items: Donations, \$472.43; truck shop, \$433.32, and the National Council Subvention, first quarter, \$92. Disbursements totalled \$1,286.25, for a net deficit on the year's operations of \$58.23.

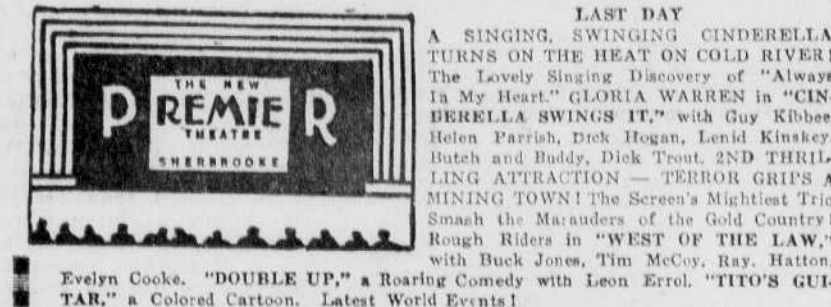

Gas Pump Destroyed By Blaze But Firemen Avert Explosion

Prompt arrival of the Municipal Fire Department saved several thousand gallons of gasoline from being burned and averted a possible explosion at 10:05 o'clock this morning when fire destroyed a gas pump at the Martin Motor Sales Company, 27 Wellington Street South. Firemen used "fog-noz," a new type of nozzle which throws a foggy water stream, to extinguish the blaze.

Investigating the origin of the fire, Director of Fire Percy Donahue said that M. Bergeron, local plumber, was repairing a leak in the pump, which was on the sidewalk in front of the garage, when a short circuit in the electric wiring started the blaze. Although the resultant flames quickly encircled Mr. Bergeron, he escaped uninjured.

As the flames gained momentum, the pump was a mass of flames and in several minutes the fire, fed by gasoline from the huge reservoir tank, left nothing but the frame standing. At the height of the fire, the mechanism of the pump was molten-red. After extinguishing the blaze, fire-fighters removed the pump frame from its base at the direction of Director Donahue, who ordered the pipe leading to the supply tank sealed.

Firemen were forced to go through clouds of black, curling smoke to reach the burning pump. However, the blaze was brought under control in several minutes by using "fog-noz."

The department answered two other calls in the past twenty-four hour period. A fire breaking out in the wood sawing machine in the yard of Wilfred Houde, 42 Belmont Street, was put out before any damage resulted.

Slight damage was caused to a ceiling in the residence of Alfred Couture, 93 Alexander Street, when a blaze started from a short circuit

WILLIAM BURNS DIES AFTER A BRIEF ILLNESS

Friends of William Burns, former employee of the C.P.R. freight sheds, and in recent years engaged in his own transportation business, will regret to learn of his death on Sunday at the hospital in Thetford Mines.

In his eighty-second year, today would have been his birthday. Mr. Burns had been a resident of Sherbrooke for over half a century.

Born in St. Malachie, Que., on June 1, 1861, Mr. Burns came to Sherbrooke when a young boy and had resided here ever since.

Married on April 28, 1895, to Rose McKenney, of Jackson, Me., who preceded him in 1932, the deceased is survived by three daughters, Mrs. A. R. Stewart and Mrs. Eric B. Norman, of Sherbrooke, and Miss Gladys Burns, of Thetford Mines.

One of the first members of St. Patrick's Church, Mr. Burns was also connected with the Society of the Holy Name and was a member of Court Friendship, Canadian Order of Foresters.

Funeral services will be held on Wednesday morning with the cortege leaving the Sherbrooke Undertaking Parlors at 8:30 o'clock, and Requiem Mass being said at St. Patrick's Church at nine o'clock.

Interment will take place in St. Michael's Cemetery, Sherbrooke.

DISCOVERY OF MAN'S BODY IN RIVER PROBED

A verdict of "death by drowning, assumed accidental," was returned yesterday by the jury at an inquest held in Bromptonville in the death of Henry Chaine, whose body found on Saturday floating in the water among logs behind the Bromptonville paper mills.

The body was found by Lionel Valieres and Leo Lapointe, two loggers of the paper company. They notified the police and Sgt. Roger Gauthier investigated.

Mr. Chaine had stayed at the Sacred Heart Home and had been an irregular worker. Delphis and Gaston Gilbert, of St. Elie, testified they had hired the deceased, but that he left their employment on May 21. D. Laliberte then testified that he had taken Mr. Chaine to the Sherbrooke C.P.R. station, where he left him and his luggage. Mr. Chaine checked his luggage and was not seen again until the two men found him in the water.

There are no relatives in the district but police officials identified the man by papers found on him, and Mrs. Howard Stetson, of Thompsonville, Conn., believed to be his sister, has been notified.

The jury headed by Leonidas Bachand, coroner for St. Francis District, consisted of G. Bibeau, C. Gregoire, J. A. Charland, A. Chevalier, D. Marcoux and P. Allaire.

Dr. Alphonse Cloutier examined the body and verified the fact that death was caused by drowning. In the absence of any witnesses to the actual happening, the jury used the phrase "assumed accidental."

The training period at camp will consist of an extension of the syllabus followed during the parades held at the armoury on week nights and it is expected that several schemes will be held during the training period at camp.

Prior to their departure for camp the men were all issued with com-

plete equipment and their small arms and rifles will also come into use during the training period. The men in the unit have had some experience in the open with their weapons and they always look forward to the outdoor tactics and schemes with a considerable amount of interest.

Among the officers who went to camp with the men are Captain R. E. White, Captain Cleveland, Major Guy Bryant, Captain Allan, Quartermaster Lieut. W. Bradley, Lieut. H. Allan, Captain Ranshouan, Second Lieut. Nicol and Second Lieut. Holt. Quartermaster Sergeant-Major Price and Regimental Sergeant-Major Bob Smith also left with the unit.

The 35th Battery (Reserve) will go to Petawawa some time in August and it is expected that Les Fusiliers de Sherbrooke will move into Farnham shortly after the Regiment leaves, and Bishop's University Contingent C.O.T.C. will camp on the College grounds immediately after the exams which are now in progress.

Carr prefaced her presidential address at the largely-attended annual dinner-meeting of the Y.W.C.A., held last evening at the MacKinnon Memorial, assuring her audience that this question would be successfully answered in reports to follow.

Dinner was served in the club room under the supervision of Mrs. S. B. Wood, Mrs. Edward Holgate and Mrs. C. A. Turner, the members of the Business Girls' Supper Club acting most efficiently as waitresses.

The long tables were effectively decorated by Miss Kate Fale, who used apple blossoms and tulips in crystal vases and lighted red, white and blue candles arranged at intervals on the white damask covers, on which red, white and blue runners formed the Union Jack.

Grace was sung by the Business Girls' Supper Club and after the delicious supper Mrs. Carr extended a gracious welcome to each and every one, especially mentioning Mrs. David Wilson, who for twenty years had filled the arduous office of Treasurer, being obliged to resign owing to ill health, remarking that her presence "made the family circle complete."

Guests seated at the head table at which Mrs. Carr presided as official hostess were Miss Mary Milford, Mrs. Colin Campbell, Miss Elizabeth Haight, Mrs. Newman Hunter, Mrs. W. B. McCaw, Miss Marjorie Haley, Miss Frances Christie, Miss Ruby Hunt, Mrs. Walter Sutherland, Miss Rupert Wiggitt and Mrs. Arthur Fraser.

Reports verifying the President's assumption that the Y.W.C.A. had more than justified its existence were heard from each and every department, and showed that outstanding success has been achieved not only within the confines of its peace-time activities but had excelled in its war service work.

Mrs. W. B. McCaw, Chairman of the latter, reviewed the financial side of this important and ever growing work, the annual report compiled by Mrs. Gordon Miller, former Secretary, being read by Miss Ruby Hunt, her successor in office.

The annual review of the Business Girls' Supper Club was presented by Miss Helen Brannelle. While Mrs. Carr remarked that she regretted no report was forthcoming from the Quaintance Club, she was gratified that two members were present to represent the club at the annual meeting.

The reception of reports over Mrs. Carr requested Miss Mary Milford to take the chair for the election, the slate of officers being presented by Mrs. Colin L. Campbell for the nominating committee as follows: Mrs. David Wilson, Honorary President; Mrs. George H. Carr, President; Mrs. Ben C. Howard, First Vice-President; Mrs. Wilfred Davey, Second Vice-President; Mrs. Newman Hunter, Recording Secretary; Mrs. Walter Sutherland, Corresponding Secretary, and Miss Elizabeth Haight, Treasurer.

The slate was accepted by the meeting and one ballot was cast. A delightful interlude occurred when Miss Mona Bigg sang two lovely songs, accompanied by Miss Pickering.

Prior to adjournment the President called upon D. J. Salls, Chairman of the Advisory Board, who after explaining some details regarding requests to the Endowment Fund, warmly congratulated Mrs. Carr, the Board and every member of the staff for the excellent work achieved during the past year.

A marked increase in the membership of the Association was reported by Miss Marjorie Haley, General Secretary. She said that last year 304 girls were listed as financial members of the club. This was an increase of ninety-six over last year's membership and these figures are irrespective of those shown in the report of the physical director.

With regard to the administration and finance of the Howard Residence and the MacKinnon Memorial, Miss Haley said that there were no outstanding debts but that the Residence will show an operating

deficit of \$154. Donations from the Rotary Club, the Plymouth Church Women's Association, the Church Union Group, the Stanstead and Sherbrooke Insurance Company, the Sherbrooke Trust, and the National War Services of the Y.W.C.A. were acknowledged in the Secretary's report, and she also mentioned the joint campaign with the Y.M.C.A. and the Salvation Army in which the Association raised \$1,500. Repairs to the Memorial Building this year amounted to \$615. This included a new roof on the gym.

Speaking of the Residence, Miss Haley said that the building, which was the big drawback, and that it had caused them endless trouble and worry. Aside from this she reported a successful year at the Residence. She said the rooms were filled to capacity and that there were now thirty girls living in the residence. A vote of thanks was also expressed to Mrs. G. T. Armstrong who has acted as house convener.

Clubs and classes also came under review in the Secretary's report and she said that the girls worked hard for the good of the Association and that through the efforts of the Quaintance Club and the Supper Club \$580 had been raised for the Churchill Fund.

At the end of her report Miss Haley said that the rentals were also of particular value to the Association. Among the organizations who used the MacKinnon Memorial for regular or occasional meetings were the Red Cross, the V.O.N., the Business and Professional Women's Club, the Prisoners of War Relations Association, the Schubert Club, the Hospital Auxiliary, the several chapters of the I.O.D.E. and the Girl Guides.

In closing, Miss Haley announced her intention of leaving the local Association. She said that it was with a great sense of regret in many respects that she was leaving her duties at the "Y," that she had watched the Association grow along many lines and that she would always remember the happy years spent in Sherbrooke and would follow with interest and pleasure every progress made in the Sherbrooke Young Women's Christian Association.

The total enrollment in the Health Education Department, from September to May was 1,138, while 1,315 girls used the swimming pool, a monthly average of 165, according to the report presented by Miss Frances Christie, Physical Director.

Miss Christie reviewed the year's work which began with a play party held on October 26, consisting of gym games, swimming demonstrations and dancing. On November 13 a Soft Slipper dance was held to raise funds for a new set of flying rings.

The basketball team had a very successful season when they won the league and retrieved the trophy lost to Bishop's College last year. Some games were played with the Montreal Y.W.C.A. and the basketball gym was also given over to the R.C.A.F. boys from Windsor Mills two nights a week all winter.

During the Christmas holidays, Miss Christie revealed that she took a refresher course at the Margaret Eaton School of Physical Education in Toronto and that all Y.W.C.A. physical directors at the conference met with Miss Slack, the Secretary for Health Education at National Council, for tea one afternoon.

The intermediate had a posture club which aroused much interest and was very beneficial in correcting posture. When a girl received five stars she was presented with a Club Ribbon which showed her to be a

REVISING ALLIED STRATEGY

The generals and the admirals have completed their revision of the British-American master plan for the destruction of the Axis. When that blueprint for victory was drawn up in January at Casablanca, the chief architects, Prime Minister Churchill and President Roosevelt, indicated that it was expected to hold good for nine months. That a revision was considered necessary before half that term had expired is proof of the enormous shifts only a few weeks can bring in this global conflict, of the headlong pace at which history is being made.

The President's twenty-two-word announcement Thursday, that the chiefs of staff had ended their Washington conference "in complete agreement on future operations in all theatres of the war" gave no hint as to how extensive the changes had been. But all the indications are that they must have been of far-reaching importance.

We can only speculate as to the new factors which entered into the deliberations at Washington. But it appears certain that nearly all of them favor the United Nations; the one major exception seems to be the growing danger that China may be overwhelmed before the Allies can come to her rescue. Among the others may be these:

The tremendous pace at which Allied military resources are growing, permitting the launching of many offensives simultaneously.

Indications that we are winning the war against the submarines.

The devastating effects of the British-American bombing offensives against Italy and Germany.

Signs that the bombing and psychological warfare together may be creating stresses in the fabric of the Axis that may make costly frontal attacks on the main bastions of the European fortress unnecessary, signs that may indicate the wisdom of waiting to see how these stresses work.

The imperative necessity of convincing Russia that the Western Allies are doing all they can to "take some of the weight" off her Red Army, as Churchill put it.

Satisfying Russia was a major consideration at Washington and the decisions reached doubtless have been or soon will be communicated to Premier Stalin. The signs are that up to this point Stalin is pleased with the summer's prospect.

THE BATTLE OF THE ATLANTIC

One of the most satisfactory developments of the war during the month of May was the marked improvement in the anti-submarine campaign, an improvement that finds reflection in the views of the leaders of the United Nations, who while seeking to prevent any undue optimism, are frankly expressing the belief that the U-boat has been substantially beaten, for the time being at least.

This view is supported by a German naval writer who declares that the Allied defence against U-boats is reducing the sinking of merchant ships and is even easing Nazi pressure on the ocean sea lanes.

Capt. Rudolf Krohne, commander of the corvette, emphasizing how difficult U-boat warfare has become, wrote in the Voelkischer Beobachter, Nazi party organ:

"The tenacious exertions of the British and Americans to protect their convoys sufficiently with constantly new defensive weapons and with naval and air forces and to discover the U-boats in time to force them off and destroy them, may indeed reduce sinkings for some time and achieve a certain easing in the Battle of the Atlantic."

Krohne added that "it must not be concealed that the battle is indescribably difficult and demands unimaginable determination in the face of the weather and the enemy's defence."

In meantime, reports reaching Stockholm from Berlin state that Germany is preparing for summer defensive warfare while Nazi military leaders hope that no large-scale invasion will start until they can replace the losses in men and material suffered in defeats in the Donet basin, at Stalingrad and in Tunisia.

While there is talk in Berlin about a Russian summer offensive between Kursk and the Crimea, a correspondent of the Stockholm Tidningen said that German political circles expressed the belief there would be no major action for at least a month.

Other quarters, he said, held the view that there would be considerable "sound-out" offensive pre-

parations throughout the summer but that there would be no major warfare.

Nazi military circles, acknowledging the big gaps caused by the Russian and North African defeats, were represented as indicating that Hitler would not launch any offensive. It was said they hoped that intensified war production and total manpower mobilization would enable them to return the German fighting machine to full strength before any Allied attacks were launched.

Das Schwarze Korps, weekly organ of the Elite Guard, said, however, that the Allies have made preparations for invasion and that Germany must be prepared to go on the defensive.

STRENGTHENING THE FRENCH FRONT

Two important week-end developments have materially improved the position of the French forces arrayed against the Nazi oppressors of their native country, the first being the apparent agreement between Generals de Gaulle and Giraud, and the second being the decision of the commander of the French naval units, immobilized at Alexandria since the fall of France, to throw in his lot with the United Nations.

The first is by far the most important from every angle, as it assures that the battle forces will henceforth be under a united command, that those Frenchmen now in the fight and those who enter it in the future will be fighting not for one or another political and military leader but for the common cause, the liberation of France. Furthermore it will remove a serious threat of friction in the United Nations front, for the admitted hostility of these two French factions in the past has led to considerable concern in London and Washington, holding as it did an excellent opportunity for propaganda and fifth column activities on the part of Nazi agents.

But even more important than the common front is the stress placed by both leaders that the new Committee is but a temporary affair, designed to give coherence to the French war effort and that with the liberation of France, an opportunity will be given the people to select their own Government under the Republican constitution. This too has an important psychological bearing on the struggle, as anti-democratic leaders have been prone in the past to point to the French leaders as examples of how not to select government for a free country.

Then again, the establishment of the seat of Government in Algiers is an important move, meaning that the base for a re-established France has been built upon French soil. Now the French army is based within the French Empire while the French administration is operating from one of the pride cities of French territory. No more is it a Government-in-exile, but a Government-in-fact with an effective army, a substantial fleet, territory of its own and all that it takes to be a nation.

The decision of the French squadron at Alexandria to join up with the United Nations is of certain military value, but the effects will not be felt for many months, as considerable time must elapse before the vessels can be reconducted for service against the Axis. But it is important as being the first sign of the benefits to accrue under the unity of leadership reported from Algiers and may be the sign for French officials in other parts of the world, notably Martinique, to throw in their lot with the United Nations and remove the danger of an Axis base being established near the shores of North America.

HON. E. C. MANNING

One of the youngest Premiers ever to head a Canadian provincial administration, Hon. Ernest Charles Manning, who was yesterday sworn in as Premier of Alberta to succeed the late William Aberhart, is only thirty-four years of age, but has already served almost eight years as a Minister of the Crown, being Provincial Secretary and Minister of Trade and Industry in the Cabinet of Premier Aberhart since 1935 when the first Social Credit Government in the world was founded.

He is a son of the West, being born in Carnduff, Sask., of English descent, moving later to Alberta where he entered politics and was elected to the Alberta Legislature in 1935, being named to the Cabinet the same year.

He is left with a great task and a great opportunity before him. He has the responsibility of reorganizing the finances of the Province on a permanent basis. He can either come to some amicable agreement with the creditors of the Province and thus re-establish the name of Alberta as a field for reasonable investment. Or he can follow along the path of his chief, repudiating the Provincial liabilities in whole or in part and thus discourage capital investment.

For the sake of the Province it is to be hoped that the responsibilities of office will bring to him the realization of the importance of his decision. Alberta is rich in natural resources, which could do much to assure her prosperity after the war, but to develop them takes capital—and capital will only come with the reasonable assurance of stability. Thus he faces the decision of future prosperity or provincial retrogression.

PRESS COMMENTS

EXPERTS GALORE!

St. Catharines Standard.

This is a war, truly, which is being "experted" to death. The Ottawa Journal remarks that there is an expert out on every limb these days, the radio and the swivel chair men turning out copy by the ream. Perhaps the public demand is the reason, or the flood of expert opinion would not otherwise be possible.

The Ottawa paper sizes it up:

The strategists, who may never have seen a battle in their lives, search the words of Churchill, Roosevelt, Eden and every top man, for clues. Nothing escapes their vigilant eyes. If Mr. Churchill meant this when he said that, then the situation is thus; if, on the other hand he meant this other thing, then here is what may happen! With "ifs" and "buts" and conditions and reservations, they take us into the innermost secrets of the Axis camps as well as the hidden places of London and Washington—a first class expert in good standing can arrange the collapse of Italy for breakfast, the bombing of Tokyo for lunch, and for dinner a two-front attack on Germany itself.

All this would be amusing if it were not so exasperating. Obviously those who know the facts, and they are few, do not tell what they know. Obviously if a newspaper or radio expert did have access to confidential information his sense of loyalty—or the censor—would seal his lips or lock his typewriter. So what they give us is guesswork, and with a map and a few high-sounding military phrases anybody can do as well.

There is one "expert" on the Canadian radio who induces an ordinary pain in the neck with the frequent reminder in his five minutes: "Some weeks ago I told you this," or "I said that." Obviously a man who should be on the High Command, with his presence or egotism. He's just too far-sighted for ordinary radio. And his name is not O'Leary either.

VICTORY GARDENS AND HEALTH

The Health League of Canada is taking a keen interest in the trend to plant Victory Gardens as a means for increasing the food supply of the nation at a time when there are certain shortages of other foods and when meat is rationed. The League has issued advisory literature which points out how certain plants supply certain elements that are wholesome for the human body. It is surprising how many of the ordinary vegetables there are which can be eaten with benefit. In fact, it seems almost safe to say that practically all of the familiar products of the garden can be taken into the human body with profit in the way of health. The following article issued by the League should give pointers to many who are making an attempt to grow vegetables for the family table.

Nutrition experts consider the mineral content of foods as important as the vitamin content. The minerals needed in the largest quantities are calcium and phosphorus.

In planning the Victory Garden the principal question to be considered is whether there are particular crops to be grown for their min-

eral content, in addition to those which are vitamin-rich.

The answer is no. The vegetables which contribute vitamins to the diet also contain minerals. Take calcium, which is required in the largest quantity and is most likely to be lacking in poorly planned diets. It is also the mineral expected to be scarce under food rationing.

Children need more calcium than adults. It builds strong bones and teeth, and is important in many bodily functions. Its principal source is milk and cheese, but after these come the green leafy vegetables, the same that are richest in Vitamins A and C.

Here is a list of vegetables containing calcium, given in the order of their value, the richest first: Green outer leaves of cabbage, turnip greens, mustard greens, collards, kale, watercress, broccoli, endive, Swiss chard, beet greens, dandelion greens, celery, kohlrabi, spinach, okra, leaf lettuce, parsnips, leeks, turnips, snap beans, cabbage heads, carrots and onions.

The calcium content of vegetables will vary according to the presence of calcium in the soil. Sandy soils and those in wooded sections also are likely to need lime. Lime is easily added, preferably in the form of fine limestone, applied before the garden is spaded, and thoroughly mixed with the soil. Lime has great value in stimulating the growth of plants, also. Though not a fertilizer, it makes plant food present in the soil more available to the plants.

Phosphorus is contributed by the following garden vegetables, given in order of their value: Fresh lima beans, green peas, parsnips, collards, loose cabbage leaves and broccoli. It is also found in many other foods and, every day, it might be said, new factories arose around which grew up towns where, a few weeks earlier, there had been only fields. Naturally all those different factories had to be used. To make machine-tools, when factories were insufficient, new ones had to be built. That went on for years, down to the time when it became apparent that the available resources in material and manpower were scarcely sufficient for the factories and equipment in use at the moment. It goes without saying that no-one could go farther than that, since there would have been useless waste. All construction in hand was suspended.

The green, leafy foods which are so valuable for their vitamins and calcium are also good contributors of iron. Many vegetables not listed as rich will contain calcium and some of this as well as other minerals. One does not expect to get all his quota of any vitamin or mineral from any one dish as a rule. But in planning the menu, there should be a good representation of the foods which contain these vital elements; and this year you cannot count on having enough of them, unless you plan to grow many in your Victory Garden.

McKENNEY ON BRIDGE

DROP QUEEN ON ACE TO BAFFLE DECLARER

This is the second of a series of articles showing a technique of play known as false-carding. This series will prove beneficial to expert and beginner alike.

I do not want my readers to get the impression that it always pays to false-card. Use this play only when you have something to gain by it. Today we have another example of a neat false-card play. North leads the three of spades, East puts on the five-spot and declarer (South) finesses the jack, which holds the trick. South lays down the ace, and now East has an opportunity to execute a skillful false-card play. East should drop the queen on the ace, not the ten-spot.

This puts the declarer up against a guess. He does not know whether to play the four-spot from his hand and finesse the nine, or go up with the king. In all probability he will play the nine-spot, and thus East will win a trick with the ten. If East plays the ten on the ace, winner.

Over Fifty Thousand Members Now In Primary Chapters Of I.O.D.E.

Edmonton, June 1.—(C)—Report of the Organization Committee of the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire at the annual meeting here was prefaced by a plea for the whole-hearted co-operation of all members in the ever-widening tasks and responsibilities created by the war.

In presenting the report, Mrs. W. C. Hodgson, of Montreal, urged Chapters to strengthen their membership programme to meet the added obligations of today. The work accomplished during the past year by some 33,000 members, said Mrs. Hodgson, would be greatly extended if the Order could reach its objective

of 50,000 members. The youth of Canada was needed to bring vitality and a renewed vigour into the Chapters, and she urged Provincial secretaries to recruit among them.

Membership by provinces showed Ontario with a paid-up membership of 14,939; Quebec 8,521; British Columbia 3,153; Nova Scotia 2,779; Alberta 2,362; Saskatchewan 2,143; New Brunswick 1,991; Manitoba 1,553—a total paid-up membership of 32,441 Primary Chapter members. In addition there were 1,367 junior members making a grand total of 33,808 members distributed among eight provincial, 28 municipal, 825 primary and 73 junior chapters.

The report of the Child and Family Welfare Committee, presented by Mrs. F. R. Taylor, revealed a total of \$39,839.20 spent in the Dominion on Child and family welfare work during the year 1942.

The War Savings Committee of the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire reported that over \$27,496.00 had been received by the I. O. D. E. through the sale of War Savings Stamps and Certificates during the past year. In presenting her report, Mrs. C. R. Brown of Toronto said that this figure represented the minimum of sales. The distribution of I.O.D.E. folders throughout the provinces had resulted in novel and varied means of selling the stamps, said Mrs. Brown. The I. O. D. E. Stamp Hut at Leithbridge, Alberta, open during most of 1942, had been especially successful. At the request of the National War Service Committee, Ottawa, pictures of the Hut with its history and sales figures were sent to Finance Minister Ilsley.

The press and radio services of Canada had been of inestimable help in carrying the work of the I.O.D.E. to the public during the past year, said Mrs. H. E. Munro, Toronto, presenting the report of the committee. The interest and support of individual members were maintained by these agencies, said Mrs. Munro, and in addition widespread support for the various activities of the Order

was gained by contacting the public. "Echoes," the national publication of the I.O.D.E. is finding its way into Service Centres of Navy, Army and Air Force, where it is much appreciated, reported Mrs. P. G. Might of Toronto, Secretary of the Echoes Committee. The magazine is distributed not only to schools, libraries and hospitals, but to all ships of the Navy, Canteens and Service Centres of the forces, even going as far afield as South Africa.

The I. O. D. E. trophy presented each year to the province showing the largest percentage of increase in annual subscriptions over the previous year was won for 1942-43 by Manitoba, the trophy winner for the previous year being Nova Scotia. Saskatchewan stands second in position this province also held last year.

The Endowment Fund Committee of the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire reported a dropping off in funds collected for the year 1942-43 over those of last year. Mrs. R. H. Hart of Winnipeg said the nine provinces and Yukon Territory had contributed a total of \$6,977, while last year's total was \$7,430. Ontario alone showed a substantial increase of \$180 over last year's amount; Saskatchewan and Manitoba showing slight increases.

The purpose of the fund, Mrs. Hart outlined as being to provide security for the I.O.D.E. It is the Beveridge Plan of the Order, that will perpetuate it, and establish its work on a sound basis. All available money of the fund, Mrs. Hart reminded the members, is invested in victory bonds where it is doing war work for Canada, as well as securing the future of the order.

C. W. L. CONVENER VISITS SAILORS' CLUB

Mrs. Albert Vallee, Catholic Women's League Convener of Ditty Bags for the Merchant Marine, visited the Catholic Sailors' Club in Montreal, where she was welcomed by the manager, Dr. William H. Atherton and attended the mass celebrated by Rev. Thos. G. Walsh, S.J., Chaplain of the Club. She also spent a few interesting hours in the attractive recreation hall where she was able to observe the sailors enjoying the many comforts, and she received personal words of appreciation for the Ditty Bags that the boys had been receiving. She had the honor of presenting the Ditty Bags and Flannel Shirts to a group of sailors who were about to embark. Many of them said that they had been tormented several times, but that they were very anxious to get back into battle.

The picturesque site of the Catholic Sailors' Club marks the site of the old "Maisonnette" landed in 1642, and Samuel de Champlain in 1611 chose the spot for his harbor. The present imposing structure had humble beginnings in an attic overlooking the St. Lawrence and the wharves alongside. It was proposed by the pioneers to found an Institute for Catholic Sailors where they would be able to obtain books, magazines and writing materials, and other forms of amusements to make their burdens lighter. Among the many other amusements the weekly Sailors' concerts, founded in June 1893, are the most popular.

Above all the society desired to look after the spiritual welfare of the sailors by furnishing them with all particulars regarding the hours of Masses and other Services and inducing them to attend to their religious duties. The Club has always welcomed all sailors, regardless of their creed or nationality.

The first President was J. H. Feeley, 1893-5, and Francis James Hackett, M.D., is recorded as builder of the Montreal Sailors' Club. Dr. Hackett became President in 1929 and Honorary President in 1936. Miss Anna T. Sadler, well-known contemporary writer, related how the ladies had formed themselves into a committee to support the leadership of Mrs. Hington for the purpose of furthering the Club's activities.

In 1941 at a National Convention of the Catholic Women's League of Canada an appeal was made for Ditty Bags for the Merchant Marine, since that appeal bags have been sent from all subdivisions of the C. W. L. including many from the Diocese of Sherbrooke. Some of the letters of appreciation are printed below.

REPORT MARKED EXPANSION OF V.O.N. SERVICE

Executive Council Hears Reports of Increased Facilities Being Offered by Victorian Order of Nurses.

Ottawa, June 1.—(C)—Miss Maude E. Hall, Acting Chief Superintendent of the Victorian Order of Nurses, said at a meeting of its executive council here yesterday that a new branch recently was organized in Niagara Falls, Ont., to serve a population of 28,000 people, including Chippawa and Stamford Township.

She said the V.O.N. branch in Pictou, N.S., which a year ago increased its staff from one to three nurses when an industrial nursing service was extended to employees of Maritime Foundation Ltd., Shipbuilding, since has added a fourth nurse, and recently requested that the vacancy for a fifth nurse be filled.

In Trenton and Pembroke, Ont., a second nurse has been added to the staffs, and the Sherbrooke, Que., staff has been increased from three to four. Extension of the service of the Moncton, N.B., V.O.N. branch is under consideration to meet war conditions caused by the increased population in the city and suburbs.

Miss Hall said arrangements have been made to place 23 nurses who have completed public health courses at the following universities: McGill, Montreal; University of Western Ontario, London, Ont.; University of Toronto; University of British Columbia, Vancouver, and the University of Alberta, Edmonton, but the problem of obtaining nurses with public health training still remains acute, and there are other vacancies to be filled.

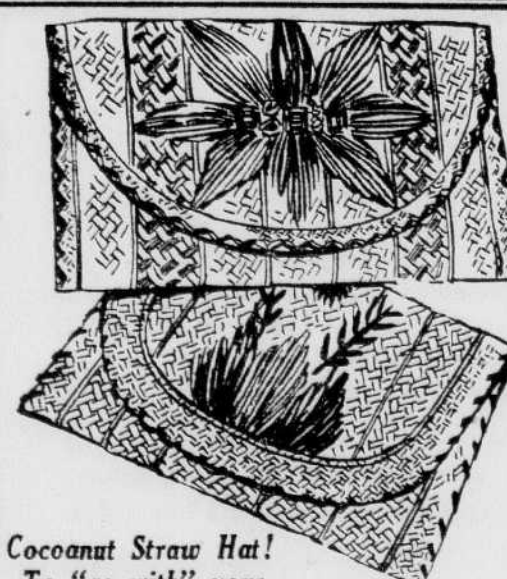

Topsy Turvy Results Of Thirty Nine Games

Baseball has three big week-ends this season—Memorial Day, Independence Day and Labor Day—and the first of these has given the major leagues something to shout about, if they have any breath left.

In three topsy-turvy days comprising the extended observance of Memorial Day in the big leagues thirty-nine games were played for the entertainment of 371,713 paying customers.

When the whole bewildering business was over the standings of both leagues had been scrambled—but New York Yankees were on top in the American and Brooklyn Dodgers still in front in the National.

The Dodgers preserved their slender margin at the head of the senior circuit by dividing a doubleheader at St. Louis before 25,664 fans, the largest crowd in the National League yesterday.

They were shut out 7-0 in the first game as Mort Cooper pitched a spectacular one-hitter. Billy Herman spoke a no-hit chance for Cooper by smashing a double in the fifth inning.

Cardinals themselves were blanked 1-0 in the second game although Harry Brecheen, rookie Southpaw, held Brooklyn to four hits while the Redbirds made five. Fred Fitzsimmons, who pitched seven innings before being removed for a pinch hitter, was credited with the victory.

Yankees split two games with Chicago White Sox, who had knocked Washington Senators out of first place in the American League on Sunday.

The Sox scored five runs in the tenth inning to win the first game 10-5, but the American League champions on homers by Charley Keller and Joe Gordon who accounted for seven runs as the Yankees won the night cap 10-4.

Monday's largest baseball throng, 31,892, was on hand for the games with the White Sox.

At Washington the Indians and Senators battled to a draw. Alex Carrasquel, pitching the last two innings of the first game, received credit for his sixth victory without defeat as the Senators gained an 8-7 decision. Then he returned to the scene in the tenth inning of the nightcap and lost a 7-6 verdict in the 13th frame.

Boston Red Sox swept the second straight doubleheader, stopping the St. Louis Browns 7-1 in thirteen innings and 7-6 in ten. Hal Newhouse pitched two-hit ball as Detroit shut out Philadelphia Athletics 7-0.

But Roger Wolff pitched the A's to a 4-3 victory in the second game. Boston Braves held onto third place in the National League by splitting with Pittsburgh Pirates. Jim Tobin pitched five-hit ball in the opener to win 6-1 and then Bob Klingner blanked the Braves 4-0.

Pirates, who had vaulted from seventh to fourth place on Sunday, lost their first division berth to Cincinnati, however, as the Reds beat New York Giants 6-4. The second game was cancelled in the sixth inning with the score 0-0.

Philadelphia's travel-weary Phillies finally won the first game of their Western expedition by beating Chicago 10-4 after losing six straight, but the Cubs set them down 8-2 in the second game.

New York, June 1.—(C)—Helen Sioussat has probably seen more nervous, frightened big shots than any other woman in America.

One of her tasks, as head of Columbia Broadcasting System's department of talks, is to soothe the fluttering nerves of speakers who are about to take the air.

"People grow nervous because they are afraid of that unseen audience," Miss Sioussat explained in her New York office the other day. "Afraid that people won't like them and will tune them out."

"Fred Astaire dreads a broadcast. Anne Shirley used to break ammonia capsules in her palms to steady herself and Joan Crawford used to take off her shoes. But I think the most apprehensive person I have ever seen before a broadcast was Edsel Ford. His knees knocked together. He kept saying to me, 'I know I shouldn't do this—that there is nothing to be frightened of—but I can't make my knees understand it.'"

Being shepherded by Helen Sioussat should be no hardship for broadcasters. Miss Sioussat (pronounce it See-oo-sat) makes a happy impression on the eyes and ears. Dark hair, and eyes, warm olive skin, wide friendly smile.

Miss Sioussat's job as CBS director of talks is unique. So far as she knows no other woman has a job just like it. Her office considers and passes on all requests for free time on the network. A senator wants time to discuss the income tax. A returned diplomat is going to discuss world conditions. A movie star wants to speak on buying war bonds.

Flocks of organizations, sponsors of national "days" and "weeks" and people with ideas they wish to air, besiege the talks director's office. It is her job to see that only responsible speakers are scheduled, "to roll out the red carpet" for the most important ones when they arrive at the studio and to calm the nerves of any who need steadying.
