World News In Brief

Tokyo, June 10.—(P)—United States Army agents searched Tokyo's tough Nakano ward today for clues in the mystery death of Miss Brocha Lova, first American woman killed in Japan since the war. Her father lives in Toronto.

Japanese police found her body early Monday beside a Nakano road, with two bullet holes through her head.
The army confirmed identification of the Russian-born, 36-year-old war department civilian employee today, and listed her home address as New York City.

Ottawa, June 10.—(C.P.)—Defence Minister Claxton said today that medals won during the war by Canadian servicemen are "on their way," but that owing to the shortage of highly-skilled labor in Britain where all decorations for bravery for distinguished service are made, delay has been unavoidable.
Everything possible has been done to hurry the work along, he added, but more than half of the awards made to Canadian servicemen are still to come.

Campaign stars and medals are being manufactured at The Royal Canadian Mint, he said, but distribution will only be started when sufficient quantities are available.

Drummondville, Que., June 10.—(C.P.)—Members of 13 families in this municipality 100 miles southwest of Quebec were being cared for by neighbors today following a fire that destroyed the three-story dwelling where they lived.

The fire began Sunday following an explosion of undetermined origin and firemen were on the job most of the day before the flames were extinguished. A department store on the ground floor was burned out and neighboring dwellings were damaged.

Several persons suffered minor injuries.

Nanking, June 10.—(P)—Government news dispatches reported fresh reversals on the Manchurian front today and cast doubt on the government's ability to halt the Chinese Communists' powerful spring offensive toward Mukden.

"Overwhelming strength of the Communists" forced Chiang Kai-shek's garrison to evacuate the railroad town of Lung, 38 miles south of Changchun and 145 northeast of Mukden, the official Central News Agency reported.
Fresh reports from Pusan, gateway to Dairen, reflected similar confusion.

NO ARRESTS IN ASSAULT CASE

Montreal, June 10.—(P)—Provincial Police reported today investigation into alleged assault on Alan Mosely of Sutton, Que., recently has been "cleaned up." No arrests would be made.

Mosely is in hospital here where he underwent an operation for what authorities described as "serious head injuries."

Police said the injuries were received during a dispute between victim and three companions near Sutton.

Truman Arrives In Ottawa Today For Three-Day Visit

United States President, on his fourth trip outside his country since he became President, will address Canadian Parliament on Wednesday—Accompanied by wife and daughter.

Aboard Presidential Train en Route to Ottawa, June 10.—President Truman, enjoying a three-day holiday from the cares of state, headed into Canada today on his fourth trip outside the United States since he became President upon the death of Franklin D. Roosevelt April 12, 1945.

Accompanied by Mrs. Truman and his daughter Margaret, both of whom seemed eager at the prospect of visiting the Dominion, the President left Washington last night by special train on the 18-hour trip to Ottawa, where he will address the Canadian Parliament Wednesday. He will return to Washington Friday.

Ottawa is the only Canadian or other point where the President will make an official appearance. Apart from the speech, the Canadian program is designed principally to afford Truman and his family a period of relaxation and good fellowship.

Baptist Head Makes Appeal For Reforms

Thomas Camelford, President of Baptist Convention of Ontario and Quebec, Urges Removal of Unjust Laws and Systems.

Hamilton, June 10.—(P)—Social misery "must be extinguished, unjust laws repealed and unjust systems changed," Thomas Camelford, president of the Baptist Convention of Ontario and Quebec, told the 59th assembly.
"The new ideologies of fascism and communism and narrow nationalism have sent people and nations reeling away from the true religion," he said in his presidential address to delegates of more than 350 churches at McMaster University here.

Although Canadians were living in a world in which people had lost their way morally and spiritually, with multitudes having no faith to fortify their lives, "our Baptist faith and fellowship is adequate to meet the new day."

"The laws of morality are rejected as being too restricted. Drunkenness and gambling are growing apace, while divorce courts speak to us of the crumbling of home life," said Mr. Camelford.

Although Baptists were one with every movement for the betterment of the poor and which would recognize in every sphere the sacredness and dignity of the so-called common man, "we believe that the victory will be won by faith rather than by force."

He said the socialists of the day "are in a hurry to change the world and if need be, by force. Social evils must be traced to their source."

Speaking of the movement which tended toward inter-church unity, Mr. Camelford declared: "As Baptists we rejoice in all efforts of the unity of all believers and all followers of Jesus Christ, but we desire to state with equal frankness that formal, visible mechanical union alone has no charm for Baptists."

Freight Rate Rise Opposed On Prairies

Several Saskatchewan Organizations Scheduled to State Opposition to Increase as Regional Hearings Continue.

Regina, June 10.—(P)—Submissions from several Saskatchewan organizations opposing railway freight rate increases were to be presented to the National Rate Inquiry today as western regional hearings continued.

First brief of the day was expected to be tendered by the Saskatchewan Co-operative Marketing Association Limited, of Swift Current, Sask., a producers' co-operative of 15,000 Prairie and British Columbia members. Others scheduled to appear included spokesmen for farmers, boards of trade, women's groups, retailers and wholesalers.

At yesterday's opening session of the Board of Transport Commissions' western tour—which will last about a month—commissioners heard objections to the railroads' proposed 30 per cent freight rate increases from a provincial cabinet minister and spokesmen for the dairying industry and co-operative groups.

J. L. McIntosh, Minister of Co-operatives in the C.C.F. Government, declared the administration would oppose to the "fullest extent" any increase for Saskatchewan, and he added it considered existing freight rates too high.

A more detailed presentation by the government was to be submitted at Ottawa when hearings there reopen in mid-July.

The Saskatchewan Dairy Association, in a brief read by Past President J. S. Turnbull, charged the railway proposals would place an "intolerable economic burden" on the butter producers of the province.

The effect would be more pronounced in Saskatchewan than in any other province, the brief declared, because Saskatchewan has to ship its surplus butter past Manitoba and Alberta to find markets. It would amount to almost one cent a pound on a product where the producer's profit margin was "very narrow."

For co-operative groups, the Saskatchewan Federated Co-operatives asserted the requested increase would have a "drastic impact" on the economy of the west, particularly that of Saskatchewan.

Freight rates already were "inequitable and unfair" to this area, the organization of 60,000 members contended, and any rise "almost prohibit" the development of new industries.

Before seeking to raise rates, the co-operatives' brief contended, the railways should eliminate "inefficiency and waste" caused by competition and duplication of services. Until this was done, increases would be "unwarranted."

Truman Family Visits Canada



President Truman, his wife and daughter, Margaret, will arrive in Ottawa by special train at 3:30 o'clock this afternoon for a three-day visit. President Truman is scheduled to address a joint meeting of the Commons and the Senate during his visit, and there will be a round of social and state functions such as the capital hasn't seen since the war.

Ald. Albert Charpentier In Favor Of 2 p.c. Sales Tax

The application of a two-per cent municipal sales tax is necessary if Sherbrooke is to have a much-needed expansion and development program, stated Alderman Albert Charpentier, in an address delivered last night to members of the Lions Club.

Mr. Charpentier explained his views on the present financial status of the city and urged the application of a municipal sales tax "if the development of the Queen of the Eastern Townships is to become a reality."

"The public is consistently demanding improvements in the way of additional bridges, enlargement of main thoroughfares and the development of parks and playgrounds," continued Ald. Charpentier, "but the present municipal budget does not permit any work project to be carried out other than the bare necessities of streets paving and maintaining adequately the existing services."

Among urgently needed improvements, Ald. Charpentier named the following: Drinking water of a better quality, additional bridges, more electric power, the development and upkeep of Victoria and Jacques Cartier parks and the establishment of pension funds for civic employees.

"The present revenue does not allow any project to improve this situation," said the speaker, "and only meets the actual needs of the city. Consequently, for many years in spite of an incessantly growing population, the City of Sherbrooke has remained in a comparatively stationary stage in the field of civic improvement."

"Means must be sought," continued the speaker, "whereby Sherbrooke can be allowed to follow progress and expand, according to the place of importance, it has now taken among leading cities of the Province, because of its population."

Discussing the possibility of having to bank on revenue derived from the taxpayers, Ald. Charpentier stated that two alternatives were possible. "Either by applying new taxes or by raising presently existing taxes can the much-needed additional revenue be levied," said the speaker.

"In view of the fact that it can be imparted equally upon every citizen, the two per cent sales tax seems to be the most fair and equitable way from which this revenue can be derived," continued Ald. Charpentier. "Exemptions on this tax would comprise foodstuffs, clothing, medical care and rent," explained the speaker. "And everyone would be taxed according to his purchasing power."

Giving as an example, the cities of Montreal and Three Rivers, the speaker said that the two per cent municipal tax had been put into effect with commendable results in several towns in the Province.

Outlining further advantages of the suggested plan Ald. Charpentier stated that "everyone, including the tourists, would pay its just share towards the betterment of the city" from its application.

"While here, the tourist benefits from our services, our protection and our public utilities," continued the speaker, "Therefore, it would also seem fair and just that they should contribute to the development and progress of the city."

In conclusion the speaker stated that the progress of Sherbrooke can only be achieved at the cost of slight inconvenience and sacrifice to residents and that the proposed suggestion seemed a small price to pay for the betterment and immediate improvement of Sherbrooke.

Introduced by J. Eddie Caron, Lions Club President, the speaker was thanked by Justice J. Dalma Landry.

Soviet Purge In Bulgaria Is Widened

London, June 10.—(P)—Dispatches from Budapest suggested today the Communist-dominated Hungarian Government was widening its purge against dissident elements on several fronts.

The Communist newspaper Szabadseg said the "resistance certificates" of nearly 200 persons, including government and church officials, would be reviewed by a special committee under the Prime Minister's office.

Among those facing loss of these certificates, which indicate that the holders opposed the Germans during the war, were Deszo Sulyok, head of the Freedom Party whose newspaper recently was banned; Assembly Speaker Bela Varga, a member of the Smallholders Party; and Josef Cardinal Mindszenty, Roman Catholic primate of Hungary.

Others facing possible loss of their lands if the committee should decide they did not work against the Nazis, Szabadseg said, were Lajos Shivy, Roman Catholic Bishop of Szekesfehervar; Count Geza Telenki, former Minister of Education, and Bela Pedanyigulyas, head of the Smallholders Party's political committee.

At the same time, the Hungarian People's Court announced that 43 "intellectuals" including doctors, lawyers and professors, would go on trial late this month on charges of conspiring to overthrow the Hungarian republic.

The newspaper Vilag quoted Istvan Ries, Minister of Justice, as saying a new election law was being written to govern the national election "scheduled for the first half of September," under which "enemies" of the state, and their relatives, would be disfranchised.

In Vienna, Chancellor Leopold Figl issued an official denial of a statement by Ernest Fischer, one of four Communist members of the Austrian parliament, saying that Figl had offered to resign if such action was necessary to effect greater participation in government affairs by the Communist party.

Trade Accord With Norway Is Completed

Geneva, June 10.—(Reuters)—A tariff agreement between Canada and Norway, first pact to materialize from Canada's negotiations with 12 countries during the current trade conference here, is expected to be announced officially early next week.

Knowledge of the agreement has given rise to speculation in informed quarters here as to whether the two governments will ratify the agreement without waiting for completion of a multilateral tariff agreement, one of the main objects of the present conference, Canada, whose important negotiations with the United States have slowed down, has taken a prominent part in conferences on the proposed multilateral agreement.

It is recognized Canada's progress on tariff negotiations would provide a stimulus to other countries. If such could announce an agreement with the United States, it is believed success of the conference in this respect would be virtually assured.

2 U.K. Officers Kidnapped By Extremists Unharmed

Jerusalem, June 10.—(P)—Two British officers kidnapped yesterday by extremists were released unharmed today at Kiriat Shaul as a British military column prepared to search that Jewish colony.

A government announcement said the two men walked toward the British troops after the cordon had been thrown around the colony, which is near the all-Jewish city of Tel Aviv.

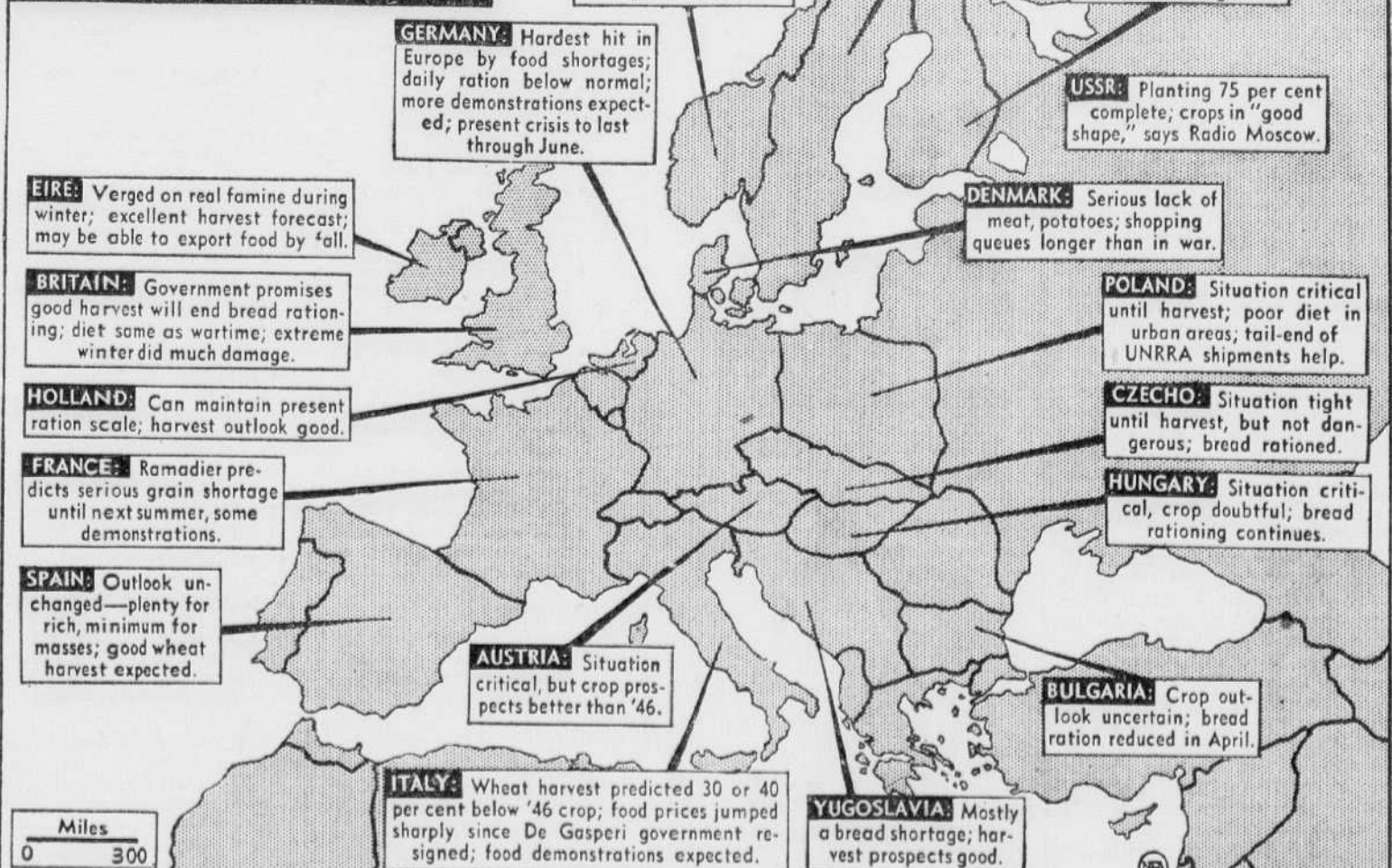
The search of the area went on as scheduled.
Military patrols had been scouring the area since the two were seized at a crowded swimming pool at Ramat Gan.

Haganah, a moderate Jewish underground organization, publicly appealed to Palestine Jewry to help in tracing the victims.
The policemen were Sgt. E. P. Hackett of London and Constable P. C. Ward of Dublin.

The kidnappers' escape truck was found before dawn today at a short distance from Herods, near Kiriat Shaul.

The Palestine Government immediately issued an official announcement that it was refraining from any action "which would hamper the Jewish community in meeting the call" of Haganah.

Whether you think so or not, my dear Johnny, Broadway is full of smart fellows. There's a gent with a head full of know-how leaning against every lamppost. Walk into a Times Square drugstore for a malted, and the guy on the stool is apt to be a Pulitzer Prize playwright, a crack scenic designer, or a double-A ASCAP songwriter.

But walk down a midway and talk to the barkers and cotton-candy peddlers, the weight-guessers and mitt-joint proprietors. Sure, these carry boys make colorful chatter. But compare them with the George Kaufmans and the George Abbotts, with Oscar Hammerstein the 2nd and Lee Shubert the 1st. Then ask yourself which set of minds you'd rather go up against.

Every midway in the world—no exceptions—is ready to be knocked off by a firecracker kid with a little imagination. These (and thorough-fares are still getting by on the attractions that radiate in the tuppence in Queen Victoria's time. Except for the parachute jump, Coney is substantially the same as it was in the buttoned-down days when Tillyou, Thompson and Dundie were the midway monarchs.

Every other kind of show business has kept an eye on the calendar. The movies have learned how to talk and make their heroines bluish in Technicolor. Dancing in the musical theatre has graduated from belly to ballet. The legit has moved up from "Uncle Tom" to "Uncle Vanya." But the midway business is still coasting along on Jo-Jo, the dog-faced boy, and "Throw a Dart at the Balloons."

And don't listen to the gent with the checked suit and the genuine diamond ring who tells you I don't know w if I'm talking about.

Oh, yes I do!

I remember three big midways at three world's fairs—New York, San Francisco, Cleveland. These midways stretched for miles, check-ablock with peepshows, snake

See if the mechanical shake-'em-ups do anything but spoil your appetite. It would be worth your while to invent a couple of new rides, Johnny. That's gold in them thar thrills!

Where will you get the money to build a new ride, set up a new concession? Where do you think you'd get the money to do a \$200,000 musical? From backers—angels who invest money in what they think are hot ideas. They operate that kind of money in state operettas every season. Why couldn't you sell them on an enterprise that runs for years once it clicks?

After 35 years, Steeplechase Park is still a better property than "Call Me Mister."

If you think you have what it takes, Johnny, bite into this candy apple. It shouldn't be hard to top these auspicious wonders. And if you can't top them, stay away from Broadway. What makes you think you can keep eating on a street where the competition is producing "Annie Get Your Gun," "Born Yesterday" and "Brigadoon"?

There it is, Johnny—hurry, hurry, hurry. A nickel's worth of showmanship on the midway will make you richer than mince pie. Besides, it'll keep you out in the open air.

ANTHEMIS IS PURCHASED BY 2 MAGOG MEN

Lake Memphremagog's only passenger steamboat, the "Anthemis," has been sold by its owner, Capt. Alexander Clarke, to Dr. Rouville Beaudry and Maurice Vallancourt of Magog. It was learned today. The new owners have engaged Capt. Clarke to operate the craft with the former pilot. Capt. John McEwen, Georgeville, and Alfred Goodie of Ayer's Cliff, as pilot and engineer, respectively.

The new owners are both young men and are well known in the Eastern Townships and along the international border. Dr. Beaudry and Mr. Vallancourt also have a small Diesel powered passenger craft which they will operate in conjunction with the Anthemis. The smaller craft will conveniently accommodate 35 to 40 passengers. The Anthemis will carry upwards of 300 passengers.

Capt. Clarke has operated the Anthemis for the past 30 years and has been a popular and courteous figure along the lake.

Previous to coming to Newport and Lake Memphremagog, Capt. Clarke was in the boat business on the St. Lawrence River. For ten years he was owner of a passenger boat on that river similar to the old "Lady of the Lake" which plied the waters of Lake Memphremagog, but which was somewhat larger and more elegantly furnished.

He started in as a purser at the age of 17 on St. Lawrence craft. Now undergoing repairs and the customary thorough spring check-up at its winter base at Georgeville, the Anthemis will be placed in operation later this month.

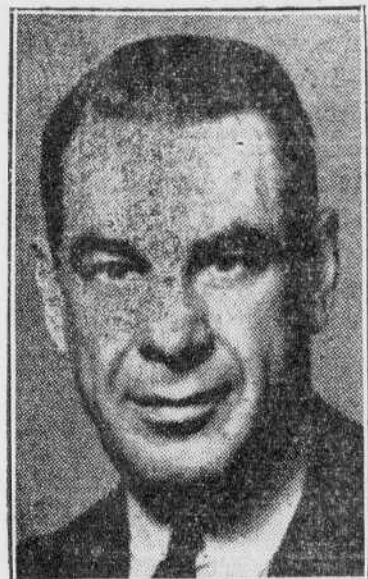
More Vets' Homes In This City Than Any Other Community In Province Outside Of Montreal

HOUSEHOLD FINANCE

Butter, Jams And Jellies Off Ration List, Prices May Go Up

Canadians could buy all the butter, jams and jellies they could get today but found their prices free to rise along with those of a number of other commodities removed from under the price ceiling in the Government's latest decontrol order.

The order, announced to an expectant Commons yesterday by Finance Minister Abbott, decontrolled butter, honey, all jams and jellies, marmalades and evaporated milk, leaving only sugar and molasses still on the ration list.

Taken from under the price ceiling by the order were butter, dairy products of all kinds, including cheese, evaporated milk and cream, honey, poultry and poultry products of all kinds, canned soups and salt, minor items of clothing, home furnishings and household equipment and supplies.

Also decontrolled as to price were such things as broilers, incubators and other poultry equipment; hay, hardwood lumber and plywood made wholly from hardwood and hardwood veneers; lead, copper and zinc.

The order also freed the price line on restaurant meals but left boarding house rates still subject to price ceilings.

Left under price control also were such food items as sugar, meat and meat products, bread and other commodities, the more essential items of clothing, all farm machinery, household textiles and other supplies, construction materials, soap and soap products, pulp and paper, containers and a wide variety of raw and processed materials.

The Finance Minister said the main groups were first of all certain products which it was desirable to remove from control at

this time because of seasonal factors; and secondly a number of metals which show signs of having settled at price levels above those prevailing in pre-war years.

In regard to restaurant meals he said the Government had to recognize the fact that "during the last few months most of the costs which enter into restaurant meals either have been decontrolled or as in the case of meat, butter, sugar, shortening and rents, have been authorized price increases."

"The Government consider the time now appropriate to take this further step."

Mr. Abbott termed dairy products of all kinds including butter, cheese, evaporated milk and ice cream as the most important food-stuffs released from price control and said "these products now are at their seasonal peak of production and price ceilings can therefore be removed with minimum danger of significant price increases."

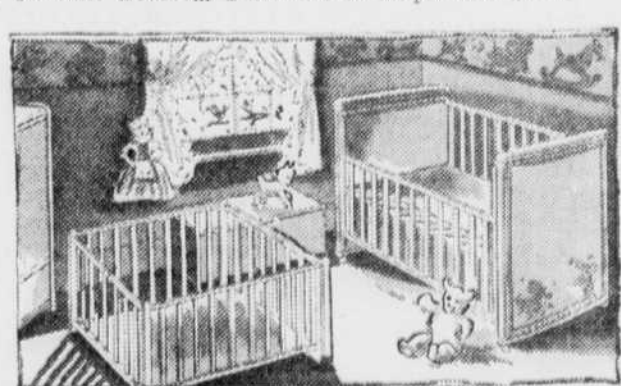

will travel in a drive through the city and inspecting buildings he will enter, including even Rideau Hall, the stately government house where the Trumans will be guests of the Governor-General and Viscountess Alexander.

Special credentials have been issued all newspaper men and photographers warned to take no "shot"

of the President at closer than 20 feet. The Governor-General and Prime Minister King will be on hand to greet the President when he steps down from the train with his entourage headed by his personal chief of staff, Fleet Admiral W. D. Leahy. Accompanying the President into the capital will be External Affairs Minister St. Laurent, U.S. Ambassador Ray Atherton, Canada's Ambassador to the U.S., Hume Wrong and others who board

the train at Rouses Point, N.Y., just across the Quebec border. Thousands are expected to line the route of the Presidential drive to the home of the Governor-General where Mr. Truman will review a guard of honor and tonight be guest of honor at a state dinner and reception. Wednesday the Trumans move to the residence of the U.S. Embassy and that afternoon the President will address a joint session of the Canadian Parliament. What he will say to Parliament in the broadcast address has not been

made public but it is expected he will make references to hemispheric solidarity and friendship. Thursday the Presidential party has nothing on its formal schedule except a dinner at the U.S. Embassy residence and they will depart for the south about 11 p.m. that night.

The Baccalaureate Services Despite the downpour of rain on Sunday morning, Centenary United Church was crowded to capacity, many having to be seated in the church hall and others not able to gain admission to the building for the annual baccalaureate service. One of the most notable events of its kind held in the Eastern Townships, the baccalaureate service is an impressive and memorial conclusion to the year's scholastic activities always held on the Sunday preceding convocation. Sunday's service was of special interest this year, bringing as it did one of the most inspiring and thought-provoking addresses ever delivered to a graduating class.

The Very Rev. George C. Pidgeon, M.A., D.D., of Toronto, was the guest preacher, stressing the value of having, holding and developing ideas as a driving force in life.

Taking as a title for his address "An Idea and an Adventure," Dr. Pidgeon said that without ideas very little could be accomplished. He urged the students during their school terms to think out ideas on everything they possibly could, so that when the time came for them to go out into the world they would be prepared and be full of ideas, which they could bring to fruition in time.

Dr. Pidgeon pointed out that what they were seeking to do was not to try and please God particularly, but preparing themselves for whatever task He called them to perform. If ideas were good, while they might be spurned for a time, they would be vindicated.

He stressed the thought that people had to have ideas since without them very little could be accomplished. He illustrated his point by drawing from the life of such men as Woodrow Wilson who entertained an idea that was spurned for a long time until he was eventually vindicated. The strength of an idea he also saw illustrated in the life of Henry Ford.

Dr. Pidgeon recalled that in 1912 Prof. John Watson at Queen's University had told the graduates that German ideas had changed and because of that there would be bloodshed, and this had proved to be a true interpretation of the ideas they had held. If the students were convinced of the soundness of their ideas there was no limit to what they could do. In a religious sense this amounted to saying that it was not what they "could do for God, but what God could do for them."

In the evening Dr. Pidgeon spoke at the Stansfeld South United Church in Rock Island on "The Will in Religion." In this sermon he stressed the importance of their ideas, the will with strength and power. The College Orchestra was again in attendance.

Protestant Churches throughout the Boundary Communities cancelled their morning services in order to participate in the Baccalaureate service, a traditional custom in this international community. The exception was Universalist Church, Derby Line.

Rev. Errol C. Amaron, College Principal, presided at the service, being assisted by Rev. Dr. H. A. Carson, of Stansfeld South United Church; Rev. A. B. Lovelace of Beebe United, Rev. C. M. Stewart of Centenary Church and Rev. F. W. Mitchell, rector of Christ Church, Stansfeld.

The Baccalaureate Choir was, as usual, composed of the best singers of the district, who for some weeks prior to Sunday have practised under the expert direction of Miss Ethel M. Nesbitt, Mus. Bac., of the Eastern Townships Conservatory of Music staff. Their contributions were exceptionally well sung, being "The Omnipotence" by Schubert, and "Sanctus" by Gounod. Miss Gwendolyn Hands, formerly of the Toronto Conservatory of Music, prior to joining the E.T.C.M., very feelingly rendered Hayden's recitative and aria, "With Verdure Clad."

The College Orchestra, conducted for the occasion by Horace Bous of Sherbrooke, also made their usual much-appreciated contribution to the service, playing a Prelude, Handel's 1st and 5th movements from the Suite, and as an Offertory, Beethoven's "Andante Cantabile" from 1st Symphony.

Dr. Pidgeon, first Moderator of the United Church, and now minister of Bloor Street Church, Toronto, remarked in his introduction that it was of interest to him that he was accompanied by his wife, a former student of Stansfeld College. Others who were present in the large gathering from all parts of the Townships and from Montreal, included Dr. C. W. COUNTRY AND DAIRY PRODUCTS PRICES

Montreal, June 10.—The Montreal Market continued steady last week with receipts still fairly heavy although they had decreased somewhat. Local dealers who have finished packing eggs for export and storing under the full contract are turning their activities to the preparation of eggs for drying. Grade B eggs arrivals were still heavy with slow demand.

his listeners laughing with him and sitting forward on their seats that they might not miss a word or a gesture. That is showmanship—that is personality.

Nor does Mr. Chevalier depend entirely on that famous straw hat for his interpretations. His characterization of a Chinese mandarin, in costume, was splendid, while his rendition of "Il Pleurait" (Weeping Willie) in a battered felt hat several sizes too small for him, brought down the house.

As if to prove that his art grows younger with the years, he has added costumes and dance steps to his songs and impressions. His style now is more florid than one remembers it—the walks around with the agility of an acrobat, does a light-footed dance step, with remarkable grace and assurance, claps his hands with vigor and roars out a word he wishes to emphasize. Besides the straw hat and crescent grin, there's a cap, a top hat and at the very end a tattered overcoat to go with his joyous characterization of a gentleman of the streets.

Chevalier explains in his own charmingly slurred English the nature of most of the songs he sings in French. The Chevalier smile and the Chevalier personality can be seen in the human nature, of the uninhibited Place Pigalle, of a gentleman who cried for joy, the wooden shoes of the war and finally of "Valentine" and the disillusionment she brings to love.

Most of the lyrics for his songs were written by the artist himself and he seems to have a very keen insight into human nature, an instinctive feeling of kinship with people—perhaps that is what makes him so attractive. He is remarkable and irresistibly funny one minute and the next, with his nostalgic rendition of "Louise," as only he can sing it, he will tug at your heartstrings, making you feel the very pulsebeat of the people of Paris as it was, or Paris as it will be again.

Maurice Chevalier can hold an audience—by himself—for over two hours and have them clamoring for more—that is the test of a real artist. Adjectives are inadequate to describe this fascinating personality. He has to be seen and heard to be appreciated.

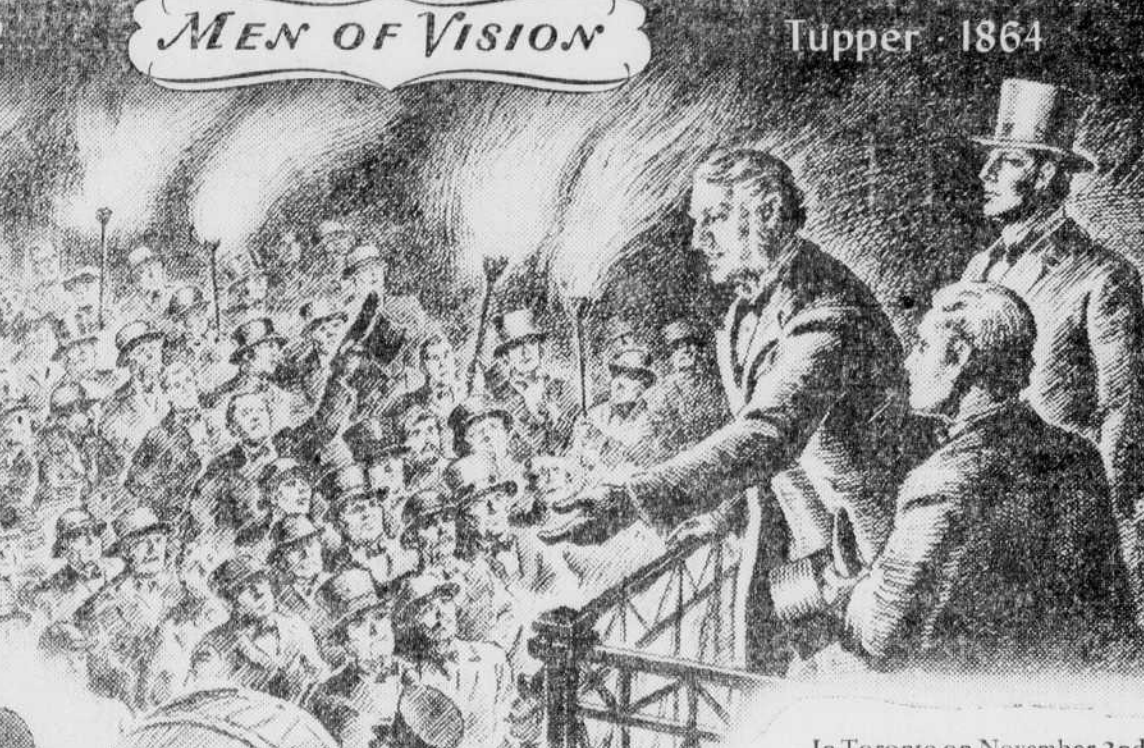

The Doctor Says

INEXPERIENCE CAUSES SWIMMING ACCIDENTS
By William A. O'Brien, M.D.

Swimming accidents result largely from panic and inexperience. If persons learn to swim when they are young and if they practice water safety, few accidents occur.



It is not wise to go swimming if you are overheated or immediately after eating. Reason for increased number of water deaths under these conditions is not known, but experience shows that it is true.

Muscle cramps while swimming may occur to anyone. They are the same cramps which are experienced under other conditions. Swimmers should keep calm and rub the cramp until it disappears.

Children who shiver and turn blue while swimming have stayed in the water too long. Body temperature drops to below normal when this occurs. Children who are chilled should get out of the water and dress as it takes several hours for their temperature to return to normal.

Sinus infections can develop in those who go in swimming while suffering with an upper respiratory infection. Diving feet first so that the water forcibly enters the nose, exhaling improperly under water and germs into the eustachian tubes as well as into the sinuses.

Artificial Respiration
If everyone practiced water safety, there would be few accidents. But since some will take chances, everyone should learn artificial respiration and give it when necessary.

The Schaefer - Prone pressure method for giving artificial respiration is recommended. Lay the patient on his stomach with one arm extended directly overhead, the other bent at the elbow with the face turned outward and resting on the hand.

Before starting artificial respiration, be sure the mouth and nasal passages are free of obstruction. Kneel astride the patient, compress the lower back region 12-16 times a minute. Continue until natural breathing is restored or until a physician pronounces the person dead.

Question: Is an X-ray examination advisable in backache?
Answer: The cause of some forms of backache, especially in older men, can be found on X-ray examination.

Artificial Respiration
If everyone practiced water safety, there would be few accidents. But since some will take chances, everyone should learn artificial respiration and give it when necessary.

The Schaefer - Prone pressure method for giving artificial respiration is recommended. Lay the patient on his stomach with one arm extended directly overhead, the other bent at the elbow with the face turned outward and resting on the hand.

Before starting artificial respiration, be sure the mouth and nasal passages are free of obstruction. Kneel astride the patient, compress the lower back region 12-16 times a minute. Continue until natural breathing is restored or until a physician pronounces the person dead.

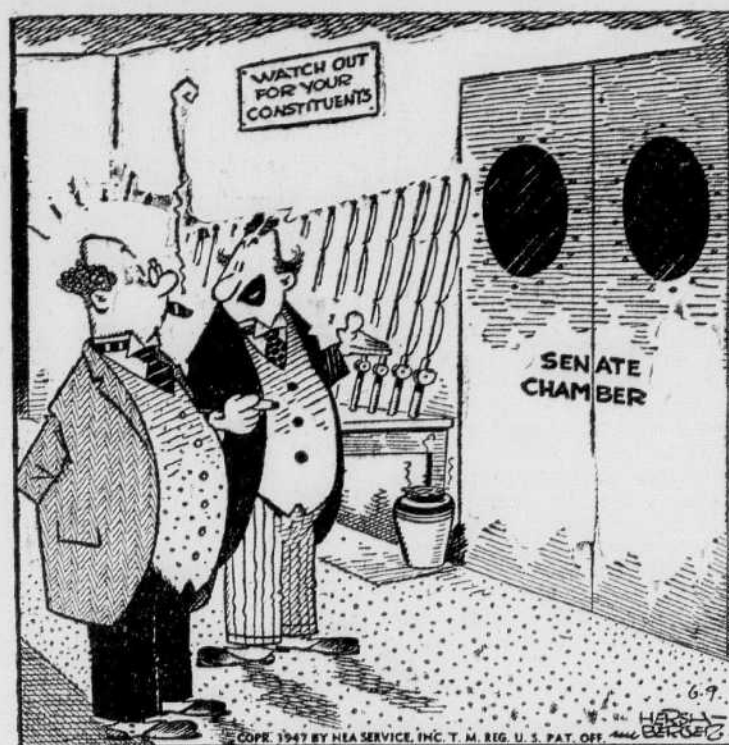

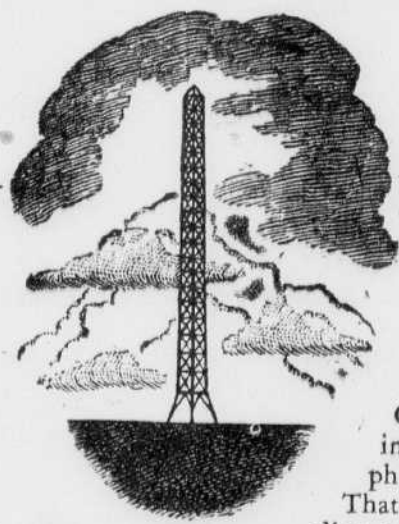

CANADIAN RADIO NEEDS FREEDOM TO GROW UP



Canadians are taking a lively interest in what goes into microphones in Canada's radio studios. That's because what goes into Canadian microphones comes out through loud speakers in Canadian homes. And that is why radio broadcasting is everybody's business — your business.

Right now the people who are trying to give you better and better radio programs are often handicapped by a "crazy-quilt" of rules and regulations and directives and legal what-nots. Many of Canada's radio laws have been handed down from government to government, from the days when radio was in the crystal-set stage. The laws have not kept pace with radio progress. They should be studied and overhauled so that there is nothing in them to prevent good Canadian programs from finding the widest possible audience.

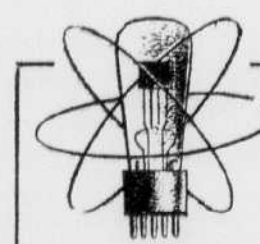

how they prevent fair and free competition; how they can discourage able people from seeking a career in Canadian broadcasting.

Because radio is something which lives with the people, it must always be carefully supervised and controlled. But in the interests of all listeners, now and in the future, we believe it should be supervised by an independent regulatory body—rather than the "Government-of-the-day".

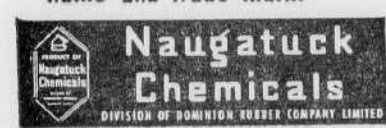

Kuehner Brothers Set Triple Mark As School Leads Class Four Events

Coach Harold Pye and his Lennoxville High School track team invaded the metropolis Saturday and copped the honors in Class 4 in the meet sponsored by the Montreal and District Protestant Secondary Schools Athletic Association.

Besides winning the honors in Class 4, for boys under 17 years, the Lennoxville boys set up three new records. John Kuehner, competing in Class 2, set a new high in the pole vault when he cleared the bar at 10 feet and in the high jump when he went over at 5 ft. 1 1/2 inches for two new records for Class 2. In Class 4 brother Don paced the field in the 440 to set up a new time of 53.6 seconds as well as winning the broad jump and the high jump.

The Lennoxville boys won points in all the classes and in Class 5, the Dominion Championships they placed second in the pole vault with John Kuehner representing Coach Pye's squad.

Dominion interscholastic team honors were won by Montreal High School with a total of 42 points. Loyola, one of the smallest entries, was second with 25, while St. Jean de Brebeuf College was third with 24. Montreal High School also topped the scoring in the first two classes while West Hill won the class three aggregate.

One of the most impressive individual performances of the event was the effort of slim, blond-haired Leo Roininen of Sudbury Mining and Technical School who established the only new Dominion interscholastic record. The Northern Ontario school boy boosted his own Canadian shot put mark up to 51 feet 14 inches, some 13 inches greater than he previously registered in 1946. He also broke the provincial record for the javelin throw on a heave of 174 feet 10 inches, almost 19 feet over the old mark.

Others showing form in the Dominion title class were Loyola's Albert Simard, who won the 880 yard run with a provincial time of two minutes one-and-four-fifths seconds, and George McPhail of Ottawa Technical School who won both the 100 yard and 220 yard runs.

West Hill's Haskell Blauer sprinted to victory in the 100 and 200 yard dashes, leading the Maroon and Grey to its win in the class for 16 and under. Both his efforts established new Quebec records.

Three new records marked the feat of young Jack Victor wearing the colors of Herbert Symonds High. Victor won the broad jump,

the 100 yard dash and 220 yard dash in Class 2 for schoolboys under 15 years of age. Oakville's Johnny Sutton led the youngsters in the class under 14 years of age winning the broad jump and the 220 yard dash.

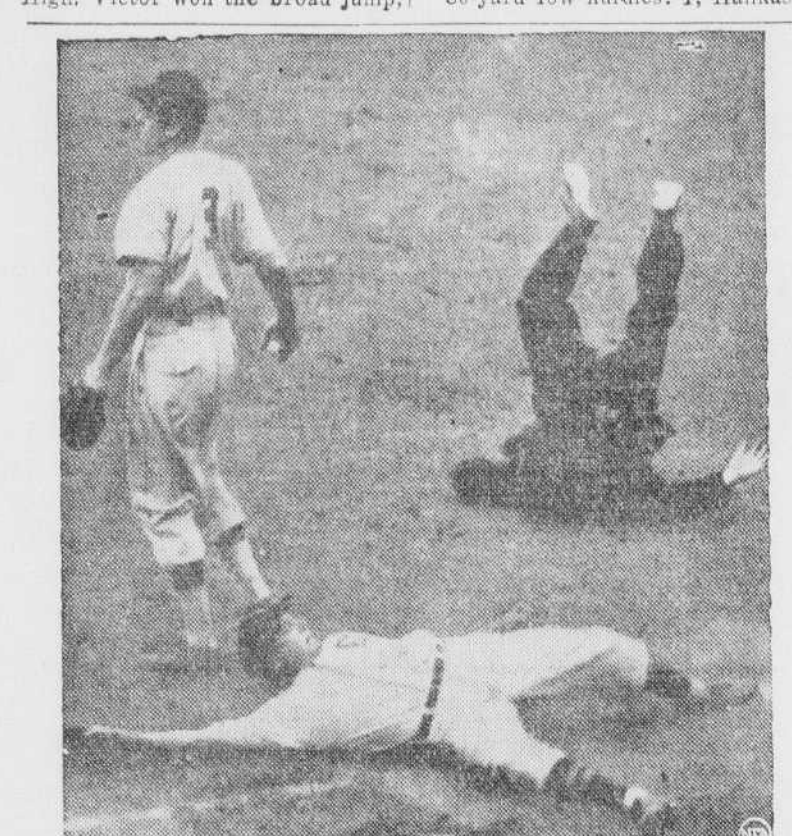
